Welcome back for today's game, as we take on Luton Town here at the Weston Homes

The game at Crewe saw us come away empty handed, having gone behind in a poor first half and then conceding a second as we searched for an equaliser. We dominated the second half and had a couple of decent chances that weren't converted. It was disappointing to leave with nothing, adding to the bad news about Sammie.

Thanks for all your support in these recent games, keep up the good work this afternoon and for the next seven games after today. We are still very much in the mix but it will take a big effort from everyone to achieve it. Make plenty of noise and enjoy the game.

Furthermore, groups are encouraged to buy credits together to then redeem and attend the games they wish to go to together.

WHAT'S BEST FOR YOU?

OUR GUIDE TO TICKETS



Colchester United's General Manager Tim Waddington has been answering some of the questions we have been receiving about our ticket options and how fans can decide what option is best for them.

With so many different ways to buy tickets for games this season, with

different prices for different parts of the stadium and then different concessions that also affect the price, it can be a bit confusing for fans to determine which method they should use and why that is the best option for them.

With the games having now started, the Season Pass is perhaps not an option for some fans, but the Annual Subscription means that supporters enthused by the

team's first half of the season can still get on board for the next year.

Tim said: "The Annual Subscription provides access to all home games for exactly a year and the cost is spread over 12 monthly payments."

Going on to discuss the matchday tickets, Tim advised us: "The Early Bird prices are very competitive, but you

EXAMPLE CASES

So, looking to understand the full advantages of the Match Credits, we asked Tim to supply us with some examples and below is the information he provided:-

EXAMPLE ONE

You know you will attend multiple games in the next year, but work and family commitments mean you don't know until the last minute when it will be, so you can never take advantage of buying cheaper, earlier.

Buying a batch of Match Credits allows you to buy at a competitive rate and then convert a credit into a match ticket at the last minute.

EXAMPLE TWO

You attend several games each year in a group, but not everyone in the group goes to all of the same games. Buying a batch between the group will make tickets cheaper to purchase and for each game you just convert the number of credits into match tickets that you need to.

EXAMPLE THREE

You run a business and like to mix business with pleasure and invite your customers and potential customers to games. You want to attend all of the games but, if you buy a number of Season Tickets, you know that some games are less attractive to your customers than others.

Buying Match Credits allows you to invite more customers to the attractive fixtures and yet still come yourself on that cold Tuesday evening in January, without wasting any tickets.

EXAMPLE FOUR

A large group of you want to attend a game, but it's too late to buy the cheaper matchday tickets.

You can simply buy a large batch of Match Credits at a cheap rate and then go online and convert them into match tickets.

FAIR USAGE

We want Match Credits to offer our loyal fan base a way to buy cheaper access to games. However, they must not be used to create a reseller option which would seriously undermine the Club finances.

need to be certain a couple of months in advance of the actual games you will be attending.

"Matchday prices do ramp up as a game gets closer so, if you are buying matchday tickets, then you must remember that the earlier you buy, the cheaper it is."

This season has also seen us introduce a Match Credits system, which offer another level of flexibility to fans with busy lives and are something that represents a first for the club as we continue to evolve the offer for supporters.

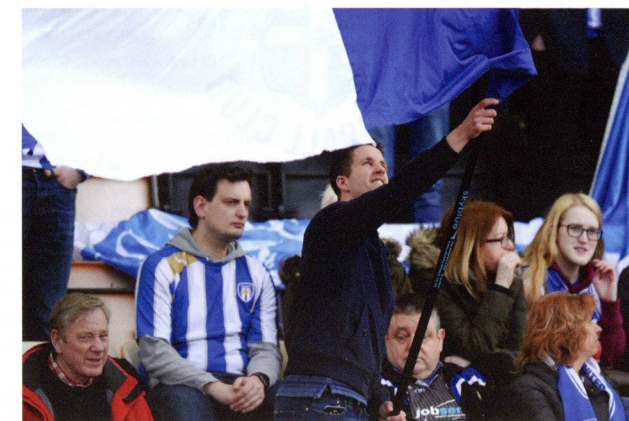


Tim explained: "The credits are very exciting for us and we are not aware that anyone else is doing anything else like it."

"If you, or a group which includes you, are planning to attend five or more games in the next 12 months but you need some flexibility regarding if, when and who will attend matches, then these Match Credits which are bought in batches online are going to be a great option."

"They get converted online to match tickets and remain valid for 12 months from the day the first one is redeemed."

We hope that this gives a better understanding of what's on offer this year as we prepare for an exciting campaign under John and Steve's management. We look forward to welcoming you on board!





IN OPPOSITION LUTON

Last weekend's defeat at Gresty Road has left Colchester United with work to do if they are to make a late dash for a Sky Bet League Two play-off berth. And with the unfortunate Sammie Szmodics breaking his leg, adding further to the U's injury woes, supporters could be forgiven for feeling somewhat frustrated at the moment.

Nevertheless, the wonderful thing about football is that there is always another game and an opportunity to put things right. Luton Town visit the Weston Homes Community Stadium today, perhaps a little disappointed themselves that they have failed to pick up maximum points in their last four League Two fixtures following Tuesday's draw at Newport.

Promotion-chasing Hatters were also held

by Exeter City at Kenilworth Road last weekend, much to the frustration of manager, Nathan Jones, who said: "It's definitely two points dropped. Exeter are a good side, but we have to win these games. For our ultimate goal, we have to win these games. It was a very good performance first half, I thought we controlled the game.

"We needed a bit more cutting edge, we needed a bit more about us, but we didn't quite have that. We started slowly second half, which is something we don't usually do. That let them into it and they had a couple of chances and then finally scored from a counter attack.

"Then we came into it. We made the changes and we got a goal back. We have missed a fair few chances in the

second half to have won the game, so that's the frustrating thing.

"It went a bit like a basketball game at the end. End-to-end. But it was two sides going at each other and we showed a lot of character to come back and to draw the game.

"Look, I am disappointed because I think it's two points dropped."

Colchester will also look to get back to winning ways. Speaking after that 2-0 setback at Crewe, U's boss, John McGreal, said: "I'm frustrated that we didn't get anything from this game because we had so many chances in the second half.

"If Rekeil's header had gone in, then I think Crewe would have been nervous

because they haven't been good at home recently.

"Their keeper (Ben Garratt) also made two good saves, and I could see them being edgy at 1-0.

"At least we gave the fans something to shout about with our second-half performance."

With neither side showing any form of consistency of late this could prove to be a tricky one to predict. Nevertheless, on their day both sides like to play an open, expansive game, which I believe could give us a decent contest this afternoon.

With all that in mind, I'm sitting on the fence and predicting an entertaining draw: U's 2-2 Hatters.

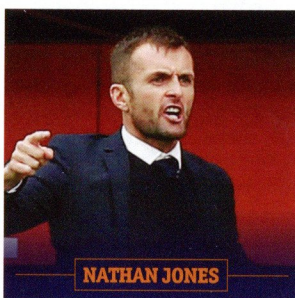

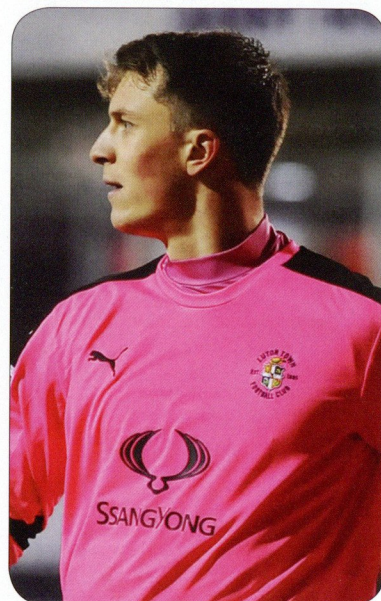
MATT MACEY

Macey joined the Hatters on loan until the end of the season from Arsenal late on deadline day in January 2017.

The 22-year-old joined the Gunners in 2013 from Bristol Rovers, where he had starred in their successful academy side, and was named on the bench nine times for Arsene Wenger's side in Champions League, Premier League and EFL Cup matches.

He had a loan spell with Accrington Stanley in 2015, for whom he made four appearances.



MIDFIELDER

PELLY RUDDOCK MPANZU

Age: 23 | Signed From: West Ham United



The former West Ham United academy graduate Ruddock Mpanzu is a direct, pacey youngster who was an instant hit when signed on-loan by then-boss John Still from the Hammers midway through the Conference title winning campaign of 2013-14, scoring a memorable goal in a crucial come-from-behind win at Dartford.

Versatile to play in central defence, midfield or on the wing, Pelly is a real crowd favourite and recently passed the 100 appearance mark for the Hatters.

DEFENDER

SCOTT CUTHBERT

Age: 29 | Signed From: Leyton Orient



Capable of playing at either centre-half or right-back, Cuthbert signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2015 having spent two years at Leyton Orient. He helped the O's reach the League One play-off final the season before last, and prior to that his influential performances enabled Swindon to do the same. He has been capped at B level for Scotland and, like Stephen O'Donnell, also came through the youth ranks at Celtic. Made 40 appearances in his first season at Kenilworth Road, and took over the captaincy when Steve McNulty left for Tranmere in October 2015. The club captain recently activated a clause in his contract to extend his stay at Kenilworth Road until the summer of 2018 after making his 50th start against Carlisle United in December 2016.

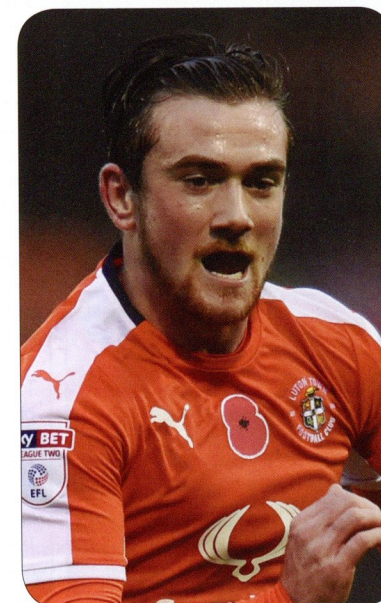
FORWARD

JACK MARRIOTT

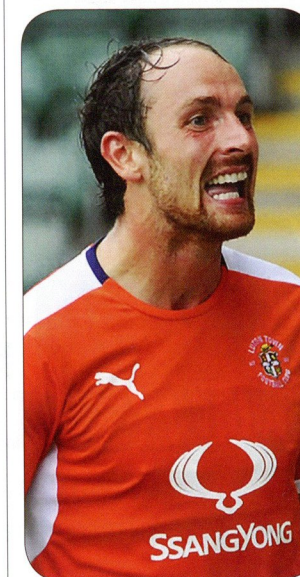
Age: 22 | Signed From: Ipswich Town

Talented young forward who moved to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2015 after spending six years at Ipswich Town, where he came through the academy.

Marriott played twice for Ipswich in the Football League, but gained experience on loan at Colchester, Gillingham and Carlisle, as well as in three spells at Conference club Woking, where he impressed in matches against the Hatters. After a bright start to his Luton career, Marriott signed a two-year contract extension before the opening month of the season was out and his goalscoring form continued throughout 2015/16, with 16 in 25 starts in all competitions earning him our supporters' player of the year award. Rewarded with a new three-year deal in late July 2016.



THE STAR MAN



DANNY HYLTON

London-born forward who joined the Town last summer alongside Oxford United team-mate Johnny Mullins, after the pair had helped the U's to promotion to League One and the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final.

Hylton started his career with Aldershot Town, where he made over 200 appearances in the Conference and League Two before joining Rotherham United in 2013.

He played just one game for the then-League One club, however, and was loaned out to Bury and AFC Wimbledon prior to his move to Oxford two years ago. While at the Kassam Stadium, Hylton hit 30 goals in 84 starts, but turned down the offer of a new contract in order to pen a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road.

Currently the club's top scorer this season, having passed his previous season's best tally of 16 in January.

Football historian Leigh Edwards profiles ten big-name Luton Town players not usually associated with the club



RON DAVIES

Noted for his aerial ability, Welsh international striker Ron Davies was capped 29 times after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Chester in July 1959, he was twice leading marksman, moving to Luton in October 1962. He was top scorer in 1962/63, netting 21 goals in 32 League games before joining Norwich City in September 1963. Moving to Southampton in August 1966, he topped their goalscoring charts three times before joining Portsmouth in April 1973. Later with Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs, Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, he coached in the United States and died in May 2013.

DEREK KEVAN

Inside-left Derek Kevan was capped 14 times by England before joining Luton Town initially with Ripon YMCA, he joined Bradford Park Avenue in October 1952 and followed Vic Buckingham to West Brom in July 1953. 'The Tank' was twice ever-present and top scorer on five occasions, moving to Chelsea in March 1963. Later with Manchester City, Crystal Palace and Peterborough, he joined Luton in December 1966 and

netted four goals in 11 League games. He moved to Stockport in March 1967, then Macclesfield, Boston United and Stourbridge. Later a driver for Signs Specialists in Hockley, he died in January 2013.

ALAN BIRCHENALL

Former England U23s midfielder Alan Birchenall briefly appeared for Luton Town in 1978/79. Signing professional for Sheffield United in June 1963, he joined Chelsea for £100,000 in November 1967 and moved via Crystal Palace to Leicester City in September 1971. He featured in their 1973/74 FA Cup run, then played for Notts County, San Jose Earthquakes, Memphis Rogues and Blackburn Rovers before joining Luton in March 1979. Making ten League appearances, he moved to Hereford United in October 1979, then had a spell as Trowbridge Town's player-boss, becoming Leicester's public relations officer.

COLIN TODD

Ex-England international central defender Colin Todd appeared for Luton Town in 1984/85. Initially with Sunderland, he moved to Derby County in February 1971, starring as they won the League

Championship in 1971/72 and 1974/75, when PFA Player of the Year. He joined Everton in September 1978, then played for Birmingham City and Nottingham Forest. Reuniting with Jim Smith at Oxford United in February 1984, he helped clinch the Third Division title and moved to Luton in October 1984, playing two League games. He later managed Middlesbrough, Bolton, Swindon, Derby County, Bradford City, Randers and Esbjerg.

STEVE WILLIAMS

Former England international midfielder Steve Williams was capped six times before joining Luton Town. Signing professional for Southampton in July 1976, he starred as they won promotion in 1977/78, were League Cup finalists in 1979 and League Championship runners-up in 1983/84. He joined Arsenal for £525,000 in December 1984 and featured in their 1987 League Cup final triumph, moving to Luton for £300,000 in July 1988. Scoring once in 40 League games, he reunited with Alan Ball at Exeter City in August 1991. He has worked in magazine publishing and property development, settling in Ottery St Mary.

MERVYN DAY

Luton Town's former loan goalkeeper Mervyn Day starred in West Ham's 1975 FA Cup final success. The England U23s international was twice ever-present for the Hammers and played in the 1976 ECWC final, moving to Orient in July 1979. He was ever-present three times prior to joining Aston Villa in May 1983, then joined Leeds United in February 1985 and helped win the Second Division title in 1989/90. Loaned to Luton in March 1992, he made four League appearances. Joining Carlisle United in July 1993, he became their manager, then assisted Alan Curbishley at Charlton and West Ham, returning to Leeds as chief scout.

JOHN HARTSON

Welsh international striker John Hartson helped Luton Town reach the FA Cup semi-finals in 1993/94. Signing professional for Luton in December 1992, he netted 11 goals in 54 League games before sold to Arsenal for £2,500,000 in January 1995. He scored in the 1995 ECWC final, moving to West Ham for £3,200,000 in February 1997. Leading marksman in 1997/98, he joined Wimbledon for £7,000,000 in January 1999 and had a spell with Coventry City prior to joining Celtic in August 2001. He starred in their 2001/02 'treble' triumph and joined West Brom for £500,000 in July 2006, gaining a total of 51 caps.

PAUL DICKOV

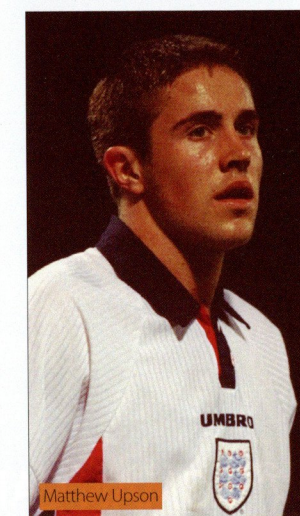
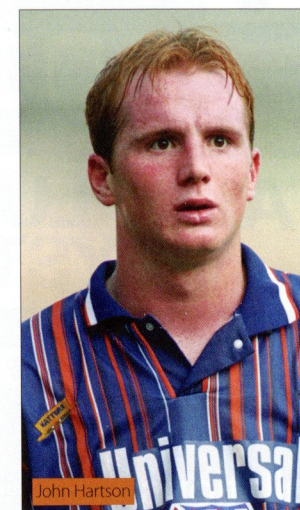
Luton Town's former loan striker Paul Dickov was capped times by Scotland. Signing professional for Arsenal in December 1990, he was loaned to Luton in October 1993 and scored once in 15 League games. A member of the Gunners' triumphant 1994 ECWC squad, he moved to Manchester City for £1,000,000 in August 1996. Starring in three promotion campaigns, he joined Leicester City in February 2002 and was leading scorer in their 2002/03 promotion success. He then appeared for Blackburn Rovers, Manchester City again, Leicester again and Leeds United, since managing Oldham Athletic and Doncaster Rovers.

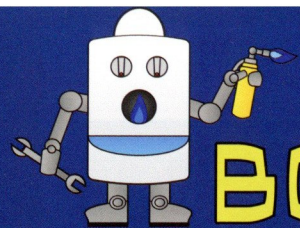
PAUL ALLEN

Former England U21s midfielder Paul Allen had a loan spell at Luton Town in 1994/95. From a notable football family, he signed professional for West Ham in July 1979 and was the youngest FA Cup finalist at 17 years 256 days in their 1980 Wembley triumph. He moved to Tottenham Hotspur for £400,000 in June 1985 and was an FA Cup winner again in 1991. Joining Southampton for £500,000 in September 1993, he was loaned to Luton in December 1994 and made four League appearances. He moved to Swindon Town in October 1995. He later played for Bristol City, Millwall and Purfleet and currently works for the PFA.

MATTHEW UPSON

Former Luton Town central defender Matthew Upson gained 21 England caps. Signing professional for Luton Town in April 1996, he made his only League appearance for the Hatters as a substitute in their 1-0 win over Rotherham four months later and joined Arsenal for £1,000,000 in May 1997. He featured in their 1997/98 Premier League title campaign and was a member of the 2001/02 'double' winning squad. Loaned to several clubs, he moved to Birmingham City for £2,000,000 in January 2003, then joined West Ham for £6,000,000 in January 2007. He has since played for Stoke City, Brighton, Leicester City and MK Dons.

WHAT DO YOU EXPECT OF SATURDAY'S GAME AT COLCHESTER?

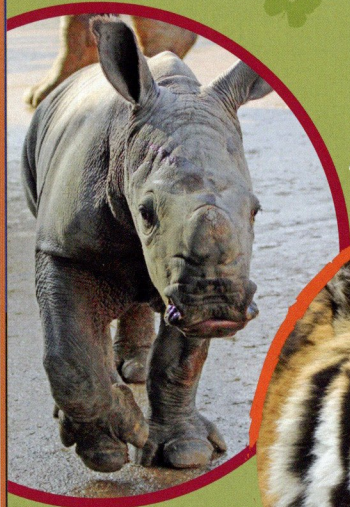

IN OPPOSITION

EX ON THE PITCH: DAN POTTS



Over the course of the season, the U's will face a number of players, coaches and even managers that are familiar from their time here in North Essex. Or a member of the U's squad will be taking on an opponent that he has had as a teammate in the past. This season, we'll be taking a look at the 'Ex on the Pitch' - or just off the pitch if they happen to be in the opposition dugout!

This afternoon, it's the turn of former U's full back Dan Potts. The twenty two year old from Barking was on loan to the U's for a couple of months during the 2012/13 season from West Ham, and made five appearances over the course of a couple of months.

Beginning his career at West Ham, Dan made his debut as a seventeen year old for the Hammers in a Championship tie against Barnsley in the 2011/12 season. He made two further appearances in the league, and another in the FA Cup the same season. He began the next season starting in the first couple of rounds of the League Cup, winning 2-0 against Crewe, then losing 4-1 to Wigan at Upton Park.

He was loaned to the U's a couple of months later in November, and made his debut in a miserable game for the U's as they were thumped 5-1 by MK Dons in League One. In fact, he was never on the winning side in blue and white stripes, losing all five games he played for the U's. Following a 3-0 defeat to Crawley on New Year's Day 2013, Dan was recalled by West Ham as they hit an injury crisis.

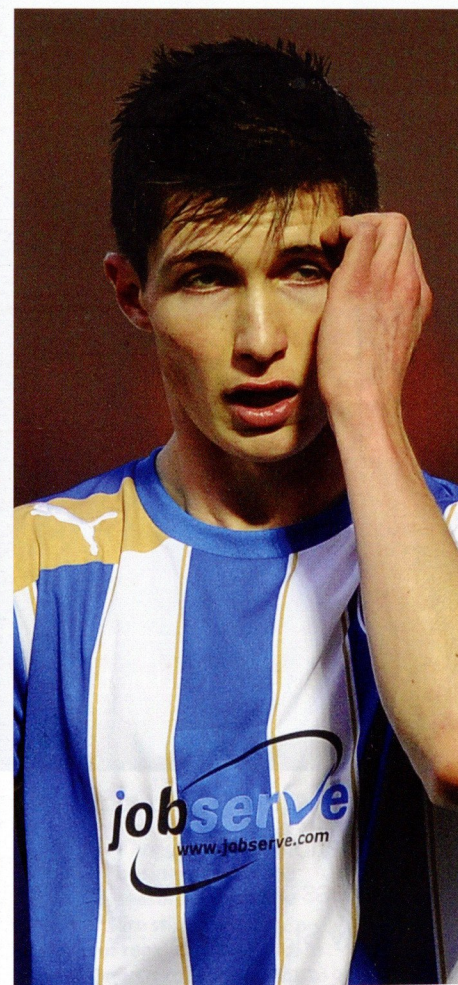
Potts went straight into the Hammers' team as they drew 2-2 against Manchester United in the Third Round of the FA Cup. His Premier League debut came a week later as his side lost 3-0 away to Sunderland. A few days later, he was again selected for the FA Cup tie against Manchester United, but in the replay at Old Trafford he was on the losing side following a 1-0 defeat. He made one further appearance, the next Saturday, as West Ham lost 5-1 away to Arsenal.

In the following season, Dan began once again at West Ham, and made one appearance in the League Cup, a 0-2 win at Burnley, before being loaned out again, this time to League Two Portsmouth. This loan spell was almost as unsuccessful as his time at Colchester, not winning a game but drawing a couple.

His loan spell ended having played six games for Pompey, and he went into the West Ham team which crashed out of the FA Cup at the third round again, being beaten 5-0 by Nottingham Forest. He was to make one more appearance for West Ham, the next season, in the League Cup second round against Sheffield United.

He left the Hammers for today's opponents Luton in the summer of 2015 and initially struggled to get into the team. When he did, he was unfortunately injured and missed most of last season through injury. This term, he has been far more consistent, making twenty two appearances so far.

He had a tough start to the season though, being sent off for two yellows in the opening game against Plymouth, where Luton won 0-3 at Home Park. In total, Dan has made more than fifty appearances across all four leagues of English football.

It has been no secret that over the past few years, the U's have looked to bring young players up through the Academy and into the first team. It became especially important once limits on squad spending came into being and then again last summer.

New rules came into force ahead of the current season, meaning clubs could only sign players in the transfer windows in the summer and in January. For the remainder of the year, clubs would have to make do with the players already on their books. One option would have been stockpiling players during the windows, the other to make sure that the young players in the U23s are good enough to step in when needed.

An added bonus for any of these players making the step up would be the ability to cover more than one position. And one player has had to learn that as an ongoing process this season, after spending all of his fledgling career in one position before now.

Drey Wright was amongst the first raft of youngsters that came through the ranks, following the change from a Centre of Excellence to an Academy.

As an exciting, pacey winger, Drey broke onto the first team scene at the start of the 2012/13 season, making his debut

in the League Cup First Round defeat at Yeovil Town.

His early appearances impressed and he went on to play another twenty two times that season, scoring three goals in the process. The following three seasons were massively disrupted by serious injuries, but he has put that all behind him this season and has made thirty eight appearances already.

The last handful have been in one or two somewhat unfamiliar roles for him, wingback and right back. He has stepped in due to the injury to Richard Brindley and has coped extremely well with the move from his more usual position further up the right side of the pitch. He admitted that he hasn't found it plain sailing though.

He told *We Are United*: “It has been quite difficult but I've been learning it as quickly as I can as I go along. It's obviously different to what I have been used to but I've been trying hard to adapt to it. I came off the subs bench a few times to play wingback and I did spend time watching players in that position, knowing that we had changed

the system and I might need to play there to get in the team.

“I have had to hold back a little bit on the attacking side of my game just to be on the cautious side and to make sure we're solid and so I don't get caught out to be honest. I feel like I have been doing OK so far but I know that there is still so much to learn and improve on.”

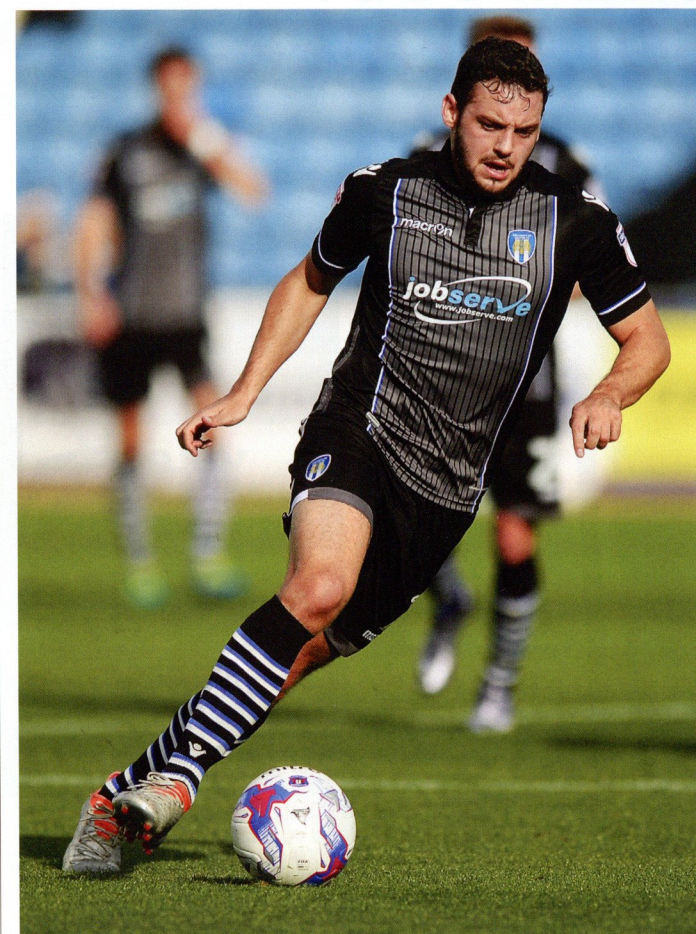
Being further back in the side has certainly added a new string to Drey's bow and he seems to be enjoying the challenge of learning the new positions he is being asked to play. He continued: “It is so different to playing on the right wing in a four or even up top wide in a three, the positions I've been playing for years. Things become second nature, where you should be in certain situations and what to do in and out of possession.

“Changing positions means changing that whole thought process so it's something that I really have to concentrate on. Being part of a defensive unit has made me have to focus more and be more switched on to what is around me. George Elokobi and Cameron James are great for that as well, they're always talking and making sure I'm positioned right and keeping me focussed.”

There was special praise for Cameron James, who is the latest product to progress from the Academy into the first team for the U's. The nineteen year old has stepped into the side in recent matches and it came as no surprise to Wright to see him do so well.

“Cam has been brilliant since he came into the side, and has put in some really solid performances. The only time he has seemed a bit flustered was in the Mansfield game, when I heard him getting annoyed with himself for not winning as many headers as he thought he should be. I just talked to him and told him not to worry about it, he was doing fine.

“We know how good he is but I think it has come as a bit of a surprise to some people just how well he has done since coming into the team and how comfortable he has found it. I played with him quite a bit in the U23s last



season so know that he's got a lot of quality, especially on the ball. If we're in possession and I want to get forward, I know there's never any problem with Cam stepping out and giving me the ball.”

Drey getting into the team in his new, more defensive role came about through injury and it's fair to say that injuries to more experienced centre halves has given James his opportunity. They have both taken that opportunity and have impressed with their respective performances. It was a chance that Drey was looking for and he was confident that he and others would be more than capable of producing the goods.

“Those of us that weren't playing during the excellent run we went on always felt that we could step in when needed and continue the good work

that was being done. There is a case of having to fill holes with so many injuries but we have an excellent squad of players and we've managed to stay well in the mix despite the injuries we have suffered.”

The U's sit a few points off the Play-Off positions but the twenty one year old insists there is plenty to play for between now and the beginning of May, especially here in north Essex.

“The home form has been excellent, and has been a refreshing change from the last few seasons. We became a better away side, catching teams out on the counter attack but this time round, we've taken the game to the opposition at home and it's worked great. We have home games to play against the teams around and above us and we'll be aiming for maximum points to keep us in the promotion race.”

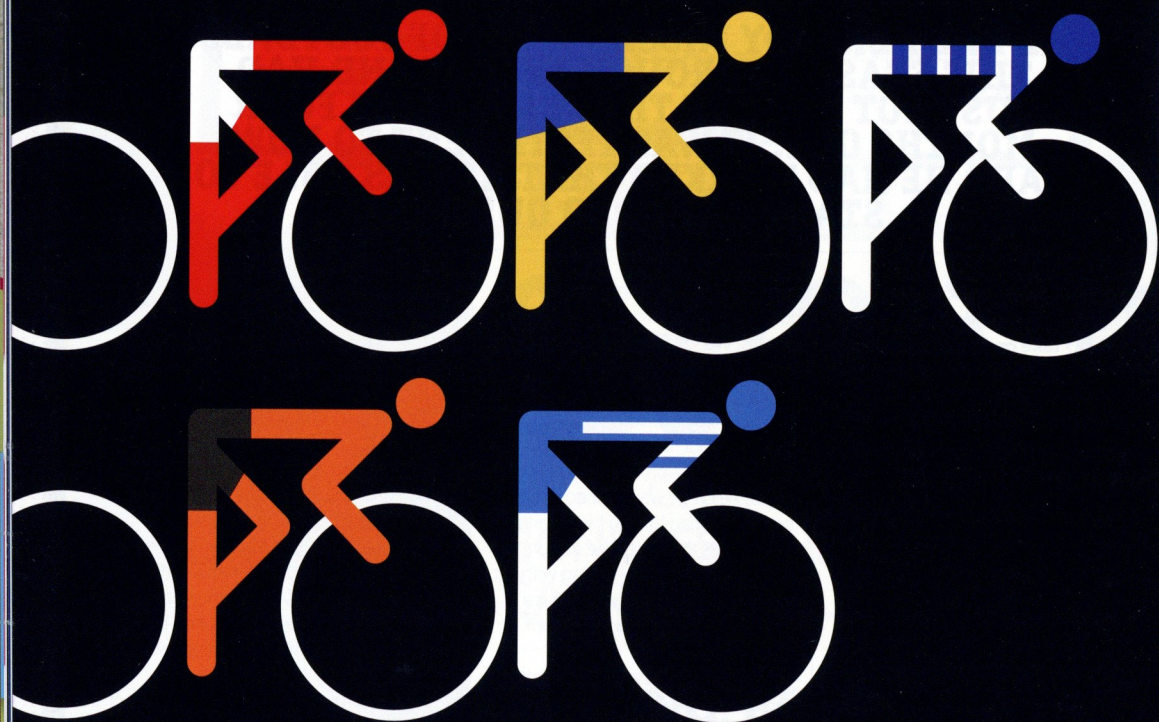

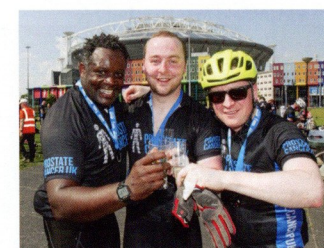
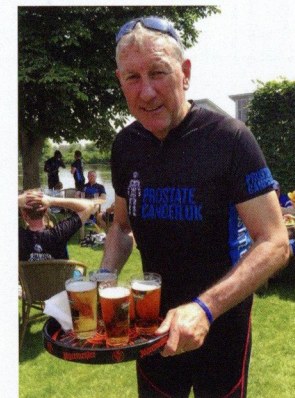

With the U's next attacking move it was 2-0.

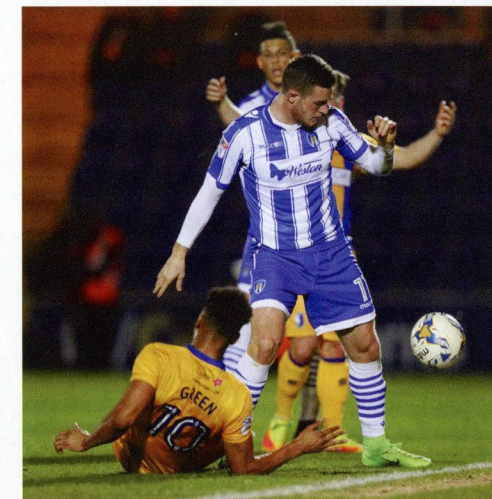

The U's lost 2-0 away at Crewe last weekend on a soggy afternoon in Cheshire.

In a first half, the hosts took the game to the U's and went ahead through striker Chris Dagnall.

Further bad news in that first period came early, when Sammie Szmodics went down under challenge and couldn't continue.

After the break, the U's threw everything at Crewe, but were hit on the break and Dagnall doubled the lead.

Dickenson and Fosu were both denied by saves in injury time, but it remained 2-0 to the hosts.

There were doubts about whether the game would take place, with flooded areas on the surface troubling the referee.

He inspected the pitch on two occasions, and finally gave the go-ahead thirty minutes before three o'clock.

The home team started the game, which kicked off fifteen minutes later than planned, on the front foot and there was only two minutes on the clock when Sam Walker palmed away a long range shot.

Three minutes later, and Jordan Bowerly got away from George Elokobi but shot well wide from the edge of the box.

The on loan forward then had a much better chance, but volleyed over from a great knockdown from George Ray.

U's forward Sammie Szmodics then went down in a challenge and looked to be holding his left ankle before being helped off the pitch.

He wasn't able to continue, and Tarique Fosu entered the fray and took up Szmodics' position

just behind Rekeil Pyke and Chris Porter.

The U's first effort on goal came on sixteen minutes, but Sean Murray's shot from distance flew well wide.

Crewe were having the better of things as the first half progressed, and it was no surprise when they went ahead on twenty five minutes.

A wide free kick was whipped into the near post and dangerman Chris Dagnall got there first and his flicked header could only be helped into the net by Walker's right hand.

Sub Fosu came closest for the U's in the remainder of the first period, but his acrobatic volley went just the wrong side of the post.

That chance on the half hour was the final goalmouth action before the break, but it was a half that the hosts dominated and were deservedly a goal ahead.

Whatever John McGreal said to his U's side, it had the desired effect and it was the visitors who started the second half best.

Sean Murray was first to try his luck, but his shot from just outside the box went wide of the target.

Murray then capitalised on a great flick from Pyke to break, and the former Watford forward played in Fosu, who blazed over the bar with his right foot shot.

The best chance of the day for the U's fell to loanee Pyke, but his far post header was blocked by Garratt.

Pyke and Fosu then combined on the right and when the latter crossed, Porter's header was comfortably saved by Garratt.

It was all U's at this stage, and Garratt had more work to do



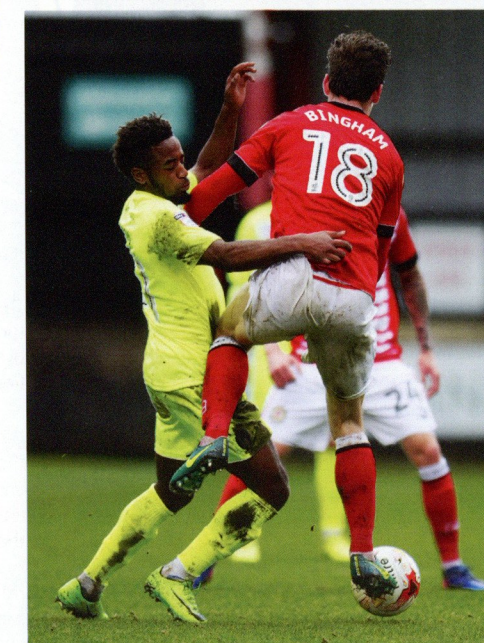
when he fielded a Fosu free kick just after the hour mark.

Another U's attack saw Fosu shoot across goal, after great work on the left by Matt Briggs and Pyke.

A rare attack for the hosts came about when Tom Lapslie lost possession in midfield, but the subsequent shot went wide of the target.

Porter once again won his header when a cross came into the box, but his looping header wasn't strong enough to beat Garratt in the home goal.

With six minutes remaining,



Lapslie was fouled in midfield but the referee decided that an advantage could be had.

There was no advantage though, and Crewe broke to make the game safe for the home side when Dagnall slid in a cross to double his tally.

He was denied a hat-trick with two minutes of the ninety remaining, with Walker blocking the close range effort from another effective low cross.

Garratt made two top drawer saves in injury time, from Dickenson and Fosu, and ensured that his side held out for the three points.

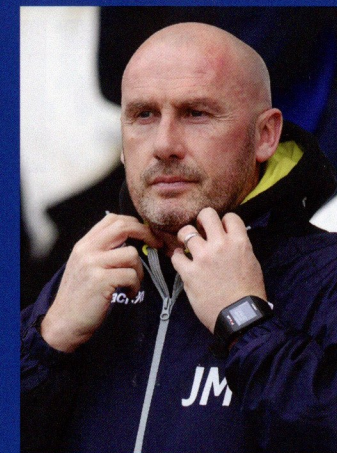

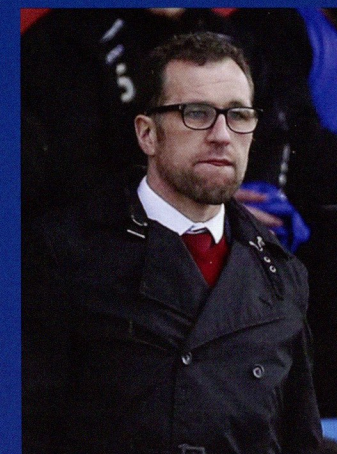

REGENT EXTEND LEAD AT THE TOP OF THE TABLE

HEROIC DEFENSIVE DISPLAY HELPS THE R'S OPEN UP A NINE POINT GAP

B RIGHTLINGSEA REGENT manager James Webster hailed long-serving defender Josh Gould for his heroics in their 1-0 victory against Bury Town.

The centre-half stood out in a makeshift back four that was missing regular trio Matt Cripps (suspended), Ricky Griggs (injured) and former Colchester United midfielder Russell Malton (unavailable).

He inspired his side to a hard-earned clean sheet and Aaron Condon's second-half winner – combined with second-placed **MALDON AND TIPTREE** losing 1-0 at home to Brentwood Town – means Regent now have a nine-point lead at the top of Ryman League Division North, heading into today's match at Haringey Borough.

"We never make a big thing of injuries but it was definitely a patched up back four on Saturday," said Webster.

"But I thought they were excellent, especially Josh Gould. He didn't lose a header all game. He's the only one who's been in that defence consistently this season and it felt like he really stepped up and led by example.

"I was really pleased for him. Pip Boyland has also made a big difference, in terms of his talking and organising. We've got a relatively young team and he says the right things to them.

"Being a coach himself obviously helps because he's giving them the right information. It's good to have that extra voice on the pitch, in addition to those from the sidelines."

In addition to Brightlingsea winning and Maldon losing last weekend, third-placed AFC Hornchurch could only

"But when the game started it seemed everyone was a bit nervy. We didn't play a lot of football and it wasn't one for the purists. It was like watching Stoke versus Stoke.

"The wind played a part but, in all honesty, it doesn't matter how we win at this stage of the season. It's just about getting points on the board. I always felt we'd get a chance, if we could keep it nice and solid at the back."

It is frustrating for all concerned but the management and players will be working hard to get that elusive away win.

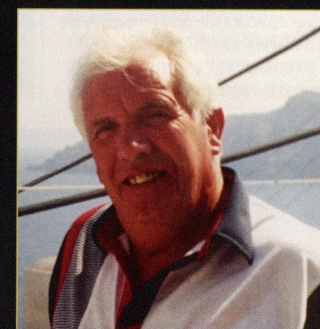

AFRICAN ADVENTURE

Colchester United Football in the Community's upcoming trip to Kenya has evoked some powerful distant memories for one Season Ticket holder.

The U's community team, plus a number of club supporters, are heading to Nakuru with African Adventures for their first trip to Kenya to help with sports, education and construction projects on a ten day visit.

And for Malcolm Smith, a Season Ticket holder in the West Stand, it brought back memories of his National Service.

He told us: "In February 1960, I was called up for National Service with the Royal Army Pay Corps. After basic training (square bashing), I was posted as Pay Clerk to the Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers - an Irish regiment stationed at Gilgil near to Nakuru.

"Arriving around the beginning of June, after a picturesque drive by army truck from Nairobi, I reported to the camp Guardroom when I was asked for the only time in my life - Smith, is that with an 'oy' or wit' a 'woy'?"

"The camp was very basic and Nakuru

didn't have much to offer. There was a branch of Barclay's DCO from where we collected our cash supplies weekly. There was little interaction with the locals apart from some inquisitiveness from the younger ones and some barter with their elders.

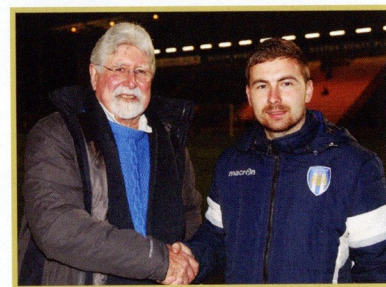
"I shall be interested to learn how the area has developed and whether the army barracks still exist. It was largely scrubland with no traditional wildlife.

"The most poignant memories I have are of the staggering views of the Rift Valley and Lake Nakuru, a salt lake surrounded by pink flamingos.

"I was in Gilgil for about a year, when we went to Kuwait which was under threat from Iraq (Saddam Hussain wasn't the first!). Then back to Kenya, via Bahrain, to new barracks outside Nairobi.

"In those days I lived in Woodford. Got into the U's 40 years ago when the children were old enough and have been 'hooked' since."
