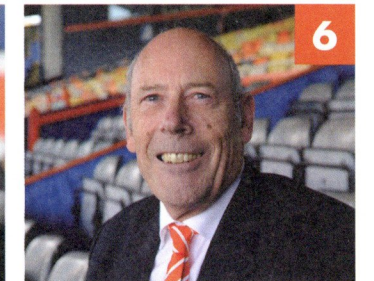

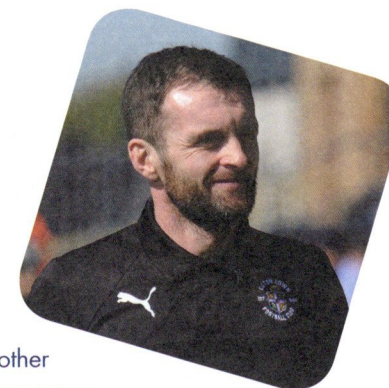

THE MANAGER NATHAN JONES



[MANAGER'S NOTES]

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for another important Sky Bet League Two fixture at this exciting stage of the season.

Let me start by wishing everyone a happy Easter. I hope that we can kick-off the Bank Holiday weekend in the finest possible way for every Luton Town fan.

I would also like to welcome everybody from our visitors Leyton Orient – including supporters, directors, staff, manager Omer Riza and his squad – and wish them a safe journey back to east London this evening.

Orient are a club with whom we have several links through our goalie coach Kevin Dearden and captain Scott Cuthbert having devoted several years of their career to the O's, as well as striker Ollie Palmer, who we currently have on loan from Brisbane Road.

Ollie is ineligible for today's game, but his impact in the 90th minute of our last home game against Blackpool set this place rocking, and we want that wonderful atmosphere to continue into this afternoon's match.

That was a big win for us against a team who had been flying. We call the players on our bench game-changers, and Jack Marriott, Luke Gambin and Ollie all played a part in that goal that sealed our second double of the league season.

We recorded a third at Barnet last week when we had to ride our luck at times, but emerged victorious – which is the only important thing at this stage of the season – with the only bit of real quality and composure in the game as Olly Lee scored the winner.

It goes without saying that we are determined this afternoon to keep the winning run going by registering a third successive league victory for the first time this season, and third double in a row bearing in mind our 2-1 win at Orient in October.

Danny Hylton was on the scoresheet that day and I was delighted to accompany our top scorer to the EFL awards

night in London last Sunday, when he was one of three shortlisted for League Two Player of the Year.

Doncaster Rovers forward John Marquis took the accolade, and we congratulate him on that, as well as his club for securing promotion to League One last weekend.

But it was a real achievement for Danny to be nominated and it goes to show that most managers think alike. In my top five I included Marquis and his team-mate James Coppinger, the other player in the three shortlisted, and of course, I would have had Danny if allowed. He should be proud to be nominated in such good company as he's had a terrific season.

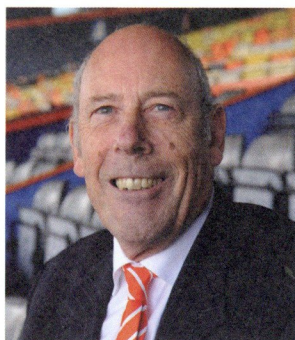

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH DIRECTOR MIKE HERRICK

A warm welcome to all involved with Leyton Orient for this Good Friday Sky Bet League Two fixture.

A glance at the league table will show the extent of the task that lies ahead of the 'O's if they are to avoid losing their place in the Football League for the first time in their long history. For some teams, dropping down to the Conference can provide the impetus to rebuild and return stronger – though we ourselves found just how difficult that could prove to be.

Leyton Orient are a proper football club with a proud tradition and we wish them and their supporters well as they try to return to a position of stability. For this afternoon though, we must put sentiment aside as we push on towards the climax of the season.

Our dip in form last month may have made it more difficult for us to achieve our goal of automatic

promotion, but whilst this is still possible we shall continue to strive for a top three finish.

Certainly, everyone at the club is fully determined to reach as high a position as is possible. In any case, when have we ever tried to do things the easy way?

Despite the recent disappointments it was heartening to see such overwhelming support at Barnet last week – and even better to see it rewarded with another victory. Altogether a perfect away day.

Whilst on the subject of heartening results it was good to see how the U18s performed against their counterparts from Plymouth Argyle in midweek. A 5-1 scoreline is good in anyone's book and it's so

encouraging to see all the hard work of the Academy staff and the youngsters themselves coming to fruition in this way. They all have a massive part to play in the future of our club.

Home fixtures are often played on a Saturday morning at Ely Way and I'm sure that you'd enjoy watching our upcoming prospects if you're able to take in one of their games.

Earlier this week we were very pleased that our policy of paying a living wage, as opposed to the minimum wage, was recognised in the form of a visit from Jeremy Corbyn and other local and national politicians. This has never, and will never, be a political statement on our part.

We implemented the policy two years ago because we felt it was the right thing to do. Yes, there have been benefits to the club in the form of increased staff morale and a reduction in staff turnover, but our principal aim was to improve the well-being of those who depend on Luton Town FC for their livelihood. It was a unanimous decision by the board that we should adopt the policy at a time when no other football club in the country had acted in this way.

We were asked by the politicians how, in a time of financial constraint, we could afford to do this when clubs higher up the pyramid with their comparatively unlimited resources fail to follow suit. As a cost to the business it's around £50,000 a year, but we see that as an investment, not a cost – and from a business perspective it's a case of, how can we afford not to do it?

FUTURE

We cannot affect the way other clubs are run but it is good to be recognised for our work in this direction. We aim to progress the club in all areas, not just on the field of play. We recognise the part we play in our community and this will remain fixed in our minds. It may take a while for us to achieve all we want but our determination to succeed will win through in the end.

Also this week, clubs from Leagues One and Two met to discuss the future direction of the Checktrade trophy and we were represented by Gary Sweet, David Wilkinson and Kevan Platt. Various issues were up for consideration and discussion – amongst which were: addressing the concerns around, and possible alterations to, the 'full-strength' team policy; regionalisation continuing



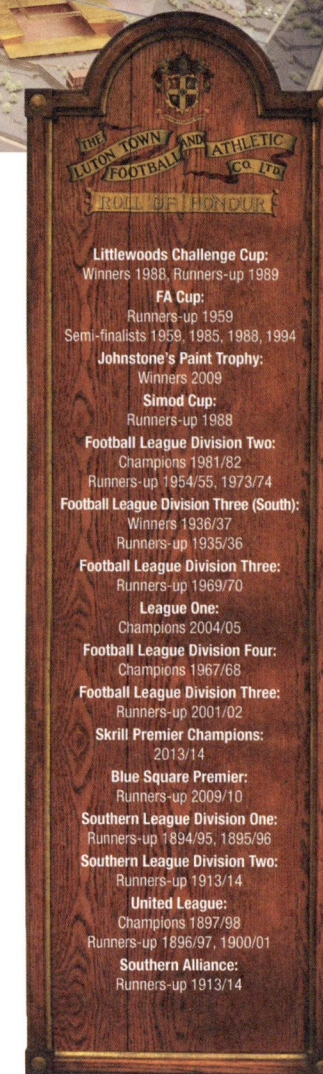
to the quarter-final stage; allowing greater flexibility in scheduling dates of fixtures; and significantly increasing prize money.

As a result, clubs will be asked to vote on either (a) a format similar to this year but with certain revisions and improvements; (b) a return to the previous competition for Leagues One and Two only; or (c) ending the competition altogether.

A final decision will be taken at the next EFL meeting in May after each club has had time to analyse and reflect on the proposals.

All in all, a busy week behind the scenes at the club – one in which we also celebrated our 132nd birthday – and a busy week on the pitch with matches today and on Easter Monday, before the final few games which will have such an impact on our season. Keep with us all the way and hang on to your hats as you do so.

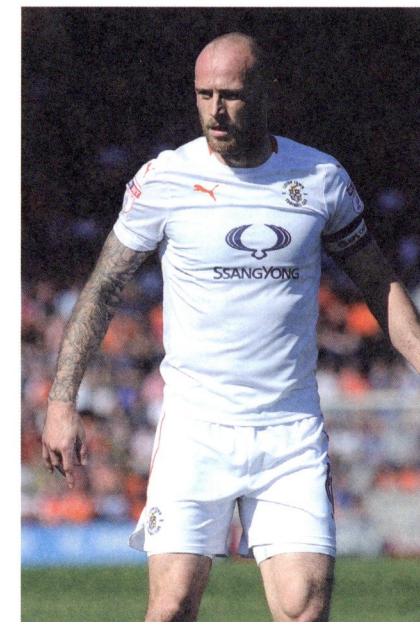

HATTERS HAILED AS A LIVING WAGE EMPLOYER

The Hatters welcomed Labour Party leader Jeremy Corbyn and Shadow Chancellor John McDonnell to Kenilworth Road on Monday morning as part of their focus on the Living Wage.

Luton Town were the first English football club to pay its staff the Living Wage, so were asked by the Labour Party via Luton Borough Council to provide the venue for them to announce their pledge to raise the minimum Living Wage to £10 an hour if they are elected in 2020.

It was announced earlier this month that the Government's minimum Living Wage will rise from £7.20 to £7.50 an hour for over-25s, but as a fully-accredited National Living Wage employer, the Hatters have been paying all staff the real Living Wage – which rises to £8.45 an hour next month – since December 2014.

Mr Corbyn and Mr McDonnell were given a tour of the ground – and shown the models and plans for our proposed new stadium at Power Court – before meeting members of staff whose lives have been changed by pay rises given to them as a result of the club's policy to help eliminate in-work poverty in the local community.

Together with Luton North MP Kelvin Hopkins, leader of LBC, Hazel Simmons, and her deputy Sian Timoney, they were impressed by hearing how being paid the Living Wage has allowed workers to apply for mortgages to buy homes, help cover childcare costs without having to constantly look for new jobs and enjoy a better work-life balance by being paid a fair wage.

When facing the national and local media on the pitch, Mr Corbyn said: "We are launching it here today because Luton Town were the



first football club in the country to introduce the Living Wage.

"We've just had a lovely meeting with many of the staff here who say how much better their lives have been because of it, but also how the enthusiasm and support and loyalty for the club has improved as a result of it.

"It's very interesting that other clubs say 'How can you afford it?' when Luton's response apparently is 'How can you afford not to do it?'."

Hatters chief executive Gary Sweet was asked why the club felt it was important to pay staff the Living Wage.

"It came from our desire to try and eliminate poverty in Luton, and why would we contribute to that?" said Sweet. "It was a very important factor for our board members and our shareholders that we contribute to the community in that way.

"There is also a business element to it, and since we've implemented

the Living Wage we've noticed that our staff are happier, more ambitious and are doing things like getting mortgages, which previously they couldn't have done. What we also find is that our retention of staff is better."

In a general statement about the visit, the club said: "We were delighted to host Jeremy Corbyn and John McDonnell this morning helping to eliminate poverty as football's first club to pay the Living Wage.

"Their visit wasn't about Luton Town Football club being political but supporting a vital social challenge by proudly paying staff a living wage, not a minimum wage.

"LTFC remains apolitical. If any party leader wishes to see the Living Wage in action, changing lives, they'd be welcomed in the same way. We beg the question 'How can an EFL League Two club afford to pay the Living Wage when so many Premier League clubs can't? It should be policy at every Premier League Club."

CLUBS TO VOTE ON THE CHECKATRADE TROPHY

League One and Two clubs met on Tuesday to formally discuss the future direction of the Checkatrade Trophy for the next two seasons.

The purpose of the meeting was to assist the EFL in shaping a formal proposal for clubs to have a final vote on in May.

During the meeting EFL Chief Executive Shaun Harvey reiterated the previously stated position that the introduction of B Teams to League competition is in no way connected to this debate or the League's wider agenda. Clubs reiterated their support for this position. EFL Article 3.3 provides that no new shares may be issued or allotted without the prior approval of 90% of member clubs. He then went on to present a number

of options and considerations for the members to deliberate. These included:

- Addressing the concerns around the full-strength team policy by improving the eligibility criteria for EFL teams. Goalkeepers will not count towards the full-strength quota and only four qualifying outfield players will need to be named on team sheets. A qualifying outfield player would be considered as any player who meets the same full strength criteria as 2016/17, is on loan from a Premier League or Category 1 club or has made 40 first team appearances (if this criteria was applied in 2016/17 only two fines would have been levied);

- Significant increase in prize money;
- Regionalisation until the quarter-final stage (improved from 2nd Round in 2016/17) to minimise travel for clubs and fans;
- Flexibility of fixture dates to allow teams to schedule games outside of international weeks.

As a result of the discussion and subsequent debate, clubs will now be asked to vote on the following:

- A revised format including 16 invited teams;
- A return to the previous 48-team competition, exclusive to League One and Two;
- Remove the competition from the fixture calendar.

WHO? After spending five seasons in the Conference, promotion as champions back into the EFL in the 2012-13 season has seen the Stags maintain their place in fourth tier with ease since their return. The goals from Matt Green in their promotion season were vital, as he scored 25 times that year before moving onto Birmingham City, then returning to the One Call Stadium – where he is current top scorer with 13 goals.

TICKETS Tickets for this fixture go off sale when the Ticket Office closes today.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE Our meeting earlier on in the season with the Stags ended in a 1-1 draw, as Green's goal in the opening ten minutes at Kenilworth Road gave the visitors the lead, before Cameron McGeehan levelled the score in the second half. That was the 33rd time the sides had met, meaning they have now drawn 12 times, whilst the Hatters have won 11 games and Mansfield have been victorious in the other ten.

IN CHARGE Former Hatters midfielder Adam Murray departed the club after two years at the helm last November, and was replaced by the experienced Steve Evans. The 54-year-old boasts an impressive managerial record, including guiding Crawley Town out of Non-League football, as well as taking charge of the likes of Rotherham United and Leeds United. His win record speaks for itself; having been victorious in 371 games of the 859 he has managed – a 43.2-win percentage. He has carried that on with the Stags, picking up 13 wins in his first 28 games with the club.

PREVIOUS FORM The Stags had looked like mounting a promotion push at one stage after Evans took charge, but just two wins in their last eight games – and four defeats in

their last six – have left them in 13th place with five matches to go of the 2016-17 season, although they are just four points off the play-off spots. On Saturday they had to watch on enviously as Doncaster's 1-0 win over them at the Keepmoat secured promotion for Darren Ferguson's side.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU Both Ollie Palmer and Johnny Mullins will be familiar faces at the One Call Stadium, as combined the two made 161 appearances for the Stags. Palmer scored seven times in his 64 appearances in his two seasons with the club between 2013-15, before departing for Leyton Orient that summer. Mullins signed for the Stags at 21-years-old, and like Palmer, stayed with Mansfield for two seasons before departing for Stockport County, who were in League One at the time. Mullins' fellow Town central defender Alan Sheehan made ten appearances on loan for the Stags during the 2006-07 season.

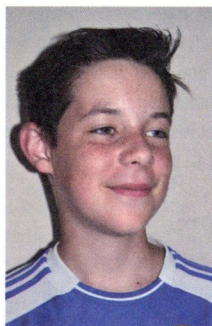

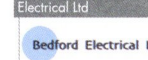

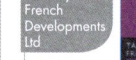

WELCOME LEYTON ORIENT

The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting staff, players and supporters of Leyton Orient.

This is the second meeting this season between the two sides, with the Hatters victorious in the reverse fixture, when they picked up their third away league win of the season at Brisbane Road with a 2-1 scoreline.

All three goalscorers that day now represent the Hatters, with both Danny Hylton and Cameron McGeehan getting on the scoresheet for Town, whilst Ollie Palmer scored a late consolation goal for his parent club. The 25-year-old played 23 times this term – scoring five goals – for the O's before his loan move to Kenilworth Road on January deadline day.

The recent struggles at Brisbane Road are well documented, but the wider footballing community has come together to raise a lot of money in order to help the Leyton Orient Fans Trust (LOFT).

The Orient technical area is now being patrolled by their fifth manager of the season, following the departures of Andy Hessenthaler, Alberto Cavasin, Andy Edwards, and most recently Danny Webb, with Omer Riza now in charge.

Webb's former assistant started his playing career with Arsenal, before moving onto play lower down the pyramid for the likes of Barnet and Cambridge United. The ex manager of Ryman League club Cheshunt is now tasked with saving EFL status for the O's, who as recently as the 2013-14 season played in the League One Play-off Final, only to lose out on penalties after drawing the game after extra-time 2-2 with Rotherham United. Relegation the following season saw them finish eighth last term, but poor

form and off the field problems sees Orient propping up Sky Bet League Two with five games to go.

Last Saturday they went down 3-0 at Cambridge United, the U's inflicting a sixth straight defeat on the east

Londoners. In that sequence Orient have scored just one goal – in a 4-1 defeat to league leaders Doncaster last month. They are without a goal in their last three matches and have recorded just two wins since Boxing Day, sitting bottom of the table and ten points adrift of safety with five games to play.

Former West Ham striker Paul McCallum is the club's top scorer this season with 12 goals. The 23-year-old enjoyed six loan spells away from the Hammers, including fruitful times at AFC Wimbledon – where he was named League Two

Player of the Month in January 2013 – and Torquay United, before signing for Orient in the summer on a two-year deal.

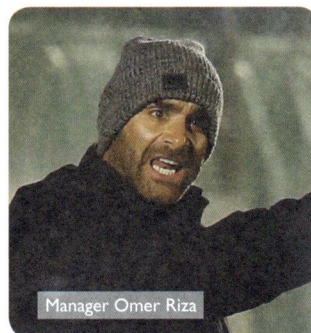
Known by a host of different names through their history, the club have called Orient during two separate spells, Clapton Orient and Leyton Orient since 1987, which they were also known as between 1946-66. In total the Hatters have met them on 83 occasions, winning 41 times, losing 24 and drawing 18 of those contests.

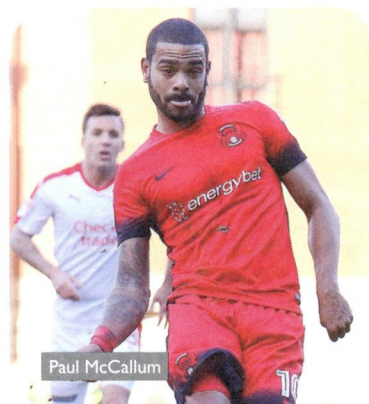

After coming through the academy at Leicester City, the 25-year-old joined Bristol Rovers in 2012 and went onto make over 150 appearances for them before departing for Orient in the summer.

NICKY HUNT

The right-back began his career at Bolton, before going onto play for the likes of Derby County, Preston North End and Accrington Stanley. He joined Orient in February 2016.

TEDDY MEZAGUE

A summer signing from Belgian club Royal Excel Mouscron, the 26-year-old started his career off in France with Ligue 1 side Montpellier.

CALLUM KENNEDY

After departing AFC Wimbledon following their promotion from Sky Bet League Two, the former Swindon Town and Scunthorpe United defender signed for the O's on a one-year deal.

JENS JANSE

The Dutchman has played a majority of his football in his home country, but has also made appearances for Dinamo Tbilisi in Georgia. He signed on a one-year deal at the beginning of the season with the O's.

ACROSS THE MIDDLE

LIAM KELLY

The 27-year-old joined Orient for what is believed to be a club record fee at the beginning of the season from Oldham Athletic. His former clubs include Kilmarnock and Bristol City.

MICHAEL COLLINS

A republic of Ireland international at Under-21 level, the 30-year-old has played for Huddersfield Town and Scunthorpe United, as well as for Indian side Bengaluru.

SANDRO SEMEDO

The 20-year-old began his career in his native Portugal, before moving to England to sign for Stoke City. He joined Orient in 2013 and has had loan spells with Welling United and Chelmsford City.

NIGEL ATANGANA

The signing from Portsmouth in January 2016 has also played for Havant and Waterlooville, in his native France with Gravelines and in Spain with Riudellots.



STEVEN ALZATE

The 18-year-old – alongside team mate Josh Koroma – signed a two-year professional deal with the club back in September.

UP FRONT

PAUL MCCALLUM

His team's top scorer this season, the former West Ham United striker joined the O's at the beginning of last season after loan spells with the likes of AFC Wimbledon and Torquay United.

JOSH KOROMA

The teenager has been a shining light for the side this season, netting a hat-trick against fellow strugglers Newport County earlier on this year.

ROWAN LIBURD

Currently on loan from fellow Sky Bet League Two side Stevenage, the 24-year-old joined Reading after graduating from college in America, going onto join Boro at the beginning of this season.

FROM THE OAK ROAD

WITH ADAM ELLIS

Adam Ellis, a Leyton Orient supporter of 23 years and Online Editor of The Football League Paper, gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team for the rest of this season in Sky Bet League Two and this afternoon on their visit to Kenilworth Road...

► THIS SEASON

Can you sum it up in less than 100 words?

The sooner the sun sets on this season the better for us Orient fans. We have rattled through four managers, parted company with several senior pros, and promoted a dozen players from the academy into the first team. While these teenagers have displayed technical skills that match their heart for the club, they lack the requisite experience needed to compete in the Football League. So, while the Hatters march on into the play-offs, we will be preparing for life in the National League – possibly by the end of today's match should results elsewhere not end in our favour – and for our adjourned winding-up case to be heard again on 12 June.

It's been a difficult season for you guys, but the football family has come together to try to support you. How pleasing has it been to see so many people willing to get involved?

This season has left the taste of ash in my mouth, 17 home defeats at Brisbane Road can attest to that. But the generosity and togetherness shown by other clubs has been humbling. Whether through donations (thank you to Luton for the signed shirt you donated) our Fans' Trust has received, or the advice AFC Wimbledon provided on the dilemmas of forming a phoenix club, Orient now have a Fans' Trust more empowered for when our case in High Court reconvenes.

With five games to go, can the O's avoid relegation?

No. With 10 points needed to redeem ourselves most fans are resigned to dropping out of the Football League after our 112-year association. For me, our 5-0 trouncing by Accrington Stanley last month extinguished the optimism I held for our survival.

Which signing have you been most impressed with so far over the whole season?

I desperately hope we are able to keep hold of winger Gavin Massey come the transfer window's re-opening. He has been the source of high-tempo creativity and valuable goals this season, notably scoring two goals in our 3-2 victory over Plymouth on a Tuesday night trip to Home Park.



Which player have you been most disappointed to lose this season?

Losing Dean Cox in such an undignified manner after making almost 250 appearances was very disappointing. The winger was one of the heroes of our 2013-14 season which exceeded all expectations and saw us challenge Brentford for the runners-up spot in League One.

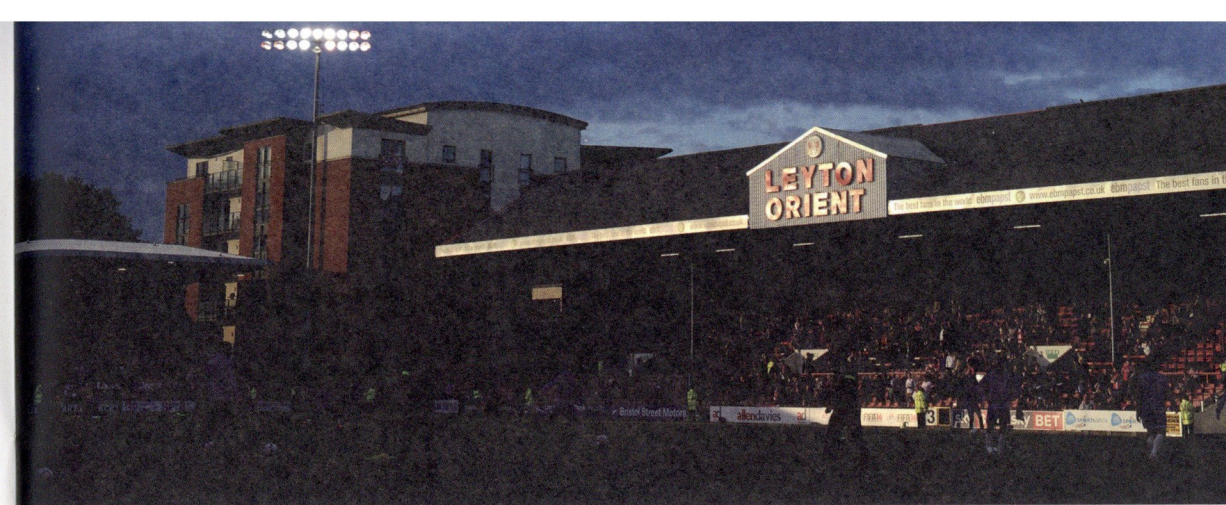
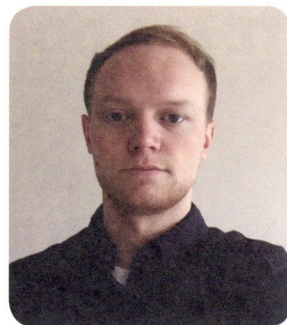
Who do you think Hatters fans will watch today and think 'I wish we had him'?

Nathan Jones has mastered the loan market by signing Christian Walton, Matt Macey and Stuart Moore to play between the sticks this season, and in Alex Cisak we have a goalkeeper who has saved our skins from many potential thrashings. The Aussie deservedly won our Player of the Season last year for his shot-stopping brilliance and has continued to restrict opponents this season despite our defensive frailties.

► SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you support Orient? Where did it all begin? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

My Grandad hated football, so I suppose I'm lucky he took my Dad down Brisbane Road in 1967 for his first game. Almost three decades later my parents took me to my



first match in 1993 when we took on Port Vale. We lost, of course, 1-0. The first match I have memories of was Orient's pre-season friendly against Arsenal in 1997. The Gunners had just signed Emmanuel Petit from Monaco and Dennis Bergkamp played the full 90 minutes. Wenger's side won 1-0.

What do you love most about the O's?

Talk to any Orient fan and they will mention the away day at Oxford in 2006 with more affection than their wedding day. We don't have a silverware-laden trophy cabinet and for some fans of English clubs that is all that matters. Nobody wants to be an Arsenal fan, do they?

Who's your favourite Leyton Orient player of all time?

Matt Lockwood. Inevitably the person I end up talking about when drunk and worthy of legend status in £10. He can consider himself desperately unlucky not to get a fair crack in the Championship when he completed a move to Nottingham Forest.

What has been your favourite season following Orient?

2000-01. Without wanting to seem like an elderly radio caller reciting surnames from 'the good old times', this season was just full of players who I remember fondly. By no means were they gifted footballers but they were my first heroes.

If you could invite five former Orient players and managers to a dinner party, who would they be?

Matt Lockwood, Craig Easton, Terry Brisley, Alex Inglethorpe and Stephen Dawson.

► LUTON AND LEYTON ORIENT...

We've currently got Ollie Palmer here on loan, and Scott Cuthbert was a terrific player for you. Who's your favourite player, past or present, with a connection to both clubs? How could anyone not love Ahmet Brkovic? The Croat had possibly the quickest feet I've seen for an Orient player

and an acute eye for a pass not often seen in a winger. Scott Cuthbert is a player we dearly miss in defence. So often he was the player making a last-ditch interception to scupper the opposition when they looked to be through on goal.

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction?

A slow start for Town would not be too much cause for concern given the O's ongoing theme this season of conceding shortly before or shortly after the half-time whistle. A physio room busier than Oxford Circus at rush hour should see us field at least eight academy products under the age of 21. Myles Judd, Josh Koroma and the recently introduced Steven Alzate all look to be top-quality prospects. Ultimately, for the short spells of impressive passing this young Orient team will piece together, the game will be won on the small margins that often go unnoticed from experienced professionals. 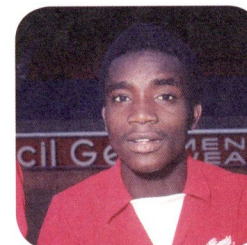

LAURIE CUNNINGHAM

Brilliant winger Laurie Cunningham was capped six times by England after leaving Orient. Signing professional for Orient in July 1974, he was leading marksman in two consecutive seasons and netted 15 goals in 75 League games before joining West Brom for £110,000 in March 1977. He starred in successive Cup runs and moved to Real Madrid for £995,000 in June 1979, helping to win the Spanish League and Cup 'double' in 1979-80. A European



Cup finalist in 1981, he later played for Manchester United, Leicester City, Sporting Gijon, Charleroi, Wimbledon and Rayo Vallecano until his tragic death in July 1989.

RALPH COATES

Ex-England international winger Ralph Coates was ever-present for Orient in 1979-80. Initially with Burnley, he helped them finish third in the top-flight in 1965-66 and reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1968-69. He joined Tottenham Hotspur for £190,000 in May 1971. He starred as they won the UEFA Cup in 1972 and were finalists in 1974, also scoring their winner in the 1973 League Cup final. Briefly with Australian side St Georges, he moved to Orient in October 1978 and netted 12 goals in 76 League games, joining their coaching staff. He managed a leisure complex in Hertfordshire and died in December 2010.

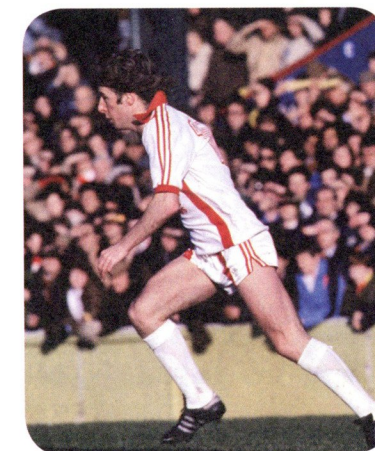
PETER TAYLOR

England international winger Peter Taylor gained four caps before playing for Orient. Initially with Southend United, he featured in their 1971-72 promotion success and

moved to Crystal Palace in October 1973. He starred in their 1975-76 FA Cup run, joining Spurs in September 1976 and helping regain top-flight status in 1977-78. Moving to Orient in November 1980, he netted 11 goals in 56 League games, then played for Maidstone, Exeter, Heybridge and Chelmsford. He has managed Dartford, Enfield, Southend, Dover, Gillingham, Leicester, Brighton, Hull City, Crystal Palace, Wycombe Wanderers and Gills again.

STAN BOWLES

England international striker Stan Bowles was capped five times before playing for Orient. Starting with Manchester City, he had spells with Crewe Alexandra and Carlisle United before moving to QPR in September 1972. 'Stan the Man' starred as they won promotion in 1972-73, were League Championship runners-up in 1975-76 and League Cup semi-finalists in 1976-77. Moving to Nottingham Forest in December 1979, he joined Orient in July 1980 and netted seven goals in 46 League games while at Brisbane Road before joining Brentford in October 1981. He has since helped his sister in the rag trade.

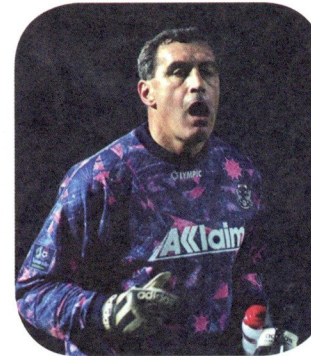

PETER SHILTON

England international goalkeeper Peter Shilton made his 1,000th League appearance while at Leyton Orient. Initially with Leicester City, he starred as they were FA Cup finalists



in 1969 and Second Division champions in 1970-71. He moved via Stoke City to Nottingham Forest in September 1977, helping win the League Championship that season and European Cup in two consecutive years. Joining Southampton in August 1982, he

then played for Derby County and was Plymouth Argyle's player-manager. He gained a record 125 caps, moving to Leyton Orient in November 1996 and making nine League appearances.

KEVIN CAMPBELL

England U-21 striker Kevin Campbell had a loan spell at Leyton Orient in 1988-89. Signing professional for Arsenal in February 1988, he grabbed a hat-trick in that season's FA Youth Cup final triumph and was loaned to Orient in January 1989, scoring nine goals in 16 League games. He featured prominently as Arsenal won the League Championship in 1990-91, FA Cup and League Cup in 1993, then the ECWC in 1994. Sold to Nottingham Forest for £3,000,000 in July 1995, he starred in their 1997-98 First Division title triumph, then played for Trabzonspor, Everton, West Brom and Cardiff City before owning a security firm.

JUSTIN FASHANU

Former England U-21 striker Justin Fashanu briefly played for Leyton Orient in 1989-90. Initially at Norwich City with his younger brother John, he was twice top scorer before moving to Nottingham Forest for £1,000,000 in August 1981. He was loaned to Southampton prior to joining Notts County for £150,000 in December 1982. Plagued by injury problems, he moved to Brighton in June 1985, then had spells at numerous clubs at home and overseas. He joined Orient in March 1990, making five League appearances while at Brisbane Road. Later with Torquay United and Airdrie, he committed suicide in May 1998.

ALVIN MARTIN

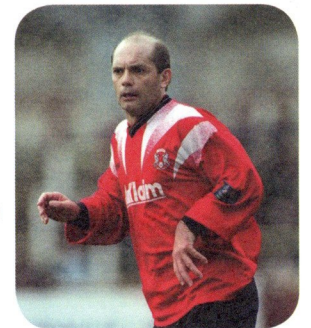
England international central defender Alvin Martin was capped 17 times before joining Leyton Orient. He turned professional with West Ham in July 1976 and was an influential figure in their 1980 FA Cup final triumph. Also starring as they won the Second Division title and were League Cup finalists in 1980-81, he was voted 'Hammer of the Year' in two consecutive seasons. He reunited with Pat Holland at Leyton Orient in July 1996 and made 17 League appearances while at Brisbane Road. Later Southend United's manager between July 1997 and March 1999, he has since worked in the media, notably with Talk Sport radio.

STEVE HODGE

Former England international midfielder Steve Hodge played in Leyton Orient's 1-0 defeat at Scunthorpe in August 1997. Initially with Nottingham Forest, he moved via Aston Villa to Tottenham Hotspur for £650,000 in December 1986. He was an FA Cup finalist in 1987 and rejoined Forest in August 1988. Featuring in two consecutive League Cup final triumphs and 1989 Simod Cup success, he moved to Leeds United for £900,000 in July 1991 and helped win the League Championship in 1991-92. He was capped 24 times and later had spells with Derby County, QPR, Watford and Orient, since holding coaching posts.

RAY WILKINS

Ex-England international midfielder Ray Wilkins briefly appeared for Leyton Orient in 1996-97. 'Butch' was Chelsea's youngest-ever captain and twice 'Player of the Year' including their 1976-77 promotion success. Sold to Manchester United for £875,000 in August 1979, scoring in their 1983 FA Cup final triumph, he later starred for AC Milan, Paris St Germain, Glasgow Rangers and QPR. Gaining 84 caps and awarded the MBE, he had spells at Wycombe, Hibernian and Millwall. He joined Orient in February 1997, playing three League games, since coaching at Fulham, Chelsea, Watford, Millwall and Chelsea again.

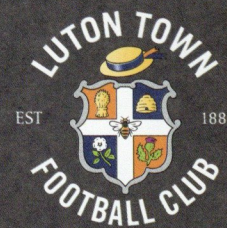

MAC'S A GREAT LAD AGAIN FOR LUTON

Luton Town 3, Orient 2

AS OTHERS SAW US

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH LOOKS AT PAST GAMES FROM THE EYES
OF THE OPPOSITION AND THE 'NEUTRAL' NATIONAL PRESS...

LUTON TOWN 3 ORIENT 2 | 23RD AUGUST 1969

Luton Town supporters felt cheated. Having finished in third position in the old Division Three (now League One) in 1969 with 61 points (equivalent to 86 today), the Hatters failed to win promotion as only the top two went up in those pre play-off days.

It was even more galling to note that the fourth-placed club, Bournemouth, sat ten points behind us.

The summer of 1969 was therefore seen as a huge anti-climax, which was made worse when it was announced that golden boy, Bruce Rioch, was to be sold for a Division Three record fee of £100,000 to Aston Villa.

Although manager Alec Stock was handed back the money to spend on strengthening the side, the new summer signings – John Ryan, John Collins and a young full-back from Fulham, Malcolm Macdonald – hardly set the pulses racing.

As such it was a quiet and sombre crowd that gathered on the opening

day to see a poor Barrow side turned over 3-0. Because of pre-season injuries, Macdonald had been moved from full-back to the wing and then to inside forward, where his enthusiastic play, speed and strength caught the eye. But would he adequately replace Rioch? No, was the general opinion.

Those opinions changed slightly when Macdonald scored the only goal of the game at Bournemouth the following week. In what was to become a trademark strike, Macdonald surged through a slow defence before rounding the goalkeeper and netting with ease.

Next up were Orient (as they were then called) at Kenilworth Road in an early season top-of-the-table clash

between two unbeaten sides that had yet to concede a goal.

The Town were protecting a 30-game unbeaten home record and started brightly against a team that had only avoided relegation the previous season by winning their final game.

Macdonald twice went close in the early stages but it was Orient who opened the scoring in the 14th minute with a goal out of the blue. With just about their first attack of the game, Orient won a free-kick on the edge of the Luton area and as the Town players were organising a wall, full-back Mick Jones hammered the ball home.

Stung by the goal, the Town players swarmed all over the Orient defence,

where everyone had been pulled back, with Macdonald in particular leading them a merry dance but was unable to put the ball in the net.

With 15 minutes left, and the crowd accepting the inevitable, a lifeline was thrown out when Keith Allen squared the ball for Collins, who had

moved in from the wing, to slam home.

Most Luton supporters felt that this was merely a consolation but five minutes later they went wild when Graham French scored a brilliant goal that has thankfully been preserved by London Weekend Television, who were recording the game.

A long clearance from goalkeeper Tony Read was headed on by Macdonald to Allen, who tangled with the Orient keeper Ray Goddard. The ball rebounded out to French, some way out of the area, who quickly sized up the situation and lobbed it back over the

The Town's long unbeaten home record was now in grave danger and even the introduction of the previous season's top scorer, Brian Lewis, in place of the largely ineffective Laurie Sheffield failed to galvanise the forward line.

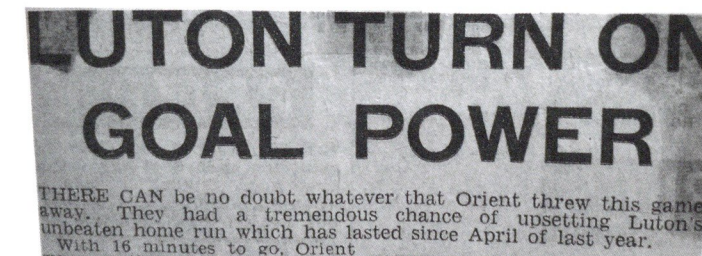
stranded Goddard and the rest of his defenders.

It was all Luton now and as the seconds ticked away a free-kick, swung in by skipper Mike Keen, was headed home by the effervescent Macdonald, who had fought his way through a crowd of defenders. No wonder the crowd of 13,761, which included new supporter Eric Morecambe, who had sponsored the ball, went away happy and singing the praises of Macdonald. Who was that Bruce Rioch?

Peter Gill in the Sunday Express reported, for the benefit of London readers: 'There can be no doubt whatsoever that Orient threw this game away. They had a tremendous chance of upsetting Luton's unbeaten home run which had lasted since April of last year.'

The correspondent for the Daily Telegraph preferred to concentrate on the Luton fightback and said: 'Fairly safely it can be said that there will not be a more thrilling finish at Luton this season than in the last 16 minutes of this game as Luton turned what seemed a hopeless position into an exciting victory.'

George Rogers in The People had the final word when he confirmed that: 'Indisputably the danger man of the front line was Macdonald, who confirmed earlier impressions that he can be a match winner in his own right.'

MAN OF THE MATCH

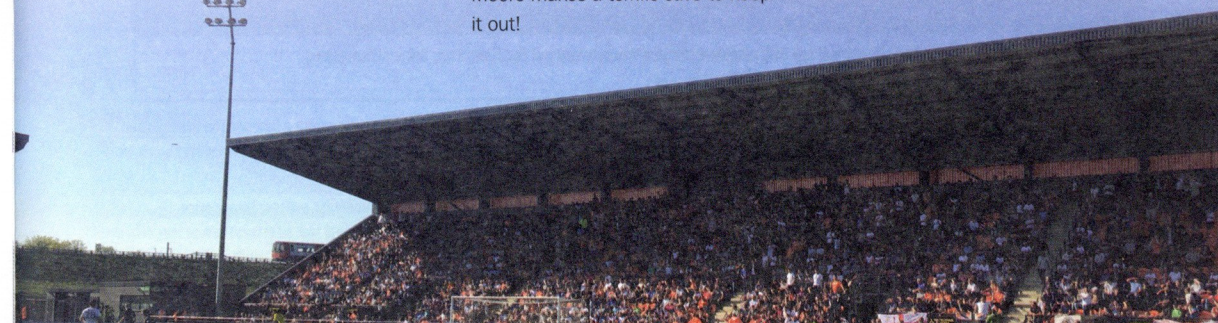
5.05 – Just before the Grand National it is time for man of the match. Simple pick this one. Stuart Moore was excellent. Two immense saves to keep us in the game.

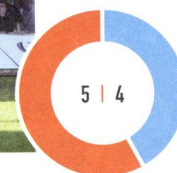

Palmer couldn't really miss, the ball landing at his feet a yard out after Lyness got a hand on Luke Gambin's low cross-shot.

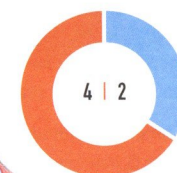
But the big striker had earned the opportunity, forcing his way into the Blackpool box with the ball glued to his foot before laying it off to fellow sub Gambin to deliver.



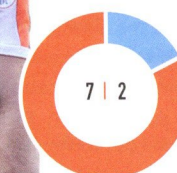

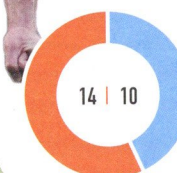

"After last week, I asked them for a response and they gave me it, fair play. They don't disappoint me. Now and again they let themselves down, not me. But they were outstanding today.

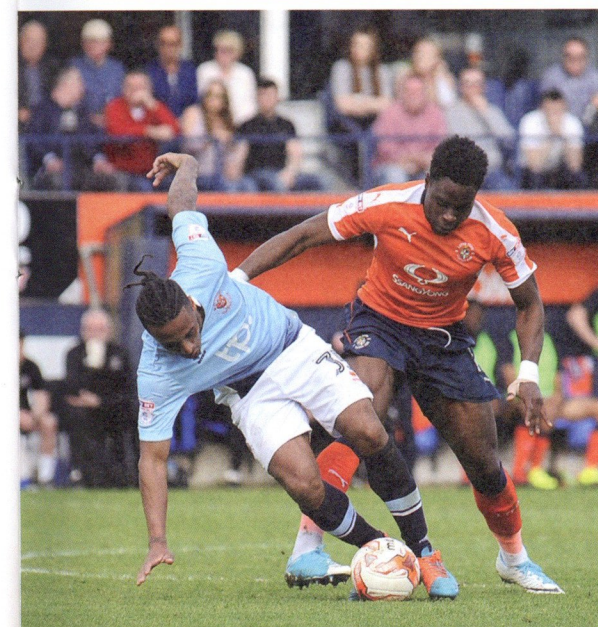

"I want to dedicate that goal to my son, I was meant to do a little something for him, but I lost my head and just went mad," the ex-Mansfield and Grimsby striker explained. "My missus is going to be very annoyed when she sees that! That goal was for my family, my little boy – who has changed my life."

"I was just going to do a cradle the baby celebration, or put my thumb in my mouth. But I just hit my head in the end, I don't know what I was doing."

"I am a little bit crazy. I lost my head and went mental and then got bundled. So I didn't get a chance to do the celebration. The main thing is we won."

Substitute Palmer's terrifically timed goal was the perfect tonic for Nathan Jones' team as they hadn't won in five matches, but pushed for the full 90 minutes against the Tangerines for the opener.

It took the new dad and fellow substitutes Jack Marriott and Luke Gambin, who both played a part in the goal, to come off the bench and seal the three points to emphasise the 'game changers' tag that manager Nathan Jones gives his replacements.

It was Palmer's second goal in a Town shirt – both of which have come at Kenilworth Road – and the atmosphere against Blackpool was the best the striker has heard it since his arrival in January.

Palmer continued: "The fans were fantastic all game, it's the loudest I have heard them, it was brilliant."

"The fans probably thought 'who's this guy the gaffer has brought on for the last ten minutes'. I was having a bit of a beast to be honest!"

"That happens in football, you're not always going to do great things. But the fans have been fantastic with me since the beginning."

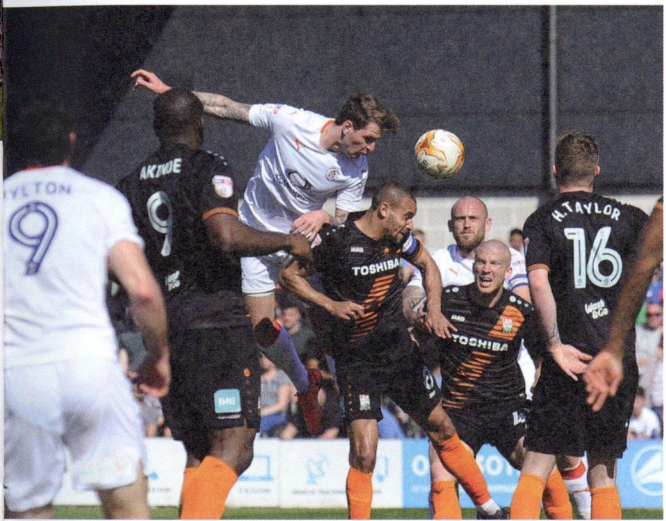

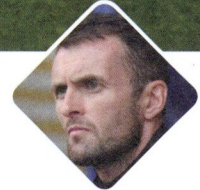

JONES: It puts us in a great position



"Obviously at this stage of the season I am delighted with the result. Performance wise we were nowhere near it. To be fair we were a little bit fortunate, Barnet probably had the best chances.

"We had a glorious one in the first half with Isaac Vassell and a few opportunities. But they had a few opportunities and as I said we were nowhere, nowhere near it in terms of our performance.

"What I said to them was get the first goal, keep a clean sheet and win the game, and that's what we did.

"I am proud of them because they gave me everything, we needed a little bit more know-how, a little bit more guile. But the pitch was very, very difficult, it's very dry. Barnet have raised their game, that's the best they have played for a while – I have watched a lot of their games.

"They raise their game when they are playing against us, but look, I am absolutely delighted with the win. It puts us in a great position. Performance wise if I wanted to be critical I could. I'd rather win and play badly at this stage of the season than play brilliantly and lose."

OLLY LOVES HIS SONGS OF PRAISE!

MATCH-WINNING MIDFIELDER'S NAME RINGS AROUND THE HIVE

Olly Lee was over the moon to hear the travelling Town fans singing his name on Saturday after netting the winning goal against former club Barnet.

Following on from his impressive performance in the previous week's win over Blackpool, the midfielder bagged his first of the season just a fortnight after coming in for criticism from some fans in the defeat at Colchester.

The 1,687 Town fans in the away end at The Hive continuously sang the 25-year-old's name after his fine 66th-minute strike, and the ex-Barnet man said: "It was nice to see the words changed today, hopefully we won't hear the other song again and this is the start of something good.

"Obviously it's not nice to hear bad things like that, but criticism doesn't bother me. I'm going to play my game whatever. Football is a game of opinions. Some people are going to like you, some aren't going to like you.

"It's not nice to hear it, but they turned it round today and I thank them for that. It tops it to hear them singing my name today and long may it continue."

On the goal, which came after Lee's attempted pass into substitute Ollie Palmer rolled invitingly back into his path to curl left-footed around Barnet keeper Jamie Stephens from the edge



of the area, Lee said: "I can't really remember what happened. I think we just lumped it into big Ol and probably his first touch got away from him, it came to me and I slotted it home, so it was a nice moment. I was really pleased with it.

"My first goal of the season has been a long time coming. I normally get three to five, so I'm not happy with just one. Hopefully there's a few more to come. It'd be nice, wouldn't it?"

With two wins on the bounce, Lee is confident the Hatters players can keep

the ball rolling for the final five games of the season as they look to secure promotion to League One.

"Listen, we are just one game after the next," he said. "We play Orient now, win that. Then Mansfield, win. We've got to keep grinding out wins.

"Morale is really high now. Everyone is backing each other. We've put two solid performances in and hopefully there is a third to come."

Lee also found time to praise goalkeeper Stuart Moore for a series of match-winning saves at The Hive, including a brilliant second-half stop to keep out a Mauro Vilhete header destined for the top corner.

"Stu was brilliant all game," said Lee. "He's come in and had a tough time, but he's got his chance now and taken it with both hands. Credit to him, he's a great lad and it's nice that he can put a performance like that in.

"He was my man of the match and he kept us in it at times, so he was brilliant. That save from the header was different class. I know their lad who headed it and he couldn't believe that he didn't get a goal there, so long may it continue."

ON-LOAN READING KEEPER RELISHES RECALL OF HIS OWN

On-loan Reading goalkeeper Stuart Moore earned a place in the EFL Team of the Week for his performance in the 1-0 win at Barnet last week, having been given his first start in over two months following Matt Macey's midweek recall by Arsenal.

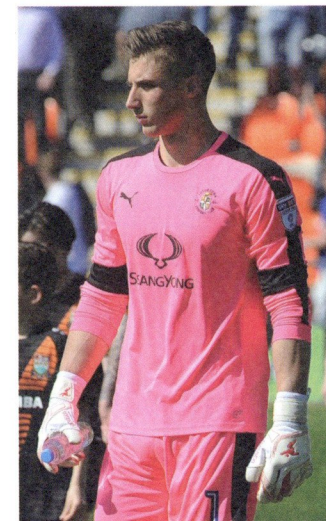
The 22-year-old told afterwards how buoyed he felt by being picked by manager Nathan Jones for the trip to The Hive, after experiencing a difficult debut in the defeat to Cheltenham a few hours after signing on a rushed January transfer deadline day following Brighton's recall of Christian Walton.

With Craig King called back from his loan at Southport and Liam Gooch still training everyday with the Hatters keepers under the watchful eye of goalie coach Kevin Dearden while on loan at Non-League side Biggleswade Town, Moore is enjoying his time at Kenilworth Road.

"We are lucky here, we've had great keepers," said Moore. "I know

Christian was here before and he did well. Matt came in and he did very well, and every day we push each other. We work very hard and we are lucky to have such a good working group at training.

PUSH

"In football you never know what's around the corner. You never know what could happen. I've got a lot of competition here. I know with Liam and Craig, they are both very good goalkeepers so I can't take my foot off the gas. And in terms of pushing for promotion as a whole, no-one can afford to take their foot off the gas, so we've really got to push for it now."

After his starring role at the Hive, Moore couldn't wait for today and the visit of Leyton Orient to come around, adding: "I'm ready for the next game. The games can't come quick enough now.

"Every game we just take on at a time, make sure we get a result in that game and move onto the next one. We don't look too far ahead, just take it a game at a time and that's all we can do – focus on ourselves."

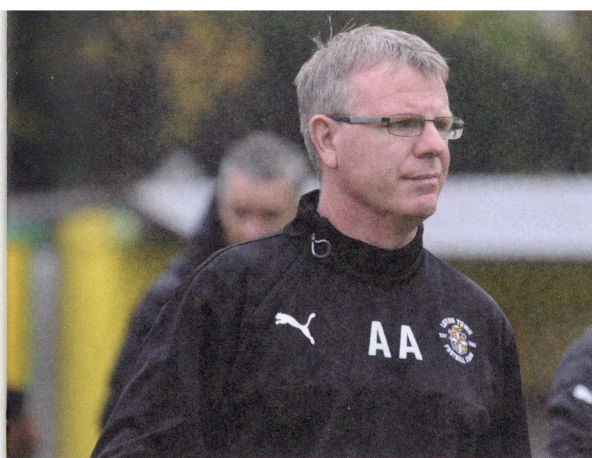

Good afternoon everyone and welcome to today's game versus Leyton Orient.

FIXTURES

This philosophy is something that we will persevere with as we look to produce more players from the Academy for the first team, and one that we are all on board with.

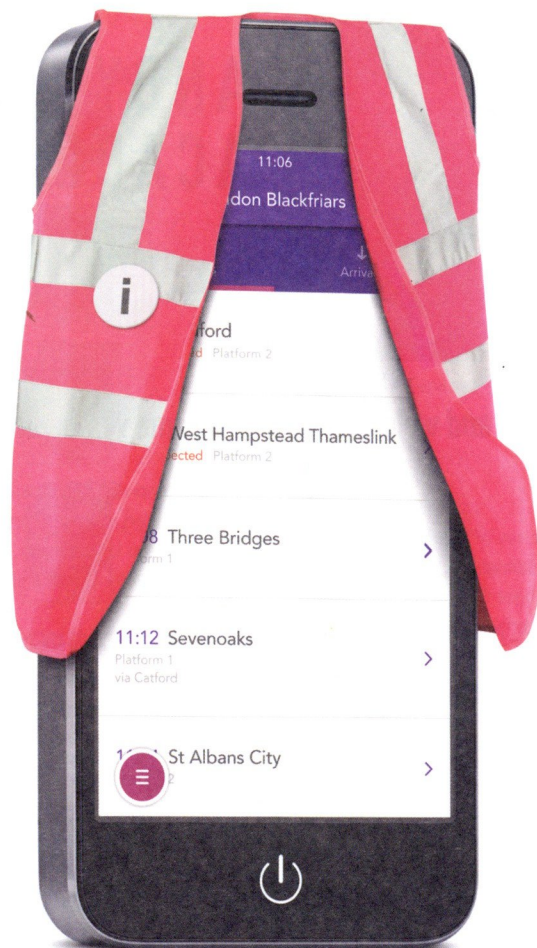
TOURS

The Trust have engaged with over 800 children over the last two weeks of the Easter school holidays with 330 centre of excellence boys visiting Stowe School in Buckingham for our annual residential football camp, 160 pre-academy boys travelling to Amsterdam to compete in

the Holland Cup, over 250 boys and girls attending our local soccer camps, 50 of our Player Development Centre Girls playing Northampton Town FC and our KICKS squads welcoming Arsenal FC to Lewsey Farm.



YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

PRE-ACADEMY PREPARE FOR AMSTERDAM TRIP WITH GAMES AGAINST NORTHAMPTON TOWN FC AND OXFORD UNITED FC AND CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE BOYS VISIT STOWE SCHOOL.

This weekend 160 boys in our pre-academy U9 to U16 squads are in Amsterdam competing in the Holland Cup, and last week prepared with games against neighbours from Oxford and Northampton.

Our fully integrated youth player development structure at the Club is run by the Community Trust to support our schoolboy academy. It starts with players as young as four-years-old who simply 'pay and play' each week, through to our Skills Performance Centres Talent Identification Coaching Programme for boys up to 16 years of age, with routes into our Development Centres for recruited boys. In total over 20 of these centres run all year around through our development programme.

An important part of the process is the games programme and during last week our pre-academy boys played final warm-up games ahead of defending several age group wins from last year's Holland Cup tournament. Fair to say

our pre-academy squads are competitive at all age groups providing stiff opposition for most clubs, and following this week's games the boys travel to Amsterdam in good spirits.

Meanwhile, over 300 centre of excellence boys attended our annual residential Easter training camp at the fantastic facilities at Stowe School in Buckingham last week. This was our ninth annual visit to the famous old public school and as well as great team building exercises and all kinds of sports activities, it does allow our coaching staff a good opportunity to see the boys both on and off the pitch as we look to promote boys into the pre-academy level to replace boys who have progressed to academy level.

The COFEX boys will now spend the next few weeks preparing for their end of season tour, which is also to Holland to compete in the Juliana Malden Cup in May. We will be reporting on both tours in future matchday programmes – so watch this space!



PL KICKS PROGRAMME WELCOMES CHARLTON ATHLETIC, MK DONS AND STEVENAGE FC TO MARSH FARM AND ARSENAL FC TO LEWSEY FARM

The Trust's PL KICKS programme this season recently came out second most popular in the EFL in terms of participants attending new club projects this season (just behind Leeds United), and our projects have quickly attracted visiting clubs to the Town for games at U11, U14, U16 and U19s, and we are now a recognised regional hub for the KICKS project.

Luton Town Ladies saw their five-game unbeaten run come to a close as they suffered an uninspiring 3-1 defeat to Old Actonians on Sunday.

Town were undone by three set pieces scored by Melissa Jung and Alessandra Barreca (2) before Amy Summerfield pulled one back for the Hatters late on.

The defeat left Town boss Nikki Baker displeased and after the game she admitted that the team must improve ahead of their next fixture that sees them play Offley & Stopsley in the County Cup final.

"We started off well and should have gone ahead twice, but a lack of strength and aggression across the pitch meant we couldn't get hold of the ball well enough in key areas and our composure in the final third as well as our defending was just not good enough," Baker said.

"We must work on playing simply, the final ball in the attacking third and basic defending. We have been much better at set pieces in recent weeks so today was disappointing."

Jess McKay came extremely close to giving Town an early lead when she curled the ball in towards the bottom right corner, but her effort went just wide.

Actonians, who sit above Town in fifth place, opened their account after seven minutes when Carla Williams crossed the ball in from the right flank and Jung was able to head in at the near post.

Barreca doubled Actonians' tally 15 minutes later as she headed in a free-kick from close range that was delivered by Jessica Byrne.

Ten minutes later, Actonians extended their lead after Town failed to clear a free-kick and Sinead Friel sent a second ball into the box that Barreca smashed in from six yards.

Paige Hornsnell made two excellent saves for Actonians to deny a long-range attempt from Erica Byron and then Joanne Rutherford, who tried to convert the rebound.

Town had yet another chance to score just before the break when Zara Carroll hit a long free-kick superbly, but her strike just crept wide of the top right corner.

Actonians continued to trouble Town after the interval as Carla Williams volleyed the ball just over the crossbar, and shortly after Jessica Devoti had to make two stops to deny shots from Friel and Barreca.

Summerfield pulled one back for Town with ten minutes to go as Rutherford fed a brilliant ball into the box that the midfielder fired in from close range.

The away team weren't done and dusted and Rachel Kosky made an exceptional last ditch tackle to stop Sinthujah Sooriyakumar, who was one-on-one on goal after she had managed to get past Devoti just minutes before full-time.

Town play next against Offley & Stopsley in the County Cup final on 19th April.

LATE TACKLE

CHRIS DUNLAVY

NEIL WARNOCK WILL KICK OFF NEXT SEASON WITH CARDIFF AIMING FOR A RECORD-BREAKING EIGHTH CAREER PROMOTION.

The 68-year-old – now in his 37th year as a manager – is currently tied on seven alongside Dave 'Harry' Bassett and the late Graham Taylor. Yet, as the Bluebirds boss seeks to surge out in front, competition is fast approaching from the rear.

Victory for Doncaster on Saturday marked Darren Ferguson's fourth promotion at the tender age of 45, whilst Chris Wilder made it three in seven years after leading his beloved Blades to League One. Here's how the current EFL managers stack up...

NEIL WARNOCK – 8

Warnock's reputation as a promotion specialist was built on a spectacular purple patch during the eighties and nineties. Starting with Scarborough's scramble from the Conference and ending in Nott County's improbable rise to the top-flight, the Yorkshireman won five promotions in nine seasons – four of them via the play-offs.

Promotion to the Premier League with Sheffield United (2006) and a first-ever EFL title with QPR in 2011 cemented his status as a Championship expert.

GARY JOHNSON – 5

Johnson started out as right-hand man to the infamous John Beck and was actually the brain behind many of the maverick tactics behind Cambridge's ascent to Division One.

He hit his stride in the mid-noughties with Yeovil, taking the Glovers from the Conference to League One and completing a sequence of three promotions in five years by leading Bristol City to the Championship. But for THAT Dean Windass goal in the 2007-08 play-off final, it might have been four in six. Still, a fairytale return to Huish Park brought victory in the League One play-offs before last season's romp to the Conference title with Cheltenham.

STEVE BRUCE – 4

Nobody knows how to seize a place in the Premier League quite like the former Man United defender. Last year's play-off victory with Hull marked the FOURTH time the 56-year-old has scrambled out of the Championship – one more than Warnock, Taylor or Bassett. In fact, nobody in Football League history can match Bruce's record, which will almost certainly be extended if he stays at Aston Villa.

SIMON GRAYSON – 4

Uniquely amongst anyone on this list – and indeed the EFL – Grayson holds the distinction of having been promoted with every club he's worked for.

A League One specialist now doing a magnificent job at Preston, the 47-year-old has taken Blackpool, Leeds, Huddersfield and the Lilywhites into the Championship.

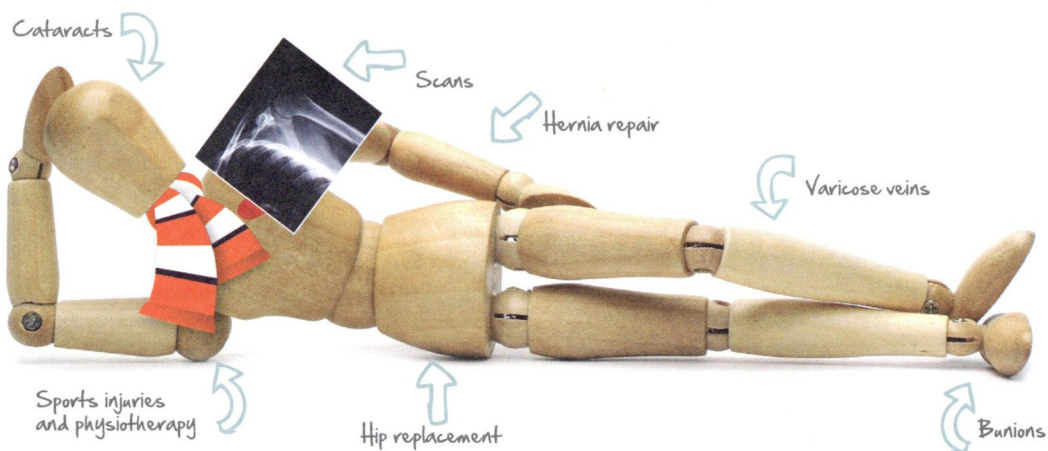
DARREN FERGUSON – 4

The youngest man on this list, Ferguson was just 36 and still registered as a player when he won the first of two promotions in as many years with Peterborough in 2008. He returned from a miserable spell at Preston to seal a third – and second to the Championship – in 2011. With a second League Two title now in the bag, Ferguson has plenty of time to hunt Warnock down.

STEVE EVANS – 4

The less said about Boston's rise to League Two in 2002 the better, but the rehabilitated Scot has since proved he doesn't need brown paper bags to win promotion. Having led Crawley to the Conference title in 2011, he joined Rotherham in April 2012 with the Red Devils all but certain of a place in League One. What seemed an odd decision was soon vindicated – two years and two promotions later, the Millers were in the Championship.

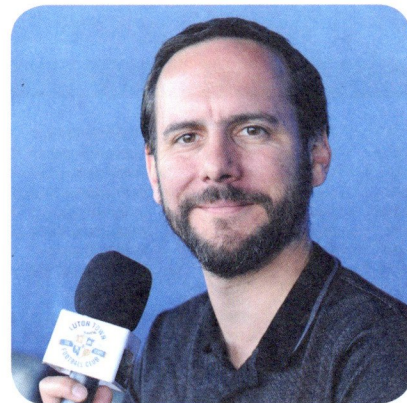

As this will probably be my final "Last Word" article of the season, and with the Supporters' Trust holding their annual presentation awards night next weekend, I thought I would take this opportunity to review some of the 2016/17 season and to look ahead to the evening that I'm proud to have been asked to host once again.

We're on the back of two 1-0 wins, which in itself is unusual as there have only been three 1-0 wins all season, the other at home to Accrington Stanley back in November. Today we're looking for a third consecutive league win for the first time this season, which possibly tells a story in itself, but you also don't need me reminding you that the number of draws has ultimately been the difference between being in the play-offs positions rather than the top three.

Congratulations should go of course to Doncaster who have already been promoted, but given Luton are unbeaten against the champions-elect, whether it be Rovers or indeed Plymouth, it shows that the Hatters are equally capable, at times, of being in those top three places.

Looking back just over a month ago and automatic promotion was in our hands; however a run of just three points from a possible 15 meant we were nervously looking over our shoulders rather than being positive about the automatic promotion possibilities. How we need Portsmouth

to now suffer a similar fate to ours over the next few weeks!

Danny Hylton's goals and overall contribution saw him nominated for the EFL League Two Player of the Season, and whilst he unfortunately lost out to John Marquis at Sunday's presentation night, it certainly shows he's a very strong contender for picking up an award of some description from the fans' event next weekend.

At the time of writing Danny has netted 24 goals, 18 of these with his right foot, three by headers, two with his left foot, and one with whichever part of his body touched the ball from the cross by Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu for the opening goal against Wycombe back in September.

One award Danny won't be winning though is the goal of the season as despite being top scorer he's not made the shortlist! Stephen O'Donnell is in the running with his only league goal of the season, that thunderbolt against Yeovil. You also have to credit Alan Sheehan who has managed to

get all three of his goals from this campaign onto the shortlist and all directly from free kicks too. The other nominees are Jordan Cook (Doncaster away), Luke Gambin (Hartlepool home) and Josh McQuoid (Swindon away).

One other stat I'd like to share with you before I come to an end relates to the fantastic support that we have seen this season. The away attendance currently stands at 23,653 from the 21 League fixtures, equating to 21.7% of the total attendances at these matches and an average of 1,126 per fixture. To put this into perspective it is already 1,000 travelling fans ahead of last season with two fixtures still to play. Looking at the home attendances and only Plymouth brought more than 1,000 fans for a League fixture at Kenilworth Road.

Enjoy the final few games of the season, however many that may be, and don't forget the Supporters Trust Player of the Season Presentation Evening is on Sunday 23rd April at Venue 360.
