

NATHAN JONES

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for the first competitive game of what we hope will be a big season for Luton Town Football Club in Sky Bet League Two.

For the fourth time in my year-and-a-half in charge of the Hatters, the visitors this afternoon are the familiar faces from my old club Yeovil Town.

Firstly, I would like to welcome everybody from Huish Park; supporters, directors, officials, management and players, among whom I have many friends from my seven years in Somerset as a player and coach. As always, it will be good to catch up with manager Darren Way and his number two Terry Skiverton, two good pals of mine.

It seems we've been destined to meet on a regular basis since I took over here in January 2016. We hosted them very early on in my tenure, then for the opening league game of last season, a repeat today and, of course, the Checkatrade Trophy quarter-final in between.

They are always keenly-fought contests that have produced plenty of entertainment for the supporters, and we look forward to another game of the same ilk this afternoon.

It's been shorter break than usual after our involvement in the play-offs, but I believe the work we have done in the transfer window – both in terms of those we've allowed to leave and the players we've recruited – has made us stronger, and I thank Gary Sweet and the board for their backing.

We've brought in a combination of higher-level and promotion-winning experience with three goalkeepers of our own in Marek Stech, James Shea and Harry Isted, plus right-back Jack Stacey, midfielders Alan McCormack and Andrew Shinnie and forwards James Collins and Elliot Lee.

We signed almost every target we went for and were able to use the wonderful new training ground and plans for Power Court as tools to sell them what we're about here.

The players came back for training in great shape with attitudes to match, determined to improve on last season and the disappointing finale we experienced in the play-offs. We've had a productive pre-season with some tough friendlies and an excellent week in Slovenia, all building up to today.

We've managed to stay injury-free apart from the routine operation Danny Hylton required after last season's endeavours, and the need to ease James Justin back in to full training after his involvement with England Under-19s.


On the subject of JJ, it was a real boost to have him sign a contract extension this week after the recent transfer speculation. It's a credit to him, his family and people who look after him that they see this as the perfect place to continue his development, not to mention the club for rejecting a sizeable offer – as they have for other members of our squad coveted by those higher up. Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu putting pen to paper until 2020 on Thursday was another huge positive for us.

Our goals remain the same as last year, but we feel we are better equipped now to go at least one place better and secure that automatic promotion position

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH OUTGOING CHAIRMAN NICK OWEN

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for the start of a brand new season and I am sure that, like me, you are filled with hope and expectation.

A warm welcome also to our friends from Yeovil – their players, directors and, of course, supporters. Our manager, Nathan Jones, spent seven years with the Grovers, so I am sure he'll enjoy meeting up with old friends.

Also, I would like to welcome our new players who have joined us over the summer. Some fabulous signings with intriguing and exciting possibilities for the campaign ahead. While I dearly hope they all have a hugely successful time at Kenilworth Road, I would also like to wish our departing players all the best and hope they take some happy memories of Luton Town with them and will always hold the club in affection.

This is the last time I will be writing our programme notes because, as you may know, I am stepping down from my role as chairman of Luton Town FC after nine years. It's a decision I've made with some regret, as you can imagine, because I have been indescribably proud to be so closely involved with the club I have loved and followed for nearly 60 years.

It is simply that I have found it particularly difficult in recent times to give the role as much attention

as it really demands. Because of varying working commitments and the distance I live from Luton, I have not been able to attend matches or club associated events as frequently as I would like. However, the club has kindly made me a Vice President and I will still be coming to as many games as I possibly can, both home and away.

The last nine years have certainly put us all through the mangle, haven't they? Some terrific highs, some appalling lows, which I suppose epitomises the life of most football fans, but particularly if you are a Hatter!

Becoming involved in the group that saved the club from extinction in 2008 was a thrill and a privilege. Then came that unprecedented penalty of a 30 points deduction from the Football

League and the Football Association. We all accepted that we would be penalised for events that occurred under previous regimes, quite right, but the outrageous severity of it all, affecting innocent supporters the most, will never cease to infuriate me. It felt harsh and vindictive.

Losing our league place was, of course, shattering, as was losing in the Conference play-offs on three occasions, particularly the finals against Wimbledon and York. Losing on pens in one and failing to an offside goal in the other – agony!

On the other hand, there was the utter joy of winning the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in such dramatic style at a sunny Wembley in 2009 with Mick Harford in charge – a legend who won at Wembley for us both as a player and manager.





Quite brilliant, even if I did have to encounter the club's nemesis, Lord Brian Mawhinney, chairman at the time of the Football League. The orange vision that day of 42,000 Luton fans, converging from all over the UK and 20 countries across the world, was an utter inspiration and indicative of our magnificent support and the galvanising effect of how we'd been treated by the authorities.

High on my memory list will be the emergence of Andre Gray. He played for Hinckley United against us in the FA Trophy, created a good impression and ultimately signed for £30,000 in 2012. What a fantastic player he turned out to be. In our glorious Conference winning season, he scored 30 goals, as we blazed our way in glorious style back up to the Football League. He's had a stellar career since then, way up to the Premier League, which has been very good for us financially because of the astute manner in which his move away from Kenilworth Road was handled.

Also, during that time, I treasure getting to know and becoming friends with John Still. He was such a character and did so much with senior players to transform the vibes around Kenilworth Road. There were lots of heroes in and around that squad. And I must mention the phenomenal efforts of SOLYD, the Supporters of Luton Youth Development, who made sure we

kept our wonderful youth policy going, which is paying serious dividends now. Most clubs in our position, out of the FL, would have had to drop it. Thank you, SOLYD.

We never really expected to spend five years in the Conference, so winning the title was all the sweeter. Having said that, I thoroughly enjoyed the experience of meeting diehard football fans and officials at non-league level who work so hard and so selflessly to keep their clubs afloat. Real football people. The same applies, of course, to clubs in the lower reaches of the Football League. I find that much more edifying and appealing than the rarefied environs of the Premier.

As Luton fans we have the unique attribute – questionable perhaps – of having played league games against a wider variety of clubs than any other. Think about it. From Arsenal to Alfreton, Man U to Macclesfield, Tottenham to Tamworth, Newcastle to Nuneaton – that's quite a broad CV! In a weird sort of way, I am quite proud of that!

I would like to pay tribute to all those who contributed in such determined fashion to keeping the club afloat during our darkest hours and continue to do so. The investors stepped up generously and selflessly when the club was on the brink. They will all deservedly take their place in the history of this wonderful club.

I am enormously grateful for the way our fellow fans have been so supportive of 2020 (and indeed me) and stayed with the club through the turmoil of the last nine or ten years. Our unwavering support is the envy of many. You are simply amazing! Thank you.

I am proud to say that four generations of my family are part of that support. My father brought me here to my first game in 1958 and I was smitten. My four children are equally passionate and now my grandchildren have started coming to games. Nothing will shake our passion for the Hatters.

Finally, rest assured that 2020, plus those that help them significantly in various ways at the highest level, and the club's terrific, loyal staff are all committed to creating a stable and glittering future for Luton Town Football Club in a beautiful new stadium a few years from now. No agenda – purely the good of the club and indeed the wider community.

Here's to a great season. All the best to Nathan, his team of coaches and, of course, the players – enjoy the game, enjoy the season, all the best,

THE CAPTAIN'S LOG

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for the opening game of the season, as we take on Yeovil Town.

First and foremost, I am proud to be captain of this fantastic football club for another season. When I was originally given the armband it was a really proud moment for me, and that sense of privilege continues to this day.

Our target for this season is clear. Promotion. We wanted to do it last year and we came a little bit short. We are confident we can do it this season, especially with the calibre of player we have brought in and the promotions that they have won. We are a side to be feared.

Even without their previous promotions, the quality of player the gaffer has brought in is different class. It's an unbelievably competitive squad and everyone is on their toes, there's competition all over the pitch. It's a good thing, the standard of training has been through the roof.

A lot of people were saying that we didn't have enough experience last season across the pitch, but I think the gaffer has addressed that. It's now up to him to ensure he carries on that upward trajectory and I don't see why that wouldn't happen because he's a fantastic lad.

Today's visiting side have a face we are very familiar with – Jake Gray – and he is one of a few good Yeovil additions. They're a big strong side who push you high up and put pressure on you. It's going to be a tough test. But it's important, especially at home, that we start well and get a good result.

Finally, it's cliché, but you, our fantastic supporters, can be the twelfth man. When you're all cheering us on it makes an absolutely huge difference. So we are hoping that we can put a smile on your face, not only today but throughout this campaign. We need your help in making this place a fortress.

POSITION: MIDFIELDER | AGE: 33

HE SAID: "I am very demanding on myself of putting in performances. Not everything is perfect, but one thing you will get from me is 100 per cent effort and commitment to winning a game of football."



ANDREW SHINNIE

POSITION: MIDFIELDER | AGE: 28

PREVIOUS CLUB: Birmingham City (signed on season-long loan)

HE SAID: "People might say you're dropping down a few leagues, but Luton Town is a big club to come to. The facilities are outstanding. It's set up to be a bigger club and progress through the leagues."



JAMES COLLINS

POSITION: STRIKER | AGE: 26

PREVIOUS CLUB: Crawley Town

HE SAID: "The game we had at Kenilworth Road this year was a real good one played in a great atmosphere. I can't wait for that to be my home ground and crowd this season."



ELLIOT LEE

POSITION: STRIKER | AGE: 22

PREVIOUS CLUB: Barnsley

HE SAID: "My brother Olly and I spoke about it and we realised it would be a great experience to play together. The club has come on a lot since I was here last time. We've got a positive future."



HARRY ISTED

POSITION: GOALKEEPER | AGE: 20

PREVIOUS CLUB: Stoke City

HE SAID: "It feels great to be here. It's an excellent club that promotes youth and I really feel I can be competition for the other two keepers. It's somewhere I think I can progress."

**JACK STACEY****POSITION: DEFENDER | AGE: 21****PREVIOUS CLUB: Reading**

HE SAID: "I spoke to the manager and he outlined his vision for the club, and how the main aim of the season is to get promoted. That's why I'm here."

**JAMES SHEA****POSITION: GOALKEEPER | AGE: 26****PREVIOUS CLUB: AFC Wimbledon**

HE SAID: "As soon as I turned up I knew it was the place I wanted to come. You see the training ground, the facilities here – it's unbelievable. It's Championship at worst really."

OLD FACES, NEW DEALS!

After the great news at the end of June that left-back Dan Potts had put pen to paper on a new one-year contract, everyone at Kenilworth Road was boosted earlier this week by sought-after defender James Justin and midfielder Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu both signed contract extensions to 2020, with an option for a further year after that.



JJ's new deal comes after the 19-year-old's breakthrough season in which he made 39 appearances for Nathan Jones' side, scoring once, and ended with a call-up to three England Under-19 training camps.

Justin joined the Town in 2005 aged seven, progressing through the youth ranks at his hometown club before making his first team debut on the final day of the 2015/16 season as a substitute in the 4-1 win over Exeter City.

The local lad was more than happy to add another year to the extended contract that he signed last December, as he aims to continue his development at Kenilworth Road.

He said: "I am happy to be rewarded for the hard work and all that I did last season, but obviously the focus is this season and getting promoted automatically. I am looking to build on last season with the club."

"There was interest from other clubs, but I am fully focused on staying here and helping the team get promoted."

"I have had a few chats with the gaffer and he reiterated what he said last season about developing this season and seeing where that takes me, just helping the team however I can. My family are happy I am not going anywhere. They're over the moon that I want to stay. My dad played a big part in that as well."



Pelly has been a Hatter since initially joining the club on loan from West Ham in November 2013, before signing permanently the following January.

He has since racked up 118 appearances, including 52 last

term, and he said: "I have been here a while now and I am delighted to have extended my contract. I can't wait to get started and hopefully we can get promotion this season."

"There's a similar vibe around the place in terms of our confidence in getting out of the division as to when I first arrived. Last year was a bit of a disappointment at the end, but we know we can turn it around. My seasons here have been disrupted by injury up until last year when the gaffer brought in Jared Roberts-Smith, who has helped me a lot. I was able to put a lot of games together last season and I really want to push on and do the same this time around."

Congratulations Pottsy, JJ and Pelly. Here's to a great season – and plenty more – ahead!

MAREK STECH

A big smile breaks across Marek Stech's face when he's reminded of the illustrious company in which he made his first move to English football from Sparta Prague, at the tender age of 16.

We are sitting in the stand next to the 4G training pitch at The Brache, a month into pre-season after his second move to these shores from the club he has always supported back home in his native Czech Republic, when I recount a Daily Telegraph article from 31st August 2006.

It opens by telling how 'West Ham United have pulled off the biggest transfer coup of the summer' with the double signing of Argentina striker Carlos Tevez and his team-mate Javier Mascherano, and ends with: 'Meanwhile, West Ham have also signed Czech Republic Under-17 international goalkeeper Marek Stech from Sparta Prague for an undisclosed fee.'

As footnotes go, it's not a bad one. And while third-party ownership infamy, the Manchester giants, Liverpool, Barcelona and Juventus lay in store for the first two players, the Town's summer signing hasn't done badly either.

He's played for his country. He returned to Sparta three years ago to play Europa League football. Before that, of course, he earned cult hero status with today's visitors Yeovil Town.

"They are massive stars now, but the first couple of months were very hard for us," says Stech, his near-perfect English illustrating how he threw himself into life over here after his move to Upton Park, so much so he met Louise when he was only 18.

This summer, nine years on, they married in Marbella.

"The key point for me was the goalie coach Ludo Miklosko being a West Ham and Czech legend. He went over to watch me in the games I played for the U17s when we reached the European Championships final that summer, and was one of the reasons why I went there.

"His wife Ivana helped me by being my English teacher. It was quite nice because I was put in digs with the other lads and had to learn very quickly. Mascherano and Tevez didn't speak any English at the time. They had a translator. They were very quiet and just did the job."

"As a youngster I never thought I'd be going to a massive club like West Ham and getting a chance."

"I was there with people like Roy Carroll and Robert Green, so it was good for me to work with those kind of keepers who had already played so many games in the Premier League. It was something to always remember about my life."

Growing up in Prague, Stech – having already chosen to be a goalkeeper at 11 after starting as a striker with Bohemians – had to get used to making big decisions early in life. A talented tennis player, he prioritised football around the same time that Sparta came in for him at U13s.

Then, after starring in the U17 Euros of 2006, came a week's trial with the Hammers. "They said they wanted me and I signed a five-year deal," he recalls. "In the space of one week I

had to move, leaving all my family, friends, everyone."

Having worked through the Upton Park academy and reserves, as much as he loved the experience of travelling around the country, seeing all the big stadiums and players while a regular on the bench in the Premier League, Stech craved first-team football. Three Carling Cup appearances in 2010-11 had him dreaming of facing Manchester United in the quarter-final.

"I had a year left on my contract and there was a clause where if I played five games, West Ham would have to pay money to Sparta," Stech says. "After the third cup game Karen Brady came to me said, 'I'm really sorry, but you're not going to play for this football club any more'.

"That was a big shock for me. We had Man U coming up, but I knew then I couldn't stay there. I needed to move on."

He'd already been on loan to Wycombe and Bournemouth, then further moves to Yeovil and Leyton Orient followed before his contract expired at the end of 2011-12. It was in the October of that campaign that he first came across Nathan Jones, then the Grovers' left-back and assistant-manager.

"I played a couple of games with the gaffer when I was there, and he was giving me grief," laughs Stech. "He's always been the same, very demanding on the pitch and giving loads of information. Basically, if someone isn't doing the job, he will tell you off. He just set up the standard that you have to do well."

After signing permanently in the summer of 2012, Stech was ever-present as Yeovil won promotion,

keeping 19 clean sheets and turning in a man-of-the-match winning performance in the Wembley play-off final with Brentford.

"Yeovil is such a small, family club, but what we achieved was amazing," says Stech. "You would never think that first season I went there that we'd get promoted to the Championship for the first time in their history. It was magical. One of the best times."

Relegation followed at the end of his second season, and at that point, the opportunity to return to Prague (turning down Watford in the process) proved too strong. Now though, he is back – with the playful fixture computer throwing up Yeovil on the opening day!

"I've been away for three years, I come back to sign for a new club and it must have been a one in a million chance we'd get a home game against Yeovil on the opening day!" says Stech.

"I've been in touch with Terry Skiverton and Darren Way, the old gaffer Gary Johnson, and other players all the time I've been at Sparta. The club lifted me up. It gave me the chance that I could prove myself. If I hadn't got the chance, I don't know where I might be."

"It was two incredible seasons playing in League One and the Championship, getting loads of games under my belt, which I needed."





"When we got relegated, it was a big thing, going home having been away for so long. Prague is lovely, my parents are there and all the people around there are really nice, so it was very easy to adjust.

"It was just unfortunate that Sparta sacked the gaffer when I was playing and doing well, and there was a lot of changes.

"For the last year and a half it's been very difficult because they changed so many people and the other gaffer came in and he wanted to play more experienced goalkeepers.

"I pretty much played all the cup games and Europa League, I did all that. But I haven't had those week-in, week-out games. Plus, there's not that many matches overall. You only play 30 during the season there. You can play almost double that here if you do well in the cups.

"I wanted to get back over to the UK because it doesn't matter if it's League One or League Two, they are still the best leagues – and every single boy's dream is to play in England, in any league.

"I was talking to Walsall, but Luton came in at the last minute, three days before our wedding. The gaffer talked me through the project of what the football club wants to achieve, and I was very keen on that.

"Living 30 miles from here, my wife's mum being around and my daughter Lyla going to school – I made a big

decision there and then because it changes it all, changes everything. Family and football – both of them, the most important things."

The transition has been seamless; Louise's family on hand to help at home in Loughton, where the Stechks have moved into a new flat and four-year-old Lyla is preparing to start school.

PUZZLE

And at work, ex-West Ham team-mates Olly and Elliot Lee, Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu and Dan Potts, plus Jones, goalie coach Kevin Dearden and captain Scott Cuthbert – the latter two known from his Orient loan – have been familiar faces to welcome him to the Town.

He says: "I spoke to Olly and said 'It's pretty much like the whole West Ham Academy – this is brilliant!' I've got about ten people I know here already, I'm living down the road, and when I spoke to the gaffer on the phone, he explained about the new training ground. Looking out here now it's amazing. This is not League Two. This is Championship, Premier League standard. It was almost like a puzzle and all the pieces came together, it was just meant to be.

"We are in the flat and all settled now. It's been a big last couple of months, moving here, a new chapter, having my family here, which is very important because you want to be comfortable with that."

And as for today and a warm reception from all parts of Kenilworth Road?

"It will be a nice feeling. After the game it might be emotional, I will clap to the Yeovil fans and have a nice friendship with them. That is still a big part of my life. In two years we achieved a lot and I will always remember that. Yeovil will stay in my heart, and so will Sparta.

"But now I'm at Luton and my heart will be here. I will try to do as much as I can to get us as a group to where we belong. We have to achieve big things here. The main priority is to get promoted straightaway and then carry on from there."

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Tuesday night's game will mark the 30th meeting between the Hatters and Ipswich, and our first competitive fixture in just over a decade. Our last game against them was a 2-0 home defeat to the Tractor Boys in March 2007. Of the 29 games played, Luton have won 12 times, lost 11 and drawn six.

IN CHARGE Ex-Republic of Ireland international and Barnsley defender McCarthy is in the fifth managerial job of his career, having also been in charge of Millwall, his country, Sunderland and Wolverhampton Wanderers. The 58-year-

Premier League outfit Celtic and French top division side Olympic Lyonnais.

Jack Marriott started his career off with Ipswich where he made three first team appearances, before signing for the Hatters in 2015.

Kevin Foley attended Luton's Cardinal Newman Catholic School, progressing through the youth ranks at Kenilworth Road and going onto make 166 appearances for the Town. He spent a season with the Blues in 2014-15, playing eight times. David Geddis joined the Town on loan in 1977 from Ipswich, making a handful of appearances, whilst more recently Carlos Edwards joined us from Wrexham in 2005 and spent two seasons at Kenilworth Road, then played for the Portman Road outfit for five seasons between 2009-14.





Super Ed Upson had an outstanding few seasons with us. He forced his way into the first team and became an important playmaker. He scored many long-distance beauties.

LM: ARRON DAVIES

The first player I ever saw score live for Yeovil Town and I will never forget it. He was the hero when we beat Forest 5-4 in the play-offs.

S: MARCUS STEWART

A veteran who never lost his spark. His passion for the game made him a fans' favourite and he started the comeback at Nottingham Forest.

S: PADDY MADDEN

 24 goals in one season – that is unheard of and his signing changed everything in 2013. He

made us all believe we could be playing in the Championship.



TOP BOYS

TONY CLARK

Goalkeeper Tony Clark was ever-present 'Player of the Year' in Yeovil Town's 1970-71 Southern League title triumph. Previously with Exeter City and Barnstaple, he joined Yeovil in July 1969 and contested a first-team slot with Ken Jones as they finished Southern League runners-up in 1969-70. He helped win at Bournemouth in the 1970-71 FA Cup second round and played against 'double' winners Arsenal in the third round, starring as they were twice FA Trophy semi-finalists. Also helping the Grovers reach the Southern League Cup final in 1976, he made 379 appearances before moving to Bideford in July 1977 and is now a retired postman in Exeter.

TONY PENNOCK

Welsh Semi-Pro international goalkeeper Tony Pennock starred in Yeovil Town's 1996-97 Isthmian League title triumph. Initially with Clydach United, he joined Stockport County in August 1990 and moved


via Wigan Athletic to Hereford United in July 1994. He joined Yeovil in August 1995 and was their 'Player of the Year' in 1995-96. Twice ever-present, he was an important figure as they twice reached the FA Cup third round and starred as they were Conference runners-up in 2000-01. He made 161 Conference appearances for the Grovers before joining Rushden & Diamonds in June 2001, then played for Farnborough Town and Carmarthen Town.

BRIAN PARKER

England Semi-Pro international goalkeeper Brian Parker was ever-present as Yeovil Town were Southern League Cup finalists in 1978-79. Signing professional for Crewe Alexandra in August 1972, he joined Arsenal for £40,000 in August 1975 and understudied England international Jimmy Rimmer. He moved to Yeovil in July 1977 and featured in their first Alliance Premier League match. Voted 'Player of the Year' as the Grovers reached the FA Cup third round in 1979-80, he played against Norwich City and made 213 appearances while at Huish. He joined Runcorn in May 1981, starring in their 1981-82 Alliance Premier League title triumph.

JOHN McGINLAY

Versatile striker John McGinlay was capped 13 times by Scotland after leaving Yeovil Town. Initially with Nairn County, he joined Yeovil in

March 1985 and was leading scorer in 1985-86. He starred alongside Paul Randall in the Grovers' 1987-88 Isthmian League title triumph and netted 56 goals in 147 games. Moving via Elgin City to Shrewsbury Town in February 1989, he had spells with Bury and Millwall, joining Bolton Wanderers for £125,000 in September 1992. He starred in three promotion successes, then played for Bradford City and Oldham Athletic. Later managing Ilkeston and Gresley, he became assistant-coach of Cincinnati Kings.

TERRY SKIVERTON

England Semi-Pro international central defender Terry Skiverton captained Yeovil Town's 2002 FA Trophy final success. Initially with Chelsea, he joined Wycombe Wanderers in March 1996 after a loan spell. He moved to Welling United in August 1997 and joined Yeovil in June 1999. Skippering the Grovers' 2002-03 Conference title triumph, he also led them to the



League Two title in 2004-05 and League One play-off final in 2006-07. He scored 21 goals in a club record 195 Football League games and was appointed Yeovil's manager in February 2009, his testimonial season, becoming assistant-boss on Gary Roberts' return to Huish Park in January 2012.

CHRIS WEALE

England Semi-Pro goalkeeper Chris Weale was an important figure in Yeovil Town's 2004-05 League Two title triumph. He progressed through the ranks made his debut in Yeovil's 2-1 win over Boston United in February 2001. Starring in their 2002 FA Trophy final success, he



also featured as the Grovers won the Conference title in 2002-03 and was selected for the PFA Third Division team in 2003-04. He helped Yeovil win at Rotherham in the 2004-05 FA Cup third round and reunited with Gary Johnson at Bristol City in July 2006. Moving to Leicester City in July 2009, he has since played for Shrewsbury, Yeovil again, Derby and Dorchester Town

GAVIN WILLIAMS

Midfielder Gavin Williams was top scorer and 'Player of the Year' as Yeovil Town narrowly failed to qualify

for the Third Division play-offs in 2003-04. He turned professional with Hereford United in August 1998 and helped take top-flight Leicester City to an FA Cup third round replay in 1999-2000. He moved to Yeovil for £20,000 in May 2002, featuring in the 2002-03 Conference title and 2004-05 League Two title triumphs. Sold to West Ham for £250,000 in December 2004, the Welsh international appeared for Ipswich Town, both Bristol clubs and Yeovil again, helping reach the Championship in 2012-13, becoming Merthyr Tydfil's player-coach.

DARREN WAY

England Semi-Pro midfielder Darren Way was 'Player of the Year' in Yeovil Town's 2004-05 League Two title triumph. A former Norwich City trainee, he turned professional in September 1998 and moved to Huish Park in August 2000. He was an important figure as Yeovil won the FA Trophy in 2002, Conference title in 2002-03 and League Two title in 2004-05. Sold to Swansea City for £150,000 in January 2006, he rejoined the Grovers for £50,000 in July 2008 after a loan spell, netting 16 goals in 121 League games overall before a car crash ended his career in February 2010. He joined Yeovil's coaching staff, becoming manager in December 2015.

STEVE MILDENHALL

Goalkeeper Steve Mildenhall was ever-present 'Player of the Year' as Yeovil Town reached the League One play-off final in 2006-07. Initially with Swindon Town, he joined Notts County for £150,000 in July 2001 and had a spell with Oldham Athletic before moving to Grimsby Town in July 2005. He was ever-present in 2005-06 and joined Yeovil in July

2006. Deputising as captain when Terry Skiverton was unavailable, he made 75 League appearances while at Huish Park. He moved to Southend United in August 2008 and has since played for Millwall, Scunthorpe United on loan and Bristol Rovers where he was ever-present in 2013-14.




STEVEN CAULKER

England Youth central defender Steven Caulker was Yeovil Town's 'Player of the Year' in 2009-10. Signing professional for Tottenham Hotspur in July 2009, he was promptly loaned to Yeovil and became the Grovers' youngest-ever League player at 17 years 222 days old in their 2-0 win at home to Tranmere on the opening day of the season. He made 44 League One appearances while at Huish Park. Loaned to Bristol City in 2010-11 and Swansea City in 2011-12, he represented Team GB in the 2012 Olympic Games. The England international joined Cardiff for £8m in July 2013, since playing for QPR and on loan at Southampton and Liverpool.

JACK SENIOR




A 2016 summer transfer deadline day signing from Huddersfield Town, the left-back's EFL debut

Irish defender who joined the Hatters on loan from Bradford City in January 2016,




ANDREW SHINNIE


ISAAC VASSELL


WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS!

PART ONE

In the summer of 1967, a 15-year-old Luton schoolboy decided to keep a comprehensive scrapbook of the forthcoming Division Four (now League Two) campaign.

It is easy to say now that he knew this was about to become one of the most glorious seasons in the club's history, but looking back it was merely the labours of a boy with too much time on his hands in the days before the internet, social media and mobile phones (or normal phones in his case).

Step back 50 years and let the boy who grew into club historian ROGER WASH remind us of the highs and lows of that ultimately successful 1967/68 season...



The Town were relegated from the top-flight in 1960 and five years later were tasting life in the football basement. Although we almost gained immediate promotion in 1965/66, the next campaign was looked on as a disaster with a finish only four points off the re-election places.

It could have been a lot worse though, because if ex-player Allan Brown had not taken on the managerial hot-seat in November 1966 and made a few astute sorties in the transfer market, we could easily have needed to suffer the ignominy of going cap in hand begging for re-election.

Brown had a major clearout over the summer of 1967, with David Pleat probably the most notable name leaving, and lost no time in recruiting the sort of player he believed would bring the glory days back to Kenilworth Road.

Aided by a cash injection, courtesy of soon to be directors Tony Hunt and Reggie Burr, £12,000 – a lot of money

for the club at the time – was paid for midfielder Billy McDerment from Leicester, while the veteran of several promotions at Northampton, centre-half Terry Branston, was signed on a free transfer and was immediately made captain. I remember being thrilled at this big money capture as he had actually played 23 games for the Foxes in the top-flight.

DIMINUTIVE

Big centre-forward Rodney Green came in from Charlton for £7,000, while diminutive inside forward Micky Brown was signed on a free from Millwall. Tough full-back Tommy Hare, who had played 13 times for Southampton, increased the Scottish quota where he joined Max Dougan, Fred Jardine and John Moore, who were already at Kenilworth Road, as well as McDerment, in what was called the 'White Heather Club'. 

HARD TRAINING BEGINS

PLAYERS RECEIVED THEIR KIT YESTERDAY

Town trying to sign a big centre-forward

TRAINING begins for the Town players on Monday and when manager Allan Brown says "training" he means just that.

In the past the drill has been to spend most of the first day kitting out the players, but so that a flying start can be made to the hard work on Monday, the manager called on the players to report yesterday, when the training kit was issued.

"WE haven't a lot of time before the first friendly match against Watford in a fortnight and we shall get stuck into

hard work straightaway," manager told me.

Together with the new trainer-coach, Dennis Evans, he has mapped out an ambitious schedule which includes lapping work with the medicine ball, circuit training and ball practice, while the afternoons will be mostly concerned with games like handball.

Wing-half, John Moore, has still not signed a new contract, even though he has been offered increased wages, but the manager is confident that he will sign soon.

Is trying to sign a centre-forward

ALAN SLOUGH, who had a cartilage operation at the end of last season, is in full training and is expected to be fit for the opening League match.

In fact the situation seems to be that there will be competition for places in defence and if the manager gets his way in the attack, too.

Yesterday, he was trying to negotiate the transfer of a centre-forward of the big strong type which he feels is necessary to bring added drive and punch to the front line.

A fee is involved and if this proves at all reasonable, the Town will go ahead.

If this deal comes off and a forward of the utility type can also be signed, then the manager will feel that he has adequate cover for all positions.

Sassenachs on the books were Keith Allen, who had already become a terrace favourite since he was brought in from Stockport the previous March, mercurial winger Graham French, goalkeeper turned forward then goalkeeper again, Tony Read, and tiny winger Ray Whittaker.

On top of this we also had two local youngsters Alan Slough and Bruce Rioch, who were hoping to make a name for themselves. The new scrapbook was now in overdrive.

Five of the new signings made their debuts at home to Watford in the first of the pre-season friendlies on 5th August. An interested crowd of 5,360 turned up to cast their eyes over the new intake and watch 'Television personality' Zena Skinner kick off the new season.

The Town were already suffering injury problems even before a ball had been kicked in anger with both Dougan and French missing from the Luton line-up and, typical of a local derby between Luton and Watford, no quarter was given leading to both trainers needing to come on to the pitch at regular intervals.

The Town made most of the early running but the Hornets took the lead against the run of play through Stuart Scullion on 25 minutes. The score was level seven minutes later, however, when Allen swept home a perfect pass from Rioch.

Watford made three substitutions at the interval but it was the Hatters who looked the more likely side to secure the win.

The final score remained 1-1 and was regarded as a good start against higher division opponents.

The following Wednesday saw another higher division opponent, with Colchester the visitors to Kenilworth Road. This time 3,593 were present to see another hard tackling game, with the Town perhaps serving notice to Division Four that they were not likely to be pushovers in the coming campaign by putting on a magnificent display.

Two goals from Green only told half the story as shots from Whittaker and Rioch crashed against the woodwork, and only good work from Colchester's goalkeeper Alan Buck prevented a landslide.

The final pre-season game took the Town to Brentwood to take on a side newly-elected to the Southern League. A sparse crowd of 1,200 saw the Town dominate proceedings from the start, and goals from Green and Whittaker produced a comfortable interval lead. The Hatters coasted through the second period, conserving energy ready for the season's opener at Wrexham in a week's time.

Here at the Community Trust they just merge into one as the summer months mark our busiest time of year!

HATTERS CUP YOUTH TOURNAMENT MAY 2017

At the end of each season, the Club always extend the season by donating the Stadium to the Community Trust for three days in May during which over 1,800 boys, girls and adults enjoy the experience of a lifetime by stepping onto the hallowed 'Kenny turf'.

So well done Dickie and Rog again for giving us a fantastic pitch in no time at all and thanks for letting us 'batter' it before you dig it up each year at the end of May!

So how do you get 1,800 people playing football on the pitch in three days? Well, 1,500 are the boys and girls who take part in the annual Hatters Cup competition this year sponsored by Thurlow Nunn Vauxhall dealership.

In its ninth year, the Hatters Cup is now established as the largest stadium youth football tournament in the south of

England, and is in fact six separate tournaments ranging from U6s to U12s played over two days – we start early and finish late!

I'm sure there are lots of you reading this who have been involved in committees at grass-roots level and have organised tournaments, so you will know how much work goes into the event before it takes place. To give you an idea how popular this tournament is we have already had several enquiries for next May, which is great and the tournament is always full by January – but we are not quite ready to start on 2018 yet as we work out with the Club our end of season dates and possible Wembley play-offs etc.

The Hatters Cup involves all of the Community Trust staff who run the tournament, man the car parks and turnstiles, as well as catering who run the food outlets and

WITH SIMON PITTS iFOLLOW COMMENTATOR
