FEATURE INTERVIEW

JAYDEN STOCKLEY

TIME TO GET DOWN
TO BUSINESS

AFTER AN IMPRESSIVE START TO HIS EXETER CITY CAREER DURING THE SECOND HALF OF THE 2015/16 SEASON, JAYDEN STOCKLEY IS BACK IN DEVON AND LOOKING FOR SUCCESS.

The 24-year-old spent last season with Scottish side Aberdeen, and after learning a great deal whilst with SPL side, which included appearing in the Europa League, he is back in England looking to build a successful career with the Grecians.

After netting 10 goals in 21 matches for the Grecians during his loan spell from Bournemouth, Jayden was quick to reopen his account with City when he scored a last-minute winner against Barnet in September, and turned out a notably impressive performance in his last match at St James Park as he found himself on the scoresheet twice against Morecambe in a 4-1 win.

BEN STRANGE sat down with the City forward, who signed on transfer deadline day in August, to talk about his time north of the border, how pleased he is to be back at Exeter City and his aspirations for this campaign.

THE GRECIAN: Jayden, how are you settling back into life at Exeter City?

JAYDEN: It's been good, I'm all settled in now. It's time to get down to business and do the talking on the pitch. It's been an easy transition for my family to come down here, and I'm enjoying it. Hopefully that can transpire onto the pitch.

THE GRECIAN: And how are you settling into the area, are there any places that you like to visit whilst not playing football?

JAYDEN: I haven't been out too much locally, but I go to Bournemouth quite a lot because it's not too far and it's nice to be around family. It's good to have the option to go back, obviously. I've got a little girl so it's nice that she can have a relationship with her grandparents again, now that I'm not nine hours away. It's been a real positive.

THE GRECIAN: How would you reflect on your time at Aberdeen, with the chance to play European football?


JAYDEN: Yes, I enjoyed it. I played in some really big games and experienced a lot of things that I wouldn't have if I'd have stayed in England. I had a good time up there, but it's the right time for me to come down and get some stability and look to my next challenge. Once you experience different styles of play I think that should improve any footballer, no matter how you do. It's something I've come away from stronger.

THE GRECIAN: What differences can you detect now from when you were here on loan in the 2015/16 season?

JAYDEN: There's a lot more competition for places now. The squad is a lot thicker and there's so much quality about the place. We've got the 3G pitch to train on now so we don't have to get taxis or minibuses to train elsewhere. The setup has become a lot more professional and the staff here play a really big role in that.

THE GRECIAN: You mentioned competition for places, how was it coming off the bench for your first few games?

JAYDEN: Yes, it was fine. You've got to take your moment when you get it. I've had a few appearances off the bench, and I'm trying to build my own fitness and sharpness to get back into the swing of things.

THE GRECIAN: Do you enjoy playing with a strike partner?

JAYDEN: Well, last time I was here I played a lot on my own with Ollie Watkins just off me, but I like playing in a partnership as well. When you've got players like Reuben Reid, Liam McAlinden and Matt Jay, you've got strikers there who like to link up and you can't not play when you've got quality like that. It's all about relationships, Tis and the staff here work on that every day and it's something that does take time, and it will no doubt click.

THE GRECIAN: Your first goal back at the club came in exciting circumstances as City secured a late 2-1 win over Barnet, can you talk us through that and how did it feel?

JAYDEN: It was great. I was desperate to contribute to the flying start that the team had made, and to score the winner in the last minute is a great feeling no matter how scrappy the goal was! It was a game where we would probably have taken a point going into the last period of the game, but I think it just sums up the spirit of the squad.

THE GRECIAN: The last home defeat, a 3-0 loss to Notts County, was the only negative at SJP so far, this season. What were your thoughts coming out of that match?

JAYDEN: There were two key penalty incidents at such key moments in the match. It was disappointing that they didn't go our way because they looked obvious to me. We were chasing the game so we were always going to leave ourselves open, but when you concede so early in the game, the game plan can sometimes go out of the window. In the first half I felt we were very good value, but it was the manner of the goals that we conceded that we weren't happy with. It wasn't a typical 3-0 game.



THE GRECIAN: You have mentioned before that Tis was a major factor in you wanting to come back to the club, what is your relationship like with him and how has he helped you?

JAYDEN: He is very professional and an honest manager. You want a manager, who is honest with you and will tell you what you need to work on. As a player, you can't be offended when someone tells you what you need to improve on, it should strive you on. He is someone who, first and foremost, wants to improve you which is sometimes what can be neglected at other clubs who don't try and build on the qualities that you've got or the weaknesses that you may have.

THE GRECIAN: What was it like coming back into the dressing room here at City?

JAYDEN: It was a good laugh and it's nice to feel a part of it and recognise some familiar faces. I've been around quite a bit over the course of my career and I seem to know somebody wherever I am. I kept good contact with Ryan Harley whilst I was away, as well as Troy Brown. Now, me, Liam McAlinden, Matt Jay, Jake Taylor and Pierce Sweeney like going for a coffee and playing cards.

THE GRECIAN: It must be pleasing to receive such a warm welcome back from the City fans?

JAYDEN: The fans are always great. It's up to me now to show them what I can do, just because I was good here last time, it doesn't mean it's going to be easy and I can expect it to happen again. I'm desperate to do well and to put on the Exeter shirt and establish myself as a very good player here.

THE GRECIAN: Are you the sort of player that will set themselves an individual goal target that you'd like to hit by the end of the season?

Professional match?

It was coming off the bench against Northampton in a cup competition for Bournemouth. I should have been sent off, I was booked, but I think the referee went easy on me.

Professional goal you scored?

For Bournemouth, I scored two whilst coming off the bench. It was against Hereford, it was a great feeling.

Memory of Exeter City fans?

It was at Leyton Orient away. My first game was Morecambe away, but there was only a few brave souls there that night, but I remember the match against Leyton Orient, the fans turned up and it was a good atmosphere there.

...BEST

Performance you've been involved in?

Personally, the match away at Leyton Orient when I got a brace, I think we were unbelievable that day as everything seemed to come off.

Player you played with?

That's a tough one, maybe Ian Harte for his technical ability. I've never

seen anything like it, it's the same with Matt Richie, they both had wands for left feet,

Piece of footballing advice given to you?

I'm not sure. To be honest, I am quite self-motivated. I'm not a nutter off the pitch or anything like that, I've just got my head down and listen to what everyone says.

...WORST

Defeat you've been involved in?

I've lost 7-0 once in the Conference away at Hyde. I'd won 7-0 the week before so I thought, yes this is pretty bad.

Away trip you've been on?

It was only in Portsmouth! But we had to move hotels at four o'clock in the morning because the fire alarm went off.

Footballing moment?

I'd have to say getting sent off in the Europa League last year. I was given two yellow cards which were so soft and it makes you so angry, but that's football and you can't do anything about it. That was such a bad moment for me.


It all came together like a dream. And yet it really happened, kids. You know I'd never lie to you. It was the perfect afternoon. The best I've ever been playing FIFA 18.



Tony Morris was born in Heavitree and educated at Ladysmith, Whipton Infants, Summerway, Pinhoe Primary and Exeter School. He became a regular Big Banker in 1955. Though exiled since 1963 as a writer for numerous publications (Racing Journalist of the Year in 1990), he is still City-mad. Proud father and grandfather of staunch City fans. Here are his latest thoughts ON football and the Grecians.



A FEW MONTHS AGO, OUT OF SHEER CURIOSITY, I SENT OFF A SAMPLE OF MY SALIVA TO ONE OF THOSE OUTFITS WHO CONDUCT AN ANALYSIS OF THE DNA AND PROVIDE A REPORT ON ONE'S ORIGINS.

I thought I had a pretty good idea of who I was, but I knew there was an element of mystery about some branches of my family tree, so I wondered whether the test might yield some information that would help me to plug the gaps.

My own researches had confirmed a load of Englishness in most areas of the pedigree, but my maternal grandfather was Scottish, and apparently came from a long line of Scots, dating back to the early 1800s. My saliva test would surely establish that I was predominantly Anglo-Scottish.

And I could rejoice over the fine efforts by Sweden, Denmark and Norway, whom I can now recognise as the lands of my fathers.

I wasted my money, sending off for that test. Because I actually know full well who I am. I'm a Devonian, and proud of it. Better yet, I'm an Exonian, and proud of the chaps who represent our club.

TO TELL YOU THE TRUTH I WASN'T TOO ENTHRALLED BY THE NEW ABBA PENALTY SYSTEM WHICH SETTLED LAST WEEK'S PENALTY SHOOTOUT BETWEEN PLYMOUTH ARGYLE AND EXETER CITY.

That is a bit ironic as regular readers of this column will recall I actually suggested the change a few years ago.

I think the new system is fairer in that statistics alone proved what was always obvious - that the team going first would hold the advantage in the latter stages of the shootout.

However, the two I have seen at first hand never reached that sudden death scenario and ultimately were settled by two successive Argyle penalties. I must admit I felt it was a bit of a damp squib.

Argyle made just the one change for that match, City eight and I do wonder whether the Grecians were perhaps looking at the long game. While Argyle were losing at home to Fleetwood on the following Saturday the Grecians were winning at Carlisle to go back to the top of League Two and increase City hopes that the two Devon rivals could be heading in opposite directions next summer.

Of course, what happens to the Pilgrims will be of no concern to City - they can only worry about themselves.

Before the start of the season I felt there were three teams which the Grecians had to finish above and this evening's visitors Luton was one of them (for the record Mansfield and Lincoln were the other two).

I know that it's not something that managers tend to worry too much about but the fans will probably be aware that historically City don't measure up too well against the Hatters who have a better than 50 per cent head to head record against City, whose last win over them here was more than 50 years ago and who have won only two of their last 14 meetings. Records, though, are there to be broken.

Finally, welcome back to St James Park, Jack Stacey, whose last kick of a football here was that goal against Carlisle six months ago.

Enjoy the game.



Jazz Hervin then came close to making it 2-0, with a free-kick that was tipped onto the crossbar, before Toogood sent a header just over the top from a corner.









STADIUM

ONE CALL STADIUM (NG18 5DA)



The One Call Stadium is the home of Mansfield Town and has been since 1861, making it the oldest ground in the Football League. However, some reports date it back to 1850. It has a capacity of 10,000 when fully open but due to safety restrictions, it holds 9,186. Its original name is Field Mill but it is called One Call Stadium due to sponsorship reasons. It is a mix of seated and terracing.

GRECIAN TRAVEL

BY ROAD

To get to the One Call Stadium, follow the M5 and the M42 to A42 in Leicestershire. Continue onto the A42 then follow signs for Nottingham and merge onto the M1. Follow the M1 to Nottinghamshire and then take exit 27 from the M1. Continue on Mansfield road/A608. Take Derby road/A611, Coxmoor road/B6139 and Hamilton road to Quarry Lane in Mansfield. The stadium will be on the left. This drive should take approximately four hours.

BY RAIL

The journey from Exeter St Davids to Mansfield station should take just over five hours and requires two changes.

The train from Exeter St Davids will take you to Birmingham New Street which will take about two and a half hours. Then, the train from Birmingham new street will take you to Nottingham which will take around one hour and 10 minutes. Finally, the train from Nottingham will take you to Mansfield station which will take about half an hour. From the station, there is a 10 minute walk in which you walk along Portland street then turn right onto Quarry lane. The stadium will be on your right.

PARKING

There is some parking at the ground which costs £5. There is also the station car park which costs £3 for four hours. Otherwise, street parking is the only other option. Highfield Way, just past the ground on Quarry Lane, a good choice if you arrive early enough to find a space.

TICKETS

Tickets are now on sale, via Exeter City, through the normal channels. The match is not all-ticket, meaning fans can purchase on the day of the game. However, there will be a £2 increase for fans who choose to do that.

Ticket prices are as follows:

Adults: £20

Concessions (over 60s): £16

Young adult (age 18-21): £15

Junior (age 7-17): £12

Six-and-under: Free

Young adults (18-21) are expected to provide ID when buying the tickets, and when they enter the stadium.

PUBS/FOOD

There is a pub at the ground called the Sandy Pate, underneath the Ian Greaves stand, that welcomes away fans and is free to enter. There is the Talbot pub on Nottingham Road near to the Sainsbury's supermarket. However, this is predominately for home fans and away fans are only usually welcomed in family groups that are there for a meal. Opposite to the Talbot is the Il Rosso which is an upmarket wine bar but a little on the pricey side. It also serves a good selection of beers and lagers on big screen TV. Near the railway station, there is a hotel called the Midland Hotel on station road. The beer is reasonably priced and welcomes away fans, also just a 10 minute walk away from the ground. On top of drinks, it includes a restaurant that serves food.

TOTAL DISTANCE

The distance between St James Park and the One Call Stadium is 224 miles, taking a little over four hours to drive.



FIRST, BEST AND WORST

...with Lee Roberts

Lee Roberts first arrived at St James Park as a youngster on loan from Shrewsbury Town in March 1977 and made his debut against Crewe Alexandra. September that year saw the forward turn his move into a permanent one as the Grecians paid £8,000 for his services. Lee turned himself into a fans' favourite at the club and he netted in the famous FA Cup tie against Newcastle United in the fifth round where his goal helped earn a replay against the Magpies. **BEN STRANGE** caught up with the former Grecian as Roberts recalled some of his first, best and worst moments during his time at the club.



FIRST...

Day at Exeter City?

Well, I remember travelling down on the train and meeting Bobby Saxton at St David's station then going into a hotel. There I signed to go on loan for a couple of months from Shrewsbury Town, I was very excited. I then played my first match against Crewe Alexandra where I thought: 'oh my god, what have I come to.' I started on the bench, our goalkeeper broke his ankle so one of the lads that also came on loan with me at the time, called Geoff Gay, ended up going in goal. Bobby Saxton, who was the manager and

player, ended up getting sent-off and I'm sat there thinking: 'what the hell is going on here!' It was ironic because I was signed as a centre forward but Saxton was after a centre-half and because Saxton was sent from the field, I was then thrown onto the pitch as a central defender!

Goal for Exeter City?

That's a tough one, I only remember one goal and that was against Newcastle United. Pete Rogers got a rollicking two seconds beforehand because he should of shot. He was

then taking a throw-in and it came to me bouncing, inside the box, and all I was trying to do was help it on to the back post, but fortunately for me I shinned it a bit and it flew into the top corner!

Memories of St James Park?

I'll always remember the Old Grandstand, which is coming down. It's sad but I understand that it has to happen for the club to progress. I remember the narrow tunnel and I always called it 'the gateway to heaven' because it has the iron bars on the side as you walk out. There's lots of good memories.

BEST...

Match for City?

I enjoyed playing against Wolverhampton Wanderers where I played up front with Harry Holman. We played them in the FA Cup and went 1-0 up, I think Harry had scored. They equalised with a free-kick, and obviously, Wolves were a bigger and better side then. I then scored to make it 2-1 and they went and scored in the last second

of the game with a cracking goal. Their fans went mad and invaded the pitch, knocking all the signs down. Somebody had said that was the fastest they'd ever seen me run, as everyone ran on the pitch, because I was trying to get off it!

Piece of advice given?

That's tough, I've had a few. Richie Barker, who was the coach at Shrewsbury, that I didn't really appreciate when I was there. I was a young man and I thought he was a bit of a taskmaster but it dawned on me when I left that, everything he told me to do, all the bits of advice, I did when I was at Exeter in the games and the pointers used to help me a lot.

Player you played with?

Tony Kellow is my hero! Always has been and always will be. I named my daughter after him, obviously, she's called Toni, not Kellow! But there were loads of other good players like Steve Neville and John Sims, I could go on forever. Even lads that couldn't get in the team that regularly, there was one called Tony Mitchell who was a defender, and he was the one that Kells (Tony Kellow) used to hate playing against because he was like a leech, he was everywhere. Even though he didn't play too often, he was still a cracking player.

WORST...

Result?

I often think about this one, against Watford. We were away from home and it was when they were a really strong team under Graham Taylor. We got absolutely hammered there, I think it was 4-0 or something like that but it could have been 24! It was constant attack, attack, attack. Obviously, we were gutted we lost because we were trying but they were just too good.

Away trip?

I used to love going everywhere but there's one trip to Carlisle which I will always remember! A lad called Andy Bell, who was making his debut, overslept and the game had been called off. We went to go and watch West Bromwich Albion play instead. We were all on the bus coming back down and we suddenly realised that Andy wasn't on the bus, he'd had a lie in thinking he'd have more time before he had to get up. He ended up getting a taxi to a service station and meeting us there.

Injury?

I damaged my knee which finished my career. It was a tackle at Wrexham from one of their strikers who bust my knee, I was advised to stop playing.



Sitting in third place at the time of writing, Luton Town have enjoyed a sterling start to the season, taking a solid 21 points from their opening 11 games.

They began their campaign in emphatic fashion, sticking eight past Yeovil Town at home, with front man James Collins netting a hat-trick.

Defeats to Ipswich Town and Barnet aside, they maintained their good form throughout August, beating Tottenham Hotspur on penalties in the Checktrade.com Trophy, whilst also sealing a 3-0 victory at home to Colchester

United. However, as September rolled around, the Hatters suffered their first setbacks, battling to a home draw against League Two new boys Lincoln City before falling to a 3-0 defeat at home to Swindon Town a week later.

Despite this, they continued to fight, and soon saw results turn their way, beginning with a 2-0 victory over Port Vale at Kenilworth Road. The following week, they made the short trip to Adams Park to take on Wycombe Wanderers in one of the most entertaining games of the season thus far. With Luton 1-0 down, skipper Scott Cuthbert and James Collins scored goals deep into injury time, to hand the visitors a 2-1 win.

Since then, Luton have been able to keep their unbeaten streak intact, recording impressive home wins against Chesterfield and Newport County alongside a hard-fought 0-0 draw away at Morecambe.

Bio: Jones began his career in his native Wales, before moving to Luton Town in 1995. Having left Kenilworth Road without making an appearance, he moved to Spain before joining Southend United in 1997. Whilst there, he enjoyed a loan spell at Exeter City, making nine appearances and scoring one goal.

In 2000, he moved on to Brighton & Hove Albion, with whom he won the old Division Three title, before finishing his career with Yeovil Town, captaining the Glovers in their 2007 League One play-off final defeat. After coaching spells at Yeovil and Brighton, he agreed terms with the Hatters in March 2016. He enjoyed an impressive first full season in the hot-seat, guiding Luton to a fourth placed finish, and with it, the League Two play-offs.

Nathan Jones on...

... Newport County: "I'm thoroughly delighted with the result, first and foremost. The performance I thought was excellent, especially first half where I thought we were really on the front foot, and had a great cutting edge about us, and I think we saw the game out very well."

... Promotion chances: "They say leagues take shape after 15 games so we know where we are, but a lot of people are in good form and a lot of people are winning games. All we can do is worry about ourselves and keep winning the games that we have."

... Squad depth: "We want to stay at the level for a minimum of 46 games, and obviously you have got cup matches as well. You need a strong squad and praise the lord we have, because the seven we have got out we have got some real, real quality in there and some big players – they would be that for any side at this level."

ONES TO WATCH

6 Defender
Scott Cuthbert (Age 30)

The Hatters' current skipper, Cuthbert came up through the ranks at Scottish giants Celtic, captaining both the under-19 and reserve teams. Equally comfortable in the centre or on the right of the defence, Cuthbert moved south of the border in 2009, joining Swindon Town. After a difficult start, he quickly cemented his place in the side, helping the Robins to reach the 2009/10 League One Play-Off Final, which they lost narrowly to Millwall. After a further season at the County Ground, Cuthbert signed for Leyton Orient. Once again, the move was an immediate success, with Cuthbert winning the club's player of the year award at the end of his first season. A key player, he was instrumental in the O's 2013/14 campaign, which saw them miss out on promotion by the skin of their teeth. He signed for Luton Town in May 2015, and was central in last season's play-off run, making 38 appearances.



17 Midfielder
Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu (Age 23)

An irrepresible force at the heart of midfield, Mpanzu came through Borham Wood's youth system, making 11 senior appearances before signing for West Ham United in 2011. He made his Hammers debut away at Burnley in the 2013 League Cup. An extraordinarily versatile player who can also operate as a centre back, on the wing and even as a centre forward, he signed a permanent deal with Luton Town in January 2014, off the back of a successful loan spell. The move proved to be an immediate success, with Mpanzu playing a key role as the Hatters stormed to the Conference Premier Title, gaining entry into League Two. During his early years at Kenilworth Road, he struggled with a number of injuries, however, it would appear that his troubles are now behind him. A fan favourite, he made his 100th appearance for the Hatters during the last campaign.



7 Defender/Midfielder
Jack Stacey (Age 21)

Well known around St James Park, Stacey came up through the ranks at Reading, joining their academy at the tender age of eight. Having signed a professional deal in December 2013, he made his first team debut off the bench the following August against Ipswich Town. He then enjoyed temporary spells with Barnet and Carlisle, before arriving at Exeter City on an initial six-month loan deal last August. He instantly found a home on the right-hand side of defence and enjoyed a stunning season, during which he made 38 appearances. Arguably his finest moment for the Grecians came during last season's play-off semis, where he hit a last-gasp rocket to help City push past his former club Carlisle 6-5 on aggregate. Having started in the 2-1 Play-Off Final defeat against Blackpool, Stacey decided to seek a permanent move elsewhere, joining Luton in June. He netted his first goal for the Hatters last month, with a lung-busting solo-effort against Port Vale.



9 Striker
Danny Hylton (Age 28)

A verifiable goal machine, Hylton began his career at Aldershot Town. Having joined their academy in 2005, aged 16, he made the leap into senior football the following season. After settling in, he played an important role as the Shots won both the 2007/08 Conference Premier Division and the Conference League Cup. After brief spells with Rotherham United, Bury and AFC Wimbledon, Hylton joined Oxford United during the summer of 2014. He made an immediate impact, topping United's scoring charts with 16 goals. Having helped the U's to automatic promotion the following season, he joined Luton Town in May 2016. He enjoyed a dream first season at Kenilworth Road, netting 27 goals to earn himself a spot in the PFA's League Two Team of the Year as well as four accolades at the club's end of season awards. He has begun the season in a similarly prolific vein, netting four goals in just nine appearances.



1 Goalkeeper
Marek Štěch (Age 27)

Capped once by the Czech Republic, Štěch began his career at Sparta Prague, moving on to West Ham United in 2006. However, finding it hard to break into their first team, he enjoyed several loan spells before moving to Yeovil in 2012. He quickly became a club legend, being named man of the match in the Play-Off Final as the Glovers gained promotion to the Championship. He signed for Luton Town during the summer, saving a penalty on debut against his former employers.



5 Defender
John Mullins (Age 31)

A solid centre back, Mullins came up through the ranks at Reading, where he captained the reserves. After two loan spells at Kidderminster Harriers, he spent time with Mansfield Town and Stockport County before signing for Rotherham United in 2010. A key player, he helped the Millers to gain promotion into League One before moving to Oxford United. He spent three seasons at the Kassam, helping the Us gain promotion in his last season before joining his teammate Danny Hylton at Kenilworth Road in 2016.



2 Defender
James Justin (Age 19)

A current England under-20 international, Justin arrived at the Hatters' academy aged seven. A talented youth player, he was a key member of Luton's all-conquering under-18 side that won the 2015/16 Youth Alliance South East Division and the Youth Alliance Cup, reaching the FA Youth Cup quarterfinals along the way. After an impressive season last time out, during which he made 39 senior appearances, Justin was named Luton's Youth Player of the Year for 2016/17.



16 Defender
Glen Rea (Age 23)

A versatile young talent, comfortable at centre back or holding midfielder, Rea came through the academy of his local club, Brighton and Hove Albion. A former Republic of Ireland youth international, he was sent out on loan spells to Southend United and Luton. He signed permanently for the Hatters at the end of the season and became a fixture in the starting line up, making 49 appearances during his first full campaign.



3 Defender
Dan Potts (Age 23)

A strong left back, who is famed for his aerial ability, Potts began his career with West Ham, joining their academy aged nine. He would go on to make 13 appearances for the Hammers, also spending time on loan with Colchester United and Portsmouth before signing for the Hatters in 2015. An experienced youth international, he has represented England at under-18, 19 and 20 levels, alongside a solitary appearance for the USA under-20's team in 2011.

Alan Sheehan (Age 31)


An attacking left back, Sheehan began his career with Leicester City, making his debut in May 2005 against Plymouth Argyle. Since then, he has played for a plethora of English clubs, including Leeds United, Notts County and Bradford City. Somewhat of a dead ball specialist, he netted three stunning free kicks last season, all of which were nominated for the club's goal of the season award.

Having arrived during the summer, he has enjoyed an impressive start to life at Kenilworth Road, winning August's League Two goal of the month award for a stunning volley against Yeovil Town.

Andrew Shinnie
(Age 28)

One of the squad's most experienced members, Shinnie began his career with Scottish titans Rangers. He moved on to Inverness Caledonian Thistle in 2011, where he enjoyed a spectacular 2012/13, making the four-man shortlist for the SPFA's Players' player of the year, whilst also making the SPL's Team of the Season. He signed for Birmingham City in 2013, but has spent much of his time on loan, winning the Scottish Championship with Hibernian last time out.



18 Midfielder
Luke Berry
(Age 25)

A box-to-box midfielder with an eye for goal, he started out at Cambridge United, winning the 2013/14 FA Trophy. He was also the U's top goal scorer in both the 2011/12 and 2013/14 seasons, helping the club back into the Football League during the latter campaign. After a short stint with Barnsley, he moved back to the Abbey, surpassing himself with a stellar 2016/17, in which he notched an astonishing 22 goals from midfield. He made the move to Luton in late August.



22 Midfielder
Luke Gambin
(Age 24)

Capped 11 times by Malta, Gambin began his career in North London with Barnet. A skilful winger, he spent five seasons with the Bees, making 26 appearances as they stormed to the 2014/15 Conference Premier Division title. He spent a further season and a half at the Hive Stadium before signing for Luton Town in January of last year.



8 Midfielder
Olly Lee
(Age 26)

The son of former England international, Rob Lee, he began his career on the books at West Ham United. He made his professional debut at St James Park in 2011, during a loan spell with Dagenham & Redbridge, with Exeter running out 2-1 winners on the day. Since leaving the Hammers he has enjoyed spells with Gillingham, Barnet, Birmingham City and Plymouth Argyle. He signed for Luton Town in August 2015, and has over ninety appearances to his name.



10 Midfielder
Jordan Cook
(Age 27)

Cook began his career in the Premier League with Sunderland, making his first senior appearance for them away at Old Trafford in 2010. Having experienced a series of loan spells, he signed for Charlton Athletic in 2012, spending a couple of seasons at the Valley before moving onto Walsall. He enjoyed two successful seasons with the Saddlers, reaching the final of the Check-a-Trade Trophy and the League One Play-Off Final in consecutive years. He arrived at Kenilworth Road in July 2016.



24 Midfielder
Lawson D'Ath
(Age 24)

A spritely midfielder, D'Ath began his career with Reading. Whilst at the Royals, he was loaned out a number of times, including an eight game spell at St James Park. Arriving in March 2013, he scored on his debut, netting a header during a 4-1 win over Bradford City. He left the Madjeski in 2014, signing for Northampton Town, with whom he won the League Two title in 2015/16. He arrived at Kenilworth Road in January 2017.



14 Forward
Harry Cornick
(Age 22)

Capable of playing through the middle or out on the flanks, Cornick began his career with Christchurch before being snapped up by Bournemouth in 2013. However, he was loaned out a number of times, making his first entrance into the Football League during a spell with Yeovil, where he scored with his first touch during a 3-2 defeat away at Exeter. Having spent some time with Gillingham during the last campaign, he agreed terms with Luton Town over the summer.



19 Forward
James Collins
(Age 26)

Prolific in the fourth tier, Collins began his career with Aston Villa. He has spent time with a number of Football League clubs, finishing as a runner up in League Two with Shrewsbury Town on two occasions, whilst also winning the division with Northampton Town in 2015/16. He arrived at Kenilworth Road during the summer and has hit the ground running, notching seven goals in just 12 league starts, including a stunning hat trick on debut against Yeovil Town.



38 Forward
Elliot Lee
(Age 22)

Younger brother of Olly, Lee came up through the ranks at West Ham, making his senior bow away at Old Trafford in January 2013. After a series of loan spells, to Colchester United, Luton Town and Blackpool amongst others, Lee moved to Barnsley, spending a solitary season at Oakwell before re-joining Luton on a permanent basis. He netted his first goal for the Hatters during the win against Yeovil in August.



BACK TO THE FUTURE

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS traces what happened to four of Luton Town's greatest post-war teams



1959 FA CUP FINALISTS

RON BAYNHAM: England international goalkeeper who made 388 league appearances until injury ended his playing career in May 1965. He later worked as an interior decorator and now lives in Silsoe.



BRENDAN McNALLY: Eire international right-back who joined Cambridge City in July 1963, then Dunstable. He managed Chesham and Dunstable, then worked for Zenith Windows and died in July 2011.

KEN HAWKES: Left-back who moved to Peterborough in June 1961, then played for Bedford and St Neots. He spent 28 years as a sales rep for a wholesale food company and died in February 2015.

JOHN GROVES: Netted 16 goals in 218 league games, moving to Bournemouth in September 1963. Settling back in Derby, he spent 30 years working for Courtaulds and died in June 2017.

SYD OWEN: England international who became manager. Later, Leeds United's coach until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

DAVE PACEY: England under-23 left-half who netted 16 goals in 246 league games, moving to Kettering in July 1965. Employed by Electrolux, he settled in Newport Pagnell and died in September 2016.

BILLY BINGHAM: Northern Ireland international winger who joined Everton in October 1960, then played for Port Vale. He managed Southport, Plymouth, Everton, Mansfield and Northern Ireland.

ALLAN BROWN: Scotland international who moved to Portsmouth in March 1961, then managed Wigan, Luton, Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool. He died in April 2011.

BOB MORTON: England B international who netted 48 goals in 495 league games, becoming Bletchley Town's player-boss in July 1964. He worked for Luton Sports Press and died in April 2002.

GEORGE CUMMINS: Eire international who scored 21 times in 186 league outings, moving to Cambridge City in July 1961, then Hull City. Later an electrician, he died in Southport in November 2009.

TONY GREGORY: Ex-England youth winger who joined Watford in March 1960, then Bexley, Bedford, Hastings, Dover and Stevenage. He was managing director of an aerosol manufacturing firm.

1973/74 PROMOTION WINNERS

GRAHAM HORN: Goalkeeper who moved to Charlton Athletic in December 1976, then Southend, Aldershot and Torquay. Later a residential social worker for Devon County Council, he died in July 2012.

JOHN RYAN: Right-back who joined Norwich City in August 1976, then Sheffield United, Manchester City, Stockport County, Chester and Cambridge United's player-boss. He has held coaching posts.

BOBBY THOMSON: England international who moved via Hartford Bi-Centennials to Port Vale in October 1976. He was Stafford's player-boss, then ran a sports shop in Sedgley and died in August 2009.

PETER ANDERSON: Midfielder who joined Antwerp in December 1975, then Tampa Bay Rowdies, Sheffield United and was Millwall's player-boss. Now CEO of Bayshore Technologies Group in Tampa.

JOHN FAULKNER: Central defender who netted six goals in 209 league games. Later coaching at Luton and Norwich City, 'Maxie' then scouted for various clubs and since become a sports psychologist.

ALAN GARNER: Central defender who moved to Watford in February 1975, then played for Portsmouth, Barnet, Chesham United and Barton Rovers. He later ran his own window business in Hitchin.


JIM RYAN: Winger who scored 21 times in 184 league games, then had a spell with Dallas Tornado before rejoining Luton as a coach, then manager. He has since coached back at Manchester United.

JIMMY HUSBAND: Former England under-23 international who joined Memphis Rogues in May 1978. Later with Eynesbury and St Neots, he then worked as a barman at a local pub and has settled in Clophill.

BARRY BUTLIN: Leading marksman who moved to Nottingham Forest in October 1974, then played for Peterborough and Sheffield United. He is now a financial adviser and has settled in Chellaston.

ALAN WEST: England under-23 midfielder who joined Millwall in July 1981, then had spells with Hitchin and Baldock. He has since become a church minister in Luton, also the Hatters' club chaplain.

JOHN ASTON: England under-23 winger who netted 31 goals in 174 league games before moving to Mansfield Town in September 1977, then Blackburn Rovers. He has since run Pet World in Stalybridge.



1981/82 SECOND DIVISION CHAMPIONS

JAKE FINDLAY: Goalkeeper who made 167 league appearances before joining Swindon Town in July 1985, then Portsmouth and Coventry City. He has held coaching posts, including at Stourport Swifts.

KIRK STEPHENS: Right-back who scored twice in 227 league games before joining Coventry City in August 1984, then Nuneaton Borough. He has since run the family building firm Walsgrave Contractors.

RICHARD MONEY: England B international who joined Portsmouth in August 1983, then Scunthorpe United again. He has since had spells as manager of Scunthorpe, Walsall, Luton and Cambridge United.

BRIAN HORTON: Captain who became Hull City's player-boss in July 1984, then managed Oxford United, Manchester City, Huddersfield, Brighton, Port Vale and Macclesfield. Now coaching at Southend.

CLIVE GOODYEAR: Central defender who moved to Plymouth Argyle in August 1984, then Wimbledon, Brentford and St Albans City. He has since been a physio at several clubs and now in Bletchley.

MAL DONAGHY: Northern Ireland international who joined Manchester United in October 1988, then played for Chelsea. Settling back in Northern Ireland, he has worked for the FAI in development roles.


RICKY HILL: England international midfielder who joined Le Havre in June 1989, then reunited with David Pleat at Leicester City. He held several coaching posts before a spell back at Luton as manager.

BRIAN STEIN: England international striker who joined Anancy in June 1988, then played for Luton again and Barnet. He has since held coaching posts, including a spell assisting Mike Newell at Luton.

STEVE WHITE: Striker who moved to Charlton Athletic in July 1982, then Bristol Rovers again, Swindon Town, Hereford United and Cardiff City. He has assisted Bath City and managed Chippenham.

LIL FUCCILLO: Midfielder who later played for Tulsa Roughnecks, Southend, Peterborough and Cambridge United. His management posts included a spell back at Luton and he has scouted for Newcastle.

BRIAN STEIN: England international striker who joined Anancy in June 1988, then played for Luton again and Barnet. He has since held coaching posts, including a spell assisting Mike Newell at Luton.

MICK HARFORD: England international striker who joined Derby in January 1990, then Luton again, Chelsea, Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon. Later Luton's manager, he is currently their chief scout.

DAVID PREECE: England B international who netted 21 goals in 336 League games, moving to Derby County in August 1995, then was player-coach at Cambridge United and Torquay. He died in July 2007.

KINGSLEY BLACK: Northern Ireland international winger who joined Nottingham Forest in September 1991, then appeared for Grimsby Town and Lincoln City. He currently owns tanning studios in Luton.



EXETER CITY A-Z

AN ALPHABETICAL LOOK AT SOME OF THE WELL-KNOWN AND MORE OBSCURE LINKS TO EXETER CITY'S HISTORY.

G IS FOR GOLDEN BOOT



Whilst Jason and the Grecians of old scoured the world in search of golden fleeces, since 1901, our equally athletic heroes have spent their lives in pursuit of something even more important – the Golden Boot!

Historically awarded to the top scorer in the English Football League's top four divisions, previous winners have included Dixie Dean, Jimmy Greaves, Alan Shearer and, of course, Exeter City's own Tony Kellow!

A Cornishman by birth, Tony enjoyed three separate spells at St James Park between 1976 and 1988. During this time, he found the net over 150 times and, as such, is one of just three men (alongside Alan Banks and Darren Rowbotham) to have scored over a century of goals in a City shirt.

He won his golden boot during the 1980/81 campaign, netting an astonishing thirty-three goals in all competitions. In doing this, he even surpassed Bulgarian Georgi Slavkov, winner of the more renowned 'European Golden Shoe', who was left stranded on a paltry 31.

During the season, City were blighted by patchy league form, which saw them finish eleventh in Division Three. This, however, was offset by a glittering FA Cup run, which took them all the way to the Quarterfinals, where they suffered a 2-0 reverse away at top-flight Tottenham Hotspur. This was, in no small part, due to the imperious



form of the talismanic Tony, whose finest hour came during the fourth round replay at home to Leicester City, where he nabbed a hat trick to secure a memorable 3-1 victory.

After hanging up his boots in 1988, Tony remained a part of the City community, serving as the club's promotions manager and commercial manager, whilst also running the Centre Spot social club at St James Park. In August 1990, a benefit match was held in his honour, as the Grecians played host to Leicester City.

After moving back to his native Cornwall, Tony passed away in 2011, at the age of just 58.

IN AN AGE OF UNFATHOMABLE RICHES, THE PREMIER LEAGUE IS IN A LEAGUE OF ITS OWN WHEN IT COMES TO FINANCIAL MUSCLE.

It doesn't seem that long ago when Andy Cole broke the British record transfer fee after Manchester United swooped to splash £7million to buy the striker from Newcastle in 1995.

But that transfer fee has been blown out of the water over the past 20 years as clubs playing in the top flight shell out huge sums of money to fill their squads.

Just over 10 years after Cole's exit, Chelsea shelled out more than £30million to sign Andriy Shevchenko from AC Milan and last year Manchester United paid almost £90million to snap up Paul Pogba from Juventus.

Of course, the Premier League has grown in global stature over the years and clubs earn significantly more money when claiming their slice of various TV deals.

Clubs can command huge sponsorship fees from businesses wanting to associate themselves with a league which continues to garner increasing interest across the world.

And corporate hospitality, coupled with vast sums of cash for finishing in a particular position in the top league, continues to rise.

In short, the gulf between the top table and League Two has never been wider and that chasm is set to increase.

So, do Premier League clubs have an obligation to look after lower league clubs and do their best to distribute some of their riches down the pyramid?

Take Ethan Ampadu as a case in point. The youngster became Exeter's youngest ever debutant when he featured in the starting line-up for a League Cup clash against Brentford 14 months ago.

But it soon became clear the talented City youth product would find himself at the centre of a transfer tug-of-war. In July, Chelsea beat off stiff competition to land the utility player after he rejected an offer from the Grecians to sign scholarship forms.

Because Ampadu had not signed professional forms at St



James Park, it meant he was effectively a free agent, even though the buying club would have to pay compensation for the development overseen by the Grecians.

In an ideal world, mega-rich Chelsea would see what an exciting talent they had signed and quickly compensate Exeter to the tune of several million pounds.

Yet it rarely works like that even when it comes to the richest clubs in the land.

The buying and selling clubs seldom reach an agreement and the issue usually goes to tribunal to establish the exact fee. However, the fact that the transfer has yet to appear in front of a tribunal could well work out in Exeter's favour.

Let's face facts, Ampadu must have made an instant impression at Stamford Bridge to be handed his debut at the tender age of 17. Replacing Cesc Fabregas in a Carabao Cup tie against Nottingham Forest had Chelsea fans salivating and he didn't disappoint in a blue jersey.

So, the fact he has already been promoted to the first-team squad must have raised his financial worth if common sense is to prevail.

It would be a crying shame to lose a talent of this stature for small rewards. So a plea to the football authorities – please make the right decision for the sake of equality between two leagues operating on very different playing fields.

Plucking a figure out of the air is impossible to do, but Ampadu's development from an Exeter under-seven's player to moving to the Premier League champions is surely worth millions.

ON A SATURDAY, APRIL 28, 1990, EXETER CITY BEAT SCARBOROUGH 3-2 AT ST JAMES PARK IN FRONT OF 6,850 FANS TO CLAIM THE FOURTH DIVISION TITLE – THE ONLY CHAMPIONSHIP VICTORY IN THE CLUB'S HISTORY.

This feature, by Charlie Howell, will look back on the careers of the eleven players that took to the field that day. The next player is City's Scottish number seven, Tom Kelly.



TOM KELLY

TOM BEGAN HIS PROFESSIONAL CAREER AGED 17 WHEN HE JOINED HIBERNIAN FROM SCOTTISH NON-LEAGUE SIDE GARTCOSH UNITED.

After two years at Hibs, Tom moved on to Partick Thistle, Queen of the South, and then south of the border to Hartlepool United in 1985.

After a solitary season at United, where he made 15 appearances, Tom moved on again, joining Torquay United on a free transfer in 1986. That season saw the Gulls involved in the battle not to become the first side to be relegated automatically to the conference – a battle that saw United survive on goal difference.

The following season saw Torquay transform into a promotion contender, as United finished fifth with Tom playing in the unfamiliar role of left-back.

Tom moved back up north to York in June 1989 after 120 appearances for Torquay, but he would only stay with the Minstermen for nine months as Terry Cooper came calling.

The Scottish midfielder joined Exeter City for a fee of £15,000 as a replacement for Darran Rowbotham, who was ruled out injured for the remainder of the season. Tom finished the season with the fourth division trophy in his hands.

Despite being a fairly regular name on City's team sheet, Tom returned to Torquay for free in 1993. The Scotsman was part of the squad that finished bottom of the fourth tier but weren't relegated due to Stevenage not meeting Football League requirements in 1996.

Tom left Torquay for a second time in 1996 as he joined non-league Weymouth, before moving onto Teignmouth and then Ilfracombe Town.

In November 1997 Tom joined Taunton Town where he was appointed as captain and, later-on, player-coach in September 2000. Aged 37, Tom started Taunton's FA Vase final at Villa Park in 2001, which they won, beating Berkhamsted Town 2-1.

Tom then moved on to Bideford and then Bridgewater Town, where he had the rare experience of playing in midfield with his son, Cameron.

In 2007 the midfielder moved to Devon and Exeter League side Stoke Gabriel and his final club was Bovey Tracey, where aged 45, Tom was player-manager before he retired.
