


Good afternoon and welcome to this afternoon's game against Luton Town.

The first thing to say is that we totally accept that Tuesday evening's performance against Chesterfield was nowhere near good enough. You voiced your frustrations at the end of the game and I understand that.

I felt we were too easy to play against and we have to be so much better. We need to move the ball much quicker and have confidence in our ability and what we're trying to achieve. We have already seen on occasions this season how dangerous we can be when he click into gear going forward, but there's no doubt we need to do that with far greater consistency.

I keep getting asked about the difference between our home and away form, and there's no real definitive answer if I am being honest. It's still the same-sized pitch, the same white lines and the same goals at either end. Wherever we play, but certainly in front of our own fans who pay good money to support their team, the players need to be brave on the ball and confident in carrying out the style of play I want us to adopt.

One thing I've maintained so far during my time here is that ideas and philosophies take time to implement. You can't change things overnight and we're still only just over two months into the season, but I totally accept your frustrations about performances here at home – they have to get better and today would be a great time to start.

Everyone here at the football club wants us to be successful and we all need to be pulling in the same direction. I'm so determined to get this right and will work every hour available to bring success and stability to the club.

The players have a great opportunity here in the Football League and they need to recognise that and make the most of it. Careers as a player are short and one thing we do have here is competition for places so if someone isn't meeting the standard required then I will change things and give other players a chance, as I have already done this season. Everyone in the squad is part of what we are trying to build.

There's no better opportunity to put things right than to test yourselves against the best and that's what this afternoon's opponents Luton Town are. Nathan Jones has assembled a strong squad for this level but this should be a game that my boys are relishing – the chance to topple the leaders in front of our supporters. We'll need to play a lot better than we did on Tuesday but I believe that we can.



We know we'll have to be on top of our game and be brave in what we're trying to do and that's what I'll be emphasising to the boys ahead of kick-off. We'll also need your support. I appreciate that Tuesday was tough for everyone but please stick with your team. They are working hard, along with everyone behind the scenes, to be successful.

First of all, an apology to those of you who were here on Tuesday for the Chesterfield game.

As a squad, we all know that it was an unacceptable performance by us. As you can imagine, the manager spelt that out in no uncertain terms afterwards although in truth we didn't need telling. We knew that we didn't get anywhere near the standards we expect of ourselves, both personally and in terms of the group, and those demanded by you, the people who pay your money to come and watch us.

We knew that Chesterfield were in a false position and that we'd need to be at our best but we never really got any momentum. Having said that, with 20 minutes to go it didn't look as if either side would score, but once they got their noses in front they protected the lead really well and got their second near the end. A bad night.

It was a performance I didn't see coming. We'd battled to pick up four points from the games at Morecambe and Grimsby and a win would have lifted us into mid-table.

Fortunately, in football the next game is never far away. We dissected Chesterfield on Wednesday and had an honest chat amongst ourselves about how we can improve, collectively and individually. The rest of this week has been about preparing for today's test against Luton.

The manager spoke afterwards about making changes today and, if we're honest, nearly all of us are vulnerable. There

are guys who are not even in the squad desperate for an opportunity and the return of Josh Yorwerth after suspension and injuries among other players slowly clearing up the Gaffer will certainly have that option to change things.

Whoever plays will need to be at their best if we are to get anything from a Luton side flying at the top of the table. We all know from last season about the goal threat James Collins possesses and Collo already has eight for the season. Alongside him Danny Hylton has scored against us for Aldershot and Oxford as well as Luton. He's another threat in a strong squad.

But these are the sorts of games we should relish. A big crowd, good opposition and the knowledge that if we can right a few of the wrongs from Tuesday and perform at our absolute best from the first whistle we can get a result. I am 100% sure we're capable of doing that but talk is cheap. We need to stand up and be counted and show everyone at the club the best of us.





Andy Kellett should have put the Spireites ahead early on, only to be denied by a great block from Mark Connolly, and Reds struggled to create much of note in the first half with Joe McNerney's header and a shot from Jimmy Smith testing Chesterfield keeper Joe Anyon.


With neither side offering much thrust in the final third the game looked destined to finish goalless as it entered the last 20 minutes. But after Reds failed to clearly a needlessly-conceded free kick Kristian Dennis pounced from close range to give Chesterfield a deserved 72nd-minute lead.

They made the points safe with a powerful low drive from outside the box in the 89th minute by Jordan Flores. Reds have now won just two home league games since February.



Football historian Leigh Edwards profiles
six winners of Luton Town's
Player of the Year award

Malcolm MacDonald

Striker MacDonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Luton in July 1969. He was twice top scorer including their 1969-70 promotion success when 'Player of the Year' and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974 and League Cup finalist in 1976, he joined Arsenal for £333,333 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He then managed Fulham and Huddersfield and now works in the media.

Kirk Stephens

Attacking right-back Stephens was ever present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's Player of the Year in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. He later re-joined Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career. He also had a spell at Barnet and has since run the family building firm.

Ricky Hill

England international midfielder Hill was Player of the Year when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. He became a professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was also 'Player of the Year' in 1980-81 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He also featured in two consecutive League Cup finals including the Hatters' 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. He was reunited with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and was later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs. He briefly returned to Luton as manager.

Paul Walsh



England international striker Walsh was capped five times while at Luton Town. After signing as a professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to

Luton in July 1982. He was Player of the Year in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters before joining Liverpool in May 1984. He helped them to win the League Championship in 1985-86 and then joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 where he was an FA Cup winner in 1991. He later played for Portsmouth, Manchester City and Pompey again until injury curtailed his career.



Mal Donaghy

Northern Ireland international central defender Donaghy gained a club-record 58 caps while at Luton Town. He moved to Kenilworth Road from Larne in June 1978 and was ever-present as Luton won the Second Division title in 1981-82 and were FA

Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. Voted Player of the Year in 1985-86, he was an FA Cup semi-finalist again in 1987-88 and starred in that season's League Cup final triumph. He netted 16 goals in 410 League games prior to joining Manchester United for £650,000 in October 1988. He then returned on loan before moving to Chelsea in August 1992. He has worked for the Irish FA.



Brian Stein

England international striker Stein was Luton Town's Player of the Year in 1987-88, scoring twice in that season's League Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second

Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted Player of the Year again in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton and spent two years at Crawley as physiotherapist.

Opposition SQUAD



Danny Hylton

Joined the Town in 2016 alongside Oxford United team-mate Johnny Mullins, after the pair had helped the U's to promotion to League One and the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final. The club's top scorer last season with 27 goals, having passed his previous season's best tally of 16 in January, Hylton came in the top three shortlisted for the EFL League Two Player of the Year award as voted by managers in the division, was named in the PFA Team of the Season for the division and won four club Player of the Year accolades in a memorable campaign.

James Collins

Having netted over 100 career goals – most of which have come in the fourth tier – Collins signed in June 2017 for an undisclosed fee from the Reds on a three-year contract. The Coventry-born former Republic of Ireland Under-21 international has won promotion three times from League Two, twice with Shrewsbury and once during his loan at Northampton Town in 2016.

Luke Berry

Summer signing from Cambridge United who registered his first goals for his new club in last weekend's 7-1 victory over Stevenage when he netted a hat-trick. He signed a three-year contract at Kenilworth Road having notched 22 times for the U's last season.

KEY THREE

Marek Stech

A Czech Republic international – winning one cap in 2014 – the 27-year-old joined the Hatters in June 2017 from Sparta Prague. The 6ft 5ins stopper earned cult hero status at Yeovil Town after signing permanently in 2012, helping the Glovers to promotion to the Championship for the first time in the club's history before leaving to play in the Europa League with Sparta.

James Justin

Made his senior debut as a substitute against Exeter on the final day of the 2015-16 season and has gone on to make 39 first team appearances in 2016-17, including a man-of-the-match winning first start in the EFL Cup win over Aston Villa.

Dan Potts

Potts is predominantly a left-back whose aerial ability also makes him an option at centre-half. The 23-year-old joined the Hatters in summer 2015 from West Ham United, where he made 13 appearances after being

handed his debut in a Championship win over Barnsley in December 2011. After making 44 appearances in his first two seasons with the Hatters, he was offered a new contract in May 2017 for another year.

Alan McCormack

The 33-year-old defensive midfielder joined the Hatters in July after his contract expired with Sky Bet Championship side Brentford. The Irishman has proven his versatility over the years with the likes of Southend and Charlton, playing in both midfield and at right-back while amassing over 450 career appearances before signing for the Hatters.

Johnny Mullins

Mullins made 51 appearances in his last season for Oxford United, including leading the U's out at Wembley in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final, as they sealed promotion from League Two, before joining the Hatters with team-mate Danny Hylton.

Scott Cuthbert

Capable of playing at either centre-half or right-back, Cuthbert signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2015 having spent two years at Leyton Orient. The club captain activated a clause in his contract to extend his stay at Kenilworth Road until the summer of 2018 after making his 50th start against Carlisle United in December 2016.

Jack Stacey

A Reading youth product who can operate at right back and in midfield, he played six times for the Royals in the Championship. Between 2015 and 2017, he had three loan spells, with Barnet, Carlisle United and Exeter City. A full season at St James Park saw him flourish as he made 38 appearances as well as scoring a fantastic late winner in the League Two play-off semi-final. Joined the Hatters on a two-year contract.

Olly Lee

The former Birmingham City central midfielder Lee joined the club on an initial short-term deal in August 2015, before quickly earning a contract to 2017 which was then extended to the summer of 2018 at the end of an impressive first campaign with the Hatters. By the end of 2016-17, Lee had made 80 appearances in a Town shirt, scoring four times.

Jordan Cook

The 27-year-old began his career in the Premier League, making his Sunderland debut as a substitute against Manchester United on Boxing Day 2010. He gained experience on loan at Darlington, Walsall and Carlisle, before heading south to sign for Charlton Athletic in 2012. Cook first worked with Town boss Nathan Jones at The Valley and after spending two years at Walsall in League One he was reunited with his old Addicks coach last summer, making 42 appearances and scoring four goals in his first campaign at Kenilworth Road.

Andrew Shinnie

Signed on a season-long loan from Championship side Birmingham City, Shinnie adds a fair amount of experience to Nathan Jones' midfield, having played over 200 first team games across the top three tiers in Scotland as well as the English second tier.

Harry Cornick

Pacey 22-year-old forward who joined the Hatters from Premier League club Bournemouth in August 2017 for an undisclosed fee on a two-year contract.

Glen Rea

Highly-rated Republic of Ireland Under-21 international who can operate as a holding midfielder or centre-half. Rea joined the Hatters on loan from Championship club Brighton & Hove Albion in March 2016, making ten appearances, and signed permanently in June 2016. Rea made 49 appearances, 46 of them starts, in his first full season with the Town. He found the net three times.

Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu

Former West Ham United academy graduate Mpanzu has just enjoyed his longest sequence of matches after an injury-disrupted couple of years. Versatile enough

to play in central defence, midfield on the wing or even up front, he passed the 100-game mark for the Hatters during 2016-17. Netted his first goal of this season in the 4-0 win at Yeovil in early March, and followed it up with the winner against Notts County in April to leave his Town career stats at seven goals from 117 appearances by the end of the campaign.

Jack Senior

A 2016 summer transfer deadline day signing from Huddersfield Town. The 20-year-old left the Terriers after a nine-year association with the club, signing for the Hatters on a two-year deal. Senior's EFL debut came on 14th January, the day after his 20th birthday, when he appeared as a second-half substitute in the 2-1 win at Crewe. He went on to make 16 appearances in his first season at the club.

Luke Gambin

Maltese international who became Nathan Jones' second signing of the January 2017 transfer window when he moved from Barnet for an undisclosed fee. Gambin had been with the Bees since joining as an apprentice in 2009 and had made 136 appearances, scoring 15 times. Gambin penned a two-and-a-half year contract.

Lawson D'Ath

The attacking midfielder joined the Hatters from Northampton Town at the beginning of the January transfer window in 2017 on an 18-month deal, with the club having the option to extend it for an extra year. D'Ath made 13 appearances, ten of them starts, during his first half-season with the Town.

Elliot Lee

Brother of current Town midfielder Olly and son of ex-England and Newcastle United midfielder Rob, Elliot Lee is in his second spell at the club – this time on a permanent deal – having had a short loan spell from West Ham United in 2015. He joined the Hatters in July 2017 on a two-year contract.


Alan Sheehan

Cultured defender Sheehan joined the Hatters on loan from Bradford City in January 2016, becoming Nathan Jones' first signing after taking over as manager. The Irishman made 20 appearances and captained the team for the final seven matches of 2015-16 after Scott Cuthbert suffered a season-ending injury. The left-footer can operate at either full-back or in central defence, and has made over 300 appearances in his career so far with the majority coming during two spells with Notts County.

Welshman Jones was appointed as John Still's successor in January 2016.

A former coach and assistant-manager at Brighton & Hove Albion, Charlton Athletic and Yeovil Town, he was a player at Kenilworth Road in 1995 but left without making an appearance. Jones spent a year in Spain before returning to the UK and playing for Southend, Brighton and Yeovil, making over 500 League and Cup appearances.

The 44-year-old began his coaching qualifications while still a player with Yeovil, initially coaching the Ladies team, and achieved his UEFA Pro-Licence in 2014.

In March 2016 Jones signed a new three-and-a-half year contract with the Hatters to tie him to the club until 2020. His first full season in the hot-seat ended with a fourth-placed finish and qualification for the League Two play-offs.

Current form

Luton have started this season well and are the top scorers in the section after demolishing Stevenage 7-1 last Saturday and then winning 4-1 at Exeter on Tuesday. Summer recruit Luke Berry led the way with a hat-trick – his first goals for the club – against Stevenage and Jones was impressed that his side

didn't ease up after taking a 3-0 lead inside the first 30 minutes.

"I don't want to be disrespectful but it could have been more. We had chances second half where we were a real threat. Some of the football, especially on the counter attack, we really put them under pressure and I'm pleased. It was a great performance and one that you couldn't envisage. If someone had said you're going to win 7-1 here against Stevenage, it's dream stuff. We won't gloat in it in any kind of way, we're pleased, it's three points, keeps us where we want to be but we've got two more tough games this week."

We keep preaching about game changers and so on and credit to the squad we've got as there's not many who can bring Luke Gambin, Elliot Lee and Pelly Ruddock on for their three changes.

"Arguably they made us stronger in a different way, but I thought we asked them to come on and be ready to go, ready to impact, ready to take the game away from the opposition and I thought we did that."

Since losing 3-0 at home to Swindon, Luton have won seven out of eight in the League. They were held to a goalless draw at Morecambe during that sequence.

Previous MEETINGS

Crawley Town have the upper hand in the head to head with Luton Town, having won four of the six meetings since 2014 in the Football League.

The Reds have lost just twice to Luton, only once in league competition and never by more than one goal. However last season the shares were spoiled, with both side winning their home fixtures.

The first meeting took place at the Checktrade Stadium and finished 2-0 to the hosts. James Collins gave the Reds the lead just a couple of minutes prior to the break, before Enzo Boldewijn sealed the deal in front of the south stand in stoppage time.

Glenn Morris, who is the feature interview in today's programme, made his debut for the Reds in this game.

However, the reverse fixture in February this year went in the Hatters' favour, when they recorded a 2-1 victory at Kenilworth Road. Collins once again put us in front half an hour from time with a wonder goal against the side he was to join this summer, but his current strike partner Danny Hylton hit a six-minute double shortly afterwards to claim all three points for the hosts.

The season before that saw the two sides meet on three occasions, twice in League Two and once in the FA Cup first round.

Crawley claimed a league double over Luton, with the first of those meetings once again taking place in Sussex and again finishing 2-1.

This time it was the Reds had to come from behind after Cameron McGeehan scored in the first half. A second half rally saw goals from Rhys Murphy and Matt Harrold enough to overturn the deficit and claim a precious victory.

Harrold was again on the scoresheet in the return fixture at Kenilworth Road, netting the only goal. Sandwiched in between the two league encounters was a first-round FA Cup tie held at the Checktrade Stadium, and is the only time the Hatters have won here. Harrold once more found the net, replying ten minutes after Josh McQuoid broke the deadlock in the 54th minute. But as the game entered the dying moments the same man sent the visitors through to the next round.

The sides have also met in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. The game was played in October 2014 at Kenilworth Road in the second round of the southern section and Gwion Edwards' 51st minute goal proved the difference.

The clubs also met four times in the Conference. Both sides won their home games in the 2009-10 season, with Ben Smith getting our winner in a 2-1 victory here. The following season Reds won 2-1 at Kenilworth Road, with Craig McAllister and Richard Brodie scoring, before drawing 1-1 in April 2011 when Reds were presented with the trophy after clinching the title a few days earlier at Tamworth.

The DW Stadium was opened in 1999 after the club moved from its former home of Springfield Park, where it had been in residence since their formation in 1932. The four separate stands are of roughly the same height and are all single tiered. They are also quite steep meaning that fans are sat quite close to the playing action too.

Both the side stands have large supporting steel frameworks visible above their roofs and there is also an electric scoreboard above the Boston (East) Stand, on one side of the ground.

The stadium was originally named the JJB Stadium under a sponsorship deal that lasted for ten years. This was replaced by a new deal in August 2009, which saw the stadium being renamed the DW Stadium in partnership with DW Sports Fitness. The stadium is also shared with Wigan Warriors Rugby League club.

Where do away fans go?

Reds fans will be seated in the North End of the stadium, where up to 4,800 supporters can be accommodated. Both the view and the leg room in for away fans is generally good, and the facilities and concourses are both modern and spacious.

What's the food like?

The food on offer inside the ground includes a range of well renowned Hollands Pies – with Steak, Meat & Potato and cheese all available for £2.60, whilst hot-dogs are also on offer for £2.50. In the surrounding area, there are also food outlets on the adjacent retail park including the likes of Pizza Hut, Burger King and Frankie and Bennys.

Where can I get a drink pre-match?

There are plenty of options in and around the town centre for visiting fans. The Swan and Railway is close to the stations and always does food as well. The Orwell is also nearby and that also welcomes away supporters and it does a special fans lunch with a variety of menu choices with competitive beer prices. The Bowling Green is another option and that's a ten-minute walk from the ground.

Can I get there by train?

Wigan North Western is well served by regular services from London Euston. Reds fans can catch the 08:58 service from Crawley to London Victoria before hopping on the tube to catch the 10:30 service from Euston that arrives at Wigan North Western at 12:25. The same timetable applies an hour later – by getting the 09:58 from Crawley you can get to Wigan at 13:25.

After the game fans can aim for the 18:09 from Wigan North Western that gets back to London Euston at 20:15 – and the 21:02 from London Victoria then gets back to Crawley at 21:51.


Where do I park if I drive?

There's a big car park at the back of the away end and fans can park there at £5 per car, £10 per mini bus and £20 per coach. Fans are discouraged from parking in the nearby retail parks as they have a maximum two-hour limited and you could be fined.



GLENN MORRIS

KEEN TO KEEP COLLO AT BAY

GOALKEEPER GLENN MORRIS IS RELISHING
THE BATTLE AGAINST LEAGUE 2'S
TOP SCORERS THIS AFTERNOON
INTERVIEW: DYLAN SMART

Glenn Morris made his first appearance for the Reds in this fixture last season and it couldn't have gone much better for 'Cat', who kept a clean sheet as we recorded a 2-0 win.

James Collins scored for the Reds that day, but this afternoon he will be looking to beat Glenn as he tries to continue his excellent early-season form for the club he joined in the summer.

Luton Town are in impressive form, particularly in attack with Collins and Danny Hylton both on eight League goals each, but Glenn is relishing facing his old team-mate.

"It's going to be difficult, we know what he (Collins) is all about; Collo is going to run all game and so is Hylton so our defence will be in for a hard afternoon but we wouldn't expect anything less against the side at the top of the league who are flying and scoring loads of goals. It'll be nice to save a few shots from Collo and try and keep him out and we'll have to be at our best."

The stopper has been in good form this season, and has had the No.1 spot nailed down since his debut in September last year despite the change of manager in the summer.

With Luton scoring freely (11 goals in their last two games) it's more than likely the 33-year old will be called into action this afternoon, but Glenn still believes in the team's ability to get something from the game.

"It's going to be a tough one, they're in great form and scoring at will but if we perform as we know



we can do then we're more than capable of getting a positive result for sure," he said.

Confidence is a key part of any footballer's game, but it's a commodity more than often associated with forwards than goalkeepers.

"It is said that when a striker isn't playing well that it's because he's lacking confidence in front of goal but it certainly can be the case at the other end as well. It's just consistency of performance; if you can get to that settled place then you can feel confident you're not going to concede. If you can keep it going it's great, but there's ups and downs in football so sometimes it can be difficult."

After conceding just two goals in three games, it's safe to say Glenn is probably feeling confident at the moment.

Despite doing brilliantly himself to keep his net from bulging, he believes it all starts from working together as a unit.

"I think as a whole as a team, starting from the front and working back, we're defending well. Even the forwards come back for the set pieces, do their job and keep some goals out and it breeds confidence throughout the team. It also gives us a good platform to build on and go and nick a 1-0 win when we've got to dig in and defend. If we can keep that up throughout the season it should put us in good stead."

Glenn signed as a player-coach last season, however has gone to be the club's first choice stopper. He has reflected on the past 12 months.

"I'm pleased with how it's gone for me personally and I've said many times I didn't expect to be playing as much as I have done but sometimes that's how football works, you get a chance and you

take it," he said.

"It seems to have worked out for me but I know in football that can quickly change so you just have to keep taking every game as it comes. As a team, we have been a little bit up and down in terms of the performances and I know we could do better but we feel there's potential to really climb the table if we could get a run going.

"We need to keep working hard as a group and take on board what the manager is telling us in terms of the way we play. We knew it would take time to adjust to what he (Harry Kewell) wants and it has. But the lads believe in what he is after, absolutely 100%. We have had a few injuries to key players which hasn't helped but I do genuinely believe we are making progress."

Glenn acknowledges that the key to moving up the table is improving our home form.

He added: "It's funny. When I came into the side we were pretty decent at home but this season it hasn't been anywhere near good enough. We sense everyone is frustrated by it and so are we. Maybe the way we set up

is better suited to hitting teams on the break and soaking up pressure which we do pretty well away from home.

"Today might be a good game in that regard for us. Luton certainly won't sit in. They are flying and will come at us so maybe it will be us trying to counter them and get a goal or two that way. Whatever happens we need the fans to stick with us. We share their frustrations about the home form, and all I can say is we are all working hard to try and get it right."


Mick Fox delves into his scrap books for a taste of Crawley Town history

Fifty-seven years ago this week Crawley were playing two of our Sussex rivals.

The first match took place on 15th October 1960 - an attractive FA Amateur Cup tie at home to local rivals Horsham. As the match programme shown details, we had sent a scout to their match the previous week when they had lost at home to Littlehampton in the FA Cup, their first defeat of the season.

Unfortunately, we were unable to use the information garnered to good effect, and lost an explosive match 3-2 in front of a crowd of over 1,000, despite leading 2-1 in the second half with goals from Johnny Gibbons and Bill Halford.

Matches with Horsham over the years have generally been well attended and it is good to see that Horsham have finally been given the go-ahead for their new stadium and a return to the town. Hopefully in the future we can renew rivalries in a major cup competition. I have included a press photo from the match, which shows Horsham defending in depth. Two of those pictured - Dave Stripp and Glyn Jones - went on in years to come to play for us with some distinction.

The following week we had another home game against another Sussex rival, this time Hastings United in the Metropolitan League, and yet again we lost by a score of 3-2 despite Hastings being below us in the league table.

As for today's opponents, I managed to find a Metropolitan League programme from 23rd August 1958, the very first match of the season, and with the programme editor noting "a decided air of optimism running through the club...." We lost that match to Luton 'A' 3-0, and our season was again one of inconsistency, although we did finish above Luton in the league.

Interestingly, the following week we also played Horsham in the FA Cup, and lost that one by 1-0. The highlight of that 58-59 season, though, was our first ever Sussex Senior Cup final, although we did lose to Worthing 2-1 in the final at the Goldstone having beaten Bognor 5-0 in the semi-final. The other interesting note in that Luton programme of August 1958 is that it marked our first game for many years to be officially known as Crawley Town rather than just Crawley FC.

Moving on to some sad news, I received a phone call this week that one of our gang of season ticket holders in the East Stand, Will Shirley, had collapsed suddenly

and died. Will has been coming to games for many years, latterly as one of the East Stand's Statler & Waldorf club (for you Muppets fans), and had previously one of the regulars behind the home goal.

I have included a photo from 1997 when our Broken Flag Social Club sponsored the final league game at Town Meadow and had our photo taken after the match in the goalmouth in front of the shed end. I am centre of the picture with hand raised and Will is slightly behind me at my left shoulder. Also in the picture, third from the left, is Ian Hands, another recently departed Crawley Town stalwart. RIP Will, and deepest sympathies to Jill, Joanna and Will's beloved granddaughters.

While looking for photos of Will I came across some of my Town Meadow photos from the early to mid 1970s, and thought I would include a few here to show the progression from that almost derelict ground - when we played in front of two to three hundred - to our current facilities, which would have been unimaginable to us back then.

I particularly like the one of the grass bank down the side of the ground with the broken fence, unkempt grass and the Radio Crawley Hospital broadcast hut (operated by Gordon Hamilton, a current West Stand season ticket holder).

Interestingly, there appears to have been some commercial activity as we had the forerunner of today's electronic scoreboard, which for us was a clock surrounded by local advertising. The clock was purely for timing each half of the match with the hands attached before play and then taken away for safekeeping after the game had finished!

The inside shot of the home changing-room also has "boot man" Jim Woods in the picture. Jim was one of the long-time club characters and would attend to all the players' footwear needs.
