

# THE MANAGER

Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for another big Sky Bet League Two fixture against Wycombe Wanderers.

I'd like to welcome everyone who has made the short journey from Buckinghamshire, including Wycombe supporters, directors, manager Gareth Ainsworth, his staff and their players, and I wish them a safe trip home after the match.

I came up against Gareth several times as a player and he was always difficult to play against. He's continued that into his managerial career and we've had some real competitive matches since I took over here just over two years ago.

We've already had one tough, and memorable, encounter with the Chairboys this season when we scored twice in the closing stages at Adams Park to turn the game on its head having been behind, and with our proximity in league position in mind, we expect nothing less tonight.

In the two games since my last notes, I've been delighted to collect maximum points from successive 1-0 victories, here against Morecambe ten days ago and up at Grimsby on a difficult Saturday afternoon.

We've had to show a different side to our game, when we dig in and grind

out results, and I've been so proud of the players for doing that. It can't be champagne and roses every week and we've perhaps been spoilt by some of the big wins we've had here this season.

## MAMMOTH

The Morecambe win wasn't as fluent as we have seen, but I watched the game back and was really pleased with how controlled we were. We just maybe lacked a bit of a cutting edge, but once again, we came up with a goal with Johnny Mullins' header and took all three points.

Saturday's success at Grimsby was massive in the context of having been reduced to ten men so early. To play with a man less for over an hour needed a mammoth effort from everyone, and we showed a real spirit to produce such a defensive rearguard action after James Collins had got us the goal that we know we have in us, even in those circumstances.

It was a wonderful win because it's one of those that can go either way, and when it's gone your way, it's a big thing that can galvanise everyone.

It also took us to 60 points for the season, and to get there so early is a big statement.

We have to maintain the consistency we have shown over the campaign to see the job through now, and Saturday was especially pleasing because we'd had a couple of bad results on the road and it sets us up for a big week here at Kenilworth Road.

That starts tonight with Wycombe and will continue on Saturday when Exeter, another side who are firmly in the running for the top three automatic places, are the visitors.

As ever, we need you to play your part from the stands. The wonderful travelling support was so vocal on Saturday at Blundell Park, so please continue that tonight and let's have one of those memorable nights under the lights against a promotion rival.



# FROM THE BOARDROOM

## WITH FINANCE DIRECTOR SIMON GIBB

Good evening and welcome to the rearranged game against our local rivals Wycombe. I would like to extend a warm welcome to their travelling supporters and players and officials.

Wycombe are currently enjoying a good run of results that have pushed them up to within one point of the automatic promotion places, with three wins on the bounce coming in to this game.

They had the weekend off due to other clubs' FA Cup involvement, but enjoyed a good win ten days ago against Crewe with a winner in the dying seconds from our former striker Craig Mackail-Smith, who has contributed nine goals to date to the Chairboys' cause this season. He along with Adebayo Akinfenwa, who is a handful to any defence at this level, will I'm sure be looking forward to challenging our well organised defence.

### STRENGTH

On the subject of good defence it was great to come away with an excellent, really hard fought win on Saturday at Grimsby, but also with a clean sheet – despite going down to ten men early on!

It is testament to the strength and depth of the squad that despite a couple of injuries and suspensions in key positions in recent weeks, we are now 11 points clear of the play-off positions. Thanks again to those of you who made the effort to get up to Blundell Park and cheer the lads on!

As always at this time of year there is lots of speculation around possible transfer targets. As a Board we are, of course, very happy with the squad Nathan has put together to date, but equally also want to ensure we help him take us to promotion.

Our aim as a Board is to provide funds for players that, at the right price, would strengthen our position for the future through either experience or youth potential.

We also are keen to hold onto our existing talent. The latter isn't easy when you are successful as success attracts attention from plenty of higher level clubs and their scouts!

As part of our squad adjustments we have let Josh McQuoid depart in recent days, and all at the club wish him well at his new club Aldershot and thank him for his contribution.

As the transfer window deadline comes towards its closure, focus for the support team will be on keeping the existing squad fit for the rest of the season.

I was recently speaking with Simon Parsell and Jared Roberts-Smith, who work very closely with the players on their fitness regimes.

### INVESTMENT

Some of you may have noticed that the players now have small electronic devices on the back of their shirts. This is all part of a significant investment by the club to really improve the overall fitness of the players and ultimately reduce injuries and lay-off time.

The new training ground has also allowed us to invest in new, more advanced equipment to enhance this work.

The support team monitor every player, checking such things as metres covered, recovery rates, hydration levels, response rates to different injury recovery techniques and diets and the like, with the aim of making them much fitter, stronger and much less likely to suffer injury.

The results of their work have been staggering with major reductions in average numbers of players unavailable through injury. Well done all.

His daughter wrote: "I hope you witnessed on Saturday the happiness etched on my dad's face, the overall feeling of comradery and feeling at home was priceless."


We are pleased he had a great day and best of luck for the future Michael from us all.

## SHEEZ ENJOYS THE HEAT OF A BATTLE!

ALAN BACK FROM SUSPENSION AND STRAIGHT "INTO THE OVEN" FOR GRIMSBY WIN

Alan Sheehan told iFollow Hatters after the recent Checkatrade Trophy defeat to Peterborough that it was "full duck or no dinner" now for the Hatters, as they were left to concentrate on the season's ultimate aim of winning promotion from Sky Bet League Two.

After returning to the starting line-up at Grimsby on Saturday following his three-game suspension, and having to play a major part in a redoubtable defensive display to secure a 1-0 win following Jordan Cook's first-half sending off, the Irishman used another culinary metaphor.

Sheehan had a running battle with Mariners striker Jamille Matt throughout the game, being caught in the face several times by stray arms, and afterwards he smiled: "It

was off the grill and straight into the oven! It was hard, but that's the way it is.

"No game is going to be easy, whether we had 11 men or ten men. I'm happy to come back in. It was hard. It's been 27 days – I've been counting it down – and that's it. Come back in, clean sheet and we win, thank God! That's it done now and it's hopefully swept under the carpet."

James Collins' header, following up Luke Berry's free-kick that had been tipped onto the bar by former Town trialist Ben Killip, was the only goal

as Sheehan and his colleagues at the back – protected brilliantly by Glen Rea in the midfield holding role – helped goalkeeper Marek Stech to a 14th league clean sheet of the season, the best in League Two currently.

"It was a great win," said Sheehan. "We had to dig deep, which this team is capable of doing, and battled out a brilliant 1-0 win. I think we can definitely call it that, at this time of the season.

"It was a brilliant free-kick and I'm delighted for Collo. It was hard up there for him on his own at times today, and they had a few big centre-backs. But he stuck in there and that's what he's here for, to score goals – and what a priceless three points that could be."

It certainly wasn't the Town's most free-flowing performance of the season, but in the circumstances as the campaign nears its final third, the result was far more important than how the game appeared.

"We want to look good, but at this stage of the season, we just want to win the games," the 31-year-old went on. "Every game is three points now for us. Every three points we add, we get closer to the tally that we need to get promoted, and that's all it is."

"We are very single-minded but we don't really care about any other team. Other people will be looking at us to see if we slip up, but at the end of the day, if we keep winning our games and keep doing what we do, we'll be OK."

"There'll be loads of ups and downs. We'll have slip-ups. Other teams will have slip-ups. But I suppose whoever goes on a little bit of a run, and momentum is huge, will get there. There are 17 games left and we know what we have to do."

## JOSH SHOOTS OFF TO JOIN THE SHOTS!

While young Hatters Harry and Jack are loaned to Non-League sides Chesham United and Hitchin Town.

Three players have departed Kenilworth Road in recent days – Josh McQuoid to kick-start his career elsewhere while two of the Town's young players, Harry Isted and Jack James, have moved on loan to Non-League clubs to gain experience.

Former Northern Ireland international forward McQuoid had his Kenilworth Road contract cancelled by mutual agreement on Friday, and subsequently joined Vanarama National League high-flyers Aldershot Town.

The former Northern Ireland international had been on the transfer list since the end of last season after finishing the 2016-17 campaign on loan at Stevenage.

### SKY CAMERAS HERE FOR BARNET!

The Hatters' Sky Bet League Two match at home to Barnet in March has been selected for live coverage by Sky Sports in the latest batch of EFL televised matches announced last Friday.

As a result, the kick-off time for the fixture on Saturday 24th March has been put back to 5.15pm.

The north London side's visit to Kenilworth Road is the first time the Town have been screened live this season, and this means that unfortunately our overseas subscribers to iFollow Hatters will NOT receive a live video stream of that particular game.

Audio commentary from Simon Pitts will, however, be available as usual to both domestic and overseas subscribers.

The game is one of two fourth tier fixtures selected for live coverage during the international break weekend, with our promotion rivals Notts County's trip to Chesterfield screened the following day – Sunday 25th March – at 1.30pm.

He had spent most of the first half of this term on loan at National League side Torquay, but scored once for the Town in the Checkatrade Trophy draw with Tottenham U21s and then made another substitute's appearance in the same competition against Peterborough last month after returning from Plainmoor.

The former Bournemouth and Millwall man departed with a Hatters record of eight goals in 45 appearances – and the best wishes for his future career from all at the club.

Young goalkeeper Isted joined Non-League side Chesham United on a one-month youth loan and kept a clean sheet on his debut in the 0-0 Evo-Stik South Premier

Division draw at Royston Town 11 days ago, before helping them to successive wins over Gosport and Bishop's Stortford.

The 20-year-old arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer, following his release by Premier League side Stoke City, to provide back-up for Marek Stech and James Shea.

Isted, who has featured in development squad friendlies and Beds FA Senior Cup matches, as well as appearing on the bench in the Checkatrade Trophy for the Town, will be in line for valuable game time during his spell with the Generals as they look to break into the play-off places.

James, another of the Town's talented youngsters, moved to the same Step 3 division on a temporary basis by joining Hitchin Town on work experience.

The right-back, who turned 18 last week, has linked up with our Hertfordshire neighbours Hitchin Town, who are mid-table but also within touching distance of the top seven.

Good luck to both Hatters youngsters in their time out on loan, although they continue to train with the Town on a daily basis.

Striker Aaron Jarvis, meanwhile, has returned to Kenilworth Road after completing his month on loan at National League side Boreham Wood.





**WHO?** Paul Tisdale's Grecians got out of the blocks quickly this season, winning seven of their opening eight league games. However, stuttering form since then has seen them win back-to-back league games just twice, although victories over the likes of Accrington, Coventry and Notts County shows their ability to turn up for the big games, and they remain strong candidates for automatic promotion. As we saw when the Town travelled to the south-west in October, their St James Park stadium is currently being redeveloped and as a result, their capacity has dropped to just over 6,000. They had 5,638 at their recent FA Cup tie with West Brom, when – like the Hatters – the Grecians exited at the third round stage to Premier League opposition.

**HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE:** Our meeting earlier on this season St James Park saw arguably the most deadly nine minutes from the Hatters this campaign, as goals from Dan Potts, Danny Hylton and Harry Cornick in a superb second half showing helped the Town on their way to a 4-1 win to reach the top of the League Two table for the first time this season. Of the 67 meetings between the two clubs, we have won 35, there have been 15 draws and the Grecians have triumphed 17 times.

**IN CHARGE:** Paul Tisdale is the longest serving manager in the EFL, only beaten by Arsene Wenger in English football when the Premier League is taken into account.

The Frenchman has ten years on Tisdale's record at the helm, but the Grecians boss is five years ahead of third-placed Jim Bentley at Morecambe. The former Southampton and Yeovil Town midfielder took over at St James Park in 2006 and has overseen two promotions – from the Conference to League One through two consecutive promotions in 2008 and '09 – and one relegation, back down to League Two in 2012. They went close to going up again last season, reaching the play-off

final after overcoming Carlisle United in the semis thanks to a very late Jack Stacey goal, but lost in the Wembley final to the Hatters' conquerors, Blackpool.

**PREVIOUS FORM** Currently sixth in the table, Exeter have won four of their last six league matches and have produced two excellent wins in a row against promotion rivals since being knocked out of the FA Cup. They beat Coventry 1-0 at home before upsetting second-placed Notts County 2-1 at Meadow Lane ten days ago, with 14-goal top scorer Jayden Stockley on target.

**KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU** Town right back Jack Stacey was a hit whilst on loan at St James Park last season, making 38 appearances and scored his only goal of the season as mentioned above to make it 6-5 on aggregate in Exeter's favour. Town midfielder Lawson D'Ath played eight times for the Devon side during a loan from Reading in 2013, scoring once, while the Grecians' current top scorer Jayden Stockley had a spell on loan at Kenilworth Road from Bournemouth, netting three times in 13 appearances during 2014-15.






# WELCOME WYCOMBE WANDERERS

The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to tonight's visiting staff, players and supporters of Wycombe Wanderers.

One of a number of sides to have missed out on a place in the top seven on the final day of last season, the Chairboys are certainly mounting a serious push this campaign for one of those top spots, currently in fourth place.

Just a point short back in May, they now sit in a tightly congested pack with 11th place still within reaching distance of second. Their chances of keeping pace with the sides around them was taken away at weekend, as their would-be opponents Coventry played MK Dons in the fourth round of the Emirates FA Cup.

What they certainly have over last season is a sharper attack. Just six league goals short of their entire tally for the last league campaign – currently on 52 – the Chairboys had netted the second highest amount of goals in the division, after the Hatters, going into the weekend.

Adebayo Akinfenwa leads the goal scoring charts for Wycombe this season with 14 goals to his name, but a summer signing who Town supporters will certainly recognise is Craig Mackail-Smith. Macca has been directly involved in 12 goals since his arrival at Adams Park – with nine goals and three assists – adding promotion know-how as well as having nearly 600 career appearances under his belt.

His time at Kenilworth Road never quite reached the heights he had achieved throughout his career, as a leg break in March 2016 curtailed his first season here and massively impacted his second, leading to a loan at Peterborough United before his contract expired with the Hatters last summer.

The Chairboys have fairly recent experience of League One football having been promoted to the third tier in 2009 and 2011, although both of those campaigns ended in relegation.

Manager of Wanderers now for over five years, Gareth Ainsworth has had mixed finishes at Adams Park. This no



more apparent than in the 2013-14 campaign when his side avoided relegation on goal difference, before finishing in the play-off places

the following season. Ainsworth was a midfielder in his playing days, turning out for the likes of Lincoln City, Port Vale and QPR, as well as the side he currently manages.

Prior to his appointment as boss at Adams Park, the 44-year-old had brief stints as caretaker manager at Loftus, where he built up his reputation as a coach, before taking over the reins at Wycombe in 2012.

Town took all three points in our last meeting, with James Collins scoring deep into injury time to secure a 2-1 at Adams Park back in September, after skipper Scott Cuthbert had netted a 90th-minute equaliser. Of the 24 meetings between the two, the Hatters have won 11, drawing nine and only losing four.

A former Wales Under-21, Jacobson joined Wycombe in 2014. The 31-year-old

started off with hometown club Cardiff City, coming through the youth ranks and making two first team appearances for the

Bluebirds. He also enjoyed loan spells with Accrington Stanley and Bristol Rovers before joining the latter permanently in 2007. He then went onto Oldham Athletic and Shrewsbury Town, winning promotion from League Two alongside our own James Collins in 2011-12, before moving to Adams Park in 2014. The left-back has played over 150 times for the Chairboys.



## THE MAN IN THE MIDDLE

### SAM SAUNDERS

An experienced midfielder who has played across the EFL, the 34-year-old counts the Chairboys as the sixth club he

has pulled on a shirt for. Starting out with Welling United in 2000, Saunders joined Ashford Town in 2003, before climbing up the pyramid with Carshalton Athletic and then Dagenham & Redbridge, where he won promotion to the EFL in 2007. That earned him a move to Brentford, which yielded another promotion as the Bees went up to the Championship. He joined Wycombe a year ago on an 18-month deal.

## THE DANGERMAN

### ADEBAYO AKINFENWA

'The Beast' has been a regular goalscorer in the third and fourth tier for the past 14 years, and even at the age of

35, is proving to be a threat more than ever. With 14 goals prior to the weekend's action, he could potentially break the 20-goal barrier this season – something he hasn't managed in his career yet. # THE VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD



**JONNY KING**, a Wycombe Wanderers supporter of 19 years, gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team this season in Sky Bet League Two and this evening on their visit to Kenilworth Road, as well as his top XI players to ever pull on a shirt for the Chairboys...

## GENERAL ENQUIRIES:

**Right on the cusp of an automatic promotion spot this term, the Chairboys missed out on a play-off place last season, are you confident you can finish in the top seven this time around?**

Fairly confident, yes, but a lot depends on keeping our players fit. We have a small squad, with quite a few older and/or injury-prone players, and this has come back to bite us in recent seasons, with injuries and fatigue taking their toll and affecting our form towards the end of the season. Despite losing a few key players to injury in recent weeks, we've stayed in the play-off places and are keeping pace with the teams in the automatic spots. With a bit of luck, I think we're looking good to stay up there.

**Adebayo Akinfenwa is still delivering the goods at the age of 35. How important has he been for your push up the table this season?**

We certainly wouldn't be where we are without him. The season before he arrived we'd struggled for goals and it was clear we needed someone to lead the line. I was sceptical when he signed, as I thought he was past it. But we play to his strengths, as we have players like Joe Jacobson and Sam Saunders who can provide him with good quality deliveries. He's the focal point of our attack and even when he doesn't score, he's creating opportunities for others.

**Gareth Ainsworth has been in charge at Adams Park for over five years. Is he the man to take you up?**

Yes. He makes mistakes now and then, but as a fairly young manager he is still learning and he has coped admirably with the considerable financial constraints placed upon him. Four years ago, the club was in danger of going down a black hole, but Ainsworth has spearheaded a stunning revival and promotion to League One would be a fitting reward. His capacity to inspire and motivate players, his eye for young talent, his ability to reenergise older players and his general enthusiasm and commitment for the job have completely turned this club around, both on and off the pitch.

**Who were you most pleased to see remain at the club over the summer?**


Anthony Stewart had a superb season alongside Aaron Pierre in central defence and with them both out of contract in the summer, there was serious concern among many Wycombe fans that we could lose them both on free transfers. Pierre did leave in the end, but Stewart, arguably the better of the two, thankfully signed a new deal. I was also pleased to see long-serving midfielder Matt Bloomfield get a new deal to take him to 14 years at Adams Park.

**Out of your January transfer signings who are you most looking forward to seeing in action?**

With little cash to spend, Ainsworth has been limited to making just three loan signings; right-back Tafari Moore from Arsenal, centre-back Nathan McGinley from Middlesbrough and striker Randall Williams from Watford. McGinley and Moore made their debuts in our match against Colchester and whilst McGinley did a good job in a patched-up defence, it was Moore who really caught the eye with a confident, rampaging display down the right flank. His pace, technique and desire to attack make him an absolute joy to watch.

**Craig Mackail-Smith joined you guys in the summer after two seasons with us, and by the looks of things he's a hit. How impressed have you been with Macca?**

He's been an inspired signing. I was worried that his past injury problems could have taken their toll on him, but he looks fit and sharp and has a turn of pace that you wouldn't expect from someone approaching their 34th birthday. He's taken some of the burden off Bayo up front, with nine goals already this season, but I've also been impressed by his overall work-rate. He's usually played out wide and has shown great stamina and intelligence in that position, but he also tracks back and helps out the midfield, which is essential to our energetic style of play.

He helped them to win promotion and the Hitachi Cup that season, then starred in their 1986-87 Vauxhall-Opel League title and 1992-93 Conference title triumphs. Twice voted 'Player of the Year' he netted 122 goals in 281 League games for the Chairboys before joining Slough Town in July 1994. Later with Farnborough Town, he then managed Thame United.

## KEITH SCOTT

Striker Keith Scott was Wycombe Wanderers' top scorer three times including their 1992-93 Conference title and FA Trophy 'double' success. He had spells with Leicester United and Lincoln City prior to joining



Wycombe in March 1991, scoring in that season's FA Trophy final triumph. Moving to Swindon Town in November 1993, he then played for Stoke City and Norwich City before rejoining the Chairboys in March 1997. He netted 74 goals in 159 League games overall prior to joining Reading in March 1999, then played for Colchester United, Dover, Scarborough, Leigh RMI, Dagenham & Redbridge and Windsor & Eton.

## STEVE GUPPY



England Semi-Pro winger Steve Guppy starred in Wycombe Wanderers' 1992-93 Conference title and FA Trophy 'double' triumph. A former Southampton trainee, he joined Wycombe in August 1989 and featured in their 1991 FA Trophy final success. He was a key figure in the Chairboys' 1993-94 Third Division play-off final triumph and netted 25 goals in 178 League games before joining Newcastle United in August 1994. Moving via Port Vale to Martin

## STEVE BROWN


Versatile left-sided midfielder Steve Brown was 'Player of the Year' when Wycombe Wanderers finished sixth in the Second Division in 1994-95. He began with hometown club Northampton in August 1983 and had a spell with Irthingborough Diamonds before rejoining the Cobblers in July 1989. Top scorer in 1992-93, he joined Wycombe in February 1994, helping them win promotion in 1993-94 and reach the FA Cup semi-finals in 2000-01. He netted 35 goals in 371 League games prior to joining their coaching staff in June 2004. Later QPR's youth team boss, then Everton's national Academy scout, he is now a talent recruiter for Adidas.

## DAVE CARROLL

Long-serving favourite Dave Carroll was Wycombe Wanderers' 'Player of the Year' in 1995-96. He impressed with Ruislip Manor prior to joining Wycombe in July 1988 and was ever-present in 1989-90, then featured in the 1990-91 FA Cup run. Helping the Chairboys win the FA Trophy in 1991, he starred in their 1992-93 Conference title and FA Trophy 'double' success and scored twice in the 1993-94 Third Division play-off final triumph. He was an FA Cup

semi-finalist in 2000-01 and moved to Aldershot in March 2002. Later Windsor & Eton's player-boss, he is now manager of self storage firm Space Station.

## MARTIN TAYLOR



Goalkeeper Martin Taylor was ever-present as Wycombe Wanderers reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 2000-01. Starting with Mile Oak Rovers, he joined Derby County in July 1986 and understudied Peter Shilton and Steve Sutton. He was ever-present 'Player of the Year' as the Rams qualified for the First Division play-offs in 1993-94. Reuniting with John Gregory at Wycombe in March 1997, he was ever-present again in 2001-02 and 'Player of the Year' in three successive seasons. He played 238 League games, moving to Telford United in July 2003, then Burton Albion, becoming Derby's goalkeeping coach.

## NATHAN TYSON

Ex-England youth striker Nathan Tyson was Wycombe Wanderers' leading marksman and 'Player of the Year' in 2004-05. A former Reading trainee, he turned professional in March 2000 but failed to secure a regular first-team slot and was loaned



to Swansea City and Cheltenham Town, before moving to Wycombe in January 2004. He netted 42 goals in 78 League outings prior to joining Nottingham Forest for £675,000 in November 2005. Helping the Reds to qualify for the League One play-offs in 2006-07 and win promotion in 2007-08, he has since appeared for Derby County, Blackpool, Doncaster, Kilmarnock and Wycombe again.

## ROGER JOHNSON


Central defender Roger Johnson was captain and 'Player of the Year' when Wycombe Wanderers qualified for the League Two play-offs in 2005-06. He turned professional with Wycombe in July 2001 and missed just one match in 2005-06, netting 19 goals in 157 League games before joining Cardiff City for £275,000 in July 2006. A key figure as they reached the FA Cup final in 2008, he moved to Birmingham City for £5m in June 2009. He featured in their 2011 League Cup final triumph and was sold to Wolves for £7m in July 2011, since playing for Charlton Athletic, FC Pune City, Charlton again and Bromley.

## TOMMY DOHERTY

Northern Ireland international midfielder Tommy Doherty was 'Player of the Year' when Wycombe


Wanderers reached the League Cup semi-finals in 2006-07. Signing professional for Bristol City in July 1997, he featured in their 2003 LDV Vans Trophy final triumph and moved to QPR in June 2005. He joined Wycombe on loan in September 2006, then returned in October 2007. Helping to qualify for the League Two play-offs in 2007-08 and win promotion in 2008-09, he scored twice in 96 League games overall, joining Ferencvaros in January 2010, then Bradford City, Newport, Bath City and Exeter City.

## CRAIG WOODMAN



Consistent left-back Craig Woodman was Wycombe Wanderers' 'Player of the Year' in two consecutive seasons. He turned professional with Bristol City in February 2000, helping them twice reach the Second Division play-offs and win promotion in 2006-07. Following loan spells at Mansfield Town and Torquay United, he joined Wycombe in August 2007 and featured prominently as they qualified for the League Two play-offs in 2007-08, then was ever-present as the Chairboys won promotion in 2008-09. He scored twice in 119 League games before joining Brentford in July 2010 and moved to Exeter City in July 2012.

I like Andrew Shinnie's – a bit of House music.


**Best initiation song?**



## JONES:

"It was one of those days. I wouldn't say it was ugly in terms of the manner, but we scored from a set-play and had to dig in. I am proud of them for doing that. # CLEAN SHEET KING!



**Keeper Marek Stech made a number of crucial saves in the Hatters' last outing at Kenilworth Road as they beat Morecambe 1-0 to move six points clear at the top of Sky Bet League Two.**

It also marked the Town's 13th league clean sheet of the season – a feat that took the whole of the last campaign for the Hatters to achieve. Stech increased that number to 14 with another shut-out in the win at Grimsby.

The Morecambe one didn't come easily though, as the Town were really tested by the Shrimps on a cold and wet afternoon at the Kenny.

Stech, who has now kept 16 clean sheets in all competitions, said: "It was a very difficult game and we knew what we were up against. With the conditions it wasn't going to be easy.

"In the warm-up it was snowing and icy, so we knew it was going to be difficult. I am just really happy about the result and the fact we kept another clean sheet.

"I managed to make a couple of saves, but that's why I am there. The last couple of games we've conceded a few goals, which we've been really disappointed about, so I am really pleased that we gave a great response after the Chesterfield game.

"We worked hard and Mully scored a very good goal, so it's been an excellent day at the office."

The result came on the back of a couple of difficult games for the Czech Republic international, but he believes this has made him mentally stronger and Nathan Jones' confidence in him has built up his confidence by continuing to play him.

"That's a massive relief for me that he still feels I'm important for this football club and I've got his backing, so I'm really happy," Stech continued.

"We had a chat and he said, 'It's been two games, so get your head down, train hard, do your basics' – and obviously this week it really paid off."

Although the game against Jim Bentley's side was a tough encounter, it certainly highlighted the Town's ability to score against teams who are difficult to break down – something Stech believes will help the Hatters in their search for promotion.

He said: "I think these kind of games are the most important games and that's what the gaffer said in the changing room afterwards.

"He said that last year we would have lost these games, so I'm really glad this year we can see the games out. We've got more experience, more experienced players, we're maybe cleverer than last year.

"Obviously I wasn't here, but judging on what the gaffer's been saying, I think this kind of game – hard conditions, very difficult side, loads of balls in the box – would have been one that we'd have slipped up in.

"It is these games that will win you the league and get you the promotions."

## JOHNNY ON THE SPOT TO SEAL SHRIMPS WIN

Johnny Mullins was over the moon with the 1-0 win over Morecambe last time out at Kenilworth Road – as he used his “big head” to secure a huge three points for the Hatters!

Mullins met Olly Lee’s inswinging free-kick with an emphatic 64th-minute header to secure the points for the Town with a more conventional scoreline than we’ve seen on other occasions at the Kenny this season.

It was the centre-half’s second goal of the campaign, following his header in the 1-1 draw with Notts County in early December, and the 32-year-old said: “There was one in the first half where Olly’s put a great cross in and I was on my heels a bit, and Joaquin has been on at me about just getting across people.

“I’ve made the run and Olly’s put it on a sixpence for me. All I’ve got to do is get the big head on it and thankfully it went in. There’s not many better feelings in football, so it was nice to get it.”

It was the Hatters’ 42nd home league goal of the season and although it didn’t have the excitement of the emphatic wins over Yeovil, Stevenage, Cambridge and Lincoln, Mullins believes the victory over the Shrimps could be every bit as significant – if not more so – in the Hatters’ overall season.

### SMILES

He said: “To win 1-0 and have another clean sheet for big Marek is nice. We extended the lead at the top of the league, so all-in-all it’s a great day at the office.

“This is the bread and butter. The sevens and eights don’t come around very often. When you have a couple, they’re never going to say it becomes the norm, but people may expect it to happen on a more regular basis. It’s League Two, though, and when the pitches are like that it’s not the case.

“So to get a win like that when our backs are up against the wall at some stages, and we needed big saves, leaves us all with smiles on our faces.”

The game was slightly marred early on when Town’s leading scorer and Mullins’ best mate, Danny Hylton, had to go off



with a hamstring problem. Although disappointed to see his old Rotherham and Oxford team-mate depart the action after missing the previous week’s defeat at Chesterfield, Mullins believes the strength in the depth the Town have will be fine coping whilst the striker is absent.

### JOY

“We all know what Hylts brings, he sets the tempo for us,” Mullins continued. “I’m gutted for him but I thought Elliot came on and was a real livewire. We’ve got players who can step in with real quality to push us on.

“Harry Cornick, when he starts or when he comes on, gives us a different dimension to our game. He stretches teams and gets at them, and it’s a real joy when you’re running out and you see him running up the pitch – it means you can have a bit of a breather!”

"We wanted to come here and make sure we didn't get beaten, and we did that."



# WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS!

## PART FIFTEEN

In the summer of 1967, a 15-year-old Luton schoolboy decided to keep a comprehensive scrapbook of the forthcoming Division Four (now League Two) campaign.

It is easy to say now that he knew this was about to become one of the most glorious seasons in the club's history, but looking back it was merely the labours of a boy with too much time on his hands in the days before the internet, social media and mobile phones (or normal phones in his case).

Step back 50 years and let the boy who grew into club historian ROGER WASH remind us of the highs and lows of that ultimately successful 1967/68 season...

Although by the end of January the Town were awaiting their first win of 1968, they were still handily placed in third position in the table. The goals had dried up though and the defence was not looking as rock solid as it had done during the long winning run before Christmas.

Next up was a trip to lower mid-table Port Vale in a game re-arranged for a Friday evening to avoid a clash with Stoke, who were at home to Cardiff in the FA Cup.

In a dour game, the Town were not at their greatest with the easiest chances falling to Vale, who failed to beat Luton goalkeeper Tony Read – now back to his best having seen off manager Allan Brown's attempts to replace him.

In the circumstances a point away was not to be sniffed at but it came at a price with star forward Bruce Rioch limping off 15 minutes from the end with a recurrence of the knee injury suffered over Christmas.


As it turned out, Rioch was fit to return for the Town's trip to York on February 3rd where it was hoped that, given the

form of the second-from bottom hosts, a first victory of the year might be recorded.

Missing his first game since joining the club was Ian Buxton, who had rung Allan Brown the evening before the match complaining of a sore throat. Into his place stepped big money summer signing Rodney Green, who was still not completely match fit according to his manager.

Again the Town were out of sorts and were outplayed by lowly York, who squandered several good opportunities in the first half as the Hatters resorted to 'strong arm tactics'. Having weathered the storm, it was a major disappointment when the unmarked and unchallenged Tommy Ross netted for the Minstermen with the second period only four minutes old.

The Town failed to step up a gear and it was York who looked the more likely to score the next goal, and it was only the linesman's flag that prevented Ross from doubling the home sides lead.



# Luton hit top form in brilliant 4-1 win

LUTON came back to promotion-hunting form this afternoon with a spectacular 4-1 win over Rochdale at Kenilworth Road.

Luton brought back right winger Graham French, who was preferred to new signing Peter Denton.

Finally, the Town had a home game to look forward to with Rochdale the visitors to Kenilworth Road. But before that, an unexpected bombshell hit the club with trainer Dennis Evans, who had only been appointed the previous July, suddenly upping sticks stating that he was moving to a more lucrative post in South Africa.

The haste of the departure led to the rumour mill flowing freely, but whatever the true reason, manager Brown immediately appointed an old colleague (and Scot!) Doug Davidson as trainer, who moved from a similar position at Portsmouth.

Also during that week, Brown made enquiries for old Town favourite John O'Rourke, who was supposedly unsettled at Middlesbrough. If you have watched the O'Rourke interview from ten years ago on YouTube, then I think that Luton would have been the last place he would have wanted to go to!

With a week's rest, the Town were at full strength for the visit of Rochdale when a crowd of 10,400 turned up to see

the away side almost take the lead in the first minute, with only the outstretched legs of Read preventing the goal.


Shaken by this, the Town slowly grew into the game and it was a typical surging run from Rioch followed by a hammer shot that opened the scoring after 14 minutes. Rochdale were continuing to cause concerns to the Luton defence on the break, and levelled on 23 minutes through Joe Fletcher. But straight after, the Town regained the lead when Allen shot home after the ball bobbed around in the Rochdale area.

For the rest of the half the Town were rampant and certainly back to their formidable best. Graham French, who had quickly replaced new signing Peter Denton, was enjoying his finest game for ages and gave ex-Hatter John Reid the runaround, sending over a string of tantalising crosses which the Rochdale defence could not cope with.

Ian Buxton ended his lean spell in front of goal with a header on 38 minutes, and three minutes later skipper Terry Branston netted with an overhead-kick following a French corner.

The match petered out a little in the second half as there did not seem to be any urgency to add to the four-goal tally, but there was plenty of effort from Green, who had come on at the interval to replace Buxton, who was suffering from a groin strain.

With other results going the Town's way, the team was now up to second. A return to form was happening at just the right time.

## ACADEMY KIDS COOK UP A TREAT!

As Andy Awford refers to in his Academy update, Hatters head of education and welfare Dale Brunton has been organising special workshops for our young players.

Within the Academy, each age group receives two different Life Skills events each season which are aimed at developing the boys as individuals off the pitch as well as improving their performance on the pitch.

Pictured here is an example from just before Christmas, when the Under-11s enjoyed a three-hour nutrition and cooking workshop at Central Beds College in Dunstable, where they received information on diet, and how it links to sports performance.

As part of the session, the players also helped cook a healthy three-

course meal which included mackerel starter, chicken with rice, fruit and nuts and fruit pavlova desert. Parents/guardians were then invited in to eat the meal, which was served by the college's catering students.

Other Life Skills events include online safety, cardiac health, first aid, social media guidance and car maintenance, and Dale said: "The Life Skills programme is something new that the Academy introduced last season, as we see it as being vital that the boys develop holistically whilst they are with us.

"Obviously their football skills are developed during training and matches, but the softer skills are something that we are also keen to develop during their time within the Academy.

"Some of the U11 players had never cooked before, so it was great to give them insight into how food is prepared, cooked and served, and how this can relate to a healthy lifestyle off the pitch, and a better performance on it."




