

THE MANAGER

NATHAN JONES

Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for another massive game in our quest to secure promotion from Sky Bet League Two, with Crawley Town the visitors.

I would like to welcome everyone who has made the journey around the M25 from an area of the country I know well having spent much of my career in Sussex with Brighton.

As well as manager Harry Kewell, his staff, their players and club officials, I extend that welcome to the Crawley supporters who have followed their team, and I wish them all a safe trip home after the game.

As was the case when Exeter came here last time out – and Wycombe, Morecambe, Lincoln, Grimsby and Notts County before them – Crawley are a team currently on an excellent run of form. We know from our goalless draw down at the Checkatrade Stadium in October that this will be a real tough test for us, but we are in good shape ourselves.

Of course, we were disappointed not to bring all three points back from Stevenage on Saturday. When you score in the 85th minute you back yourselves to win the game, and that is something we've been right on top of in recent times, with three 1-0 wins in four matches before the weekend.

Unfortunately that wasn't the case at the Lamex Stadium, but we know that Stevenage is a tough place to go, especially in the difficult conditions we encountered on Saturday, and we all see it as a positive point towards the ultimate goal of winning automatic promotion this season.

In that last game here at Kenilworth Road, we once more showed the character we have within the dressing room by winning the fixture immediately after a defeat, and some of the football we played in that win over Exeter was top drawer.

With a bit more of a clinical edge we could have scored more than the one goal we got from Harry Cornick, who was a threat throughout the game, but I was delighted with how we responded to the Wycombe set-back.

We saw in that victory how we added even more character, quality and depth to the squad on transfer deadline day with Flynn Downes impressing in midfield, Jake Jervis carrying a threat up front and Lloyd Jones coming on in the closing stages to help us secure three valuable points.

ATMOSPHERE

All three lads have settled in well and will only help us as we now find ourselves in the final three months of the season, while some of the younger members of the squad will go out on loan to gain valuable experience of senior football, as Frankie Musonda has with Oxford City in the last few days.

Finally, thank you once again for such wonderful support both here in the Exeter game – when the atmosphere was electric as ever – and at Stevenage on Saturday when almost 2,000 of you filled the away end behind the goal.

Yes, it's a local one, but you've proved throughout the season that you cover the miles in support of your team, and we all appreciate the money you spend and time you devote to the cause.

Enjoy the game.



FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE GARY SWEET

Good evening one and all to Kenilworth Road for tonight's League Two fixture against Crawley Town. Whilst this "wintry cold February night game against the 'other' red devils" doesn't necessarily stimulate one's romantic imagination for most, it's a game I've been very much looking forward to.

It will certainly be a game that I can be confident will be a million miles from that mind-numbingly horrific encounter we had the great misfortune to experience on Saturday, alongside two thousand other Luton supporters!

Welcome to all from Crawley Town; their players, staff, officials and, most importantly, supporters. There are many similarities between tonight's opponents and Saturday's. Both considered as 'new clubs' (despite Crawley's 120-year history), both rising from the Conference (as it was then) in our early years of dropping into it, and both with a 'chequered' recent history of popularity with our supporters, mainly encouraged by controversial managers and with us having a bit of a bogey reputation with them over recent seasons – until this.

I'm happy to say though that Crawley are deservedly earning their plaudits, certainly in the way they are trying to play and claim an identifiable mark in the game. I have built a very good relationship with their director of football, Selim Gaygusuz – one of the Turkish representatives of the Club's custodians – whose opinion I respect and, together with the board, were correct in giving Harry Kewell more time than many other Clubs have given their managers to find their feet. Something which Harry has clearly done now.

Stephen Browne commented to me on Saturday, "How is it we seem to always play the opposition when they're in their best form of the season?". Without checking the statistics of this perception, it certainly does appear to be accurate as we face the division's top recent performers tonight and whose excellent recent run has given them a beady eye on a play-off position.

Regardless of that, we are top of the league for good reason. We may have mis-fired a little at times recently,

but this is understandable with so many absences of key leaders in the team (Cuthbert, Hylton, Sheehan, Mullins, McCormack and Lee to name a few) and playing in some freakishly windy conditions and on some surfaces that only arable freeholders would be proud of. I know it is supposed to be the same for all teams, but it's in such games when we need our leaders on the pitch, which we have sorely missed.

Despite that, we have bolstered our resources by having another very good transfer window meeting our objective of strengthening the squad without losing any key players, which we duly accomplished – not that it was all plain-sailing, I should add! January is a horrific window where the treacherous traps and pitfalls are generally more common than the opportunities it presents, and with 80 per cent of the month's trading happening on the last day.

We're very pleased with how we came out of it having signed two very good long-term, permanent players and one highly-rated loanee. Welcome to Luton Town Jake, Lloyd and Flynn. All three lads and their representatives were a pleasure to get signed and introduce into the fold. All three will require a little patience from you too, as they find their feet in the Lutopian culture and raise their fitness levels to our bar of expectation.

In addition to our expenditure of a total value approaching £200,000 in January, we managed to avoid letting any of our top players go despite receiving bids in total of over £2.5m placed in respect of a few players. There were a variety of reasons for these decisions.

For most, retaining the services of these players was important because we strongly felt we needed to keep the squad together for the all-important run-in, especially

as injuries have taken their toll and could continue to do so. For others, however, it may be a different reason. We generally accept that if a player develops more quickly than the Club is able to, we are more than happy to help them progress to the right opportunity, at the right time, receiving the right amount of compensation without it negatively impacting our season. We generally work hard to help this process if the inevitable situation is upon us but, alas, this couldn't happen in January. In any case, none of these decisions will affect the long-term aspirations of any player.

Adding three players without loss does bloat the squad to an uncomfortable level, though – or it certainly will when our injured and suspended start to return. Consequently, it's good to see Frankie Musonda, Harry Isted and Jack James get valuable game-time out on loan with others soon to follow.

February, for us, is also a time when we begin the process of securing and extending the contracts of some existing players for the longer term and this process is ongoing positively as we speak.

So, as we have entered the final third of the season the same two principal goals remain potentially alive for us all; promotion to League One and a receipt of a planning consent by the Local Council.

On this latter aim, I can only apologise for not giving more updates recently, however, I'm sure you all understand that as we are now in the final technical throes of the process there is little we can do or say other than wait. Naturally, we are working tirelessly (and sometimes sleeplessly) to respond to the various technical cross-examinations thrown our way,

which of course, we're able to and happy to respond to.


Indeed, there is very little now we can possibly answer given that everything should now have been reviewed in detail, other than one small but important final document which can only be issued once everything else has been.

In March – week commencing 13th to be precise – 2020 will be very well-represented at MIPIM in Cannes (the event where we won two acclaimed architectural awards last year) – an important global property exhibition where partnerships are created and deals are done. We have politely asked the Council to be mindful of the fact that visiting Cannes at great expense without having a planning decision after twenty months of consideration will create a not insignificant delay in progressing with the project. Indeed, the inability to be able to trade at MIPIM will not only hamper our progress but the progress of the town itself!

We fully understand and appreciate that planning officers must be meticulous in their considerations, but we have been very patient, as helpful as any developer could be and have been swift in responding to any questions or challenges. I'm beginning to find it unfathomable how something so positive and already so detailed upon submission can take so long.

It will be incredibly disappointing (and costly) if we were to miss this key timeframe and I have urged our Council, as far as I am possibly able, to give us the ammunition to begin the process of making this dream a reality.

Right here, right now, for both the development of our town and Club, we could be lucky enough to be celebrating two major events



this season and you can play a fundamental role. Your voices need to be heard on the stands and terraces and may still need to be heard if our applications get challenged after determination. Let's not lose these opportunities – be loud and proud by make yourselves heard starting tonight to spur the team on to three points!

COLLO CALLS FOR COOL HEADS DURING RUN-IN

STRIKER SAYS PROMOTION EXPERIENCE WITHIN TOWN DRESSING ROOM WILL HELP THE HATTERS

James Collins netted his 14th goal in a Luton Town shirt in the 1-1 draw at Stevenage at the weekend – and ahead of tonight's game against his former club Crawley, the striker called for his team-mates to use all their promotion-winning experience to see the Hatters over the League Two line.

With 14 games to go, that point helped the Hatters move ten ahead of fourth-placed Notts County as they look to secure one of the three automatic spots by the first Saturday in May.

Collins, 27, is aiming to win a fourth promotion from the EFL's fourth tier in a career that has already seen him go up to League One with Shrewsbury, twice, and Northampton Town.

CONFIDENCE

After seeing Stevenage hit back with a late equaliser to cancel out his penalty opener at the Lamex Stadium on Saturday, the forward said: "We are gutted in there. When you nick a goal with 85 minutes gone, you fancy yourselves to see the game out, but it wasn't to be.

"Results elsewhere have gone for us today though, so it could turn out to be a good point. It definitely helps having another game so quickly. We're back at Kenilworth Road on Tuesday and we go into that game full of confidence.

"It wasn't the prettiest of games today, but I think Tuesday will be a completely different game and we go into it looking to go and get another three points."

On that run-in, with the Town now well into the final third of the fixture list, he added: "There are numerous leaders in the dressing room, not just myself.

"There's loads of promotions in the dressing room and we are all coming together, trying to put our heads together and make sure we see this over the line.

"Today you either look at it as two points dropped or a point closer to getting promotion, and if we go and win on Tuesday, I'd say it's another point closer to promotion."



Last season Collins netted 22 goals in all competitions for tonight's visitors as they finished sixth-from-bottom in League Two under Dermot Drummy, who sadly passed away last November.

The Red Devils are currently on a good run of form under former Leeds and Liverpool winger Harry Kewell and are now within sight of the play-offs themselves after seven wins in their last eight matches.

The Hatters had to settle for a point down in Sussex in October, and Collins said: "They are doing really well. It was a difficult game down at their place. They've picked up some form and it won't be an easy game, but we are at home and we are confident that we can cause problems.

"He (Kewell) has brought a few in, but the majority of the lads I played with are still there. I still keep in contact with a couple of them and they enjoy it there, working under him, so we'll see how good they are on Tuesday."



HATTERS HOST WADERS IN BEDS FA SENIOR CUP FINAL

After winning 1-0 in the semi-final at Bedford Town last Tuesday night, the Hatters will host Biggleswade Town in the final of the Beds FA Senior Cup next month.

The final against the Evo-Stik South Premier Division Waders, who beat Biggleswade FC in a penalty shoot-out, will take place at Kenilworth Road on Monday 26th March, with a 7.30pm kick-off.

The Main Stand and Enclosure will be open on the night, with entrance via the Maple Road Bridge turnstiles and the Press gate at the Kenilworth Road end of the ground. Admission will be

£8 for adults and £3 for over 60s and under 16s.

The Hatters youngsters have reached the final by winning 3-0 at Arlesey Town and 4-1 at Barton Rovers before Frankie Musonda netted an injury-time winner at The Eyrle.

Biggleswade Town, who are currently just below mid-table in their Step 3 division, knocked out Kempston

Rovers (4-1) and Leighton Town (1-0), before edging past their Spartan South Midlands League tenants at the Carlsberg Stadium after a 1-1 draw in 90 minutes.

Reece Fielding netted their goal inside normal time, then with former Hatters keeper Liam Gooch saving Biggleswade FC's first spot-kick in the shoot-out, it enabled them to progress to the final 5-3 on penalties.



YOUTH TEAM OFF TO OXFORD

The Hatters youth team will travel to Oxford United in the Southern Area final of the EFL Youth Alliance Cup next month.

Like the Town Under-18s in their semi-final victory at Cheltenham last month, Oxford needed penalties to overcome Exeter City ten days ago.

The winners of the game, which will take place on Saturday 31st March, will then face the victors of the Northern Area Final between Wigan Athletic and Hartlepool United.

This is the third season in a row that the Town have played in the regional final, beating Swindon Town in 2015-16 before going on to win the national title against Shrewsbury. Last year they lost in the southern final at AFC Bournemouth.

ENGLISH SCHOOLS FA V REPUBLIC OF IRELAND

Don't forget that there will be international football on offer at Kenilworth Road on Friday 16th March, when the English Schools FA Under-18s host the Republic of Ireland in the Centenary Shield – kick-off 7pm.

The Hatters were due to be playing at Newport County the same night when the international was first announced, but with our league fixture now having reverted to Saturday March 17th, we hope some Town fans will take the opportunity to see what promises to be an exciting match at the Kenny!

Tickets will be priced at £8 for adults and £5 for concessions (age 65-plus and Under-18), while schools will be able to apply for group booking discounts of £5 adults and £3 for school pupils, with one adult going free with every group of 10 children booked.

Look out for an announcement next week about how tickets can be obtained.

FRANKIE GOES TO OXFORD CITY ON LOAN


Young Hatters defender Frankie Musonda has joined Vanarama National League South side Oxford City on a one-month youth loan.



Musonda, who captained the Town youth team to a league and cup double success and on a run to the FA Youth Cup quarter-finals in 2015-16, will link up with his team-mate from that side, Craig King, the goalkeeper who left Kenilworth Road last summer and has recently started playing again.

He will also work under former Hatters player and academy coach Joe Deeney, who is assistant-manager at Court Place Farm.

Our next game isn't for another ten days, when we welcome Cheltenham Town to Kenilworth Road...

WHO? Promoted in the 2015-16 season from the National League, they were the first club in 27 years to achieve the feat of bouncing straight back up as champions after relegation from the EFL – they managed it with 101 points. The Robins avoided relegation by just four points as they finished 21st in Sky Bet League Two last season with a poor run of form from late October through to the New Year putting them in danger of slipping back down to the fifth tier.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE Our last meeting came in mid-November when, after Dan Potts' opener had been cancelled out, Elliot Lee put the Town in the lead late on only for the Robins to equalise with what was essentially the last kick of the game. Of the 12 games between the two sides, the Hatters have won three, drawn six and lost three.

IN CHARGE Ex-Peterborough United, Northampton Town and Yeovil Town boss Gary Johnson has been in charge at Whaddon Road since March 2015, when he couldn't prevent the Robins' relegation from League Two, but then masterminded their immediate return to the division. One of the 61-year-old's greatest achievements was guiding the Glovers to the Championship via the League One play-offs, at one point going on a run of eight consecutive League One wins. Father of Bristol City boss Lee Johnson, the Robins manager boasts a win record of 42 per cent with nearly 1,000 games as a boss under his belt.

PREVIOUS FORM Cheltenham moved up to 14th in the table on Saturday with their biggest win of the season, beating Port Vale 5-1 to record their first home victory in two months. Leading scorer Mohamed Eisa netted a hat-trick to take his tally to 15 for the season - his first in professional football after being signed from Greenwich Borough - as the Robins brought an end to a four-match winless run in fine style.



KNOWING ME KNOWING YOU The Hatters and the Robins have had a number of players represent both teams over the years. Former Town midfielder Jake Gray had a short loan spell with Cheltenham in 2015 making four appearances, whilst Asa Hall – who had been with Cheltenham since 2014 until the summer when he moved to National League outfit Barrow – made 89 appearances for the Town, scoring 16 goals. Amari Morgan-Smith made 48 appearances for Town, netting 18 times in a two season spell between 2010-12. He made his loan to York City a permanent deal in the summer. The only current player in either squad to have played for both clubs is new Hatters defender Lloyd Jones, who made six appearances for Cheltenham on loan from Liverpool in 2015.

WELCOME CRAWLEY TOWN

The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to tonight's visiting staff, players and supporters of Crawley Town.

After a slow start under first time manager Harry Kewell, the Red Devils looked set for a relegation scrap and Kewell finding himself under a bit of early pressure. However, players returning from injury and the former Australia international getting his message across has seen the Checkatrade Stadium outfit go on a tremendous run – which if they maintain, could see them finish in a play-off place, or even higher.

Seven defeats in their opening 11 league games didn't bode well, but only five losses in their following 21 fixtures, including a recent run of seven wins in their last eight matches, has seen them shoot up the table to within four points of seventh.

Ex-Leeds United, Liverpool and Galatasaray forward Kewell took over at Crawley in the summer after leaving his job as Under-23 boss at Watford, becoming the first Australian to manage an English Football League side. He was appointed after the departure of Dermot Drummy, who sadly passed away back in November.

Kewell's side's recent form saw him nominated for Sky Bet League Two Manager of the Month for January, as they won four of their five outings. The award however was picked up by Wycombe Wanderers' Gareth Ainsworth.

The Red Devils brought in strikers Panutche Camara and Thomas Verheydt over the summer, but Enzio Boldewijn –

who has been at the club since 2016 – is the man who has been finding the back of the net regularly this season. His performances last month also saw him nominated for Player of the Month, and although he didn't win it, the 25-year-old has helped his team carry on their run of form, having defeated Chesterfield at the Proact Stadium at the beginning of February.

Crawley's climb up the football pyramid has been quite remarkable, having not made it into the EFL until 2011. Promotion as champions from the Conference that season was followed by another hugely successful campaign as they finished third in League Two, going up automatically to League One.

A three-season stay followed before relegation, with the Red Devils finishing in 20th and 19th in their two campaigns back in the fourth tier. Now-Hatters forward James Collins topped the scoring charts for Crawley last year, netting 22 times for them – including their only goal here in their last visit, which ended in a 2-1 win for the Town, courtesy of a Danny Hylton brace.

The last fixture between the Hatters and Crawley finished as a goalless draw back in October at the Checkatrade Stadium, which marked the second draw between the two clubs. Crawley have won six, and Town have been victorious three times in the other nine fixtures.

He has been the Reds' first choice keeper since his arrival, with the 34-year-old closing in on 80 appearances for them.

The Bolton Wanderers academy graduate is in his second spell at the Checkatrade Stadium. The 25-year-old

joined from Dutch second division side Almere City, where he made just over 100 appearances, scoring 18 times. He started off at Eredivisie side FC Utrecht, before a loan with Den Bosch, which was followed by the move to Almere in 2013. Six of his eight goals this season have directly contributed to four of the Reds' league wins.

Loans away from the Blues led to a permanent switch to Leyton Orient in 2009, where he spent four seasons before leaving for Stevenage. Smith played a single campaign at Boro before joining the Reds.

THE VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD

STEVE HERBERT, a Crawley Town supporter of 30 years, gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team this season in Sky Bet League Two, and this evening on their visit to Kenilworth Road, as well as his top XI players to ever pull on a shirt for the Red Devils...

GENERAL ENQUIRIES:

A few weeks ago you were nervously looking over your shoulders, but six wins in seven before the weekend has now got you looking towards the play-offs. What's changed at the Checkatrade Stadium?

The belief and confidence has all of a sudden kicked in amongst the players. Harry Kewell comes across as a very confident and composed guy. That confidence has now grown in the players and it's showing every time they step on to the pitch. Long may it continue.

The Red Devils have experienced League One football before. Is there a feeling around the club that with the openness of this division's promotion race, you can creep into the play-offs?

The play-offs would be a first for Crawley Town. In football you have to dream big, so why not? Although, after three poor seasons the main aim at the start of the season was for some League Two stability this time around. That goal has not changed.

Manager Harry Kewell was coming in for some criticism earlier in the campaign, but must surely have won supporters over with that recent run?

A couple of supporters, no names mentioned "Mitch & Kieran", threw a wobbly at Mr Kewell after a 4-0 defeat at Wycombe earlier in the season, which was well documented in the press at the time. That defeat and incident has turned out to be the turning point of our season. Harry and the two supporters in question deserve medals for turning our season around!

Karlan Ahearne-Grant netted on his debut at Chesterfield last week after signing on loan from Charlton as the only signing of the January transfer window. Was that a sign of Kewell being content with his squad?

The big thing is we didn't lose anyone during the window. Harry Kewell knows he has a decent squad at his disposal. As for Karlan Ahearne-Grant, he played like a League Two version of Lionel Messi at Chesterfield! He was absolutely

immense. Why Charlton have allowed such a talented player to go out on loan is beyond me.

And the club have stated that they turned down bids for several players during the window. How pleased were you to see everyone remain with important players like Josh Payne and Glen Morris signing new contracts?

It shows a bit of ambition from our Turkish owner that he wants to try and build for the future by keeping our better players. We have some quality footballers on our books who could easily play at a higher level. The fact other clubs have been sniffing around them is a sign the team is doing well. Josh Payne and Glenn Morris are big players for Crawley, it's great see them both sign new deals.



Which of his summer signings has impressed you most over the course of the season?

To be fair to Harry Kewell a lot of the signings were made before his arrival, but the return of club legend Dannie Bulman from AFC Wimbledon has given everyone a lift. He's been outstanding so far this season.

Honours have been even over the last two seasons with one win each last term and a goalless draw in Sussex earlier this season. Are you hopeful of a decent result today? What do you think the score will be?

I know Luton fans have called us their bogey team in recent seasons – we always seem to turn it on against you. Even your own fans admitted we should have won at the Checkatrade stadium back in October. It will be tough tonight, and obviously a point would be a superb result for us – 1-1 would do me.

Little Argentinian wizard scored a 90th-minute winning goal against

Derby County in a live televised third round FA Cup tie in 2011 which bought him instant club legend status.

CM: DANNIE BULMAN

Talking of club legends, the only player of the current squad that makes it in to my all-time Reds XI. Dannie joined the Reds in 2006. After a couple of brief affairs with Oxford and Wimbledon, Dannie returned to his spiritual home last summer.

CM: TONY VESSEY

Captained the Reds at the old Goldstone ground against his former club Brighton in the Cup third round in 1992. Another player that holds cult status amongst the older generation of Reds fans.

LM: JAMIE COOK

Totaled 100 games for Crawley between 2007 and 2011. A Steve Evans signing who played a massive part in getting us into the League. A very talented player who once scored from 40 yards v Oxford.

ST: MATT TUBBS

The man with more clubs than Tiger Woods! Scored 66 goals in 97 appearances and was also the main reason we went from Conference to League One in two years. Will always be loved by us!

ST: CRAIG WHITTINGTON

A prolific goalscorer for Crawley with 72 goals in 173 appearances between 1990-93, before Scarborough paid £50,000 for his services. Scored for fun in the Beazer Homes League back in the day.

TOP BOYS

DAVE HAINING

Versatile full-back Dave Haining gave Crawley Town magnificent service in various capacities. He played for Crawley United before moving to Town Mead in August 1965 and helped Crawley to win promotion in 1968-69. Ever-present in 1973-74, he netted 58 goals in 348 Southern League games prior to becoming the club's physio. He spent five spells as caretaker-boss/manager and had a testimonial match against Crystal Palace in 1994. Later the club secretary, he remained involved with the Red Devils until his death in May 2012, associated with the club for 47 years. Crawley's 'Player of the Year' award is named in his honour.

JOHN LEEDHAM

Long-serving central defender John Leedham was ever-present in Crawley Town's 1968-69 promotion

campaign. A former Fulham junior, he had a spell with Epsom & Ewell prior to joining Millwall in October 1962. He joined Walsall in May 1964, then appeared for Orient and Dartford before moving to Crawley in July 1968. Ever-present in three successive seasons, he helped take Exeter City to an FA Cup first round replay in 1971-72 and played 371 Southern League games until a knee injury ended his career in May 1980. He settled in Carshalton and ran the Norbury Bedding & Furniture Centre in South London.

VIC BRAGG

Versatile midfielder Vic Bragg starred in Crawley Town's 1968-69 promotion success. A former Fulham junior, he joined Crawley in August 1968 and was a key figure as they reached the FA Cup competition proper in two consecutive seasons, taking

Exeter City to a first round replay in 1971-72. He also featured in a defensive role and moved to Horsham in May 1975. Rejoining Crawley in September 1976, he netted 24 goals in 359 Southern League games overall before rejoining Three Bridges in May 1983. He was head of PE at Langley Green Middle School, since coaching England Schoolboys and Brighton's youth team.

JOHN MAGGS

John Maggs gave Crawley Town record service as goalkeeper, manager and chairman. A former Millwall junior, the England Schoolboy international moved via Herne Bay to Crawley in August 1963. He was ever-present in the 1968-69 promotion success and helped Crawley take Exeter City to an FA Cup first round replay in 1971-72. Joining Maidstone United in April 1973, he rejoined Crawley in July 1975 and played a club record 440 Southern League games. He managed Crawley to promotion in 1983-84, then was chairman. Later Horsham's manager for 11 years, he has since been Tonbridge Angels' general manager.

STEVE BREACH

Central defender Steve Breach was ever-present in Crawley Town's 1983-84 promotion campaign. He had spells with Arsenal, hometown club Brighton, Thanet United and Dover before joining Crawley in June 1977. Ever-present for the Red Devils in 1982-83, he skippered John Maggs'

side to third place in the Southern League Premier Division in 1984-85, the club's highest-ever finish at that time. He scored 25 goals in 354 Southern League games before becoming Three Bridges' player-manager in June 1987. Later assisting Horsham, Oakwood, Lewes, Wick and Broadbridge Heath, he is now employed as a transport manager.

CLIFF CANT

Long-serving midfielder Cliff Cant was an important figure in Crawley Town's 1983-84 promotion success. A former Arsenal apprentice, he turned professional in December 1977 but failed to secure a first-team slot and briefly followed Malcolm Macdonald to Fulham before playing for Norwegian side Harstad. He joined Crawley in July 1982 and followed Terry Robbins to Welling United in November 1986, rejoining Crawley five months later. Helping to twice win the Sussex Senior Cup, he played against Brighton in the 1991-92 FA Cup third round, then assisted Horsham and Carshalton. He now works in Post Office management.

TERRY ROBBINS

England Semi-Pro striker Terry Robbins was Crawley Town's leading scorer and 'Player of the Year' in 1984-85. A former Gillingham junior, he had a spell with Maidstone United before joining newly-promoted Crawley in July 1984. He was top scorer again in 1985-86, with a then record 33 goals, netting 60 times in 84 Southern League games prior to joining Welling United in October 1986. Topping their goalscoring charts in six successive seasons, he was twice 'Player of the Year' and became player-boss in November 1992. He moved to Barnet in

July 1995, then Boreham Wood, Cambridge City, Wisbech and Enfield.

TONY VESSEY

Inspirational central defender Tony Vessey was twice voted Crawley Town's 'Player of the Year'. A former Brighton apprentice, he turned professional in November 1979 and made his First Division debut in their 4-1 victory over Coventry City in March 1981. He joined Swedish side Vasalund in March 1982, then played for Steyning and Worthing before moving to Crawley in July 1987. Skipping them to the FA Cup third round in 1991-92, he starred in two consecutive Sussex Senior Cup final triumphs and briefly became manager in December 1994. He became an independent financial adviser at Hunter Hammond in Hove.

DAVE VENABLES

England Semi-Pro striker Dave Venables was Crawley Town's 'Player of the Year' in 1990-91. Born in Horsham, he spent four seasons with Eastbourne United before joining Crawley in August 1990. He helped the Red to reach the FA Cup third round for the first time in


1991-92, appearing against Sussex rivals Brighton in front of 18,031. He moved to Wealdstone in March 1992, then Stevenage Borough in June 1993. Starring as they won the Isthmian League title in 1993-94 and Conference title in 1995-96, he joined Kettering Town in December 1996, then played for Enfield, Cambridge City, Boston United and Stamford.

MATT TUBBS

England Semi-Pro striker Matt Tubbs was leading marksman as Crawley Town won the Conference title in 2010-11. A former AFC Bournemouth trainee, he played for Dorchester Town before joining Salisbury in October 2003. He featured prominently as they twice won promotion and was loaned back to Bournemouth prior to joining Crawley in July 2010. Helping to reach the FA Cup fifth round in 2010-11, he appeared in their 2011-12 promotion campaign and rejoined Bournemouth in January 2012. He reunited with Steve Evans at Rotherham, since playing for Wimbledon, Portsmouth, Eastleigh and Havant & Waterlooville.




◀ SEPTEMBER 2009




◀ OCTOBER 2010

A goal from Alex Lawless secures a point in a 1-1 draw at Crawley, who are already crowned champions.




▲ OCTOBER 2015

Another dismal performance at Crawley with this time the Town losing 2-0. The Hatters drop to seventh after topping the table two weeks before.



Worst initiation song?


You already know this! Shins. Forgot the Robbie Williams 'Angels' lyrics – it was the most embarrassing thing I've ever seen!

Many of those Scandinavian fans probably fell in love at the same time, that February day in 1988, when Luton Town hammered Oxford 7-4 in a stunning game broadcasted on Norwegian TV. Having seen a lot of boring games from England, 20-year-old Lars Ove fell in love with this crazy side and got his first favourite team in England.

Living in Elverum, Norway, he hardly knows other Luton fans. That's probably why he hasn't travelled before. But he has stuck by Luton's

side in spite of troubled years and annoying comments from friends, supporting a lot more mainstream sides.

I'm proud that he has never left. He has yelled at teletext scorelines and had some tough Hatters years. He wouldn't pick up his phone for hours when they lost the promotion battle on penalties back in 2011. He saw that on a bad streaming website.

Good memories holds his spirit up. In spite of a 5-3 defeat, those minutes where Luton were beating Liverpool in the 2006 FA Cup was magical. That was on TV as well, maybe even more crazy than the start of the journey 18 years earlier. A few years back he also won a match-worn jersey from Luke Guttridge.

In September last year, my father turned 50 years and I was never in



a doubt what the old man would get for his birthday. Tonight, we're celebrating a double anniversary: 50 years on earth, 30 years as a true Hatters fan.






DREAM DEBUT FOR IPSWICH LOANEE DOWNES IN EXETER WIN



Deadline day loan signing Flynn Downes had a Luton debut to remember as he excelled in the 1-0 victory over Exeter City, which helped maintain the Town's lead at the top of Sky Bet League Two.

After impressing for Ipswich Town this season in the 12 appearances he has made for Mick McCarthy's team, the 19-year-old confidently slotted into the Hatters starting XI and looked like he had been playing at Kenilworth Road for many a year.

Deployed in the holding midfield role, the arrival from the Championship outfit put in a top-class performance as his all-round play and contribution helped put the Town attack on the front foot.

The young Tractor Boy said: "I loved it. I absolutely loved it. The boys have welcomed me and made me feel a part of the team and that's how I play – I help the team.

"When I get the ball I just give it to the frontman and let them do their job – they were all beating their man so that's all I can do. I thought defensively the boys were excellent. Obviously, Stockley up top is a handful, but the boys dealt with him well.

"It was tough out there. I've got a few cuts and bruises, it was similar to the Championship, I just really enjoyed it. I thought the boys were excellent."

The England Under-19 international has been impressed with a lot of things since his arrival at Kenilworth Road, including the supporters and the squad, as he looks to get minutes under his belt after his move happened so late in the window.

"The fans are unbelievable, every team needs fans when they're having a little drought and they were excellent today," said Downes, who made his full Ipswich debut in their Carabao Cup win at the Kenny earlier this season.

"There's a lot of depth in the squad. If someone gets injured, we've got good players coming in and that's what every team needs. Playing here in August was one of the toughest games I've played. So I wanted to get over here and add to the team and help them.

"Every youngster wants to be playing football, that's the same for me, I want to be playing first team football, Under-23s is not the same."

"To be honest the move was a bit rushed, I played for the 23s on the Monday, I got called into the gaffer's office after that and there was two days left until deadline day. He suggested Luton, so I said 'get me there'. The gaffer said it would be a good club to go to, he said 'they play good football'. I'm delighted to be here."

Town boss Nathan Jones was just as impressed with his signing, as he said: "He was outstanding. It's as if he lives here in terms of the way he went about the pitch, the confidence he played with, the security and everything he had. But we kind of knew what we were getting, we just hoped he could carry on the form that he's had with Ipswich to here and he was absolutely outstanding, he really was."



HARD-WORKING HARRY'S HITTING THE HEIGHTS!

Town forward Harry Cornick was delighted to get on the scoresheet as his winning goal against Exeter City helped the Hatters bounce back from the disappointment of defeat to Wycombe Wanderers.

The summer signing from Premier League Bournemouth has been in excellent form since he arrived at Kenilworth Road, and his strike against the Grecians was his fifth goal of the season.

Dan Potts' brilliant run and cut-in from the left to tee up Cornick seven minutes before half-time really impressed the forward, who was pleased to see his side put the defeat to the Chairboys behind them.

Harry said: "Pottsy was brilliant. He kept getting the better of his wide man and kept bombing on, which put them on the back foot straight away and set me up nicely. It was a good win – especially after what happened on Tuesday night. It was a massive game.

"The Wycombe one was disappointing as I thought we played quite well. We had more chances, but it was one of those days for us. It was good that it was on a Tuesday and then we didn't have long to think about it, because sometimes Saturday-to-Saturday you end up thinking about the game too much.

"So we had a game straight afterwards to put things right. We've done really well to get the three points and dug deep to the end. It's not the sevens and eights that we have got at times, but it's three points and at the end of the season, you look back and see a win and that's all that matters.

"We need to keep the wins ticking and keep going until the end of the season now. We had a lot of chances. We only took one but that was enough on the day."

The forward has been a part of a hard-working side that, with the win over Paul Tisdale's team, remained eight points clear at the top of Sky Bet League Two.

That intensity has seen the 22-year-old pull up late on with cramp in recent fixtures, but it comes as little surprise given how hard he works – but he also wants to see an improvement in certain areas of his own game as well.



Cornick continued: "It was a bit of cramp. I keep getting cramp at the end of the game. I try to do my running in the game and then just blow up at the end which is a bit annoying, but we'll get on top of that.

"I think my crossing needs a bit of working on, a bit of finishing too and I can get better. But that's what we have to keep working on the training ground and then keep getting better as a team.

"If I keep improving, keep working on it, then I'm going to keep improving and keep the team improving, which is the main thing."

...BUT CENTRE-HALF RECKONS BORO POINT WILL PROVE A BIG ONE IN THE END

Utility man Glen Rea admitted the players were down in the changing room after conceding a late equaliser at Stevenage on Saturday, but the 23-year-old believes the point will be a big one at the end of the season.

The Hatters saw their lead at the top cut to six points with Accrington Stanley moving second with a 2-0 win at Coventry.

But the point earned at the Lamex Stadium, however disappointing it was to see James Collins' 85th-minute penalty cancelled out by a Danny Newton equaliser three minutes later, still increased the Town's advantage over the play-off places to ten points.

"Everyone is disappointed the way we conceded right at the end," said the former Republic of Ireland U21 international. "We got the goal and it would have been the perfect away performance.

"We didn't play as well as we could have, but it still would have been the perfect away result. The goal right at the end has dampened our spirits a bit, but hopefully that'll prove to be a good point come the end of the season. The point is a positive and we'll go again on Tuesday."

Collins netted his 14th goal of the season after being brought down for the penalty, and Rea says he predicted the goal with the Town striker during the half-time interval of a game that proved a real battle of attrition on a difficult pitch.

"The way we beat them in the last game, they were obviously going to come in with more motivation to try and beat us this game," said Rea. "We know from last year that it was hard coming here. It's a hard place to come."

"But we get the penalty and that's what Collo's there for, isn't it? He scores goals. I said to him at half-time, you're going to score a goal and he's done it again for us."

With Alan McCormack out injured since mid-September, Rea has spent much of his time in recent months in the holding midfield role. Since Flynn Downes' arrival on loan



from Ipswich, however, he has moved back into centre-half alongside Alan Sheehan in the last two matches.

On his positional switch, he said: "You know me from last year, I just want to play, so if I can help the team out, I'll play anywhere. I've known Sheez for a long time now. We are good friends off the pitch, and we do gel on the pitch as well."

"We knew they were going to make it difficult for us, but we came here and we wanted to be solid, which I thought we were. We've defended well for the majority of the game, it was just at the end."

On the deadline day signing of Downes – and forward Jake Jervis and defender Lloyd Jones – Rea added: "Flynn has done really well in the last couple of games. He's come from a Championship club and you can see that he's got Championship quality, so he's done really well."

"They've all boosted our squad. We've got an amazing squad, so any addition is going to be a good one. It's good competition for everyone."

In the summer of 1967, a 15-year-old Luton schoolboy decided to keep a comprehensive scrapbook of the forthcoming Division Four (now League Two) campaign.

It is easy to say now that he knew this was about to become one of the most glorious seasons in the club's history, but looking back it was merely the labours of a boy with too much time on his hands in the days before the internet, social media and mobile phones (or normal phones in his case).

Step back 50 years and let the boy who grew into club historian ROGER WASH remind us of the highs and lows of that ultimately successful 1967/68 season...

Following the home win over Darlington the Town invested in a short 'holiday' for the players at Blackpool as a reward for maintaining a place at the top of the table.

The break was meant as a bonding exercise (before the term was invented) in readiness for the trip to Chesterfield on the following Saturday.

The Spireites were seen by the management team as the toughest hurdle yet to overcome on the road to promotion, although supporters could think of other sides worthy of that title.

Manager Allan Brown had set his stall out by saying: "I do not care how the points come away from home, so long as we win with authority on our own ground." In layman's terms, this meant a point away and two at home would see us up.

Chesterfield were hovering around the promotion places and boasted a mean defence, and a Saltergate crowd of 14,075

turned out to watch an entertaining 0-0 draw. As expected, both defences were tight but the Hatters enjoyed the better of the chances and on another day, a header from Keith Allen, which thudded against the bar, would have gone in.

Back to Kenilworth Road the following week where lower mid-table Port Vale were to be the visitors. Vale were in crisis at the time having received the news that because of financial irregularities, which included paying amateur players and paying illegal bonuses and signing on fees, they were to be fined £2,000 and expelled from the Football League at the end of the season.

Naturally a wave of sympathy swept through the football world, given the severity of the sanctions – and so it was probably not a good time to play them as a siege mentality had set in amongst the players.

A best of the season so far, for a Saturday game, crowd of 12,749 turned up to see the now settled Town side open in

PORT VALE obviously intend to fight for points all the way to their suspension day at the end of the season.

blistering fashion with Bruce Rioch setting up Alan Slough for a run on goal, followed by a hard shot which was brilliantly saved by Stuart Sharratt in the Vale goal.

Immediately after this, Vale broke away and with an open goal in his sights, Mick Mahon shot weakly wide. Rioch then hit the bar with a fierce shot before the same player fired in centre which was turned in by Ian Buxton.

The Hatters continued to live dangerously against a spirited Vale side, and the supporters could see that one goal would not be enough. As so often the case that season, it was left to 'Golden Boy' Rioch to come up with another one of his specials to effectively settle the contest.

In the 64th minute, Rioch picked up a loose ball 25 yards out and fairly hammered a left foot strike into the top corner

of the net with Sharratt rooted to the spot. A goal fit to win any game.

Now in full control, the Town saw out the rest of the game with ease. Not a vintage performance but two points nearer to promotion.

Trumping the football for a short while came the long-awaited news that for the third consecutive year the Supporters Club would be holding their Football Queen competition in the Bobbers Club. You can see the winner on page 65 of this programme.

The Hatters now had a big chance to consolidate their position at the top as next up at Kenilworth Road were Exeter, who they had beaten 5-0 at St James Park earlier in the season.

They would, though, have to go into the game without the two new signings that manager Allan Brown attempted to secure before the transfer deadline.


Tottenham's Eddie Clayton arrived at Luton early one morning, agreed terms but left without putting pen to paper. He signed for Southend that afternoon!

The other player interesting Luton was Brian Lewis of Coventry, who decided to remain at Highfield Road after the two clubs agreed a fee. Brown would eventually get his man, but it would have to wait until the summer.

For the visit of the Grecians the Town were missing Alan Slough, who was suffering a groin strain, with Billy McDerment taking his place.

The least said about this particular game the better, as Exeter pulled everyone back behind the ball, and with winger Ray Whittaker injured early and limping through to half time, and full-back Fred Jardine needing to play on the wing because of an ankle injury, it became a poor spectacle.

Exeter became the first side to prevent the Town from scoring at home that season, and according to Brown's mantra the Hatters would now need to pick up some wins away from home.

Leyton Orient WFC 0-4 Luton Town Ladies

Luton Town Ladies avenged comprehensive home defeats to Leyton Orient WFC earlier in the season by securing a sensational 4-0 win against the O's at Mile End last Sunday to reinforce their position in the top five of FA Women's Premier League South East Division One.

The Hatters' attention has turned to the cup competition in recent times with their last league outing coming in the shape of an 8-2 victory over Norwich City Ladies at the end of November, so they were eager to establish a positive return to the divisional game.

And Natasha Fensome almost provided the perfect start as she burst through down the left and, having steadied herself for the shot, fired tamely at the near post as the goalkeeper collected.

However, a defensive lapse presented the Orient forward with an excellent opportunity to nudge her side in front, but as she rounded goalkeeper Kezia Hassall her shot was blocked by the defender and scrambled clear.

That sparked a rather perturbing spell for the Luton backline as the hosts enjoyed a five-minute period of extended pressure that yielded a golden chance, although the striker looped her shot over from close range.

The importance of surviving that moment was heightened shortly after, when the opening goal arrived with Fensome's volley striking the post

and falling presentably for Steph Gale to finish.

Orient were determined to restore parity from the outset of the second period with a ball launched into the penalty area that culminated in a shot sailing over the bar.

And from that point Luton accelerated into gear and delivered a masterful performance, doubling their lead through Fensome as she was released by Nicola Henman's pass before side-stepping two defenders and drilling low across the keeper into the bottom corner.

Arguably, Fensome should have added a third following some intricate link-up play with Gale in the box, but the pacey striker shot harmlessly wide.

Where she failed, Lisa Nixon succeeded in astounding fashion as she pounced on Zara Carroll's blocked free-kick to volley viciously into the top corner.

Luton were rampant and in their pursuit of more goals they were awarded a penalty as an O's defender harnessed her inner goalkeeper to produce a diving save with her hands on the goal line.

She was dismissed for her infringement and substitute Joanne Rutherford assumed penalty-taking duties, but her strike cannoned off the crossbar and over the top.

The away side wouldn't be denied a fourth to match the scoreline Orient




