

[THE MANAGER'S NOTES]

THE MANAGER

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for what has developed into another huge game at the top of the Sky Bet League Two table, with Accrington Stanley the visitors to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

I'd like to welcome everybody who has made the trip south with Accrington today, including manager John Coleman, his assistant Jimmy Bell, their staff, squad, club officials and, of course, the supporters who will help add to what should be a cracking atmosphere. I wish them all a safe journey back to Lancashire this evening.

There's nothing better in football than a first versus second clash and we had a similar encounter here with Notts County before Christmas, when Kenilworth Road was packed to the rafters. Now we're at the business end of the season, this is one to really whet the appetite.

OUTSTANDING

We've had some entertaining games with Accrington in the two years since I took charge here, with ourselves coming out on top in our last three league encounters. Hopefully that run of form can continue for us today, but we know that the test we face will be as tough as it's been all season.

Accrington's form has been outstanding in recent weeks, just as ours has been consistently so for the majority of the campaign, and we come into the match having lost just two of our last ten league fixtures, unbeaten in our last five.

We were disappointed to bring only the one point back from Cambridge last week. We talk about missed opportunities and that was definitely one of those, with every other team bar Carlisle and Grimsby having the afternoon off. We had a great chance to open up more of a gap and put ourselves in an even better position than we currently are.

We seemed set fair to do exactly that with James Collins' goal giving us a deserved 1-0 lead, which we only looked like extending. The sending off with 15 minutes to go changed the game because with 11 men on the pitch, I have little doubt that we'd have gone on to secure all three points.

A game lasts 90-plus minutes though, and a lack of discipline cost us. That is something we have all spoken about – and the players have as a group – to try to eradicate and ensure that nothing derails us from reaching our ultimate destination.

That, of course, is League One for next season and as we come up against a good side that has the same ambition, we are going to need all of your support to ensure we cement one of the top three automatic promotion places.


We had phenomenal backing at Cambridge, as always, with 2,405 braving the elements to make what must have been a hazardous journey for many. It's amazing to think that with six away games still to go, we've had almost 27,000 fans follow us on our travels in league and cup this season.

That is top-flight support and it makes me proud to represent you as manager of this wonderful club, so thank you.

We've five massive games left at home and the finishing line is in sight, so please give it everything you've got from the stands to help make it a season to remember.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH VICE CHAIRMAN DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road.

We are getting into the business end of the season and today we welcome our closest challengers Accrington Stanley. Accy have been hanging on to our coat tails for most of the season since we beat them 2-0 at their place back in October, and after their midweek win over Morecambe, they are now only one point behind us.

Last weekend the weather played havoc with fixtures around the country, although Cambridge should be congratulated for getting the game on after such adverse conditions.

It was a frustrating game as we seemed to be in total control until Danny went off injured and Collo was sent off for a second yellow after drawing the referee's attention to the fact that goal-kicks should be awarded if the opposition heads the ball over their opponents' goal-line. The indiscipline was unacceptable, although slightly understandable at such a crucial moment in the game.

Returning to the weather, the temperatures may have been sub-zero last week and the snow deep on the ground, but it was heart-warming to hear of the charitable, caring and generous reaction by so many football clubs during the glacial spell.

Many clubs, on learning their game would not be played, went on to distribute the food that had been lined up for the expected fans, to those in need, particularly the homeless rough sleepers.

It was wonderful of Sunderland to offer the Stadium of Light itself as a shelter, not just for people needing food and respite from the biting conditions, but also for their pets.

We can also all probably identify with Steven Taylor of Peterborough, who grabbed a broom to brush snow off the white lines to satisfy the referee that they could get through the 90 minutes as the snow was piling up at quite a rate.

That effort from Taylor and others gave Peterborough the chance to record their first win in eight games.

The senior citizens among us, like myself, were probably reminded with so many cancelled games, of the 'Pools Panel' that was born out of the 1962/63 season, when the whole country experienced arctic conditions for months on end. I remember there being snow on the ground from January to April and in one week in January, 52 out of 55 games were postponed due to unplayable pitches.

In those days 10 million people a week punted on the Pools, so a panel was formed to decide what the results would have been if the games had been played. The initial panel included Tom Finney, Tommy Lawton (who scored six against us in 1942 playing for Aldershot), Arthur Ellis (World Cup referee) and various others who were deemed to have a superior knowledge of the game at the time.

CONTROVERSIES

They sat down on Saturday after the games and decided whether the result was home, draw or away win. I can remember, and I'm sure you can imagine the debates and disappointments which resulted from their decisions, as mums and dads waited impatiently with pens in hand to fill in the coupons.

One of the newest controversies in the game surrounds VAR (video assistant referees). Clearly we should encourage the use of any technology to help referees do their job and avoid mistakes, which can mean millions of pounds being lost to the victim, but it seems that we are some way away from a system which has the respect of all parties.

In rugby, cricket and tennis it seems to work quite well, but they are all games which have natural breaks to give time for deliberation and consideration. Football is a game which should flow and which relies on momentum.



Anything which breaks the rhythm affects not only the on-field performance, but also the spectating experience.

My personal opinion is that it should be restricted as in rugby to goal – yes or no, penalty – yes or no, serious foul – yes or no, all at the request of the referee aided by his assistants. They would all be looked at by the officials during the ensuing natural break in play and ensure that major mistakes are avoided without affecting the rhythm or momentum of the game.

Additionally, it is obvious that officials will need extra training and probably pay to enable them to perform to the standards required in the modern game.

I guess it's hard to stress strongly enough how important officials are and how one or two wrong decisions can seriously affect the outcome of a game, and eventual promotion and relegation prospects.

Is there another subject in the game that causes so much controversy?

I know we are Luton and those of us who have been around a long time know that we make life difficult for ourselves quite often, but it is part of what makes us what we are.

Your support has been incredible this year home and away – over 2,400 to Cambridge in that weather was nothing short of incredible. The board are immensely proud of our following – please keep it up.


Only 11 more games of an amazing season and we need all of us together to get us over the line.

Good afternoon everybody and welcome to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's top of the table clash.

Accrington Stanley are now within a point of us after their win over Morecambe in midweek, so it goes without saying how big this game is.

However, given our position going into the game, every match in the past two or three months has been absolutely huge. There hasn't been a fixture where we can take our foot off the pedal and that has worked in our favour preparing for this one.

John Coleman has put together a strong squad, which is spearheaded by the top scorer in Sky Bet League Two, Billy Kee. He's a very good striker who I have played against a lot throughout my career. He's their talisman, but if you can stop him scoring, then you have a good chance of winning the game.

Their unbelievable form has seen them make up a lot of ground on us, but the fact is we aren't in bad form at all.

It's been a long old recovery – Saturday was one of the very few occasions I can think of where I was happy to be on the bench! To get on at the end and be back was brilliant, and I want to thank the staff behind the scenes who have helped me get back to where I am.

Unfortunately, we had Lawson D'Ath limp off early on in that game, but like we've seen throughout this season,



LEVEL PLAYING FIELD WEEKS OF ACTION (3RD TO 18TH MARCH 2018) – CELEBRATING 'OUR MATCHDAY'

Luton Town are pleased to support the 2018 Level Playing Field (LPF) Weeks of Action. This annual initiative, now in its 13th year, aims to celebrate access and inclusion for disabled sports fans across England and Wales.



Disabled people constitute the largest minority group at around 15 per cent of the population, and this number is increasing year on year. Naturally, a large number of disabled people are football fans too and we are pleased to take this opportunity to thank our own disabled fans for their continued loyalty and dedication to this great club.

This year we are celebrating the matchday experience for disabled fans. We want to shine a light on the positives of attending a live matchday and in turn help remove those barriers and promote a culture of accessibility and inclusiveness within sport.

Luton Town Disabled Supporters' Association secretary Allan Drummond, pictured right, gave us this account of his matchday supporting the Hatters at Kenilworth Road.

Allan said: "As someone with eyesight rated at around five per cent of useful vision compared to those with 20/20 vision, my matchday experience takes a little bit more planning than others.

"For home games I have a routine

where the morning starts with checking the Hatters Vision bookings and emailing the list off to the ticket office, then it's the mad hunt for my season ticket, which I obviously put in a safe place – so safe I forgot!

"My son and I then get the bus and head towards the Oak Road, but have to do a quick detour to the Maple Road reception to pick up the Hatters Vision receiver.

TRICKY

"The Oak Road provides an amazing atmosphere, with often amusing exchanges of sardonic wit with the away following. It doesn't really matter where we sit (stand) as I cannot see much of what is on the pitch anyway, so this is where I rely on the fantastic commentary and description of what is happening from iFollow Hatters commentator Simon Pitts.



"A few things I find tricky are the small steps in the Oak Road end, and if it's raining, getting to and from the ground causes me issues with glare and bright lights, as my eyes are very photo-sensitive. Obviously seeing anything in detail on the pitch, and finally having to cope when we don't win by at least six goals each game!

"That said, the atmosphere, being able to say "I was there", experiencing the emotion, trauma and joy, I would not do without regardless of my poor eyesight."

One man who had a special matchday experience with his beloved Hatters last Saturday is Nicky Toone, one of the stars of the Luton Town Men's Disability team.

As you can see from the pictures, Nicky – who helps the coaching staff at the training ground every Thursday

– was invited by Nathan Jones and the team to join them on the coach to Cambridge United.

Nicky enjoyed a pre-match meal with the team, spent time in the dressing room as the players prepared for the match before checking the pitch with them and then heading to the boardroom, where he joined the club's directors to watch the 1-1 draw from the Abbey Stadium's directors' box.

POSITIVE

This Weeks of Action campaign we are joining together with sports clubs, fans and organisations across England and Wales to celebrate the #OurMatchday to not only promote the positive experience had by disabled fans but also the message of access and inclusion for all.

As part of Luton Town's ongoing commitment to improving access for our disabled supporters, we have



recently installed Induction Loop Systems at a range of LTFC venues.

The loops help amplify sound in hearing aids, therefore making it easier for hard of hearing supporters to hear more clearly when using the club's facilities.

This service is now available in both club shops (at Kenilworth Road and the Mall), the Ticket Office and the main reception.

For users, this can be found by changing the setting on your hearing aid to the T position and can be used in areas where the sign, pictured on page 10, can be found.

The Hatters head to the Abbey next Saturday hoping to make it four consecutive wins against the U's...

WHO? This is the first season that Hatters and the Sky Blues have ever met in the fourth tier – you have to go back to the early 20th century when both sides competed in the Southern League to find them competing against each other at a level below this.

More recently a Championship fixture, Coventry managed to hold onto their second tier status for four more seasons than the Town, before they were relegated to League One in 2012. They remained in the third tier for five seasons before falling into Sky Bet League Two at the end of last term after finishing in 23rd spot.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? Our last meeting is a blip in the Hatters' results this season, as Coventry came to Kenilworth Road, with Mark Robins' side taking all three points as they ran out 3-0 winners. Today marks the 80th meeting between the Hatters and the Sky Blues, with Town picking up 24 wins, whilst Coventry have 41 victories under their belt. The other 14 fixtures have ended in draws.

IN CHARGE The 48-year-old Mark Robins scored arguably one of the most important goals in recent football history – a last minute winner against Nottingham Forest in the FA Cup semi-finals in 1990 for the Red Devils. Although it might not sound particularly important, it was reported at the time

should United not win that game, Sir Alex Ferguson would have been sacked. They went onto to win the FA Cup that year and Ferguson went onto win a couple more trophies during his time at Old Trafford! In his second stint at the club as manager, Robins won the Checkatrade Trophy last term within a month of returning to the club.

PREVIOUS FORM Despite being the sixth-lowest scorers in the division, the Sky Blues moved back to the brink of the play-off places last Tuesday with a 1-0 win at automatic promotion hunters Wycombe. It was City's first victory of February, after ending a run three successive defeats in the month – four including the FA Cup fifth round exit at Premier League Brighton – with a 1-1 draw at high-flying Mansfield three days earlier.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU Hatters legend Mick Harford counts Coventry as one of his previous clubs, however due to injury, he only made one appearance. He did score in that 15-minute cameo, a 1-0 winner against Newcastle United. An academy graduate having gone to school at Luton's Cardinal Newman, Kevin Foley was associated with the club for over a decade. He made 166 appearances for us in total after making his debut in 2002, before leaving in 2007 for Wolverhampton Wanderers. He made 12 appearances for Coventry in the last campaign during a short stint with the Sky Blues. He now plays for Billericay Town.

WELCOME ACCRINGTON STANLEY

On paper one of our toughest home fixtures of the campaign, the Hatters take on Stanley who have the same aspirations as the Hatters this season...

The Town would like to extend a warm welcome to John Coleman, his staff, side and their supporters, and we hope you all had a safe trip down from Lancashire.

Apart from a blip in December, Stanley have been one of the frontrunners in Sky Bet League Two this campaign. The only other side in the division apart from the Hatters to reach 20 league wins for the season, Stanley are certainly pushing the Town as both teams go in search of promotion to the third tier.

Stanley's rise up the Pyramid over the past two decades from the Northern Premier League's second tier has been a sight to behold, but under John Coleman, they aren't satisfied with League Two football and this campaign could see them continue their climb under the Liverpudlian.

A Non-League legend in his day, the 55-year-old scored over 500 goals in a long career, before he packed it in to become a manager. He left Ashton United to take over the reins at the Crown Ground originally in 1999, guiding them to three promotions over the following years and entering the EFL in 2006.

He departed in 2012 to manage Rochdale, before spells in charge of Southport and Sligo Rovers followed. He returned to Accrington in 2014 and combined over his two spells

with Stanley, he has managed nearly 800 games, boasting a win record over 40 per cent.


Now in their 12th season in the fourth tier, Accrington have reached the Sky Bet League Two play-offs on two occasions. The first came in 2011 when they were defeated 3-0 by Stevenage over two semi-final legs, but the most gutting of all came in 2016 – after missing out on automatic promotion on goal difference, a semi-final defeat again saw Stanley miss out on promotion, this time to AFC Wimbledon in extra-time.

The key ingredient to that season's recipe was Billy Kee, who at the end of last year agreed a new three-year deal with the club. Averaging a goal every other game, the forward is currently leading the way in the race for the league's golden boot.

The Hatters – like everyone in English football – were awestruck with the bravery Billy recently showed by sharing his mental health issues he has been battling, and everyone at the club wishes him the best for the future.

Our last meeting ended in a 2-0 win for the Town up at the Wham Stadium, when James Collins fired in from close range before Danny Hylton scored a second from the penalty spot.

THE VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD

PETER LEATHAM, an Accrington Stanley supporter of 16 years, gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team this season in Sky Bet League Two and this afternoon on their visit to Kenilworth Road, as well as his top XI players to ever pull on a shirt for Stanley...

GENERAL ENQUIRIES:

You've gone close before, but your aims of reaching Sky Bet League One certainly seem right on track this campaign. Are supporters hopeful they can finally make the jump after a few years of near misses?

The club is on a much more solid foundation than our previous near misses, both on and off the field, and everyone is very hopeful that this could be our season. We are now the "oldest" in League Two after 12 seasons and the squad is probably the best equipped we have had with both quality and depth.

John Coleman continues to work his magic at the club. How important is he to Stanley?


With historically having the lowest budget, lowest crowds and no permanent training ground (it's either the park or the leisure centre), few actually appreciate the work John and his assistant Jimmy Bell have done. He is very much at the heart of the club and understands exactly how to operate at this level, and therefore is paramount to our aspirations.

Whilst Coleman is the man off the pitch, Billy Kee is the man on it. He must be right on track for club legend status?

Undoubtedly, Billy is another who just fits the club. He came as a youngster on loan, left for pastures new, lost his way a little bit and then came back 'home'. He is key to Coleman's methods, revered by his peers,

popular with the crowds and has a strong relationship with all, nothing is too much trouble as with all the players. You will generally find them all in the clubhouse, with the fans, after most home games.

Which of your signings this campaign have you been most impressed by?



Kayden Jackson

There are two that stand out. Kayden Jackson joined in the summer and has slotted in straight away alongside Kee, providing the pace to complement Billy's guile. We also had a young defender on loan from Middlesbrough for the first half of the season, Callum Johnson, who



then signed a two-and-a-half year deal in January. He looks composed in possession and again has slotted straight into the Stanley mentality.

Out of the players you had last season who went onto leave, who do you wish you could bring back into the team?

Matty Pearson from Barnsley. An out and out competitor, great defender, could help in midfield and scored a few as well. He was very popular and would always be welcomed back to the club.

Your run since the turn of the year has been incredible. What do you put this down to?

The strength of squad. As we have had key players injured, there has been no discernible fall in quality as their replacements have stepped in, to the extent that a few positions have been rotated to suit the match. It also helps that confidence is high, which assists momentum and results.

How can Town supporters expect your side to play this afternoon – open and attacking? Direct football? Or neither?

I suspect neither. The manager makes no secret that he likes to play out from the back and keep the ball on the floor. Unlike many of our peers, we don't have 6ft 3ins forwards to lump the ball up to. It's not in our gamebook and won't be under John Coleman.



Best initiation song?







JONES:

SHEEHAN PRAISES TOWN FOR A POSITIVE POINT

It was an afternoon tainted with controversy as the Hatters snatched a point against Cheltenham a fortnight ago.

Alan Sheehan's back stick header two minutes into second half injury time saw the Town equalise after a frustrating game at Kenilworth Road.

Sheehan said: "Obviously we want to go and win every game and get three points, especially at home. They came and they always make it difficult for us, they get men behind the ball and that's two 2-2 draws against us, so it is what it is.

"From 2-0 down I thought we showed great character to get back into the game and get a point, which possibly at the start of the day might not have been a great result, but I don't think it was half bad to get a point looking at how the other results went.

SPIRITED

"You have to be positive and we know we've got goals in our team. We try to keep it as tight as possible at the back, but it's a strange feeling. We're happy to come back from 2-0 down and then disappointed to not win the game, but that's the way it is."

Whilst there was a feeling of disappointment, the Irishman was pleased to see the character the Hatters showed in their spirited fightback and that was highlighted by the older heads in the dressing room.

He continued: "We have character, we've played a lot of good football this year and I know we have to finish the job off. But we've played some unbelievable football at times throughout the season – it's not always going to be like that.

"It was a frustrating game, no two ways about it – but we dug in and got a point in the end. When you kind of drop two points and you come in and the lads that weren't playing, Scotty Cuthbert and Alan McCormack, they just say, 'Look, it's not a bad point.'

"They try to keep everyone upbeat, so we know it's in our hands if we do our jobs and get the points. It's just about hitting a small bit of momentum now and keeping it going."




The captain in the absence of Cuthbert usually finds himself standing over dead-ball situations, but for the corner he ended up scoring from, he felt it was best to let Luke Gambin take it.

"It was a split-second thing really," said Sheehan. "I just said to Gambo 'You go out and get it', because we weren't getting many first contacts in the box. So it just went in and I ended up getting on the end of it.

"I hit them usually but we're missing a few players, so a small bit of height helps and I just felt last minute, might as well go up and try and do it.

"He put a great ball in, I am thinking I've got to hit the target and thankfully I got on the end of it. It doesn't really matter who scores, we've got so many goal scorers throughout the squad, so I'm happy enough to do my part."








JONES:

GAMBIN GLAD TO BE GIVEN GAME TIME

Luke Gambin says the Hatters players got together in the dressing room after the game at Cambridge last week to ensure they remain focussed on the job of winning promotion.

The Town led 1-0 at the Abbey Stadium through James Collins' first-half goal, but then saw the advantage cancelled out soon after the striker was sent off for collecting two yellow cards in four minutes with just under a quarter-of-an-hour to go.

Just as was the case with the 1-1 draw at Stevenage a couple of weeks earlier, the result gave Cambridge some form of reputation restoration after having seven goals put past them on their visit to Kenilworth Road before Christmas.

"Personally, I felt we were in control," said Malta international Gambin. "Not every game is going to be wonderful football like when we played these at home and the lads were brilliant.

"Today was more direct football, more physical and getting on the second ball because teams like this, obviously after the first defeat, they want to prove something to us. We knew it was going to be a difficult game.

"I thought we rallied together and did well, but like the manager keeps reiterating, it's a missed opportunity by not taking three points. We got a draw, which again is momentum, and we keep plugging away. It was a chance for us, but if we focus on that too much it can be a negative.

"We are disappointed, and we've had a talk as a group. We just need to stay focussed. We are on the home straight and we need to rally together."

Gambin made his 15th appearance of the season at Cambridge as a 19th-minute replacement for the injured Lawson D'Ath. The 24-year-old was thought by many to be the Hatters' man-of-the-match, with manager Nathan Jones describing his performance as "excellent".

ENJOYED

Eight of his appearances have come from the bench, and Gambin said: "I was disappointed not to be involved in the team as it changed a bit, but then – under the circumstances – I was called upon. I'm always raring to go. The lads know me, and that I'll give 100 per cent and work hard. I enjoyed it being out there on the pitch today.

"I'm happy with how I played, but I'm not happy with the draw. I'd have loved to have gone on as a sub and won the game. It would give me a bit more leeway if I go and speak to the gaffer again!

"But we are a top squad, like the gaffer says, we've got so many good players here, it's difficult for him – and we are all hungry."




Gambin says he is regularly having chats with manager Jones about being in his plans.

U'S BOO BOYS DON'T BOTHER BERRY

HATTERS MIDFIELDER EXPECTED HOSTILE RECEPTION ON HIS FIRST RETURN TO FORMER CLUB

Town midfielder Luke Berry says he fully expected a hostile reception on his first return to former club Cambridge United last week — admitting that if he were a U's fan he'd have booed himself!

Berry left the Abbey, where he had come through the ranks, for a second time in August to sign for the Hatters. The 25-year-old, who previously left for a season at Barnsley, was jeered throughout the fixture by the Cambridge supporters.

"I expected it to be honest, I didn't expect anything else," he explained. "I just took it in my stride and I am just disappointed we didn't get the winner."

"I think they were singing more about me than their own players, I don't know what that says! To be fair when you're in the game you don't really think about things like that, but it got me going. It didn't disappoint me at all. I had been here since I was a kid, it's just one of those things."

"If I was a Cambridge fan I would probably boo me! I know how it is, I am not going to sugar coat it, they're going to boo me. You can't hide out there, you've got to push your chest out and try to get the three points."

Collins had given the Town the lead just after the half-hour mark, before he was at the centre of the turning point in the game, when he received his second yellow card on 77 minutes. Jabo Ibehre headed in six minutes later, and the game ended all-square.

"The feeling is we're quite disappointed about the result, we were in control," Luke continued. "I don't know what time the sending off happened, but it affected us and you saw the crowd get up and they were all going for it. You say a draw away isn't a bad result, but we're disappointed."

"We've had some good displays when we go down to ten men. When we went down to ten men against Lincoln we did well, but it's tricky to do it every three or four games. We've just got to keep our cool on the pitch."

Berry was delighted to have Danny Hylton back in the team from the first whistle, with the 17-goal joint top scorer



turning in an impressive display before leaving the action just after the hour.

"Hylts looked really sharp, and although he had to come off, I think he's all right," said Berry. "He looked really good and as we know, he's a real player when he's on it."

He also praised the training facilities at The Brache that helped the Hatters prepare for the game in the same way they normally would, despite the sub-zero temperatures dubbed 'The Beast From the East'.

"We trained like normal," said the 25-year-old. "We were out in the snow. Obviously it was a bit chilly, but we did everything right and went through our tactics in exactly the same way as we do for every game, but that's down to the facilities we've got at the training ground — it's really good."

WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS!

PART NINETEEN

In the summer of 1967, a 15-year-old Luton schoolboy decided to keep a comprehensive scrapbook of the forthcoming Division Four (now League Two) campaign.

It is easy to say now that he knew this was about to become one of the most glorious seasons in the club's history, but looking back it was merely the labours of a boy with too much time on his hands in the days before the internet, social media and mobile phones (or normal phones in his case).

Step back 50 years and let the boy who grew into club historian ROGER WASH remind us of the highs and lows of that ultimately successful 1967/68 season...



Next up for the table-topping Hatters was the long trip to Workington, who were struggling at the wrong end of the division and were fighting for their lives to avoid re-election.

Ray Whittaker was fit to return after three weeks out but Alan Slough was still missing with his place in the half-back line taken by Keith Allen. Rodney Green was selected to play up-front in Allen's normal position.

Strangely, the players in the forward line did not have the normal numbers on the backs of their shirts. Whether this was meant to confuse the opposition in the days before readily available pre-match team news, it was not said, but the players lined up in their usual positions as the game kicked off.

On a hard, bumpy pitch and with the home side determined to keep the point they started with, the game was never going to be a classic and so it proved.

With multiple stoppages which ruined the flow of the game, the contest had scoreless draw written all over it long before

the end until a moment of magic from Graham French broke the deadlock on 68 minutes.

A long, high ball from winger Whittaker was nodded down to French who fired in an unstoppable half volley into the net from around the penalty spot.

Workington threw caution to the wind after that and attacked with purpose. On another day, they may have won a penalty when Max Dougan fouled his man in the area, but the referee was unmoved.

A brilliant save by Tony Read in the Luton goal in the closing minutes was the final action of note, and on the final whistle the third away win in a row had been recorded during a run of 14 games without defeat.

Easter had often been a graveyard for Luton hopes in the past. With three games against lowly opposition in quick succession, two against Notts County with a home clash with Chester in between, the Town were hoping that historic trends would be bucked.



PROMOTION IS JUST ABOUT CERTAIN NOW

THE TOWN, I fancy, made promotion as near a certainty as it is possible to get, and also increased the odds on the title coming to Kenilworth Road by their success at Workington this afternoon.

This was the Town's 14th consecutive match without defeat, and their third away win in a row. In addition, they have collected nine away points out of the last ten, which is promotion form to say the least.

At the same time, the least said about this game as an entertainment value is concerned the better, conditions may have been to blame, for it was a light ball on a hard ground, coupled with Upton's desperate bid to avoid the re-election.

If they do have to apply, with their gates running at the present level — only 2,195 were here today — things might go badly for them.

The upshot was that this game was much of aumble from start to finish, with stoppage after stoppage for fouls, many of them coming into the bunched category. There was only one booking, but there were other interruptions for minor trifles, which kept both trainers busy for much of the afternoon.

There was little continuity, and at one time I thought this drab affair had "goal-less draw" written over it.

Apparently irretrievable deadlock was ended in the 68th minute when French, who was wearing the 8 shirt, justified that fact by cracking in the decisive goal from the inside-right position.

Exactly what it was hoped to achieve by the change of numbers of four of the Town forwards before the start I find it difficult to assess. The only people who were baffled, I should imagine, were the home spectators, who were not aware of the alterations.

Once the Town got into the lead, Workington threw everything into attack, and ielt themselves hard done by not to have a penalty. In truth, however, they seldom looked like retrieving the point they so badly needed. The Town defence was so strong and covered so well in depth that Read had few serious tasks, and one of these — a glorious save in the dying minutes — enabled him to earn his keep.

So, the chief honours so far as the Town were concerned rested with the defence, and it was certainly a shrewd move to play Allen at right-half. On past occasions it has been noted that he is most efficient there, and he was one of the outstanding players on view.

Most attempts to break through the middle were frustrated completely by Branston, with the sure aid of Moore, who has developed into a fine player in the covering role.

Both Dougan and Jardine came through splendidly, cutting out the threat from the wings.

On the other hand, the Town's attack did not function as it can, faced as it was by some stern and ready tackling. They were seldom allowed to settle on the ball, and this naturally had its effect on such constructive players as Buxton and Rioch.

Green did not make much impact against the rugged Upton, but he justified his inclusion by laying the ball for French's goal.

I feel the Town deserved their victory, narrow though it was, and even though it rested on somewhat shaky foundations in the closing minutes.

Back again 24 hours later, when 13,266 filed in to Kenilworth Road for the visit of Chester, who were fresh having not played on Good Friday – they were having to play on Monday and Tuesday instead to make up their statutory three games over the holiday period.

The Town were unchanged and again the game developed into attack versus defence, but this time there was no way through and a disappointing contest finished scoreless. The bare, hard pitch was put down as a contributing factor, but in truth the strain of maintaining top spot was beginning to tell.

Every cloud has a silver lining though, as with closest challengers Crewe losing at Brentford, the Hatters lead at the top now stretched to seven points (two for a win then) with six games to play.



HATTERS THROUGH TO NATIONAL SEMI-FINAL AFTER BEATING MK DONS

Luton Town Ladies 3-2 MK Dons Ladies

An epic cup tie culminated in victory for Luton Town Ladies a fortnight ago as a late Nicola Henman goal sunk visitors Milton Keynes Dons Ladies and secured a place in the semi-finals of the FA WPL Plate for the Hatters.

SOLID

An ominous ball across the face of the Luton goal was frantically cleared by the defence as the striker was closing in on a second for her side.

And shortly after the Hatters hit the front as Zara Carroll watched her initial free-kick strike the bar before Rachel Kosky recovered the ball to force the keeper into a solid save, but when it eventually came back out to Carroll, she unleashed a stunning shot to skimmed the palm of Sophie Shults in the Dons' goal as it nestled into the top right corner.

The intensity increased briefly following that goal as Town rediscovered their belief in the contest and set about completing a turnaround.

Their ambitions were curtailed moments prior to the half-time interval, though, as a whipped cross was turned over by the Dons' striker only for Hassall to clatter into her afterwards, resulting in a penalty – Heather McDonnell slotting the ball into the bottom right corner.

DOMINANCE

A rescue act was required in the second period and evidently inspired by their coach's cajoling during the break, parity was quickly restored as Henman's low shot was saved but not cleared sufficiently to prevent the electric Natasha Fensome following up to finish.

The home side's dominance at the start of the second half drifted as both teams created a paucity of chances with Milton Keynes looking most likely when their striker drove to the byline, rounded Hassall but her clip to the edge of the six-yard box was headed wide.

Extra-time seemed inevitable as Fensome fired straight at Shults. However, the uncharacteristically quiet McKay had yet to truly impact the game until the dying seconds,








TRISTAN: What is your first football memory?
