

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CRAIG: WE'RE LEARNING

Striker says the Chairboys are still adapting to League 1 life



Craig got off the mark for the season with the opening goal in last weekend's win at Bradford City, and Craig Mackail-Smith says the Chairboys' performance was a signal of the continued progress made by the side in League 1.

A promising start to the season in the 0-0 draw with Blackpool was quickly forgotten in some parts following the losses to Doncaster and Bristol Rovers, but normal order was resumed in a stylish and dominant performance in the second half at Plymouth, and then the full 90 minutes at Valley Parade.

"We're learning," said the striker after the game. "The first few games were a bit nervy, and maybe we were wondering if we could compete at this level, but we got confidence from our second half performance at Plymouth.

"We got the ball down and played some nice football, which gave us belief and we know we can play that way. We've got lots of variations

in the way we can play, and which players we can use, and that can only be a good thing," he added.

There was little time to prepare for the clash with the Bantams, with the trip north on the Friday coming quickly off the back of a late-night return to Wycombe from Plymouth, but Mackail-Smith – who's enjoying a new central role instead of the wide position of last season – says the hours on the training ground were put to good use as they prepared a plan to take down Bradford and executed it to perfection.

"We did our homework on Bradford and knew what their weaknesses were," he explained. "We pressed them high and they couldn't get out of their half with us trying to get the ball back quickly, and that's how we wanted to play that game.

"We looked good and we know we're capable of mixing it up – it's a pleasure to be in this team. I'm really enjoying playing down the middle – it's my favourite position as it allows me to come short or go

long and it leaves the defenders not knowing where I can go. It's nice to be involved and we're playing good football," he said.

The goal was one of the simplest of the striker's career, nodding home from on the goal-line after Joe Jacobson's wicked corner had swung over the keeper's head, and Mackail-Smith says he was pleased to notch his first strike of the new campaign in front of the travelling fans.

"I don't think I could have missed!" he admitted. "The gaffer was battering me last week for not heading the ball in training, so it was nice to get off the mark and for the team it was important for us to win and be scoring goals.

"For the fans to make those two trips in a week is unbelievable – it's hard enough for the players but the fans had to get up and go to work the next day, so we really appreciate the support and we'll always do everything we can to put the hard work in, get results and send the fans home happy," he finished.



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ALL-STOP

Ryan Allsop was the penalty hero on Tuesday night

On Tuesday afternoon Ryan Allsop was looking forward to a comfortable night on the subs' bench for the Carabao Cup second round tie against Forest Green Rovers. Fast forward a few hours later and he was the toast of Adams Park after making two vital saves in the penalty shootout, helping his side progress to the third round of the competition for just the second time ever.

The Chairboys' number 1 was set to make way between the sticks for Yves Ma-Kalambay, just as he had done for the first round clash with Northampton, but a late decision was made to keep the Belgian keeper sidelined due to an injury complaint, thrusting Allsop back into action in an unchanged back five from the 2-1 win at Bradford.

A completely new front six twice helped put the Blues in control, but Rovers twice pegged them back to take it to penalties, where Allsop dived the right way each time and denied both Christian Doidge and Paul Digby to make himself the hero.

"Ideally we'd have liked to have won it in the 90 minutes but penalties are a great chance for keepers to be the hero," he said afterwards. "Yves was the hero in the last round but he was unlucky to pick up an injury so I was put in goal tonight and it's nice to get the win."

"The two goals we conceded were sloppy on our part; we'll look at that as a team and rectify it, but the goals we scored at the other end were pleasing and we'll iron out the details and hopefully get back to keeping clean sheets and continuing to score plenty of goals at the other end," he added.

Allsop returned to Adams Park this summer following a loan spell in



2016, and while the manager and many of his team-mates remain the same as when he left, he's linked up with a new keeper coach in Andy Fairman, following the Lancastrian's appointment as first-team coach in the summer.

And Ryan – often known as Rocky for his incredible fight and determination against illness as an infant – says his heroics in the shootout owe a lot to the research and preparation from his new coach.

"Andy works very hard behind the scenes, and we sat down before the game and had a good look at them (Forest Green)," he explained. "That helped me a lot, so big credit to Andy for the work he's done because it's paid off in both rounds."

Now Wanderers turn their attentions back to the league and today's test against Luton – who were Allsop's first opponents as a Wycombe player two-and-a-half years ago.

"It's a big task – Luton are a good side; we know that from last season," he said. "We'll go into it with confidence on the back of two wins and hopefully get another one."

"We can start looking forward now; we're getting a bit of stability and getting to know each other a bit more. A few of us have played together before and it's just a case of refreshing our memory of how each other plays, and we can only get stronger and better."




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NICK'S NATTER

STATE OF PLAY

Phil Catchpole reviews the latest offering from Michael Calvin


I'd barely had a chance to tuck my trusty Three Lions shirt back in the drawer, cleansed of all the flying beers, tears and sweat of a scorching World Cup summer. But, the English Football League and Premier League was BACK already to dazzle us with its rollercoaster ride of emotions for another glorious season.

Fresh from a young and multi-cultural England team giving a lot of us something to unite behind in these most fractious of times, surely now is the time for football to puff its chest out and be proud of its wonderful unifying and far reaching influence for good. Or is it? As you and I both know from bitter experience – where there is hope, despair is never far away.

'State Of Play' is the latest offering from award winning journalist Michael Calvin and the turning of the pages is akin to watching an end to end, nail-biting cup tie. As you'd expect from a hugely impressive thirty odd years at the coal-face of journalism, the supporting cast assembled by Calvin is of the very highest calibre – Arsene Wenger at his philosophical best; the gravel soaked common sense of Sean Dyche; Steven Gerrard, Dele Alli and Gareth Southgate et al. But the common thread throughout Calvin's work is the light he shines behind the scenes, unearthing the human stories and unsung heroes who are the real stars of the show.

The book is made up of an exhaustive nineteen chapters, split into four parts – The Player; The Manager; The Club and The People.

The opening pages are a literal bucket of cold water to the face as the dying moments of former West Brom legend Jeff Astle are poignantly recounted by his daughter Dawn. Astle died aged just 59 from the ravaging effects of



Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy (CTE), a condition common in boxers.

Thanks to the relentless campaigning of Dawn Astle, the FA and PFA have finally commissioned an independent study into the long-term effects of heading a football. I was completely unaware of the issue of CTE, but with shockingly high numbers of former footballers potentially affected, it could have huge ramifications for the game. Calvin's delicate treatment of this topic is as skilful as it is heartbreaking and provides Dawn's fight the exposure it surely deserves.

With my attention firmly in his grasp, Calvin's investigative journey calls at homophobia, mental health issues, failing protocols for assessing and safeguarding injured players, outdated toxic-masculinity, sexism and the high pressure culture of the modern game.

The backdrop for these stories is behind the scenes at some of the biggest clubs in the world alongside prisons, housing estates, homeless shelters and non-league grounds. The beauty of this book is that people like Tony McCool, manager of Dunstable Town, working with a budget of zero sits side by side with the general manager of FC Barcelona, Jose Segura. Everyone has equal importance and input in 'State Of Play' as Calvin gets under the skin of the beautiful game.

It's far from all doom and gloom though. The superb bluntness of

Accrington Stanley chairman Andy Holt is thoroughly invigorating as his opening quote of chapter 13 illustrates perfectly:


"Sport in this country is being taken over by rich people who take the p**. Football is a gambling den. It's not an industry. It is just a casino. It's awful. Some clubs are like Formula One cars, allowed to fit rocket boosters. I'm still pedalling this little bike like mad."

Holt is the local boy made good who has taken it upon himself to make sure the club that famously wouldn't die continues to stay alive for the good of the community. There is no magic wand with Holt or unsustainable spending, just gritty pragmatism and an amazing transparency that fans of other clubs might not want to admit to being slightly jealous of. And it's working too with Stanley waltzing to the League Two title last season.

Triumph in the face of adversity is a common theme, often doused in perspective allowing success or failure to be measured outside of the binary form of football results. Calvin's pursuit of the ugly truth is a masterclass of balanced, informed journalism. The facts and testimonies are woven together with a free flowing and relatable passion for the game which places trust in us as readers to see the message for ourselves.

I have learnt a huge amount from the books of Michael Calvin and 'State Of Play' is his finest work to date. I just hope that the power brokers in football can bear to look in the mirror that Calvin holds up to them.



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25 Years On

We continue our trip down memory lane,
retelling the tale of the 1993/94 season

An unbeaten August came to an end with the 4-3 win at Hereford, as documented in the previous edition of Parklife, and Wanderers' first season in the EFL was set to build further momentum with four points from their next two league games.

With a League Cup tie against top-flight Coventry City on the horizon, Martin O'Neill's men weren't to be distracted from their focus as they collected a well-earned 1-1 draw against Gillingham at Adams Park on Saturday 4th September 1993.

O'Neill, however, was a man of high standards and didn't quite see it the same way, commenting afterwards: "We were absolutely hopeless. That's our first poor performance and I've still no idea why. That was not even Diadora (Isthmian League) defending. We were very poor. When we did get the ball, we did not do anything with it. It is sad that is how we played for the thousands who turned up. There were a floating 1,000 supporters here. It must have been disappointing for them."

Those floating fans bolstered an overall attendance of over 6,000

who were confident of another Chairboys success against a Gills outfit who were without a win in their opening league fixtures.

The hosts were without Tim Langford through illness and his absence contributed to a mediocre first half with few chances, as Gillingham – with future Blues boss and assistant manager Neil Smillie and Gary Micklewhite in their side – enjoyed the best of the opportunities.

Normal order looked to be resumed on the hour-mark when Dave Carroll was pulled back in the area, with Keith Scott dispatching the penalty, but teenage striker Nicky Forster – a thorn in the side of the Blues throughout his career – waltzed away down the right with just minutes left on the clock.

O'Neill dipped into the transfer market to bolster his squad ahead of the trip to Bury the following weekend, with Tony Hemmings arriving from Northwich Victoria for an initial £25,000. Meanwhile Glyn Creaser made a long-awaited return from injury in a reserve game at Woking, alongside Mark West – who had signed Football League terms with the club despite originally

opting against turning full-time – and trialist Kenny Sansom, formerly of England and Arsenal.

And Hemmings made a name for himself on his debut with a game-changing cameo from the bench, aiding the Chairboys in their 2-1 victory at Gigg Lane. Andy Kerr opened the scoring – adding to his brace in the win at Hereford – when he steered Terry Evans' header over the line, before Hemmings came off the bench to set up the second goal for Tim Langford, who'd only just come on as a substitute himself.

Luther Blissett scored a consolation for the Shakers from Alan Knill's assist but Wycombe held on and climbed to fourth in the league, with O'Neill commenting: "It's not just that but the manner and way we play. We are having a go at teams and scoring quite a number of goals away from home – in four games we have scored nine goals – so we are attacking."

Then came a reunion with old Conference foes Colchester United... and that story is best kept for another day.






Using the car? These are the recommended road directions. Take the M40 towards London and the anti-clockwise M25. Leave at J2 and follow the A2 towards London. After around 12 miles the road splits with the A2 going off to the left and the right-hand lanes becoming the A102. Proceed on the A102 towards the Blackwall Tunnel. Leave the A102 at the next slip road (sign posted Woolwich & Ferry A206). At the bottom of the slip road turn right at the traffic lights towards Woolwich/Charlton. Proceed along the A206 passing the Antigallican pub on your right (the ground and away entrance are diagonally behind this pub). For the main club entrance and car park go straight over the next roundabout, passing a retail park on the left. At the next roundabout, go right around it turning back on yourself along the A206. Then take the first left into Charlton Road. Cross over the railway and after passing the Royal Oak pub on the right, turn right into Harvey Gardens. The ground is on the left.

Travelling by coach? OWWSA will be running a coach that will leave Adams Park at 11:30. Travel prices are £17 for adults, £16 for seniors, and £15 for juniors. The price for non-members is £22 (no refund if game is cancelled and the coaches have left their depot). If you wish to book by phone (Rena 01494 520179, Graham 07876 267301) or by e-mail (bookings@owwsa.co.uk) you need to do so by Thursday 6th September at 5pm. If booking by email please make sure you receive an acknowledgment.

Using the train? There are very regular services from London Bridge, Charing Cross and St Pancras International. The Valley is a very short walk from Charlton station – exit into Charlton Church Lane (all exits lead onto this road), turn right and cross over to the other side. Take the next left into Floyd Road and then right into Valley Grove for the away section entrance.


Facilities for away fans. The ground capacity is 27,111 (all seated). Away fans are housed in the Jimmy Seed (South) Stand at one

end of the ground, which is slightly raised above pitch level, making for a good view. The height between rows is good and the stand quite steep, keeping you fairly close to the playing action. There are refreshment areas on either side of the stand. There is a decent fish and chip shop at the top of Floyd Road, which you pass on the way to the away fans entrance.

Spare time on your hands?

"The Antigallican", near Charlton station, is a favourite haunt of away fans. It can though get very busy. Another option is the "Rose of Denmark" on Woolwich Road. Apparently, the pub has a photo display on the wall of fans from visiting clubs that have visited previously. I have read this is a "home supporters only" pub after the game. To find these pubs come out of Charlton station and turn left into Charlton Church Lane. The Antigallican pub is down on the right-hand corner. If you continue down to the T-junction with the Woolwich Road and turn left you will find the Rose of Denmark further down on the left. Alternatively, alcohol is available in the away end.

SETTING THE SCENE

A look ahead to the next 90 minutes

England never win penalty shootouts, they said. Wycombe never win League Cup ties, they said. And Wycombe never win at home to Luton, you'll be reminded at least once this afternoon no doubt.

The 13th attempt last season looked to be the landmark moment that that record changed, with the Chairboys holding a 1-0 lead going into injury time. Scott Brown had already denied Danny Hylton from the penalty spot, but the Hatters weren't to be denied, and not only found an equaliser but also a winner with virtually the last kick.

Wanderers made amends at Kenilworth Road in January, winning 3-2 to prevent Luton opening up a 12-point lead at the top of League 2, and that result proved pivotal with Town ultimately losing their grip on top spot to Accrington, and Wycombe carrying that momentum into a successful promotion bid of their own.

Now the two teams are reunited

in League 1, having both overcome early scares that the step up in class might be larger than first anticipated. Both collected just one point from their opening three league games, but turned a corner on August 21st, with Luton defeating Southend and repeating the feat against Shrewsbury at the weekend.

Meanwhile Gareth Ainsworth's men found a new formula at Plymouth, partly imposed by Adebayo Akinfenwa's demotion to the bench which gave former Hatter Craig Mackail-Smith a new lease of life in attack. He was rewarded with the opening goal in last Saturday's win at Bradford, with loan signing Bryn Morris also on target and bringing a new energy to the midfield that may have been lost with the sale of Luke O'Nien to Sunderland.

The Bedfordshire club have had the full week to prepare for today's game, with the Blues in action on Tuesday night, rotating half their team for the Carabao Cup tie with Forest Green Rovers which

ultimately proved to be successful by virtue of a victory on penalties.

Therefore a positive fortnight since the defeat to Bristol Rovers last time out in the league at Adams Park gives Wanderers the confidence that today could be the day to banish the Hatters' hoodoo, though Luton have only won once away since January which provides their own ammunition to push extra hard for the three points today.

Geography deems this game a derby even though any rivalry between the clubs has been fairly muted in recent times, but two thrilling encounters last season – with some pantomime villain performances thrown in for good measure – may just give this one added spice to leave both sets of fans perched on the edge of their seats.

HEAD-TO-HEAD

All of Wycombe's five victories have come at Kenilworth Road, so it's no surprise that Luton hold the upper hand with 11 wins from 25 meetings in league and cup.

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

OVERVIEW

Back-to-back home wins over Southend and Shrewsbury have restored credibility to the Hatters' belief that they can compete for a top six finish this season, having endured a baptism of fire with opening games against promotion favourites Portsmouth, Sunderland and Peterborough, collecting one point from three.

Boss Nathan Jones added to his squad significantly in January with a view to securing League 1 football and was active again in the summer, bringing the likes of Jorge Grant, Sonny Bradley and Matty Pearson to the club, which naturally can create the need for a 'settling in period' before the Hatters hit top form. The Hatters didn't make an electric start to last season, sitting 13th around this stage following a 3-0 loss to Swindon, but many fans

point to their win at Adams Park as a catalyst for the success that was to follow.

TACTICS

Nathan Jones favoured a diamond formation for much of last season, with their narrow midfield giving space for full-backs Dan Potts and James Stacey to bomb forward with freedom. It was a similar story last time out in their 3-2 win over Shrewsbury, with Stacey finding the net with a smart finish, showing he's capable of matching Potts' goal return of seven last season.

That would leave Sonny Bradley and Matty Pearson in the centre of defence, with Glen Rea shielding in front, and then Pelly Ruddock and Andrew Shinnie linking the play from box to box in the middle.

Jorge Grant is therefore given a free role to find pockets of space and work his magic behind the front two of Danny Hylton and Elliot Lee, though Hylton came off at half-time last week and may need to make way for James Collins.

Defensive-minded James Justin came off the bench to replace Grant as soon as they took the lead on Saturday, and with Jones keen to record their first away win since early April, they may adopt a similar mindset if they go in front today.

Other options off the bench include Jake Jervis, who is more of a target man than the creative Harry Cornick in attack, while Luke Gambin and Lloyd Jones are waiting for their first EFL minutes of the season.

IN CHARGE: NATHAN JONES

The former defender enjoyed a career that saw him ply his trade in

his homeland of Wales, Spain and England, turning out for the likes of Merthyr Tydfil, Numancia and Yeovil. He began life as a professional after David Pleat brought him to Luton from Merthyr in 1995.

This is his first managerial role – save for a short stint in charge as caretaker manager at Brighton in 2014 – and he's approaching three years in the Kenilworth Road dugout. After coming agonisingly close to making the play-off final in his first full season at the helm, he achieved automatic promotion last time round, and is just shy of a 50% win rate during his time at the club.

HIGHS & LOWS

Adrian Wood takes an overall look at earlier fixtures with today's opponents




Since entering the Football League in 1993 Wycombe have met Luton on a regular basis in the lower two divisions. Meetings began in the old Division 2 in season 1996/97 and continued until the Hatters were relegated at the end of the 2000/01 season. Since 2014/15 the sides have met annually in League 2 with both teams achieving automatic promotion at the end of last season.

In total there have been 24 Football League meetings, Luton have the distinct edge with 10 victories compared to Wycombe's meagre five

successes. All Wycombe's victories have come at Kenilworth Road. Thus, including the FA Cup meeting in 2004/05 (see below) Luton remain unbeaten at Adams Park in 13 fixtures. Of Luton's 10 league victories, just four have come at Kenilworth Road.

FIRST EVER MEETING

This was at Adams Park on September 7th 1996 and a crowd of 6,471 witnessed a 1-0 Luton victory. From a Wycombe point of view the game was best remembered for being the one and only appearance in a Wycombe shirt of former England star Ray Wilkins. The game's only goal

came in the 54th minute and was scored by David Oldfield.

The return fixture at Kenilworth Road on April 8th ended goalless (att. 7,626). It was a valuable point for Wycombe who were in 21st place at the time. Luton finished 3rd but lost out to Crewe in their play-off semi-final. Meanwhile Wycombe finished strongly, managing 10 points from their last five fixtures to end up 18th, eight points clear of relegation.

WYCOMBE HIGHS

Season 2008/09 was a significant one – for both clubs. Before a ball had been kicked the Hatters had been docked a massive 30 points for financial irregularities. The sides met at Adams Park in December when Wycombe stood proudly six points clear at the top of League 2. Playing conditions were difficult due to heavy rain and the sides played out a goal less draw. That afternoon's attendance was 5,567.

At the time of the Kenilworth Road return in April Wycombe were third and needed seven points from their last three games to secure automatic promotion. They managed three of those points with a 1-0 success but already relegated Luton didn't make life easy for them. The crucial goal came on 56 minutes when John Akinde used his strength to hold off the Hatters' defence and fired past Dean Brill. It was his seventh goal in nine games since joining on loan from Bristol City. The attendance for this meeting was 6,553.

That goal helped Wycombe to an eventual third place finish and

automatic promotion. Luton were relegated to the Blue Square Premier – without the points deduction they would have finished comfortably in mid-table.

LUTON HIGHS

The Hatters have completed the league double over the Chairboys on two occasions. On the opening day of the 1998/99 Division 2 campaign a Steve Davis goal earned them a 1-0 success at Adams Park. The return at Luton in January was a lively affair. Wycombe had two men sent off, Paul McCarthy and Keith Ryan. Luton, who had Phil Gray sent off, won 3-1 with goals from a certain Matt Spring, Sean Evers and Stuart Douglas. Dave Carroll netted a late consolation penalty for Wycombe. Luton finished 12th with Wycombe down in 19th.

Moving onto season 2002/03 a bumper holiday crowd of 7,740 saw



Luton win 2-1 at Adams Park on December 28th. Two goals from Steve Howard put the visitors in charge although Jonny Dixon's goal had given Wycombe hope. Four weeks later Matt Spring netted the game's only goal in the return at Kenilworth Road (att. 7,351). Luton finished 9th in Division 2 that season with Wycombe in 18th place.

CELEBRATION FOR BOTH CLUBS!

Last season Wycombe must have thought they had earned their first ever home win over Luton when they led through Adebayo Akinfenwa's 40th minute goal. Luton however finished in dramatic style claiming the points with last minute goals from Scott Cuthbert and James Collins. There was more drama at Kenilworth Road in late January. Despite two goals from Elliot Lee the Chairboys claimed three crucial points through an early strike from Paris Cowan Hall and a brace from Nathan Tyson. The final league placings saw Luton second and Wycombe third with both clubs winning automatic promotion to League 1.

CUP MEETINGS – IN SUMMARY

The one and only cup meeting between the sides was an FA Cup second round tie at Adams Park in December 2004. This was John Gorman's first game in charge at Wycombe. The Chairboys (12th in League 2) were no match for Mike Newell's Luton side who were riding high at the top of League 1. The Hatters won 3-0 with two goals from Steve Howard and one from Kevin Nicholls. Luton lost out to Brentford in the next round but finished the campaign as League 1 Champions.

Adebayo Akinfenwa opened the scoring in this game last season

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MAKING A STAND

Crisps were chosen as the missile of choice after reports that Charlton staff had been banned from eating lunch at their desks to reduce cleaning bills.

It isn't the first time supporters have vented their anger at the Valley; in 2016, they threw thousands of foam pigs onto the pitch. And they aren't the only supporters to get creative when it comes to protests either...

FC Basel

Fans of Basel FC Luzern were understandably furious when a league fixture in 2010 was moved forward at just 48 hours' notice.

The reason? The TV company showing the game wanted to make sure it was over before home favourite Roger Federer faced Novak Djokovic in the final of the Basel Open.

Quick thinking supporters then raided every sportshop and, when the referee blew for kick-off, peleted the pitch with hundreds of tennis balls.

The referee was eventually forced to take the players off the pitch whilst hardy stewards cleared up amid an ongoing hail.

Manchester City (sort of)

During a match between Everton and Man City at Goodison Park in 2012, visiting fan Michael Foley ambled on to the pitch and shackled himself to Joe Hart's goal post.



His beef was not with the Head & Shoulders salesman or even with his club; closer inspection revealed he was wearing a t-shirt criticising Ryanair, whom he accused of sacking his daughter during the 2008 recession.

After a chat with Toffees skipper Phil Neville, Foley was eventually cut free by police wielding bolt cutters and chuck in the cells for a night. Curiously enough, Ryanair owner and City fan Michael O'Leary was actually in the stands that night.

New Orleans Saints

By 1980, the Saints had been a pro NFL side for 17 years and never finished with a winning record, let alone made the Super Bowl.

In protest at this ongoing ineptitude, fan Robert Lecompte ordered 5,000 paper bags for supporters to wear on their heads, thus sparing them the embarrassment of being identified as Saints supporters.

Just to complete the effect, each mask came with 'Aints' written in gold letters and the team's grisly

record printed beneath the eye holes.

RB Leipzig

Thought MK Dons were unpopular? Trying being Red Bull Leipzig. Back in 2009, the big-spending Bundesliga outfit were little old Markranstädt, an amateur side in Germany's regional fifth division.

Then Red Bull bought the club, changed the name, crest and kit, and set about spending their way to the top flight.

This did not sit well with Germany's traditional supporters, nor the small hardcore of Markranstadt fans. Red Bull adverts were defaced, the pitch and stands vandalised.

Fans of visiting teams refused to attend. At away games, Leipzig were met with black-clad fans or lengthy silent protests. Even today, the thriving 'Say no to RB' movement sees opposing fans wait outside grounds for 15 minutes after kick off.



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FOOTBALLING INJURIES

We all know how devastating it is when one of our team goes down on the pitch with an injury, and it's even more devastating for the player as it could mean their ability to continue playing is jeopardised.

Whether professional or amateur, it is extremely important to look after our bodies before during and after playing so as to avoid injury. We have been speaking to Orthopaedic Consultant Mr Bhupinder Mann who practises at the home of our Medical Sponsors, BMI The Chiltern Hospital in Great Missenden. He often sees and treats players for football inflicted injuries, including our own Wycombe Wanderers, and we wanted to ask him a few questions about what we can do to help avoid injury.

What is the most common injury that you see and treat in footballers?

The anterior cruciate ligament rupture is probably the most common injury I see in football players. This typically involves an indirect twist through the knee whilst the foot is planted firmly into the ground. There is often an associated pop or click followed by a rapid onset of swelling. Rest, elevation and ice packing are important first aid measures. Diagnosis is often made clinically and confirmed by performing an MRI scan.

What are the symptoms of an Anterior Cruciate Ligament rupture?

The main symptom is giving way of the knee. This leads to a loss of confidence in the knee and an inability to play football.

What treatment is available and how long does it take to recover?

The first line of treatment is physiotherapy to help strengthen the whole of the limb. This includes functional core and gluteal muscle strengthening as well as focussing on the muscles around the knee.

Some people can significantly improve after physio and may not require surgery.

For those who continue to experience giving way after physio and are finding it difficult to return to football the recognised treatment is an Anterior Cruciate Ligament reconstruction.

The surgery itself is only the beginning in a long chain of events! A dedicated course of rehabilitation is mandatory following the surgery. This rehab is as important as the surgery and lasts for up to a year post surgery.

Risks and side effects

The risks include re-rupture, infection, clots, numbness and swelling. In rare circumstances complete resolution of symptoms

and return to pre injury function remains impossible.

What would you advise someone who plays football regularly to do to avoid this type of injury?

Warm up before playing by stretching!

Also having a strong core and posterior muscular chain will help minimise your chances of losing balance and twisting across the knee.

In your opinion are professional football players more prone to injury than amateur players?

Difficult to say. Professional football players are more likely to have better neuromuscular limb control than say a "weekend warrior" and therefore less prone to injury. However they are also more likely to incur a higher velocity injury!

What other sports could you recommend to strengthen the muscles at risk in football?

I would try Yoga, Pilates or fitness training to keep on top of your game – they are good for muscle and core strength.

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GETTING SHIRTY

Ian Baker calls for a common sense approach

There are plenty of things that annoy me in football but none more so than a small sub-section of Law 12 concerning excessive celebration.

To my knowledge this rule preventing the removal of a shirt or climbing into the crowd was introduced to prevent political messages and crowd disorder.

The game of football has 17 major laws but there is also an 18th and one that is introduced to all prospective referees on their first day of training: that is the law of common sense and that should outweigh all other laws.

I think referees are so concerned with what their assessor may say they often apply rules too literally. Certainly this section of Law 12 should only, in my view, be applied in extreme cases of excessive celebration, cases likely to cause serious harm to the public, be inflammatory towards opposing fans or bring the game into disrepute.

Matt Bloomfield celebrating with a dozen fans at Plymouth after scoring Wycombe's first away goal of the season should not meet the criteria for a yellow card.

Neither should Harry Maguire taking off his shirt and diving on his knees in front of Leicester's fans after scoring the winner for his club at Southampton last week, a game I was covering last week.

Maguire explained to me afterwards that he would probably regret the celebration and subsequent booking in a few days but at the time the adrenaline rush completely took over.

There was also a certain match a few years ago where Steve Brown took off his shirt after a last minute



winner to reveal the name of his sick son Maxwell. Leicester City, away, FA Cup quarter-final 2000-01. It does not get any bigger than that. That particular story made front page news in The Sun. But nothing seems to have changed since.

Do we really want a game devoid of all excitement? Celebrations are part of the entertainment and as long as they do not cross a line should be encouraged.

The rule is clearly not going to be changed but that famous Law 18 could be used a bit more by referees.

Talking of excitement, that 3-2 victory at Luton for Wycombe last season will probably go down as my favourite game of the last 12 months.

Gareth Ainsworth admitted as much when he claimed that win was the moment he felt that the Chairboys would win promotion.

It was a night where everything went right and showed just how much this side had grown. Ainsworth got his tactics spot on

and outfoxed his opposite number with the pace of Nathan Tyson and Paris Cowan-Hall proving crucial.

It was enjoyable as a fan to see my side take on a decent opposition on their own home turf by constantly attacking - sometimes that is the best form of defence.

Wycombe have had their battles over the years with Luton and who could forget the sickening defeat in injury time at Adams Park around this time 12 months ago?

This game I'm sure will be one that many immediately looked out for when the fixtures were introduced just because it is a local derby and has a bit of needle to it.

Here's hoping to finally get one over on the Hatters at home today. But if Wycombe do score a dramatic last minute winner, don't over-celebrate, it might not go down too well with the referee!

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


