NATHAN JONES

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's Sky Bet League One game against Bristol Rovers.

It seems an age since we last played in the league here when Shrewsbury visited three weeks ago, and a lot has happened on and off the pitch since then.

I'll start by welcoming everyone who has travelled up from the Memorial Stadium, including all Bristol Rovers supporters, directors, officials, Darrell Clarke and Marcus Stewart, their staff and their players, and I hope they have a safe journey back west tonight.

Like Luton Town, Rovers have experienced Non-League life in the not-too-distant past, but are now an established League One club currently in their third season in the division following successive promotions back from the National League.

We know they will represent another stern test and act as another good gauge for where we are at, just as Sunderland, Southend and Shrewsbury have in previous home matches.

Our last two games on the road may have produced only the one point, which we earned by coming from behind yet again at Wycombe, but we know that performance levels have been good enough to have realistically come back with all six.

Once we stop conceding early goals and giving ourselves a mountain to climb in matches, we know we'll be more of a force to be reckoned than we already are.

The overall structure to our play, our domination of long periods of matches and the number of openings we are creating has been terrific to see as we get used to the new level with as tough a start as you could have imagined, but we need to start converting that positivity into points.



Off the pitch, we've said farewell to Paul Hart, who has been a great help to me in his two years as my assistant-manager. Harty's a wonderful friend and mentor, and he did everything I asked of him, completely committed to the role.

But the travelling from his home in Nottingham was proving tough, and when the opportunity arose at Notts County, it was a sensible lifestyle decision for Paul to make at his stage of life. It gives him a new challenge, one that I know he'll relish, and we all wish him every success back at Meadow Lane.

Back to today, and the atmosphere here at Kenilworth Road for the first three games has been electric. It's no coincidence that we're unbeaten, with that near-capacity crowd behind us. As always, your support on the road for the past fortnight has been phenomenal, too.

Please continue to get behind the team as we look to bounce quickly back to winning ways.

Enjoy the game.



FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN DAVID WILKINSON

Hello everyone and a very warm welcome to Henilworth Road.

Today we entertain the officials, players and supporters from Bristol Rovers. It's just under three years since we last faced the Pirates, when we lost 2-0 under the caretaker management of Andy Awford, a week before we welcomed Nathan Jones to the club.

Perhaps the most memorable game to me was on Boxing Day in 2007, the last time we were in League One, where we managed an amazing rearguard action to draw 1-1 at their place whilst ending up with only eight men on the pitch. Tense isn't the word for it! We look forward to another challenging match this afternoon.

Our recent form has been somewhat of an enigma. Our performances have deserved better, and apart from a spell against Peterborough, we have rarely been outplayed. It's always gratifying when even the opposition say we played well, but it doesn't earn us any points.

There has been a lot of discussion recently about modern football including ownership of league clubs, it being particularly noted how few are owned by fans, supporters or people connected with their local communities. This is particularly true in the Premier League and Championship.

We noticed a tweet from Nick Owen recently celebrating the 60th anniversary of his first game against Leeds United, which got us thinking about the supporting history of the Board. Nick, as you all know, resigned as chairman a year ago having been our figurehead for nearly ten years. Although he was never a member of the Board or an investor in 2020, he played an invaluable role representing us with the media and as our most famous fan, after Eric of course. We continue to owe him a debt of thanks for all he did through those difficult years.

It is amazing how so many of us began to support so close together. Our first season in the top flight was 1955/56 so perhaps that higher profile, at the time, drew us in.

Mike Herrick tops our list, his first game being Blackpool here in September 1957, which we won 2-0 in front of 19,567 with goals from Allan Brown and Mick Cullen.

Bob Curson is next having been at the same Leeds game as Nick, so he too has made his 60th year. The game ended as a 1-1 draw in front of 13,497 on a Wednesday afternoon with the goal scored by Brown.

My first game was the next one, against West Ham, in September 1958, which we won 4-1 in front of 25,715 with goals from Gordon Turner (2), Brown and Dave Pacey. We were unbeaten for the first ten games of that season and I was hooked. Sadly, we lost the FA Cup Final at the end of the season and were relegated the following year, which began a ten-year slide down the divisions. However, that was not enough to dim my enthusiasm, nor that of my present 2020 colleagues.

Mick Pattinson was next watching us play Spurs with his dad in late 1958, a game we lost 2-1 in front of 23,592 fans with a goal from Billy Bingham. Mick's dad was landlord of the Hare and Hounds pub in Old Warden and couldn't go very often, so Mick would tag along with customers instead.

Gratitude

Gary Sweet's first game was in September 1971 against Middlesbrough. We won 3-2 in front of 13,001 with goals from Vic Halom, Robin Wainwright and Peter Anderson. Gary told me that he wanted to support Arsenal after taking a liking to Charlie George, but it was short-lived until his mum clipped him round the ear and told him he was going to see his home town team the next day. We all owe his mum a great debt of gratitude!

Paul Ballantyne's debut game was in 1972 in the League Cup replay against Birmingham City. We drew 1-1 with a goal from John Aston to take it to a second replay, which we managed to lose 1-0 at the neutral venue of the County Ground, Northampton.

Although he had been close to attending on an earlier occasion, Stephen Browne's first game was here against Aston Villa in 1983. He was brought along by his grandad, who, ironically, had trialled with Villa before the war. We won 2-1 with goals from Trevor Aylott and David Moss in front of 10,924.

What is the point of all this you may ask? Well, it's about credentials and custodianship. I doubt there is a club in the country where the current Board of Directors and investors have some 370 years of supporting their Club. If you include vice presidents,


who are former chairmen, investors and directors, the numbers go off the chart.

Where the majority were born in, or have a major connection to the town, and have proved their resilience by continuing to support throughout adversity. We know the highs and the lows. We have reached the top and touched the bottom.

There are those in connection with our planning applications, who try to cast doubt on our motives. They don't know us. We are a steadfast bunch. When 2020 was put together we backed a plan, and ten years on that plan is still good and we are more determined than ever to make it happen for the Town and the Club.

If there are any youngsters watching for the first time, can you imagine in 2078 looking back to today, as we are looking back to our first games? That's why we are only custodians of this unique Club and why our plans are so important.

Whilst I'm on the subject of determination – Alastair Cook – what a shining example of a sporting professional! Could I close by extending on behalf of us all our congratulations to our fellow Hatter. What an incredible achievement. We wish him every success in the future and a happy retirement and hope to see him in the Kenny again soon.

The 28-year-old, who counts Torquay United and Bournemouth among his former clubs, has joined the Town until January 10th.

Speaking after his impressive debut as a second-half sub in the 1-1 draw at Wycombe a fortnight ago, the seven-times capped Republic of Ireland international said: “I spoke to Nathan on the phone and he said, ‘I wish I could sit down with you and I’d inspire you about football’ and I was thinking, he’d already done that, and we had only been on the phone five minutes, so credit to him.





Teenage forward Josh Neufville recently put pen to paper on his first professional contract with the Hatters.

The pacy 17-year-old, who hit double figures last season as part of the Under-18s side that won the EFL Youth Alliance Cup, signed a two-year contract running until the end of 2019-20.

Luton boy Josh has been with the Town's academy since he was an Under-10, having played his earlier football with neighbours Crawley Green.

Hatters boss Nathan Jones said: "Josh is a young man that we feel can make the step up. He's done excellently in recent months and is someone that we've monitored and tried to make sure that we nurture carefully.

"For a long time we've identified him as someone who could potentially step into the first team environment, but we've had to make sure that we do it at the right time.

"His application, his all-round quality and ability has really put him closer to the first team squad, and we feel that now is the ideal time to take up that option of giving him a pro contract, so we can see him challenge and hopefully fulfil his potential."

Josh made his senior debut as a substitute in the Checkatrade Trophy win over Brighton, the day after turning pro.

UNDER-15S IN NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT

The Hatters Under-15s have reached the group stages of the Premier League Floodlit Cup – a Champions League style tournament that could see the Town play across the country.




BRISTOL ROVERS



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting staff, players and supporters of Bristol Rovers.

It was a season of consolidation last season for Gas after their impressive climb from Non-League football just three years ago. Two relegations in four years saw Rovers drop into the Conference in 2014, but they made an instant return to League Two, winning back-to-back promotions when they went up again the following season. A tenth placed finish in 2016/17 saw them slow down their upward curve, but last season's mid-table finish was by no means a failure.

They achieved all this under Darrell Clarke, who has four promotions to his name as a manager, having taken Salisbury City from the Southern Premier League up to the Conference, before his appointment at the Memorial Stadium in 2013 as assistant manager. He took over the reins late on in that season, but was unable to turn around their fortunes as they were relegated on goal difference, falling into the drop zone only on the final day.

The Pirates have a decent squad – although it was weakened by the departure of Billy Boden at the beginning of the year. Liam Sercombe is arguably

one of the best midfielders in the league, and his 12 goals from the middle of the park last year makes it easy to see why he was so sought-after following his promotion with Oxford United in 2016.

They've added quality in the summer in the form Stefan Payne, who was top scorer for play-off finalists Shrewsbury Town last season, bagging 14 times.

It's been a tough start though for Clarke, a draw at home to Plymouth last week moved them up to five points from their opening seven games, picking up two draws and one win – that coming against Wycombe Wanderers. Defensively they haven't been too bad, but goals have been hard to come by; netting just six so far.

Formed in 1883, the Pirates were first admitted to the Football League in 1920. Their highest ever league finish was sixth place in the second tier in 1956 and 1959, and they were EFL Trophy finalists in both 1990 and 2007, the latter in which they were defeated 3-2 by Doncaster Rovers at the Millennium Stadium.

Took over: March 2014


As a player, Clarke clocked up more than 400 appearances across the EFL with a handful of clubs. He hung up his boots at Salisbury City in 2013, although the 40-year-old had worked as player-manager for the club since 2010. He then went on to take over as manager of today's visitors in March 2014 after serving as assistant to John Ward for the previous nine months. He could not prevent Rovers' relegation from the Football League that season though, eventually going down on goal difference, losing to his boyhood club Mansfield Town. Despite this, the Mansfield-born gaffer led the Pirates to an immediate return from the Conference, and then up to League One the following season, where they are now in their third campaign.



THE STOPPER

Jack Bonham | Age: 24

The Stevenage-born shot stopper began his career with Watford but struggled to find game time, making just one senior appearance with the Hornets. The 24-year-old then signed for current club, Brentford, in 2013, before going out on loan to Non-League Arlesey Town. After a successful spell with Carlisle United last season, making over 40 appearances, Rovers snapped up the keeper for a second successive season-long loan before last month's deadline. Bonham made his first appearance for the Pirates in the recent 1-1 draw with Shrewsbury, making a few important saves in the process to ensure that the points were shared.



GOALKEEPER

ADAM SMITH
AGE: 25

Signed from Northampton Town in 2017. The keeper has made three appearances so far this season, taking over from Sam Slocombe since his loan move to Lincoln City.



DEFENDERS

DANIEL LEADBITTER
AGE: 27

Defender who has been with Rovers since 2014. He came up through the youth system at Newcastle and was part of the Conference play-off winning side.



TONY CRAIG

AGE: 33

The experienced centre-half who has had three spells with Millwall, was snapped up by Rovers on a free deal in January 2018 following his release by the Lions.

DID YOU KNOW?

Bristol Rovers' goalkeeper Jack Bonham was the man between the sticks for Carlisle when Olly Lee scored that famous goal away at Brunton Park last April to send the Hatters back up to Sky Bet League One for the first time in a decade.



THE WALL

Tom Lockyer

Age: 24

A real fans' favourite and the man with the arm band, Tom Lockyer has seen it all with Bristol Rovers. After his release from the youth set-up at Cardiff City, the Welshman penned a deal with Rovers in 2011 and went on to make his senior debut in 2012. His brilliant form in his first season won him the Supporters' Club Young Player of the Year award. From there, the 24-year-old has gone on to make more than 200 appearances for Rovers, playing a big part in the side that won two promotions in two seasons, as well as that horrible relegation that Hatters fans know all too well. The defender's solid performances at the back have also been rewarded with four senior international call ups for Wales.

IN THE MIDDLE

Ollie Clarke

Age: 26

The club's longest serving player has been incredibly unfortunate over his time at the Memorial Stadium. Hailing from Somerset, the 26-year-old began his career with Rovers as a schoolboy, before turning professional with the club in 2009. The creative midfielder has had a frustrating career, tarnished with injuries, spending the majority of the 2011/12 season watching from the sidelines after rupturing his anterior cruciate ligament on the first day of pre-season training. Having started all the Pirates' matches so far, Clarke will be hoping to recreate last season's form and play another big part in the side.



JAMES CLARKE

Age: 28

Born in nearby Aylesbury, Clarke started his career at Oxford United. He was an important defensive player for the Pirates in their Sky Bet League Two promotion season in 2015-16.

TOM BROADBENT

Age: 26

Followed a unique but somewhat rewarding route into professional football, Broadbent only signed his first professional contract with Rovers in 2017 after spending six years in the army.



JOE PARTINGTON

Age: 28

The ex-Eastleigh captain signed for the Pirates in 2017 for an undisclosed fee. The Welshman started his career at Bournemouth, making more than 50 appearances for the Cherries.



TAREIQ HOLMES-DENNIS

Age: 22

Yet to make an appearance at the Memorial Stadium, the talented defender struggled to make it into the Huddersfield Town side and signed for Rovers in July of this year.

The tall winger has played all over England for a number of clubs including Tamworth, Notts County, Grimsby and Newport. He even had a stint playing futsal for the English national side.

WATCH OUT**Stefan Payne**
Age: 27

The striker started in Non-League, playing for a host of clubs including Sutton United, Ebbsfleet United and Dover Athletic, where his form led to a move to Championship side Barnsley in 2016. It proved to be unsuccessful, as Payne was loaned out to Shrewsbury halfway through the season, and was subsequently sold the following year. The forward made 38 league

appearances for the Shrews last season, scoring 14 in all competitions to finish as their top scorer while reaching both the Checkatrade Trophy and League One play-off finals. Rovers bought Payne for an undisclosed fee at the start of this season, scoring on his home competitive debut in a 2-1 defeat against Accrington Stanley.

CLASSIC CLASH WITH THE PIRATES

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

6TH SEPTEMBER 1969 • LUTON TOWN 4 BRISTOL ROVERS 0

Luton Town supporters were a little down in the dumps over the summer of 1969. In the days before play-offs, the Hatters had finished a clear third in Division Three (now League One) the previous season and failed to win promotion, and when, on 10th July, it was announced that fans' favourite Bruce Rioch was to be sold for a record £100,000 to Aston Villa, the sky seemed to cave in.

The feeling of despair was made worse when Luton manager Alec Stock seemed in no hurry to replace Rioch and instead paid £17,500 to Fulham for an unknown (to us anyway) full-back by the name of Malcolm Macdonald.

Stock said at the time: "I have seen him score goals in Fulham's first team, but I have signed him as a full-back. He is a big, strong powerful player and at 19, he is the right age for us."

Strength

Macdonald made his debut for the Hatters in a pre-season game at Aldershot where he and his fellow defenders were given the runaround as the home side won 5-2.

With the Town 1-0 down to Clyde at Kenilworth Road in the next friendly, Stock pushed Macdonald on to the left wing in the second period where his speed and strength caused any manner of problems as the Hatters fought back to draw 1-1.

A pair of goals in the final friendly – a 10-0 humbling of Gibraltar – meant that Macdonald would never return to defence, and for the opening League game of the season at home to Barrow, he started on the left wing but was then moved inside as the game progressed, a position he was to maintain for the rest of his career.

The 3-0 win over Barrow was followed by a tough 1-1 draw at Peterborough in the League Cup before Macdonald netted his first League goal in a 1-0 win at Bournemouth. In what was to become typical fashion, Macdonald latched on to a clever through pass from skipper Mike Keen and sped past the Cherries' defence before rounding the goalkeeper to slot the ball home with his left foot.

Macdonald scored again in the 5-2 home replay win over Peterborough, before netting a late winner against Orient at Kenilworth Road, where the Town won 3-2 after being 2-0 down.

Although he scored an early goal in the 1-1 home draw with Halifax, he was well held by the big opposition centre-half Chris Nicholl, so straight after game Stock entered into negotiations for the defender and 24 hours later he was a Luton Town player at a Hatters record £34,000.

It got even better the following day as, following a mad dash to get him registered, a further £25,000 was paid to Charlton for their striker Matt Tees. Stock had bided his time in spending the Rioch money, but now the gloom of the summer had been lifted completely and the sky was blue!

Both players made their debuts in a tough 2-0 win at Gillingham with Macdonald inevitably on the scoresheet before he netted again in a 2-2 home draw with second division (now the Championship) Millwall in the League Cup.

Next up in the League was a home clash with Bristol Rovers who were, like the Town, unbeaten at that stage in the season. The Hatters were top and Rovers were third.

A crowd of 15,198 turned up to see Rovers open the brighter side with £12,000 signing Robin

Stubbs going close with a volley, but it was the Town that opened the scoring through John Collins on 12 minutes with a shot that trickled over the line.

The game flowed from end to end for the remainder of the half with the Luton defence having to be at its best against Rovers' three-man attack of Stubbs and the two Jones boys, Wayne and Bobby, while at the other end winger Graham French had the beating of full-back Phil Roberts.

The game was settled with two goals in a minute shortly after the interval. Firstly, Matt Tees took two attempts to force the ball over the line following a

cross from Keith Allen before Macdonald headed home an accurate French cross.

The scoring was completed just before the end when Macdonald headed a deep corner back across goal, leaving Allen with a simple tap-in.

"We had honest endeavour followed by skill," said Stock afterwards, "but skill only comes on the back of graft and sweat. You have to put that in first."

He also confirmed something about Macdonald that we were all starting to believe. "If there's a better 19-year-old striker around at the moment I have still to see him," was Stock's verdict.

THE LAST TIME ROVERS CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REPORTS ON THE PIRATES' LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

18TH AUGUST 2015 • LUTON TOWN 0 BRISTOL ROVERS 1 (LEAGUE 2)

Another season and another summer of much transfer activity at Kenilworth Road, with Craig Mackail-Smith and Paddy McCourt the most high profile of the new signings.

Hopes were high of a better placed finish than the previous campaign, where the Town narrowly failed to reach the play-offs, but a lacklustre display in a 1-1 draw at Accrington on the opening day was a disappointing start.

Championship side Bristol City were then seen off at Kenilworth Road in a game marking the full debut of two-goal Jack Marriott, and when the Town led Oxford 2-0 at home with only ten minutes left, supporters were confident that the season had turned.

Sadly, a late goal from Kemar Roofe followed by an equaliser deep into added time, compounded by a rare error from dependable goalkeeper Mark Tyler, was utterly deflating.

The third home game in a week followed with this time the other team from Bristol visiting. Newly-promoted Rovers were buoyed by a win at Yeovil

three days before, and sat back as the Town huffed and puffed in front of them.

McCourt tried to inject some urgency in the Town's play but the Rovers defenders easily snuffed out the Luton spearhead of Paul Benson and Mackail-Smith, leading to Pirates goalkeeper Aaron Chapman having a trouble free evening.

Rovers had some chances of their own, but were thwarted by the alert Tyler and with the game petering out to a turgid scoreless draw, for the second time in three days, the Town conceded a stoppage time goal with ex-Hatter Stuart Sinclair, completely unmarked, being allowed to run through to plant the ball in the net.




► April 1936

► April 1955



► October 1960

Following relegation from Division One (now Premier League) the Town have only won twice in the opening 11 games, but stun the Kenilworth Road crowd with a 4-2 victory featuring four different Luton goalscorers, including an own goal.

▲ March 1964

The start of the seemingly hopeless task to avoid relegation from Division Three (now League One) comes with a 4-2 home win over Rovers. New scoring sensation John O'Rourke bags a hat-trick.

▲ April 1976

With the home game against Rovers petering out to a 1-1 draw, teenage substitute Ricky Hill is introduced for his debut. With this first touch he sets up Brian Chambers, and with his second, nets the Town's third goal with a fierce strike. A star was born!



▲ September 1977

A 2-1 win at Eastville for the Town with full-back Steve Buckley's winner as hard a strike as you are likely to see.

▲ September 2000

A season of gloom is lit up a little with a 3-3 draw at the Memorial Stadium. Tresor Kandol scores two as the Luton supporters get very wet.



 **thomas_lfcfe:** What was it like when we got promoted last season?


It was everything you expect it to be, and more. Carlisle away will stick with me for the rest of my career, and probably the rest of my life. The group we've got, it was even better doing it with them and when you go through a long season like that, you put so much into it, so many sacrifices, so to achieve what you want at the end of it is so memorable.

 **hattersnews:** Best footballing memory?

My debut for West Ham against Barnsley at Upton Park will always stick with me – 17th December 2011. I was 17 and got thrown in five minutes before kick-off after a centre-half got injured in the warm-up. The manager at the time was Sam Allardyce, and I got pulled in the dressing room and asked if I was ready. I said, tentatively, 'Yeah!' He said 'Good, you're starting', ran through a few set pieces and before I knew it we were kicking off. I had a few other good appearances for West Ham, and maybe at the time I didn't think of it being as big as it was. But going into the game I think we'd lost a couple and there was quite a bit of pressure on the gaffer. We won 1-0 and if I had to look to back on one individual moment, it would be that one.

 **jamesball2481:** What has been your favourite game in a Luton shirt?

Two away games stick in my mind from last season – Exeter and Swindon. We went into the Exeter one off the back of a good run of results and went top for the first time, winning 4-1. I scored that night and I felt that was a real turning point for us, when we really felt 'We're going to do it this year'. Then on Boxing Day, when we won 5-1 at Swindon – you travel up on Christmas Day and to do

it in that fashion, with that blistering second half performance, was good. In terms of playing teams at the top and really coming away with good results from tough away games, I think they're the ones that are more fulfilling.

✉ _samwatt: Where do you think Luton will finish this season?

I really believe we can finish in the top six. We'd love to finish top two, of course. But it's a step up, and in the games we've had so far, things have gone against us. Maybe some mistakes have cost us a bit, but if you look at the seven games as a whole, there is a belief there that even if you didn't think we could finish top six at the start of the season, after six or seven games, we've got to believe that we can. We've had some tough opening fixtures, but I'd like to think play-off places, definitely.

✉ _loz4090_: What's going to be the toughest part of the season?

Hopefully we could look back and say the opening fixtures, but you always look at winter time, Christmas, where the weather turns, the fixtures come in thick and fast, people putting a run of games together, injuries – God forbidding there's none, but if the squad gets stretched. Obviously we want to still be in the cups as well, so we'll have all those games. November, December, January is normally a time when the season escalates and it can be season-defining.

✉ LutonTownExile: Couple here. I think the modern-day full back/wing back needs to have

the widest skill set. Needs to defend, head it, be quick, athletic, have a good engine, cross the ball & finish. Firstly, do you think in future full/wing backs will be defenders or converted midfielders?

Defenders. I've always been taught that as a full-back, wherever I've been, you're a defender. First and foremost, that's how you set up. Obviously it's nice to chip in with your goals, and you want to chip in with assists as well, because you're getting in positions in advanced areas. But if you can't defend, you're not going to be a full-back. I wouldn't want to score a goal and lose 4-3. I'd rather someone else score and win 1-0.

✉ @LutonTownExile: Secondly, I've noticed that you and NJ are in contact quite often in a game. Do you have specific responsibility over & above your job for how we defend?

I'm quite vocal on the pitch, and always have been. When I'm on the side where the benches are, if there is a break in play, it's a good chance to get feedback from the bench, to see how they are seeing it. Normally in the second half at home, I'm on the gaffer's side, so if there are changes being made, if we are tinkering with formations and he wants something different, it's hard for him to relay the info to all the other players, so I take it upon myself sometimes to get the info across. It's just about being one step ahead to try and get the info as quick as possible, get it onto the pitch so we can put it into the game.

adfleet: What do you jump so high?

I realised it's a strength I've got, because I'm not particularly tall, tall – I'm six foot, not 'God, look at the size of him' kind of thing. But I'm springy, which is quite natural. I tend to do a lot of gym work with Jared – he's probably the man to ask. I've got a knack for timing my jump well, assessing the ball flight and it all comes together really, but you do need that natural jump. I can jump quite high just from a standing start.

@AlfieMee: What's your favourite thing about the club? And where do you see yourself in five years' time?

I think everything about the club is positive. There is not a bad thing you could say about it at the moment, in all aspects – on the pitch, off the pitch, staff, players, backroom staff as well. It's just a very professional, enjoyable environment. You enjoy coming in every day and working. For the second part of the question, in five years' time I'll be 29 – wow! I like to think I'll be looking back on a couple more promotions. Being in the Premier League will be on the club's agenda, and on my agenda too, definitely!

Has he told me about it? No. Have I asked him about it? Yes! So he's told me about it off the back of my questions. Someone tweeted me the video of it, and I've been reminded of it a few times by Luton fans. He comes to as many games as he can get to, and always sits in with the fans.

Facebook Chris Neville: With speculation linking you with Championship teams, what made you sign a new deal at Kenilworth Road?

It was just speculation. I wasn't looking too much into it, I was just focussing on where I was at Luton at the time, where I wanted to be, and the aspirations of the club tied in together. I had some good, honest chats with the manager and that was a big part of why I signed. You've only really got to come into the training ground for one day to see where the club is going, not only on the pitch but behind the scenes. It's a good place to be at.

Twitter @SteveLTFC1: What's his target for goals this season as we need them?

I'd like to match the seven that I got last year, just to prove it wasn't a fluke! I have enough chances, and I keep getting myself in positions where I can score. Stepping up a level, it's going to be harder, but I'd like to think I can match or better what I did last year for sure.

There's been a few players coming through at West Ham. You look at Joe Cole, Mark Noble – top, top quality players. But the one player who does stick in my mind as an out and out footballing talent

Potential wise, he's obviously not fulfilled what he could have been, but in terms of a football player, his awareness balanced with both feet, passing, shooting, he can get around the pitch – unbelievable. With the schoolboy programme starting at the beginning of September, it is an ideal time for the sports science and medicine team to complete physical testing with every player from Under-Nines to U18s.

These tests include acceleration, sprinting and jumping, three areas that are key to develop in the making of an athletic footballer. The results from these tests will be used to implement specific training.

This year, two university students have joined us during their placement year, Eoin and David. Whilst their placements provide valuable experience for them, we as an academy benefit hugely as we are able to implement a number of new strategies aiding players' development.

The U18s' season is now well underway and the boys have achieved impressive results so far, with 10 out of 15 points already on the board.

With The Brache as our training facility, we are working very closely alongside the first team. This is a huge incentive for the scholars as they are motivated and eager to step up their game and impress.

This has recently been seen with Josh Neufville, who has signed his first professional contract after training with the first team numerous times already this season. He made his first professional debut on Tuesday 4th September in the Checkatrade Trophy game against Brighton. One thing I will say about Josh...he has pace to burn!

Part of my role in the Academy is to work closely with our medical team in the rehabilitation of players. At the moment, we are working with long-term injured Jonas Kalonda, who as of this week, was back out on the grass running!

Working with Jonas is always interesting. Recently he came up into the office to collect his programme

for that day's work when, on the way out, I asked him to shut down head of education Dale Brunton's laptop.

Sure enough, he walked over to Dale, who was happily sitting on his laptop working and proceeded to shut the lid before turning and walking out of the office. It is safe to say that Dale was not impressed. However, Jonas will do as told – even if you are joking or not!

A massive thank you needs to go to Paul Hart from me personally. I have been lucky enough to have learnt a lot from him during his years here at the club. He has been a massive help and I am grateful for all of the advice he has given me from his extensive experience and knowledge in football and academy football.

I also have to thank Paul for calling me Zidane – after realising that our hairlines are starting to look very similar!

FOOTBALL FOR PEACE

It was great to see the first team warm up in our Football for Peace (FFP) T-shirts at the recent Southend United home fixture to reinforce the Club's community cohesion agenda.

Hatters rue missed chances as they crash out of League Cup

The form of these two sides couldn't have been more contrasting as they went into this tie, with Cheltenham on six points compared to Luton's zero after the first two games.

Despite going into the game as underdogs, Luton were definitely the side on top in the opening stages, with Funmi Babalola coming close a few times after some intelligent runs in behind the Cheltenham defence.

Erica Byron also posed a significant threat with her delivery from the left, but it was the Robins who took the lead against the run of play when Annie Martin converted after a flowing move.

Luton's response to going behind was superb, Nicola Henman heading home expertly to bring the Hatters deservedly back level within five minutes.

Cheltenham regained the advantage soon after the restart, however, when Amy Leask smashed in off the bar after a reshuffled Luton defence – missing usual centre-half pairing Rachel Kosky and Rachel Carter – failed to clear.

The second half brought yet more big opportunities for Luton to draw level, but Babalola was once again denied by a solid display from the opposing keeper.

Town continued to press, with Henman coming close, and the introduction of Naomi Stirling created further openings as the Cheltenham defence struggled to handle her physicality and link up play, coupled with the speed and athleticism of Byron and Babalola, who joined her up front to form a dangerous offensive trio.

It looked for all the world that Luton would equalise at any moment, but the Hatters were unable to turn their host of chances into goals, not helped by a poor decision by the linesman which denied Naomi Stirling a clean run on goal.

Inevitably, Luton would be made to pay for their missed chances when Martin bagged herself a second to all but end the tie. Having said this, Luton continued their pursuit of a second goal and came as agonisingly close when Naomi Stirling's goal-bound effort from inside the six-yard box struck her own team mate Babalola and bounced away, illustrating perfectly how it just wasn't Luton's day.

Town manager Nikki Baker gave her thoughts on the last few games, saying: "It is very disappointing to not get any points on the board yet. We had a very tough start against top teams with a big budget, but it is no excuse.

"We haven't been good enough or clicked yet which is very frustrating. We will be working hard in the coming weeks to get better and will hopefully pick up some points urgently."





WHO?

A Premier League outfit for one season in 2010/11, the Tangerines slipped down the pyramid to League Two, before making one step up two campaigns ago. Promoted via the Championship play-offs in 2010, the club very nearly maintained top tier status, but a narrow defeat to Manchester United at Old Trafford on the final day of that season saw them go down under Ian Holloway.

STADIUM - BLOOMFIELD ROAD

With a capacity of 17,338, Bloomfield Road is one of the bigger grounds in League One. The club's record attendance since it was redeveloped in 2010 is 16,116, but it once held 38,098 when they played Wolverhampton Wanderers in 1955. Hosted its first Premier League match in 2010, when the Seasiders welcomed Fulham. During their top tier season, they averaged crowds of 15,782.

PUBS

The Bridge is the main away supporters' pub, which can be found on Lytham Road. It's a short walk away from the ground, just four minutes according to Google Maps. There is also the Bloomfield Brewhouse, which has its own microbrewery.

TRAVEL

A trip up the M1 and the M6, or the M1 and the A50, works out at just over 200 miles one way and will take about three-and-a-half hours. The

train takes about 15 minutes longer, followed by a bus – this requires heading down into central London before going up to Preston and changing for Blackpool North. From there you can catch a bus or the tram on the seafront.

RESULTS SO FAR

Gary Bowyer left his role as manager following the opening day draw with Wycombe, with interim boss Terry McPhillips losing his first game at the helm to Portsmouth. Since then, however, the 49-year-old former Blackburn coach has led the Tangerines on an eight-match unbeaten run in all competitions to earn the job on a 12-month rolling contract. Blackpool are currently ninth – two points and two places above the Town.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Mark Cullen links the two clubs – the striker having made 83 appearances in a Town shirt, scoring 24 times, before he moved to Blackpool in 2015 for an initial fee of £180,000. He has since made nearly 100 appearances for the Seasiders. Further back, Town signed Allan Brown from Blackpool in 1956, the inside-forward staying at Town for four years. He represented Scotland on 14 occasions, before returning to Kenilworth Road to manage the side between 1966-69.

When I think of football clubs who have faced torrid times in the recent past, there are many that come to mind. In fact, every football club in the country has a problem at some point.

It might be a financial breakdown, a controversial owner or the fact there isn't enough pies in the oven for the half-time rush.

They're all unique and can cause new strains, and at ten to five on Saturday 3rd May 2014, Bristol Rovers had one of those big dilemmas as their 94-year stay in the Football League came to an end.

I could barely watch as Danny Kedwell sent Wimbledon up, but these are dark memories of the past. The future looks good for the Hatters and as these two sides meet in today's Sky Bet League One fixture, it's important to remember the vast journey to hell and back that both clubs have been on.

Yes, it may have taken Luton considerably longer than Rovers, and my heart would have preferred a much smoother path – but that's what makes supporting Luton entertaining. You never know what's around the corner.

I'm hoping that today we can keep Kenilworth Road the fortress it's become, and not let Rovers re-create their 1-0 win last time they visited Bedfordshire in a league match.

However, both sides act as fantastic examples to the likes of Leyton Orient, Hartlepool and Chesterfield that it can be done. It may not feel like it when you lose 5-1 away at Gateshead – or should I say Carlisle – but with a bit of passion, skill and belief, anything is possible.
