THE MANAGER



NATHAN JONES

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's Sky Bet League One fixture against Scunthorpe United.

I'm saying it every game at the minute, and as a newly-promoted side I suppose it's inevitable, but our visitors today provide us with a real good test to gauge where we're at in the new division, having been in the play-offs last year and running into form as they have in recent weeks.

I'd like to welcome everyone who has made the journey south from Lincolnshire – supporters, officials, manager Stuart McCall, his staff and their players – and I wish them a safe trip home after the game.

I also have to officially welcome our new assistant-manager Steve Rutter. We announced Steve's appointment as replacement for Paul Hart on our staff on Monday, and what a start he had on Tuesday night with our late, late win at Oxford.

Steve is someone I've known for a long time. I first came across him – or him across me, more to the point – in the early 1990s. I was playing for Merthyr when Steve was Yeovil manager, and he tried to sign me!

I got to know Steve years later when I went to Yeovil myself and started turning my attention to coaching. He has been a manager and an assistant, at some big European clubs as well, but has also been renowned as one of the FA's top coach educators. He took me through all my courses over the years.

He's someone who is experienced, someone who has done many different roles, someone who is an excellent coach and someone I can trust to continue to guide me as a young manager who is still learning.

If I hadn't been able to get Harty out of Leeds two years ago, Steve would have been my number two then. So although I've taken my time to make sure it's the right appointment at this moment in time, I knew he would be a big help to not only me, but also Joaquin, who works tirelessly for us as an innovative, forward-thinking first-team coach.

Today is my 150th game in charge and I'll reiterate how proud I am to be manager of this wonderful club. You have backed me 100 per cent from day one and I couldn't have been prouder than at the end of game No.149 when we celebrated that win together on Tuesday night.

Of course, if we'd had more of an assassin's instinct in the box earlier in the game we'd have been home and dry. But there aren't many better ways to win than by scoring in the last minute of injury-time, and with just one defeat in our last nine in all competitions, we're in excellent form.

We should have been two points better off after that wonderful game here last Saturday against another top team in Charlton. It was heartbreak at the end, but I was delighted with our overall structure, execution of the game plan and domination, at times, of another big team that went close to promotion last season.

The atmosphere really has been phenomenal here in every match so far this season, and that's reflected in our unbeaten home status. Please crank up the volume again today and enjoy the game.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH DIRECTOR MIKE HERRICK

Today we welcome the supporters, players and directors of Scunthorpe United for our Sky Bet League One match. Is it really over nine years since we last played them in that great occasion in the JPT final at Wembley?

In a way we were both winners that day – us taking the trophy and Scunthorpe gaining the experience that must have helped them in their play-off final a few weeks later that took them up into the Championship.

After the recent milestones of Harry Cornick's 50th appearance and Dan Potts' 100th, it's Nathan's turn today with his 150th game in charge. With both Harry and Dan scoring on their respective anniversaries, it puts pressure on Nathan to come up with something equally momentous.

You could argue that he's already done this. Since he joined us back in January 2016 he has won 35 home games – a total exceeded only by Arsenal, Sheffield Utd and Tottenham (all with 36) in that time. In particular, the brand of football he has fostered here is so entertaining to watch. Even when we've lost we've managed to do so with a sense of style!

Another fascinating statistic which came to light this week is that, having moved ahead of Fleetwood, we are now higher in the football pyramid than every team that was promoted before us since our 30-point deduction leading to our years in the Conference. (In one case, we're many leagues higher!)

This last week ably demonstrated the increased entertainment value – a last-gasp equaliser conceded against Charlton in a game that ebbed and flowed continuously on Saturday; and a last-gasp winner at Oxford on Tuesday.


Both games gave us much to be thankful for as far as sheer enjoyment went. I've already mentioned Harry Cornick's goal on his 50th appearance against Charlton, and I thought it a little harsh that some fans were wondering whether to move their cars from behind the open end at Oxford when they heard he was starting on Tuesday. All very unnecessary as it turned out (though Pelly did manage to hit quite a few windscreens and bonnets himself with a lofted shot in the second half).

The ending to the game was quite memorable. We had our first sight of Kaz LuaLua. In his 20-minute cameo he created many problems for the Oxford defence and delivered a perfect free-kick for Dan Potts to win the game with one of his trademark headers – or so we thought.

Despite this being mysteriously ruled out for some unseen infringement, heads didn't drop and two minutes later, with only seconds remaining of the eight minutes of added time, Alan Sheehan sent in another free-kick from an identical spot for Dan to repeat his heroics. What a way to win the game on your 100th appearance.

In the directors' box afterwards we were all as excited as the massed ranks of our supporters opposite. Remember, we ourselves are diehard fans first and foremost and this is what drives us in our quest to keep our club moving forward.

It would be remiss of me not to welcome Steve Rutter as Nathan's new assistant manager. Very highly thought of, he will make a valuable



contribution to all levels of coaching within the club and will be an excellent sounding board for Nathan. Steve – we all wish you a long and fruitful time with us here at Luton Town.

In my last programme notes (against Southend) I shared my views on how I would try and eradicate time-wasting in the modern game. Unfortunately none of these have yet been implemented but I've since thought of another couple:

- If a team is winning and they waste time, then any additional minutes are waived if they concede their lead.
- If a player feigns injury in an attempt to stop the game then he's not allowed back onto the pitch until he has made an appointment and seen a doctor at his local surgery!

I'm still trying to decide upon a suitably severe sanction if the ball goes into the crowd and they delay its return to the pitch. Any suggestions?

In the meantime, thank you once again for your wonderful support both home and away and let's all enjoy the game this afternoon.

We're back at Kenilworth Road again for the second Saturday in a row and the boys can't wait for three o'clock to come around - that's what it's like when you get on a bit of a roll.

We welcome Scunthorpe this afternoon and we know that as one of the teams that reached the play-offs last season, they are going to be a really tough nut to crack, especially with the unbeaten run they're on.

But we haven't tasted defeat here this season, we're four unbeaten and after breaking our duck away from home in such dramatic circumstances on Tuesday night at Oxford, we're all hoping that a turning point has been reached in the same way we did last season with that 98th-minute winner at Wycombe.

It was around this time last year that we started gathering a bit of momentum, and we'd all love for that turnaround in midweek to be the trigger for this season.

No-one can deny we didn't deserve to take all three on Tuesday and the emotions at the end, with the way we did it, were there for all to see.

We've got a great squad footballing wise, and we've also got a cracking squad off the pitch. We've got a group of lads in the dressing room who are pulling in the same direction, which I said last year and I firmly believe is the case now.

I'm not going to say we are going to do this and we are going to do that in League One. I know everyone loves headlines, but I think we are going to do well and we aim to continue that progress this afternoon when I know there'll be another cracking atmosphere here inside the Kenny.

Finally, on behalf of the squad I'd like to welcome Steve Rutter to the club. Steve's experience in different roles throughout the game in this country and abroad will be a valuable addition to the gaffer's staff - and I'm sure those of us doing our coaching badges will be picking his brain with the knowledge he's got from taking the FA courses for so many years!

STEVE'S OUR NEW NO.2!

Ex Yeovil boss and FA coach educator Rutter joins the Town



We were delighted on Monday to announce the appointment of vastly-experienced coach Steve Rutter as assistant-manager to Nathan Jones at Kenilworth Road.

Rutter, a former centre-half who played for and managed Yeovil during their Conference days, has worked for the Football Association for many years – and more recently UEFA – as a coach educator, taking Hatters trio Jones, Mick Harford and Andy Awford through their coaching courses over the years.

The 55-year-old has also been assistant and caretaker-manager at Greek Superleague club Panathinaikos, Dutch Eredivisie side Roda JC and Belgian First Division outfit KV Kortrijk, as well as returning to Yeovil for a brief spell in 2017 to work on their academy set-up.

Rutter, who also won the Conference and FA Trophy double as a player with Wealdstone, was delighted to take on the number two's role at Kenilworth Road and finally link up with his old pupil – after coming close to joining the Hatters two-and-a-half years ago.

Rutter said: "At the point Nathan was looking two years ago, he said he felt like he needed somebody

with a bit more experience of League Two – and that was right, as it's proved.

"My experiences as an assistant manager in professional football have mainly been abroad, so I think it was important Nathan got someone he felt he needed and more comfortable with. There were no issues around that, we were very open about it and it worked out really well.

"Obviously what they're [Nathan and his coaches] doing is working well. But there is always more you want to do and to have an extra member of staff out on the training pitch means you can split it up a little bit more if you want to.

"You can maybe work in smaller groups at times and be a little bit more focused. I am not here to replace anything, hopefully just to add something and help out wherever I can."

On his experiences with Nathan on his coaching courses, right up to UEFA Pro Licence, Rutter said: "It's probably easy to say now, but he was always somebody who was very attentive, really hard-working around his courses and you could see it really meant something to him – he did it with a bit of passion.

"I like that, that's what draws you to people really. They have got the same work ethic as you, the same sort of mentality and he worked very hard, like a lot of lads who get through their coaching badges, and he has taken his time to build his career as a coach and a manager."

And on joining the Hatters, he added: "I am from Northampton originally so Luton are one of the clubs that was close to me. I watched them when I was younger and it's a traditional football club. It's a good place to work.

"Nathan has come here with his first chance as manager and the two have gelled really well. It has been the right opportunity for him at the right time and hopefully that will continue long into the future."





WELCOME SCUNTHORPE UNITED



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to the travelling staff, players and supporters of Scunthorpe United.

The Iron have had three managers this year – Graham Alexander, Nick Daws and Stuart McCall – and their most recent appointment has a good pedigree and strong knowledge of League One. McCall has crossed the Yorkshire border into Lincolnshire, having been in charge of Bradford City on a permanent basis on two occasions, before departing in February. The former midfielder played at the highest level of English football with Everton, as well as in the Scottish top flight with Rangers.

They had a bit of a mixed start to the campaign, with their only two defeats so far being big ones against Sunderland and Fleetwood – 3-0 and 5-0 respectively, the latter at home. They've since put a seven-game unbeaten run together, however, culminating in Tuesday night's thrilling 5-3 home win against Charlton – a victory that kept them one point and one place above the Hatters in ninth position.

McCall's side boasts some decent names for this level, with Josh Morris the standout player. After a fairly quiet start to his career, the 27-year-old has netted over 30 goals for the Iron since signing for them at the beginning of the 2016/17 season. The capture of experienced striker Lee Novak just over a year ago has also proved to be an astute move, the

former Birmingham man playing up top alongside either Chelsea and Fulham loanees Ike Ugbo and Stephen Humphys, or summer signing from Non-League Mickleover Sports, Andy Dales.

Morris' goals have helped the Iron finish in the play-off places for the last two seasons, but both ended in heartbreak. They were playing Championship football as recently as 2011, but two relegations in two years saw them fall down to League Two. The appointment of Russ Willcox as manager however proved to be an inspired one; the former Northampton and Hull defender got them up as they suffered only one defeat between his appointment in November and the end of that season.

A return to the Championship is the aim – something ex-Hatter Graham Alexander was unable to do, a run of seven games without a win saw him lose his job back in March. Scunthorpe recruited well over the summer, bringing in goalkeeper Jak Alnwick on loan from Rangers and defender Cameron Borthwick-Jackson from Manchester United for the season.

The Hatters have faced Scunthorpe on 13 occasions, our most recent meeting was certainly an enjoyable occasion – for us anyway! April 5th 2009 will be a date that will be particularly popular with Town supporters, given the fact we defeated the Iron 3-2 in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final at Wembley!

Stuart McCall | Age: 54




McCall became Scunthorpe's manager in August after leaving his boyhood club Bradford City for the second time in his managerial career. The Yorkshireman signed his first professional contract as a player with the Bantams before transferring to Everton, and eventually moving north of the border to Glasgow Rangers, picking up numerous trophies along the way with the Scottish giants. As a manager, McCall played a big part in Bradford's 2017 play-off campaign, ending in disappointment at Wembley when Steve Morison poked home the winner late on to seal promotion for Millwall. He'll be hoping for a touch of class in this Scunthorpe side to go one better with the Iron.

THE STOPPER

Jak Alnwick | Age: 25

Alnwick became McCall's first signing at Scunthorpe, arriving from Glasgow Rangers on loan until the start of 2019. The shot-stopper came through the youth system at Newcastle United, penning his first professional deal with the Magpies but making just six league appearances in four seasons. The 25-year-old found regular first team football with Port Vale, appearing more than 60 times in two seasons at Vale Park. His exceptional performances in Stoke-on-Trent earned him a three-and-a-half-year deal at Ibrox, signing in January 2017 for an undisclosed fee. Alnwick has made six starts so far for the Iron, keeping two clean sheets in the process.



GOALKEEPER

JONATHAN FLATT
AGE: 24

A graduate of Wolverhampton Wanderers' academy, the keeper has not started a league match yet but acts a suitable replacement for the injured Matt Gilks.

DEFENDERS

CAMERON BORTHWICK-JACKSON | AGE: 21

The young Manchester United loanee has made seven starts so far this season for the Iron, proving himself as a fine asset to the squad.

CHARLIE GOODE
AGE 23

As a former England C international, Goode balanced working in his family's blinds business with playing Non-League for AFC Hayes and Hendon, from where he joined Scunthorpe in 2015.



DID YOU KNOW?

Scunthorpe have had ten players capped by their country during their time with the Iron. Current Doncaster manager Grant McCann has the most out of that 33-cap total, playing 12 times for Northern Ireland, while current player Clayton Lewis is already joint-second in the list with David Mulligan and Michael O'Connor, gaining four caps for New Zealand since moving to Glanford Park a year ago.

Cameron Burgess
 Age: 22

After six years of service for Fulham, Burgess left Craven Cottage in the summer of 2017 to join Scunthorpe on a three-and-a-half-year deal for an undisclosed fee. The defender had a considerable number of Sky Bet League One appearances under his belt before his move to Glanford Park, having been loaned out to Oldham Athletic and Bury by the Cottagers. The Scotsman also represented his country at U19 level on three occasions before making the switch to Australia's international set-up, appearing at U20 and more recently U23 level. The 22-year-old made 33 appearances for the Iron in his first full season, netting twice.

IN THE MIDDLE
Josh Morris | Age: 27

Born in Preston, Morris signed his first professional contract with Blackburn Rovers, making 20 league appearances at Ewood Park before going out on loan to several clubs including Rotherham United and Yeovil Town. The ex-Rovers man had two successful loan spells with Fleetwood Town before he became a Bradford City player in the summer of 2015. The Iron signed the midfielder a year later, a move which turned out to be a good bit of business as the midfielder scored 20 goals in all competitions as well as 17 assists, affirming himself as a vital member of the squad.

 AGE 31

With seven Northern Ireland international caps to his name, the big defender is one of Scunthorpe's most seasoned professionals. He signed from Bradford City in 2017.



JORDAN CLARKE
 AGE 26

Coming through the youth system with Coventry City, Clarke played 144 times for the Sky Blues, scoring four times. He's also been capped for England U19s and U20s.

LEWIS BUTROID
 AGE 20

The youngster has been with the Iron since the age of nine and signed his first professional deal with the club in 2016. The local lad made 11 appearances in his first season.

 AGE 33

The veteran midfielder has played for some big clubs throughout his career such as Newcastle, making more than 80 appearances for the Magpies including matches in the Premier League.

WATCH OUT
Lee Novak | Age: 30

Novak began his career with Scottish side Gretna but moved back to his birthplace, Newcastle, to play for Newcastle Blue Star and eventually Gateshead in the Conference. A blistering start with the Tynesiders, scoring 16 goals in 18 appearances, earned the forward a move to Huddersfield Town, where he featured just under 150 times in the league across four years. The experienced striker has also played for Birmingham City, completed a prolific loan spell with Chesterfield and spent time with Charlton Athletic.

CLASSIC CLASH WITH THE IRON

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

3RD JANUARY 2000 • LUTON TOWN 4 SCUNTHORPE UNITED 1

With the Hatters finishing 1998/99 in receivership, manager Lennie Lawrence had his hands tied as he prepared for the new campaign.

With no money to spend, vultures circling overhead ready to pounce on some of the Town's younger players, not to mention the real threat to League football at Kenilworth Road, no wonder he looked on the summer of 1999 as the most disturbing in his long career.

Lawrence was forced to sell Chris Willmott and Kelvin Davis to Premiership Wimbledon in quick succession, as the receiver sought to balance the books.

Behind the scenes, majority shareholder Cliff Bassett was involved in protracted discussions with ex-chairman David Kohler, in a bid to purchase Kohler's shareholding.

Until Bassett had wrested control, the club could not move out of receivership. As the sorry saga dragged on, the Football League were getting tired and agitated, and finally set a time limit of midnight on Friday 6th August for the two protagonists to come to an agreement. Otherwise the plug would have been pulled and 114 years of history would have been just that...history.

Many supporters travelled to Notts County on the opening day unsure as to whether they would have a team to support. But word soon spread that Bassett and Kohler had signed the necessary documents, which were faxed to Lytham St Annes just as the clock struck midnight the previous day.

Although the game at Meadow Lane was a drab affair, the many Luton supporters present did not care, although they realised that the club was not

yet out of the woods and that it would be some time before the spectre of receivership could be banished and some semblance of normality could return. It had all been a little too close for comfort.

Despite the loss of Willmott and Davis, along with the experienced Mitchell Thomas, the Town started of the season rather well to most people's surprise.

Seventeen-year-old Matthew Taylor, who made his debut on the opening day after jumping straight from youth team to first team football, was a revelation. Also taking the eye were other teenagers off the Kenilworth Road conveyor belt – Gary Doherty, Matthew Spring and Liam George.


The quote by football pundit Alan Hansen – 'You don't win anything with kids' – was to prove true as far as the Hatters were concerned. The team's form began to falter as autumn turned to winter.

The experienced Phil Gray received a serious injury which would keep him out for two months. That left only three players in the side – Marvin Johnson, Adam Locke and Julian Watts – with any real experience.

The Hatters' home form stood up well, but from a high spot of second in late August, the team had dropped to 12th by Christmas, mainly due to a poor away record and patchy form from the younger element in the side.

On Boxing Day the Town had fought out a dull 1-1 draw with Chesterfield at Kenilworth Road. The Hatters had gone five games without a win in a dismal December, but the Spireites had gone 16 games without a victory so it was no wonder that the spectacle was less than stellar!

Two days later, the Town surprisingly returned from Bristol City with a point following a 0-0 draw. Taylor hit the woodwork twice for the Hatters as a new 3-5-2 formation seemed to work, and the players came off the pitch a bit disappointed not to have won.

For the first game of the new millennium the Town welcomed back Gray for his first start at Kenilworth Road after his long absence, and he inspired the team to net three goals in six first half minutes.

In an open game it was Scunthorpe who started the brighter with only a fingertip save from Tanny Abbey keeping out a stinging volley from Lee Hodges. Doherty and Watts formed a defensive rock and made several important tackles to lay the foundation for a devastating spell from the home side.

On 34 minutes, Stuart Douglas broke the deadlock with his club's first goal of the new century with a determined header from Spring's cross. Two minutes later Gray doubled the lead with a header from an inswinging Taylor corner, before Spring thumped in a third with a 30-yard piledriver.

Douglas was on fire and saw several good efforts smartly saved by Tom Evans in the Scunthorpe goal, with Locke going close with two long range shots.

Hodges then reduced the deficit on 79 minutes with his own 30-yard blockbuster before Spring replied a minute later with a 25-yard effort that curled into Evans' top left hand corner.

Lawrence now urged the players to go on a late bid for the play-offs!



THE LAST TIME SCUNTHORPE CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** REPORTS ON THE IRON'S LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

16TH FEBRUARY 2002 • LUTON TOWN 2 SCUNTHORPE UNITED 3
DIVISION THREE (NOW LEAGUE TWO)

Back in the fourth tier for the first time since 1968, the Town were up to second spot in the table and had seen off their closest rivals Plymouth in their last outing at Kenilworth Road.

Following a narrow defeat at Rochdale in their next game, manager Joe Kinnear brought in Hearts forward Gary McSwegan on loan, and he took the place of Dean Crowe as the Town looked to take on another promotion challenger at Kenilworth Road in Scunthorpe.

In an unconvincing performance the Hatters equalised twice through Steve Howard and Matthew Taylor, but lost all three points in the last minute when Scunthorpe's teenage midfielder Matt Sparrow crashed a spectacular volley into the top corner of the Luton net.

McSwegan was not a success and was taken off before an hour was up while Chris Coyne, back in the side after two months out injured, was given the

task of looking after the evergreen 36-year-old Iron winger Peter Beagrie without much joy.

Beagrie netted the first goal for Scunthorpe before Howard fired home from 12 yards. A mistake from Luton defender David Bayliss ended in a gift of a goal for Wayne Graves, but when Taylor levelled with 12 minutes to go the Luton supporters were all grateful for a point.


Sparrow's late winner left Kinnear furious and he kept the players in the changing room for an hour. Whatever he said certainly worked though as the Town then went on a run of 13 wins and draw to finish up the season promoted!




◀ **October 1960**





◀ **October 1961**


▶ **April 1963**


▶ **April 1963**


▶ **October 1964**

DEADLY DUOS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES FOUR NOTABLE POST-WAR SCUNTHORPE UNITED GOALSCORING PARTNERSHIPS

RONNIE WALDOCK & ERIC DAVIS

Fast inside-right Ronnie Waldock was top scorer in Scunthorpe United's 1957-58 Third Division (North) title triumph. Signing professional for Coventry City in February 1950, he joined Sheffield United in May 1954 and moved to Scunthorpe in February 1957.

He also starred as they reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1957-58 and netted 45 goals in 97 League outings prior to joining Plymouth Argyle in September 1959, then played for Middlesbrough and helped Gillingham win the Fourth Division title in 1963-64. Later with Margate, Halifax Town and Selby Town, he spent 21 years as a foundry operative and now lives in Leeds.

Centre-forward Eric Davis featured prominently in Scunthorpe United's 1957-58 Third Division (North) title success. Initially with Tavistock, he joined Plymouth Argyle in August 1952 and scored on his League debut at Blackburn Rovers seven months later.

He moved to Scunthorpe in July 1957 and scored their first-ever goal in the Second Division, netting 20 times in 40 League outings before joining Chester in February 1959. Following a spell with Oldham Athletic, he was Falmouth Town's player-manager until a broken leg ended his career. Settling in Plymstock, he was a collector for Western Amusements and died in July 2007.


BARRIE THOMAS & JOHN KAYE

Former England Youth centre-forward Barrie Thomas was Scunthorpe United's leading marksman on three occasions, scoring a record 31 goals in the 1961-62 promotion near-miss. He began with Leicester City and was twice top scorer at Mansfield Town prior to joining the Iron in September 1959.


Moving to Newcastle United in a record £45,000 deal in January 1962, he returned to Scunthorpe in November 1964. Netting 93 goals in 114 League games overall before joining Barnsley in November 1966, he featured in their 1967-68 promotion campaign. He later ran his own haulage company in Netherseal until retiring in May 1994.

Inside-forward John Kaye was Scunthorpe United's leading marksman in 1962-63. Joining the Iron from Goole Town in September 1960, he featured in the 1961-62 promotion near-miss and netted 25 goals in 77 Second Division games prior to joining West Brom in a record deal in June 1963.

Ever-present and top scorer in 1965-66 when Albion won the League Cup, he also helped them to win the FA Cup in 1968 and reach the League Cup final again in 1967 and 1970. He moved to Hull City in November 1971 and was manager for three years until October 1977, then coached Scunthorpe and Brigg while a welder in Hull.

ANDY FLOUNDERS & TONY DAWS

Striker Andy Flounders was Scunthorpe United's leading marksman on three occasions. Starting with Hull City, he featured in their meteoric rise and played in the 1984 Associate Members Cup final.

He joined Scunthorpe in March 1987 and starred as the Iron qualified for the Fourth Division play-offs three times, netting 87 goals in 196 League outings before moving to Rochdale in August 1991. Ever-present in 1991-92, he was twice top scorer and joined Halifax Town in July 1994. Later with Northampton Town, he helped Brigg Town win the FA Vase in 1999 and was a Wembley finalist again with North Ferriby in 2000.

Ex-England Youth striker Tony Daws scored for Scunthorpe United in the 1991-92 Fourth Division play-off final. Signing professional for Notts County in September 1984, he moved to Sheffield United in August 1986.

He joined Scunthorpe in July 1987 and helped them qualify for the promotion play-offs four times. Ever-present top scorer in 1988-89, he netted 63 goals in 183 League games before sold to Grimsby Town for £50,000 in March 1993. Later playing for Lincoln City, Scarborough, Altrincham and Bradford PA, he was a youth coach at both Sheffield clubs before returning to Scunthorpe as Academy manager.

BILLY SHARP & ANDY KEOGH

Young striker Billy Sharp was leading marksman with 30 goals in Scunthorpe United's 2006-07 League One title triumph. A former Sheffield United trainee, he turned professional in July 2004 and was sold to Scunthorpe for £100,000 in August 2005.

He was top scorer in 2005-06 and voted in the PFA League One 'Team of the Year' in 2006-07. Netting 53 goals in 82 League outings, he returned to Sheffield United for a record £2m fee in July 2007. He then played for Doncaster, Southampton and Leeds United before rejoining Sheffield United for a third spell in July 2015, starring in their 2016-17 League One title success.

Republic of Ireland international striker Andy Keogh featured in Scunthorpe United's 2006-07 League One title campaign. He turned professional with Leeds United in May 2003 and had a loan spell at Scunthorpe before signing on a permanent basis in February 2005. Helping the Iron to clinch promotion that season, he scored 19 goals in 86 League outings prior to joining Wolves for £600,000 in January 2007.

He featured prominently in their 2008-09 Championship title triumph and was loaned to Cardiff City, Bristol City and Leeds again before sold to Millwall for £500,000 in January 2012, then joined Australian side Perth Glory.

staff member and asking the question, "Who is this one?"





We asked for your questions on our social media channels to put to Jorge Grant - our midfielder on loan for the season from Nottingham Forest - ahead of today's clash with Scunthorpe United. Here the 23-year-old is the latest Hatter to be put On The Centre Spot!



@baileyneale06 - What when through your head on your first game for Luton?

Excited. I was raring to go by that point because we'd had a long pre-season, and I just couldn't wait to get out there and do well for the club. We had the Notts County friendly, but my home debut against Sunderland was brilliant. It was packed out and there was a great atmosphere.

@Khydes - Jorge, you're our new favourite player. Who inspired you to become a footballer?

My dad, and my older brother, who used to play for West Ham. His name is Sam Wright but he never made the first team. He broke his leg when he was 18 - he'd just signed a year's pro after doing his scholarship. He was a right-back in the same year as Anton Ferdinand and a year older than Mark Noble. Me and him used to play in the garden all the time, but he doesn't play at all now. He's married and lives in America. My dad, Mike Grant, was always coaching. He coached at Reading when I was there, and coached all the local teams as well. I was there from eight until 16, and he coached me from 13s to 16s. He played locally as a striker for Witney, Oxford City, Banbury United and Clanfield.

And who inspires you today?

Dad, because he's constantly on at me - which is a good thing. He comes to all the games. He's the first person I call after training, and after a game. If there's a problem with anything in my life, he's the first person I call.

@LutonTownExile? - You've played in tiers 2, 3 & 4. What are the main differences between the three leagues?

I would say that in League Two there are more battles than quality of football. You've got to do the basics right because if you don't win the second balls, then you won't win games. League One, from what I've seen so far, there's a lot more quality in players. There are still battles to be won, but it's more about technique and better players in general, and the

Championship - from what I've experienced - is very difficult. There are very good players and if you switch off for a second, you will get punished. I made my debut at 19 and haven't played in the Champ for two or three years now, but when I was at that age I knew that if I went on and did something wrong, it would probably cost us.

@_danscott - Who's the best player you have ever played with?



There are two in my head. I trained with Andy Reid at Forest, and when I first went into the first team I was actually scared of him, because if you give the ball away he hammers you - because he never gave the ball away. His left foot was unbelievable. I used to sit on the bench or in the stands and just watch him. He was unreal - and that was when he was at the end of his career. The other is Henri Lansbury, who could see stuff that others couldn't see. A great lad as well. He took me under his wing when I was a youngster. A really nice lad and one of the best players at Forest.



@thomas_tfcfe - Who was your inspiration growing up and why?

Paul Scholes. I know everybody says Zidane and Ronaldinho, those sort of players, but me and my dad used to sit and watch Paul Scholes all the time. I used to play holding



midfield, the same as he did when I was growing up, and I used to try and base my game around him. He wasn't just unreal on the ball, he was everything off the ball and was a horrible person to play against. My dad just wanted me to be a similar player to what he is. Obviously I'm more attacking now, but that's just as I've grown up I've moved into scoring and creating goals, but I still used to watch him constantly. I know he was a goalscorer when he started off, but as he got older he moved further back.

@joel.p._ - What is it like working alongside Nathan Jones?

Very good. From the first moment I met him, it made me want to come here straightaway. He makes training intense, focussed. The style and way he wants to play never changes, even if it's not going the right way in the game. If you stick to the way we want to play, then it will turn out OK. For all of those reasons, I'm really enjoying it.

📍 L1.driller – What was your best football moment?

Got to be Tottenham, when I made my first start in the Capital One Cup, as it was known then. I didn't know I was starting until I went in on the Monday and my name was on the board – it was a real shock! I looked at the board and looked around at everyone and my face was like 'Oh my God, I'm starting against Tottenham... at White Hart Lane!' I was stood in the tunnel next to Vertonghen, Kane, Lamela, Paulinho – and I looked across and thought 'OK!' I scored to take the lead. I was 19 and had been there a year, but had just done pre-season with the first team. Stuart Pearce was manager and he was a massive influence on me, too.

🐦 @CammyBayliss - Best player you have played against in your career?

Paulinho. He was so good. His brain was on a different level to everyone else's. He was next to you one minute, and not next to you the next. His feet were good, he was quick, he was strong. He had everything.

🐦 @BenBanksFM - Most admired non-footballer sportsperson and why?

It's a hard one that. I think it's got to be Tiger Woods at the moment, especially after winning the tournament in the build-up to the Ryder Cup. He was at the top, then all the stuff happened away from golf and the way he was playing, he went all the way to the bottom and everyone wrote him off, but now he's back again and everybody is realising that they shouldn't have written him off in the first place.

@LutonTownExile – You spent a year at the Nike Academy – was that beneficial to you and your game? And do systems like that have a place in football?

When I first got told at Reading that I wasn't going to get anything more than a year non-contract at 16, because I was told I was "too small and wouldn't enough game time in our Under-18s, so we think it's best for you to not do that", there were two options; exit trials or the Nike Academy trials.

The Nike trials were first, so I went to that because the manager at Reading – David Dodds – knew Jimmy Gilligan and Jon Goodman at the Nike Academy.

I went to the trial at Loughborough University and there was maybe 150 kids. I was the youngest there because everyone else had done their scholarships, but I was still 17. The oldest was 21.


We had a day and morning where it was just drills and bleep test, and then in the afternoon we had games between six or seven teams. I spoke to Jimmy Gilligan and he said straight away that they'd offer me something, which was technically a year's contract.

I had my summer off and came back at the same time as any other team would for pre-season, then we played games against professional teams and tried to do your best in front of any scouts that were watching. There were also games against The Chance, who were foreign players trying to get into the Nike Academy and take your place, and there'd be around 50 scouts at the game.

It was a hard year, but probably one of the most enjoyable – just for the fact that you were living with your friends. We lived together for the whole week, played together, trained together, went out together, had food together, and there's a group of around ten of us that still meet up now and go and see each other.

We stayed in halls at Loughborough. We'd go to the common room and there'd be loads of uni students drinking, and we'd be just watching the football!

You got all your accommodation, food, college and all your Nike kit free. They'd give you expenses back, but there was no weekly pay – the same as

when I was at Reading for that year. I didn't get paid because I was non-contract. Mum and dad helped me out a lot!

I think it's definitely got a place and I was disappointed to see it stop, because it was something that I came from and it helped me out massively. At that point I was contemplating whether to stop and go into school work, so it gave me a second chance when Forest came in for me towards the end of the season, when I was 18.

@lftcP - What's your free-kick technique?

I do the same in a game as how I practise, so three and a half steps back, I stand in between 45 and 90 degrees to the ball, left foot in front of my right, then I step my left foot back and just concentrate on trying to get it over the wall, because I think if you get it over the wall, then most of the time you've got a good chance of it either testing the keeper or going in. Not so much a certain technique, that's just my routine for how I'd hit a ball if I'm shooting – the same every time. The most common thing that I do is that sometimes I'm already looking up. It's like golf, if you look up, you're going to miss the ball before you hit it. If I have half an eye on hoping it's going in, and lift my head a little bit, then I normally don't score. But if I concentrate completely and don't move my head at all, then normally it's a good one.

@lutonmagoo – If you didn't play football what other job would you want to do?

I've got two things that I have in mind, separated from football. I want my own bar. Carl Froch has just opened one in Nottingham, and it's proper class – it makes me want to do it. I'd love to get into that and figure out how to run a business. The other one is properties, because in my house I've done a bit of work. I love doing work on houses and watching home programmes. I sometimes sit at home and watch YouTube videos about people doing up their homes. That's one thing I think I'd enjoy if I wasn't a footballer.

@RealCraigHatter - Fifa or Football Manager? Xbox or PlayStation?

I think I've only played Football Manager once in my life. Elliot Lee plays it a lot though. I play the odd game of FIFA, but I don't really play games that much anymore. All the lads have PlayStations, but I've had Xbox since I was a kid and I've never changed.

@J_Cooper_LTFC - Messi or Ronaldo?

Messi – without a doubt. I think he's on a different planet to everyone else. The best player that I've ever seen.

@DtandyKarma - What's the craic with the beard?

(Laughs) The craic with the beard is that if I shave it off, I look 12! With it I look maybe 18, so I keep it – so I don't get ID'd basically! I used to always shave it off, but when I got to 20, 21, I just decided to keep it and now, whenever I shave it off, I think 'Oh no, what have I done?' So I just leave it now and just get the hairdresser to trim it.

@3dw1n_ - Best mate at Luton?

Probably El Lee. We've got on well so far. On away trips, I roomed with Matty to start with, but now him and Sonny are together – centre-backs and all that. Sonny was with Stace, so now me and him are together. Stace was at Reading in the year below me, so I've known him a long time.

@Harry50867566 - Favourite drink?

Blackcurrant and lemonade – with ice!

@LTFCSmithy - If you could invite three sportspeople, past or present, for dinner, who and why?

Paul Scholes, because he's a legend and I'd want to pick his brain. Maybe Zidane, because he's gone and done what he's done as a manager after being such a good player. And maybe Roger Federer – just because he's so class and has always been one of the best. I don't play tennis, I'm horrendous, but I do like watching it.

f espokes7 - Best dancer?

I saw that shout from Pottsy in the Bristol Rovers programme about me and I'm happy with it – I do think I've got a bit. If I was to pick someone else, from what I've seen, Pelly seems to have a bit. I did Toploader 'Dancing In The Moonlight' as my initiation song and it's always a nerve-wracking experience when everybody is giving you a bit of grief before you go up, but it's a good song, isn't it?

@KearneyWarren - What would win in a fight, a dog sized duck or five duck sized dogs?




"It definitely is two points dropped. Apart from late on, in the last three or four minutes right at the end when they were pushing everyone forward and had a few corners, I felt we were the better side.





COLLO'S OFF AND RUNNING

After the longest goal drought in his career, James Collins was delighted to finally get up and running for the season last week - although he admitted his joy was spoilt at the final whistle by that late Charlton equaliser.

Despite the striker's obvious disappointment not to hold on, Collins' first goal in 14 matches dating back to Mansfield on April 2nd ensured that the Hatters remain unbeaten in five matches at Kenilworth Road this term.

The 27-year-old said: "I'd like to show that it didn't bother me, but I think it could have been my longest run without a goal. It all stems from last season in the last six games. I was desperate to get the 20th league goal but it wasn't to be.

"Going into this season I was always confident I was going to score goals, but for whatever reason it just wasn't going for me, but the team was scoring goals.

"We had Elliot scoring, Hylts scoring and Matty Pearson chipping in, so I knew it would come eventually. So on a personal note, I'm buzzing to get my first goal, but it doesn't really mean much today.

"We've conceded in the last minute so it's not really for me to be boasting about. It's a big sigh of relief to score, but I'm gutted to concede so late.

"Charlton are a good side and they threw everything at us in the last five minutes and I thought we were just going to see it out, but unfortunately it wasn't to be."

It felt at times as if Collins had to be the unluckiest man in the EFL, after stringing together many good



performances for the Hatters so far this season without the reward of a goal.

Even rebounds failed to fall for the striker, who has finally put the deficit to bed by following up Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu's shot that came back off the post, before Harry Cornick's effort fell at his feet via the cross bar at Oxford.

"I've been in loads of positions this year where the rebounds haven't quite fallen to me," Collins continued. "There were a couple at Wycombe

where we hit the post, even the one in the first half today where Jack's put it across and I've not got to it.

"But I knew it would eventually come. I'm always confident I can score goals and I'm delighted to get the goal today."

Collins was also pleased with the team's competitiveness in the fixture and during the season overall, adding: "I think we're earning that respect now to be in this league. We're playing some big sides off the park and I think we're earning that because we're playing some great stuff.

"You get a lot of teams matching us up now with the diamond. I know Charlton play with the diamond and they had to do their homework on us today, but I still think we played the better stuff and had the better chances."


"I thought we were as dominant as an away team could be in the first half. I thought we were excellent.





"Sheehan is over the ball. He's lining up to take the free-kick. Potts is arriving. And it's in!"

Now how often did we hear that through Simon Pitts' commentary over the course of last season?

The deadly duo finally linked up once more on Tuesday night to grab the Hatters' first three points on the road this season, triggering pandemonium in the away stand at Grenoble Road in the eighth minute of stoppage time.

Potts could not have scripted his 100th appearance for the club any better, thumping his header home to celebrate his century in style.


The 24-year-old was obviously thrilled to snatch the winner against Oxford and is confident his side's hard work is paying off as they battle against conceding the first goal.

Asked what was going through his mind, Potts told iFollow Hatters: "Jubilation! Obviously I thought it was everything we deserved from the game. But for it to be my 100th appearance and to be a 98th minute winner, it just adds to the positive feeling we've all got after the game.

"You know with Sheez, he's always going to put it in that position. We got a good understanding last year, so as soon as I saw him over the ball I sort of knew where it was going to go before he took it. The space just opened up nicely, I didn't have to move too much. He just put it on a sixpence. I knew as soon as I had contact with the ball it was going to go in.

"We've had six games away from home now, but with every game we've made it hard for ourselves to say the least. But performance wise, we probably haven't got our just desserts from the game.

"We can't wait for teams to get the head start for us to try and work our way back into it. We have the



character, we have the spirit to come back away from home, but we want to be getting the first goal and seeing these teams off."

The full-back even netted in the fifth minute of stoppage time, only to see the referee pull it back after judging Sonny Bradley's touch on the defender enough to warrant a U's free-kick.

He added: "We looked at it after the game, once we had settled down, and it's harsh to say the least. I mean, I had wheeled away celebrating and looked across to the linesman and saw no offside, so I carried on celebrating. But you look at it back, there's not much there, I think it's harsh.

"But if you take that into account with all the other chances we had, if we hadn't have come away with the win we would have been disappointed."

An impressive defensive display also meant that, for the majority of the second half, Ipswich were frustrated offensively and could only manage desperate long range attempts.

In the 85th minute, Luton put the cherry on top of a delightful all round performance when Manning added an assist to her brace in a wonderful performance, teeing up Jessica McKay, who slid the ball exquisitely into the far corner.

The game ended 3-1, and the long awaited first league win of the season had arrived, much to the credit of the Luton players, who unquestionably deserved all three points after a terrific showing.







WHO?

A Championship outfit for two years before their relegation at the end of last season, the Tykes will be hoping to go back up at the first attempt. A side renowned for signing young players and developing them, it didn't quite work out as planned in their last campaign, but the foundations are laid for an immediate return to the Championship, given the calibre of player at Daniel Stendel's disposal.

STADIUM - OAKWELL

The home of Barnsley since pretty much the club's inception, Oakwell was built in 1882 and has obviously been renovated over the years, notably during the 1990s. With a capacity of over 23,000, it is certainly one of the bigger grounds in the third tier.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The sides have faced each other on 57 occasions, the latest of which was in 2007, when the Tykes defeated the Hatters 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in a Championship fixture. Of those meetings, the Town have won 23, drawn eight and lost 26.

TRAVEL

A decent run from Luton should take around two-and-a-half hours, with the route via the M1 just under 150 miles. The journey on public transport isn't too bad, as you can head up to Nottingham and change there, which will take you directly to Barnsley. From the train station it's a ten-minute walk.

RESULTS SO FAR

Sat just inside the play-off places going into this weekend, the Tykes have only suffered one league defeat this campaign. Whilst they remain unbeaten at home, they are yet to play a team in the top five and haven't beaten a team in the top half of the table. Goals have been fairly easy to come by though for Stendel's side, having bagged 19 already. Defensively they have been outstanding and boast the joint best record in the league, having only conceded on seven occasions.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Former Hatter Cameron McGeehan now plays for the Tykes having signed for them last summer, but spent the second half of the last campaign on loan at today's opponents, Scunthorpe United. The Tykes have signed former Town youngster Cauley Woodrow from Fulham in the summer as a replacement for Tom Bradshaw, who was signed by Millwall in August. In our ranks we currently have two former Tykes, with central defender Matty Pearson joining the Hatters from the Yorkshire club in the summer - 12 months after striker Elliot Lee made the same move south.
