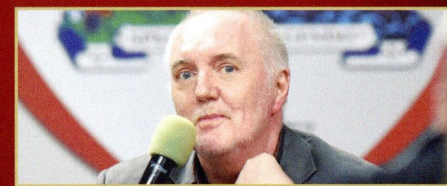

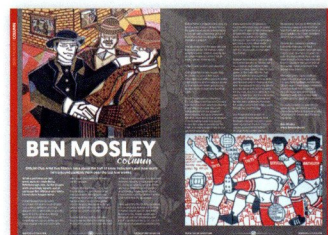

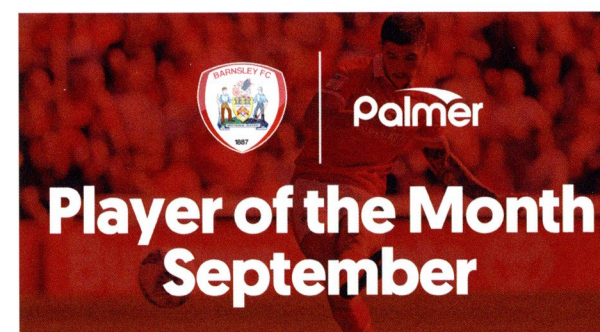

INTERVIEW

BEN WILLIAMS

Ben Williams had a debut to remember against Peterborough United last weekend. The young full-back, who has progressed through the Under 23s to establish himself as a regular in the first team matchday squad, was thrown in for his first start away at the high-flying Posh.



Starting and finishing the match, Williams was a pivotal part of a Reds' defence that kept a clean sheet and kept to Daniel Stendel's philosophy of 'pressing' the opposition as high up the pitch as possible.

"Obviously it was a mad sort of feeling to get a start against second in the league," Williams told

BE RED. "To come away from home and get three points and a clean sheet on my debut, you can't get better than that, I'm as chuffed as anything. Obviously, I knew about the injuries, so I thought I had a chance but there is so much quality in the team and lads that can play in different positions that nobody is ever sure that they will get the start. The Gaffer [Daniel Stendel] pulled

me around lunch time at the hotel and said to me I would be starting. He told me that he trusted me which was nice to hear and that I just needed to treat it like any other normal game I've played."

Stendel arrived in England from Hannover 96 in Germany. The now Reds' Head Coach did manage the first team there, but spent the

majority of his time working with the academy once his playing career had ended. This has paid fruition so far in his spell at Oakwell, with the 'Gaffer' giving plenty of opportunities to the youngsters at the club.

"I was confident going into the game knowing that the Gaffer believed in me, so going out there and getting result we have and the three points that we needed has made this a debut to remember for me, I'm really grateful that he had faith in me to start. I'm really pleased for all the boys that we got the win.

"The Gaffer has been quality with giving youth a chance." Williams continued. "I've been watching from the side-lines and seeing Brown [Jacob Brown], Victor [Adeboyejo], Birdy [Jared Bird] and Jack Walton get a chance to play, they all got their chance and they have taken it. Thankfully I got my opportunity and I think I did well, I want to keep it now!"

Williams has a taste for the professional game now, after such an impressive performance and a memorable result. He feels the squad is strong and knows there is competition for places, so the bigger picture is that Barnsley Football Club have sent a message out to the league that whoever plays is capable of putting a performance in.

"We've gone away against second in the league and bagged a four-nil win, that's not an easy thing to do so yeah, I think it sends a message to the rest of the league what we're all about. We can push for promotion, we know what direction we want to go in and with results like that we're showing it.

"We now look for and want the next three points, we want to build on the win at Peterborough with three points against Luton and it's on Sky Sports, so we want everyone to see that we're a good side and challenging for promotion. I've just had a taste for playing, only a small taste but it's



one I want to have again. My plan is to keep a regular spot, it's not nice to see the other boys injured but that happens in football, so when you get that chance you have to be ready. That's the mind-set and mentality that has always been installed here, even when I was playing every week for the

U23s there could have been an opportunity, you have to be ready for anything.

Having joined the Reds in the summer of 2017 following a successful trial period, Williams can see a path at Oakwell for anyone who puts the hard work into training and listens to the coaches.

"As a kid it's always been my aim to make my professional debut. When I joined Barnsley, I knew that as a club the ethos is to bring youth through, so it was an exciting move for me and now it's clearly proved to be the right one. Throughout the game I was thinking 'just do everything right' and I think all the boys did that, working together. I had all the lads around me talking to me and helping me through the game, that's so important. It gives you some reassurance when you need it and some help when you need it, we're not the most 'experienced' group on paper but we have some lads who have played so many games at a young age, it can only be a good thing.

Finally, as any pro must feel for the first time, Williams wanted to thank the fans and many familiar faces in the crowd that helped him through the match. Playing at left-back, the 19-year-old spent the second half flying up and down a wing in front of a stand that was packed to the rafters with Barnsley fans, next to him.

"The fans pushed us through the game, it's the first time I've truly managed to play in front of such a big crowd and to see so many from Barnsley was mad. They were so loud and I was running up and down that side, they're all shouting positive things and singing non-stop. A lot of people mentioned the tackle I managed to make which was right in front of the fans and I heard a big cheer for that, so it's just the little things that pick you up and spur you on in matches that they can help with. I want to thank every single Barnsley fan for that and now I want to experience that at Oakwell."

OAKWELL HALL OF FAME

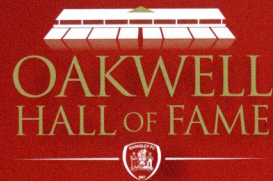


Barnsley FC held the inaugural Oakwell Hall Of Fame induction ceremony last night!

It was time for the greats to forever be remembered, permanently honoured,
their names etched into the annals of Barnsley Football Club.

And it's with the supporters' influence that the Oakwell Hall Of Fame
will grow, year-on-year.

This is where fans get the chance to decide, on an annual basis
who else joins this illustrious and elite group of individuals.



Barnsley Football Club wanted to recognise, highlight and reward the service and achievements of individuals who have made a significant impact at Oakwell, whether that be as players or staff.

Since the inception of Barnsley Football Club, fans have been the cornerstone of the club. This will give every fan the opportunity to have their say and to celebrate the greats of Barnsley FC.

Oakwell played host last night to a special, annual induction ceremony, where some of the greatest players to represent the club were in attendance. Photographs, video and interviews from the event will be released in the coming days.

As well as a digital Hall Of Fame accessible to all fans at no cost, with inductee profiles, pictures and information, a physical site will also be created at Oakwell.

Each supporter will have their opportunity each year to vote for an individual from the shortlist who

they believe should be inducted into the Oakwell Hall Of Fame. We can reveal last night's winners in the next pages of BE RED.

Finance Director of Barnsley FC, Robert Zuk told us he believes the introduction of the Oakwell Hall Of Fame had been a long time coming.

"I was delighted to see the Oakwell Hall Of Fame launched," he explained.

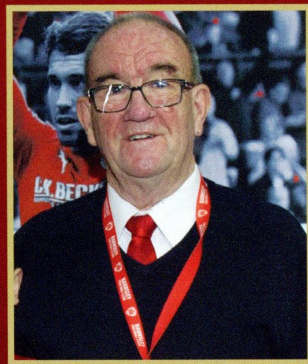
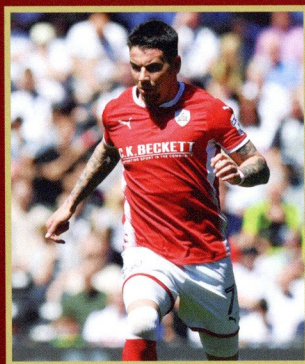
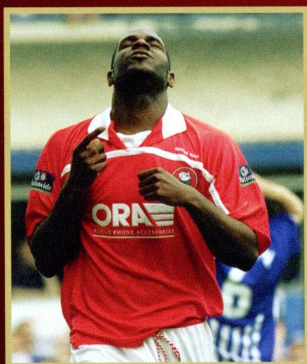
"This had been in the pipeline for quite a while, but was something that really came to life as a project during last summer's 130th Anniversary celebrations that culminated in the events surrounding the Aston Villa game here at Oakwell that was also broadcast live on Sky Sports.

"Our staff behind-the-scenes worked tirelessly to make that event a success and it was decided in the aftermath of it that a permanent way of recognising legendary figures at the club was not only possible, but something everyone here wanted to stage."

As the club's representative forming part of the Shortlist Panel, Robert has been pivotal in driving the idea forward, but feels the concept is one dedicated entirely to the greats of Barnsley FC and also enabling Reds supporters to honour them in kind, whilst perhaps even helping to educate younger supporters of the history of Barnsley FC.

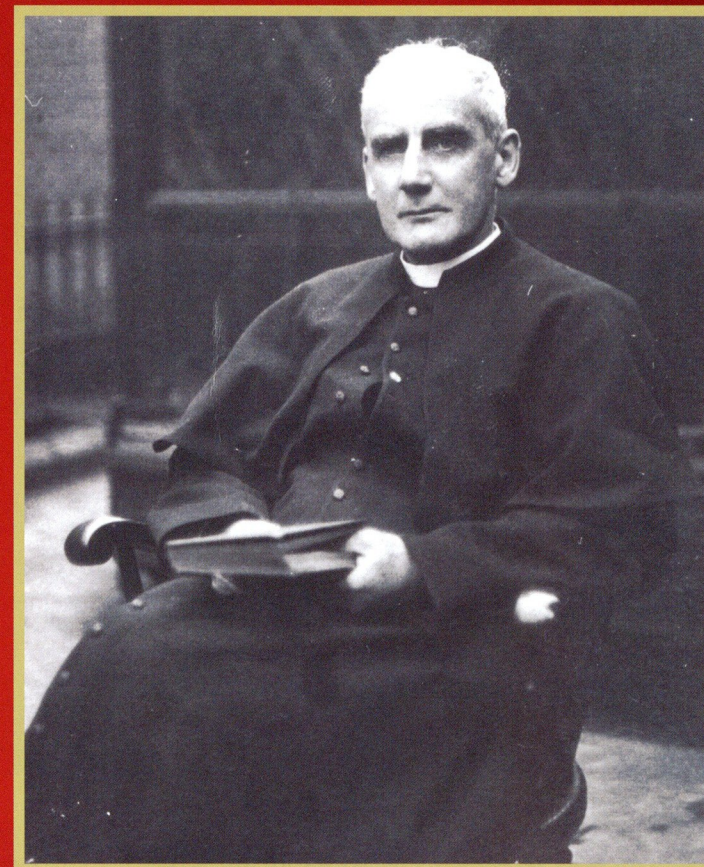
A Barnsley supporter himself, Zuk told us: "It's going to be an opportunity each year to pause and reflect. Whilst the club's main focus is naturally on moving forward towards a prosperous future, it's great to sometimes take a backward glance at where it all started, the journey made so far over 130 years, and those special moments.

"We've had some terrific footballers here down the years and members of staff who've given the club their all. I think it was a fantastic opportunity to celebrate their legacy, and we look forward to next year's now!"



There were other awards handed out last night too, with the likes of Bruce Dyer, Laurie Handley and Adam Hammill coming out on top in different categories, and barnsleyfc.co.uk is THE place to visit for all the aftermath of the first ever Oakwell Hall Of Fame induction ceremony.

INDUCTED THE REVEREND TIVERTON PREEDY



Preedy, born in Hunstanton, Norfolk on the 22nd of January 1863, was appointed curate of St Peter's church in Barnsley by the Bishop of Wakefield in 1887. Ironically, the young Preedy played rugby when he first arrived in the town but walked out of his club because they'd arranged a game on Good Friday, a day he believed should be a day of rest.

Without his enthusiasm for bringing football to the town, Barnsley FC as an idea would probably have never got off the ground. He wanted to introduce 'Muscular Christianity' to the town, where men were encouraged to mix prayer with physical activity.

But it was always Preedy's intention that the football club would have more than just a parochial appeal, and his unrelenting energy and generous nature soon made the club talked about across Yorkshire.

He did everything at the club, from initially finding a playing area, raising money, recruiting players and officials, to mediating disputes and even playing himself, he gave 100% to making a success of the club. He set the tone and style of leadership that put the club on course for the Football League and FA Cup.

After leaving Oakwell in 1893 to become curate of St Clement's

Church in Islington, London, tributes poured in and he was given a fantastic send-off. And despite four years later Barnsley FC severing its ties with the church, he was guest of honour at the 1912 FA Cup final, and displayed the victorious match ball at his home until his passing.

He died in his sleep in 1928 at the age of 65 after suffering with heart trouble. His funeral was attended by several thousand mourners at Islington Cemetery.

His grave is restored on an annual basis by Barnsley FC representatives in association with the Barnsley Football Club Supporters Trust.

INDUCTED NORMAN RIMMINGTON BEM

The great Norman Rimmington only made 29 appearances as a goalkeeper for the Reds between 1945-47 but after returning to the club following four years and 124 appearances with Hartlepool it was his loyalty over the next 60+ years that holds him as high as anyone in terms of distinction.

Born in Staincross in 1923, Norman was a fearless 'keeper and injuries to his hands were the only reasons he didn't make a bigger impression in his playing career.

When returning to the club in 1951 he held numerous posts including assistant manager, groundsman and physio. More recently he was kitman and also worked in the laundry room.

Through his commitment and service to the club over the decades Norman became affectionately known to the fans



as 'Mr Barnsley' - a fitting tribute to a man who devoted his life to the club he loved.

'Rimmo' passed away in December of 2016 at the age of 93 and there were huge crowds inside and outside the church and

Grove Street was lined by Reds supporters as his funeral cortege made one final visit to Oakwell.

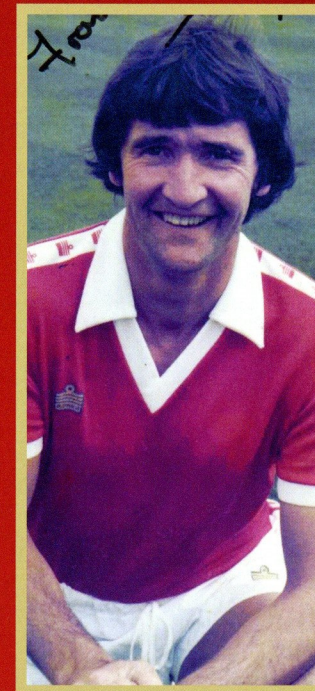
Honoured by the Queen prior to his passing with a well-earned British Empire Medal, Norman Rimmington was and is Barnsley Football Club.

INDUCTED BARRY MURPHY

When Consett-born defender Barry Murphy arrived at Oakwell in July of 1962, little did he know that he would be going on to write his name forever into the annals of Barnsley FC history.

He was 22-years-old when signing for the Reds and only managed 68 appearances across the first four seasons he spent at the club, surely fearing his days were numbered at Oakwell. But in March of 1967 he made a long-awaited return, out of position at left back rather than on his natural right hand side of defence and would turn his fortunes on their head by then playing 182 consecutive games, into the bargain beating Harry Hough's club record of 166 successive appearances.

He was also the first ever Barnsley FC substitute, replacing Brian Jackson against Luton Town in 1965.



Barry was part of the Reds side who were promoted from the Fourth Division back in 1968.

He made his last appearance for the Reds in April of 1978, his 569th for the club, a record that still stands to this very day, and if we are being perfectly honest, it's a record that will probably never be broken such is the nature of modern football.

After retiring from playing he became youth coach and then first team coach under Allan Clarke before following him to Leeds United in 1980.

After finishing his career in football, Barry returned to Barnsley Football Club and now works as a club ambassador, tour guide and matchday host in the Copier Systems Legends Suite where he looks after our guests in the hospitality areas of Oakwell.

INDUCTED PATRICK CRYNE

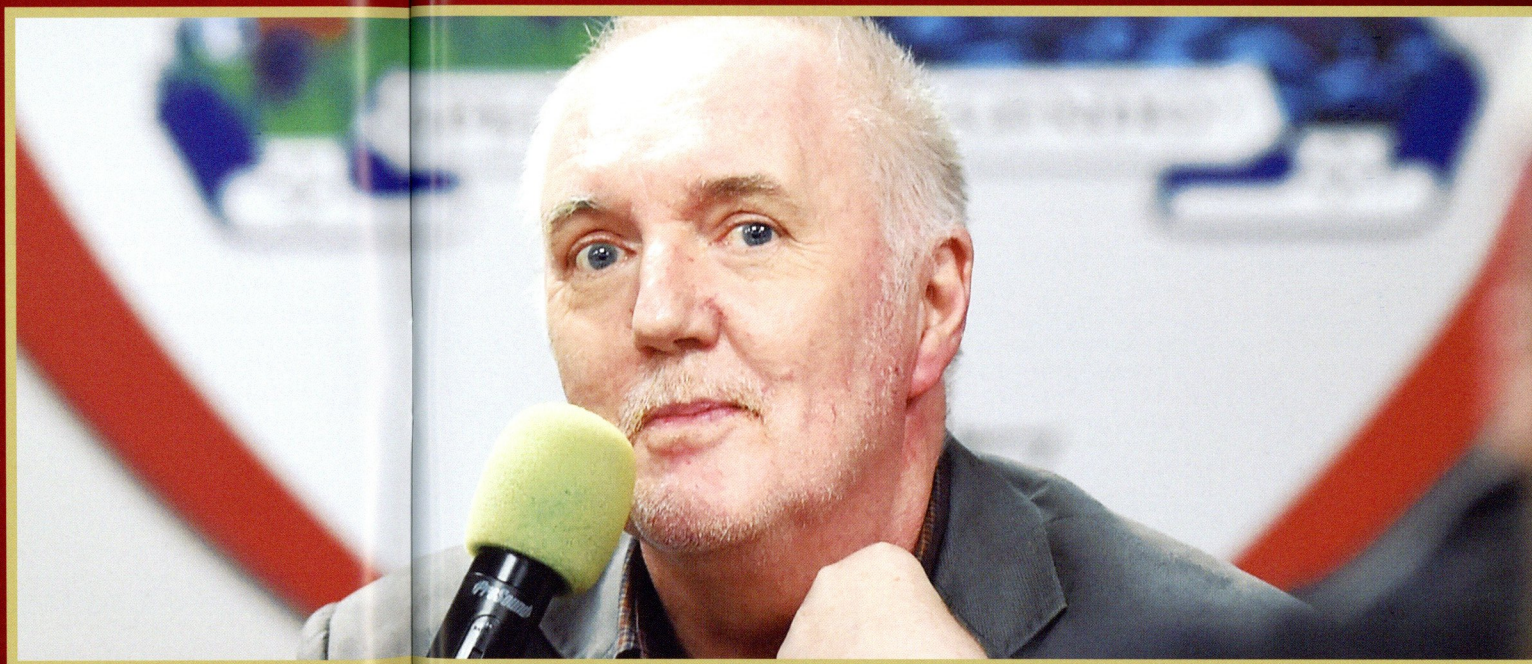
A Reds supporter since first being taken to Oakwell as a young child by his Uncle Ernest back in the 1950's, Patrick Cryne became in 2003 what he described as the club's 'buyer of last resort' as Barnsley Football Club faced the threat of going out of business.

During his tenure as owner of the club, the Reds reached two successful playoff finals, three trips to Wembley including the first time Barnsley won a cup competition at the home of English football, beating Oxford United 3-2 in the Football League Trophy final. The Reds also produced or developed many

outstanding talents through the Reds Academy in that time, none more successful than another Barnsley lad in John Stones.

Diagnosed with cancer soon after the Reds' successful double-Wembley trip of 2016, a blow felt throughout the club, Patrick ploughed on and worked hard in his final months to secure responsible buyers, new owners of his beloved football club.

As the supporters' flag decrees when describing the efforts of Patrick and club founder, Tiverton Preedy - 'One Made Us / One Saved Us'.



INDUCTED RONNIE GLAVIN



In the 1980's, 'King Ronnie' certainly ruled at Oakwell with many visiting the Scotsman's palace only to be leaving empty-handed. Glavin is still regarded as the most gifted natural talent to grace the hallowed turf here at Barnsley FC and was one of the selection committees first names mentioned when putting together the Oakwell Hall Of Fame nominees.

Ronnie started his professional career in his native Scotland with Patrick Thistle where he helped them to win the Second Division title in 1971. In 1972 he played his part in their League Cup success, beating Celtic 4-1 in the final. In four years at Firhill, he would notch 35 goals in 135 appearances before a move to the green and white hoops and Glasgow.

He soon made his international debut against Sweden but was never selected again for his country, despite going on that season to top the goalscoring charts as Celtic lifted the Scottish Championship.

After netting 36 times in 102 games for the Glasgow giants, Glavin was

lured to Oakwell by Allan Clarke, signing for just £40,000 to begin a career in 1979 that would thrill all in attendance.

Initially he was slow, lethargic, struggling to impress, but he soon clicked into gear and in his first season he managed a fantastic 23 goals in 48 games, with eight of those strikes coming from the penalty spot. It was some total for a midfielder.

The Reds finished 11th that year in the Third Division with Ronnie named the supporters' Player of the Season. The following season Barnsley were promoted back to the second tier and his 18 goals in 37 appearances were pivotal to that success. He scored his first hat-trick in a 4-2 victory over Mansfield in the League Cup; at Christmas he put in an outstanding performance in a 3-0 win over Walsall, with his second goal a thunderous 30-yard strike. And indeed it was fitting that he would be the one to score the goal against Rotherham to take the Reds back to the Second Division for the first time in 22 years.

A week on and he completed another hat-trick as the Reds

swept aside Newport County, with promotion achieved and a place for Glavin in the Team of the Year alongside teammate Mick McCarthy.

In 1982/83 the goals continued to flow - another 21 in 39 games - including a truly memorable winner at Hillsborough over Sheffield Wednesday on Easter Monday. That backed up his taste for Sheffield having already bagged a brace in a 3-1 League Cup victory over Sheffield United at Bramall Lane.

The following season was ultimately his last and another 11 goals were struck before he left Oakwell for Portuguese outfit Belenenses. His stay overseas didn't last long as he returned to Barnsley as player/coach but played just seven more matches before calling it a day.

215 appearances, 93 Reds goals - Ronnie Glavin was quite easily one of the greats.

Still living in the area to this day, Ronnie returned to the club for a brief spell as first team coach in 2003 alongside manager Gudjon Thordarson.

INDUCTED NEIL REDFEARN

Beginning his career with Nottingham Forest as an apprentice, Dewsbury-born midfielder Neil Redfearn signed for Bolton Wanderers in 1982 playing just 41 times for the Trotters before moving to Lincoln City two years later. After just over a century of games for the Imps, he was back on the move again, this time to Doncaster Rovers where he became a big crowd favourite, named Player of the Year in his first season at Belle Vue.

He played in all 53 games for Rovers in his only year there, notching 15 goals along the way and with the South Yorkshire side strapped for cash, he was on his way once again, this time down South with Crystal Palace paying £120,000 for his services.

After 63 games and 10 goals in just over a year at Selhurst Park, again 'Redders' was looking for another club, joining Watford in November of 1988 where he would play 36 times scoring seven goals before, you guessed it, getting back on his travels and pitching up at Boundary Park, signing for Oldham Athletic for £150,000.

He stayed there 18 months making 74 appearances scoring 20 goals for the Latics and was involved in their famous FA Cup run of 1989/90

before joining the Reds - initially on loan - in September of 1991.

It's without doubt that Neil played his best football with Barnsley, it was the one club where he settled, making Oakwell his home and going on to become one of its greatest ever players.

Impressing the Reds faithful with his enthusiasm and endeavour from midfield, he was probably the best box-to-box midfielder since Frank Bartlett almost 50 years previously. Combining that winning attitude with a superb passing range and the ability to shoot from anywhere on the pitch with either foot, Redfearn was the perfect midfield lynchpin.

During his first two seasons at Oakwell his goal output wasn't anything to write home about, with just 10 goals in his first 95 games, but he netted double figures in each of the following five campaigns.

He was top scorer for the Reds in both the 1996/97 and 1997/98 seasons, two of the most successful campaigns in the club's history. In that famous promotion season, he smashed home 19 goals but his overall contribution was immeasurable. Deadly from the spot, a threat with his free-kicks and an absolute leader of men, Neil was Mr Barnsley.

He was just as impressive, if not more so in the top flight despite the Reds' relegation. At 32-years-old he still showed his full repertoire, notching 14 goals and proving to be one of the most dangerous midfielders in the Premier League. There was even talk of him going to France for the World Cup, but the England call never came.

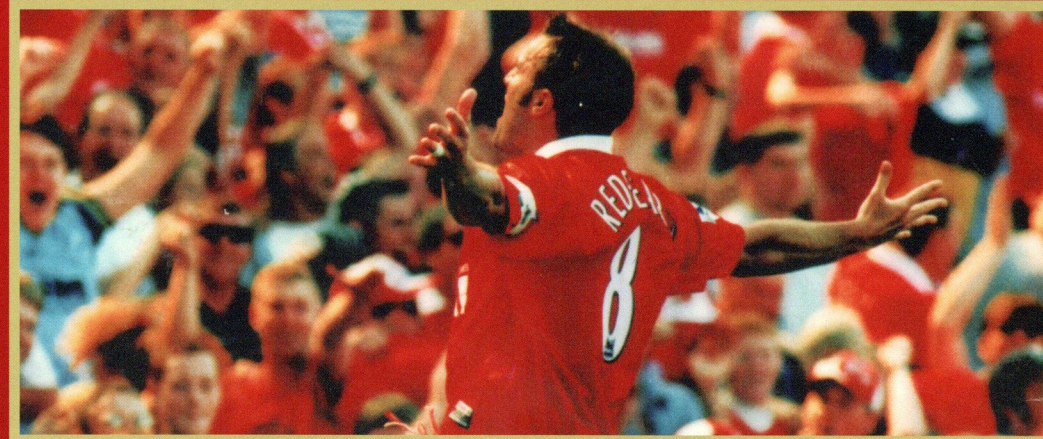
Leaving the club upon relegation over a wage dispute, Redfearn had another two years in the top flight, first with Charlton Athletic and then Bradford City before a successful stint in the lower leagues with big-spending Wigan Athletic.

Brief spells with Halifax, Rochdale, Boston and Scarborough brought an end to a career that took in 20 different clubs, playing 790 games, scoring 157 goals throughout all four divisions in England.

He's had coaching experience with Halifax, Northwich, Leeds United and Rotherham but is now in charge of the Liverpool Football Club Ladies Team, after success with Doncaster Belles in 2018.

Quite easily one of the greatest players to have represented Barnsley FC, an icon and legend.

Neil was last night given the honour of being our final inductee for 2018!

STORY SO FAR

This is Luton's first year back in the third tier of English football, following last season's second place finish in Sky Bet League Two.

The Hatters had a fantastic campaign, losing just eight league matches on their way to a haul of 88 points. Finishing five behind eventual Champions, Accrington Stanley, Luton were indebted to star striker Danny Hylton who plundered 21 goals in their promotion season.

too, with the Town sitting 8th at present, just three points behind the Reds going into today's noon kick-off.

With a trio of former Barnsley players in the Luton side likely to contest today's fixture, and the Sky Sports cameras in town, we are all set for a quality match here at Oakwell.

THE HISTORY BOOKS

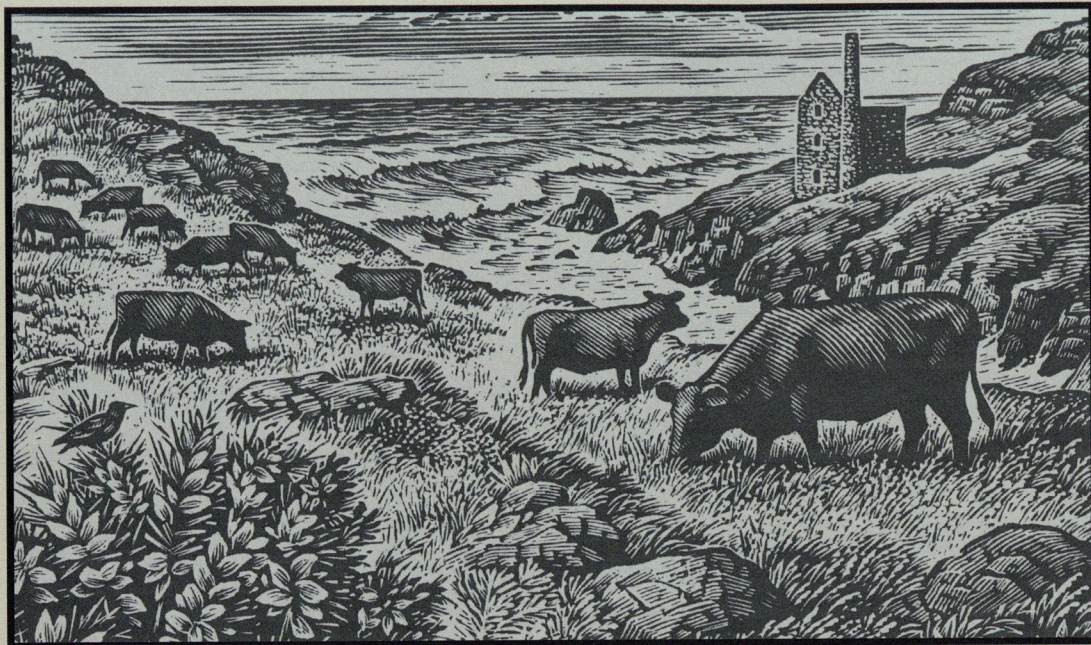
Luton Town Football Club was formed on 11th April 1885 and was the product of a merger between two leading local teams, Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior. The club was initially based at Excelsior's Dallow Lane ground.

In 1891 the club became the first team in Southern England to be fully professional. The club became a founder member of the Southern Football League during the 1894-95 season.

The Hatters reached the final of the FA Cup in 1959, losing out 2-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final. However, the club has won a major domestic trophy. Ray Harford's side defeated Arsenal 3-2 in the final of the League Cup at Wembley.

The Hatters were relegated in 2010 from the Football League for the first time in their history. However, after promotion back to League Two, Town then went one better in April this year and were promoted to the third tier of English football.

CLUB LEGEND MICK HARFORD

David Pleat added Harford to his Luton Town side for a £250,000 fee in 1984. In his time at Luton, Harford earned himself two England caps, making his international debut against Israel in February of 1988. He also featured against Denmark in a September 1988 fixture.

Harford was part of the Luton side that won the League Cup in 1988 against Arsenal. He also scored in the final the following year as Luton went down 3-1 to Nottingham Forest.

He is a fan favourite of Luton supporters and is often voted as the club's best ever player, such is the regard he is held in at Kenilworth Road. He was a key player at Luton until his transfer to Derby County in January of 1990 for £450,000.

Even after his transfer, Harford bizarrely managed to help the Hatters in their fight against relegation, as in the last game of the season Derby County played Luton Town, with Luton needing a win to stay up. Harford managed to head the ball from outside his own six-yard box, past England goalkeeper Peter Shilton, into his own net as Luton won the game and avoided relegation.

Harford then rejoined the Hatters in September of 1991 for £325,000, despite competition from Manchester United. Harford managed a credible 12 goals from 29 league games as the Hatters were relegated from what was about to become the Premier League.

Now in a role at the club as Chief Recruitment Officer, Harford is quite rightly considered a Luton Town legend.



THE GAFFER NATHAN JONES

The man in the dugout for today's opponents is Nathan Jones. Jones played for several clubs during his career as a left back/midfielder, these included Brighton & Hove Albion, Yeovil Town and Southend United.

Jones also spent a year at Kenilworth Road, but the Welshman didn't make an appearance for The Hatters. Having retired in 2014, Jones spent a couple of weeks as Brighton's caretaker manager before reverting to his role as first team coach.

On 6th January 2016, Jones left his role as first-team coach and became the new manager of League Two Luton Town. This was his first full time managerial role and Jones has been in the position since his appointment.

After a couple of successful seasons in charge at Luton, Jones guided the club to promotion in April this year and ended The Hatters' ten-year absence from League One. Now the Welshmen will be hoping to consolidate their position in the third tier of English football.



THE OPPOSITION PLAYER PROFILES

MAREK STECH

Position **GOALKEEPER** | Age **28** | Height **1.91m** | Last Club **SPARTA PRAGUE**

A Czech Republic international – winning one cap in 2014 – the 28-year-old joined the Hatters in June of 2017 from Sparta Prague. He started his career in his home country as a schoolboy with Sparta, before joining West Ham United at 16 and gaining experience on loan with clubs including Wycombe Wanderers and Yeovil Town.

The 6ft 5ins stopper earned cult hero status in Somerset after signing permanently in 2012, helping the Glovers to promotion to the Championship for the first time in the club's history before leaving following their immediate relegation in the summer of 2014 to return home and play in the Europa League with Sparta.

Stech was an instant hit in his first season with the Hatters, saving two penalties in his first month at the club and going onto keep 15 clean sheets in 38 league games as Town won promotion to League One. He also has 12 Under-21 caps to his name and was named in the PFA Sky Bet League Two Team of the Season for 2017/18.



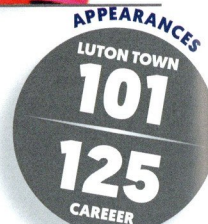
DAN POTTS

Position **DEFENDER** | Age **24** | Height **1.73m** | Last Club **PORTSMOUTH**

Potts is predominantly a left-back whose aerial ability also makes him an option at centre-half. The 24-year-old joined the Hatters in the summer of 2015 from West Ham United, where he made 13 appearances after being handed his debut in a Championship win over the Reds in December 2011.

Whilst with the Hammers he also represented the USA at Under-20 level in 2011, before being selected for England Under-18, 19 and 20s. Potts gained valuable Football League experience on loan at Colchester and Portsmouth before agreeing a two-year deal with the Town. After making 44 appearances in his first two seasons with the Hatters, he signed a new one-year deal in the summer of 2017 and netted seven times last season after only opening his account for the club in play-off semi-final at Blackpool the previous May.

Potts' contract was automatically extended upon the Hatters clinching promotion to the third tier, having been named in the EFL and PFA Sky Bet League Two Team of the Season, as well as winning the club's Players' Player of the Year award.



LUKE BERRY

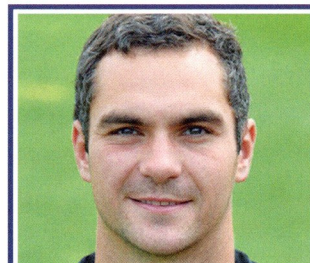
Position **MIDFIELDER** | Age **26** | Height **1.78m** | Last Club **CAMBRIDGE UNITED**

No stranger to Reds supporters, it's a first return to Oakwell today for Luke Berry! The midfielder joined Luton Town on a three-year deal for an undisclosed fee from Sky Bet League Two rivals Cambridge United in August of 2017.

One of the top scoring midfielders in the lower leagues in recent seasons, the 25-year-old netted 22 times in 2016-17 for the club with whom he started his career.

Berry played 135 times for the Abbey Stadium outfit before departing for the Reds in 2014. After one season at Oakwell, he returned to Cambridge, where he played a further 105 times – scoring 35 goals – before becoming Nathan Jones' tenth signing of the summer transfer window.

A major player in the heart of the Town midfield last season, he made 39 appearances, scoring eight times, before a serious ankle injury at Colchester United in late March curtailed what had been an outstanding campaign.



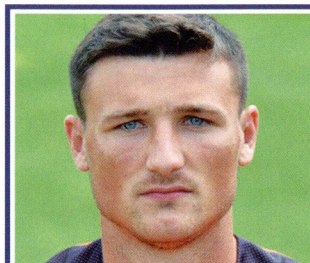
James SHEA

Position **GOALKEEPER**

After coming through the academy at Arsenal, the keeper had loan spells with Southampton and Dagenham & Redbridge before playing his trade in Non-League football with Needham Market and Harrow Borough after his release by the Gunners in 2013.

He joined and helped AFC Wimbledon to promotion from Sky Bet League Two in 2015-16, then made 43 appearances for them in all competitions in 2016/17, taking him to over a century with the south-west London club.

Signed a one-year deal with the Hatters as a free agent in July of 2017, which was extended until 2020 in February of this year.

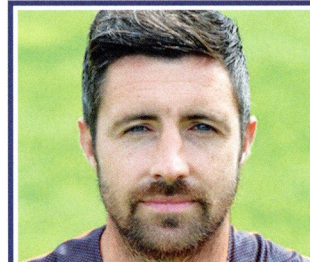


Matty PEARSON

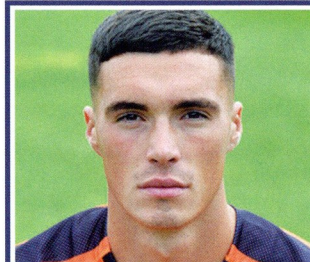

Capable of operating at centre-half or left back, he has made over 400 appearances in his career so far with the majority coming during two spells with Notts County. Sheehan also counts Leeds United and Swindon Town among his former employers, as well as loans with Mansfield, Crewe, Oldham and Peterborough United, after starting out at Leicester City.



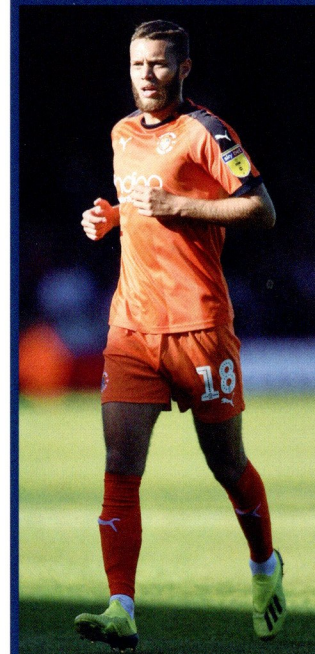
Lloyd JONES

Position **DEFENDER**

Jones is a young defender who joined the Hatters for an undisclosed fee from Premier League giants Liverpool on transfer deadline day in January of 2018.

Plymouth-born Jones started out in the youth ranks at his hometown club Plymouth Argyle, before Liverpool paid a reported six-figure fee to take him to Anfield in 2011. The 6ft 3in centre-half won international caps for both Wales and England at youth level up to Under-20s, and gained experience during loan spells in the EFL with Cheltenham Town, Accrington Stanley, Blackpool and Swindon Town, but left the Merseysiders without having made a senior appearance.

STAR MAN



JORGE GRANT

Position **MIDFIELDER**

Grant joined the Hatters on a season-long loan deal from Sky Bet Championship outfit Nottingham Forest in July of this year.

A skilful, clever central midfielder, he was Notts County's top scorer last season, as he netted 19 times in 56 appearances for the Magpies, having also spent the second half of the 2016/17 campaign at Meadow Lane.

A regular in Nathan Jones' side since he joined the Kenilworth Road outfit, scoring his first goal for the Hatters with a wonderful free-kick in the 3-2 win over Shrewsbury Town in late August.

He progressed through the youth ranks at Reading, the Nike Academy and then finally at Forest, making his first team debut for the Nottinghamshire-based club in August of 2014.

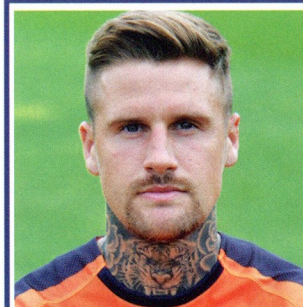

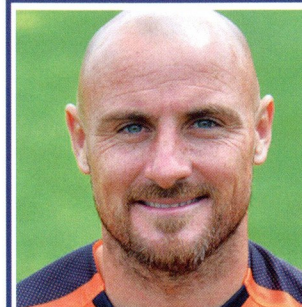
Sonny **BRADLEY**

Selected in the EFL Sky Bet League Two Team of the Year whilst with Plymouth in the 2016/17 campaign.

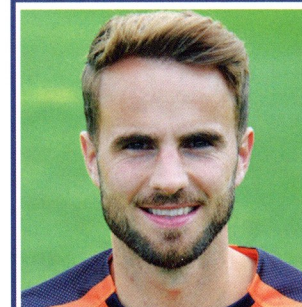


Alan **MCCORMACK**

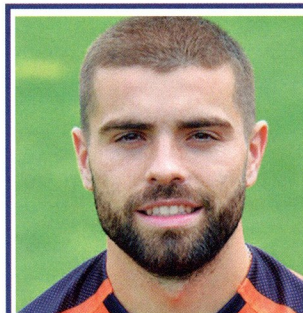


Andrew **SHINNIE**

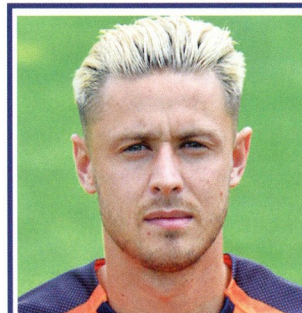


Elliot **LEE**

Son of ex-England and Newcastle United midfielder Rob, Elliot Lee is in his second spell at the club – this time on a permanent deal – having had a short loan spell from West Ham United in 2015.

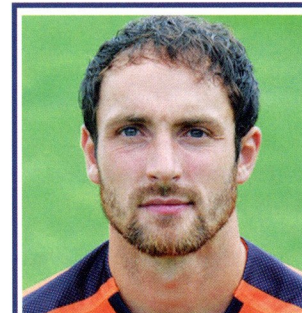
The 23-year-old is another former Reds player, spending a year at Oakwell making just six appearances throughout 2016/17, he joined the Hatters in July of 2017 on a two-year deal, which was extended by a season following promotion to League One. He's had a regular run at Kenilworth Road, scoring a creating goals and proving a key asset as the Hatters earned promotion last season.



Harry **CORNICK**

Position **FORWARD**

The 23-year-old forward joined the Hatters from Premier League club Bournemouth in August of 2017 for an undisclosed fee. The Poole-born player made his only professional appearance for Bournemouth as a sub in an FA Cup tie against Rotherham in January of 2015, but gained experience on loan at Welling United, Aldershot, Havant & Waterlooville, Yeovil, Leyton Orient and Gillingham. He joined Luton on a two-year contract, with potential for a further 12 months, in the opening week of the 2017-18 campaign. Cornick netted his first goal in a Town shirt in the 4-1 away win at Exeter City in October 2017 and finished the campaign with five to his name.



Danny **HYLTON**

Position **FORWARD**

London-born forward who joined Town in 2016 after he played his part in helping Oxford United to promotion to League One and the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final defeat to the Reds at Wembley. Hylton started his career with Aldershot Town, where he made over 200 appearances in the Conference and League Two before joining Rotherham United in 2013. He played just one game for the then-League One club, later joining Oxford. While at the Kassam Stadium, Hylton hit 30 goals in 84 starts, but turned down the offer of a new contract in order to move to Kenilworth Road. The club's top scorer for the past two seasons with 50 goals in just 90 appearances, Hylton will be a real threat this afternoon.



DEADLY DUOS



Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** profiles five notable post-war Luton Town goalscoring partnerships

GORDON TURNER & ALLAN BROWN

Long-serving inside-forward Gordon Turner holds Luton Town's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in March 1950, he featured in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run and 1952-53 promotion near-miss. He was leading marksman seven times, including 1954-55 when ever-present as they won promotion to the top-flight, also representing the Football League. Netting 243 goals in 406 League outings for the Hatters, he briefly reunited with Jesse Pye at Wisbech Town in July 1964, then played for Kettering Town, Dunstable and Bletchley. He lived and worked locally until his death in December 1976.

Ex-Scotland international Allan

Brown was a player and manager at Luton Town. He was a Scottish Cup finalist with East Fife shortly before joining Blackpool in December 1950, moving to Luton in February 1957. Appearing in the 1959 FA Cup final, he netted 51 goals in 151 League games, joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He helped win the Third Division title in 1961-62, then was Wigan's player-boss and Luton's manager from November 1966 until December 1968, plotting their 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph. Later managing Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool, he died in April 2011.

MALCOLM MACDONALD & DON GIVENS

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton

Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including their 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £330,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and now works in the media.

Republic of Ireland international striker Don Givens was ever-present for Luton Town in 1971-72. Starting with Manchester United, he joined Luton in April 1970 and formed a lethal partnership with Malcolm Macdonald, netting 19

goals in 83 League outings before joining QPR in July 1972. He starred as they won promotion in 1972-73, then were League Championship runners-up in 1975-76. Joining Birmingham City in August 1978, he later appeared for Sheffield United, then was player and coach with leading Swiss side Neuchatel Xamax. He had a spell as Arsenal's youth coach before managing Republic of Ireland U-21's.

DAVID MOSS & BOB HATTON

Winger David Moss was Luton Town's top scorer in two consecutive seasons. Initially with hometown Witney, he joined Swindon Town in July 1969 and was twice leading marksman before moving to Luton for £110,000 in May 1978. He featured prominently in their 1981-82 Second Division title triumph and was an FA Cup semi-finalist in 1984-85, netting 88 goals in 221 League games for the Hatters prior to rejoining Swindon in July 1985. Later with Trowbridge Town, he coached under Brian Horton at Oxford United, Manchester City and Huddersfield Town. He has since been chief scout of Liverpool's Academy.

Much-travelled striker Bob Hatton missed just one match for Luton Town in two consecutive seasons. Initially with Wolves, he had spells at Bolton Wanderers and Northampton prior to joining Carlisle United in July 1969. He starred as they were League Cup semi-finalists in 1969-70, then joined Birmingham City in October 1971 and helped to clinch top-

flight status that season. Moving to Blackpool in July 1976, he was leading marksman in 1977-78 and joined Luton in July 1978. He netted 29 goals in 82 League games before joining Sheffield United in July 1980, then Cardiff City, becoming director of sales for the PFA.

BRIAN STEIN & MICK HARFORD

England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 League Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted their 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992, helping win promotion in 1992-93. His brother Mark also played for Luton.

England international striker Mick Harford played for Luton Town in two consecutive League Cup finals including their 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea

in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry City and Wimbledon. He has since been coach and manager back at Luton.

STEVE HOWARD & TONY THORPE

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. Initially with Tow Law, he joined Hartlepool United in August 1995 and moved to Northampton Town for £120,000 in February 1999. He starred in their 1999-2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001-02 and League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006. He helped win promotion in 2006-07 and joined Leicester for £1,500,000 in January 2008, then returned to Hartlepool.

Striker Tony Thorpe was leading marksman as Luton Town qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. A former Leicester City trainee, he reunited with David Pleat at Luton in August 1992 and was also top scorer in 1997-98. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in February 1998 and helped them reach the play-offs that season. Sold to Bristol City for £1,000,000 in June 1998, he was top scorer three times prior to rejoining Luton in July 2002 after two loan spells. He netted 70 goals in 164 League games overall before moving to QPR in August 2003, then Swindon, Colchester, Stevenage, Grimsby and Tamworth.



NEIL RICHARDSON



With article deadline day being Tuesday, this text is being tapped out on my laptop before we play Plymouth Argyle so apologies for this being seemingly behind a little bit. But as I write my calves are only just recovering from traipsing through the illuminations after a weekend in Blackpool, where I just happened by chance to also take my missus to the Fleetwood game.

From what I heard from the fans and what I read online, this was one of those matches where you have to ask if you were watching a different game. A lot of people were being negative, I honestly thought we played well. The first twenty five minutes looked shaky in parts including the goal, but once we settled into a rhythm Fleetwood were nowhere to be seen. Our expectations can't be too high. Yes, we all want promotion, but we can't lose sight of the fact that much bigger clubs than us often find themselves in lower divisions. No longer is it a pub league, these are places that half of the teams featured could have made up a Premier League table ten years ago. So keep getting behind the lads, keep singing and be positive. It's a team effort and that includes you and I.

NUMBER 7 – NEIL REDFEARN

The era of Neil Redfearn passed me by somewhat. At the

time I was a teenager, with a family thrust into the uncertainty of not having two pence to scratch our backsides with. So to that end, having a season ticket was out of the question. Fast forward to 1997/98 and single match tickets were pretty much as rare as Gary Tedford (from Scotland you know..) buying a round. This all meant that my Redders admiration was done at a distance.

But even by viewing our successes of that era through a pair of binoculars you could see that this bloke was special. Some players just gel, and this journeyman who came to us from Oldham Athletic found a home from home at Oakwell.

It was in September 1991 that Redfearn joined Barnsley, and it was at this club he arguably spent his prime years. In his seven seasons at Oakwell, he rarely missed a single game and was named club captain and penalty taker. In the 1996–97 season, Redfearn scored 17 goals as Barnsley won promotion to the FA Premier League for the first time in the club's history. Redfearn missed only one game and was our top scorer with ten league goals that year. These included Barnsley's first ever top division goal on the opening day of the season, when he put us ahead in the ninth minute at home to West Ham United, although we ended up losing the game 2–1.

Sadly, as we all know it was not enough to save us though, as Barnsley were relegated that season. Despite being in his thirties, Redfearn's performances had made him a wanted man in the Premier League, and he was signed by Charlton Athletic for £1 million in the summer of 1998. He left Barnsley having played 338 first team games, scoring 84 goals.

His play, his captaincy at the helm of our most successful period in our history will no doubt live on. His name is regularly mentioned amongst the Glavin's, Taylor's and Rimmo's of our world.

LUTON TOWN

CECIL MCCORMACK

'Cec' McCormack had an unusual early footballing life. He was signed by Gateshead who were a Football League team in those days, playing in Division Three North. When the Second World War started and he joined the R.A.F. He married during the war to an Essex girl. After leaving the R.A.F. in 1947 he was transferred to Middlesbrough but his wife couldn't settle in the North East and he asked for a transfer. No buyer could be found so he joined non-league Chelmsford City. So when the 28-year-old joined Barnsley they had to pay a fee to both Chelmsford City & Middlesbrough, who had retained his Football League registration. The Reds were happy for him to sign

but didn't realise the impact he was to have...

The opening day fixture ended in a 2-1 home defeat to Southampton but by the time Luton Town arrived at Oakwell for the seventh match of the season he had already scored eight times.

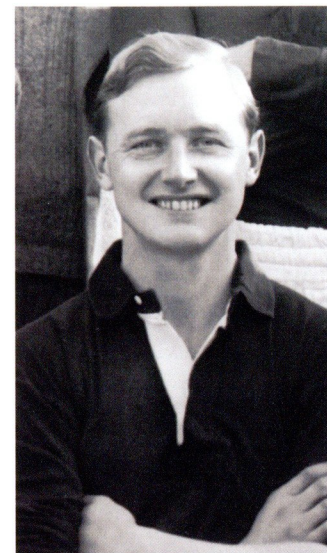
From the off he was too much of a handful for Luton centre half Sid Owen [he was to go on to play for England]. In fact the opening goal in the 15th minute was a penalty when Owen brought down McCormack. He took it himself. He added a second in the 27th minute with a shot from 18 yards. Alex Wright got into the act when he hooked home a

third following a Gavin Smith cross. It was to be Wright's final match for the Reds before his transfer to Tottenham. By half time it was 3-1. Jim Jinks, a giant of a man scoring for Luton.

The highlight of the match came after the break. Jimmy Baxter broke out of defence. In a 50 yard run he shimmied past two defenders before releasing a slide rule pass to McCormack. He swerved passed two more defenders before beating keeper Hughes from a narrow angle to complete his hat trick. He wasn't finished there and added two more. It ended a 6-1 win with five to McCormack. It equalled, and remains to this day a club record of five goals in a single game.

When the teams met for the return in mid January both were having disappointing seasons. Luton were in a battle against relegation while Barnsley despite McCormack's goals couldn't get above mid table. Barnsley took the lead in the 10th minute through Deakin but seven minutes later Shanks equalised. On the half hour mark Syd 'Skinner' Normanton brought down Stobbard but Havenga missed from the spot so the match ended as a draw. It was a game that saw the debut of another Barnsley legend, Arthur Kaye who replaced Gavin Smith.

In the 1933-34 season 'Abe' Blight set a club record 31 goals in a season. By the 23rd March 1951 McCormack had already scored 29 and he netted twice that day against Blackburn Rovers to equal that record. There were still eight games to play but he was to miss four of them through injury and scored only two more to end with 33 league goals. He had another one in the FA Cup to take his final tally to 34. It's a record that still stands.



At the season's end the Reds finished in a disappointing 15th position while Luton avoided relegation by two points and two places.

In the following season McCormack was still scoring with nine goals in 13 games when Notts County had a £20,000 bid for him accepted and his record breaking time at Oakwell was over.

I was asked by the Club to produce some original paintings for the Hall of Fame, which was an absolute honour to do. A few weeks ago I talked about Eric Winstanley and what a gentleman he is. I'm sure for all of those involved in selecting the

Hall of Fame candidates this year, it's been a very tough call and I know the panel have worked tirelessly to come up with a stunning group of individuals that would grace any Barnsley starting 11.

The six inductees this year are true Barnsley greats. Mr Patrick Cryne and Reverend Tiverton Preedy are absolute legends of the Club in every sense of the word.

"One made us and one saved us".

Our great fans made a giant flag in tribute to two of the most influential and selfless people in the Club's history and I'm always proud to depict them when producing paintings about Barnsley Football Club.

I had the pleasure of meeting Ronnie Glavin and his son Conor a few months back when producing the Ponty End mural. Not only is Ronnie one of our greatest ever players, but he is extremely modest, kind and a real gentleman. Unfortunately I was too young to see him play in person for the Club, but many regard him as our greatest ever player.

It was a pleasure to spend a couple of hours in his company and I was in awe of his enthusiasm and knowledge of the game. It was a complete education listening to him talk about tactics and his love of football really comes through. I hope that I will get the opportunity to talk with him further.

Norman Rimmington, who he will be forever known as "Mr Barnsley", is a clubman that will probably never be seen again in the modern game. In the early 60s my Dad trained with the youngsters at Barnsley Football Club for a while and Norman was in charge at that time. He wanted to play my Dad in a youth game, but, unfortunately for my Dad, due to a ruling in those days he was too old. It's a story my Dad is fond of talking about and he was very grateful to Norman for seeing something in him, even though he couldn't play.

The final inductee is one of our greatest ever players, Neil Redfearn. He was our promotion-winning captain back in 1996/97, and he scored an incredible 14 goals from midfield in our

Premiership season in 1997/98. I'm obviously biased, but I feel that Neil Redfearn would have been a good addition to Glenn Hoddle's World Cup squad in 1998.

He was the complete midfield player for Barnsley; he had immense skill, power, strength and could score any type of goal. I'm sure, like many Reds fans, I would have loved to have seen him and Ronnie Glavin in the same side at their peak. What a midfield that would have been.

We have some super midfield players in our current side and I'm sure Neil Redfearn and Ronnie Glavin would have been extremely proud of Brad Potts' stunning 25-yard strike last weekend at Peterborough. One of the early contenders for goal of the season.

I'm really looking forward to the game today and hope we can come away with a big three points. Good luck to Daniel and the boys. You Reds.

On Sunday Barnsley FC Ladies entertained Burton Albion in the FA League Cup Plate Competition. Barnsley welcomed back Annie Ward and Becks Hornsey, both who had been out for two weeks. Trying a new formation of 3-5-2 Barnsley were on the front foot from the off and it wasn't long before we went 1-0 up. Drew Green did well on the right and hit a low cross which was sweetly met by Amy Woodruff who finished clinically. Woodruff is now this season's leading scorer with 6 in all competitions.

Barnsley continued to dominate, but against the run of play Burton equalised when a hopeful long ball forward bounced over the Barnsley keeper and into the net.

Despite the set back, Barnsley continued to play good football and the new formation was working well with both Sophie Bell and Darcie Green causing problems down both flanks. After another Bell attack Barnsley were awarded a corner and from the resulting cross, Barnsley's youngest player, Mollie Crump rose highest to head home. This was Mollie's first goal for the Ladies in Red following her move from Sheffield United in the Summer.

At half time the score was 2-1 and, but at half time Barnsley were forced to make a change when the influential Kathryn Smith had to be replaced by Rebecca Fevers.

Shortly after the break, The Reds went further ahead when Emily Ward pounced on a loose ball

ACADEMY INTERVIEW

AIDEN MARSH

The Barnsley boy making a name for himself at academy level.

The Reds' academy has produced several talented players over the years and there could be another gem set to roll off the production line shortly.

Striker Aiden Marsh has wowed coaches at all age groups and, aged just 15, he came off the bench to make his U23s debut during the 1-0 victory over Bolton Wanderers in September.

Not content with just featuring on the Oakwell pitch, the youngster also played a major role in Amir Berkovits' late winner as he brilliantly linked the play from midfield in a swift Reds' counter attack.

"I was a bit shocked to get called-up to the under 23s, but it was more excitement than anything to come in and play with the older lads," said Marsh. "But, I thought I took my chance well and, hopefully, I can get another game.

"It was a bit surreal to be playing out on Oakwell, but it's always been a dream of mine to do that and it came true, and it was a good experience for me.

"Being a Barnsley lad, it's my dream to play for Barnsley so I'm working hard and, hopefully, one day I'll make it."

His U23s debut came just days after scoring a blistering hat-trick against Sheffield Wednesday as our U17s secured a 6-3 friendly victory on the Oakwell Training Ground.

That performance was one of a number of impressive displays from the striker who has natural predatory instincts and is a throwback to number nines of

bygone eras with his tireless work rate and insatiable appetite for goals.

"I'm really enjoying my football at the moment; I've scored eleven goals this season," continued Marsh. "It was a really good feeling to score for the under 17s – particularly against our local rivals, it's always a good feeling to score against them.

"I'm a hunter and a hard worker. When I was younger, I loved to watch Didier Drogba and I always watch clips of former strikers to look at how I can improve my game."

As well as possessing an unerring ability to find the net, Marsh has a professionalism and character to match those of many senior players in the game.

He has maturity beyond his years, and has built positive relationships with teammates and academy coaches as he looks to continue his phenomenal development.

"I have a really good relationship with Dale [Tonge] and Darren [Kelk]; I'm always laughing and joking with them but, when it gets serious, we knuckle down and get on with training sessions and games," said the clinical striker.

"I've been training with the older lads in the under 18s for a while now, so I've been building relationships and they've been very good to me when I first came in. I'm confident that, if I keep scoring, I can continue to progress and keep on going.

"If young players have been brought through in the past, it will happen again in the future and it could be me."

Aiden has been excellent; he had a bit of a knock at the end of last season, so to see him come back as fit this season has been a real pleasure. He's had early progression to the under 18s, which has resulted in an appearance for the under 23s and that's credit to himself.

He's got lots of potential – for different reasons. His attitude is second to none, he's got a desire and a willingness that is quite rare for someone of his age, he's eager to learn and has a bit of an edge as well, which is great to see. He's not arrogant, but he has trust in his own ability; he knows he's a good player but, at the same time, he's willing to apply and work hard, not just for himself but for the team.

This season, he has been going from strength to strength; he's probably exceeding what we've expected this early on. In general, I'd say he's quite an old-fashioned striker in that he's got a bit of everything. Out of possession he's relentless; he doesn't give defenders a minute on the ball, he's intense and has an attitude that's rare in centre forwards these days. In possession he does what it says on the tin; he scores goals – all different types of goals – and he's started adding them with his so-called weaker foot and is becoming an all-round striker.

The call-up to the under 23s isn't something that will go to his head – being the character that he is, it will only encourage him to want to be there more. I think he'll understand that it was an opportunity and in the five or ten minutes that he got, he did well and helped to create the

goal. It's something that he'll strive to do; he's already set goals with the under 18s in terms of starting games and scoring goals. Hopefully this will lead to better things for him, but he's a level-headed kid and it's certainly well-deserved.

BOBBY HASSELL
Academy Manager

We're really happy with his development; he's come back strong after a minor injury in the off season and he's scoring goals, like he does. It's great to see a local lad doing so well in the academy. He's played four or five games for the under 18s – he made his debut last year as a 14-year-old – and obviously made his debut for the under 23s against Bolton Wanderers.

It's always difficult to see how much potential a player has, but he's got fantastic character, a great work rate and has a desire and enthusiasm to learn, and you need those as well as ability. He's technically very good and scores lots of goals, has pace and great strength – he's got a lot going for him for a 15-year-old. So if he keeps his feet on the ground, which we'll all make sure he does, he's got a great chance.

He's quite a confident person, for a young lad, so I'm sure playing with the under 23s will have given him loads of confidence. We're trying to make sure that his feet are grounded at school so he gets his education done. We don't want to put too much pressure on him, in terms of his development, we just want him to come and enjoy his football. There's no expectations from myself or the other coaches for Aiden – or for any of the other boys in that age group. Some of

the boys in are equally as good and could get a call-up to the under 18s or 23s, so there's two or three in that group who we have really high hopes for.

But we don't put expectations on them because there's a lot of things that can happen in a kid's life at the age of 15 or 16; there's a lot of distractions and a lot of growth issues. Reuben Noble-Lazarus made his debut just before the age of 16 and there were a lot of expectations on him and he couldn't cope with them, so we don't want to do that with Aiden. Having said that, Aiden is a different character – he's confident, so he'd probably take it in his stride. He's good at taking criticism and rolicking's, which is unusual for a 15-year-old but, like I said, we just need to keep his feet on the ground.
