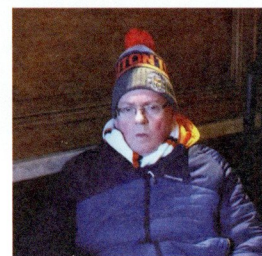
Dreams

JJ IS EFL YOUNG PLAYER OF THE MONTH...

Homegrown Hatters defender James Justin has been named the EFL's Young Player of the Month for November - a hugely prestigious award covering the 72 clubs across all three divisions.

The league's official press release stated that 'at just 20 years of age, James continues to show maturity beyond his years as well as versatility in defence, and although this isn't his first season in professional football, November was certainly a month to remember for the Luton-born defender. Making four league appearances in total in November, Justin was part of a Luton side that conceded just twice, adding two goals and two assists to his personal tally as goals continue to come from all areas of the pitch for the league's leading goalscorers.'

New for this season, all contenders for the EFL Young Player of the Month award have to be a Club Developed player, which is defined as a player who has been registered with the relevant club for a minimum of 12 months prior to the end of his Under-19 season.

On receiving the award, James – who has been with his hometown club for over 13 years – said: "I'm over the moon. There's lots of young talent



throughout the leagues and to be noticed for my performances is a special achievement.

"November was definitely a stand-out month for me and us as a club, especially with winning this award. It's nice for me to add a couple of goals to my game as well, which I've been lacking at times. I've had to be patient and bide my time to make sure I got into the team regularly. I knew that once I got a regular spot I needed to take my chance, and I feel like I have done that."

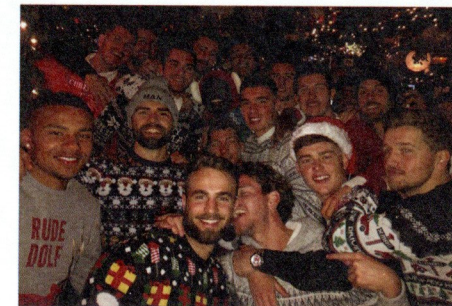
We've found our consistency, everyone's been solid and we've gone on a great run that's taken us up to second in the league.

A HAPPY HATTERS CHRISTMAS!

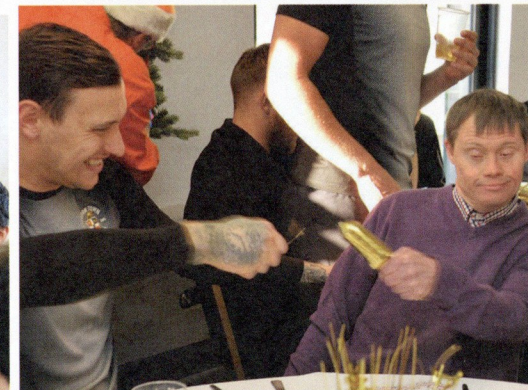

WELCOME BURTON ALBION



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to Burton Albion's staff, players and supporters, who have made the journey down from Staffordshire.

It's the second home game in a row we have faced a team that has climbed from the nether-reaches of Non-League and into the Football League – the Brewers going all the way to the Championship, before they were relegated last season.

Formed in 1950, the club only reached the EFL in 2009, having spent a number of years in the Conference. Their ascent was masterminded mostly by current boss Nigel Clough, who took over in 1998, before leaving during their Conference winning season of 2009 for Derby County. At that stage they looked set to go up, but their 13-point cushion at the top of the table was ebbd away and it took until the final day of the campaign for them to clinch promotion as Cambridge came close to catching them.

Whilst the club rose through the divisions, they also provided a springboard for a number of young managers, including Gary Rowett and Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink, both of whom have gone onto manage in the Championship. It was under the latter they were promoted to League One in 2015, before Clough returned and took them up to the Championship the following season.

They managed two seasons in the Championship – which was remarkable given the gulf in budget they had compared to a majority of second tier sides. It was only a final day defeat in the last campaign that confirmed they were heading back down to League One.

The key players in the squad were kept over the summer, as Clough looks to go straight back up at the first attempt. However, form wise it's been a difficult half season so far for the Brewers. They're the only team to beat Sunderland this campaign, and one of only a couple to get points at Portsmouth. But narrow defeats have cost Burton so far, as they find themselves in 15th with 27 points after 21 games – although they have reached the Carabao Cup semi-finals, after beating Middlesbrough 1-0 on Tuesday night.

Generally, their home form hasn't been too bad, winning six of their 11 outings at the Pirelli, but on the road they've struggled, scooping just eight points from 30 available. Liam Boyce has been finding the back of the net regularly so far this season, having missed a large chunk of last year with a knee injury – the Northern Ireland international scoring nine times this campaign.

Nigel Clough | Age: 52

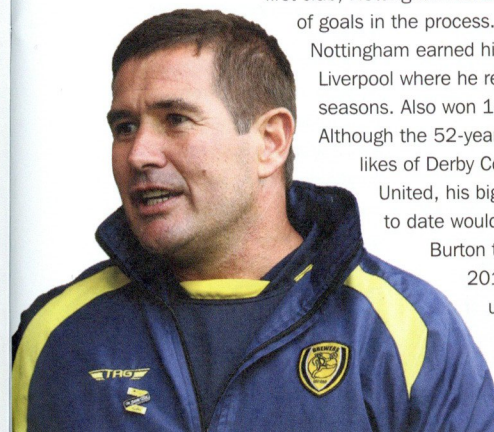
Back for a second time managing the Brewers, Clough re-took the reins in 2015 after originally joining the club in 1998 as a player-manager. The ex-forward made more than 300 appearances for his

first club, Nottingham Forest, scoring a century of goals in the process. His success in

Nottingham earned him a move north to Liverpool where he remained for three seasons. Also won 14 England caps.

Although the 52-year-old has managed the likes of Derby County and Sheffield United, his biggest achievement to date would probably be leading

Burton to the Championship in 2016 where they remained until last season, narrowly avoiding safety on the last day.



THE STOPPER

Bradley Collins | Age: 21

The young goalkeeper who is on-loan from Premier League Chelsea has a lot of experience to his name, even though he's only 21. Originally at Southampton until he joined Chelsea at U12 level, Collins played all but three games for the Blues' U18 side who won the UEFA Youth League and League Cup double in 2014-15. The shot-stopper played another significant part in retaining the UEFA Youth League honour a year later, in what was a prolific few seasons for the youth set-up at the South-West London club. The 21-year-old broadened his league experience further last term, spending the entire season with Forest Green Rovers.

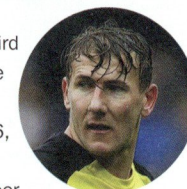

The then 19-year-old didn't do badly either, netting five times in 11 starts for the Brewers.



THE WALL

John Brayford | Age: 30

Mr Burton himself signed for a third time on deadline day in the summer on a two-year deal from Sheffield United, after spending the entirety of last season on-loan with the Brewers in what was his second spell at the club. Following his release from Manchester City at youth level, Brayford graduated into professional football at the Pirelli Stadium in 2006. The defender moved to Crewe in 2008, picking up Fans' Player of the Season at the end of his debut campaign. He would find himself celebrating the same award a year later in two solid seasons with the Railwaymen. His defensive ability meant a move to Championship Derby, and then on to Premier League Cardiff in 2013.



IN THE MIDDLE

Jamie Allen | Age: 23

Born in Rochdale, Allen ended up signing on at Spotland as a youngster until he was offered his first professional deal at the club in 2013. He went on to make more than a century of appearances with his boyhood team, scoring eleven times. The midfielder played 25 league matches for Dale on his maiden campaign in 2013-14, assisting the team with promotion to Sky Bet League One where they have remained ever since. His talent in the middle of the pitch earned him a move to Burton in August last year, who were in the Championship at the time. The 23-year-old has also managed to grab four goals in all competitions so far this season.



DAMIEN McCORRY AGE: 28

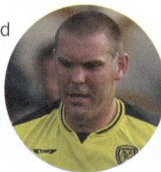

A fine career in Scottish football, winning promotion to the Scottish Championship with Rangers and scoring a memorable goal at Anfield in the Europa League for Hearts.

STEPHEN QUINN AGE: 32

Capped 18 times for the Republic of Ireland national side. Quinn also made more than 200 appearances for Sheffield United across seven years.

BEN FOX AGE: 20

Came through the youth system with the Brewers, as well as spending time out on-loan. Won Goal of the Month and Player of the Month in his first 31 days at Gateshead.

STRIKERS

LUCAS AKINS AGE: 29

Top scorer in two of his four seasons at the Pirelli Stadium with a total of 36 goals since he joined, including the three he's already notched this season. Signed from Stevenage in 2014.



MARVIN SORDELL AGE: 27

The striker has played for Burnley and Bolton Wanderers in the Premier League as well as a number of clubs in the EFL. Sordell is an extremely experienced forward.

DEVANTE COLE AGE: 23

The ex-Manchester City academy player is on a season-long loan from Wigan Athletic. A good goal scorer at this level, scoring 17 times in 77 matches for Fleetwood Town.

WILLIAM MILLER AGE: 22

Spent last season on-loan with the Brewers from Tottenham Hotspur before signing on permanently in the summer. Miller featured for Spurs in the International Champions Cup against Juventus.

WATCH OUT

Liam Boyce Age: 28

Boyce arrived at the Pirelli Stadium from Scottish side Ross County in the summer of 2017, in what was the Brewers' record fee for a player. The forward only managed three goals in a tough season for the club who battled valiantly to stay up in the Championship. This season though, Boyce has brought his goal-scoring boots, already netting nine times. The striker even has 15 international caps for Northern Ireland to his name, scoring on one occasion in a 1-0 win over New Zealand at Windsor Park. Boyce was part of the Ross County team who defeated Hibernian in the Scottish League Cup Final at Hampden Park in 2016.

THE LAST TIME BURTON CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** REPORTS ON **THE BREWERS'** LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

11TH APRIL 2015 • LUTON TOWN 0 BURTON ALBION 1

In their first season back in the Football League the Town started off tentatively before hitting a run of form that saw them top the table in mid-November. Sadly, a narrow and undeserved defeat at Burton on 22nd November started a slump from which the team never fully recovered.

Burton continued on an impressive run of form following their win over the Hatters and by the time of the return, with five games left, stood proudly at the head of the table and seemingly about to sample League One football for the first time.

The Town had ended an awful run of seven defeats in a row with a win at relegation threatened Tranmere the previous week and amazingly still stood just one point off the play-off positions. Burton were unbeaten in seven.

A healthy crowd of 8,680 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see the Town miss a number of presentable opportunities with Scott Griffiths, Elliot Lee, Michael Harriman, Mark Cullen and particularly Luke Guttridge spurning chances that on another day would have hit the back of the net.

The Guttridge miss proved very costly as Burton, in just about their only meaningful attack of the game, advanced upfield with ten minutes to go and with the Town defenders appealing for an offside flag that never came, saw Burton's Matty Palmer score with a shot that was deflected past Hatters goalkeeper Elliot Justham. Showing the mark of potential champions, Burton held on to seal a vital victory which left them needing one win to guarantee promotion.

Luton manager John Still said afterwards: "I thought we played really well, we had some great chances while they had one deflected shot. What can we do about that?"

Brewers boss Jimmy-Floyd Hasselbaink was merely delighted by a "professional performance."

CHRISTMAS PAST

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** LOOKS BACK TO WHEN THE TOWN WOULD MEET THE SAME OPPONENTS IN DOUBLE HEADERS ON CHRISTMAS AND BOXING DAY

To most supporters here this afternoon, Christmas Day has always been a time for eating to excess while sitting in front of the television watching yet another re-run of 'The Great Escape'.

Up until the late 1950s though, Christmas Day was regarded the country over as one of the most important days in the football calendar. It was accepted practice for the women of the house to prepare the Christmas dinner while their menfolk toddled off to watch festive football before returning home exhausted ready to be fed!

It was normal practice for home and away games to be played against the same opposition on Christmas Day and Boxing Day, but in those pre-computer days the fixture compilers often got it wrong with their geographical knowledge. This often resulted in both teams travelling on a train together on Christmas night to or from some far-flung outpost of the country.

When the Town entered Football League Division Three in 1920 they had to face Southampton twice over the festive period, but fortunately Boxing Day fell on a Sunday that year so there was a chance for the players to travel at their leisure between the two fixtures.

As both games finished 1-1 the players probably wished they could have agreed the results beforehand and therefore enjoy an extended break!

The Town's first 'double header' took place two years later when QPR were played on consecutive days. The Hatters went down 4-0 in West London on Christmas Day, then won 1-0 at Kenilworth Road after making only one change to the side.

The most amazing pair of games during the decade came in 1926. A hat-trick from Sid Reid set the Town on their way to a 6-0 home win over Millwall but the following day, with the same team, a 7-0 thrashing was recorded. By all accounts the Hatters were lucky to get nil as they were kicked to shreds by a 'robust' opposition and were offered no protection by the referee, who was a late replacement and came from London.

Wisdom

Probably the Town's longest trip of the season was saved for the Christmas period in 1930 when the fixture planners, in their wisdom, paired us with Torquay. The Hatters won convincingly at Kenilworth Road on Christmas Day by 3-1, but not surprisingly both sides put on a jaded performance in the return the following day and 'fought' out a 1-1 draw.

Throughout the 1930s as well, 'local derbies' at places such as Cardiff, Bournemouth, Brighton and Barnsley were played on a home and away basis over the Christmas period, but from reading the match reports it would appear that no-one complained.

One surprising fact is that it took until 1935 before the Town or one of their opponents achieved the 'double' over the Christmas period. The sequence was finally broken when a 3-0 victory was recorded at Notts County on Christmas Day, which was followed up with a solitary Fred Roberts goal in

front of a then record Kenilworth Road League attendance of 18,100. We achieved the 'double' again, over Nottingham Forest in 1938 and then over Leeds in 1947.

We then settled for a spell of playing West Ham over the Christmas period, although 'local' games against Swansea, Plymouth and Leeds (again) did spring up to test the resolve of the travelling supporters.

By the mid-1950s, crowds for the Christmas Day fixture were beginning to dwindle due, in the main, to a cut back in public transport services on that day.

Poignant

Our final Christmas Day fixture took place in 1957, and the game holds rather poignant memories for many people as it was against the 'Busby Babes' of Manchester United only a matter of weeks before the Munich disaster.

The Town players travelled to Manchester where the United officials were worried about the size of the crowd which eventually turned out to be 39,144,

which was still 10,000 higher than any other crowd that day.

The League champions took an early lead against a Luton side missing several key first teamers through injury, through a dubious penalty netted by Duncan Edwards before the Reds' Tommy Taylor deflected a Bobby Charlton shot past a by-now injured Ron Baynam in the Luton goal. The scoring was completed in the 70th minute when Charlton tapped the ball home from close range.

It seems rather quaint to hear that the two sets of players travelled back to Luton by train together that evening ready for the return the following day, which was drawn 2-2 thanks to a last-gasp equaliser from Allan Brown.

That was the last season a full programme of Christmas Day fixtures was played, although some clubs held out. Blackpool in particular, because of the influx of holidaymakers over the Christmas period, battled on but finally signalled the end of the tradition in England with a local derby against Blackburn in 1965.

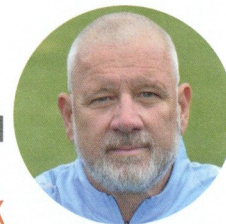

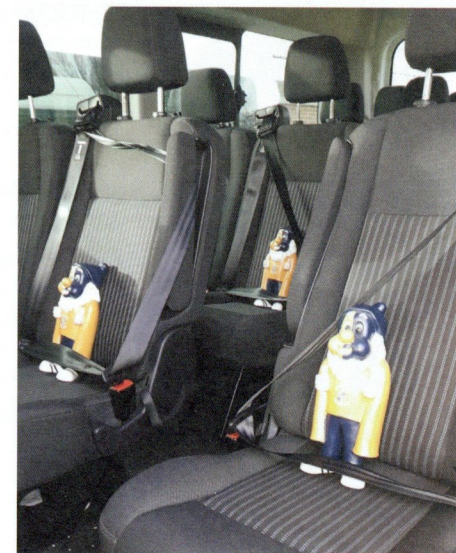
I was asked recently 'What is the best Christmas present I have had?' I said a broken drum. You just can't beat it.

I think with him it's just having the right attitude, and if you're willing to work for him, then he's willing to do things in return. Thankfully it's been like that since I've been here, and I am willing to work for him, so long may it continue.

@LTFC_Dave Do you still have 'that' swimming cap? And do you feel that being able to have an extended run in the team in one position has helped you perform better?

No I don't have the swimming cap, and yes – 100 per cent.

When I signed the contract in the summer I said that if I have a run in a position, then I feel I can do a job in that position and thankfully I'm improving, I think, this year on the ball, and defensively I'm improving as well.

I just keep trying to improve each week. It's a combination of everything though. I'm happy off the pitch and I'm happy on it too, and if I do something wrong, it's not affecting me. I've got a more relaxed view to coming in every day. Even on a matchday, I used to be all like – I needed to get into a zone that I don't actually need to get into. I've been doing yoga away from football. I'm not saying that's the sole reason I've improved, but every little helps. Me and Gambo started doing it in the summer, at the Yoga Shed in Hitchin, just for a bit of fitness and we loved it that much that I go three times a week now. It's unreal. It's helped me massively, mentally as well.

ig mhayward32 How do you cope when your barber decides to go on holiday? Do you go elsewhere or do you let it grow? Or did Christian cut your hair and since you don't see him every day you've let it become an absolute state...

What Matt is trying to say is, am I going to cut my hair? Why would I grow it to this length if I'm just going to cut it? I'm just going to grow it – maybe until the end of the season – and see where I go from there. There's no point in growing it if I'm just going to cut it when it gets scruffy, because I did that before. I would like to say I'll never wear a hair band – but then I always said I'd never wear pink boots, or boots with socks, and I've started to do that!

@geoffjellis When do you start your drive home for Christmas? Hopefully not in bloody November like your uncle Chris!

Haha! That would work – but my second name is pronounced Ray, not Rear! (Ed – This answers several other questions about how to pronounce Glen's surname)

@revdmbrown What's your favourite way to celebrate Christmas?

Training and travelling on Christmas Day! I think the build-up to Christmas is actually better than Christmas day, with all the songs and everyone is happy. I used to alternate from my dad's one year and then mum's the next, just spending it with family.

@LutonTownExile Do you think a central midfielder can learn or be taught to be comfortable on the ball under pressure or do you think you are born with the ability?

Everyone can learn, every day. Not just in centre mid, but 100 per cent you can learn to be comfortable on the ball. I've learnt masses from the day I signed here to the player I am now, on the ball. It's just the awareness in centre midfield and doing things quick, playing the first thing you see is normally the right option. Hopefully I'll continue to learn. It comes with confidence, and I'll tell Elliot before a game: 'Shout at me if I don't give it to you – I want you to tell me, because if I hear you shout I'll look to go forward with it'. Everyone helps each other, but you've got to have a bit as well.

@SteveLTFC1 Who's the best player you have come up against in your career and why?

I don't mean it disrespectfully, but I don't think about who I'm playing against.

@abboway What made you have loads of tattoos?

I liked tattoos when I was a kid and I wanted to get one when I was 16, but my dad wouldn't let me. I was playing for the Brighton centre of excellence as well, and if you're coming in with a tattoo you look a bit wrong. So I said when I was 18 I was going to get one. I did, and then I didn't really stop. There's a couple that mean something, like this clock for my nan, with the time that she passed away. And I've got one with No.30 on it, which is where I used to live with Gavin Howe, the digs guy at Brighton. I moved out of home when I was 18, because they thought it would be better for me to be more independent, so I moved into a semi-independent – an annex off a house, on my own. The owners went on holiday and said I needed to move out while they were away, so me and Chris Walton moved in with this couple, Gav and Rach, and since then we didn't look back. They split up when I was very young, but they still put their differences aside and took me

everywhere, up and down the country every week, both of them. So that was massive for me as a kid, and then I met Gav and Rach and they've been unreal ever since I've met them. I've got another mate, Darren Teague, and he's unreal for me. He does my off-season stuff. I've just got good people around me, my mates and that, who look out for me. On the pitch my inspiration at Brighton was Lewis Dunk, because he went through the ranks and he's played for England now. When I was younger, because of my dad, John Terry and Frank Lampard were my heroes – and I used to love Eidur Gudjohnsen – but then Dunky!

f Chris Sharples What famous player did you pretend to be when at school and what club did you grow up supporting?

My dad's a massive Chelsea fan, so when I was a kid it was Chelsea, Chelsea, Chelsea. Then from when I was about 12, 13, I started going to Brighton games and since then I've been a fan. I used to go home and away and loved it. We were in League One and almost dropped into League Two. We had Stockport at home, last day of the season, and we needed to win or draw and I was on the Withdean pitch at the end! We beat Man City as well. I can't really remember Nathan as a player because when I started going, it was after he was there. @madhatterhammer What is your aim for this season?

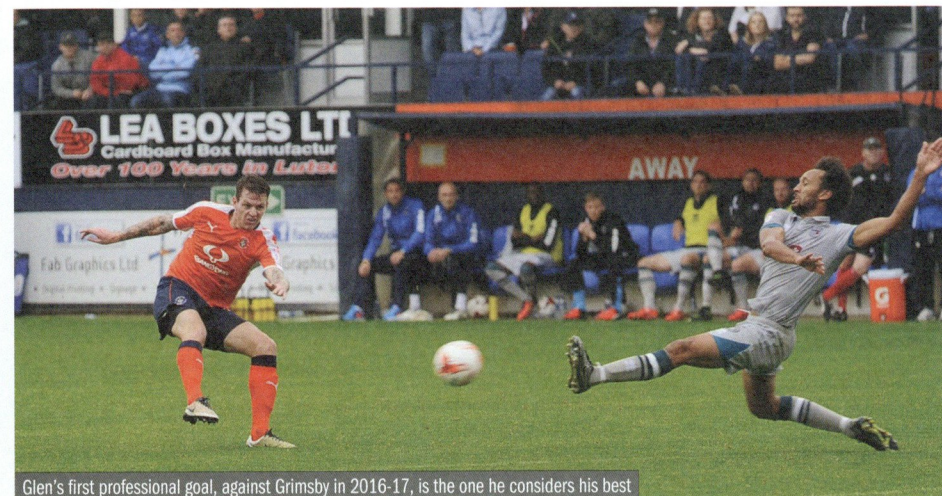

Harry Cornick taps in the opening goal

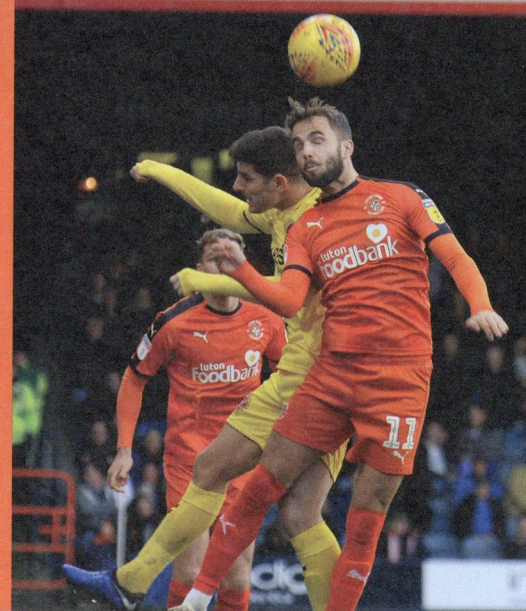


JONES:

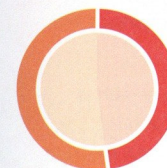
STORY OF THE MATCH

The Hatters put in a determined performance as they overcame a well-drilled Fleetwood Town side to move into the automatic promotion spots in Sky Bet League One.

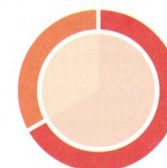

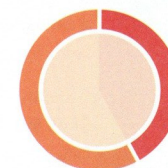

across goal – with the former Barnsley man netting his third of the campaign.

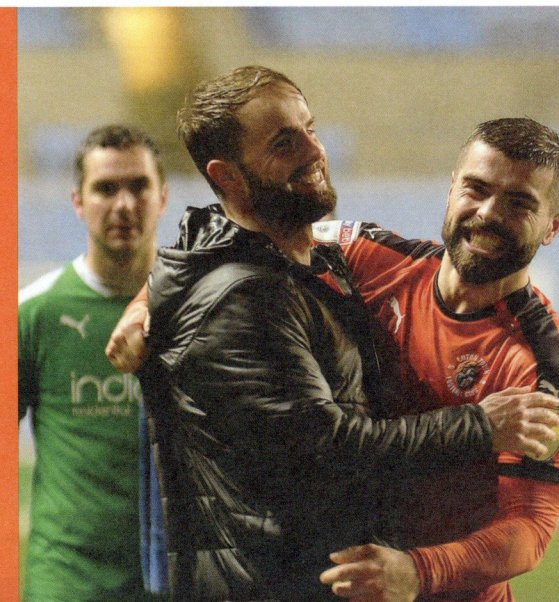

"The manager is a big part of us all working hard, he puts on all the sessions and gets us going and he's doing a good job. Hopefully we'll keep going in the right direction and see what happens come May."

Pearson also praised the 2,598 Hatters fans who made to trip to the Midlands, battling the wind and rain to get behind the team once more, creating a wall of noise behind the goal.

He added: "It's brilliant, especially with the weather, to see such a great following and they're pushing us all the way."

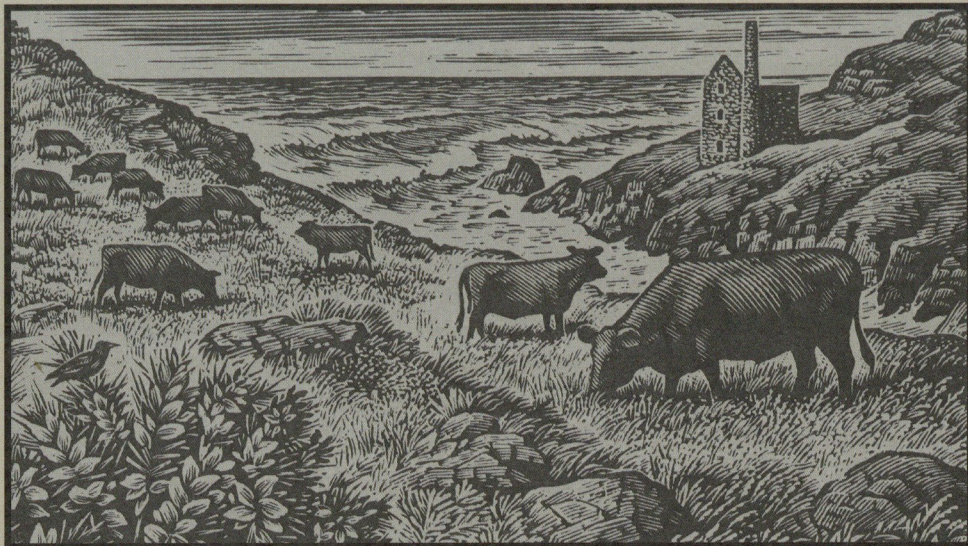
MAN OF THE MATCH

REVD DAVID KESTERTON CLUB CHAPLAIN

A few weeks ago I brought a guest along to the home game against Plymouth. I didn't realise but it was the first football match they had been to and it turned out to be a great introduction to live football.

The person visiting was from Taiwan, where apparently there is no big football following. As a result of lots of social media in the days that followed, there now seem to be a good number of LTFC fans in Taiwan! I also joked that my guest should come along on a regular basis as they were obviously a good omen.

This got me thinking about the place of superstition in our game. My predecessor as chaplain and former club captain, Alan West, told me a few weeks ago how superstitious players often were in his day, especially with pre-game rituals – the order in which socks or boots are put on and that kind of thing.

I'm not sure whether this is quite as strong today in the age of sports science, but we all have moments of wondering about how powers beyond our own may help us or influence us in some way.

The Christmas story might seem like the stuff of superstition in our day and age, yet lots of us will have enjoyed the retelling of the story in school nativity plays during the last few weeks, perhaps singing Carols while enjoying mince pies and mulled wine.

Church attendance goes up dramatically at this time of year as many enjoy the music and the atmosphere of a traditional Christmas and the re-telling of the story of the birth of Jesus.

Christians believe the miracle of Christmas goes way beyond superstition – that God makes a choice to enter into our world not with a powerful grand entry, but in the form of a vulnerable human baby. A story that can seem sentimental has a hard edge to it.

We are reminded that giving and receiving gifts and warm family gatherings are not the end of the story. Homelessness, fleeing from persecution, and the stigma surrounding an unmarried mother were right there at the heart of a story that we so often dress up to suit our own tastes.

For me the Christmas message is less about escapism or superstition and more about realities of everyday living – as relevant today as they were 2,000 years ago.

However you choose to mark the festive period, I wish you a happy and peaceful holiday and safety in travelling to family, friends and much celebration both on and off the pitch.

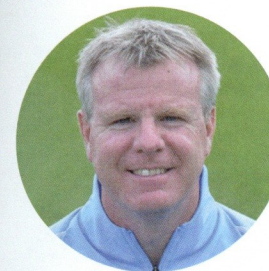

school or college and now find the jobs market challenging. KICKS projects aim to use football as hook to engage and target young people aged 11 to 24 and attempt to divert them away from anti-social behaviour by providing training and employment and volunteering opportunities. Longer term it all leads to improved health and self-esteem where they can feel safer through by bringing

different communities together.

Our cohesion team are out every night in Luton right across the town – up Farley Hill, down Lewsey and Park Street, up Crawley and in Marsh Farm engaging with the town's young people and enabling access to facilities they can't book on their own. Of course, it's not just KICKS but other organisations, such as our own council, are heavily involved through a project called Luton Street League, which is part of a Community Led local development project which hopes to use sport to engage with the disengaged and try to bring them back into mainstream society and the jobs market – tough but rewarding work.

A lot of the interest is centred on the 'perceived' rise in racism in football in the UK amongst some supporters, and yet we all recognise that away from matchday situations football has the power to bring people together from different ethnicities like no other sport. Recognising this, and following Daniel's award he has recently been interviewed on BBC 3CR and last week Sky Sports, no less, visited one of our centres in Marsh Farm which is funded through the Premier league KICKS project to see first-hand the work our cohesion team are involved with.

PL KICKS seeks to promote sport in deprived areas with unemployment and anti-social behaviour challenges, where lots of students under-achieve at

Another of our partners is the Laureus Sport for Good Foundation who support sport for development programmes which enhance social and emotional development and healthy behaviour of children and young people in disadvantaged communities, reducing the impact of violence, conflict and discrimination in their lives and increase their educational achievements and employability skills.

Last week some of our Laureus graduates were given a coaching lesson and 'pep' talk from two of the game's recent legends Andriy Shevchenko and pundit Jamie Redknapp. The message from Jamie was 'there are no shortcuts in life', and his hard-hitting talk to the young lads from Luton certainly left an impression.

As well as actual activity centres we also have a couple of big events coming up in the new year with a member of the first team coaching staff and a couple of players, including home town boy James Justin, due to attend a Show Racism the Red Card (SRTRC) day at the stadium.

On the day around 100 children will cram into the Eric Morecambe Lounge to take part in lots of activities and Q&A's with the panel. It will be a celebration of the Town's diversity and forms part of our education offer around community cohesion.

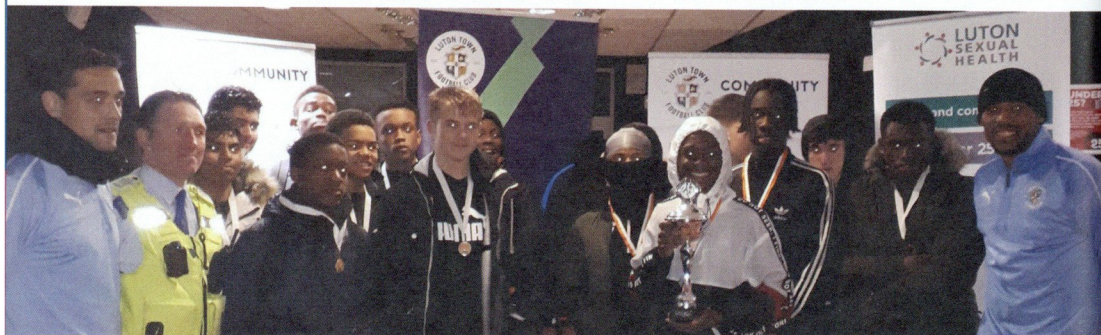
Not forgetting our annual KICK IT OUT matchday next year, scheduled for the Blackpool home game in April, to highlight our support for the charity that challenges discrimination, encourages inclusive practices and campaigns for positive change.

Standing with Kick It Out on the day we will be at the heart of the fight against discrimination for everyone who plays, watches or even works in football. I know our supporters will be keen as always to support the day.

Community Operations Development Officer Daniel Douglas commented: "We now have a fantastic project portfolio that encourages young people of all ages and abilities to come together and enjoy football.

"Quite often it's the first stage of a young person becoming involved with the Trust, from KICKS or Luton Street League they may also decide to volunteer with us or sign up for employability support programmes.

"It can be just about coming along to play football every night with friends, but for the majority of students it's so much more than that – it's a step towards making positive changes in their lives and making sure we all get along together in the Town."



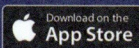

HATTERS SUFFER DEFEAT IN BOTTOM OF THE TABLE CLASH

Luton travelled east to Norwich for their final league game before Christmas – and it was arguably the most important of the season so far.

With both sides enduring a wretched first half of the 2018/19 campaign, it was a must win game for each team.

The first ten minutes of the game saw Luton dominate, and Town could easily have taken the lead on several occasions, but this initial momentum was followed by a bland 20 minutes before the home side took the lead through a stunning free-kick out of absolutely nothing.

The Hatters gave it their best when it came to trying to level the score line in the little time that remained until half time; Dionne Manning was the spearhead of most Luton attacks, but the Canaries defended resolutely and maintained their narrow lead until the break.

Town would have been hoping to bounce back in the second 45 and try to drag themselves off the bottom of the table.

Alas, Norwich stunned everyone by flying out of the blocks and doubling their lead just a minute into the second half, poking home a loose ball in the box. They then almost added a third, and it became clear Luton had a mountain to climb if they were going to get back into this game, despite their possession suggesting they were not the inferior side.

Aurora Ryan led the fight to try and drag Luton back into the game, linking up the play well and making several firm challenges to win back possession. Olivia Abraham and Jess McKay also looked to get a goal back for the Hatters, providing excellent crosses from both wings, but

as the game went on frustrations grew and patience wavered, with shots becoming more rushed and desperate.

Erica Byron's more advanced role opened up further avenues of attack for Luton, especially as Dionne Manning seemed to thrive more out wide, and Byron could have been the one to give Luton a late glimmer of hope, but a smart reaction save stopped her close range effort and somehow Town still found themselves comfortably behind with ten minutes remaining.

Luton persevered in their seemingly futile attempts to get back into the game, and were inevitably caught on the counter attack, not once, but twice within a two-minute spell to definitively kill the fixture.

Amy Summerfield did eventually get Luton the goal they had worked so hard for, poking home from close range at the second attempt, but it was too little too late. They remain on just four points after ten games, so a strong start to the second half of the season is going to be vital in the push to avoid relegation.

WHO?

The Iron have had three managers this year – Graham Alexander, Nick Daws and Stuart McCall – and their most recent appointment has a good pedigree and strong knowledge of League One. Former Scotland international McCall has crossed the Yorkshire border into Lincolnshire, having been in charge of Bradford City on a permanent basis on two occasions, before departing in February. The ex-midfielder played at the highest level of English football with Everton, as well as in the Scottish top flight with Rangers.

STADIUM - GLANFORD PARK

Built in 1987 at a cost of £2.5m and opened in time for the start of the 1988/89 campaign, Glanford Park can hold just under 9,100 supporters. Their record attendance was for a League Cup match against Manchester United, with 9,077 crammed in to watch the Iron be defeated 5-2. Away supporters are put in the AMS Stand.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Hatters have faced Scunthorpe on 14 occasions, our most recent meeting ended in a 3-2 win here at Kenilworth Road earlier on in the campaign. Our most enjoyable victory against them was on another occasion – April 5th 2009 will be

a date that will be particularly popular with Town supporters, given the fact we defeated the Iron 3-2 in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final.

PUBS

Glanford Park has its own 'Iron Bar', which admits visiting supporters.

TRAVEL

It's a 300-mile round trip to Glanford Park from Kenilworth Road, with either the M1 or the A1 the best routes. Public transport won't be available with the game taking place on Boxing Day.

RESULTS SO FAR

After a half decent start to their campaign, the Iron's form has come off the gas considerably – that starting with their defeat at Kenilworth Road at the beginning of October. That began a run of five defeats, they steadied themselves with a draw and a win before going on another winless run, which was extended to four straight defeats with a 3-0 defeat at Doncaster last weekend.

Former Hatter Cameron McGeehan had a loan spell with the Iron last season as they reached the play-off semi-finals, before returning to parent club Barnsley.

When the 2016/17 League Two play-off semi-finals were on Sky, the whole pub blossomed in orange. The stakes were high in the first leg against Blackpool. The beer went flying and a couple of chairs were broken when Dan Potts and Isaac Vassell scored, and of course, some of the supporters were very upset after the 3-2 defeat. But the orange army stayed there to clean up the mess without hesitation.

My first time ever at Kenilworth Road was in February, on a very cold and wet Tuesday evening.

As part of the journalism course for my degree, I had to cover a game, from start to finish, head to toe, digging deep into the world of the Hatters.

Even though we were still "baby-journalists", we were treated as professionals by the club. They welcomed us like we were one of their own and helped us find our feet in this fairly new territory. And when we were in need of a hand, supporters of 50 years fed us with information about the whole squad in no time. They knew the team inside out, like some sort of offline Wikipedia pages.

Hungarians are famous for their hospitality, but they cannot be compared to Luton Town's management and supporter club. Luton may have been second in the league, but they were definitely first in our hearts.

I wish everyone the same experience outside the press box, being a part of a family like this is something we all should experience. But if you are reading these lines, you are probably already part of the pack (and will never go back to not being so).
