Gary Sweet and 2020 have put so much into this and we really have to thank them for saving the club ten years ago. Now we must continue to support them driving it forward.

I can't wait for the Newlands Park meeting now – but first we've got a big one here today.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone.

As most of you will already know on Wednesday evening the Luton Borough Council Planning Committee approved our planning application for a stadium and other mixed-use facilities at Power Court.

We are delighted that after such an extensive and thorough process the Committee have made such a momentous and historic decision for not only the club, but the town as a whole. This is without a doubt the most important result in all our living memories.

However, it is too early to start celebrating, because the away leg is yet to come in two weeks, and we also need a positive result then to make it all happen.

There are reasons why very large and experienced international developers have failed to find a viable way to make Power Court work for so long. It has been largely derelict for over a dozen years, is contaminated due to its former uses, has the River Lea culverted under it and has an electricity substation in the middle of it.

It is also a well-known fact that when an area is derelict or run-down it infects its surroundings and makes the whole area less attractive to investors, residents and businesses. There are many examples of stadia injecting life into formerly ignored spaces.

We believe that we have a unique opportunity, but it will be expensive – much more expensive than a regular site.

Before we get to even think about making it a place that people want to inhabit and visit, we must make it workable. We have to decontaminate the site, move the sub-station, which otherwise would be under the away end, and we want to bring the River

Lea out from undercroft as a feature between us and St Mary's church. Our town was named after the river, so isn't it right that it should be part of the environment and a place for people to enjoy? If any of you know the recent developments at St Pancras Square or Granary Square in London, I can imagine people sitting on the banks of the river with views of the church, just as they do by the Grand Union Canal there. A vibrant welcoming place for residents, students and visitors to enjoy.

Previous owners have failed to develop the site, but they weren't Lutonians with a committed dream, and simply made decisions purely on commerciality. They were corporations, which had to be profit motivated before anything else. When Gary sold us the vision ten years ago this was, alongside success on the pitch, it!

Sustainable

The key that opens the door is Newlands Park. It is THE gateway to Luton. Millions of people travel down Airport Way from Junction 10 every month and this land and the airport is what they see. We believe that a high-quality mixed-use development will become a modern destination for people to work, shop, eat, watch a film or have fun. Why should we have to drive 25 miles to do that?

The profit from Newlands will be used to build the stadium and make our Club sustainable, but without it, it will be very difficult, if not impossible. It has taken four or five years to develop this plan and in that time the market has shifted somewhat, particularly with High Street retail.

Town centres are simply too heavily reliant on shopping for need with most specialist market



commentators stating that they desperately need to diversify to places where people live, work and play, which is precisely what we are trying to deliver.

Gary, Mike and the development team have done a marvellous job to get us this far, so let us hope and pray that they get the opportunity to finish it for the benefit of us all.

A warm welcome today to Barry Fry, Mark Tyler and all the officials, players and supporters from Peterborough United.

The "Posh" had a storming start to the season and tore us apart for 20 minutes at London Road in August. Their progress has slowed somewhat, but they are a talented side and well in the play-off picture. We are well acquainted with their aggressively passionate manager, Steve Evans, having come up against him at both Crawley and Mansfield in the recent past, and we can be sure of a feisty encounter this afternoon.

It's never boring being a Luton Town fan, is it? But there are limits. Since the New Year it has been an emotional rollercoaster interspersed with some fantastic football matches and amazing support.

The number of you who travelled to West Brom and Sunderland so early in the year when money is tight was extraordinary, and I for one found myself welling

up with pride and emotion. It seems that, perhaps because of the size of Kenilworth Road and the time we have recently spent in the lower leagues, other clubs do not realise how well supported we are, and ticket requests and attendances come as quite a shock. This is really important for our standing with the authorities and our reputation within football in general. Thank you all.

Gary very eloquently expressed our views about Nathan's rapid and unexpected departure in his Sheffield Wednesday notes. I would just like to wish him well and add my thanks for the work he did and the team he helped to create. However, the timing and manner of his departure sadly showed that he was not the man he professes to be.

I must add my thanks on behalf of the Board and investors to all operational staff and to Mick, the coaching staff and all the players for their words, actions and support at this testing time.

I will always be a Hatter, but today I'm a very proud Hatter.

NEW STADIUM AT POWER COURT **APPROVED!**

**LUTON COUNCIL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE APPROVE
A NEW STADIUM FOR LUTON TOWN AT POWER COURT**

History was made on Wednesday evening as the Planning Control Committee at Luton Borough Council approved planning permission to build the new Luton Town stadium at Power Court.

This momentous decision ends almost 70 years of waiting for the Club, who have been trying to relocate since the 1950s.

During the meeting, the Development Control Committee was addressed by Luton Town Chief Executive Gary Sweet, and 2020 Developments associates Sean McGrath and Michael Moran, who laid out the many benefits that the new stadium would bring to the Club and the community at large.

In his closing remarks, Gary Sweet also demonstrated the Club's ambition, were the developments to go ahead.

"It would instantly elevate our footballing ambition to another level. If Leicester City in a new surrounding can win the Premier League, then so can we, it will increase our support base and make sure Luton Town are permanently financially viable going forward," he said. His comments were met with applause from the room.

The Club revealed Power Court as the preferred location for their new stadium in December 2015 when artists' impressions of the stadium were first revealed to the public.

During May 2016 further details of the plans for the new stadium were introduced to the public at a series of exhibitions in Luton over ten days. The exhibitions opened in the Eric Morecambe Lounge at Kenilworth Road before moving on to Venue Central in Bury Park and closing at The Hat Factory in Bute Street.

Many thousands of people attended, including supporters of the Club and residents, providing an opportunity to meet with the development team, ask questions and raise concerns. Feedback across the ten days was overwhelmingly positive, with a 98% approval rate among those who visited.

In August 2016, 2020 Developments submitted the applications for Power Court and Newlands Park to the council which were validated shortly afterwards. During the period of public consultation, close to 11,000 letters were submitted to the Council in support of the developments, with residents, members of parliament and public figures all adding their voices in favour.

Since then, the council have diligently been going through the necessary, and complicated process of

scrutinising the applications, and while it has been a long, drawn-out and at times, frustrating process, the council should be applauded for leaving no stone unturned along the way to making this evening's historic decision.

The gravity and importance of this decision should not be under-estimated. For Luton Town Football Club, and its loyal supporters – the security of a new home at Power Court means that we can look to the future with great optimism.

It means that the Club will be able to compete at a higher level, and to progress towards our ambitions for more success on the football pitch.

But also, and perhaps even more importantly, that we can continue to provide a place for the people of Luton to gather with friends and family as a community, as we have since the Club began in 1885 – almost 135 years ago.

The iconic new stadium will also provide many fantastic opportunities to Luton and its townspeople. Thousands of new jobs will be created, along with new public spaces and facilities that Luton has been lacking for many years.

Above all it will bring much-needed regeneration to Luton town centre – revitalising Power Court, an area that has been largely unused for well over a decade.

Kenilworth Road is and always be a 'spiritual-home' for most of today's loyal supporters. It has been a



venue for countless great matches over the years, whether wins, draws or defeats. It has played host to many of the greatest teams, and players the world has seen, both from our Club and others, and has endured two world wars and many great social upheavals along the way. It has been a constant in the lives of Lutonians, and Luton Town supporters.

It has seen friends and loved ones come, and go.

But the future of our Club, lies with our young supporters. Your children, and grandchildren. Wednesday night's decision means that they too will have the opportunity to witness their own unforgettable moments and experience the sense of belonging, wonder and joy that Luton Town Football Club can deliver.

It's a powerful feeling. And that future will be at Power Court.

We now look ahead to the meeting to determine the mixed use development at Newlands Park on the 30th January, and hope for a similarly positive outcome.

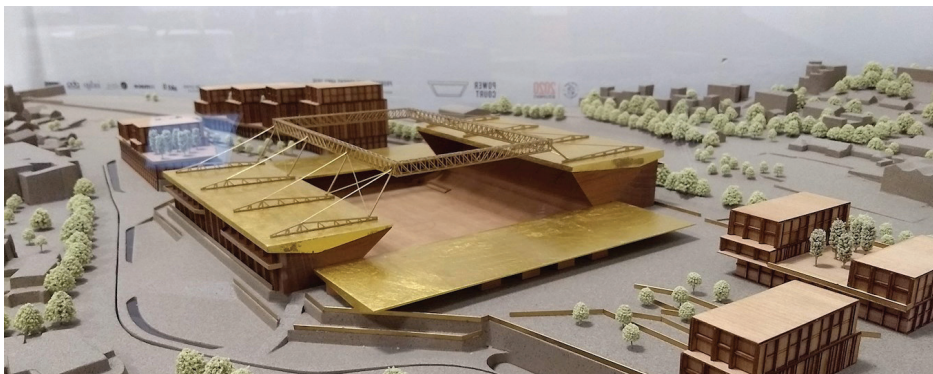

GARY SWEET'S POWER COURT REACTION!

The morning after the night before, Hatters CEO Gary Sweet gave his reaction to BBC Three Counties Radio's Andy Collins.

Here's what he had to say: "It's massive, it's a milestone. The last time this happened would have been around 106, 107 years ago, so it's quite a momentous occasion. It's a two-legged tie, we've won the first one, we've now got to win the second one.

"There's not a linkage as such [between the two applications], it's just one effectively funds much of the other. You've got to think that the piece of land that we are putting the stadium on at Power Court is a horrendous site.

"There used to be two cooling chimneys on that site so there's a lot of contamination. We want to move the river out, we've got to remove the substation, a lot of levelling. So, before we even start, the cost of that isn't far off the cost of a football stadium and nobody else could unlock that piece of land in Luton, and particularly in the Town centre. It needs that revitalisation.

"So unless there is something else to fund that process, then it will remain derelict forever. This is why principally we need Newlands to be passed. No developer is going to have that kind of money to unlock that particular site.

"Technically yes [we could start clearing the site today]. It's not the sort of thing we can start putting millions into, we will start to do some further investigation work etc. So there will be some progress, but we can't really start the building

process as such until we've got the planning permission granted on the 30th of this month for Newlands Park."

He added: "It's a long old process! I think one thing Luton fans have learned is patience. We've had ten years now of nurturing this football club back to life and I think they have been really, really patient with us and our communication. The way we're messaging this is everything is on track.

"I think everyone understands and appreciates the fact it's going to take some time before we can really start digging holes. So, I really thank them for that patience. The most important thing is we've got permission for the football stadium and that puts us in a really good position, a really strong position, that does ultimately mean we will move to Power Court.

"For us, we believe in terms of the construction phase, we're talking about 18 months, but there's a long way to go before that. That doesn't include the phase of clearing the site. I wouldn't class it as a delay, we're planning ahead. So, I am sure supporters are going to be asking 'when are we moving in?'

"We don't really want to be committing to a date. It'll be three years down the line that I would imagine that we would move in. Ideally, we would like to move in at the start of a season, rather than some way through the middle of one."

The Town would like to welcome the staff, players and supporters of this afternoon's visitors, Peterborough United.

Posh got off to a flying start this season and were one of the early automatic promotion contenders such was their form. However, a difficult run since the beginning of November had seen Steve Evans' side slip down and out of the play-off places altogether, but they now occupy sixth spot.

A side packed full of quality, Evans recruited heavily in the summer, having been appointed at the end of February last year. He was unable to guide them to a play-off spot, and with the departure of former Hatters striker Jack Marriott to Derby, Peterborough brought in an impressive amount of quality players.

Sky Bet League One player of the month for December, Ivan Toney, is getting the headlines at the moment up top, but Jason Cummings and Matt Godden are very good for this level, whilst the return of Lee Tomlin from Premier League Cardiff City must be one of the coups of this window so far.

Aaron Chapman scooped the Golden Glove for League Two last season with Accrington, before switching to the ABAX Stadium. Alex Woodyard and Siriki Dembele were two of the standout midfielders in the fourth tier in the 2017/18 campaign with Lincoln and Grimsby respectively, and they add to a midfield that already boasts Marcus Maddison,

who topped the assist charts last year. Defensively, the signing of ex-Premier League centre-half Sebastien Bassong speaks for itself, whilst the recent recruitment of Ben White from Brighton should prove to be a decent signing, the youngster having impressed on loan at Newport County AFC last season.

Posh will be looking to get to the Championship by the end of this campaign, and they have a good recent history of winning promotions, going up in two consecutive seasons between 2007-09, finding themselves in the Championship for a year, before regaining second tier status for a two-year spell, which came to an end in 2013. This season marks their sixth consecutive year at this level, with their finishes over the last three gradually improving.

Away from home, Peterborough have been on fire, sitting second in the away form table for the campaign. Twenty-seven points from 13 games, having netted 30 goals, makes for some reading – their points haul only beaten by Portsmouth with 30, but Pompey have scored eight fewer goals. Home form has been the issue for Evans' team though, picking up just 20 points from 14 matches so far.

THE GAFFER

Steve Evans | Age: 56

The Posh boss had a relatively short playing career, ending at the age of 24 when an unfortunate knee ligament injury forced him into

early retirement. Evans played all of his senior football in his native Scotland, ending at St Johnstone in 1986. It was nearly ten years later when Evans took his first managerial role at Stamford, leading them to two titles in four years. The 56-year-old has taken Boston United and Crawley Town into the league as Conference champions, as well as managing Leeds United, but is probably best known for his work with Rotherham, gaining back-to-back promotions from League Two to the Championship in 2012-13 and 2013-14. He joined the Posh just under a year ago after a spell in charge at Mansfield Town.



THE STOPPER

Aaron Chapman | Age: 28

A towering presence in between the sticks standing at 6ft 8ins, Chapman won League Two with Accrington Stanley last season – playing against the Hatters in both fixtures – before switching to Posh soon after the campaign ended. Started his career in Non-League football with Belper Town, where his impressive performances earned a move to nearby Chesterfield in 2013. Loan spells in the Conference with Chester, then in the League with Stanley and Bristol Rovers, followed before his permanent move to the Wham Stadium – where he became a team-mate of Matty Pearson's – in 2016.



GOALKEEPER

CONOR O'MALLEY

AGE: 24

The Irishman played for a string of clubs in his homeland, including Shamrock Rovers and St Patrick's Athletic, before moving to England in 2017. Played in the Checkatrade game against us earlier this season.

DEFENDERS

RHYS BENNETT

AGE: 27

Signed his first professional deal for Bolton Wanderers in 2009. Played under Steve Evans at Mansfield and subsequently moved along with the manager when he joined Peterborough.

JASON NAISMITH

AGE: 24

The scot is enjoying his first full season in English football having always played north of the border. Capped for his country at U17, U18, U20 and U21 level.

DID YOU KNOW?

Peterborough United were formed in 1934 and were a Non-League club until 1960, when they were elected to the Football League after winning the Midland League for five seasons in a row. They made it six successive championship successes by securing the old Fourth Division title in their first season among the top 92. Their record attendance of 30,046 turned out for an FA Cup tie with Arsenal in 1965.

THE WALL

Ryan Tafazolli | Age: 27

A powerful centre-back who can be a danger from set-pieces, Tafazolli really stood out while at Mansfield Town, winning Fans' Player of the Season, Chairman and Directors' Player of the Season, and the Stags' Association Player of the Season in 2013-14, even though he only made 24 appearances. A brilliant four years at Mansfield Town caught the attention of a few Championship clubs, but the Iranian-born centre-half decided to put pen to paper with the Posh in 2016. He was voted best defender by the fans on his maiden season with the club and has continued to keep his place in the starting XI ever since.



IN THE MIDDLE

Alex Woodyard

Age: 25

The midfielder ended up being an incredibly important part of the Lincoln City side to win promotion back to the football league in 2016-17. Woodyard also played in every single match of the Imps' memorable FA Cup campaign that season, beating the likes of Ipswich, Brighton and Burnley to help the side in becoming the first non-league team to reach the competition's quarter final stage in 103 years. The midfielder did taste success at Wembley eventually though, in last season's EFL Trophy final, winning the match against League One Shrewsbury. With such an impressive CV built while at Lincoln, Peterborough signed Woodyard in May last year to bolster their squad.



TYLER DENTON

AGE: 23

On-loan from Leeds United, Denton spent last season with Port Vale in League Two making 15 appearances. Played for England at U17 level.

DARREN LYON

AGE: 23

A former Hamilton Academical player, scoring a historic goal second in a 2-0 win over Rangers at Ibrox. The club's first victory at the Scottish giants since 1987.

MIDFIELDERS

COLIN DANIEL

AGE: 30

Part of the Blackpool team to beat the Hatters in the League Two play-off semi-finals in 2016-17. Also gained promotion back to the Football League with Mansfield Town.

MARK O'HARA

AGE: 23

Made more than a century of appearances in the Scottish Premier League with Dundee and Kilmarnock. Also capped at youth level for the Scottish national team.

Ivan Toney | Age: 22

Toney has been sensational so far this season, netting 17 times in all competitions – including two hat-tricks. Born just up the M1 in Northampton, Toney played his youth football for the Cobblers until Newcastle United bought him in 2015 for an undisclosed fee, aged just 19. The striker only featured twice for the Premier League outfit who loaned Toney out to multiple EFL clubs including Barnsley, Shrewsbury and Scunthorpe, until Peterborough signed the forward on a permanent deal in August last year. The 22-year-old's vast experience at such a young age is proving to be a brilliant piece of business at the ABAX Stadium as he continues to fire the Posh towards a play-off spot.

CLASSIC CLASH WITH THE POSH

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

19TH OCTOBER 1996 • LUTON TOWN 3 PETERBOROUGH UNITED 0

Following relegation from Division One (now the Championship) in 1996, the close season was expected to feature a major clear out of playing staff which never actually materialised.

Although Scott Oakes was transferred to David Pleat's Premiership side Sheffield Wednesday and the unlucky Vidar Riseth moved to Linz, a couple of on-off deals seemed to take up much of the summer.

Ceri Hughes was taken by Crystal Palace on trial, but after what seemed an age it was decided he should return to Kenilworth Road. Also, Julian James was on the verge of signing for Gillingham but in the end decided to stay with the Hatters.

On the incoming side was Paul Showler, signed from one of manager Lennie Lawrence's old sides Bradford City, while another forward, Steve McCormick, had been targeted after playing for and against the Town during a pre-season tour of Scotland. Unfortunately another forward had to be sacrificed first and, after Lincoln withdrew from signing John Taylor at the eleventh hour, McCormick had to be left to ply his trade with Stirling Albion.

After a mixed bag of pre-season results, which included a 4-2 win over a full strength West Ham side in Julian James' testimonial and a 4-1 defeat at Stirling, it was back to Division Two football for the first time since 1970.

The opening league game did not quite go the way the supporters, who felt that a quick return to Division One was a divine right, expected.

Burnley, the visitors to Kenilworth Road, not only won, but their scorers were Luton old boys Steve Thompson and Kurt Nogan. Although the Town were not particularly bad they had to swiftly learn that to gift the opposition a two goal start left you with a

mountain to climb whichever division you were in. A penalty miss by Bontcho Guentchev did not help the Hatters cause very much either.

The Town's visit to Brentford attracted a large Luton following who thought that, with ten minutes left, a lead of 2-1 meant three points in the bag. Unfortunately the Bees had other ideas, and two goals at the death, aided by some generous defending, meant that the season was beginning to look like a follow on from the previous campaign.

Worse was to follow in an embarrassing 5-0 midweek defeat at Bristol City which brought about a public apology from Lennie Lawrence as the Town sank to the foot of the table. Obviously the Hatters had to learn fast that the division was not likely to be a cakewalk.

After a certain amount of soul searching, the Town finally got off the mark with a narrow 1-0 home win over Rotherham courtesy of a rare goal from Mitchell Thomas. No-one was about to get carried away, however, as the Millers were a poor outfit as proved by their eventual relegation, so it was probably a blessing that we met them when we did.

Next up was a first ever visit to Wycombe and another 1-0 victory. This time though the fans could see the first glimmer that the Hatters were acclimatising themselves to their new level and adapting themselves accordingly. The game was fairly turgid and settled by a scrappy goal, but another clean sheet proved that lessons from the early season disasters were being learned.

The players were now beginning to enjoy themselves, as proved by their reaction following a 2-1 home victory over a tough Gillingham outfit. A 1-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road at the hands of Chesterfield brought them back to earth however, as they were shown that at this level teams could make up for any lack of skill by sheer hard work and dogged defending, so the Town tried those tactics in the next game at Bury and returned with a point following a 0-0 draw.

Blackpool were next up at Kenilworth Road and for the first time in the campaign the Town truly imposed themselves on the opposition, especially in the first half when they had the Seasiders on the rack for long periods. Despite this superiority they only had one goal to show for their domination which came after a Blackpool defensive mistake.

The Hatters were now moving up the table and supporters were in a much happier frame of mind after successive wins over Walsall and Shrewsbury together with a fighting 1-1 draw at Stockport.

Barry Fry's Peterborough were the next visitors to Kenilworth Road and the best attendance since the opening day gathered to watch the resurgent Hatters. The Town set about Posh, who had lost their last three games, from the opening whistle and it was no surprise when Steve Davis headed

the Hatters into the lead after ten minutes following a corner.

The Peterborough defence was all over the place once more shortly afterwards when another corner was only partly cleared, leaving Paul Showler to touch in Tony Thorpe's goal bound shot.

Showler made the game safe just after the interval leaving Posh, who had brought on three subs at half-time, chasing shadows. "We must pull our fingers out," said Fry afterwards, while Lawrence could only enthuse over the talents of Paul Showler who "needs to be kept physically right!"

The Town had been reasonably successful in the Checkatrade Trophy since Nathan Jones had taken on the hot-seat at Kenilworth Road, beating higher League opposition to progress through to the semi-finals in 2016/17 before going out unluckily to Oxford.

Blooding youngsters for their first taste of senior football, coupled with some entertaining games made the competition a welcome diversion from normal League action.

Much the same could be said for season 2017/18 with penalty wins over Tottenham and Barnet followed by victory at Wimbledon in the group stages before a comfortable 4-0 humbling of West Ham in round 2.

Next up was a home meeting with Peterborough from the division above and a chance for the Town's youngsters to prove themselves against higher opposition.

The Hatters made ten changes from the side that had lost at Newcastle in the FA Cup the previous weekend, while Posh made two and included former

The second half was still end to end but lacked the chances of the first although Shea brought off a wonder save from Jermaine Anderson in the closing moments to take the tie to penalties.

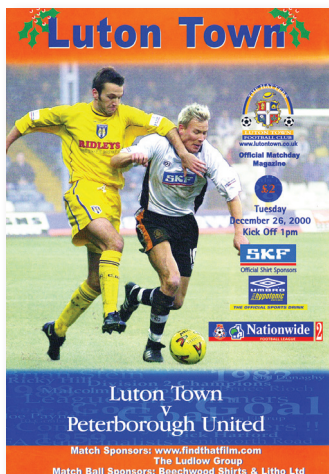
April 1994

April 1997

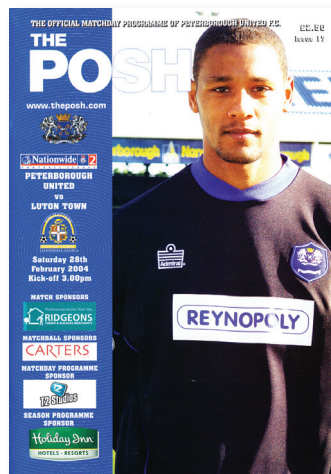

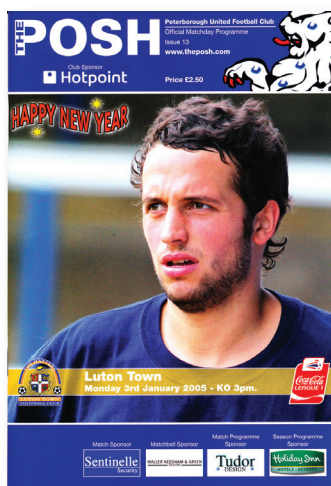
▲ February 2004

JIM HALL & JOHN COZENS

Former England Youth striker Jim Hall is Peterborough United's record League goalscorer. Signing professional for hometown Northampton in July 1963, he helped them reach the top-flight and moved to Peterborough in an exchange deal involving Johnny Byrne in December 1967. He starred alongside Peter Price and John Cozens, featuring in the 1973-74 Fourth Division title triumph. Scoring 122 goals in 302 League outings for Posh prior to rejoining Northampton in January 1975, he was leading marksman in their 1975-76 promotion success, then played for Cambridge United. Now living near Great Yarmouth.

Striker John Cozens was ever-present leading marksman in Peterborough's 1973-74 Fourth Division title triumph. After spells with Tonbridge and Hayes, he joined Hillingdon Borough in August 1968, starring as they were FA Trophy finalists in 1970. He moved to Notts County in August 1970 and helped win the Fourth Division title in 1970-71. Joining Peterborough in November 1972, he was top scorer again in 1976-77 and netted 41 goals in 132 League games before moving to Cambridge United in December 1977. He helped clinch promotion, then joined their coaching staff and managed Bourne, King's Lynn and Stamford.

BILLY KELLOCK & ROBBIE COOKE

Striker Robbie Cooke was top scorer as Peterborough reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1980-81. Initially with Mansfield Town, he was a prolific scorer with Grantham before reuniting with Peter Morris at London Road in May 1980. He starred as Peterborough twice narrowly missed promotion, netting 51 goals in 115 League outings prior to joining Cambridge United in February 1983. Moving to Brentford in December 1984, he joined Millwall in December 1987 and linked up with Peter Morris again at Kettering Town. The England Semi-Pro international featured in the 1988-89 FA Cup run, then played for Bourne and Warboys.

Ex-Scotland Schoolboy striker Billy Kellock was Peterborough United's leading marksman in 1979-80. He began with Aston Villa and joined Cardiff City in February 1972, then played for Norwich City, Millwall, Chelmsford and Kettering, appearing in the 1979 FA Trophy final. Joining Peterborough in August 1979, he was ever-present in 1980-81 and skippered two promotion near-misses. He netted 43 goals in 134 League games before moving to Luton Town in July 1982, then had a spell at Wolves. Reunited with Peter Morris at Southend United in September 1983, he then played for Port Vale, Halifax and Kettering again.



KEN CHARLERY & TONY ADCOCK

Popular striker Ken Charlery scored two goals in Peterborough United's 1991-92 Third Division play-off final success. He impressed with Maidstone United before moving to Posh in March 1991, starring in their 1991-92 League Cup run. Sold to Watford for a club record £350,000 in October 1992, he rejoined Peterborough in December 1993, then returned again from Birmingham City in February 1996 and netted 55 goals in 177 League games overall before joining Stockport County in March 1997. The St Lucia star later played for Barnet, Boston United and Dagenham & Redbridge, gaining England Semi-Pro honours.

Striker Tony Adcock helped Peterborough United to clinch promotion in 1991-92. Signing professional for Colchester United in February 1981, he was leading marksman four times before moving to Manchester City in June 1987. He then played for Northampton Town, Bradford City and Northampton again prior to joining Peterborough in December 1991. Twice top scorer, he netted 35 goals in 111 League games before moving to Luton Town in August 1994. He later returned to Colchester, helping to reach the 1997 Auto Windscreens Shield final and Third Division play-offs in 1997-98, then appeared for Heybridge Swifts.



CRAIG MACKAIL-SMITH & AARON McLEAN

Scotland international striker Craig Mackail-Smith was top scorer in Peterborough United's 2008-09 and 2010-11 promotion successes. He played for St Albans City and Arlesey before moving to Dagenham & Redbridge in July 2004. Featuring in their 2006-07 Conference title campaign, he joined Peterborough with Shane Blackett in January 2007. He starred as they won promotion three times in four seasons, netting 80 goals in 185 League games before sold to Brighton for £2.5m in July 2011. Rejoining Posh on loan in November 2014, also from Luton in January 2017, he helped Wycombe to win promotion in 2017-18.

Former England Semi-Pro striker Aaron McLean was leading marksman in Peterborough United's 2007-08 promotion triumph. Initially with Leyton Orient, he had spells with Aldershot and Grays Athletic, helping win the FA Trophy shortly before moving to Peterborough in October 2006. He featured in three promotion campaigns, netting 71 goals in 157 League outings prior to joining Hull City in December 2010. Moving to Bradford City in January 2014, he briefly rekindled his lethal partnership with Craig Mackail-Smith when loaned back to Peterborough in November 2014. He has since played for Barnet and Ebbsfleet United.

LUKE'S FITNESS IS RETURNING AFTER SECOND START

Although disappointed to see Town knocked out of the Emirates FA Cup, Hatters midfielder Luke Berry was pleased to see how far the club has come since his arrival in the summer of 2017.

The former Cambridge United man started in both games against Sheffield Wednesday and has played as if he was never away – the 26-year-old running around with the same tenacity we had become accustomed to at Kenilworth Road prior to his serious ankle injury.

He said: "It just shows how far we have come that we're all disappointed and after two games we have given a real good Championship team a good run for their money. I thought I had a good chance, Collo had a good chance, Elliot as well. We've all had good chances, so we're disappointed.

"I had a good chance second half, I am annoyed I didn't score it, but I am glad to get minutes in. That's the main thing at the minute, just getting up my match sharpness. I didn't think I was that sharp today, second half I got a bit tired. I just need to keep working on that in training. I have done my own mini pre-season, now I just need to get my sharpness up in games."

The Owls' goal came just a minute after the restart, when Steven Fletcher's effort was deflected into the path of Atdeh Nuhui, who saw his strike deflect off Sonny Bradley and into the top corner.

"It was a poor goal to concede to be honest, I think he shanked it and it bobbed in," Berry continued. "It's one of those where you're like 'how the hell has he done that?' Then we create four or five clear cut chances and it's a shame we didn't take them.

"The message after the game was we've got an even bigger one on Saturday and we're going to



focus on that now. We've got a great record at Kenilworth Road; 13 League One games unbeaten in the league and we want to keep that going.

"In the first leg we didn't even know we would be playing Chelsea and we still thought we could have beaten Sheffield Wednesday. We want to try and win.

"We know we're good enough to go toe-to-toe with teams like this, that's why we're in the top two in the league. We know we can give any team a run for their money like we did on Saturday. We had ten men against Sunderland for a bit of time and we could have won that as well."

Well this has certainly taken a long time to write. Not two and a half years admittedly, but despite an astonishing intervention from the Football League, I think I have formed an opinion.

I volunteered my services last Thursday in a show of sympathy for the programme editor who had suddenly been handed 'Jonesgate' to deal with on top of two home games in five days. Fortunately for me, in a similar role back in 1995, David Pleat left for Sheffield Wednesday in the summer, and Twitter was just a noise that birds made.

Originally I started the article discussing a book I received for Christmas on the history of Luton, which included the possibility that Julius Caesar marched through the town. Now that wasn't the prelude to a gag about being stabbed in the back, I was going to use the Roman reference to highlight the benefit we can take from what is left behind, and build on what has been achieved during Nathan Jones' time here.

But then I saw that photo. Nathan receiving the December manager of the month trophy in his new Stoke training top.

Then I was going to recall, in no particular order, departures such as Jim Ryan, John Hartson, Curtis Davies, Joe Kinnear, Kingsley Black and David Pleat first time around. Older supporters would add Bruce Rioch and Malcolm Macdonald to that list along with many more, and I was going to point out that despite them all, we are still here.

But then I looked at that photo again.

I felt Nathan moving on was not a surprise, but it was the timing which couldn't have been much worse.

As for the “badge-kissing”, it wasn’t an act. Nathan is a proud and passionate Welshman and that was his way, and without that passion and ambition we might still be in League Two. This season has been among the most enjoyable to commentate on, with genuine excitement from even a middle-aged cynic like me.

But then I looked at the photo once again. Perhaps put a jumper on? Does anyone work in PR at the Football League? What a shame it has all ended this way. Just a farewell video message would have helped, aimed in particular at younger Twitter and Instagram users who seem especially upset. I should add it falls on those of us who have seen it all before to ensure that their enthusiasm remains.

The players, the vast majority of whom were signed by Nathan, seem to have taken it in their stride. Based on Sunderland the response was outstanding; from the pre-match salute in front of the travelling fans, throughout the game itself, to the measured and respectful comments afterwards from skipper on the day Sonny Bradley – fast becoming a player we can least afford to lose.

So where do I stand? Am I sad he’s gone? Yes. Can I understand why he’s gone? Yes. Am I going to burn effigies of him on November the 5th? No.

Memories

If someone had said back in 2016 when Nathan arrived that he’d leave three years later, but Luton would be second in the division above, I think we’d have taken that. But what possessed him to pose for that photo? I think it has taken the shine off some memories like the 8-2 v Yeovil, the 5-0 Boxing Day win at Swindon, and the comeback at Walsall at Christmas just gone.

However, one memory I don’t think it can ever tarnish, for me personally, is interviewing the manager and his players on the pitch in the sunshine at Carlisle last April after witnessing first hand promotion being achieved. That was an ‘I was there’ moment.

So in conclusion, abiding memory? The picture that launched a thousand tweets, or Carlisle? (Deep breath)...Carlisle.

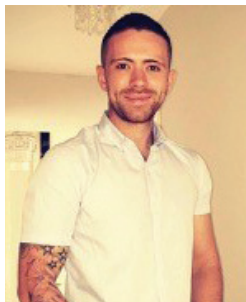

Leyton Orient 3-0 Luton Town

SEARCH FOR POINTS GOES ON FOR UNLUCKY LUTON

Luton travelled into East London for their first league game back after Christmas, and were looking to build on their 9-0 demolition of Sharnbrook in last week's outing in the Bedfordshire cup.

The Hatters knew that they needed to get off to a good start to the second half of their league campaign if they were to avoid a relegation battle, having picked up just four points from their opening ten games. This left them rooted to the bottom of the table.

Despite the gap in quality between the two teams suggested by the two sides' respective places in the league table, Town made much the better start, and undeniably dominated for the majority of the first half.

The game's first clear cut chance came after 13 minutes with Luton's number eight Aurora Ryan going close.

Cannoned

But the Hatters then suffered an injury to Olivia Abraham which appeared to knock them off their stride, and before long they were behind against the run of play.

The ball cannoned around the six-yard box before finally deflecting off the boot of Grace Stewart and nestling in the back of the net.

Luton tried desperately to overcome the blow of conceding such a scrappy goal, and a delightful move involving some impressive football from Grace Stewart and Erica Byron almost saw them draw level, but the momentum of the move was lost and only led to an optimistic long range effort from Jess McKay flying wide.

With not long to go in the first 45 minutes, Town could feel aggrieved to be behind, but things were about to get worse; Orient applied a good deal of pressure at the tail end of the first half, and some superb shot stopping from Kezia Hassall was needed to keep the deficit at just a single goal.

Squared

However, this wouldn't last, and in the stoppage time at the end of the first half, the home side doubled their lead with an excellent lobbed finish.

The Hatters were in need of a big second half performance, and they almost got off to a perfect start to the half when Erica Byron squared to Aurora Ryan who beat the keeper, but saw her shot smash against the inside of the post!

Zara Carroll then tried her luck with a speculative effort from just inside the opposing half, though the keeper was able to hold onto the strike.

Orient then secured all three points with an emphatic close range finish to make it 3-0 and essentially kill the game.

Luton did have a decent penalty shout waved away by the referee following Aurora Ryan seemingly being pulled down whilst bearing down on goal, but other than that the game slowly petered out as the visitors resigned themselves to the defeat and remain anchored to the bottom of the table.

WHO?

Chris Powell is well known in football for being one of the good guys, but he also knows how to get out of the third tier, having guided Charlton to the Championship. Whilst maintaining a fair amount of the core of the squad he inherited when he took over from Phil Brown a year ago, he has also added a few new faces. Arguably one of the best stoppers at this level in Mark Oxley with Michael Turner and Jason Demetriou in front of him forms a solid defence, whilst Michael Kightly and Sam Mantom play as part of a decent midfield – with the addition of Luke Hyam bringing real quality. Injuries have really hindered the Shrimpers in recent months though, with long term problems keeping key members of Powell's squad out.

STADIUM - ROOTS HALL

Roots Hall was used by the Shrimpers since their inception, but they had to move after the outbreak of World War One as it was used for storage. The ground then served as a quarry and then a tipping site, before Southend moved back in in 1955 and the stadium as we know it today was built. It was the newest ground in the country for more than three decades until Scunthorpe built Glanford Park in 1988. The club are in the process of moving away though, with hopes of moving into a 21,000-seater stadium at Fossetts Farm – a plan

Southend council have been reviewing for almost two years.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

We've already met twice this season – both those games were played at Kenilworth Road, with Town winning the league fixture, before losing the Checkatrade Trophy match back in December. In total we have defeated the Shrimpers 39 times, drawn 19, and lost 30.

RESULTS SO FAR

You hear about football supporters saying their side 'wins one week, loses the next', well Southend supporters can say that factually. Since the end of November, they have consistently alternated between winning and losing in each of their last nine league games. Should they carry on that sequence, they will beat Bradford on Saturday, and then lose to us.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Paul Furlong played for the Hatters in the 2007-08 season, before departing for Southend the following season. Two of our current midfielders, Alan McCormack and Glen Rea, have both played previously for Southend – Macca appearing 166 times for the Shrimpers over five years up to 2010, while Glen was there on loan during the 2015-16 season, just before he came to Kenilworth Road.

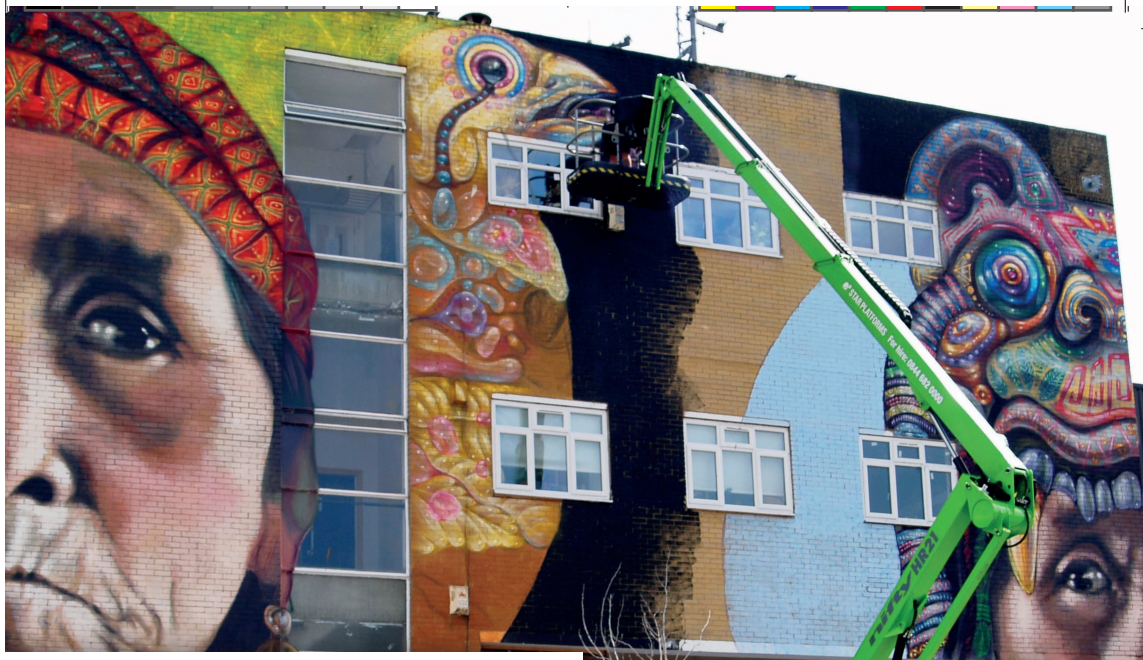

It's time again for pets corner, and introducing Nala Lee. As you can see from the photo she has Elliott well trained and he doesn't sit on the furniture.

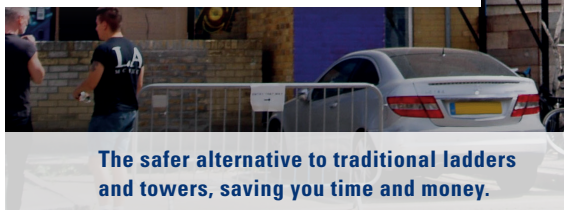
