I can't praise them enough. From the fitness and medical staff, to the lads for organising their own Cryotherapy sessions on Sunday to help their recovery. Their professionalism is what helped break another club record with a 12th successive away league game without defeat on a tough night at Valley Parade.

The weather and pitch made it difficult, but where we couldn't quite find a way past an inspired goalkeeper at Plymouth when we deserved more than a point, we managed to get the early goal through Jack Stacey and could have had several more against a team who are fighting for their lives.

We welcome Gillingham today and their manager Steve Lovell will have them similarly prepared to give us another tough encounter. I hope they have a good afternoon with us – not too good, obviously – and wish them well for the rest of the season.

Finally, James Collins will join up with the Republic of Ireland squad after today's game and I'm thrilled for him. It is reward for the graft and consistency he has shown for many years, and it's a special time for Collo and his family to see him represent his country.

We'll all be rooting for him to get that first cap. I know Mick McCarthy and Robbie Keane have been impressed with his qualities as a player, and I've told them what a terrific character he is around the place. We all wish him every success in Gibraltar and Dublin.

These are good times for everyone connected with Luton Town, not least you supporters – the best in the land. Make yourselves heard for 90 minutes today and let the lads and 2020 know exactly how much you're behind them. They all deserve it.

A warm welcome to Kenilworth Road, and now we know that we can enjoy every single second because our time here is limited!

Today we welcome Gillingham fans and directors, Steve Lovell, his staff and players. Recent form has not been consistent for the Gills with many games being settled by the odd goal. This has left them looking over their shoulder but after today with only one other fixture against a top-six side, I'm sure they will be very confident of picking up the points to ensure their place in League One next season.

At the moment, League One is amazing – just three wins and nine points separate 12th from 24th, and with ourselves to down to ninth scrapping for every single point in the promotion hunt, it shows the end of the season run-in is vital for many clubs no matter what end of the table they are at.

After the historic win against Bradford City – setting a new Club record run of 12 away games unbeaten in the Football League – adding to record breaking 24 game unbeaten run, we just know the lads will be itching to get on the pitch to play to win.

Joseph plays for

our Every Player Counts disability team so see how you can get involved too.

The players' boot auction ended this week raising funds for Kids in Action and a huge thank you to all the bidders and the successful recipients.

WOW! What a few weeks...it's hard to take it all in. As that classic Motty phrase goes in that memorable 5-1 win away in Germany, just as Owen scored his third.... *"This just keeps on getting better and better and BETTER!"*

Rollercoaster

The news is coming thick and fast! Records are being set on the pitch; we have gained planning permissions for both Power Court and Newlands Park; Collo has a call up; Hylts, Potts, Cornick, Luke, Glen et al are all making excellent comebacks from injury to show the strength of squad we have; Mick and his staff have been simply superb in their leadership; Sheez is a giant as Club captain; we have a full house every week; Luton, Luton Town, Lutonians, are united as never before; and as seen on Sky TV, with new camera technology we don't rely solely on the TV gantry anymore!

The ride has been a rollercoaster since we became custodians of the Club, and wow, looking back we made quite a few commitments back in the day:

- The first was about being, whenever and wherever possible, open, honest, and transparent;
- The second was to ensure stability and to operate 'within our means';



- The third was about reigniting and preserving our Club's great name, culture, and identity;
- The fourth was to re-establish trust and confidence with all stakeholders...supporters, staff, community, neighbours, businesses, and public servants to name a few;
- The fourth was about playing at a competitive level that we felt was part of the fabric of the Club – i.e. at least the Championship – by 2020;
- The fifth was about us playing in a new stadium, by 2020 too.

We hope you agree that we have done our best to deliver on every single one of those commitments, and whilst we would have liked to be at Power Court sooner, the fact remains, it is now a reality that we have a path ahead!

We know everyone wants to know when they can bring their spades and hard hats to start getting on with the job. Well, there are two sides to that:

Firstly, the planning process means we need to await the decision from the Secretary of State as to whether it is felt that the application should be 'called in'. This means scrutiny to see and ensure that the decision that has been taken is consistent with local and national planning guidelines.

With Power Court we heard within a week or so that it was not going to be 'called in', and as Sian Timoney has stated in the media, we hope we hear about this – more complex – proposal as quickly as possible. However, the Secretary of State has a time period within which to act so we must wait patiently whilst matters take their due course.

Once we overcome that hurdle, secondly then any objector can apply for a 'Judicial Review'. This focuses on the ensuring the correct processes were followed throughout each stage from when the applications were lodged.

Even then, as Gary has stated, there is work to be done on clearing and preparing the ground.

So, a politician's answer regarding a start date! Yes, we again ask for patience. You have been superb in showing belief and patience firstly in the Club turnaround that lasted 6-8 years, and then in the planning process which has been another 2-4 years. But now we are in the end game so what you know for sure is that it will be as soon as practicably possible and wheels have been in motion for some time.

We will keep you updated and, unlike Brexit, we have a plan so please stick with us, enjoy the Kenny whilst it lasts, the time will just fly by and, before you know it, we will be in our new home.

What a force for positive change we have all created! Word is spreading far and wide. In the dark days we garnered a lot of support and sympathy from people around the world – for some it was their first introduction to Luton Town and our history.

Today, people remember that little ol' distressed English club and they are taking a second look at what we have become. Through hard work, never-ending belief, and trust in each other, we are now being talked about by so many in the media and we have made many, many friends.

People have noticed that this is not about one star player or done by one person, or done simply with uber money...no, this is about a whole town and county, from all walks of life and backgrounds, coming together for one purpose – to save our town!

What we have done is quite simple – we have put the nation's greatest game and unifying force and placed it at the heart of the community, with the sole purpose of developing an exciting future for generations to come.



And all of this was done by the community for the community...no issues of gender, race, faith, age, nationality, money, ability, accent...a community acting as one for the good of everyone.

Wow! Our town is a pretty amazing place to be at the moment. Everyone is pushing boundaries and everyone is making Herculean efforts. Our task now is to nurture this positive energy to even greater effect.

NEWLANDS PARK APPROVED!

2020 Developments game-changing plans for Newlands Park given the go-ahead by Luton Borough Council's development control committee

In years to come, the 11th March 2019 will be remembered as one of the most important days in the entire history of Luton Town Football Club – as Luton Borough Council's development control committee determined that the plans for Newlands Park should be approved.

This momentous decision comes two and a half years after the plans were submitted and following a rigorous period of scrutiny from the Council's planning department.

We can now all look forward to a future in the state-of-the-art stadium at Power Court, a secure future will give us the best possible opportunity to compete at the highest level and a bright future for Luton, with the Club's developments at the heart of the town's regeneration.

As well as the obvious benefits to the Club, the developments will bring in the region of 10,000 jobs to Luton, and a much-needed boost to the local economy to the tune of £250m annually.

On March 1st, the planning department revealed their report, which recommended Newlands Park for approval – laying the foundations for this evening's decision. The plans, which were revealed to the public in 2016 alongside the plans for the new Hatters stadium at Power Court, consist of new offices, retail, leisure facilities, restaurants and bars as well as a 300-bed hotel.

GARY SWEET ON 'BIGGEST MOMENT' IN THE CLUB'S HISTORY!

WHAT HATTERS CEO HAD TO SAY AFTER NEWLANDS PARK PERMISSION WAS GRANTED

"It is probably the biggest moment in the history of Luton Town Football Club," Gary told BBC Look East.

"My job is to keep my feet on the ground now and wait for the secretary of state to give his approval and ensure there is no challenge thereafter.

"We've still got three or four months to go, and then I'll probably open my bottle of champagne. But I'll insist that everyone else does so now.

"The secretary of state may well have a look at it to see if there is any kind of regional impact and to see if he agrees with the decision of the council. For us, it's a local decision, so there should be no call-in.

"And then it is up to anybody if they want to challenge it through the judicial review process, which is them challenging the decision of the council. So we'll probably need about four months before we absolutely know that none of those things will happen.

"I can believe (permission was granted) because I always had faith and confidence that we'd get to this point. That's not an arrogant statement, but it's interesting that when we deal in a commercial world, we are football people, we don't lose.

"We've got a sports mentality that we take to the commercial market and so, in this case, we studied the opposition in the way that Mick Harford will be

with Bradford tomorrow night and Gillingham on Saturday.

"We knew what the arguments were going to be, and we covered all of that with the retail conditions and all of the additional effort that we put into the design.

"I think we won it two and a half years ago when we submitted the applications. It's been the same argument that we had back then. It's been the same designs that we had back then. We've used the same people all the way through.

"We haven't changed any of those consultants. It's a team, just like Mick's taking the team to Bradford, this is a team. Our team is solid, it's sound and we know what we're talking about. It was thoroughly thought through. The designs are fantastic and we are providing Luton with exactly what Luton needs, and that's why we won the case.

"One thing I thank everybody for is their patience, but I'm also going to ask for more because actually we can't really give a date. I don't necessarily want to do what Tottenham have done this year and announce a moving in date and then delay it.

"When you get a date from us, it will be a realistic one, but enjoy Kenilworth Road for the next three or four years, is all I'm going to say."

The rebirth would come in the shape of a new stadium, playing football at a level befitting of a Club with the heritage and standing of our great Club – and they have kept their word.

Tonight's future-making decision will be celebrated by Lutonians, and Luton Town supporters everywhere from Bury Park to Berlin, Marsh Farm to Melbourne and New Town to New York. Today's place in the history books is guaranteed.

But this decision is not about the Club's past. It is about the future.

Level Playing Field Weeks of Action: celebrating access and inclusion

Luton Town Football Club are pleased to support the 2019 Level Playing Field (LPF) Weeks of Action.

This annual initiative, now in its 14th year, aims to celebrate access and inclusion for disabled sports fans across England and Wales.

Disabled people constitute the largest minority group at around 15 per cent of the population and this number is increasing year on year.

Naturally, a large number of disabled people are football fans too and we are pleased to take this opportunity to thank our own disabled fans for their continued loyalty and dedication to this great club. But we also appreciate that many disabled people have yet to share the passion and pleasures of being a football fan.

The Hatters welcome disabled fans along with their families and friends, and over the past fortnight we have shared the stories of George Barnard, a supporter who attends matches home and away in his wheelchair, and Joseph, a 19-year-old who helps the club's ground staff one day a week as part of our partnership with Central Beds College, in order to help build his confidence and social skills.

We have also carried stories on the recent matchday visit of the players' charity of the season – Kids In Action – for whom the squad have held a boot and glove auction which has raised a sizeable four-figure sum, while our homegrown defender James Justin proudly volunteered to be player patron for the Luton Town Disabled Supporters' Association.

On page 58 of today's programme, you can also read about the success of the Hatters Adult PAN Disability team who had a half-time kickabout on the Kenilworth Road pitch when we hosted Rochdale recently.

WELCOME GILLINGHAM



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting staff, players and supporters of Kent based side, Gillingham.

A League One side since 2013, the Gills have generally finished mid-table and below, and with ten games to go, look as if a similar position come the end of the campaign might be on the cards.

Consecutive wins for their opening two games was the perfect start for Steve Lovell in his first full campaign as boss at Priestfield, having guided them away from danger last year. A difficult run followed though, and it would take them eight games before they would win again.

A side that are as good away from home as they are in front of their own crowd, they could still be dragged into a relegation scrap if they aren't careful. They do however face a number of teams around them including three sides in the bottom four, so should they carry on their decent run of late, they should be more than fine.

Lovell has put together a side with a decent 'never say die' attitude, with his team finding the net more regularly in the final 15 minutes of games than during any other period of matches. Fifteen goals this campaign in the latter stages have certainly helped in recent weeks, seven points were picked up in three games prior to Tuesday's game against Bristol Rovers by the Gills scoring late on.

It's difficult to talk about Gillingham's goals without mentioning Tom Eaves. Very much in the chase for the League One Golden Boot – for which there is some really strong competition at this stage – he is fighting it out with the likes of James Collins, John Marquis and Ian Henderson.

Defence is the concern for the Gills. Only Scunthorpe, Bradford and Rochdale have worse defensive records than them, with heavy defeats to the likes of Dale, Peterborough and Sunderland really hampering their goal difference.

Although they're yet to defeat a team in the top three this campaign, they very much have the capacity to upset high-flying teams, inflicting Portsmouth's first defeat of the league season back in October – that came at Fratton Park as well.

Founded in 1893, the Gills joined the EFL in 1920. After a spell out of it, they were voted back in in 1950, when the league expanded to 92 clubs from 88. A Championship club as recently as 2005, the Priestfield based outfit slipped down the pyramid and had a spell in League Two, before winning promotion as champions six years ago.

THE GAFFER

Steve Lovell | Age: 58

The Welshman signed his first ever playing contract at Crystal Palace. He played just under 100 matches at Selhurst Park before joining Millwall and then eventually Gillingham.

It was with the Gills that Lovell enjoyed his most successful spell as a player with more than 200 appearances. Although the gaffer has been a part of the coaching staff for several teams since he retired from playing, he has only ever managed Gillingham. He was in charge for a few months at the end of 2014 but was offered the role permanently a few years later in 2017 after a run of good form.



THE STOPPER

Tomas Holy

Age: 27

The Czech keeper has played every minute of every league match so far this season. Standing at 6ft 9in, Holy is a tough man to beat, keeping two of his ten clean sheets this season against promotion chasing Portsmouth.

The 27-year-old began his career at Sparta Prague in his home country and had spent his whole career in the Czech Republic until Gillingham bought him in 2017; providing competition to

Stuart Nelson at the time. The following season Holy became the Gills' number one and helped the club in steering away from the drop zone.



GOALKEEPER

TOM HADLER

Age: 22

Although Hadler is yet to make a first team appearance, the young stopper has spent a considerable amount of time on loan, most recently with Gloucester City.



DID YOU KNOW?

Ex-Trinidad and Tobago international Brent Sancho is one of 13 former Gillingham players to make an international appearance for their country whilst at the club. Sancho though holds the accolade of being the only one to play at the World Cup, representing his country in Germany in 2006. He will, however, be remembered for Peter Crouch getting a great big handful of his dreadlocks so the striker could lift himself above the defender and nod in for England's opening goal. In 2015, Sancho became Minister of Sport in Trinidad & Tobago.

THE WALL

Max Ehmer | Age: 27

Ehmer has been a Gills player since the summer of 2015 after an initial season-long loan in 2014-15 proved to be successful. The German is a product of Queens Park Rangers' academy but has played for a range of clubs in the Football League having only made one appearance for Rangers. Yeovil

Town came first, where Ehmer played more than 50 matches for the Grovers. Then brief spells with Preston North End, Stevenage and Carlisle followed until the centre half turned up at Priestfield. The defender has managed to net twice this season, including a late goal against Doncaster to ensure the points were shared.

IN THE MIDDLE

Mark Byrne | Age: 30

The experienced midfielder started his career at Nottingham Forest. After season-long loan stints with Burton Albion and Rushden & Diamonds, Byrne put pen to paper with Barnet after impressing the manager while on-loan there in 2010-11.

The Irishman clocked up more than a century of matches at the Hive across three seasons until Newport County purchased him in 2014.

A tremendous campaign in 2015-16 for County saw him scoop Player of the Season, Players' Player of the Season, Goal of the Season, Supporters Club Away Player of the Season and Supporters Club Player of the Season. Gillingham signed the talisman in 2016.



DEFENDERS

GABRIEL ZAKUANI AGE: 32

The skipper owns a host of winner's medals, having been promoted to the Premier League with Stoke City, as well as League One promotion on two occasions with Peterborough United.

LUKE O'NEILL AGE: 27

Played against the Hatters as a Mansfield player in the Blue Square Premier. Capped for the England U17 national side.

BRADLEY GARMSTON AGE: 25

The Irishman joined the Gills on a one-month loan deal from West Brom in January 2015. This deal was made permanent in the summer following his release from the Hawthorns.

BARRY FULLER AGE: 34

Back for a second time at Priestfield, Fuller won League Two promotion through the play-offs with the Gills in 2009, something he did with AFC Wimbledon seven years later.

CONNOR OGILVIE AGE: 23

The Londoner signed his first professional contract with Spurs in 2014, although he has never earned a senior appearance. Currently on his second loan spell with the Gills.

ALEX LACEY AGE: 25

Local boy Lacey began his career with the Hatters, playing a part in John Still's squad that won promotion back to the Football League in 2013/14.

AGE: 27

CLASSIC CLASH WITH THE GILLS

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

16TH OCTOBER 1999 • LUTON TOWN 3 GILLINGHAM 1

The Town had finished the 1998/99 campaign in receivership, and throughout the summer manager Lennie Lawrence was left to fend off the advances of clubs out to pick up some of his promising youngsters for a song, as well as having no money to spend.

Lawrence was eventually forced to sell central defender Chris Willmott and goalkeeper Kelvin Davis to Premiership club Wimbledon, while behind the scenes majority shareholder Cliff Bassett was involved in long discussions with ex-chairman David Kohler as he attempted to buy Kohler's shareholding.

The Football League got so fed up with the wranglings that they imposed a deadline of midnight on Friday 6th August 1999, the day before the new season started, for an agreement to be signed otherwise the Hatters would have been consigned to history.

Mercifully, documents were signed with moments to spare and the Town were therefore allowed to start the new season with a dull 0-0 draw at Notts County. The performance was immaterial – the Town were still alive although most supporters realised that it would be some time before the club could exit receivership.

Despite losing Willmott and Davis, as well as the experienced Mitchell Thomas, the Hatters started the season rather better than most people thought they would.

Seventeen-year-old Matthew Taylor, who made the jump from youth to first team football on the opening day, looked like he had been in the team for years while other starlets off the Kenilworth Road production line – Michael McIndoe, Matthew Spring, Liam George, Emmerson Boyce and Gary Doherty – all played their part.

Impressive home wins over Blackpool, Cardiff, Wrexham and Oxford were wrapped around the club's first, and so far only, win at the Madejski Stadium in Reading, where goals from George and Andrew Fotiadis sealed all three points.

The Town were then unlucky to lose in their first ever trip to the JJB Stadium at Wigan before a last minute goal, scored by Oldham at Boundary Park the following week, pushed the team down to tenth after they had hit the heady heights of second in late August.

Next up was Gillingham at home and the biggest news leading up to the clash was the announcement that the club was finally out of receivership. Bizarrely, the Gills were the first club to be on the receiving end of a defeat after the Town entered administration the previous March.

Manager Lawrence decided to stick with his youngsters after the defeat at Oldham but as he welcomed back Liam George – an Eire international Under-21 call-up in Macedonia had kept him out the previous week – he learned that he was to be without the experienced Phil Gray, sidelined with a bad back.

The Gills were on a good run of form which was to see them eventually win promotion via the play-offs at the season's end and had beaten Wrexham 5-1 at Priestfield the previous week.

All did not seem to be going well when the Gills led 1-0 at the interval courtesy of a 17th minute strike

from Junior Lewis, who played a neat one-two with Andy Thomson before drilling a low shot past Luton goalkeeper Tanny Abbey.

Whatever was said at half-time seemed to work as the Town certainly stepped up the pace after the interval, and were rewarded when a neat passing move on 52 minutes involving Paul McLaren and Ipswich loanee Neil Midgley released George, who encouraged a foul from ex-Watford midfielder, and pantomime villain, Andy Hessenthaler inside the area.

George calmly stroked home the subsequent spot-kick and from then on, there was only one team in it as Gills previously strong and resolute defence was undone by the fleet-footed Luton youngsters.

Stuart Douglas netted his first goal in 19 games when he turned in Midgley's low cross at the near post on 65 minutes, before George brought the house down with the Town's third goal nine minutes later.

THE LAST TIME GILLINGHAM CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** REPORTS ON THE GILLS' LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

3RD MARCH 2009 • LUTON TOWN 0 GILLINGHAM 0
LEAGUE TWO

Thankfully this will be the final time this season that our opponents last visited Kenilworth Road during the fateful 2008/09 season, where the Hatters were deducted 30 points and with it, a realistic chance of avoiding the drop out of the Football League.

By the time of the visit of promotion-chasing Gillingham in early March there were 14 games left to play with the Town 14 points from safety.

Not impossible odds but with opposing teams knowing that the Town needed to win, tactics were adjusted accordingly especially at Kenilworth Road. There was also added pressure, of course, on the Town players to take three points from every game.

The Hatters had gone three games unbeaten which included a home win over high-flying Shrewsbury and a victory at Port Vale, and perhaps there was a slight glimmer of hope amongst the Luton faithful should the Town win three more points against the Gills. Sadly, as so often that season, the away side set out to frustrate the Town and on a miserable, wet

evening, Gillingham were happy to contain the Luton attack and perhaps pinch a goal on the break.

The Town showed attacking intent, but the closest they came to a goal was a shot from Tom Craddock just before the interval that cannoned off a post. Sam Parkin, back in the side after illness and looking to replicate his performance at Priestfield earlier in the season when his goal won all three points, was a thorn in the Gillingham defence, but wasteful shooting by him and Craddock meant that the Gills achieved their goal of a point.

It could have been worse on a frustrating evening as, deep in stoppage time, Dean Brill had to save sharply as Gills' Adam Miller was left free in a rare breakaway.






► August 1969


▲ March 1999

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES FOUR NOTABLE POST-WAR GILLINGHAM GOALSCORING PARTNERSHIPS

BRIAN GIBBS & BRIAN YEO

Inside-forward Brian Gibbs was leading goalscorer in Gillingham's 1963-64 Fourth Division title triumph. A former Portsmouth junior, he had a spell with Gosport Borough before joining Bournemouth in October 1957, featuring in their 1961-62 promotion near-miss.

He reunited with Freddie Cox at Gillingham in October 1964 and was top scorer in five successive seasons, netting 101 goals in 259 League games prior to joining Colchester United in September 1968. Appearing in their 1970-71 FA Cup run, he was Bletchley's player-boss and spent 23 years in meat industry management. He died in Silverstone in January 2014.

Long-serving striker Brian Yeo holds Gillingham's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional for Portsmouth in May 1961, he moved to Priestfield Stadium in July 1963 and scored on his League debut in Gillingham's 2-0 win at home to Torquay United three months later. He helped Gills to win the Fourth Division title in 1963-64 and was the Football League's leading marksman with 31 goals when they won promotion in 1973-74. Netting 136 times in 355 League outings for Gillingham, he retired in May 1975 to run a newsagents in Gillingham and later had spells as manager of Folkestone and Canterbury City.


KEN PRICE & DANNY WESTWOOD

Bustling striker Ken Price topped Gillingham's goalscoring charts on four occasions. Initially with Highgate United, he helped win the FA Sunday Cup in 1973 and was a prolific scorer for Dudley Town before joining Southend United in May 1976. He moved to Gillingham seven months later and became the perfect foil for Damien Richardson's guile and Danny Westwood's pace.

Starring in consecutive promotion near-misses, he netted 78 goals in 255 League outings prior to joining Reading in January 1983. He helped win promotion in 1983-84 but suffered a recurring knee injury and finished his career with Basingstoke.

Fast striker Danny Westwood was leading marksman in Gillingham's 1978-79 promotion near-miss. A former Fulham junior, he was a prolific scorer with Billericay Town before joining QPR in July 1974 and scored on his First Division debut in their 4-2 win at home to Leicester City five months later. He moved to Gillingham for a then club record £17,500 in November 1975 and was noted for his expertise at lobbing goalkeepers.

Scoring 74 goals in 211 League games while at Priestfield Stadium, he joined Barnet in December 1981 and later appeared for Billericay again, Grays Athletic, Canterbury City and Aveley.


STEVE LOVELL & DAVID CROWN

Welsh international striker Steve Lovell was Gillingham's top scorer in four successive seasons. Initially with Crystal Palace, he reunited with George Graham at Millwall in March 1983 and was leading marksman in their 1984-85 promotion success. He joined Gillingham in February 1987 and equalled the club record of scoring in seven consecutive League games in 1990.

Netting 94 goals in 233 League outings for Gills, he joined AFC Bournemouth in November 1992, then assisted various Kent non-League clubs including Sittingbourne and Deal Town. He has been Gillingham's community officer, coach and manager.

Striker David Crown was Gillingham's top scorer in 1991-92. He played for Grays Athletic, Walthamstow and Brentford prior to joining Portsmouth in October 1981 and featured in their 1982-83 Third Division title campaign. Moving to Reading in August 1983, he was a promotion winner in 1983-84 and joined Cambridge United in July 1985.

He moved to Southend United in November 1987 and was top scorer three times, starring in their 1989-90 promotion success before joining Gillingham in June 1990. Scoring 38 goals in 86 League games, he then played for Dagenham & Redbridge and Purfleet. He is now an accountant.



Carl Asaba

CARL ASABA & ROBERT TAYLOR

Striker Carl Asaba was top scorer as Gillingham reached the Second Division play-off final in 1998-99. Initially with Dulwich Hamlet, he joined Brentford in August 1994 and starred as they reached the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. He moved to Reading for £800,000 in August 1997, then Gillingham for a club record £590,000 in August 1998. Overcoming injury to help clinch promotion via the play-offs in 1999-2000, he netted 36 goals in 77 League games before joining Sheffield United for £92,500 in March 2001.

Later with Stoke City and Millwall, he has since worked for DuoCalls communications in Sheffield.

Striker Robert Taylor scored for Gillingham in the 1998-99 Second Division play-off final. Initially with Norwich City, he moved via Birmingham City to Leyton Orient in October 1991 and was leading marksman in 1992-93.

He joined Brentford in March 1994 and was top scorer in 1997-98, moving to Gillingham in August 1998. Netting 31 goals in 58 League games, including five at Burnley in February 1999, he joined Manchester City for £1.5m in November 1999 and helped to clinch promotion to the Premier League that season. He then played for QPR, Gillingham on loan, Grimsby and Scunthorpe United.



STORY OF THE MATCH

"They pressed us really, really high, put us under pressure. They played quite a high line




STORY OF THE MATCH




Macey would then make two inspired saves – somehow tipping a James Collins header onto the crossbar, before he then got the slightest touch on Lee's low effort to send it around the post.





SHIN THE MOOD FOR MORE!

Andrew wants the record-breaking unbeaten run to run and run...

Andrew Shinnie is hoping that the Hatters can push on and remain unbeaten for the rest of the campaign after claiming another important point against Plymouth last Saturday, a result that stretched the Town's record-breaking run to half a season.

The Scot has been in tremendous form this term and cemented his place as a key player in Mick Harford's starting XI, helping propel the team to the top of the table in January – a position they haven't relinquished since.

Speaking after Saturday's match at Home Park, Shinnie said: "It feels great (to remain unbeaten for half a season). Mick said we've equalled the club record for the number of away matches unbeaten, so that's another thing to be proud of.

"It's great to be that hard to beat. It's great to be a part of a team that's hard to play against because that's what we work hard on, on the training field. Our shape, the way we play, the way we press. It's great to be involved in a run like this and hopefully we'll be remembered in years to come.

"We don't want it to come to an end. We don't want to get beaten this season, that's what we're aiming for. Obviously, it's going to be a difficult run-in, it's a hard time in the season. Plymouth are fighting for their lives to get away from the relegation zone and teams will make it difficult.

"We want to make it as hard for them as well, but we feel we give everyone a hard game. We want to keep this run going until the end of the season."

The midfielder was also extremely pleased for James Collins on his recent call-up to the Republic of Ireland national team. Shinnie has experienced this feeling on one occasion when he was named in the Scotland squad in 2012.



With some great performances recently and his brother already among the ranks, the ex-Birmingham player remains well-grounded with his expectations of a recall, although a second chance on the international stage would be a brilliant opportunity.

Shinnie added: "I'm happy for Collo, he deserves it so much. I'm buzzing for him, he's a hard worker and a great player. Credit to him, he'll go away and enjoy that and hopefully he gets in the final squad and gets on the pitch.

"I'd always hope for that (a Scotland recall) if it came available, or if the club keep progressing and I go with them as well, then I could maybe force my way in.

"But as of now, I'm just concentrating on Luton. It's not on my mind. They're doing well, they've got a good squad, my brother's getting in, so I'm happy with that."

It was a frustrating afternoon on the pitch as the Town dominated the match from start to finish, but former Town loanee Matt Macey turned into a brick wall and nothing would go past him. We played some really good football throughout the match, and after a quiet first half in terms of chances we came alive in the second period.

Macey made numerous good saves from Elliot Lee in particular, and pushed a James Collins header onto the crossbar, but try as we might the ball just wouldn't go into the back of the net and we were forced to make do with a 0-0 draw which maintained the gap on third place.





because in all fairness and no disrespect, the game should have been out of sight.


"The way we played, the way we moved the ball, we got in advanced positions. We got bodies in the box. I am not sure how many attempts we had on target in the first half, but it was total domination."

Hatters centre-half Sonny Bradley praised the Town's ability to win in all conditions after he captained the side to a 1-0 win at Bradford on a difficult pitch in atrocious weather.

Storm Gareth very much took a hold of Valley Parade on Tuesday, but Town were still able to work the ball around with their usual tempo, although were at times tested by the Bantams.

Bradley helped the Town keep another clean sheet – the Hatters' 18th of the league season so far and their third in a row, having kept out both Rochdale and Plymouth.

Sonny revealed that the bar was set just as high as usual by Mick Harford for how he wanted the Hatters to play, given the fact they have been able to play some excellent football in worse conditions.

Bradley said: "The play was exceptional in the first half. I am not involved in it a lot of the time – it's happening in front of me! It's a pleasure to watch.

Clinical

"Mick before the game said 'look, some of the best football we have played this season was against Portsmouth at home in the worst conditions we have played in all season, so we're not going to use that as an excuse to change our style'.

"The goal was a great bit of play, a couple of switches, Shins played a one-two with Elliot and puts Stacey in and in that position as a full-back, Stace is clinical. He's put it away and we won 1-0, it's the perfect result."

At the full-time whistle it was clear how much the entire squad and staff enjoyed the victory, as they ran over to the away supporters to celebrate in front of them.

"I think all season it has been a team effort, a squad effort and that's a key factor as to why we have had success. All season we haven't had a bad player, a bad egg at the club. And that's important. It means we can protect our environment and that has helped us achieve success so far this season."

Full-back buries Bantams with his third goal of the season

Town defender Jack Stacey hailed the 1-0 win over Bradford City as a huge victory as the Hatters look to close in on automatic promotion to the Championship.

The former Reading man grabbed his third goal of the campaign when he was picked out exquisitely by Andrew Shinnie and the full back made no mistake as he fired across goal into the bottom left corner – the victory breaking the Town's record of unbeaten away games, which now stands at 12.

With the rain pouring and the wind howling, the Hatters played some excellent stuff in really testing conditions and Jack felt that getting the result was a massive credit to the Town team.

He said: "We said it before the game – this is where championships are won, away at Bradford in these conditions. It's a massive three points. We obviously knew that Barnsley and Sunderland were playing each other and at least one of them were going to gain points there, so 1-0 is the perfect away result.

"We knew there was a lot of space out wide for me and JJ when teams match us up with the diamond, so we tried to switch it as much as we could. We were quite good at that in the first half. Shins, he always seems to find me. When he's on the ball you know you can make the run and the ball will find you. He's been amazing this season.

"Sonny and Matty will say the most important thing is to keep clean sheets. Me and JJ we get forward, but we have to do our bit defensively as well. To have as many clean sheets as we do now, that's the sort of rock that a team that has hopes of winning championships is built on."


Just over 1,000 supporters made the journey to Valley Parade, just three days after 1,200 had

Narrow defeat leaves Town disappointed, but not disheartened

After picking up their first three points of the New Year last weekend away at AFC Wimbledon, the Hatters were aiming to further their hopes of escaping the drop zone against a Stevenage side just two places above them.

It was a cagey opening 15 minutes, with both sides knocking it around nicely, but neither creating any clear-cut chances. It wasn't until just before the 20-minute mark that Luton had the opportunity to break the deadlock: skipper Zara Carroll tried her luck from distance, and the Stevenage stopper parried the ball into the path of Amy Summerfield, who hooked the ball over the bar with the goal at her mercy.

The game continued in a tight fashion for the remainder of the half, with Jess McKay the primary source of Luton's pressure. The only other proper chance of the half once again fell to Amy Summerfield after Erica Byron's cross was nicely knocked down by Remi Bains, and Summerfield's well-hit strike required an impressive block to keep the game goalless.

The second half was a very hotly contested, open affair. Aurora Ryan built on a good first half performance by running rings around the visitors' defence and coming inches away from giving Town the lead, with her shot trickling just wide within two minutes of the restart.

Some excellent defending from Millie Guest then allowed McKay to burst down the wing and skin the Stevenage full-back, before her cross was put behind for a corner, from which a scramble in the six-yard box saw the ball rebound off the post!

Tackles were flying in, though Zara Carroll and Lisa Nixon controlled the midfield effectively, with some tough tackling and a tenacious attitude. Rachel Kosky was also having a great game, and between them the Luton back line were depriving Stevenage of any real chances.

The Hatters were attacking well too, with Ryan and McKay forcing the keeper to make some good saves, and Carroll coming incredibly close with a free-kick that came back off the bar with the keeper rooted to the spot.

The final quarter of the game was end-to-end, and Hassall was called into action on a few occasions to keep her clean sheet intact. However, with 15 minutes left on the clock, the away side scored against the run of play with a header from a corner, a soft goal to concede in the context of a good overall performance from the home side.

Luton did, of course, press for a late equaliser, but unfortunately no one was able to convert any of several decent deliveries into the box, so Stevenage came out on top.






WHO?

A side fancied to finish quite a way down the pile, Doncaster have been superb this campaign. Grant McCann came in over the summer having lost his job at Peterborough earlier on in 2018 and has kept the qualities he inherited and mixed in his own vision of how to play. John Marquis is still scoring goals and James Coppinger, as he has for almost 15 years now, is running the Donny midfield. Strong home form and decent second half performances in games have helped maintain their push for a play-off place – they will pose a real threat to the Hatters next weekend without doubt.

STADIUM - KEEPMOAT STADIUM

Opened in 2007, the Keepmoat replaced Donny's then home Belle Vue, and has a capacity of just over 15,000. A capacity crowd squeezed in for Donny's game against Leeds United in April 2008 which they lost 1-0 – but they would go onto beat later on that year in the League One play-off final.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Hatters were defeated at the Keepmoat earlier on this season, with Matty Blair opening the scoring before Elliot Lee equalised. Ben Whiteman netted

immediately after the restart though to secure a 2-1 win for McCann's side. That was the 25th match between the sides, with Town winning on 11 occasions, drawing six and losing eight.

RESULTS SO FAR

Donny have come off the boil in recent weeks and as a result the teams below them have started chasing their spot in the play-off places. Without a win in five and with just two in their last ten, it's not the most ideal time for Grant McCann's side to be taking their foot off the gas. They drew 1-1 with Blackpool on Tuesday night, having lost 2-0 at Wimbledon last Saturday.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Kerry Dixon made appearances for both sides in the 90s, playing 88 times for the Hatters, scoring 20 goals. Winger Michael McIndoe represented the club between 1998-2000, making 49 appearances in total for the Town before going onto have three very successful seasons with Doncaster. Former Hatters striker and manager Mike Newell (pictured above with Mick Hartford) also had a spell at Belle Vue around the turn of the century.




