

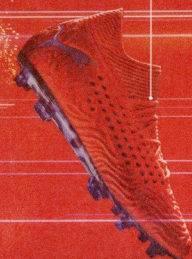

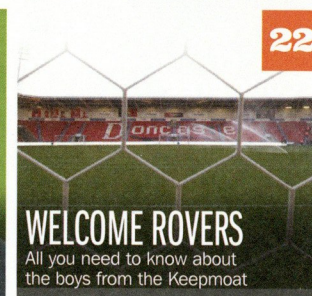

The players have all had to be training to the highest levels to be ready to take that chance, and they know they will all have a part to play in the coming weeks.

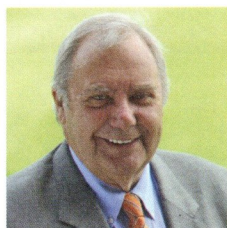

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone.

A warm welcome to you all and especially our visitors from Doncaster Rovers. It was a close fought encounter at the Keepmoat in September, which Donny won 2-1.

We enjoyed a lot of the play and created many chances, but a deflected goal proved to be the decider after Elliot Lee had equalised with a close-range header. Donny have plenty to play for as they are currently in sixth place at the bottom end of the play-off zone with a game in hand. We look forward to an exciting game in front of another capacity crowd in the Kenny.

It has been an active few weeks both on and off the field. I must add my congratulations to Gary, Mike, Shaun and the team for their tremendous performance at the Planning Committee hearing, which culminated in permission being granted for our game changing plans at Newlands Park, and to our playing squad for bringing back four points from the recent punishing away schedule. So much in our club goes on behind the scenes that it is easy to underestimate and undervalue the work that is involved in creating what we all see – the end result.

We on the Board see some of it, maybe enough to fire our imaginations, but even that is just the tip of the iceberg. We hear reactions to the granting of planning permission on an evening in March, which was the result of years of thinking, talking, planning, learning, consulting, managing, battling, selling, promoting, financing, buying, employing, testing, analysing, defending, wishing, hoping, doubting, fearing and eventually cheering – but they can never do justice to what has gone before and we are still only just at the end of the beginning.

We reiterate that even though this is a fantastic result, there is much more to do before we can put a spade in the ground to start the stadium.

While we are on the subject of hard work, we are so proud that Collo has made the Ireland squad. It is so well deserved for his effort and determination and we are keeping our fingers crossed that he plays tonight against Gibraltar.

And then there's Pelly, what a character! Doesn't score many, but is up for 2018 goal of the season. What a cracker it was against Crewe last season! If you agree, voting closes at midnight tomorrow. He deserves it.

Tuesday was EFL Day of Action and our part in it was to hold a competition at Ely Way for our Every Player Counts Disability team. Mick, Sonny Bradley and James Shea joined in and were there to present prizes to the winners. It was a fantastic few hours and showed how football can help to bring people with all kinds of disabilities together in the fresh air, on grass to have fun and socialise. For me it was incredibly moving to see so much joy from all those involved. (For those who can, there is a great short clip on the club website, YouTube and social media channels showing some of the action)

It's probably not possible for our younger fans to realise how only a few decades ago disabilities, learning or physical, were a barrier to participating in what is now justifiably tagged the beautiful game. Many of you may have watched Harry Redknapp's Full English on TV this week and seen the forlorn distress of Paul Merson when talking of his gambling addiction.



We know that this has blighted a significant number of players over the years, and it is so encouraging that Paul and others now feel able to speak out without fear of stigma or judgement.

The players' boot and glove auction for Kids in Action raised almost £2,500, including an amazing £148 for Matty's magic hat, an old straw boater that had been lying around the media and marketing team's office for years until Matty signed it.

All these show the good that football can do towards social advancement.

"Disability is the inability to see ability" Vikas Khanna.

Finally, the tenth anniversary of our JPT win against Scunthorpe is only a week away. It has special significance for us in 2020 and, of course, Mick. There were so many reasons for making it so. It was the end of our first season as custodians of the club, which had been at the wrong end of so much adversity and injustice and was going to find itself out of the Football League. No club before or since had suffered such a punishment, but we are made of sterner stuff and 42,000 bought tickets to the Final at Wembley. At the time it was a record attendance from a single club and reminded us of our future potential.

Mick was our manager and despite a superhuman effort we had failed to make up the 30 points deducted by the FA and Football League, but we won with a squad built from scratch at the start of the season. A win, which at least temporarily lifted the gloom surrounding the club. It was an important part of our journey; a day we'll never forget and I for one am looking forward to reliving the occasion at the beginning of April.

Enjoy the game.

PELLY UP FOR GOAL OF 2018!

Hatters midfielder Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu's strike against Crewe last season - which won him the Sky Bet League Two Goal of the Month award for April - has been shortlisted for Goal of 2018 at the upcoming EFL Awards.

Last season the award was brought back to Kenilworth Road by Olly Lee for his stunning 70-yard 'Goal from another post code' against Cambridge in November 2017.

This time around it's Pelly's turn as he approaches his double century of appearances in a Town shirt, with today set to be his 199th.

It was the absolute rocket he struck late on in our 3-1 win over Crewe on April 14th last year - in his 151st game for the club - that has seen him shortlisted for this award.

The Luton Town Community Trust hosted a fantastic tournament for the Every Player Counts Adult PAN Disability team at Ely Way on Tuesday afternoon as part of the EFL's Day of Action, with Mick Harford, Sonny Bradley and James Shea getting involved.

Around 40 members of the Hatters team took part, all of different ages and backgrounds, showcasing their skills – with Bradley and Shea getting in on the action as they joined in the games.

After setting up Nicky Toone to score the tournament's winning goal, James said: "I really enjoy it. Me and Sonny have come down here and played a bit of football and you can see the smiles on everyone's faces.

"We have Nicky down at the training ground every Thursday and he was a part of the tournament today. He's a great lad Nicky – he's brilliant to be around. You can see what it meant to him when he scored the goal!

"It's just great to come down and put some smiles on faces. It's hard not to feel a part of the community and the town as a player when we're representing the club at events like this.

Inspiring

"You see what's going on both on and off the pitch, what the club is doing for the whole town. It's unbelievable, it's just moving everything forward. Everyone wants to be a part of it."

Mick also enjoyed the afternoon, sharing some inspiring words and taking questions from several of the players who all had an opinion on his substitutions in matches, player recruitment and – in hat-trick scorer Damian's case – his eyesight!



After claiming his glasses back from the disability team's talisman, Mick said: "Damian's scored three and he's a top man. I'm honoured to be here.

"It's inspirational to see the guys out there running around. They don't get a lot of time outdoors and they come here and they do inspire me and everyone else in the town. It's a real special day.

"I know they train on a weekly basis, but this is the annual EFL Day of Action to showcase what the Community Trust do, and it's great to see them having a good time. I'm honoured to be in attendance.

"Nicky is part of our squad. We are thinking about giving him a number! He comes down every Thursday, has breakfast with us. He comes out and collects the balls.

"Kevin Dearden looks after him and his father Terry picks him up after he's had his lunch, so Nicky is part of our squad and to be fair, one of the other lads over there has just pulled me aside and said 'You should have made the substitution a bit earlier on Saturday!'

"I asked him where he sat and he said he sits in the Enclosure, so I think he's one of the rowdy ones – but I reckon he's probably right actually, so fair play to him!"

The Hatters legend spent well over an hour joining in with the lads, and he added: "Luton Town Football Club is in the heart of the community. The people who organise and run these events for the Community Trust need a pat on the back and we will carry on doing this. Just bringing the lads here to the old training ground and seeing them play, it's absolutely inspirational."

DONCASTER ROVERS



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting staff, players and supporters from Yorkshire based outfit, Doncaster Rovers.

A side who have been through the mire and recovered – much like the Hatters – Donny suffered under what we will call an 'interesting' ownership, falling into the Conference. They spent five years in Non-League before achieving successive promotions, finding themselves in League One in 2004.

Spells in the Championship before falling back down the pyramid to League Two followed, securing third tier status once again in 2017.

John Marquis' goals were huge in that success and are once again vital in Donny's push for a play-off spot this campaign. Their form since the turn of the year hasn't been ideal though, and their once comfortable spot in the top six is coming under threat.

Just three league wins since New Year's Day and with no victory in their last six, Grant McCann's side need to reverse this slide or a punt at Championship football might not be on the cards come May.

Their first half of the season was hugely impressive and came as a little bit of a surprise to some

pundits – some believing that Doncaster would struggle to beat the drop. 'Grant McCann isn't known for defensively sound teams' and 'over-reliant on James Coppinger and Marquis' will have no doubt been words that fired them into life, and we can say with confidence that we can't see Doncaster slipping back into League Two anytime soon.

As it stands, five of the teams that Doncaster face between now and the end of the campaign are in the bottom half of the division, so with the relegation battle maybe threatening more teams than it has ever done at this stage of the campaign than before, Donny are in for a fight to maintain their place in the play-offs. So should they finish there, it will be more than deserved.

Doncaster have tended to do better at the Keepmoat Stadium than on the road, but have still got a decent return from their travels, picking up 23 points from 19 games. It's the amount of goals they get that have been getting them over the line – 61 goals in 37 games means they have the fifth best offensive record in the league.

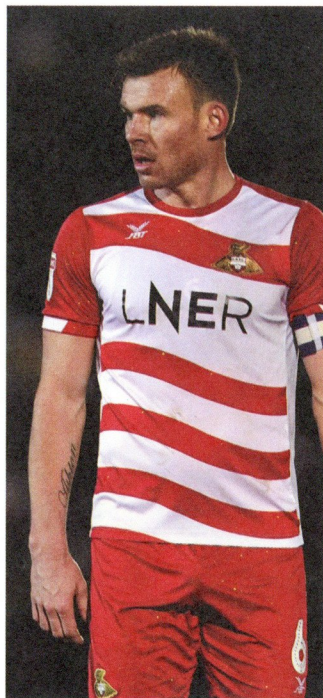
DID YOU KNOW?

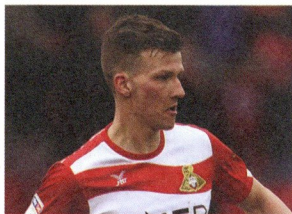
THE WALL**Andy Butler**
Age: 35

Born in Doncaster, it wasn't until much later in his career that the defender earned a move to his home-town club, signing for Rovers in 2014. Butler enjoyed his most successful run at Scunthorpe United, helping the club climb from League

The 35-year-old has spent time with Huddersfield Town, Blackpool and Sheffield United before his move to Doncaster was made permanent after a solid loan spell. The centre-half was a vital part of the Rovers team to win promotion from League Two in 2016-17, playing 46 matches in total.

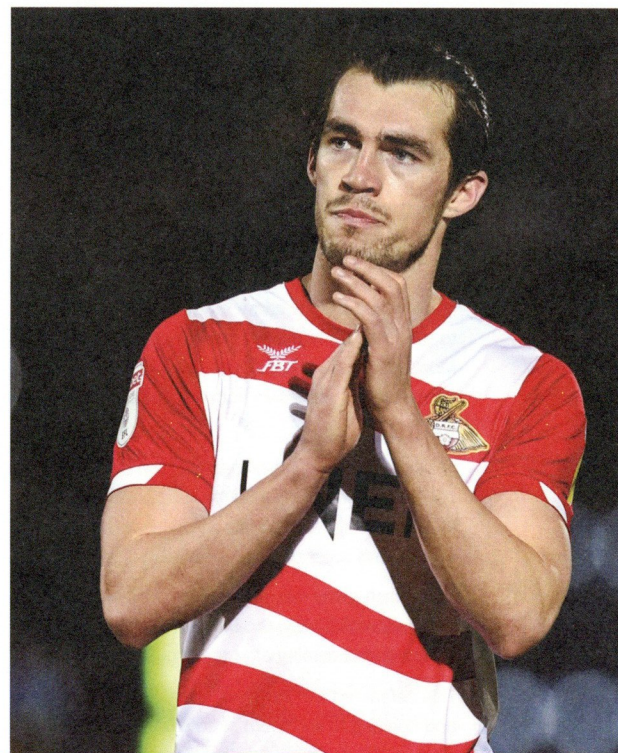

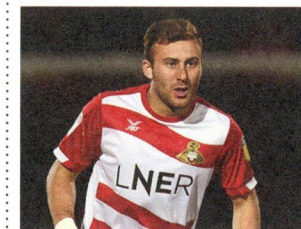

CLASSIC CLASH WITH DONNY

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

APRIL 30TH 1955 • DONCASTER ROVERS 0 LUTON TOWN 3

The Town opened the new 1954/55 season adopting a 'continental' style of strip (round neck collar and tight fitting) not previously seen worn by a British club, and also pinching an idea used successfully by the Hungarians - that of using a deep lying centre-forward.

With the now fit-again Jesse Pye filling the role, the Hatters, after another stuttering start, won six games in a row and promotion talk soon filled the pubs and clubs of the town. But the first bombshell of the new season was about to be dropped when Pye asked for a transfer and moved to Derby in early October 1954

With no ready-made replacement, a variety of permutations were used including Terry Kelly and Peter MacEwan, but after what was to be the only home defeat of the season, against Swansea on 30th October, the drastic decision was taken to switch wing-half Bob Morton to centre-forward.

Morton – relishing his new position – scored twice in his first game in the new role in a 3-3 draw at Notts County and the team began to fire on all cylinders again with ace goalscorer Gordon Turner now given more freedom.

The Town embarked on a spell of ten games undefeated which saw them take over top spot and earn rave reviews with their wins at Nottingham Forest (5-1), Hull (4-0) and Rotherham in the FA Cup (5-1).

The scintillating form could not be maintained and the Town became part of a group of clubs tightly packed at the top of the table, and as the season neared its end it could be seen that the Hatters had to face and overcome several of their chief rivals if promotion was to be won.

Easter came, as did a crowd of 25,775 to Kenilworth Road on Good Friday, who witnessed a disappointing 0-0 draw with Leeds. Undeterred, a best-of-the season 27,148 turned up the following day to see West Ham beaten 2-0.

It was following this game that the season started to turn sour, as in the return with Leeds on Easter Monday, the Town were thrashed 4-0 with big John Charles hammering two from the penalty spot.

The Hatters were now in the middle of an epidemic of penalty kicks awarded against them, but in the next game Blackburn's Bobby Langton shot wide as Luton luckily hung on to a point in a 0-0 draw at Ewood Park.

The crunch game followed at Birmingham where a crowd of 34,612 saw the Blues win 2-1 with the clinching goal coming after a dubious penalty award.

This defeat left the Town with three games to play and needing to win them all to stand a realistic chance of promotion. At a round table conference, the players agreed that experience was needed for the run-in with the result that Charlie Watkins, who was due to emigrate to South Africa at the season's end, was recalled to form a left wing partnership with Jim Pemberton, who had been moved from the half-back line leaving the way clear for Morton to return to probably his best position.

These unorthodox moves had 'gamble' written all over them, but they paid off as Port Vale were

hammered 4-2 at Kenilworth Road followed by Bristol Rovers, beaten 2-0 in a clash that saw Watkins score both in a fairytale end to his last Luton home game.

The final game of the campaign was a trip to Doncaster where two special trains were chartered and amongst the supporters was our esteemed Honorary Vice-President John Buttle who, along with everyone else, knew that only a victory would do.

As it turned out the Town enjoyed a surprisingly comfortable victory with Peter MacEwan heading home from a Seamus Dunne cross in the first minute to settle the nerves and firing in a second 14 minutes later.

By the half-hour mark Pemberton had added a third and although Rovers attacked constantly in the second period, the Town held out with little trouble and at the final whistle needed to wait patiently for results elsewhere.

Rotherham were the main danger, winning seven in a row in a late bid, and if they had won at Port Vale on the day the Hatters were at Belle Vue, they would (should the Town also win) be virtually guaranteed promotion being level on points with a game to play.

With the Millers losing 1-0 at Vale Park they were awarded a penalty which was saved by Vale's Ray

King, later to become a Hatters coach. The Town had to wait ten agonising minutes to find out if they were up on goal average, as Rotherham would have now needed to win their final game by a cricket score

This turn of events actually put the Town in top spot, but they were pipped for the championship, again on goal average, by Birmingham who won their final game the following week. This, incidentally, was the only time the Blues had led the table all season.

The Town were now in the top flight for the first time in their history. An exciting but, at the same time, frightening prospect.

THE LAST TIME DONCASTER CAME TO TOWN

CLUB HISTORIAN **ROGER WASH** REPORTS ON **DONNY'S** LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

24TH SEPTEMBER 2016 • LUTON TOWN 3 DONCASTER 1
LEAGUE TWO

After the Town won 3-0 at Home Park on the opening day of the 2016/17 campaign, it looked like we could be in for a good season but inconsistent form, where it proved to be difficult to put an unbeaten run together, meant that we were always playing catch-up for one of the automatic promotion places.

The Hatters had dropped to seventh spot following a 2-0 defeat at Crawley, which was not the best preparation for the visit of second-placed Doncaster, who were pushing for an immediate return to League One.

In truth, Doncaster were all over the Hatters for the opening 20 minutes, missing several opportunities to put the game to bed before James Coppinger netted on 21 minutes. Luton skipper Scott Cuthbert injured his neck while trying to prevent the goal, and the subsequent seven-minute stoppage seemed to upset Rovers' rhythm and galvanise the Town in equal measure, leading to a far better Hatters performance for the rest of the game.

Cameron McGeehan levelled the score on 36 minutes when he took advantage of a low driven cross from Olly Lee, and five minutes later Jack Marriott latched on to a clever Danny Hylton back-heel before smashing the ball home.

The game was made safe with ten minutes to go when Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu was tripped in the area by Donny's Joe Wright, leaving McGeehan to confidently net the subsequent penalty.

The final action of the game saw Hylton dismissed for dissent (throwing a litter picker off the pitch) after being refused a free-kick when he was bundled over the advertising hoardings.

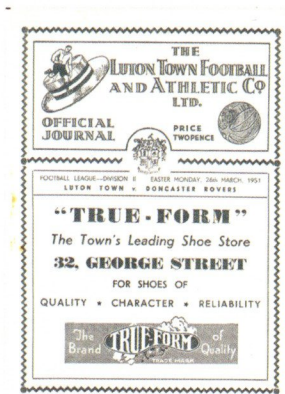
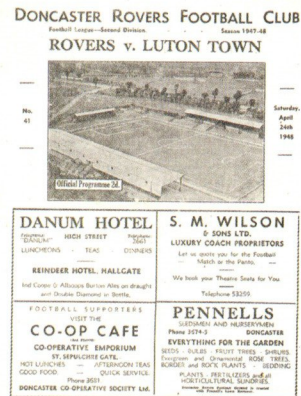

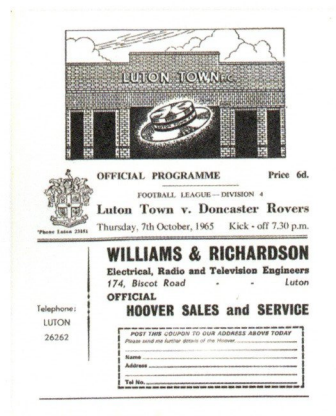

In the return at Belle Vue the home side are already relegated and two goals from Bobby Brennan seal a 2-0 win.



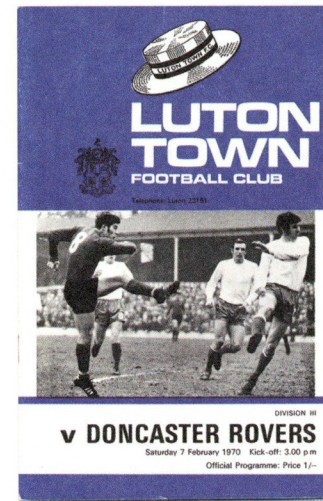
March 1951

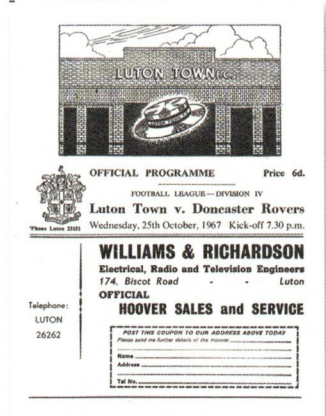
October 1965

THE ROAD TO WEMBLEY 2009 PART THREE

IN THIS OCCASIONAL SERIES, CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH RECOUNTS THE HATTERS' JOHNSTONE'S PAINT TROPHY CUP RUN

On April 5th it will be ten years since the Town team stepped out at Wembley in front of 42,000 Hatters ready to lift the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. In the final part of this series we will travel back on the road to Wembley culminating in a great victory in a season of gloom.

The competition had not been received with rapturous delight by Town supporters, even though a first round bye was granted, as we had more important things to think about, namely the preservation of our Football League status.

Brentford were seen off in round two at Kenilworth Road in a game that went to a penalty shoot-out after finishing 2-2. On-loan goalkeeper Conrad Logan pulled off two saves to leave Rossi Jarvis to secure the winning strike.

League One Walsall were our area quarter-final opponents at the Bescot Stadium, where Jarvis netted the only goal of the game late on to set up an area semi-final at home to Colchester, also of League One.

In truth, we should have gone out of the competition that evening as Colchester missed many opportunities as the Town rode their luck. A solitary deflected goal by Claude Gnaka settled

the tie and suddenly the competition became interesting as only a two legged area final against Brighton stood between the Hatters and Wembley.

A dour 0-0 draw at Withdean was followed by a tight 1-1 scoreline at Kenilworth Road, leading to another penalty shoot-out. This time a different loanee goalkeeper, Lewis Price, was the hero saving twice to send the Town through to a Wembley clash with Scunthorpe, who were chasing an ultimately successful promotion from League One.

Off the pitch the club's new owners, 2020, were overwhelmed but not surprised by the supporters resolving to make sure that the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final would be a show of unity and defiance.

The initial allocation of tickets was quickly sold out amid tales of supporters queuing from 2.30 in the morning and an unprecedented 6,500 being shifted in one day. Fresh allocations were requested and supplied, and by the time of the game an amazing



42,000 tickets had been sold, which could have been even more, had an ill thought-out segregation policy not been in place at Wembley stadium.

The record '30 miles to Wembley' was produced, the players were 'suited and booted' and boaters, scarves and replica shirts were purchased in record numbers as the supporters made their intentions known that this would be a day to remember in front of the TV cameras.

The Hatters were as good as relegated by this time, so the final was seen as a welcome relief from the problems in the League and would be a final 'hurrah' for at least a season.

Scunthorpe were obvious favourites and bossed the opening 20 minutes, taking the lead during that period when the clever front duo of Paul Hayes and Gary Hooper combined to good effect, leaving the latter to slot the ball home.

An acrobatic header off the line by skipper Kevin Nicholls from a piledriver by Scunthorpe's Henri Lansbury was pivotal as slowly the Town fought back, and the game developed into an end-to-end thriller with several close shaves in both goalmouths.

We did eventually level the tie on 32 minutes when Tom Craddock cleverly set up Chris Martin to roll the ball into the net.

The Hatters then had a lucky let-off when Craddock raised an arm to Scunthorpe's Cliff Byrne.

The Iron captain theatrically collapsed, but fortunately none of the officials saw the incident.

Rather than going straight to a penalty shoot-out again, the final catered for extra-time and when substitute Gnaka failed to score two minutes in after being put through by Nicholls, we all thought that the miss could come back and bite us.

Three minutes later though, Gnaka was put through again and this time he made no mistake, cleverly lobbing the onrushing goalkeeper.

We managed to hold on to the lead until the end this time though to cue mass celebrations in the midst of a season of gloom.

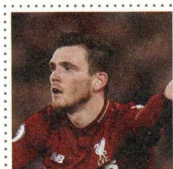
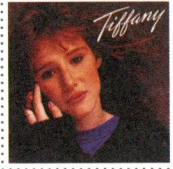

We asked for your questions on our social media channels to put to midfielder George Moncur - our January signing from Barnsley - ahead of today's clash with Doncaster. Here the 25-year-old is the latest Hatter to be put On The Centre Spot!



@lukehobson2005 What made you want to join Luton?

It was an easy decision as soon as I knew Luton were interested, and it didn't matter to me that the manager had just left. I knew a lot about the club because of so many of my mates being here - obviously Elliot, being my best mate for so long, but the other lads I knew from West Ham when we were younger like Pottsy, Pelly and Stechy, and Matty from Barnsley - it all made it so appealing to come here. Even lads at Barnsley, like Cam, only had good things to say about where this club were heading and the way they do things. You only have to look at the training ground and the new stadium plans for that, and having been here and heard the crowd and seen how the team play, I knew it was the right place for me to come and play my football. I also wanted to get back down south, especially with my wife due to give birth to our first baby any day now. Both our families are in Essex so it was important for us to be close to them.

@emmaorch How do you get your foot around your free-kicks?

I used to practise the so-called 'Dipper' at West Ham all the time, and at Colchester, where you run onto it straight, try to hit the valve and it goes up and over the wall, but it's hard to control it to come back down. I get more success with the one that I've done twice for Luton so far, where I try to hit the outside of the ball as hard as I can, and I swing my right foot towards the corner flag, so as long as I get my foot around it, the spin comes back in to the far post. I try to put as much spin as I can on it from the outside of the ball, and get plenty of whip on it. The one at Fleetwood had a little bit of dip and a little bit of curve, so all good.

@lftc_bible What's your favourite moment at Luton so far?

Definitely scoring against Portsmouth, just in terms of the state of the game - it was a big top of the table clash so it would have been great for us to win - and thankfully we did, so it was a great moment to score that goal. The weather helped as well, with it snowing. All we needed was the orange ball!

I just got carried away. I've never really liked playing at Fleetwood. Can't stand the place. But I should have run to celebrate with our supporters, and I'm sorry I didn't.

@lftc_bible Best player you've ever played with?

Joe Cole at West Ham. I was lucky as a boy to watch him play with my dad for West Ham, and then to be at the club when he came back in 2013 was unreal. He was such a quality player, could do amazing things with the ball and he'd achieved so much in the game with Chelsea and England. Top man as well. It was a privilege to train with him.

@comeonhatters Why didn't you bring Cam back with you!

Haha! Cam's a great lad, but he's happy at Barnsley. I did speak to him about Luton and he only said good things. He'd had a great relationship with the fans and loved his time here. Because it all happened so quickly with my move I didn't really get chance to get his opinion on me coming here, but I know what he thinks about Luton.

@abboway Who's the best player in Division One? (apart from Luton players of course)

I like the lad we played against at Plymouth a couple of weeks ago, Ruben lameiras. I thought he was good on the ball and lively. And I've got to say my old Barnsley team-mate Alex Mowatt. He was brilliant to play with and you always knew he'd find you with the pass. I'd imagine he's got to be up there for League One Player of the Year, but there'd be a few in our squad that'll be in with a shout as well.

Jack Stacey restored the lead with a drilled effort at the near post, but Luke O'Neill curled in a fantastic free-kick to ensure his side took a point from the game.

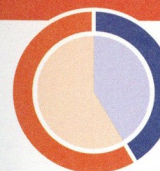

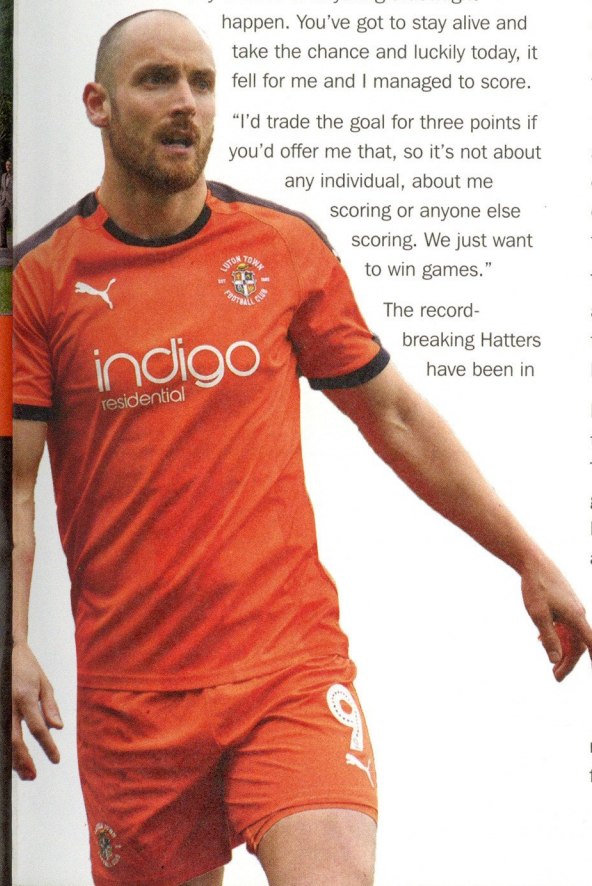
He continued: "That's the great thing about this team and squad. We don't get too high or too low about these kind of things. We're not getting too excited about records, being unbeaten and being top of the league.

Top of the league is fantastic and we'll try and stay there now."

EVER-PRESENT PELLY'S IN POSITION

Along with Matty Pearson, Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu is the only Luton player to have started every single Sky Bet League One match this season, proving his worth to this promotion chasing Hatters side.

Even a small change of position in last weekend's 2-2 draw with Gillingham couldn't falter the 25-year-old's contribution, slotting into the defensive midfield role for the injured Alan McCormack.

Speaking after the match on Saturday, Pelly – who moved to within two of his double century of appearances for the club – said: “The switch is easy for me, I've played there the season before, I fit in well.

“Obviously, if the gaffer wants me to play there then I'll play there. It has no effect on me. I've just got to keep it simple, keep disciplined and keep the ball moving.”

It was the midfielder's dominating run from the middle of the pitch that won the Hatters an important corner which led to Danny Hylton's opening goal just before half-time.

Mpanzu continued: “I had the opportunity to drive, won the corner and we scored from it. It was a good start from the boys. Hylts is a goal scorer and today he put one in. It's a bit of a dodgy bounce, I thought the keeper was going to get it, but thankfully he's put it in.”

A huge number of miles had been covered going into the Gillingham clash at Kenilworth Road with Plymouth away on the previous Saturday, followed by a long Tuesday night journey up to Bradford. The ex-West Ham man was happy to accept a short rest before getting back to work for this afternoon's test.

Mpanzu said: “We've put in a lot of miles going to Plymouth and Bradford. We got a win and a draw, and today we got a draw. We've travelled a lot of miles throughout the week and got five points out of



nine, which isn't bad going. We've got to keep top of the table and everyone's got to catch us.

“I think we did alright. We started well but the boys maybe got a bit leggy, but there is no excuses. We're top of the league for a reason. We've got to keep going, keep battling and take positives from the game. We're a point better off than we were.”

The Kenilworth Road faithful may also remember Mpanzu's stunning strike at home versus Crewe last season, putting the game out of reach and pushing the Hatters within touching distance of promotion. His top-class effort has been shortlisted for the 'Goal of 2018' prize at the upcoming EFL awards.

Mpanzu added: “It's good on a personal note and hopefully people get voting and I win it. But listen, a goal is goal. We've got to focus on hopefully winning the league and the next match on Saturday.”

WHO?

Gas have dragged themselves out of the relegation zone after a dismal start to the campaign and now sit 13th in the third tier. The Hatters took on Gas earlier on this season, with Andrew Shinnie grabbing the all-important goal in a 1-0 win. That was Town's 47th victory in this fixture, having drawn 29, and lost on 47 occasions.

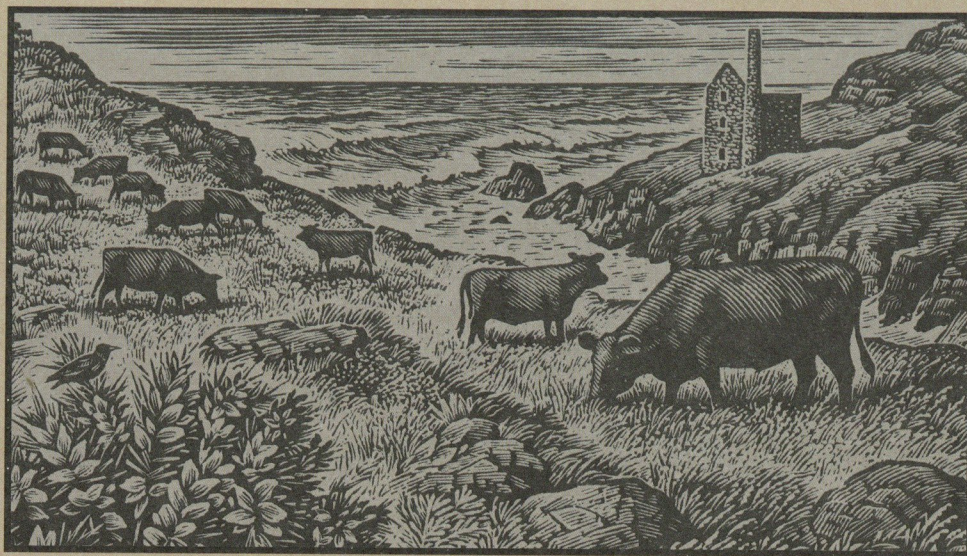
A dreadful start this season ended up costing Darrell Clarke his job at the Memorial Stadium, with a 2-1 defeat at Sunderland in mid-December following his departure seeing the club sit four points from safety in 23rd spot. Just two defeats since then have reversed their fortunes, defeating clubs around them like Walsall, Oxford and Scunthorpe to haul them away from danger. They're performing against the bigger teams in the third tier as well, drawing with Portsmouth, and last weekend grabbing a point at Charlton Athletic.

Former Hatters midfielder Lee Mansell made 62 appearances for the club, scoring ten times before departing for Oxford United in 2005. A long spell at Torquay United followed, before spending the last three seasons of his playing career at Bristol Rovers. He is now an academy coach at the club. John Still who famously guided the Hatters back into the EFL, was Rovers' assistant manager between May 2002 and December 2003.

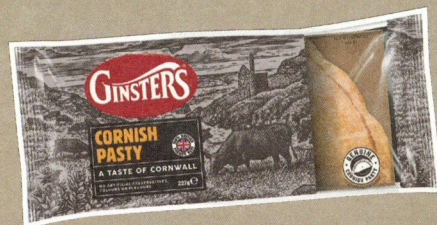

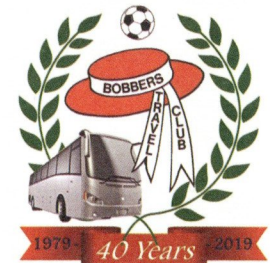

TRUST RECEIVES NATIONAL CRIMEBEAT AWARD

Earlier this month the Trust received further recognition of its community cohesion work when Community Operations Manager Daniel Douglas was presented with the National Crimebeat Award from the High Sheriff of Bedfordshire, Julian Polhill, with a special commendation for the Football for Peace project.

National Crimebeat is the youth crime prevention charity of the High Sheriffs' Association, and recognises innovative and successful crime prevention and social cohesion projects.

The Football for Peace Young Ambassador Training Programme was a local community initiative that used football to connect young people from different faiths, cultures and backgrounds in Luton and get them to communicate, play together and learn to confront stereotypes and better understand one another through dialogue.

Respect

As well as having the chance to organise a peace football tournament here at the stadium during the close season, the project identified young people aged 16 to 18 years to work together within Luton's communities to create greater mutual understanding and respect as well as developing their personal skills in the process.

Our 'Peace Ambassadors' attended workshops that covered events management, conflict management, team building and equality and diversity, as well as everyone gaining a recognised Level 2 sports qualifications, skills that we hope will be helpful for them in the future whilst also benefitting the whole community.



Luton Town FC Community Operations Manager, Daniel Douglas, said: "We recognise the cohesive impact that a relatively small number of young people from across the town can have as young leaders in changing perceptions and raising aspirations. We know that Luton's young people have a lot to contribute to making Luton a place to be proud of, and projects like Football For Peace help them to achieve this."

Football For peace is an ongoing project and is part of the Hatters Trust portfolio of projects that aim to improve community cohesion in Luton. This year the Trust will be heavily involved in celebrating the 25th anniversary of Kick it Out celebrations at our next home game v Blackpool.

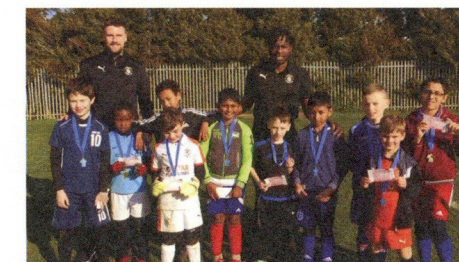

Luton looked to retaliate, and Rachel Kosky's storming run could only be stopped by a cynical body-check from a Denham defender.

Fair

The introduction of Aurora Ryan and Rebecca Clay for the final ten minutes seemed the best chance of Luton taking back the initiative and grabbing the winner, and the pair contributed to the last big push which saw Jess McKay and Rachel Carter both go close, before Denham provided one last scare as they clipped the crossbar with a speculative strike.

The game ended all-square, which was probably a fair result on the balance of play. Luton must now prepare for the visit of high-flying Crawley as they hope to pick up more points to help in their fight to escape relegation.
