On September 13th 1919 – almost one century ago – the Addicks graced SE7's now famous turf for the very first time and throughout next season we will be paying tribute to our iconic home.

Charlton supporters have been crucial this season and have played a huge role in helping Lee Bowyer's team to secure some vital – and often dramatic – points, and we are still hopeful that 2018/19 can end with promotion to the Sky Bet

Championship.

As the club remains committed to offering reasonably-priced, family football, the Addicks will again be one of the most affordable teams to follow in the entire EFL next season. Adult season tickets start from just £210, which equates to £9.13 per match.

Some areas of The Valley have seen price increases for 2019/20 due to a number of reasons, which include increases

in inflation, minimum and real wages, as well as security and counter-terrorism costs.

Season tickets will be at their cheapest during our early-bird phase. Our early-bird deadline is midnight on Monday, May 6th and our phase-two prices will be published in due course.

As always, there are a number of ways supporters can secure their seat for 2019/20: In person from The Valley, by post, by phone, by V12 finance or online.

PEARCE: "WE CAN STILL CATCH TOP TWO"

Charlton narrowed the gap on the automatic-promotion places to four points after a hard-fought 1-0 victory at Wycombe Wanderers on Tuesday night.



Jason Pearce, who bagged the winning goal at Adams Park on his return to first-team action, believes that the clubs above them may begin to feel the pressure of the Addicks breathing down their necks.

He said: "They'll keep looking behind and see that Charlton keep winning - it will be difficult for them because they know they've got to win. We're four points off it, which at this stage of the season is a decent little gap, but we're just going to keep plugging away and win the games.

"The Manager has said all along that he thinks we can get into the top two, so he just keeps drilling that into us. At the moment, we're getting the victories, we're getting clean sheets and the boys are playing well. You've got to keep your feet on the ground - if we take our foot off the gas then we'll get beaten by any team in

this league. We just need to all stay together."

1,434 fans made the trip to Buckinghamshire on Tuesday and Pearce realises how crucial their support will be in the final five games as Charlton try and chase down the top-two.

He said: "They've really helped the team and have given us that extra push. I can't thank them enough, it's been great to have them behind us. At the moment, we're giving them something to cheer about, so hopefully we can keep that going."

Meanwhile, Pearce could not hide his delight after his midweek winner.

He said: "I was fortunate enough to pop up with a goal and it was the winner in the end, so I was delighted.

"I just thought I was going to run back into position with Pat [Bauer] because I thought the attack had

finished but then I thought 'I'll stay up and see if a decent ball comes in'. It did and luckily I was there to finish it off."

The Addicks captain was sidelined with ankle injury in December and has struggled to regain his spot in the team since, due to the excellent form of Naby Sarr and Patrick Bauer in defence.

"Naby's been playing and doing really well, so I've had to wait for my opportunity," Pearce said.

He said: "I'm old enough to know that's football. I got injured, someone else got an opportunity in Naby and he's taken it. I want to play and it's frustrating, but it's a team game.

"I support him and Pat all the time and I just waited for my opportunity. I got one on Tuesday and felt like I took it but we'll see what the manager does at the weekend."



BAUER POWER: PATRICK'S PROMOTION PUSH

A lot has changed for Patrick Bauer since he first became an Addick back in 2015. Since living in London, he has met his wife and is just a few weeks away from welcoming a baby daughter into the world. Much has changed on the pitch, too, for the big German. After that first season which ended in relegation, Bauer believes things have only got better and is confident matters will come full circle with a return to the second tier next month.

Speaking to Olly Groome prior to Tuesday's trip to Wycombe Wanderers, the 26-year old discusses the season so far, the importance of not letting standards slip as the play-offs approach and why he believes Charlton have enjoyed such a good defensive record since the turn of the year.

Patrick, it's been a good season, so far. How do you feel going into these last five games?

Last week I read on the internet that we had already beaten the amount of points that we got last season with six games still to play so it proves that, definitely, as a team we're doing very well.

It has been better than last year and we're unbeaten since the Fleetwood game so we're on a good run and it's important for us to keep going. We're still aiming for the top two. We'll have to see whether they drop points and if they do we want to be there. If we don't succeed with that, we at least want to have some momentum going into the play-offs and get promoted that way.

People talk about the importance of momentum all the time, but we're winning games and not conceding many goals - that's going to be so important going into the play-offs isn't it?

Yes, we saw last Saturday [against Plymouth] in the first-half, it was probably one of our worst 45 minutes in the whole season but we managed to

win the game 2-0. I think it's important to have this momentum and if you've got in your head that, if it's not going well, we are still able to beat other teams. I think it's an important thing and that's why we have to keep going like that.

Is there ever a subconscious danger of knowing we're going to be in the play-offs that you take your foot off the pedal during the run-in?

No, I don't think so. The boys, especially the manager, will not let anyone drop their standards. Everyone in the squad is professional and everyone knows that they have to keep going. Even if we're almost secure in the play-offs, it's still important to go into it with some momentum. Hopefully we can win those play-offs. I'd definitely like to be in a Wembley final, it would be a fantastic experience. Or if not, just a straight promotion will be fine! My aim is to get promoted with Charlton this season no matter what.

In the whole of the EFL, Charlton have conceded the fewest goals since the beginning of 2019 - how important has Dillion Phillips' form been towards that?

I think at the start of the season he was unlucky to just be on the bench because Jed did a very good job. I think it was in his mind that 'if I'm given a chance, no one is going to get me out of the goal again'. You could see that how important





the penalty save was on Saturday. Less than two minutes after, we scored the first goal, and it got us to the chance to finish the game.

Someone else who has been important in the second half of the season is Naby Sarr. He signed during the same summer you did four years ago - it's been quite a journey for him, hasn't it?

I'm delighted for him. I think he had a tough first couple of years at Charlton but I think he feels very comfortable now; he's happy, he plays every week and he's doing well. I'm delighted for him, he's working hard.

I think it's the best thing for the Manager to have the problem that he has because Jason Pearce has been kept out of the team. We are at the stage of the season where there aren't many injuries in the team; in every position it will be a difficult decision for the manager. He's our skipper and, unfortunately, he was out with an ankle injury, but it's often like that in football that if others are doing well then you have to wait for your chance. He's still an important part of the team, but Naby has been doing so well.

You've been living in London and playing for Charlton for four years now - do you feel like a different person to the one who joined the club?

Yes, in both my private life and football career. I've been married since last year and my wife is awaiting a baby and due on May 17th - play-off time! When it comes to football as well, I think I've learned a lot here in England and really enjoyed my last four years here.

A lot has changed since I first came. I get a feeling from the supporters that they're enjoying it a lot more. You can see there's a togetherness and, as players, we feel a togetherness with the fans. In my first year, it wasn't always like that. So that is one thing that has definitely improved.

The fans have always been good to you - they obviously call you BFG which you enjoy - that must be nice?

The fans have been really loyal to us. Week in week out, they're coming to support us. Last week at Plymouth, they were even louder than the home fans! It really helps us, especially in difficult




times it gives us help and we need them to succeed.

I do like it a lot that they call me the BFG and I even call myself that sometimes now.

Your contract situation is well publicised and you've mentioned that you probably won't be staying - is there a chance if we go up that you might still be here?

I want to play at the highest possible level, just like every player. And I know that the club wants to be playing as high as possible, at least in the Championship which is where we are all trying to get to. My focus now is just on getting Charlton promoted. When we are promoted, we'll sit at a table and then we will speak about my future.

Keeping account of the 1910/11 season

Following the recent release of the club's annual accounts, Charlton Museum Trustee, Paul Baker, takes a look through the Addicks' finances during the 1910/11 season and the successes on the pitch that paved the way for the future.

A recent visitor to the Charlton Museum asked which one item I would like to acquire for the Museum. The answer I gave was the Accounts Book for the season 1910/11, which was the first season that Bert 'Fatty' Heath took over as secretary. Heath kept a comprehensive accounts book which was loaned to me many years ago by one of his descendants so that I could photocopy it. Unfortunately, I have lost touch with the family but it would be very exciting to know if it's still in existence and, at least, make a better copy of it. The book provided a fascinating insight of the running of our club at a very early stage of its existence and provides the information for this article.

A brief summary of previous years might be of interest to anyone not familiar with the club's early history.

The club was formed in 1905 by a group of 15 and 16-year-old boys and at first played only friendly matches. In 1906/07 the club entered the third division of the Lewisham league, and dropped only one point in 18 games, winning the championship and promotion to Division Two. The next season, they finished top equal of section B of Division 2 with North Greenwich Amateurs. A play-off was arranged

Analysts. A play off was arranged and Charlton won through to a game against the champions of section A, St Joseph's Rotherhithe. The latter, however, failed to turn up, so Charlton were overall Division

Two champions and promoted again. The team also played in the second division of the Woolwich league this season and won this championship too. Next season, in 1908/09 the team played in Division One of the Lewisham league and became champions after another play-off against North Greenwich Amateurs. They also entered, and won, both the second division of the Blackheath League, and the Woolwich Cup. The team still consisted of many of the players from 1906. In 1909/10 Charlton won the first division of the Blackheath and Woolwich Leagues, and the Woolwich Cup again. The final of the Charlton Charity cup was reached, but a surprising defeat against the Personnel Ordnance College boys, by 2-1 was encountered on the (then) Woolwich

Arsenal ground at Plumstead. Thus season 1910/11 was reached after an almost uninterrupted run of success. The matches at that time were played on a private ground at Pound Park, close to The Valley. Four competitions were entered - the first division of both the Blackheath and Woolwich Leagues, the Woolwich Cup and a new venture, the London Junior Cup.

The first league match of the season was a home game against Johnson & Phillips in the Blackheath league on September 17th. The best attendance for the whole season, 276, attended, producing

gate receipts of £2-4s-4d. Younger readers might be interested to know that there were twenty shillings to the pound and twelve pennies to the shilling before decimalisation in 1971. A shilling, sometimes written as 1/-, was therefore equivalent to 5p in today's currency. In those days, admission was 2d for men and boys paid one penny if they were caught before climbing the fence! The team for this match was: C Oliver, A Hunt, J Mitchell, W Wilson, A Ellis, E Marshall, H Gritton, H Calcutt, C Ladd, S Mew and A Mills. This was the regular team for most of the season, with the exception of the goalkeeper; W "Bodger" King being a regular custodian. The crowd saw Charlton run up their best win of the season, 8-0, with J. Mitchell scoring four times. The next game saw Charlton play in the London Junior Cup for the first time, the Army Service Corp being soundly beaten 6-0 on Woolwich Common. Following another victory in the Blackheath League, Charlton played their first Woolwich Cup match of the season against Rotherhithe Town at Pound Park. Another good crowd, 205, saw an easy win by 6-0. J Mitchell (2), H Gritton (2), Ladd and Higgs (making a rare appearance in place of H Calcutt) scoring the goals. Another victory in the London Junior Cup was followed by a Woolwich League match against Callender's Athletic, away at Belvedere. Charlton won a hard game 2-1

after conceding a goal inside two minutes when W Wilson headed an own goal. Further wins in the London Junior Cup and Woolwich League were followed by a 1-1 draw away against Prices Athletic on November 26th – the first point dropped. This was soon followed by their first, and last defeat. Silvertown Rubber Works provided the opposition in the London Junior Cup and, following a 2-2 draw at Silvertown (where W King saved a penalty), Charlton were soundly beaten 4-1 in the replay at Pound Park. A fine crowd of 200 saw the visitors score four times in the first half before Charlton managed a consolation goal.

Charlton responded admirably to their defeat, winning fifteen successive matches which included ten in the league and a Woolwich Cup semi-final against Callender's Athletic. The same opposition played at Pound Park in a Woolwich League match watched by a crowd of 50, producing receipts of only 8/3 (about 41p). This was the lowest attendance of the season. Apart from this match, the attendance was only below 100 on one other occasion. A 1-1 draw away at Silvertown in the Woolwich League on April 8th was followed by a local derby against Charlton Amateurs on April 15th. Charlton needed to win this match to clinch the championship of the Woolwich League, and a crowd of 216 saw them win a tame match 2-1. Two days later, Charlton played North Woolwich Claremont away in the final of the Woolwich Cup, and they were again victorious by 2-1, A Mills scoring both goals. This was Charlton's third successive victory in the Woolwich Cup and meant they won it outright. The cup was later presented to the Woolwich War

Memorial Hospital and an annual competition was played to raise funds for the Hospital with the cup being presented to the winners.

The next game was against Prices Athletic away, at Belvedere, in the Blackheath League. A 1-1 draw was enough to give Charlton the championship of the Blackheath League again. The final match of the season was against a Woolwich

League select team and a goal by Eddie Marshall gave Charlton victory by 1-0.

This was another magnificent season. 34 matches were played, resulting in 27 wins, five draws and two defeats (one in a pre-season friendly), with a goal tally of 103 – 24.

The club also managed very well financially too. Total income for the season amounted to £42-10s-9½d, of which gate receipts contributed £21-19s-2d. Players' contributions supplemented the income, a fee of 4d being paid for every game played (unless they were unemployed). This information also provides line-ups for the competitive

matches played. Other income came from donations from the Vice-Presidents, and a handsome gift of a guinea from their Patron (later President), Sir Ian Hamilton-Benn. The sale of fixture cards and club photos also provided some income, but none of the fixture cards are known to have survived.

In those days, rent of the ground was £4 per year, and 10/- for their headquarters at the "Royal Oak" pub. The cost of marking out the pitch was 2/6 on average, and the task was normally performed by one of the players. Over the season this amounted to £2-3-8d. Referees were generally 3/- per game, totalling £2-8s-2d. Cost of footballs (at 8/6, including bladder) was nearly £5. In addition, £4-13-9½d had to be paid to visiting clubs in cup competitions. In all, total expenditure for the season was £30-4s-0d so over the season a profit of over £12 was achieved.

Thus, 1910/11 was a very successful season, but how many people at that time would have imagined that Charlton Athletic would be competing in the Football League within 10 years – and after a World War?



Past Encounters

FEBRUARY 10TH, 1962

LUTON TOWN 1 CHARLTON 6


Charlton recovered from a goal down to win 6-1 at Kenilworth Road, in the process recording their record away win that would stand for more than 55 years until September 2018's 8-0 win at Stevenage.

Gordon Turner gave Luton the lead, but Charlton responded immediately to equalise through a David Pacey own goal.

Once on level terms, the Addicks didn't look back, as Dennis Edwards struck twice before half-time to give the away side a commanding lead.

The second half saw Edwards secure his hat-trick, while Stuart Leary and Brian Kinsey also got on the scoresheet to complete the stunning rout.

The victory proved pivotal as Charlton rallied from an initial nine points in 19 games to eventually avoid relegation by three points in dramatic fashion.



SEPTEMBER 10TH, 1976

CHARLTON 4 LUTON TOWN 3

A crowd of 9,191 saw Charlton win an entertaining seven-goal encounter at The Valley en route to a respectable seventh-place finish in the Second Division.


The Addicks' record goalscorer Derek Hales scored three of his 168 goals for the club, while Bob Curtis added the fourth from the penalty spot.

A 22nd-minute John Deans strike gave Luton the lead, but two Hales goals before the half-time interval sent Charlton into the second period with a slender advantage.

Hales completed his hat-trick on the hour mark to give the hosts some breathing room, but Luton closed the gap just two minutes later through John Aston.

It was no surprise to see Hales involved in the Addicks' fourth goal, seeing his effort handled by Paul Fletcher in the box to give Curtis the chance to make it 4-2 from the spot.

Luton managed to narrow the deficit yet again in the 86th minute, but Ricky Hill's goal proved to be no more than a consolation as the Addicks held out for a thrilling victory.



JANUARY 14TH, 1989

CHARLTON 3 LUTON TOWN 0

Charlton claimed a comfortable victory in front of a crowd of 5,212 at The Valley, earning a crucial three points in their First Division survival hopes.


An Addicks team that relied on resolute defending to secure their First Division status, scored three first-half goals in a stunning display of clinical finishing.

Paul Mortimer opened the scoring in the 12th minute, heading Charlton into the lead from close range before Garth Crooks doubled the advantage, notching the goal of the day as he delicately clipped a loose ball over the advancing Les Sealey.

Just 10 minutes later, the Addicks killed off the match, adding a third just past the half-hour mark through Paul Williams. Crooks saw an initial effort cleared off the line before the forward found Williams for the simplest of finishes.

Goalkeeper Bob Bolder marked his 300th League appearance for the club by keeping a clean sheet, as Charlton held out for a deserved 3-0 victory.

The win proved to be crucial in the final table as Charlton staved off relegation by just three points, while Luton also survived, finishing one point worse off than the Addicks.



(Charlton win 8-7 on penalties)

A seesaw League Cup second-round tie saw Charlton rally from two goals down to emerge victorious on penalties.

The visitors from Division Two shocked the home crowd of 10,905, taking the lead through future Addick Kevin Foley on the half-hour mark. Things immediately went from bad to worse for Charlton just two minutes later when David Bayliss doubled Luton's lead, rising highest to head home from a corner.

Desperately in need of a response before half-time, Scott Parker stepped up to halve the deficit in the 41st minute, taking a pass from Kevin Lisbie in his stride, before beating a man and coolly slotting past Robert Beckwith in the Luton net.

Lisbie then got on the scoresheet himself, glancing a header into the bottom corner from a Claus Jensen cross just before the hour mark.



Luton looked to have snatched the tie when Gary McSheffrey curled a first-time effort into the back of the net, stunning the Premier League Addicks.

Staring elimination in the face, Paolo Di Canio rose to loop a header over Beckwith and under the crossbar in the third minute of stoppage time, sending the match to extra-time and sparking elated shirtless celebrations from the Italian.


The additional 30 minute period saw Charlton claim their first lead of the night, Jensen's effort from 20 yards, deflecting off a Luton defender en route to the net, but the game was once again levelled when Chris Coyne scored to make it 3-3 in the 110th minute.

With a pulsating 120 minutes ending on level terms, the match went to penalties and the trend of equity continued as each side scored their first seven spot-kicks.

Mark Fish notched the Addicks eighth penalty, setting up a decisive Dean Kiely save from Coyne's effort to send Charlton through to the League Cup third round, where the Addicks cup run would come to an end with a narrow 1-0 defeat to Everton.

Former Addicks youth graduate Kevin Lisbie picks his best side based on the players he played alongside during his 176-game career at The Valley.

1. DEAN KIELY

Deano was so consistent over the years and the best keeper I played with. I played with some good keepers, but there's no discussion about who was the best and he was so good at the highest level in the Premier League.

2. LUKE YOUNG

He was another very consistent player and you knew what you were getting out of him in every single game. He went on to captain the club and play for England which obviously shows just how good he was.

3. CHRIS POWELL

It's tough to choose between Paul Konchesky and Powelly, but I'll have to go with Powelly. The whole time he was at the club, he was an absolute legend and was involved in everything good that the club did. I was fortunate to have people like him, Keith Jones and Mark Bright around me that I could look up to, but Chris was top of that list. He still gives me advice to this day and is a good, good man. He opened a lot of doors for people without even realising it when he played for England. It gave players the belief that they could do it.

4. CLAUS JENSEN

Claus was a Rolls Royce of a player. He and Scotty Parker were a perfect partnership in the middle. He was a great guy who always had a smile on his face, I never remember him shouting. He always encouraged people around the building and made time for the young boys. Apart from all that, his passing was ridiculous. If he was playing now, I believe he

would be at one of the big clubs.

5. RICHARD RUFUS

Rich had everything. He was one of those players that I hated playing against in training and I would never have liked to have come up against him in a match. He was quick, strong, he read the game really well and he was really aggressive. Once he was on that pitch, there was no talking to him, he was in game mode and was a true professional.

6. HERMANN HREIDARSSON

Hermann was a left-footer so I've gone for him to partner Rufus for a better balance. Some might call him a character, but others would just say he was an absolute loon! He was great to have around the place, especially when results didn't go well because he would come in the next day and liven everyone up.

7. SHAUN NEWTON

Newts was always up and down and had great energy. He could even fill in at right-back if he had to or in centre midfield. He scored a lot of important goals and his crossing ability was fantastic. He was a modern-day winger ahead of his time. He would be a brilliant wing-back in today's game.

8. SCOTT PARKER

I remember when he first came in, everyone talked about the McDonald's advert and were saying he was the next big thing, but he just didn't produce and we were underwhelmed. Then Curbs sent him out on loan to Norwich and he came back a different animal. He was

kicking everyone, passing and scoring goals. It was the kick-start he needed and shows how important it is for kids to get game time. He had everything and was almost like having an extra man on the field during games. He's probably the best player I ever played with.

9. JASON EUELL

Jase was our top scorer for a few seasons and is the club's top Premier League goalscorer so that tells you what you need to know. He was what we needed at the time when he came in, he just scored important goals that kept us comfortable in that league and was a great player for us.

10. CLIVE MENDONCA

Clive was unbelievable and probably the best striker I played with. That game at Wembley will always come to mind. To be the best player on the park by a mile when there were people like Kevin Phillips and Niall Quinn on the other side says a lot. He made things look really simple. He wasn't good at all the other stuff, but inside the box, he was incredible. He always seemed to have that extra second and his brain was so quick, he never seemed in a rush and always finished.

11. JOHN ROBINSON







Charlton Athletic U23s 2 Millwall U23s 1



George Lapslie's double ensured that all three points remained at The Valley, with a confident display earning Charlton's U23s a 2-1 victory against Millwall on April 2nd.

An attritional opening period saw both sides struggle to maintain possession, with Mark Marshall firing Charlton's first effort directly at Jordan Archer in the Millwall net.

On the quarter-hour mark, the visitors mounted their first attack, advancing to the outskirts of the Charlton box, but strong defending from Tyler French ensured that Fred Onyedinma's deflected cross was cut out with Tom Elliott lurking ominously at the back post.

After beginning to control proceedings, the hosts took the lead in the 21st minute through an excellent Lapslie header. Marshall beat his marker on the right flank with a sharp turn of pace before whipping a pinpoint cross onto Lapslie's head, the momentum on the pass sending both the ball and midfielder

careening into the back of the net. Charlton continued to dominate possession of the ball but opportunities remained at a premium, with captain Kenneth Yao firing over the bar from long distance.

Lapslie, at the heart of the Addicks' attacking prowess, nearly opened up Millwall's defence in the 37th minute but his dangerous, low cross deflected behind for a corner.

Three minutes before the half-time whistle Tariqe Fosu was inches away from doubling the Charlton lead, seeing his diving header come back off the base of the post after Toby Stevenson found the midfielder with a cross from the left flank.

Albie Morgan had the home side's first effort of the second half, stinging Archer's palms with a rasping drive from distance.

Despite struggling to mount any serious first-half chances, Millwall were back on level terms 10 minutes into the second period, Elliott firing into an empty net after Nathan Harness had kept out the striker's

initial header with an exceptional save.

Josh Parker then missed an opportunity to regain the Addicks' lead, hitting his first-time effort over the bar after latching onto a Marshall cut-back along the six-yard box.

Charlton were forced to weather a spell of Millwall pressure after conceding the equaliser, but Jason Euell's men exploded back into life to re-take the lead in the 69th minute.

Lapslie touched home his second of the day after Parker's glancing header found the 21-year old free at the back post.

The Addicks dug in to survive the final 20 minutes with minimal fuss, Lapslie's brace the difference as Charlton claimed bragging rights from the south-London derby.

Goals from strikers Liz Ejupi and Kit Graham either side of half-time ensured the Charlton Women saw off London Bees 2-1 at The Hive to keep the pressure on the FA Women's Championship leaders.

The first period ended with Charlton still on top, with Graham having a couple of chances and Charley Clifford firing a brace of free kicks over the crossbar.

London Bees came forward sporadically, but couldn't break down a stubborn Addicks backline.

Again, Bees had the better of the opening exchanges immediately after the interval with Toussaint crashing a long-range effort against the woodwork.

A couple of minutes later it was Charlton's turn to hit the post, with Gurr receiving the ball from her own cleared corner. The wing-back made cut inside onto her left foot and curled a wonderful effort onto the far post. Graham was then unlucky to see her close-range shot parried over the bar by Quantrill.

Up the other end, the home side had a rare foray forward with intent. Pickett advanced and spread the ball out wide to the right for McLachlan, whose cross was too high for Toussaint and too heavy for Wilkinson at the far post and the chance went.

With 12 minutes remaining, the Addicks doubled their advantage when substitute Lily Agg won the ball inside the final third and laid the ball off to Gurr. Gurr then threaded a sublime through ball for Graham to latch onto and fire across

Quantrill and into the bottom far corner.

The final stages saw Quantrill keep an Amber Stobbs shot out and Agg shoot just wide. With Charlton then looking like moving back into third place ahead of Durham on goals scored, London Bees finally found a reply seemingly out of nothing as the ball dropped for Pickett 10 yards out and the former Tottenham striker volleyed home well.

In the end, though, it was not to be a nervy period of added time as Charlton saw the game out well to record their 11th win of the season.

MY FAVOURITE CHARLTON PLAYER: was Andy Hunt. He scored some great goals. Had to pack up playing due to illness.


MY FAVOURITE CHARLTON KIT: was the 1995-96 third strip. The purple and green one.

DEADLY DUOS

Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** profiles five notable post-war Luton Town goalscoring partnerships

GORDON TURNER & ALLAN BROWN

Long-serving inside-forward Gordon Turner holds Luton Town's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in March 1950, he featured in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run and 1952-53 promotion near-miss. He was leading marksman seven times, including 1954-55 when ever-present as they won promotion to the top-flight, also representing the Football League. Netting 243 goals in 406 League outings for the Hatters, he briefly reunited with Jesse Pye at Wisbech Town in July 1964, then played for Kettering Town, Dunstable and Bletchley. He lived and worked locally until his death in December 1976.

Ex-Scotland international Allan Brown was a player and manager at Luton Town. He was a Scottish Cup finalist with East Fife shortly before joining Blackpool in December 1950, moving to Luton in February 1957. Appearing in the 1959 FA Cup final, he netted 51 goals in 151 League games, joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He helped win the Third Division title in 1961-62, then was Wigan's player-boss and Luton's manager from November 1966 until December 1968, plotting their 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph. Later managing Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool, he died in April 2011.

MALCOLM MACDONALD & DON GIVENS

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including their 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £330,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury

ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and now works in the media.

Republic of Ireland international striker Don Givens was ever-present for Luton Town in 1971-72. Starting with Manchester United, he joined Luton in April 1970 and formed a lethal partnership with Malcolm Macdonald, netting 19 goals in 83 League outings before joining QPR in July 1972. He starred as they won promotion in 1972-73, then were League Championship runners-up in 1975-76. Joining Birmingham City in August 1978, he later appeared for Sheffield United, then was player and coach with leading Swiss side Neuchatel Xamax. He had a spell as Arsenal's youth coach before managing Republic of Ireland U-21's.

DAVID MOSS & BOB HATTON

Winger David Moss was Luton Town's top scorer in two consecutive seasons. Initially with hometown Witney, he joined Swindon Town in July 1969 and was twice leading marksman before moving to Luton for £110,000 in May 1978. He featured prominently in their 1981-82 Second Division title triumph and was an FA Cup semi-finalist in 1984-85, netting 88 goals in 221 League games for the Hatters prior to rejoining Swindon in July 1985. Later with Trowbridge Town, he coached under Brian Horton at Oxford United, Manchester City and Huddersfield Town. He has since been chief scout of Liverpool's Academy.

Much-travelled striker Bob Hatton missed just one match for Luton Town in two consecutive seasons. Initially with Wolves, he had spells at Bolton Wanderers and Northampton prior to joining Carlisle United in July 1969. He starred as they were League Cup semi-finalists in 1969-70, then joined Birmingham City in October 1971 and helped to clinch top-flight status that season. Moving to Blackpool in July 1976, he was leading marksman in 1977-78 and joined Luton in July 1978. He netted 29 goals in 82 League games before joining Sheffield United in July 1980, then Cardiff City, becoming director of sales for the PFA.

BRIAN STEIN & MICK HARFORD

England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 League Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in

Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted their 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992, helping win promotion in 1992-93. His brother Mark also played for Luton.

England international striker Mick Harford played for Luton Town in two consecutive League Cup finals including their 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry City and Wimbledon. He has since been coach and manager back at Luton.

STEVE HOWARD & TONY THORPE

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. Initially with Tow Law, he joined Hartlepool United in August 1995 and moved to Northampton Town for £120,000 in February 1999. He starred in their 1999-2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001-02 and League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006. He helped win promotion in 2006-07 and joined Leicester for £1,500,000 in January 2008, then returned to Hartlepool.

Striker Tony Thorpe was leading marksman as Luton Town qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. A former Leicester City trainee, he reunited with David Pleat at Luton in August 1992 and was also top scorer in 1997-98. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in February 1998 and helped them reach the play-offs that season. Sold to Bristol City for £1,000,000 in June 1998, he was top scorer three times prior to rejoining Luton in July 2002 after two loan spells.

He netted 70 goals in 164 League games overall before moving to QPR in August 2003, then Swindon, Colchester, Stevenage, Grimsby and Tamworth.

THE LOWDOWN

Luton have surprised many with their hugely successful season, riding on a crest of a wave following their promotion from League Town last term.

They come to The Valley off the back of a 28-game unbeaten league run, a club record, and are close to securing a double promotion and a return to the second tier for the first time since 2007.

The club's resurgence was largely led by former manager Nathan Jones who departed the Hatters for Stoke City in January, but Mick Harford has taken on the mantle to continue their run of form. They currently sit top of League One with 25 wins, 12 draws and four defeats from their 41 games.



TURNSTILES

The Kassam Stadium consists of just three stands, with the travelling Addicks housed in the right-hand side (as you look at the pitch) of the North Stand, which runs along one side of the pitch.

The stand offers a good view, with plenty of room, although the concourse can get cosy.

WHERE TO EAT

Since the stadium is situated right next to a retail park, there are a few options nearby. There is a Frankie & Benny's, a bar and grill called The Ridge, J's Sports Bar and a pan-Asian buffet named Oxy Oriental. You can also grab a bite to eat in the bowling alley next door, while there is a fish and chip shop in the same complex called the Ozone Plaice. Alternatively, there are plenty of options in the city centre which is around four miles away.

WHERE TO DRINK

In the city centre, the Eagle and Child is recommended and there are plenty of other options on hand. There is not much near to the ground, but you can grab a pint in the bowling alley or Frankie and Benny's. The nearby Holiday Inn does have a bar, but do not welcome away fans.

WHERE TO PARK

Postcode is OX4 4XP. There is free parking available at the ground and in the complex next door, but be prepared for a slow getaway.


TRAIN TRAVEL

Oxford station is over four miles away so a cab or bus to the ground is advised. Trains run direct from both Paddington, which take approximately one hour, or Marylebone, which takes around one hour, 20 minutes.

The number 3A bus runs from the station to the Kassam Stadium. Alternatively, the number 5 bus runs to just a short walk from the ground.
