

GRAEME JONES WILL BE THE HATTERS NEW MANAGER

Luton Town Football Club are delighted to announce that Graeme Jones will become the Hatters' new manager from Tuesday, with Mick Harford having successfully led the team to promotion to the Sky Bet Championship.

Graeme has agreed a three-year contract to take charge at Kenilworth Road until 2022, the terms of which were satisfactorily agreed in February, whichever league we would have been playing in, after amicable consultation with his then club West Bromwich Albion.

The Hatters' board were insistent on not disrupting another club's season, and Graeme did not want to break the commitment he had made to both West Brom – as they bid to win promotion back to the Premier League – and his manager Darren Moore.

The Championship club parted company with their management team in March, but despite Graeme's early availability, we rightly continued to honour our commitment to Mick, just as he committed to the club.

There will be minimal disruption to players and staff in the summer, and Graeme – who in recent weeks, since the severance of his contract with West Brom, has been fulfilling Mick's usual role – has been fully respectful of Mick and his coaches being solely responsible for the team without interference.

The 49-year-old Geordie is a former striker who enjoyed a 15-year playing career with the likes of Doncaster Rovers, Wigan Athletic, Southend United, Boston United and Bury in the Football League, as well as St Johnstone, Clyde and Hamilton Academical in Scotland, after working his way up from Non-League football with North Shields and Bridlington Town.

It was at Wigan that he shone most brightly, his 33 goals in the 1996-97 Division Three (now League Two) title winning campaign earning him the league's Golden Boot, before winning the Auto Windscreens Shield with victory over Millwall at Wembley in 1999.

It was also at the north-west club that he first met Roberto Martinez, a team-mate with whom he would go on to build a glowing reputation as one of the most experienced assistant managers in the game.


Graeme worked as the Spaniard's number two for 11 years, first winning League One at Swansea City and spending a season in the Championship, then for four seasons back at by-now Premier League Wigan, with whom he won the FA Cup against Manchester City in 2013.

He worked for another three in the top-flight with Martinez at Everton before moving into international football with the star-studded Belgian national team.

It was after spending two years helping Martinez and Thierry Henry leading the likes of Eden Hazard, Kevin De Bruyne and Romelu Lukaku to the World Cup, achieving the bronze medal as semi-finalists in Russia last summer, that he returned to English football to become assistant head coach to Moore at West Brom following their relegation from the top-flight.

With the Hatters having in recent years closely followed a career that has seen Graeme work at all levels of the game, with those who know him best maintaining that he has always remained grounded, the board quickly identified him as their number one target from the first moment the vacancy opened up.

Town CEO Gary Sweet said: "We're delighted to be the first club to secure the managerial services of Graeme Jones. Graeme is a very highly regarded coach and assistant amongst his peers and has caught our eye over the last few seasons as someone who is very hard working, very methodical and thorough in his approach, and a coach who



sets his teams up in a manner Luton players and supporters will be accustomed to.

"We were always looking for an individual with fresh ideas but one who would befit our Club's culture and ambition; one who is capable of taking Luton Town to the next level, building further upon the foundations we have nurtured over the last few years. We are very much looking forward to Graeme leading us into our next few chapters as a Championship club.

"We've been extremely fortunate to have Mick at the helm to see the job through, alongside our first team coaching staff. They have done a truly wonderful job with Graeme working in the background, without any thought of interference to the current set-up, to ensure we have a head start with regards to recruitment for next season.

"We would like to thank all of our supporters for your patience and for the support you have given Mick, his staff and the players throughout this wonderfully successful season and look forward to you giving Graeme the same backing in the Championship next season."

TOMORROW'S COUNCIL CELEBRATION!

The Mayor of Luton, Cllr Naseem Ayub, is inviting fans to a massive promotion party in St George's Square tomorrow.

Following pre-entertainment on the stage from a local band starting at 11am, the main party will kick off when Hatters players and officials arrive in St George's Square from Kenilworth Road in an open-top bus at around 12.15pm, before joining the Mayor onto a stage for short celebratory speeches hosted by BBC Three Counties Radio.

The team and officials will then make their way to a private reception in the Town Hall, with season highlights playing on large screens in the Square until 2pm.

The open-top bus tour will depart Kenilworth Road at around 12noon and proceed to St George's Square at walking pace via Dunstable Road, Telford Way, and Manchester Street.

In order to aid safe and smooth running of the event, the following roads will be closed from 9am-3pm: Guildford Street, Bridge Street, Gordon Street, Alma Street, Alma Link, Manchester Street, George Street, Upper George Street, Wellington Street,



Dunstable Place, New Bedford Road (jct. with Luton-Dunstable Busway) and Oak Road.

Motorists are advised to plan alternative routes around the area between those times.

Gary's commitment, passion, imagination and sheer dogged hard-work and persistence make him a well-deserved recipient of this award.





WELCOME OXFORD UNITED



The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting players, staff and supporters of Oxford United.

After our last meeting back in October – when the Hatters defeated Karl Robinson's side 2-1 at Grenoble Road – Oxford found themselves in 23rd spot with five points from 11 games.

Their form picked up dramatically after that and apart from a blip over Christmas and New Year, the U's have been in at least play-off challenging form.

Whilst their season is all but over – unable to finish in the play-offs and safe from relegation – Robinson's team have found another gear and head into today's match having won eight out of their last 12. They have beaten Portsmouth and Charlton this season, but haven't managed to take three points away at a team in the top seven.

A First Division side in the 1980s, the U's have slowly filtered down the pyramid and found themselves out of the league altogether, spending four seasons in the Conference, before winning promotion back to League Two in 2010.


Six years in the fourth tier came to an end when a team that included the likes of Danny Hylton and Johnny Mullins won promotion in 2016. They also reached two consecutive Checkatrade

Trophy finals – once at our expense – only to be beaten on both occasions at Wembley.

Their squad has changed drastically since then, with manager Chris Wilder moving onto boyhood club and now Premier League bound Sheffield United, whilst Kemar Roofe and Chey Dunkley are plying their trade in the Championship with Leeds United and Wigan Athletic.

Grenoble Road this season has been where Oxford have really found their form – winning just under half the games they have played there (11), and are generally involved in entertaining affairs, with at least three goals scored in nearly 60 per cent of their matches. They've actually suffered fewer defeats on the road than they have at home, but drawing has been what has stopped them pushing for a place in the top six, picking up a point in 11 games, winning on just four occasions. That said, three out of those four victories have come in their last three away games.

Second in the form table (last eight games), today's game will no doubt be one of the toughest the Hatters have faced this campaign.

THE GAFFER

Karl Robinson | Age: 38

The U's boss never made an appearance in the EFL as a player, but has made several as a manager, securing his first managerial role at MK Dons in 2010. In his first two seasons with the club, he led the Dons to the League One Play-Offs in as many years, falling just short of Wembley with two semi-final defeats. In 2014-15, Robinson finally avoided the dreaded Play-Offs altogether and secured the second automatic promotion spot, guiding the club to the second tier of English football for the first time in their short history. The boss spent just over a year with Charlton Athletic before joining the U's towards the end of last season.



THE STOPPER

Simon Eastwood | Age: 29

Believe it or not, the stopper was born in Luton, but played his youth football at Huddersfield Town. When game-time became sparse with the Terriers after signing his first professional contract in

Yorkshire, the U's acquired the 29-year-old, but again, first team football was hard to come by. The keeper worked hard though, plying his trade with Halifax Town in the Conference North until Portsmouth signed him in 2012. After one season on the south coast and three in Lancashire with Blackburn Rovers, Oxford re-signed the keeper and he has been a regular between the sticks ever since.



DID YOU KNOW?

The £69,000 transfer fee that saw Oxford sign their second-highest goalscorer of all-time James Constable, the striker who helped fire them out of the Conference ahead of the Hatters in 2009-10, was paid to Shrewsbury Town by Stewart Donald, who is now the owner of the Town's League One promotion rivals Sunderland. Donald's company Bridle Insurance sponsored the U's.

GOALKEEPER

JACK STEVENS

AGE: 21

The young goalkeeper came through the ranks with the U's and was handed his first ever start over the Easter period, coming in for the suspended Eastwood.

LUKE GARBUTT

AGE: 25

Currently on-loan from Everton, the full-back is capped for England from the U16s, all the way up to U21 level. Won the UEFA European Under-17 Championship for the Three Lions in 2010.

THE WALL

Curtis Nelson

Age: 25

The centre-half signed his first professional deal with Plymouth Argyle and went on to play more than 200 matches for the Pilgrims. In his first season as a senior player, Nelson won the Young Player of the Year award too. The 25-year-old spent seven years with Argyle, also skippering the side to the League Two Play-Off final against AFC Wimbledon, narrowly losing 2-0 on the day. That was to be the defender's last match on the south coast, signing for the U's in 2016. Nelson has scored four goals this season, including an important winner away at Coventry.



IN THE MIDDLE

Josh Ruffels | Age: 25

The local lad began his career with Coventry, eventually signing for his home town club in 2013. Since then, the midfielder has gone on to play more than 200 matches for the U's, making himself an integral part of the club. The 25-year-old was part of the Oxford side to win promotion from League Two in 2015-16 and has also appeared in two Checkatrade Trophy final defeats at Wembley. The ex-Coventry man netted his fourth goal of the season at the end of March, clinching a 90th minute winner for the U's over Wycombe.



ROB DICKIE

Age: 23

After failing to make an impact at Reading, Dickie signed for Oxford in January last year. Won the National League title in 2015-16 while on-loan at Cheltenham Town.

JOHN MOUSINHO

Age: 33



Scored the only goal in the League Two Play-Off final for Stevenage against Torquay to send the club up to League One for the first time in their history.

SAM LONG

Age: 24

A U's academy graduate, Long has spent time on-loan with Kidderminster Harriers and Hampton & Richmond. The versatile centre-half can also play on the left or right side of defence.

JAMIE HANSON

Age: 23

Signed from Derby County at the start of this season. Capped for England U20s and has enjoyed a loan spell with Wigan Athletic.

GAVIN WHYTE**AGE: 23**

Scored an impressive hat-trick over Shrewsbury Town last Monday, taking his tally up to ten for this season. Also capped for Northern Ireland.

JAMES HENRY**AGE: 29**

Played more than a century of matches for Millwall, gaining promotion to the Championship with the Lions in 2010 – a feat he managed with Wolves four years later.

CLASSIC CLASH WITH UNITED

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES INTO HIS ARCHIVES...

1ST SEPTEMBER 1970 • LUTON TOWN 4 OXFORD UNITED 0

After the Town scraped through to win promotion back to the old Division Two at the end of the 1969/70 season, deficiencies in the squad were quickly identified and efforts were made to attract top name players to Kenilworth Road.

One of the major plus points of being a relatively successful side on the back of a promotion is the ability to attract players that the supporters have actually heard of. This was certainly true over the summer of 1970 as Jim Ryan and Don Givens were signed from Manchester United, Roger Hoy from Crystal Palace and David Court from Arsenal.

All the new signings, with the exception of Court, made their debuts on the opening day of the new season, away at Bolton. For this, the Town's first game in Division Two (now the Championship) since 1963, Viv Busby, Alan Starling and Terry Branston were preferred to Court, Tony Read and Chris Nicholl, which seemed strange to the many supporters who made the trip to Burnden Park on two special trains.

The supporters' fears were vindicated as the Town went down 4-2 to a team that was to finish rock bottom at the end of the season. With tiny wingers Gordon Taylor and Terry Wharton running rings around the Luton defence, the latter helping himself to a hat-trick, it was a shell-shocked Hatters manager, Alec Stock, who faced the press at the end of the game.

"I didn't feel very good about that one," said Stock. "The goals we gave away were scandalous."

It was therefore back to the drawing board in preparation for the visit of Norwich to Kenilworth Road the following Saturday.

Unsurprisingly, the three players missing on the

opening day were back in the side but the Canaries, fearing a newly promoted side in their first game in front of their own fans, decided to shut up shop with 0-0 the only likely outcome.

Norwich manager, Ron Saunders, admitted that he had come for a point and warned that most sides would visit Kenilworth Road with a similar game plan, adding that it was down to the home side to force the play.


Alec Stock was reasonably pleased with the point and could see that his players were quickly learning about life in Division Two, but next up was a difficult trip to one of the pre-season promotion favourites, Birmingham City.

A crowd of 30,141 were present at St Andrew's to see a strong Blues side attempt to intimidate the Hatters, but the players were now, only two weeks into the season, made of stronger stuff.

Although Birmingham took an early lead through Geoff Vowden, the Town were always in the game and for the first time we looked like a Division Two side with fast and incisive football worrying the Blues' defence.

The deserved equaliser came with seven minutes left when Malcolm Macdonald was upended in the box, just as he was about to slot the ball into the net. The ball ran through to Hoy, who fired home but the referee had already pointed to the spot.

In front of the fiercely partisan crowd, Macdonald kept his cool and calmly slotted the ball into the

back of the net. The Hatters were now ready to be taken more seriously.

With newfound confidence the Town were ready to take on Oxford at Kenilworth Road on the following Tuesday evening. Oxford were, at that stage, unbeaten and had won both of their away games at Middlesbrough and Millwall, so arrived at Kenilworth Road as confident as the Town.

If supporters felt that the display at Birmingham proved there was little to fear in Division Two, then the subsequent hammering of Oxford showed that the Town were now truly ready for the big time. The crowd of 16,173 were treated to bold, attacking football played with speed; the Town two up early on and three up by the interval.

Oxford had showed their hand before the game by announcing that they were about to attack the Town right from the start, but as they started shipping goals they seemed unable to alter their formation which gave the Hatters ample opportunity to improve their goal average.

Matt Tees, recalled at Birmingham to replace the injured Jim Ryan, had probably his best game in a Luton shirt and thumped home two of the goals with his head following precision crosses from Court and John Ryan.

The other two goals in the eventual 4-0 victory came from the trusty left peg of Macdonald, who was now showing that he was fully capable of scoring at this level and would soon bring the scouts flocking to Kenilworth Road.

'Radiant Luton come to boil' shouted out the headline in the Evening Post, with the reporter saying, 'With one of the most entertaining displays of powerful, high speed football that I have ever seen them give, Luton demolished Oxford. They pounded them into the turf with as good a performance as you are ever likely to see.' The reporter's only criticism of the evening was the size of the crowd!

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REPORTS ON UNITED'S LAST VISIT TO KENILWORTH ROAD

CHECKATRADE TROPHY SOUTHERN AREA FINAL.

After fighting their way through the group stages of the Checkatrade Trophy, the Town had seen off Swindon and Chesterfield from the League above before beating Yeovil to earn a place in the Area Final.

Their opponents were to be Oxford, again from a league higher, and being only one step from Wembley, the competition took on greater interest with 6,901 turning up at Kenilworth Road.

The game turned out to be a thriller with the Town's Jake Gray missing an early opportunity before United took the lead on ten minutes through Phil Edwards. The Hatters responded well but could not force the ball home despite several decent chances.

The second goal that Oxford had been threatening sporadically came early in the second half when a Marvin Johnson cross took a wicked deflection off Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu to loop over Matt Macey in the Luton goal.

The Town got a lifeline on 73 minutes when Isaac Vassell slammed home before a combination of

poor finishing and Macey prevented Oxford from putting the game to bed.

Back came the Hatters and Danny Hylton, against his old club, nodded home from close range seemingly to take the game to a penalty shoot-out. Oxford had other ideas though, and following a short corner routine, Johnson thrashed the ball into the top corner from distance.

There was still time for substitute Jack Marriott to force a brilliant save from Simon Eastwood in the Oxford goal, but with everyone camped in the Oxford half, including Macey, United managed to hold on for the referee to blow time on a breathless cup-tie.






◀ September 1971


▶ April 1974


◀ February 1988

A crazy top-flight game at Kenilworth Road finishes 7-4 to the Town. Mark Stein nets a hat-trick as both defences are all over the place.




▶ March 1993


▲ September 1999


▲ December 2001

DEADLY DUOS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES FOUR NOTABLE POST-WAR OXFORD UNITED GOALSCORING PARTNERSHIPS

NIGEL CASSIDY & HUGH CURRAN

Striker Nigel Cassidy was Oxford United's leading marksman in 1971-72. He was an important figure in Lowestoft Town's 1966-67 Eastern Counties League and Cup 'treble' success, moving to Norwich City in July 1967.

Moving to Scunthorpe United in December 1968, he starred alongside Kevin Keegan as they reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1969-70 and joined Oxford United for £20,000 in November 1970. Scoring 33 times in 116 League games, he moved to Cambridge United March 1974, then managed Bicester and Banbury. He ran the Molesworth Arms hotel in Wadebridge until his death in May 2008.

Former Scotland international striker Hugh Curran was Oxford United's top scorer in two consecutive seasons. He had spells with Manchester United, Shamrock Rovers, Third Lanark and Corby before moving to Millwall in March 1964. Top scorer in their 1964-65 promotion success, he played for Norwich City and Wolves prior to joining Oxford United in September 1972. He starred as they attained their then-highest position in 1972-73, moving to Bolton in September 1974.


Rejoining Oxford United in July 1977, he netted 39 goals in 105 League games overall, then managed Banbury United and Thame, becoming a publican.

JOHN ALDRIDGE & BILLY HAMILTON

Republic of Ireland international striker John Aldridge gained the first seven of his 69 caps while at Oxford United. Initially with South Liverpool, he joined Newport County in May 1979 and starred as they won promotion in 1979-80 and were ECWC quarter-finalists in 1980-81. He moved to the Manor Ground for £70,000 in March 1984 and was leading marksman as Oxford won the Second Division title in 1984-85 and Milk Cup in 1985-86.

Scoring 72 times in 114 League games for United, he joined Liverpool for £775,000 in January 1987 and later starred for Real Sociedad and Tranmere Rovers where he was player-manager.

Northern Ireland international striker Billy Hamilton was capped six times while at Oxford United. Initially with Linfield, he featured in their 1977-78 'double' success and moved to QPR in April 1978. He joined Burnley in November 1979 and was leading marksman as they won the Third Division title in 1981-82, then were League Cup semi-finalists in 1982-83. Moving to the Manor Ground for £95,000 in August 1984, he starred in Oxford's 1984-85 Second Division title campaign and netted 12 times in 32 League games until injury ended his career. He managed Limerick and Distillery, then ran a sports shop in Bangor.

DEAN SAUNDERS & MARTIN FOYLE

Welsh international striker Dean Saunders was top scorer as Oxford United were League Cup semi-finalists in 1987-88. Initially with Swansea City, he moved to Brighton in August 1985 and joined Oxford in March 1987.

He netted 22 goals in 59 League games while at the Manor Ground before being sold to Derby County for £1m in October 1988. Joining Liverpool for £2.9m in July 1991, he featured in their 1992 FA Cup final triumph and later played for Aston Villa, Galatasaray, Nottingham Forest, Sheffield United, Benfica, Bradford City and Blackburn Rovers. He has since held various managerial posts.

Striker Martin Foyle was Oxford United's leading scorer in 1988-89. Signing professional for Southampton in August 1980, he joined Aldershot in July 1984, starring in their 1986-87 promotion success and FA Cup run. He moved to Oxford United for £140,000 in March 1987, having starred against them in that season's FA Cup upset. Helping Oxford to reach the League Cup semi-finals in 1987-88, he netted 36 goals in 126 League games before sold to Port Vale for a record £375,000 in June 1991. He was later Vale's manager and has since had spells in charge of York City, Northwich Victoria, Hereford United and Southport.

PAUL MOODY & JOEY BEAUCHAMP

Striker Paul Moody was leading marksman in Oxford United's 1995-96 promotion campaign. He starred in Fareham Town's 1986-87 FA Trophy run, joining Waterloo in July 1988 and twice finishing top scorer. Moving to Southampton for £50,000 in July 1991, he joined Oxford United for £60,000 in February 1994 and netted 49 goals in 136 League games before sold to Fulham for £200,000 in July 1997. He was a promotion winner again in 1998-99, then joined Millwall in July 1999 and repeated the feat in 2000-01. Briefly rejoining Oxford in September 2001, he later played for Aldershot Town and Gosport Borough.

Widely regarded as one of Oxford United's finest discoveries, flying winger Joey Beauchamp starred in the 1995-96 promotion success. Signing professional at the Manor Ground in May 1989, he helped Oxford triumph at top-flight Leeds United in the 1993-94 FA Cup fourth round replay and moved to West Ham for £1m in June 1994. He failed to settle at Upton Park and moved to Swindon Town two months later, rejoining Oxford for £75,000 in October 1995.

A favourite with his spectacular goals and dazzling runs, he scored 63 times in 362 League games overall before joining Abingdon in August 2002, then Didcot Town.


Town controlled the game and deservedly took the lead when Lee bundled in from Jack Stacey's low cross.

Piggott got the visitors back on level terms as he converted from close range just before the half-


hour, before the Hatters regained the lead through James Collins who headed in from James Justin's cross five minutes before half-time.


The Dons got their equaliser in the dying moments when Marek Stech saved Piggott's effort, but it bounced up kindly for Seddon who headed in.






"I've said to the players in there, we've got a chance, one last chance next week


"I think Burton thoroughly deserved the victory, I thought they played very well, with their movement they were very good and we

couldn't contain them at times. So you've got to give them a little bit of credit, but overall we're very, very disappointed.



SUMMER






MARCH



YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME PRE-ACADEMY U9 TO U16'S HOLLAND TOUR 2019

Our Pre-Academy squads travelled out to Holland again this Easter and enjoyed our most successful tour for some years with four outright wins from the U9s up to U12s, and three third place finishes from the U14s, U15s and U16s who were all playing up an age group.

Our first day results were the best they could have been with all age groups qualifying in the top two placings to qualify for the main competition on Day 2 – that's a magnificent 10 teams all qualifying and guaranteeing Day 2 would be both exciting but extremely challenging.

Our two U16 squads thundered their way through the first day's U17 groups with five wins and a draw between them and only one goal conceded all day. Impressive performances against Dutch, Belgian, Danish and German opponents. Fate then drew them together in the first game of Day 2 in an all British group meaning only one team could progress to the final and a 1-0 win for our North 16s looked



decisive, but a last minute penalty miss in the last group game denied them a place in the final, although they recovered to win the play-off 1-0 and claim third place. A great effort.

We also entered two U15 teams in the U16 section; one from the pre-academy and one from our centre of excellence (COFEX) and while our COFEX boys got off to a great start with a 2-0 win, the competition proved tough after that with only one further win, but a couple of good draws in their six games.

Our U15 pre-academy boys also got a couple of good draws and a 2-0 win on Day 1 to make the top four group, where two wins and a draw meant a second place finish in the group and a 3/4th play-off which they won 3-2 to clinch a third place finish.

On to the U14s, where a 2-0 win in game one proved decisive and followed with two 1-1 draws, was enough to



secure top spot and a place in the top four group placings. Same again on Day 2 with two 1-1 draws and a 3-0 win meaning a runner-up spot in the group and a third place finish.

Our u13 squad battled through to a 2-2 draw in their final Day 1 group game to again qualify for the finals, but one win and two defeats proved a tough final day. Both our U14 an U13 squads deserve great credit as these age groups present the biggest physical challenge in playing up a year on full size pitches and both squads showed the capacity to compete physically and come back from set-backs.

Day 1 for our U9 to U12 squads did bode well with 14 wins out of 15 games, and 79 goals scored with only seven conceded – leaving quite a few English EFL Clubs development squads chasing shadows and a few opposition parents lost for words! Day 2 followed pretty much the same with the U9s not conceding a goal and clinching the cup with a 0-0 final game v Nottingham Forest; U10s didn't concede until the final where a 3-2 over Danish



opponents AFC Alkmaar clinched victory; U11s also only conceded once all day and a 1-0 victory v Forest (not you lot again!) in the final sealed victory, and to complete the quartet of winning cup finals, the U12s put West Brom to the sword on their way to the final where Dutch side SV Hooten

where the only team to score against them in all seven games, but conceding four from the Luton boys meant another Cup on the way back to Bedfordshire.

Overall, a very successful weekend saw seven trophies return among our ten touring squads, and a great experience for the boys and a testament to the underlying strength among our shadow academy squad boys who are striving to achieve a full schoolboy academy place.

"Nothing will stop her watching her beloved club, she is now living in Colchester and still holds a season ticket and travels to every single home game and a handful of away games every season."


J BLOCK CHARITY AWAY DAY

Hatters let two goal lead slip in penultimate game

Luton headed into this game knowing that their final two matches this season would be vital in their fight for survival. After some encouraging performances in recent weeks, the general feeling around the team was one of optimism with the season finale approaching.

The Hatters made a promising start to this encounter with mid-table Ipswich Town, Jess McKay and Remi Bains looking sharp in the early stages. After 20 minutes, it was Bains who gave Luton a deserved lead in rather bizarre circumstances, as she tenaciously chased down a through ball, and the Ipswich keeper's clearance ricocheted back off the forward and looped into the net.

Just three minutes later, the visitors doubled their advantage, this time through McKay, who carried the ball past the Tractor Girls' defence with pace and power before finishing coolly.

Any Ipswich threat was quickly eliminated by Rachel Carter and Rachel Kosky, backed up by a solid showing from stand-in keeper Amy Butler.

The game reached the halfway mark with Luton two goals ahead, and just 45 minutes away from a huge three points in their battle against relegation. Ipswich, however, used the break to make a triple substitution in what seemed like a desperate roll of the dice.

The gamble paid off pretty quickly: 15 minutes after the restart, the hosts got a goal back with an intelligent finish from close range.

Within minutes they were back on terms with a stunning bicycle kick from outside the box, and then almost took the lead when they struck the bar with a long-range effort.

With 20 minutes left on the clock, Ipswich completed their comeback with a scrappy goal after some pinball inside the six-yard box. The impressive Suffolk side didn't let up after their third, and added two more in the closing stages, as by this time Hatters' confidence had visibly drained away.

As has often been the case in this frustrating season, possession was surrendered too easily and opportunities to strike back weren't taken.

Overall, it was a very disappointing afternoon for Luton, missing out on a potentially massive three points with a limp second half performance after what had been such a positive first 45.

Town boss Nikki Baker said of the defeat: "It has been a tough season. Anyone who loses two top goal scorers through injury will struggle, and we have missed out in lots of games where we are unable to finish them off or hold onto leads. We are devastated that it looks like relegation but will work hard to come back to where we should be."

SIMON PITTS REVIEWS THE NUMBERS FROM A REMARKABLE SEASON



I wrote an article for the final home game against Forest Green Rovers last season. In my opening line I used the words “when you realise that you’re limited to the number of words that fit onto the page, it suddenly becomes a challenge to cover everything that this season deserves.” I have to say a year on, I’ve got exactly the same challenge.

Where do you start to try and summarise this season that, both on and off the pitch, has been beyond all expectations?

Going into the final game of the season, knowing that we are already promoted and that a win would secure the League One Championship is certainly not a position that I think anyone was expecting at the start of the season!

When you add in the 28 game Club record unbeaten League run, the 13 away League games without defeat (another Club record), the League’s Player of the Season and current top scorer James Collins and both planning applications accepted, it really has been an amazing 2018/19 season.

Firstly congratulations to those players who have picked up awards from the EFL, PFA and of course from the Supporters Trust Presentation Evening that I was honoured to be the host for last Sunday.

Winners

We were grateful that triple award winner, including Player of the Season, Jack Stacey wasn’t at the PFA dinner although he and a few others certainly had a case for being there!

James Justin and Collins were there so missed the Supporters Trust evening, and all three had been at the EFL dinner a few weeks earlier, as had Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu due to a goal being nominated for the best of 2018. Pelly was also amongst the winners on Sunday as he joined Andrew Shinnie with two awards on the night.

George Moncur was honoured with goal of the season for his free-kick against Portsmouth, which led to wild celebrations not only on the pitch and from the stands, but also in the press box where it was a pleasure to have Harry Cornick alongside me on iFollow co-commentary duties.

James Collins has become the first Luton player to score 25 League goals in a season since Tony Thorpe in 1996/97 and he’s almost assured of the Golden Boot for League One given his five-goal lead over the chasing pack.

Pelly and Matty Pearson are looking to be ever-present starters in the League campaign; you have to go back to the 2013/14 Conference Promotion winning team for a player to have started every League match in the season. In that campaign there were three, Scott Griffiths, Steve McNulty and Mark Tyler.

The incredible away support is up 12 per cent on last season with an average of 1,564 going to an away game, including trips to Sunderland and Charlton with over 3,000 travelling fans. There has also been an eight per cent increase in Luton fans at Kenilworth Road this season with an average of 8,889 at each home game prior to today.

It has already been a record-breaking season to remember, but there is a chance for it to be an absolutely fantastic season so get behind the team for the final time this season and let’s see if we can cheer them lifting the silverware at 7.30pm tonight!

HOLD THE BACK PAGE

What was the favourite phrase in your place of celebration on Tuesday night? "I didn't see that coming" or "I've always liked Peterborough" or Mrs Oxley's favourite "Thank goodness that's over" - or words to that effect.

Three-two has been a favourite scoreline in Luton Town history – Wembley 1988 and the 1994 FA Cup quarter-final replay spring immediately to mind – and now in years to come I can see future Hatters fans gathering in the museum section at Power Court to view the special Ivan Toney display. The Peterborough striker wouldn't have expected that when he trooped off following a 4-0 defeat here back in January.

But don't you have just a smidgen of disappointment we can't have another last day decider? No, me neither. The potential for heartbreak and the unpredictability of the play-offs far outweighed the chance of a glorious finale this evening. And of course there is the title to be decided today. When I first took my seat in the Kenilworth Road pressbox, last day deciders were the norm – but from 1989 to 1993 it was at the other end of the table.

There are so many great memories from this season. The late goals at Oxford and Walsall; the thrashings of Plymouth and Doncaster here; the win over Portsmouth in the snow; but my stand out moment was the pre-match walk by the players to the fans at Sunderland in the immediate aftermath of "Jonesgate". That told me all I needed to know about this group. Not forgetting of course two council planning meetings which have greater significance long-term than anything on the pitch.

I think it's only fair to recognise the contribution of Nathan Jones at this point, but this is Mick Harford's promotion. Shall we order the statue now?

There have been some nerves lately, but this club has not been alone in feeling the pressure in the final weeks. World-renowned players are falling over themselves not to qualify for the Champions League; Leeds have seen automatic promotion hopes in the Championship melt away; and in League Two, despite a combined three wins from their last 10 games, one of MK Dons and Mansfield will be promoted today.

A year ago we were basking in the sun at Meadow Lane, already promoted and fully expecting Notts County to join us via the play-offs. Now, 12 months on, we are heading to the Championship and they are one game away from the National League – and without a minus 30 point handicap.

You never know what football can spring on you, so soak it up this evening. I tend to get a bit emotional on these occasions. I'm sure many of you will be enjoying today but thinking of those here only in spirit. I know Brian Swain would have thoroughly enjoyed reporting on this season, and Ian Pearce likewise. Mick Harford came to Pearcey's funeral. Family aside, amidst all the friends and colleagues and members of the wider Luton community, I think Mick's attendance would have meant the most to Ian. He certainly went up even higher in my estimations. Legend as a player, legend as a manager, and legend as a man.
