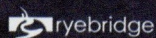

Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this Carabao Cup first round tie against Ipswich Town.

I'll start by extending that welcome to everyone who has travelled west from Suffolk, including all the Portman Road officials, supporters, manager Paul Lambert, his staff and their squad.

Paul is a hugely experienced manager who I've come up against several times in the past. He'll make sure they regroup following the disappointment of relegation last season and bounce back stronger, and they've certainly made a solid start to their League One campaign. I wish them well.

If we get half the entertainment tonight that we had for our opening fixture of the season against Middlesbrough we'll all be in for a good night. It was a match that summed up why everyone loves the Championship – six goals, a missed penalty and some wonderful football in front of the TV cameras and a full house.

On that note, I have to say thank you for the atmosphere you generated from the stands. I'd been told about these famous nights under the Kenilworth Road lights and my first experience didn't disappoint, I can tell you.

Pound for pound, it was the best crowd that a team I've been involved with has played before. You were with the lads all the way and it was the finest example possible of supporters staying with the team at every scoreline within the game, and showing understanding and belief we would get something positive from the game.

We'll need more of that every time we play this season if we are to achieve in this division, and again – although smaller in number with it being an away game – the backing we received in south Wales on Saturday was outstanding. I asked the players to go out and be themselves, to do what they've been doing for the couple of years' success that they've brought to this club.

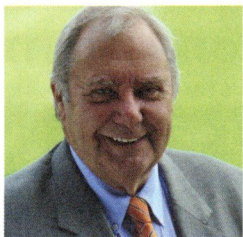
Cardiff were a Premier League side until a couple of months ago and they showed the ruthless nature that we have to get to. We were focussed for 94 minutes, but if the game lasts 95 then that moment you switch off for will cost you. We have a fantastic opportunity to bounce back tonight however, in a competition that we want to make progress in.

We added three players on transfer deadline day from top Premier League clubs and saw the first, James Bree, in action during the latter stages of Saturday's game. Izzy Brown and Luke Bolton will be terrific additions for the season too, along with our new head of sports science James Redden, and I know you will make them all feel welcome as you have myself and the other newcomers this summer.

Enjoy the game, get behind the lads again and help us into round two.

It was at Portman Road in October 2006, the last time we were in the Championship, that our decline out of the Football League began. We had finished tenth in the previous season and were going quite well, coming off a 5-1 victory against Leeds at home, when our then full-back Sol Davis had a stroke on the coach on the way to Ipswich. Despite this it was ruled that the game should go ahead, and we were not surprisingly thumped 5-0.

We never recovered, winning only four more games out of the remaining 32 before being relegated at the end of the season. Thankfully Sol recovered, but momentum was lost and the process of players being sold to cover overspending by the then-management led ultimately to further relegations, administration and points deductions.

I mention this not wishing to harp on about the past, but we all see how generous the EFL are being to Bolton and Bury. There was no such generosity afforded to us, in fact very much the opposite. We would never have been allowed to start a season without proof of funding. There are many examples of clubs being punished over the past 11

years and none have been as harshly treated as us even where their actions were patently worse.

On the pitch we look for consistency from officials and we should expect it from our rulers. Everyone makes mistakes and we accept wrong-doing must be punished, but it should surely be even handed. If we were in any other business we would potentially have major claims against those who caused us loss, particularly as there are so many examples of clubs subsequently being treated more reasonably. The claims would be for many tens of millions of pounds, not just for the cost of being out of the League, but also the consequent diminution in value of our assets including players lost to other clubs because of it.

We believe it is right that the EFL seek to protect clubs and their communities, which is why we are still so bitter about what happened to us. We have recovered, but with no help from the authorities and at significant cost to ourselves – our only crime being to rescue a 125-year-old football club in the heart of its community. We could have been back at this level earlier, in a new stadium and have a team filled with quality home grown players.

Gary's comprehensive notes in the last programme took most of the wind out of my sails for this one, so I thought we might consider a little more of the journey we have been on in the last 11 years.

Gary and I were chatting in the car on the way to Cardiff about exactly that. Which is the lowliest club now that we have played in a league game? Histon, Salisbury, Grays, Kettering, Altrincham, Eastbourne, Hayes & Yeading. Some have been reformed, but Grays and Histon are both at level eight in the Isthmian League.

One of our most vivid memories of the Conference years was the 2012 play-off final against York City. The misery we all felt after Matty Blair's offside goal won the day. Having beaten us to promotion they are now in National League North, which is level six of the pyramid – a turn round of five levels in seven years.

We all have our different memories of the best and worst of the last 11 years, but the change has been rapid and dramatic. Momentum can be a powerful thing and as a Club we have as much experience of it as any, but it needs to be supported with positive thoughts and deeds.

On the final day of the transfer window we signed three players on loan from Manchester City, Chelsea and Aston Villa. It further demonstrates how far we have come that top Premier League Clubs recognise and will deal with us, whereas when we were in the National Conference we were hard pushed to get players from League Two. In a perfect world we prefer not to have to loan players, but in our current circumstances and to help us improve our quality at a price we can afford, it is a helpful additional tool.

We are all excited that they have agreed to join us and on behalf of us all I welcome Luke Bolton, James Bree and Izzy Brown to our football club. We all hope you have a happy, enjoyable and successful time with us, and in Luke's case, we have an option to buy next summer.

Our signings in this window have added over 1,000 Championship games (and 100 in the Premier League) to our experience. Before this window we had only 365 Championship games under our belt, of which Kaz was 199 of them.

I'm writing this on Sunday afternoon having had a bit of time to reflect on our first two Championship games. Obviously, we were gutted with the way we lost at Cardiff, but I thought we acquitted ourselves very well having ridden our luck a bit early on. We have not looked out of our depth in either game and are playing some very attractive and exciting football.

It's clear that mistakes are punished much more at this level and the quality at dead-ball situations is much higher, but these are all things which are controllable, and at which we can improve. I for one am more excited by the prospect of the season ahead after seeing those games.

This evening's game sees the return of one of the members of our League Two promotion winning team from just over a year ago - with Flynn Downes now a big part of Paul Lambert's Ipswich side.

The midfielder made ten appearances after joining us on loan from the Tractor Boys in January 2018, playing a significant role as we won promotion to the third tier.

"I really enjoyed myself at Luton, big time," Flynn explained. "I wasn't exactly enjoying my football at the time before the move, so it came at a really good time. When I arrived at Luton, the fans, the staff and players made me feel welcome and it was something I really needed. I got back to enjoying my football again.

"As a young player when you're expected to be involved every week, you've got to be energetic and I felt I was lacking that a little bit. I wasn't feeling like myself and when I went to Luton it was like a breath of fresh air.

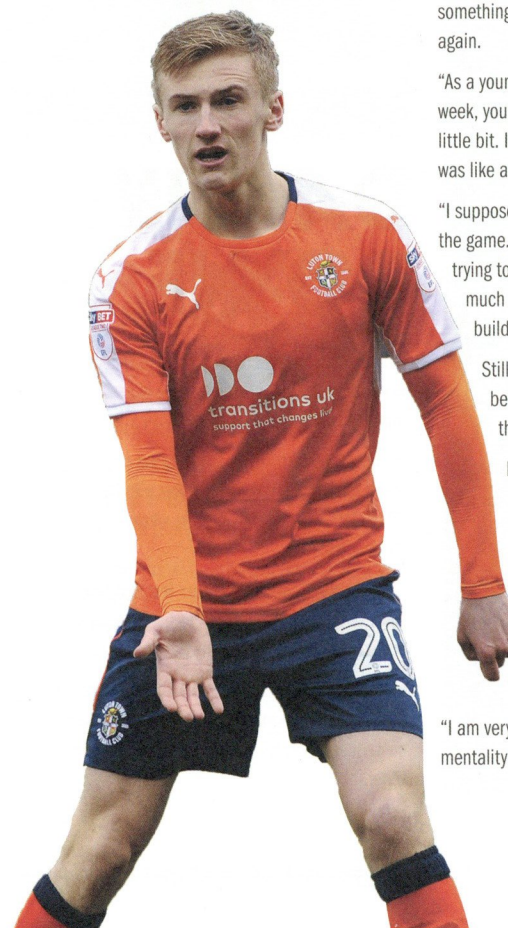
"I suppose at the time I didn't realise I was learning a lot about the game. I was inconsistent which sometimes young players trying to break through can be, so looking back I realise how much I have developed since then. Luton was a massive building block for me."

Still only 20, Downes reflects on that few months as the best time of his career - an experience he is massively thankful for.

He continued: "The experience of promotion - some players don't experience that in their whole careers. It was 100 per cent my career highlight. We were always on a buzz, so I want to get that back this season.

"I want to say a massive thank you to everyone at the club. I was still young, still learning, but everyone made me feel welcome and made me feel at ease.

"I am very grateful for that. I hope I can bring that winning mentality from that season to Ipswich this year."

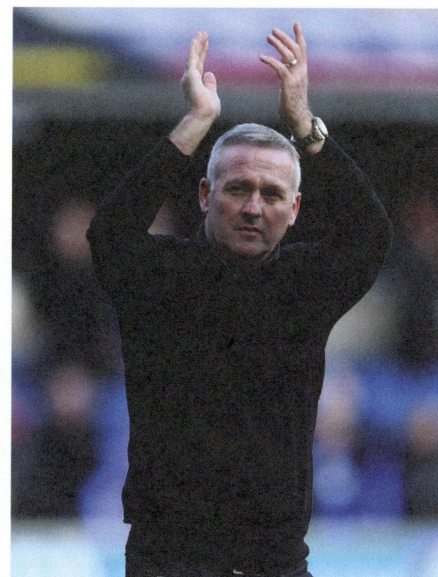
With Ipswich having dropped down to League One, Danny Rowe looks set to make a name for himself after returning from loan spells at Lincoln City.

His career at Portman Road didn't get off to the best of starts under Mick McCarthy, and likewise with Paul Lambert in the 2018/19 Championship season, where he played a total of 32 minutes.

However, the 27-year-old winger featured heavily in the Imps' successful campaign last term where they won League Two and were promoted to League One.

In Ipswich's opening encounter with Burton Albion, Rowe caused many a problem for left-back Colin Daniel and consequently forced a collection of superb saves from Kieran O'Hara.

PAUL LAMBERT

Lambert took over as Ipswich boss with the club at the bottom of the Championship in October 2018, having managed rivals Norwich City six years previously.

The former defensive midfielder won the Champions League with Borussia Dortmund in 1997, but was unable to make such a positive impact in East Anglia.

Despite an attempt to resurrect the Tractor Boys' season with several January transfer window signings, the club finished rock bottom behind Bolton Wanderers whose season was blighted with financial troubles.

The 50-year-old holds a vast amount of managerial experience and that status will prove vital in Ipswich's bid to bounce back.

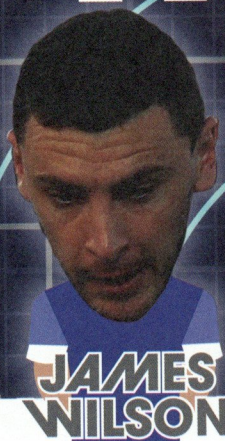

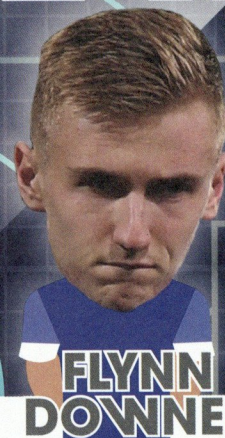

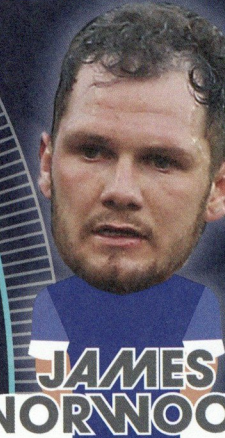

Downes also had his opportunity on the international stage after being called up to both U19 and U20 England squads - he was capped on five occasions for the U19s.

He started against the Brewers on the opening day and looked comfortable marauding the middle of the park, while also assisting Luke Garbutt's match defining strike.

The 28-year-old's eye for goal continued to help Tranmere and guided them to League One via the Play-Offs once again in 2019.

Norwood finished his exceptional 2018/19 season as League Two Player of the Year and also as joint top goal scorer in English football with 32 goals in all competitions, tied with Manchester City's Sergio Aguero.

The summer of 2017 brought its usual merry-go-round of player movement as manager Nathan Jones attempted to put behind him the play-off heartbreak of the previous campaign when the Town had gone out to Blackpool,

In came Alan McCormack, Marek Stech, James Shea, James Collins, Andrew Shinnie and Jack Stacey, and the Town showed they meant business by starting their 2017-18 League Two season with a thumping 8-2 home win over Yeovil.

The following match was a Carabao Cup clash with Championship side Ipswich at Kenilworth Road. Having disposed of the

likes of Bristol City and Aston Villa in the competition in the recent past, the Hatters were quietly confident.

Fielding eight of the side which had thrashed Yeovil, the Town got off to a bright start and Collins just failed to meet a Shinnie cross in the opening exchanges.

Ipswich, though, were made of sterner stuff than Yeovil and with debutant Bersant Celina causing the Luton defence problems with his darting runs from midfield, it was his clever through ball that set up David McGoldrick for the opening goal on 34 minutes.

The Town battled hard and spurned several half chances, but Ipswich also caused problems at the other end as the game opened out.

In the second period the contest continued in the same vein but as the Town pushed up, they always left themselves open to a counter attack which is what happened in stoppage time, when McGoldrick ran through the Hatters defence to slot home his second and with it the tie.

WORTHINGTON CUP ROUND 2 SECOND LEG

Although the Town started off the 1998-99 campaign with a good win at Wycombe, they were expected to quickly come down to earth with a bang against Division One (now Championship) side Oxford United in Round One of the Worthington Cup.

And so it proved. Oxford's Matt Murphy gave the away side a 2-0 interval lead and although a half-time roasting from manager Lennie Lawrence led to the Town pulling back to 2-2, courtesy of two Graham Alexander penalties, the defence went to sleep again allowing Simon Weatherstone to net the winner with two minutes to go.

The second leg was looked on as being a formality, especially when Phil Whelan headed home on 24 minutes to take the game to 4-2 on aggregate.

With the game seemingly out of reach, Phil Gray pulled a goal back before half-time and in a determined performance after the interval, the Town scored twice through Sean Evers and Paul McLaren.

Allied to backs to the wall defending, the Hatters managed to hold out for an unlikely 5-4 aggregate victory.

Next up were another Division One side, Ipswich, who were making a concerted effort to return to the Premier League.

In the first leg at Portman Road, the Town were forced to play three 18 year olds – Matt Spring, Michael McIndoe and debutant Jimmy Cox – in midfield, but the trio acquitted themselves well by using their speed to unsettle the Ipswich defence.

It came as a surprise therefore, when James Scowcroft volleyed Ipswich into the lead just after the interval, but Stuart Douglas took advantage of an error by big Frenchman Manuel Thetis to level the scores on 60 minutes.

Thetis made amends for his mistake with ten minutes to go when the ball ricocheted around the Luton area before falling at his feet when he gratefully snapped up the chance.

In the second leg at Kenilworth Road, the Ipswich game plan appeared to be to pull everyone back behind the ball and then use the pace of David Johnson to attack on the break.

The plan appeared to be working a treat when a quick move involving Micky Stockwell and Scowcroft allowed Johnson to apply the finishing touch on 35 minutes.

At 3-1 the tie seemed over, but Andrew Fotiadis, in for the injured Gray, robbed Thetis on the byline before heading towards goal and slipping the ball under Ipswich keeper Richard Wright.

The Town then gambled by pushing skipper and centre-half Steve Davis up front and he was instrumental in setting up the aggregate equaliser which was forced home by Douglas with a deflected shot.

With the crowd going wild the game moved into extra-time, and the ploy of leaving Davis up front seemed to be producing dividends when he rose head and shoulders above everyone to direct a towering header from Alexander's flag kick into the top corner of Wright's net after 98 minutes.

There were now 22 minutes to hang on and Lawrence wisely pulled Davis back into defence where he marshalled the back line to deny Ipswich the goal which would take them through on the away goals rule.

With the game in its final minute and the Town having weathered the Ipswich storm, hero Davis turned to villain when, in attempting to clear a

Jamie Clapham cross, he headed spectacularly past Kelvin Davis in the Luton goal.

Heads did not drop though as with only seconds remaining the Town won a corner and with everyone piling into the box to try to connect to Spring's flag kick, Wright could not get a good connection on the ball and sent it looping up in the air.

Luton defender Marvin Johnson was more used to putting through his own net than scoring at the other end, but the ball fell kindly on to his head and he knocked it past everyone for the winner.

The players and crowd went mad and there was hardly time for the game to restart before the final whistle blew. A fabulous ending to a famous night.

A happy Lennie Lawrence said afterwards: "It was a great night for Luton Town Football Club and its fans. I wasn't here in the good old days but I hope that performance brought back the memories.

"Ipswich are the biggest scalp since I have been here because they are definite play-off material and they were up for it. But just as they thought they were through up pops Marvin for his one in every 300 games goal."



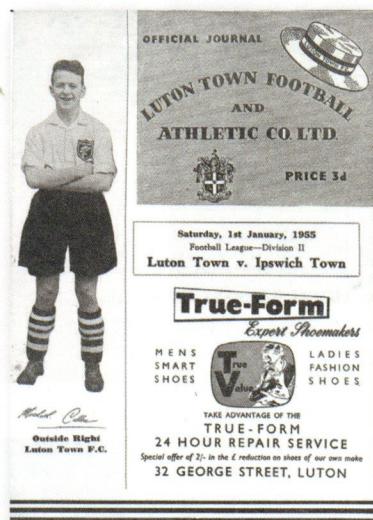

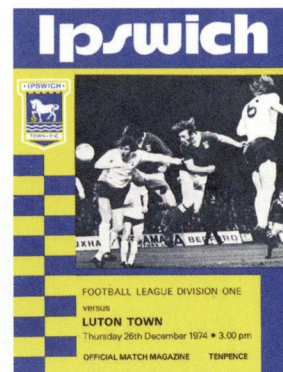
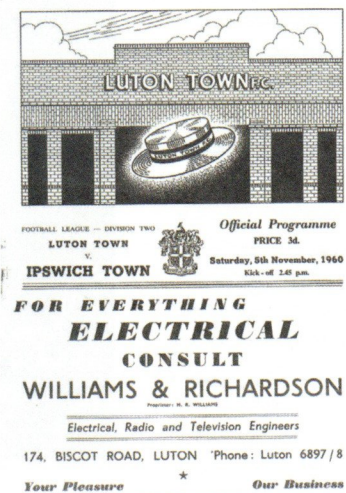


FEBRUARY 1959

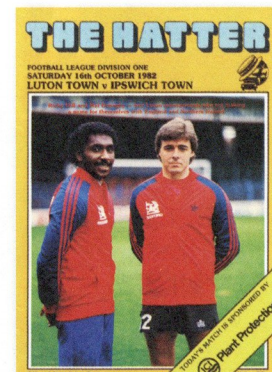


DECEMBER 1974

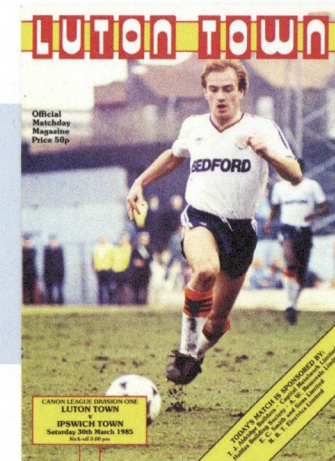
OCTOBER 1982

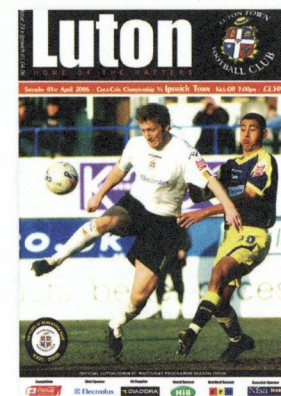


OCTOBER 1995

THE BOYS ARE BACK IN TOWN

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** PROFILES TEN PLAYERS WHO HAD MORE THAN ONE SPELL AT IPSWICH TOWN

RAY CRAWFORD

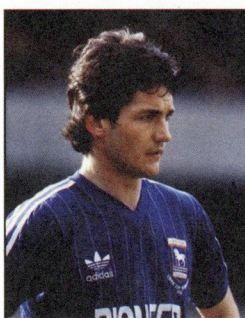
England international centre-forward Ray Crawford holds Ipswich Town's goalscoring record. Signing professional for Portsmouth in December 1954, he initially joined Ipswich in September 1958 and was top scorer as they won the Second Division and First Division titles in consecutive seasons under Alf Ramsey. He moved to Wolves in September 1963, rejoining Ipswich via West Brom in March 1966 and starring in their 1967-68 Second Division title success. Netting 203 goals in 320 League games overall, he joined Charlton Athletic in March 1969 and later played for Kettering Town, Colchester United and Durban City.

JOE BROADFOOT

Winger Joe Broadfoot had two spells at Ipswich Town. He turned professional with Millwall in January 1958 and starred in their 1961-62 Fourth Division title triumph. Sold to Ipswich Town for £16,000 in October 1963, he returned to the top-flight in a then club record £27,000 move to Northampton in November 1965. He rejoined Millwall in July 1966 and returned to Ipswich seven months later. Featuring in their 1967-68 Second Division title campaign, he

netted 19 goals in 101 League games overall before hanging up his boots in May 1968. He then had various jobs including a car valet business in Ipswich.

GEORGE BURLEY



Scotland international right-back George Burley was both a player and manager at Ipswich Town. Signing professional at Portman Road in June 1973, he starred in Ipswich's 1978 FA Cup final success and netted six goals in 394 First Division games prior to joining Sunderland

in September 1985. He later played for Gillingham and Motherwell, then was Ayr United's player-boss and managed Colchester before rejoining Ipswich as boss in December 1994. Guiding them to promotion in 1999-2000 and UEFA Cup qualification twice, he left in October 2002, then managed Derby, Hearts, Southampton, Scotland and Crystal Palace.

JOHN WARK

Scotland international favourite John Wark was top scorer and PFA 'Player of the Year' as Ipswich Town won the UEFA Cup in 1981. Signing professional at Portman Road in August 1974, he starred as Ipswich lifted the FA Youth Cup in 1975 and FA Cup in 1978. He was sold to Liverpool for £450,000 in March 1984 and won numerous European and domestic honours, returning to Ipswich in January 1988. After a year at Middlesbrough, he rejoined Ipswich again in August 1991

and helped win the Second Division title in 1991-92. He netted 135 goals in 539 League games overall before joining Ipswich's coaching staff.

JASON DOZZELL

England U-21 midfielder Jason Dozzell starred as Ipswich Town won the Second Division title in 1991-92. He turned professional with hometown Ipswich in December 1984 and also featured as they reached the Second Division play-offs in 1986-87. Sold to Tottenham Hotspur for £1,500,000 in August 1993, he briefly rejoined Ipswich in October 1997 and netted 53 goals in 340 League games overall. He moved to Northampton two months later and helped reach the Second Division play-off final in 1997-98. Joining Colchester United in October 1998, then Canvey Island, he later managed Ipswich Wanderers and Leiston.

JAMES SCOWCROFT

England U-21 striker James Scowcroft was 'Player of the Year' in Ipswich Town's 1999-2000 promotion campaign. Signing professional at Portman Road in July 1994, he starred as Ipswich qualified for the First Division play-offs in four successive seasons and UEFA Cup in 2000-01. He was sold to Leicester City for £3,000,000 and helped them to regain top-flight status at the first attempt in 2002-03. Loaned back to Ipswich in February 2005, he netted 47 goals in 211 League games overall. He joined Coventry City in July 2005, then Crystal Palace, Leyton Orient and Bury Town, since returning to Ipswich as an Academy coach.

TOMMY MILLER

Midfielder Tommy Miller had two spells at Ipswich Town. He turned professional with Hartlepool United in July 1997 and was leading marksman in 1999-2000. Starring as they qualified for the Third Division play-offs in two consecutive seasons, he joined Ipswich for a club record £800,000 in July 2001. Helping qualify for the Championship play-offs in 2004-05, he joined Sunderland in July 2005 and returned to Ipswich in July 2007. He netted 40 goals in 186 League games overall before joining Sheffield Wednesday in July 2009, then played for Huddersfield Town, Swindon Town, Bury, Hartlepool again and Halifax.

PABLO COUNAGO

Spanish U-21 striker Pablo Counago was Ipswich Town's leading marksman in 2002-03. Initially with Celta Vigo, he was

loaned to Numancia and Recreativo before joining Ipswich in July 2001. He helped them twice qualify for the Championship play-offs and returned to Spain with Malaga in May 2005. Rejoining Ipswich in July 2007, he netted 54 goals in 214 League games overall and reunited with George Burley on loan at Crystal Palace prior to joining Vietnamese side Dong Tam Long An in June 2011. He later played in Hong Kong and Finland for Kitchee, Choco, Honk, PK-35, Alondras and Choco again.

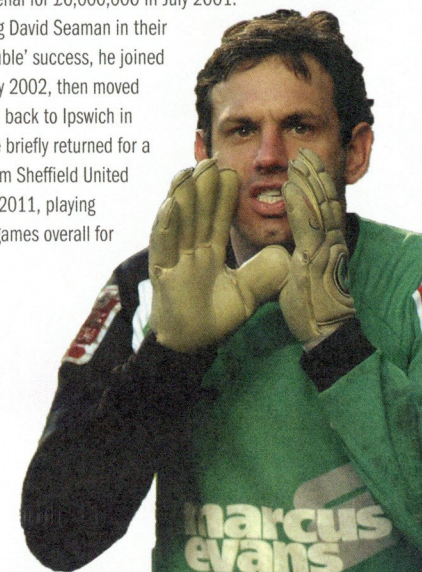
DARREN AMBROSE

England U-21 winger Darren Ambrose had three spells at Ipswich Town. Signing professional at Portman Road in July 2001, he made his League debut in Ipswich's 2-0 defeat against Arsenal in April 2002. He joined Newcastle United for £1,000,000 in March 2003, then Charlton Athletic in July 2005. Loaned back to Ipswich in November 2008, he reunited with George Burley at Crystal Palace in July 2009. He moved to Birmingham City for £250,000 in July 2012 and was loaned to Apollon Smyrni before rejoining Ipswich in September 2014. Scoring eight times in 45 League games overall, he joined Colchester in August 2015.

RICHARD WRIGHT

England international goalkeeper Richard Wright was Ipswich Town's 'Player of the Year' in 2008-09. Signing professional at Portman Road in January 1995, he was ever-present three times and starred in Ipswich's 1999-2000 promotion success. He helped qualify for the UEFA Cup in 2000-01 and moved to Arsenal for £6,000,000 in July 2001.

Understudying David Seaman in their 2001-02 'double' success, he joined Everton in July 2002, then moved via West Ham back to Ipswich in July 2008. He briefly returned for a third spell from Sheffield United in November 2011, playing 299 League games overall for Ipswich.

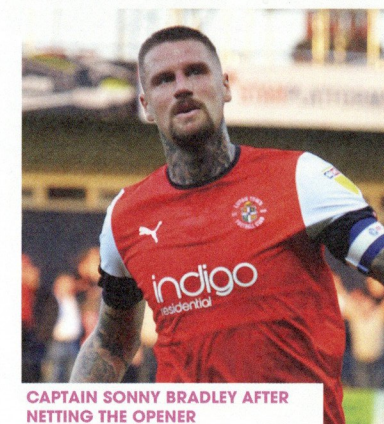
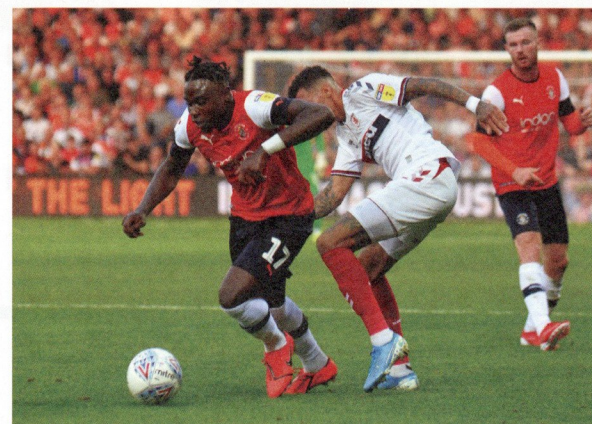

STORY OF THE MATCH

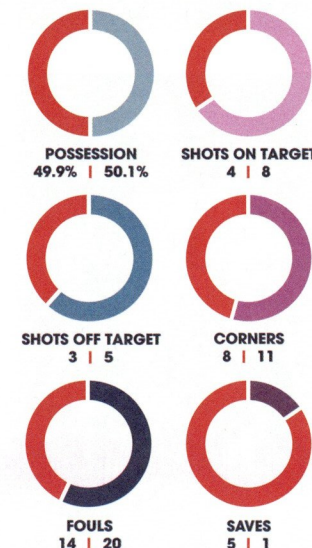
The Hatters and Middlesbrough played out an enthralling opening game for the start of the 2019-20 EFL campaign at Kenilworth Road.

COMMUNITY WEEK AT THE STADIUM ATTRACTS OVER 7,000 PARTICIPANTS AND SPECTATORS



As part of the Trust's 10-year anniversary celebrations, the Club donated the stadium to the Trust over two weekends during the close season in May, which allowed thousands of youngsters the opportunity to play on the hallowed turf at Kenilworth Road.

We kicked off the first weekend with a football tournament for over 40 Beaver and Cub packs from all over Bedfordshire, which was supported on the day by Bedfordshire Freemasons with Provincial Grand Master Tony Henderson on hand to present medals for all the eager Beavers and Cubs who took part on the day and achieved a dream of playing at the famous Kenny.

Luton Town FC Chairman David Wilkinson also came along for the day and brought out the magnificent League One trophy, which caused great excitement!

Following on from the Beavers, we had a change of gear as the professional clubs brought their PL KICKS squads to Luton for a fiercely contested competition under the lights. On the night teams from West Ham, Leyton Orient, Millwall, Coventry City to name just a few competed for the Kicks Cup, along with boys from all over Luton playing under one badge and putting aside local rivalries for the night.

Daniel Douglas, Community Operations Manager at the Trust commented: "KICKS is a fantastic project that encourages young people of all ages and abilities to come together and enjoy football.

"Often it's the first stage of a young person becoming involved with the Trust. From KICKS they may also decide to volunteer with us, or sign up for employability support. KICKS can just be about coming along to play football every night with friends,



but for the majority of students it's so much more than that – it's a step towards making positive changes within their lives."

Day 2 of our stadium community event saw the start of our biggest event of the year with our very popular two-day annual youth tournament. It involves all of the community trust staff who run the tournament, man the car parks and turnstiles, as well as catering who run the food outlets and stewards who patrol the stadium and our ground and stadium maintenance staff.

Over 50 staff members in total all make a contribution in making the weekend a huge success for everyone.

Most of important of all, of course are the 1,500 local boys and girls who take part, with everyone entering the pitch down the famous tunnel before their lap of honour around the stadium to great applause from proud and excited family members – this year over 3,000 spectators attended over the weekend.

It creates a great atmosphere and it's fantastic to see so many local children on the pitch with massive smiles – lots of them present and future Hatters – we hope!

It's then down to the serious business of the competition itself, and of course Under-6, U7 and U8 age groups are non-competitive (try telling that to a seven-year-old!) and so results are not recorded, but everyone goes home with a famous Luton Town FC medal while the U9s to U12s play to a knock-out final and a tournament winner.

WHO?

Now in their second season back in the Championship after an eight year stay in the Premier League, the Baggies have appointed former Croatia and West Ham United manager Slaven Bilic as the man to get them back up to the top tier, replacing Jimmy Shan. Town boss Graeme Jones was assistant manager to Darren Moore at The Hawthorns last season, but parted ways with the Baggies in March.

STADIUM - THE HAWTHORNS

One of the few stadiums that can claim to be older than Kenilworth Road - The Hawthorns has five years on Kenilworth Road - although you probably wouldn't be able to tell! Built in 1900, the ground's record attendance came in 1937, when 64,815 crammed in for an FA Cup sixth round tie against Arsenal. Since the introduction of all-seater stadiums, the ground can now fit just over 27,000 in.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Town have faced Albion in two different Cup competitions in recent seasons - with the Hatters defeating the Baggies at Kenilworth Road in the Checkatrade Trophy in 2016, before losing last season in the Carabao Cup 1-0 at the Hawthorns. Of our 44 meetings, Town have won 11 drawn nine and lost 24.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Curtis Davies joined West Brom in a £3 million deal in August 2005 - which at the time was a club record fee received for the Town. Curtis made 62 appearances in a Hatters shirt and will be returning to Kenilworth Road with Derby County in January. As well as manager Jones, we also have two ex-Baggies now in our ranks with Callum McManaman and Brendan Galloway joining in the summer. McManaman spent two-and-a-half years with Albion after signing from Wigan for £4.75m, while Galloway had a loan spell at the Hawthorns from Everton in 2016-17.

But Luton now is a different beast; the town, the football club. United.

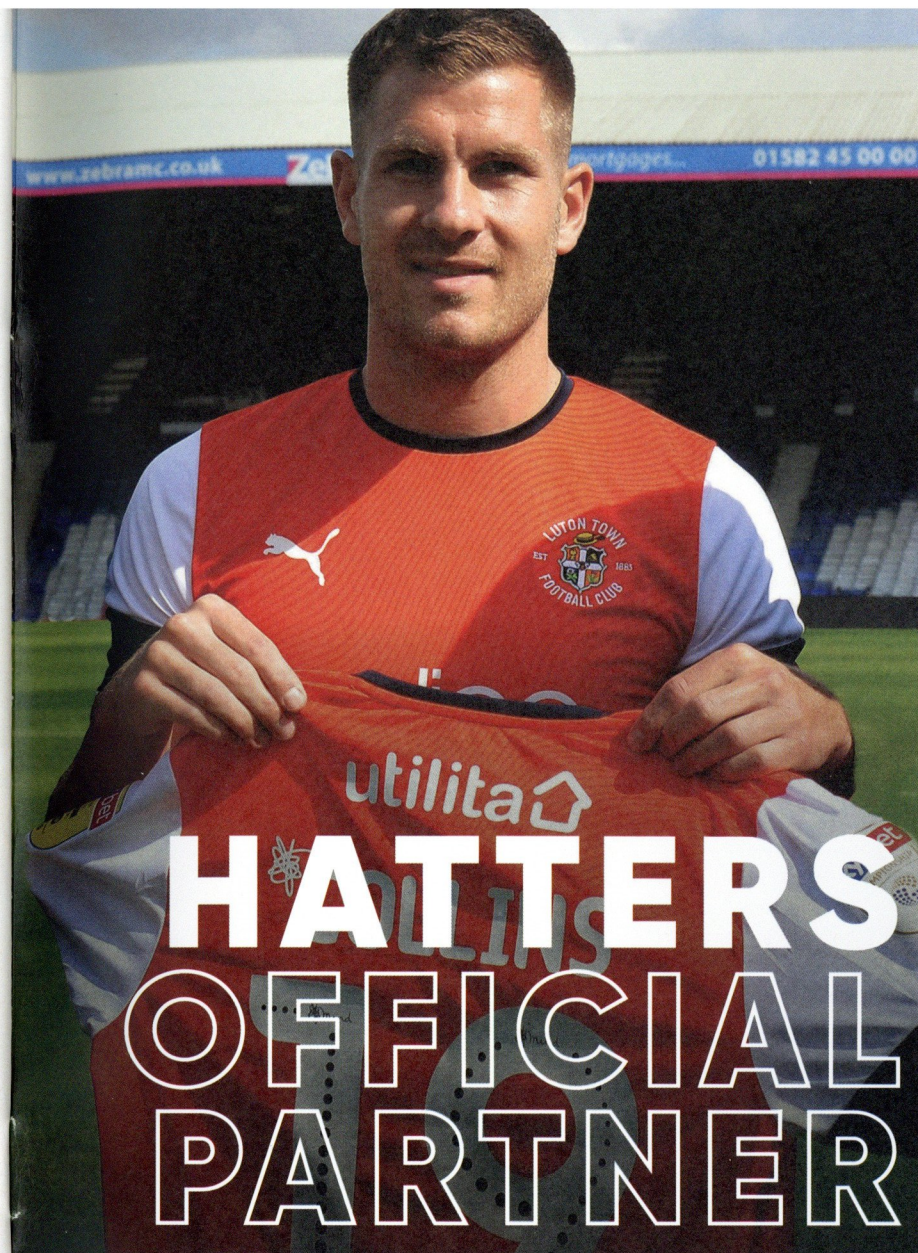
