Please continue to back them as you have so far in every game this season – and enjoy what will hopefully be a classic cup tie.

# GARY SWEET



**Good evening and welcome all to what promises to be cracker of a cup tie under the lights here at Kenilworth Road as we host one of the Premier**

## **League's top clubs.**

Leicester City are a club we've often had respectable tussles in the league with historically, and it may now sound slightly strange to consider our visitors today as one of England's top clubs, but it is a title that is fully deserved. It's an accolade that's not only based on The Foxes inspirationally winning the title in that unforgettable 2015/16 season – a year which gave belief to every club in the English pyramid that we can still dream – but also of how they are now perceived as ready to challenge for the top places again under Brendan Rodgers, currently lying third in the table.

The way the Foxes play their football, by being brave on the ball and attacking teams on the front foot, is very much in keeping with how we like to see the game played too. It is why we believe the sale of one of our own (a young man whose name you might hear sung once or twice tonight!) to them in the summer transfer window for a club record fee was just about the perfect fit.

We are very proud of the role we played in JJ's rise, but we are tremendously proud of James himself. He was, and still

is, a great role model for all the young players in our academy, with the way he conducted himself, the way he wanted to better himself, and the way he wanted to help his hometown club win promotion before he moved on.

We were all delighted to see him win his first England Under-21 cap recently, and we'll be just as pleased, as we were for Jack Stacey at Bournemouth last week, when he makes his Premier League debut. If his first start for the Foxes comes tonight, here at what will always be his home ground, it will just add to what should be an electric atmosphere.

Leicester beat the Champions League runners-up on Saturday, and while we are a division below them at the moment, their rise as a club from their nadir of League One to Premier League champions serves as a brilliant blueprint for our own somewhat steeper climb back from the Conference to the Championship.

Anyone too down about losing successive games away at QPR and at home to Hull (both of whom have spent several recent seasons in the top flight, remember) should remember that three years ago the corresponding weekends saw us follow three straight league and cup wins with two defeats in a row against Grimsby and Crawley.

It hasn't worked out too badly since then and whilst Saturday's result and performance in the latter stages of the game was disappointing, as a united group, we're happy with the progress we're making. It's nowhere near perfect, by any means, but we will only be able to hold our own comfortably in the Championship by controlled effort, continuous improvement and some time.

Graeme, his staff and the team that went into the international break having played so well and with such fantastic momentum after beating Barnsley and Huddersfield, not forgetting the 3-0 win at Cardiff that brought about tonight's tie.

Those breaks are an added distraction that we all need to learn to cope with, as they disrupt training schedules and restrict the work that coaches can do as a team with key players missing. They can present an advantage in many ways, but

we acknowledge that we need to avoid the pitfalls they can introduce, but it is a scenario we want to experience more and hopefully will become accustomed to.

However, the international break brought us our first international goalscorer in a debut since Joe Payne netted twice when winning his first and only England cap against Finland in 1937. James Collins' first appearance for the Republic of Ireland was overdue, but a fitting reward for his fantastic form since he netted his first goal of last season when Charlton visited at the end of September. Thirty goals for club and country in less than a year is a phenomenal record, so well done Collo!

On Thursday we will be attending an EFL club meeting where a range of topics will be discussed, including how the fall-out from Bury's expulsion from League One will be resolved in terms of promotion, relegation and FA Cup involvement amongst other significant issues around the administration of this beautiful game.

The state of a game is a concern for us. We are witnessing historical clubs go to the wall, clubs taking legal action against its own league which it is a member of, clubs selling fundamental assets of their stadia and training grounds as a means to apparently comply with league rules (!) and where there is a tenfold factor of player budgets in the same league

that clubs are able to lose dozens of millions of pounds, promoting a boom and bust culture.

The financial dynamics around the game are worrying but we recognise that money isn't the only currency in football. Other than points in the league table we also recognise that inclusion is fundamental to our uncompromising culture at Luton Town. We are competing against clubs who may be richer than us but many of whom are operating an unsustainable financial model at a cost of supporter, community and industry engagement.

To survive in this mad world, and indeed to succeed, we need to play the long game. We need to keep our heads on the foundations of stability we've created and success will come.

On the home front we have seen the recent fire at our former training ground at Ely Way destroy the facility that we had created for use in the community by our club charity, the Luton Town Community Trust.

With water and electricity now restored, we hope to be able to re-open the dressing rooms to enable the academy's fixtures to resume on the pitches there soon, while the Trust staff led by Kevin Thoburn have adapted how Luton Town people do, converting the old gym into a makeshift office and making sure that not a single session was affected by such a devastating blow.

You make lifelong friends in your youth team days and I've been lucky to forge special relationships with many, especially James Wesolowski and Richard Stearman, who I've been best man and groomsman for at their weddings.

Andy King was another in our group, and I know he's on loan at Rangers at the minute, but he's had an unbelievable career at the King Power.

Everyone else from my era has gone, but they've got some brilliant players, a lot of internationals, and I'm sure their goal with be to go for top six again this season.

What a draw this is for JJ! It's like it was written in the stars that he would get his opportunity to come back to Kenilworth Road so soon after the success he had here at his hometown club.

His debut might come back at Luton, and he deserves it. We were all delighted for him with the move. He's a brilliant lad and he deserves everything that comes to him because he deserves to be in the Premier League. I really hope it goes well for him...after tonight!

At such a young age, you can get side-tracked, but not him. His attitude is first class. He's an unbelievable athlete, both footed, can play right and left back. He just wanted to get better and better every day and listen to advice.

Now he's learning off one of the best managers who promotes youth, and I'm sure he will turn into an excellent Premier League player.

Personally, it was good to get 90 minutes and a goal against Cardiff in the last round, and having played another full game in the friendly at Brentford last Tuesday, I feel like I'm close to full match fitness now. After the operation it was important I worked hard to get fit again, but I'm happy where I'm at now.

We're now in a spell of five games in 14 days, so everyone will be needed. Although the main focus is on the league, we want to do well in all competitions, so play your part tonight and get behind the lads.

We know what it can be like here under the lights. They are the nights you miss when you're not playing. Let's make it another memorable one.



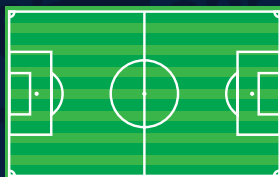

## **YOURI TIELEMANS**

Youri Tielemans completed a permanent move from Monaco to Leicester City in the 2019 summer transfer window after a very successful loan spell from January through to May last season.

The Belgium international has picked up from where he left off with a number of impressive performances, particularly when scoring and assisting in the Foxes' 3-1 win over Bournemouth. His talent was evident throughout that fixture and there is an expectation he will continue playing that same way for the remainder of the season.

The 22-year-old's dribbling ability, range of passing and all-round technique makes him one of the best young central midfield players in the Premier League.

# BRENDAN RODGERS

Brendan Rodgers was appointed as Leicester City manager on February 26th 2019 after Claude Puel was relieved of his duties just two days previously.

On the day he was announced, the Foxes occupied 11th place in the Premier League but in the ten games he managed, Rodgers propelled Leicester up into a respectable ninth place.

He took the job at the King Power Stadium on the back of winning an unprecedented treble with Celtic, and has a glowing reputation in the game.

The 46-year-old is otherwise best known for leading Swansea City into the Premier League in 2011, and also for finishing second with Liverpool in the 2013/14 Premier League season.

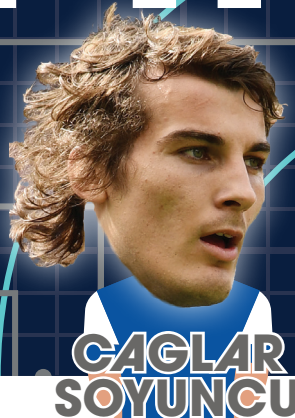

Schmeichel has been ever-present in-between the sticks for Leicester since joining back in 2011.

The Danish shot-stopper has amassed more than 300 appearances for the Foxes and played all 38 Premier League games when the East Midlands club, against all the odds, won the Premier League in 2016.

Schmeichel played a major role in their Champions League run the following season. In the eight games they played en route to the quarter-final, the 32-year-old kept five clean sheets before they were narrowly knocked out by Atletico Madrid.

In all six Premier League games this season, he has worn the captain's armband, a sign of not only his leadership but all-round quality.

Soyuncu joined Leicester in the 2018 summer transfer window but was limited to just six Premier League appearances last season as Harry Maguire blocked his pathway to the starting line-up.

Now the leading man in defence next to Jonny Evans, the 22-year-old has impressed during the first month of the season and looks extremely comfortable in English football.

His no-nonsense approach to the game means he isn't afraid to get stuck in with lunging tackles or last-ditch challenges.

Before joining the Foxes, Soyuncu had a two-year stint at Freiburg in the Bundesliga, amassing a total of 50 appearances. The Izmir-born centre-half has 25 caps for Turkey.

Maddison transferred to Leicester City in the 2018 summer transfer window from Norwich City, a club he spent two years with after joining from Coventry City.

He left Carrow Road after scoring 14 goals that season, as well as making an impressive eight assists.

His first Leicester goal came in his home debut against Wolves and he went on to score six more times last season.

The 22-year-old recently received a call-up to the England senior squad after an impressive start to the 2019/20 Premier League season, with his first goal being the winner against Spurs on Saturday. Maddison's creativity, dead-ball quality and astute passing ability makes him one of the nation's most promising youngsters.

Vardy has been a City stalwart since joining back in 2012 from Fleetwood as Non-League's first £1m transfer.

His route to the top was unconventional but showed his determination to succeed after working all the way up from part-time football with Stocksbridge Park Steels and FC Halifax.

Vardy is best known for his contribution when Leicester won the title, becoming the first player to score in 11 consecutive Premier League matches and finishing the campaign with 24 goals, second only to Harry Kane.

That form earned him a place in the England squad and he went on to win 26 caps, scoring seven times, before retiring from international duty after last year's World Cup.

**After a tenth place finish in the Town's first season back in the Championship for nine years, supporters were naturally hoping for the same again or perhaps even better in 2006/07 assuming the players could be kept together.**

The loss of Steve Howard, top scorer for the past five seasons, to Derby and influential skipper Kevin Nicholls to Leeds over the summer therefore was bound to be felt although according to the club's directors it was 'good business'!

Time would tell whether the replacements, Adam Boyd from Hartlepool, Lewis Emanuel from Bradford

City and Richard Langley from QPR would enable the club to push on. The opening day sunshine brought Leicester City and the Sky cameras to Kenilworth Road and the Hatters got off to the best possible start.

Debutant Emanuel nicked the ball off Leicester's Richard Stearman before sending in a shot that hit a post, and soon after sent over a corner that was glanced home by Leon Barnett for his first senior goal.

It was not all one-way traffic though as the Foxes came back with both Paddy McCarthy and Gareth Williams hitting the woodwork.

As the first half wore on the game slackened due to the searing heat, and this continued into the second period before the Town found another gear and went seeking a second goal which duly came eleven minutes from the end.

A fine passing move between substitute Boyd and Warren Feeney set up Trinidad and Tobago international Carlos Edwards who swept the ball home.

Luton manager Mike Newell, who signed a new four-year contract an hour before kick-off, said afterwards: "Two goals and a clean sheet – you can't ask for more. We weren't as convincing as I'd have liked at times, and the heat played a part, but I'm happy with three points on the board."

MILK (LEAGUE) CUP THIRD ROUND**

**The 1984/85 campaign marked the Town's third back in the top-flight, but they would need to do without terrace favourite Paul Walsh who was sold to Liverpool for £750,000, the biggest fee the Hatters had received for a player at that point.**

The money was supposed to be used to offset some of the club's overdraft, so the bank was less than impressed when manager David Pleat embarked on a spending spree bringing in Vince Hilaire from Crystal Palace, Andy Dibble from Cardiff, Ashley Grimes from Coventry and Steve Elliott from Preston.

In mitigation it was pointed out that Kirk Stephens had moved to Coventry as part of the Grimes deal and the overall wage bill had been reduced, when Raddy Antic and skipper Brian Horton left at the end of the previous season on free transfers.

Amidst unsettling approaches for Pleat from both Aston Villa and QPR and a boycott by some supporters regarding the proposed move to Milton Keynes, the Town kicked off in front of their lowest opening day crowd for five years.

Stoke, the visitors to Kenilworth Road, were easily seen off 2-0 but no-one was deceived as the Potters were truly awful and eventually finished bottom with only 17 points.

There was no real experience in the side, too many youngsters thrust in at the deep end and no recognised target man, so it came as no surprise as the team went eight games before winning again – the by-now usual victory on QPR's Omniturf.

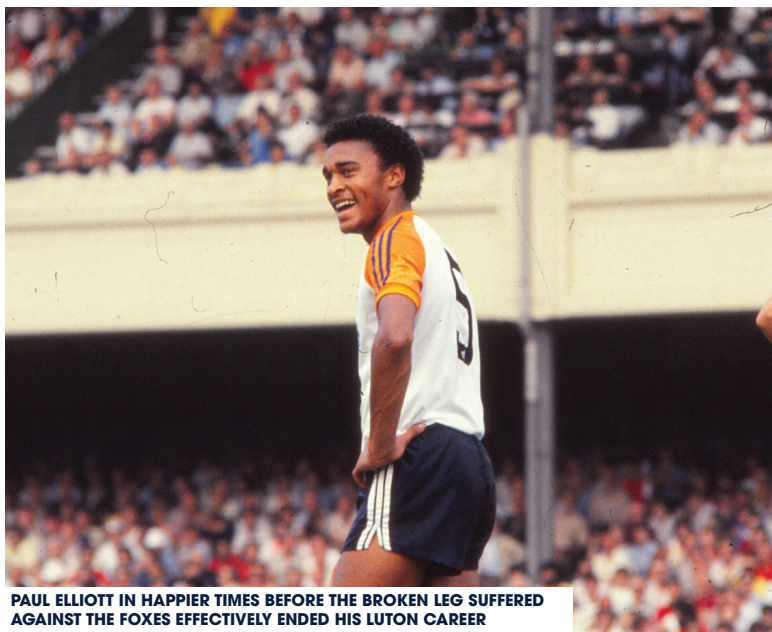
In the Milk Cup the Hatters had comfortably eased past third tier Orient over two legs in round two, and were now drawn against fellow league strugglers Leicester, although the Foxes had seen off Aston Villa 5-0 the previous weekend.

A poor crowd of 8,015, which included a fair number from Leicester, turned up to see a much-changed Town side from the previous weekend's sorry 3-0 defeat at Sunderland. Out went full-back Mitchell Thomas, to be replaced by Tim Breacker, Hilaire was dropped in favour of the by now veteran David Moss, while in goal Dibble came in for Jake Findlay.

Garry Parker dropped to the bench and in his place came the debut of former England international, the 35-year-old Colin Todd, who had signed on a short-term contract from Vancouver Whitecaps.

The Foxes came out of the traps like men possessed in an attempt to kill the game off in double-quick time.

Alan Smith volleyed the ball over the bar from three yards, Dibble denied Gary Lineker with a one-handed save, then plunged at the same man's feet to prevent another goal, and was saved by an offside flag when Smith netted in the 11th minute.

Gradually the Town shook themselves out of their lethargy with Brian Stein seeing a header saved, before forcing a brilliant tip around the post from Leicester goalkeeper Ian Andrews to a shot that seemed destined to hit the back of the net.

Ricky Hill had an effort hacked off the line by Robert Jones before the game took a dramatic turn.

Central defender Paul Elliott went in with a reckless challenge on Smith, which ended with a badly broken leg that finished his season and thus effectively ending his Luton career as by the time he was fit to return, the Town had signed Steve Foster.

Elliott was even booked for his troubles whilst he was being carried off on a stretcher!

A switch around saw Wayne Turner revert to full-back, being replaced in midfield by substitute Parker, which left Todd and Mal Donaghy to form a new central defensive duo.

Parker took his opportunity to return to the fold with a masterful display, and with Moss turning back

the years, the game swung and the second period belonged to the Town.

Moss opened the scoring on 52 minutes with a clever flick from Stein's pass, followed five minutes later by an own goal from Tommy Williams, who lobbed his own goalkeeper under pressure from Frank Bunn.

The third goal came in the 67th minute when Donaghy headed in Moss's corner at the near post. Moss enjoyed his comeback so much he was seen tackling back in defence and was even spotted heading the ball in midfield, much to the enjoyment of the crowd!

Lineker reduced the deficit with a shot following a pass from Steve Lynex, but it was too little too late and the Hatters were through to the last 16.

"It was a nightmare for the first 20 minutes," said Pleat afterwards, "but I have to be pleased with the character our players showed - they can't have too much praise for that."

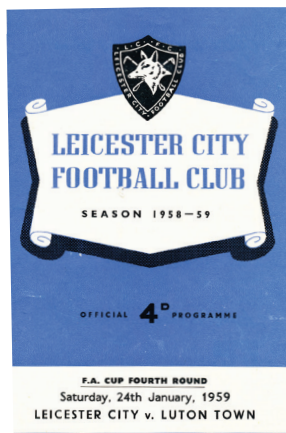

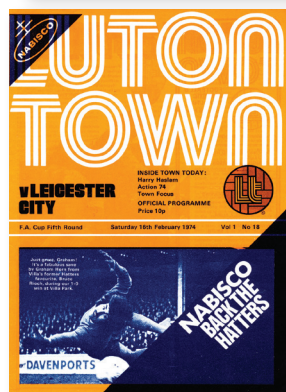

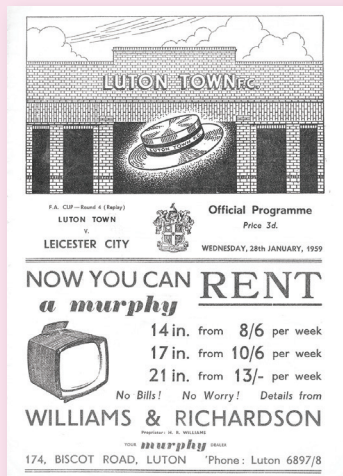
## JANUARY 1959

An FA Cup fourth round tie at Filbert Street on another lottery of pitch, this time icy. The players slip and slide to a 1-1 draw.



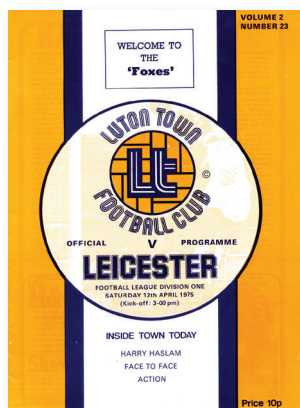
## FEBRUARY 1974

## APRIL 1975

With both sides now in the first division the Hatters extract suitable revenge, with a 3-0 victory. Weller scores at the Oak Road end again but this time with an often televised curling effort into his own net!

## AUGUST 2005

With the Town back in the Championship, a first visit to the Walkers Stadium ends in a 2-0 win. Ahmet Brkovic's overhead kick to open the scoring is sublime.

# CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS



**FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS TEN POST-WAR  
LEICESTER CITY 'CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS'**

## 1953/54

Norman Bullock took Leicester City to the Second Division title in 1953/54. Overcoming a disappointing start, Leicester stormed to the top of the table with a 14 match unbeaten run that culminated in a crucial 2-1 victory at title rivals Everton. Derek Hines scored five times as Leicester hammered Lincoln 9-2, then they beat Brentford 6-0 and maintained pole position with five straight wins. Leicester defeated Middlesbrough 3-2, Stoke 3-1 and Norwich 2-1 in the FA Cup before losing 3-1 to Preston in the sixth round second replay. Arthur Rowley netted 30 goals as Leicester clinched the championship with a 3-1 win at Brentford.

## 1956/57

Arthur Rowley scored a club record 44 goals as Leicester City won the Second Division title in 1956/57. David Halliday's side lost just one of their opening ten games and went top after a thrilling 5-4 victory at Bury in mid-September. Leicester slammed six goals past Notts County and Blackburn Rovers, then trounced Bristol Rovers 7-2. Dave MacLaren arrived from Dundee in January and Leicester triumphed 2-1 at rivals Nottingham Forest, clinching the championship with a 5-1 win at Leyton Orient. Jack Froggatt, Stan Milburn, Johnny Morris and Arthur Rowley were ever-present as they won the title by seven points.

## 1960/61

Matt Gillies managed Leicester City to the FA Cup final in 1960/61. Gordon Banks saved a penalty as Leicester gained their first-ever win at Chelsea and climbed into the top half of the First Division with four wins in five matches. Jimmy Walsh was leading scorer as they trounced Manchester United 6-0, then netted five times against Newcastle and West Ham as

well as completing the double over Arsenal, finishing sixth in the top-flight. Leicester defeated Oxford United 3-1, Bristol City 5-1, Birmingham 2-1, Barnsley 2-1 and Sheffield United 2-0 in the FA Cup before losing 2-0 to 'double' winners Spurs in the Wembley final.

## 1962/63

Leicester City were FA Cup finalists for the second time in three seasons in 1962/63. They made their best start to a First Division campaign for 37 years, taking 18 points from their opening 13 matches. The 5-1 victory at home to Leyton Orient on Boxing Day launched a 12 match unbeaten run that took Leicester to the top of the table for the first time since 1927. The title challenge faltered with four successive away defeats and Leicester finished fourth in the top-flight. Matt Gillies' side beat Grimsby 3-1, Ipswich 3-1, Orient 1-0, Norwich 2-0 and Liverpool 1-0 before losing 3-1 to Manchester United in the FA Cup final.

## 1963/64

Matt Gillies guided Leicester City to League Cup final glory in 1963/64. They were early First Division leaders after drawing 1-1 at West Brom, beating Birmingham 3-0 and trouncing Arsenal 7-2. Bobby Roberts arrived from Motherwell but despite winning 1-0 at champions Liverpool and gaining five straight wins around Christmas, they finished mid-table after inconsistent results. Colin Appleton, Gordon Banks and David Gibson starred as Leicester beat Aldershot 2-0, Tranmere 2-1, Gillingham 3-1, Norwich 2-1 and West Ham 6-3 in the League Cup before defeating Stoke 4-3 in the final to win their first major trophy.

## 1970/71

Leicester City won the Second Division championship under Frank O'Farrell in 1970/71. Leicester had narrowly failed

to win promotion the previous season and newcomer Bobby Kellard scored as they went top with a 3-2 victory over Middlesbrough in late September. Willie Carlin was signed from Derby the following month and helped Leicester consolidate pole position with a 14 match unbeaten run. They overcame a lean spell to regain the leadership with a 1-0 win at Swindon in March and took Arsenal to an FA Cup sixth round replay. Peter Shilton starred as Leicester were undefeated in their last 17 games.

#### 1979/80

Jock Wallace managed Leicester City to the Second Division title in 1979/80. Summer signings included Alan Young, Ian Wilson and Pat Byrne, with Leicester emerging as early pace-setters. They triumphed 4-1 at QPR and maintained their promotion challenge with just one defeat in 13 matches, with young Gary Lineker scoring twice in a 2-1 win over rivals Sunderland. Overcoming a shock FA Cup exit at Harlow, they went top after a 1-0 victory at home to Newcastle in early February and clinched the title with a 1-0 win at Orient. Skipper Mark Wallington, leading scorer Alan Young and Larry May were ever-present.

#### 1996/97

Martin O'Neill plotted Leicester City's 1997 League Cup final triumph. Notable newcomers were Kasey Keller and Spencer Prior, with newly promoted Leicester starting life back in the Premier League with a 0-0 draw at Sunderland. Ian Marshall, Matt Elliott and Steve Guppy arrived during the season as Leicester achieved several notable wins and finished in ninth position. The Foxes defeated Scarborough 4-1, York City 2-0,

Manchester United 2-0, Ipswich 1-0 and Wimbledon on away goals in the League Cup before beating Middlesbrough 1-0 in the final replay. Leicester also took Chelsea to an FA Cup fifth round replay.

#### 1999/00

Matt Elliott scored both goals in Leicester City's 2000 League Cup final success. Martin O'Neill's side had lost 1-0 to Spurs in the previous season's final. Tim Flowers arrived from Blackburn and Phil Gilchrist from Oxford United, with Leicester rising to fifth in the Premier League after nine wins in their opening 16 games. Record signing Darren Eadie helped the Foxes to defeat Arsenal in the FA Cup fourth round and finish in eighth position. Leicester beat Crystal Palace 7-5, Grimsby Town 2-0, Leeds United and Fulham on penalties and Aston Villa 1-0 in the League Cup before beating Tranmere 2-1 in the Wembley final.

#### 2015/16

Leicester City shocked the football world with the most unexpected Premier League title win in history in 2015/16, lifting the trophy just 12 months after a stunning relegation escape. Claudio Ranieri's side were 5000/1 to win the Premier League at the start of the season but defied those odds thanks to 41 goals from 'Footballer of the Year' Jamie Vardy and PFA 'Player of the Year' Riyad Mahrez. When the pressure increased, the Foxes' defence, led by skipper Wes Morgan, stood firm. Leicester remained top for the last four months and lost only three Premier League games, finishing ten points clear of runners-up Arsenal.

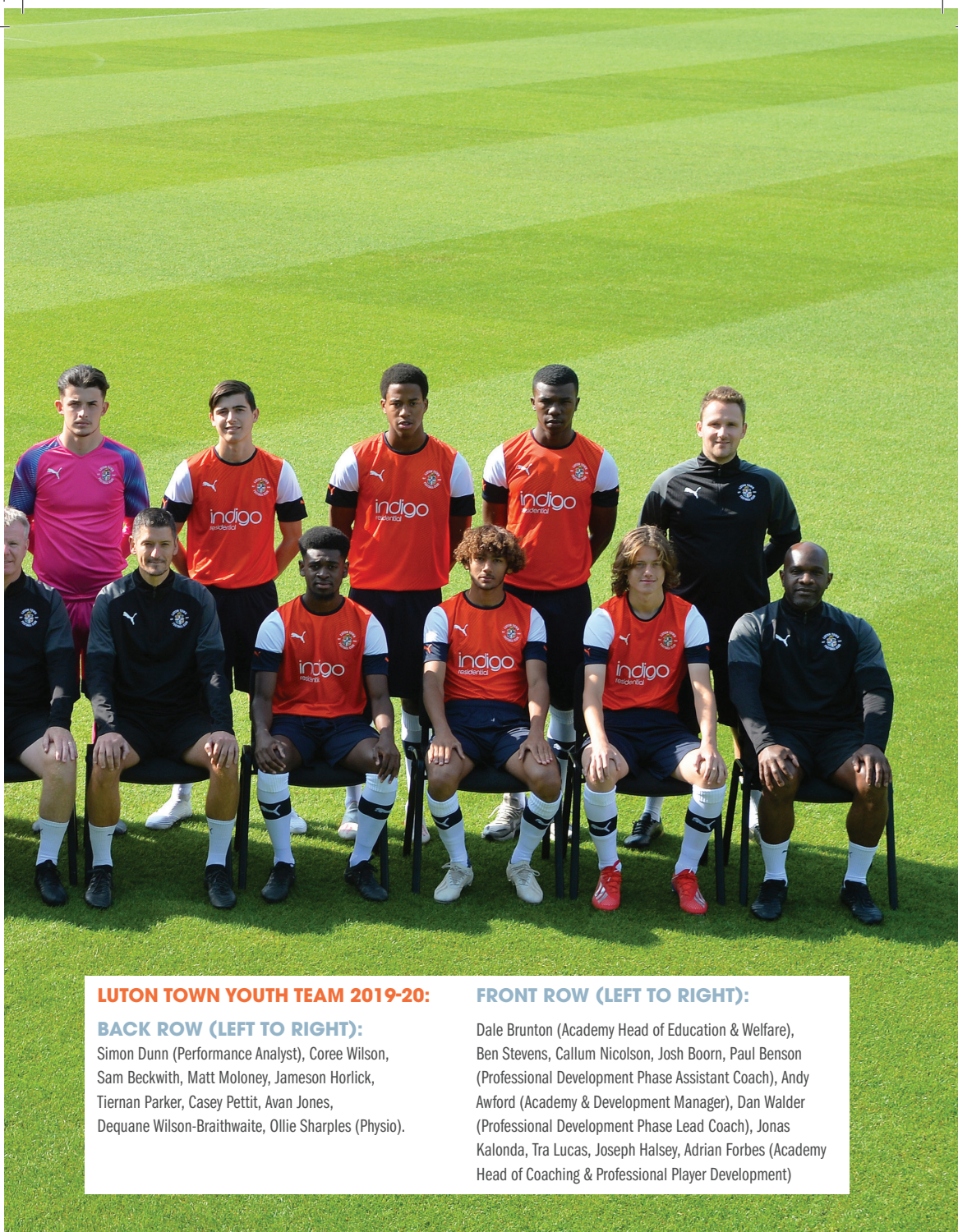

# SONNY REFLECTS ON RARE HOME REVERSAL

Hatters captain Sonny Bradley felt all three goals were 'avoidable' as Luton were beaten 3-0 by Hull City at Kenilworth Road on Saturday.

**The Town started the game on the front foot but failed to create any real clear-cut chances, which allowed Hull to come into the game during the second half.**

Two goals from Kevin Stewart and a 20-yard strike from Kamil Grosicki secured Hull first away win of the season as Bradley insisted Luton "couldn't match the intensity of the first half and got punished for it".

The former Hull defender said: "I need to look at all three goals again because I think they were all avoidable and they didn't do a great deal to score those goals, which was the most disappointing thing.

Chasing the game was always bound to be a tricky task but after conceding three, and the captain said: "It's very rare that we get beat like that, especially at home, so it's a tough one to take.

"From the start of the season and before the QPR game, I felt we've improved every game and we were really starting to get to grips with the Championship.

"But the first half against QPR last week wasn't good enough and on the flip side, it was the second half today."

Luton were much the better team in the first 45 minutes, but they weren't able to punish Hull and Bradley reacted by saying: "I thought we did create a few chances and goals do change games.

"I think if we got a goal in the first half, it would have changed the complexion of the game, but you know it wasn't to be and we didn't get it."

The Hatters hope to quickly forget that defeat, Bradley insisted, as Leicester City visit tonight in the Carabao Cup Third Round.

"Leicester will be a very difficult challenge, there's no two ways about it," said the 28-year-old. "They will probably look at this result and think that it will be an easy game for them,



but we've shown good character already this season and come up against some good opposition, so although it will be difficult, we do have winners in this team."

The Foxes moved third in the Premier League with their victory over Tottenham on Saturday and with that in mind, Bradley added: "It's a challenge, it's a game we will give 100 per cent to, like we always do every week.

"But for Leicester, it's probably their best chance of silverware this season so it's going to be difficult, but we're up for the challenge."

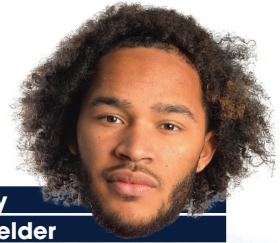

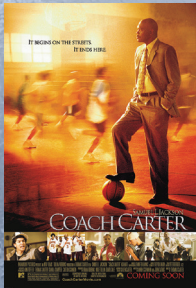

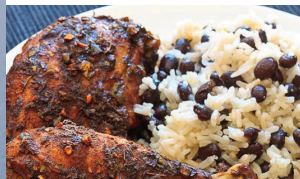

**Community Trust launch Heritage Memory Cards. Reflect and remember Luton Town FC with our historic memory cards**

**Have a look at the historic photograph below. What do you notice about this player (centre left) and the stadium from the photograph? Do you recognise this Luton Town player? When might this player have played for Luton Town? What memories do you have of this player on and off the pitch?**



Whether this is your first Luton Town match, or you have lost count of the number of matches you have been to over the years, hopefully this historic photograph sparked intrigue, reflection and discussion. In fact, as many of you will know, this picture shows Luton Town's legendary Ricky Hill taking on his Orient opponent at Kenilworth Road on 10th March 1979.

This historic photograph forms part of a collection of Luton Town FC memory cards – ‘Kenilworth Memories’ – created as part of the Heritage Lottery Funded Schools Heritage project run by Luton Town Community Trust.

The collection takes the form of 11 ‘Top Trump’ style cards relating to significant Luton Town players, memorable seasons and historic matches from 1959-1988. Highlights include players such as Ricky Hill, Brian Stein and Luton's record goalscorer, Gordon Turner; the 1967-68 and 1981-82 seasons; and of course, the unforgettable Littlewoods Cup Final in 1988.

Whether you have been a season ticket holder for decades or attend the occasional match, our memory cards are accessible for everyone. Look at the array of historic photographs and reflect upon the questions posed. Then simply turn the card over to reveal more information about the match, significant event or player.

The educational resource is ideal for both schools, and individuals working with older groups in informal, family, reminiscence and community settings to help encourage discussion, debate and reflection on past experiences.



Kevin Thornburn, Head of the Trust commented: "While our Schools Heritage project's main aim initially was to take the Club's rich and long heritage with the Town into the classroom to show the next generation of supporters how important the Football Club has been to Luton, it soon became obvious that the 'Kenilworth Memories' cards could also offer so much more particularly to improve the well-being of older people and to tackle dementia, depression and social isolation.

"We trialled the cards with volunteer groups and have had great feedback. Football has a universal appeal across communities, generations and families, yet is rarely offered as a reminiscence activity for older people.

"Using the guides and materials developed by our Heritage Officer, Natasha Rolt, we hope families, friends, care staff and volunteers will quickly gain the confidence to start exciting and stimulating Kenilworth Memories groups in the Town."

Natasha, who has spent the last year as the Trust's Heritage Officer commented: "Sporting reminiscence is fun. It's stimulating, it evokes magical memories, sparks conversation and debate, brings people together and allows people to share the passion they have for their favourite sports.

"The benefits of sporting reminiscence are very clear to those who have experienced it and our 'Kenilworth Memories' work equally well with children in the classroom to show the Club's longevity and local heritage, while at the same time reaching out to our older supporters and helping them remember 'the good old days down the Kenny'."

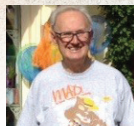

# MY TOWN

**TONY RUBIN, A LUTON TOWN SUPPORTER OF 70 YEARS, GOT IN TOUCH WITH US TO RECALL HIS FIRST-EVER MATCH AT KENILWORTH ROAD – AN FA CUP FIFTH ROUND GOAL-FEST AGAINST THE FOXES IN 1949!**

## **My parents had bought a weekend house in Bedfordshire in 1944 and the local football team was Luton Town.**

In 1949, I was 12 and my father had little interest in football, preferring boxing and indeed one night taking me to a Leicester Square cinema to watch a transmission of a Cassius Clay fight!

However, I finally persuaded him to take me to Luton, then in the second division. The occasion was a fifth round FA Cup tie against Leicester City, at that time also in the second division, on Saturday February 12th.

We arrived at the stadium just before kick-off to find the gates closed as the areas at the Oak Road end were already full to capacity. We were told that the was a small possibility of getting in at the opposite Kenilworth Road end, where there was a large terrace (standing of course in those days) behind the goal.

We ran as fast as we could around to the other end along a very narrow and hazardous path and were let in. The path was called Beech Hill path and is, of course, still there today.

We had gained admission but by the time we had got into place ten minutes into the game, three goals had already been scored!

Being a shortie I could only catch glimpses of the play, but I remember very vividly that every time a goal was scored (and there were ten), there was a surge from behind and we finished up lower down. By half-time we were somehow nearer the front than the back, and my view had improved considerably.

The match had many ebbs and flows and finally ended 5-5 after extra-time, Leicester equalising in the very last minute! No one should be surprised that I was hooked.

The attendance was over 26,000 in the same stadium that now has a maximum capacity of just over 10,000. The gate receipts were a then record of £4,678.

The Luton goalkeeper was Bernard Streten, who with Ron Baynham was one of two England International goalies on Luton's books at that time. Streten was 5ft 9in, unbelievably short for a goalie by today's standards, but made up for it by amazing agility.

Another renowned player in that team was Bob Morton, who was equally at home at wing-half or centre-forward. He played for Luton from 1946 to 1964 and holds the record to this day of the most appearances for the club, with 495 in the league and 550 overall. He also scored 48 goals.

A certain Don Revie was in the Leicester team! This was a few months before he moved on to Hull City for a transfer fee of £19,000, later moving to Manchester City, Sunderland and most famously Leeds United.

Incidentally, Leicester won that fifth round replay 5-3 and went on to the final at Wembley, where they lost to Wolves!

### WHO?

It's not often the Hatters play former Premier League champions in consecutive games. Blackburn have had a turbulent few years off the field, going from a mainstay in the Premier League to being in League One just two years ago. Good recruitment under Tony Mowbray has seen this weekend's hosts stabilise themselves slightly in the second tier, with the arrival of Bradley Dack from Gillingham proving to be an inspired signing – the 25-year-old scoring on 39 occasions in 85 games heading into the weekend just gone.

### STADIUM - THE KING POWER

Built in 1882, Ewood Park has been home to Blackburn permanently since 1890, having had a brief spell there at the beginning of the 1880s. The largest ever crowd was for a game against Bolton Wanderers in 1929, when 62,522 squeezed in – the maximum capacity of the ground is around half of that now. Floodlights were installed in 1958, before under Jack Walker the ground was completely renovated in the 1990s.

### HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Hatters have played Blackburn on 39 occasions, our most recent meeting came in January 2007, when they defeated us at Kenilworth Road in the FA Cup. Of all the games against each other, Town have won 15, drawn 12 and lost 12.

### KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Of the current squads, Ryan Tunnicliffe had a loan spell at Ewood Park in 2014, scoring once in 17 games, while Rovers keeper Christian Walton had a productive loan here at the Kenny in 2016/17. Former Hatters boss Mike Newell spent four years at Ewood Park as a player and was a part of the team that won the Premier League in the 1994/95 season, having also played for the Town in the 86/87 campaign. He went onto manage 200 games at Kenilworth Road, winning 83 of those matches. A Scotland international prior to the start of World War Two, Dally Duncan played for the Hatters between 1946-48, managing the club from 47-58, before joining Rovers as manager, where he reached an FA Cup final in 1960.

At the time of writing, prior to the Hull game at the weekend, he's joint 26th in the goal-scoring table for the Hatters, and will be looking to close the gap on Bruce Rioch (52), Phil Gray (53), Bob Morten (55), Andre Gray and Tommy Tait (57) and of course current team-mate Danny Hylton who along with Allan Brown, Malcolm Macdonald and Arthur Wileman are all on 58 goals.

Luke Bolton played twice for the England U20s during the International break and actually provided the assist for the last-minute winner against Switzerland on Monday evening. On the same day, Simon Sluga was part of the Croatia squad.

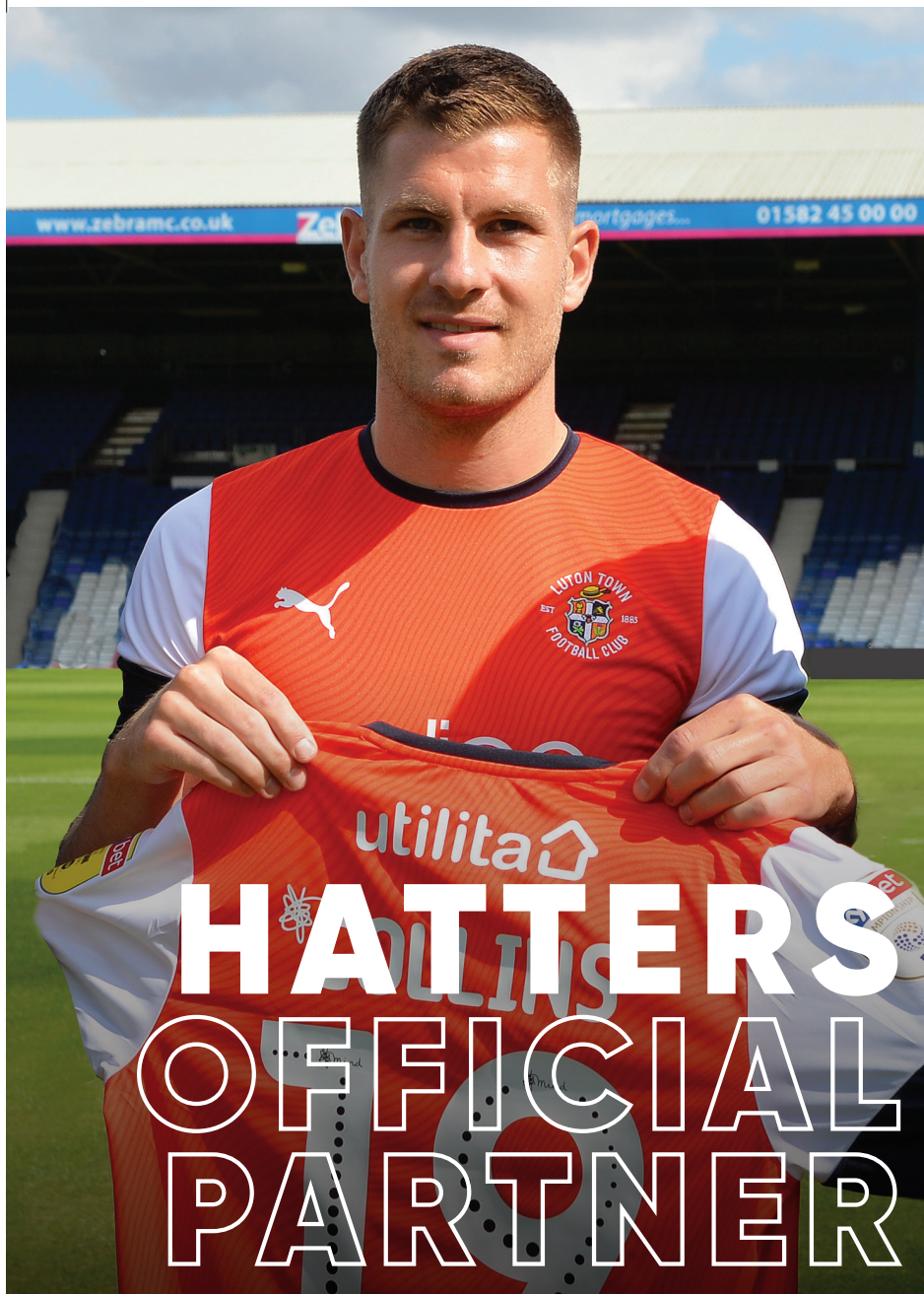
