

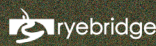

MIKE MORAN



I'd like to start by saying what an honour it is to be given the opportunity to pen

these notes which is a fleeting departure from those you usually read.

I have been asked to write these as a director of 2020 Developments, and as a result of the High Court's decision to unequivocally dismiss Capital & Regional's challenge of our planning applications to such an extent that our opponent didn't see the point in appealing. This means that we are now able to proceed in delivering Luton Town a brand, spanking new, shiny, modern football stadium.

Whilst not a Lutonian I am completely committed to the values of the town and its people, and I understand how much this club means to so many of you.

I began working with Gary Sweet back in 2013 to draw up a long list of potential

sites for a new stadium. The board wanted a clean slate approach and I remember vividly the discussions and the demands to come up with a site and a plan that was true to both the club's history and its ambitions.

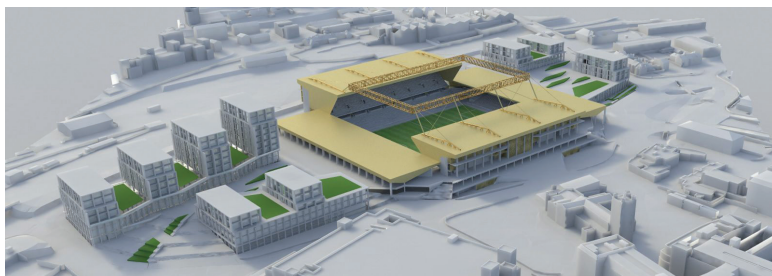
I certainly never thought back then it would take us so long to get to this stage and on hearing the news this last week that all final legal challenges from Capital & Regional had failed, it was a mixture of emotions; relief, anger at the wasted years, and excitement for the future. I'd describe it as much about "vindication" as about "celebration".

From the very outset we put together a plan that we honestly felt was best for the club, the town as a whole and its people. We assembled a brilliant team of advisers and consultants to help and guide us, and it is a credit to everyone that after all the years of challenge and scrutiny from opponents, not one single technical or legal flaw in our planning applications was found.

Why then has it taken so long to get to this stage?

Unfortunately, it's been a mixture of both circumstances and also well-funded opponents "playing the system".

The pressure applied by Capital & Regional on Luton Council from the start meant we went head-first into a major review of the Local Plan when all experts at the time felt we were destined to fail. There was a window to get the plans through before the 2017 Local Plan review, even back in 2016 we could have done it, before Brexit and the first of two destabilising general elections, but for the actions of that said company.





It's possible to say that these opponents were merely defending their commercial interests. That works to an extent, but Gary and I spent an awful lot of time many years ago engaging with all parties offering to work together for the good of Luton, but we were dismissed out of hand by just one obstinate objector.

We knew that after decades and decades of failure to deliver a new stadium, it would take something ambitious to achieve our goals. We felt strongly then, as we do now, that the best place for the club is in the heart of the town that it serves. The best plans are not always the easiest plans.

It's important to draw a line on the past and look forward now to a bright future. The years in planning have galvanised the team and our relationship with Luton Council is stronger than ever. We have seen first-hand the impacts of central government budget cuts on local authorities, but the senior leadership in the Town Hall and their planning officers have been fantastic in the face of all challenges, despite a host of changes in personnel that have had to be managed.

So, in the face of adverse curveballs of local plans, general elections, Brexit and all that comes with it, call-in challenges, judicial reviews and generational market corrections that have all been thrown our way, we stand firmly together, unscathed and energised and enthused, ready to Power On and deliver the visionary scheme we imagined from the outset.

So, what next in the process? Firstly, we can properly engage with the occupiers and investors we have been talking to over the years. Our designs and plans are over four years old. Retail, leisure and housing markets have all seen change in

the interim. We need to work these through as we produce our detailed plans. In any assessment of investment value that adage of "location, location, location" remains as true now as ever. On that score there are few, if any, better sites coming forward in the UK than 20 acres adjacent to a station 20 minutes or so from Central London; and 40 acres right on Junction 10 of the M1 that speaks for itself.

Of course, there are risks and challenges ahead, as with any development project. But be assured we have a first-rate team around us who now just need a little bit of time to work to bring things together.

I'd also like to say a huge thank you, on behalf of the whole development team, for the incredible unstinting support and belief from the club's supporters and supporter groups that has been so apparent and important through these times of drawn-out challenge. It has helped to cement the idea of it always being a case of "when" not "if" we'd get there.

The last word, of course, needs to be about the club's custodians on the board of 2020. I simply cannot imagine there is another club in the country with such a unified sense of purpose and commitment to doing things in the right way for the long-term benefit of this great club and town.

FROM THE BOARDROOM



Good afternoon everyone and welcome to today's game against Birmingham City.

We lost 2-1 earlier in the season to the Blues at St Andrew's, so we look forward to revenge today at home.

It's 2020 and this is our first home game of the year, a very special one for our club, so could I take this opportunity to wish you a happy, healthy and prosperous new year from all of us at Kenilworth Road.

At this time of year it makes sense to reflect upon the past, re-examine our aims and ambitions, and review our mistakes. The past decade has seen incredible progress on and off the pitch, and to start a new decade we need to remind ourselves of that as a point of reference.

Undoubtedly the most important thing was Gary Sweet and Stephen Browne finding like-minded people to invest in the Club and lift it out of administration. From day one there was a vision to relocate, climb up the leagues and create and manage a sustainable and morally defensible football club for the benefit of our fans, our town, the community and ourselves.

However, unbeknown to us we were almost immediately hit by our first bump in the road when we were punished with a deduction of a total of 40 points for previous owners' breaches of rules and financial profligacy. This decision, which still rankles to this day, cost the club many millions in lost revenue and missed opportunities.

Undaunted and in high spirits we had one of our best days ever winning the JPT at Wembley managed by club legend Mick Harford, but then suffered an almost inevitable relegation to the Football Conference (now National League).

In the Conference we received no central funding and no contribution or protection for our academy. The significance of this was that, having decided to continue to operate as a

fully professional club and not just maintain but rebuild our youth system, we lost seven-figure sums every year. For clarity, these losses were to keep the infrastructure going for when we regained our Football League membership, rather than buying our way back.

Despite this, as you know, we took five years to get promoted, losing four managers in the process, including the legend that is Mick Harford. Our time there saw many disappointments from play-off defeats to poor results against smaller clubs, but we are Luton Town and we persevered.

We also suffered the loss of young players from our academy for minimal reward, many of whom have subsequently gone on to be talented and valuable participants in the Premier League and elsewhere. Max Aarons and Jamal Lewis at Norwich, for example, were both in the successful youth teams at the same time as James Justin, but along with many others left for peanuts at a young age.

There are former Luton youth players scattered all around the Leagues, and although we will probably always have to be a selling club, we shouldn't have to be a gifting club.

We take this area as seriously as any and as Gary has already told you, we have applied for EPPP category 2 status, which will move us into the Premier League U23 games programme and further protect our youngsters from being picked off for next to nothing by bigger clubs. It will also provide a league games programme in which our players not in the first team can get match time, because at present there is almost no competitive football between leaving the academy at 18 and being picked for the first team. The crazy games schedule in the Championship requires a bigger squad, but too many don't get regular football.

None of this comes for free and we must install an indoor dome with an artificial turf pitch at the training ground amongst other things as a condition of being approved for this level.

We then managed three promotions in five years, with all sorts of records being broken last season in League One. It can be argued that such progress may have come too quickly and that we didn't have time to adjust to the enormous and growing gap

between League One and the Championship. However, we all know that momentum can carry you beyond your expectations.

Even before we were promoted the management were advising the Board as to our ability to compete in the Championship, a division which has changed markedly since we were last here. We have the smallest budget in the league by some margin.

Financial Fair Play, which governs clubs' spending, allows clubs to lose £39 million over three seasons and, of course, some clubs are helped by having parachute payments when they are relegated from the Premier League amounting to eye-watering proportions. To give an idea, the value of Premier League parachute payments to Championship clubs would completely fund the player budgets of Leagues One and Two for well over two seasons. This though, is further complicated by them having to pay Premier League wages in the Championship. It is trickle down economics and the monstrous wages paid in the Premier League are affecting almost every level of the game.

We cannot and will not compete with these losses so it follows that we simply cannot compete with salaries or transfer fees. With a new stadium and other sources of income and a thriving academy all on the horizon, we will much more able to be competitive and, by then, the effects of less prudent clubs over-spending in the Championship will be being felt quite hard if the authorities implement the rules as they should be. Remember we have been in those shoes too often before and probably wouldn't survive another.

Having said all this, reality is only just beginning to filter into the system and clubs are still trying to find ways around the current rules so to hope for wage caps, limits to agent fees and break-even accounts could be some way off.

In the meantime, we as a Board are proud of what we have achieved over the past decade. We are Luton Town so we can't expect an easy ride all the time, and I for one wouldn't want one. I always say to friends of mine who are Arsenal fans, how boring it must be to have never been promoted or relegated and just worried about whether you are or aren't in the top four. We, on the other hand, have experienced more ups and downs in the 21st century than most clubs have in their entire existence.

Gary asked for patience regarding the stadium and associated developments and I, on behalf of the Board, ask the same for football. We are all fans, mostly Lutonians, and the club is deeply embedded in our hearts. We are not short-term players and have gained some valuable experience over the past 11 years making us one of the most experienced operational boards in football. We will get where we want to be, but maybe not as quickly as some may hope for because of the nonsensical delays to planning permissions caused by Capital & Regional, amongst other things outside our control.

Finally, before I sign off, it's an honour for us to welcome John Still, the man who took us out of the Conference, as our guest in the Boardroom today. He will always have a special place in our hearts.

Good afternoon and welcome to a new decade of football here at Kenilworth Road. Having not yet had chance to do so, I'd like to wish everyone a happy new year!

Today we host Birmingham City and extend the welcome to Pep Clotet, his staff, their squad and everyone who has travelled with the Blues today. We wish them a safe journey back to the west Midlands this evening.

I'll kick off by congratulating the board and everyone at the club who has worked so hard towards gaining planning permission for Newlands Park and the new stadium at Power Court.

The ambition to improve the facilities, not only for Luton Town but for the town and region as a whole, was one of the major attractions for me when the offer to join the club first arose. This week's news that there will be no further legal challenge is brilliant and a great boost to everyone here.

The future of the club is paramount and the two developments will only help attract people – including players – to the area, which is what we are trying to do this month, within our budget. Everyone is working 24/7 to help with that and enable us to improve our current league position.

Looking back to our last match here, we saw just how important our home

form and your influence from the stands is going to be in that process.

We came up against a Fulham team who are pushing for an immediate return to the Premier League and took the game to them from the off. We played some excellent attacking football and showed real character to keep retaking the lead after being pegged back twice.

Of course, the third and final equaliser came so late we didn't have a chance to do it again, but I took great pride in the players' performance, and from the Boxing Day atmosphere inside Kenilworth Road I believe you did too.

We know that our form here is such that together with the return of key players, the experience of having played every team at least once and a growing understanding of the Championship, we firmly believe that if we can find a formula to get results on the road, we can not only achieve, but surpass our target of a minimum 20 points from our 20 remaining matches.

That starts today against a Birmingham side we felt we deserved to take something from up at St Andrew's in late October, when we faced them at the end of a tough three-game week in which we'd already travelled to Fulham.

Please continue to get behind the lads as you have in such great numbers at Bristol City, Millwall and Bournemouth, during such a busy period when money will have been tight from so many other things going on. It really is appreciated by us all.

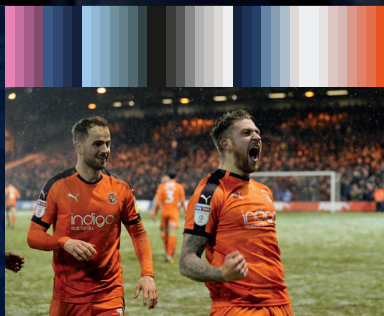

The 22-year-old stopper's form in his first few weeks with the Stones has been so impressive that he was voted the National League South leaders' player of the month for December.



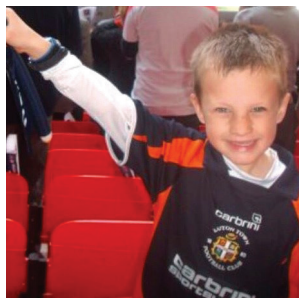

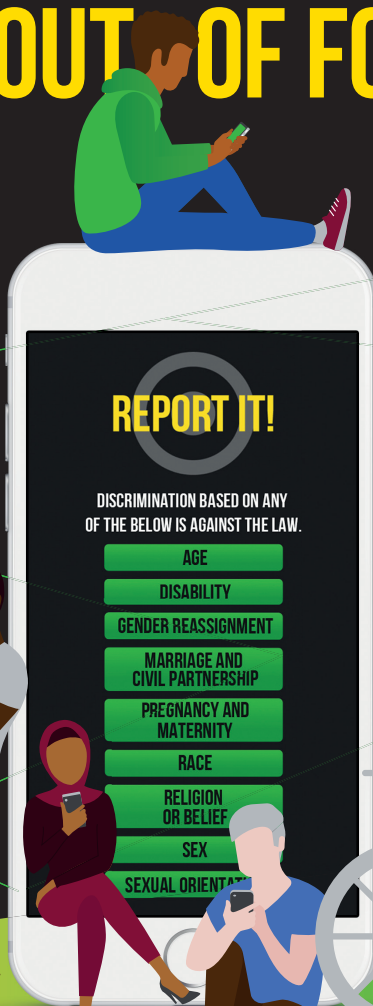
Edward Connew, who has been a loyal supporter of Luton Town for over 70 years, is celebrating his birthday.

YOUTH TEAM FOCUS:

COREE WILSON

Left-foot or right-foot, if Coree Wilson is on the end of it, the net is usually bulging.

The striker has been in prolific form in front of goal this season and it all started when he joined the club as an Under-8 after being scouted at a tournament in Kempston playing for his local team, Bedford Town.

Memorably, Wilson played as an Under-8 in an Under-11s match shortly after joining and certainly made the most of the opportunity.

"I remember it well," he says, "it was in Letchworth at St Christopher's School – that's where we used to play our home games.

"I don't think I was meant to be playing that game and something happened, I think an injury, so I got called up. With my first touch I came on and scored!"

Goalscoring has always been a key attribute of Wilson's, though he has been utilised in other areas of the pitch previously too.

Wilson said: "When I was 16 playing Under-18s in the Youth Cup, I came on at right-back and I actually quite enjoyed that position, but I think I play my best at striker because I've always learned that position from a young age and developed like that."

As well as helpful development from the Under-18 coaches, the striker has also been passed on plenty of advice from the first team and enjoys being surrounded by them each day, which he explained in greater detail.

"It's good because you learn a lot from them, not just on the pitch but also off it, like how they carry themselves, how they stay professional and how they look after their bodies in the gym.

"When Jake Jarvis was here, I was on his boots and he would just say if I played in Under-23s games or different games, he would tell me what to do and give me advice."



With plenty of goals to his name this season, Wilson is looking to continue his good form into the second half of the season having netted under the lights at Kenilworth Road when the lads put up a good show against Sheffield Wednesday in the FA Youth Cup third round tie last month.

The striker featured in both Youth Cup matches last season too, at home against Brentwood Town and away at Peterborough United's ABAX Stadium.

"It's my favourite time to be a scholar, playing at the stadium in front of the fans," added Wilson. "We gave a good account of ourselves against Sheffield Wednesday, but they were a good, older team than us and we couldn't quite get the equaliser we deserved. It was a great experience to use for next year though."

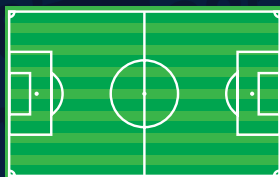

After three and a half seasons of success, the Town's tilt at promotion from the football basement of Division Four (now League Two) to the top flight in record time was coming off the rails by the spring of 1971, and a succession of draws and single goal defeats gradually pushed the team down the Division Two (now Championship) table.

By the time Birmingham visited Kenilworth Road at the beginning of April 1971 it was make or break time as the dropping of further points would mean that thoughts of promotion could be virtually forgotten for another year.

Birmingham travelled to Luton on the crest of a wave. From a position near the foot of the table at Christmas, they had gone 14 games without defeat and picked up 25 points in the process (in the days of two points for a win) and were now only a point behind the Hatters.

Leading this resurgence in fortune was a 16-year-old forward, Trevor Francis, who

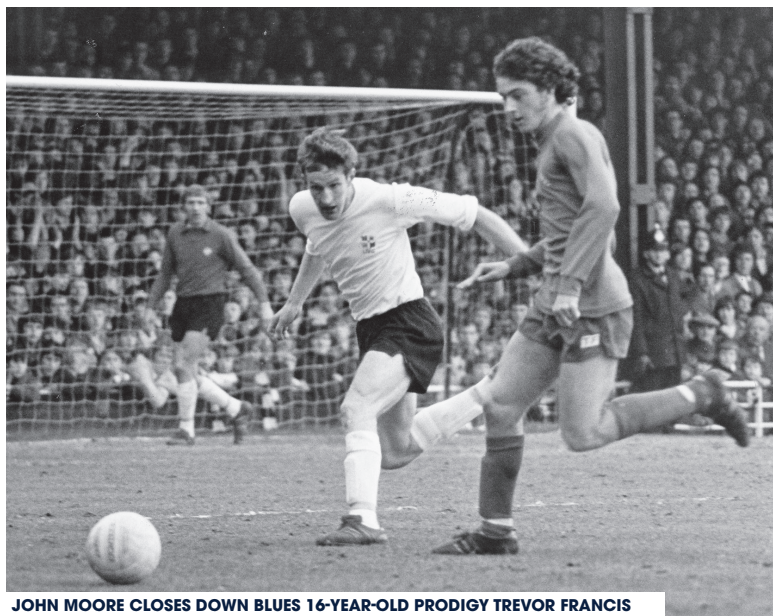
had taken the football world by storm when scoring 15 goals in only 16 games.

In their previous home game almost 50,000 had crammed into St Andrews, and it was not surprising to hear that the Town were expecting over 8,000 to travel from the Midlands.

A long queue of mainly Birmingham supporters snaked down Oak Road as early as one o'clock and eventually a crowd of 25,172, which has not been beaten in the League since, was shoehorned into Kenilworth Road with the latecomers missing a barnstorming start from Birmingham, who were two goals up within the first 20 minutes.

Firstly, half-fit Luton centre-half Chris Nicholl failed to clear a soft through ball leaving Bob Latchford with an easy chance which he scuffed past Tony Read in the Luton goal, and when Phil Summerill was left unmarked for a free header soon afterwards the Town's season appeared over.

The Hatters, though, were playing the better football and did not deserve to be trailing and, after 36 minutes, were handed a lifeline when Viv Busby, in and out of the side all season, headed a Malcolm Macdonald pass between two dithering Birmingham defenders and coolly slotted home.

It was now time for the Blues defence to come under pressure and just before half-time came the deserved equaliser when Busby managed to deflect a Macdonald shot, which was going wide, past Mike Kelly in the Birmingham goal.

The fightback was completed shortly after the break when Birmingham centre-half Roger Hynd, who was having a torrid time, brought down Macdonald unnecessarily just outside the area. Skipper Mike Keen sized up the situation and slipped the ball sideways to Alan Slough who hammered in a 30-yard free-kick with the Blues defenders still setting up a wall.

From then on the game was end to end but, with John Moore completely dominating Francis, the

Hatters managed to hold on and dent the progress of the Blues, while at the same time ensuring that their own promotion hopes were re-awakened.

"What a magnificent show that was," said Luton manager Alec Stock afterwards. "All I wanted to do towards the end was to turn this team of 21 year olds into mature 28 year olds but they hung on for me."

The national press scribes were generally praising in their reports with Danny Blanchflower in the Sunday Express saying, 'The score fairly reflects the difference between the two sides. Luton deserved to win but could never feel really confident about the manner of victory.'

His counterpart in the Daily Express, Steve Curry, managed to obtain a quote from Birmingham manager Freddie Goodwin who said, "I have to hand it to Luton. They fought back magnificently after being two down and it was a courageous win. It's a great blow to the younger players like Trevor Francis who have become used to winning, but it is part of their growing up."

After a tenth place finish in the Town's first season back in the Championship for nine years, supporters were naturally hoping for the same again or perhaps even better in 2006/07 assuming the players could be kept together.

The loss of Steve Howard, top scorer for the past five seasons, to Derby and influential skipper Kevin Nicholls to Leeds over the summer therefore was bound to be felt although according to the club's directors it was 'good business'!

As it turned out the Town got off to a reasonable start and by the time of the visit of high-flying Birmingham in mid-October a comfortable mid-table position had been attained.

Birmingham, relegated from the top flight the previous season, were attempting to bounce back first time and sat in second spot having lost only twice at that stage in the campaign.

The Blues attacked with purpose from the kick-off and with the Luton defence under siege it came as little surprise when DJ Campbell muscled his way through the Luton rearguard and slammed the ball home after 14 minutes.

Surprisingly Birmingham sat back after this early onslaught leaving Rowan Vine and Sam Parkin to miss presentable chances before, on 26 minutes, Lewis Emanuel was upended in the box by Bruno N'Gotty leaving Vine to net from the spot.

Two minutes later Vine prodded the ball home from close range following a penalty box melee before the game settled down with both sides content to just lump the ball into each other's penalty area.

This tactic produced dividends for Birmingham when, on 66 minutes, former Town target Neil Dannis lashed a loose ball home from 15 yards.

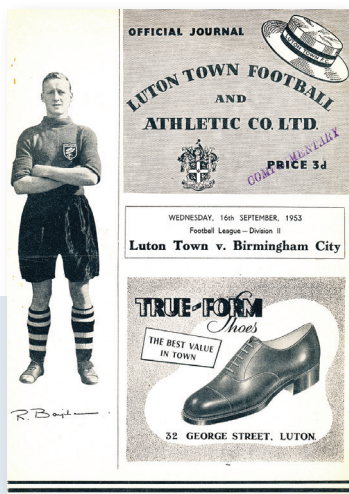
With both sides chasing the winner it was the Hatters who came out on top when substitute David Bell, making a rare appearance following his £125,000 transfer from Rushden & Diamonds the previous February, stroked the ball home after being cleverly set up by Carlos Edwards.

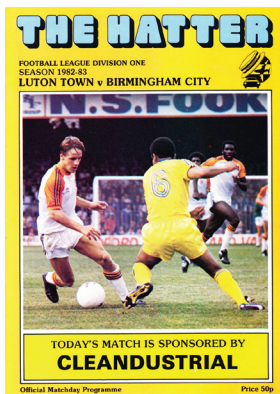

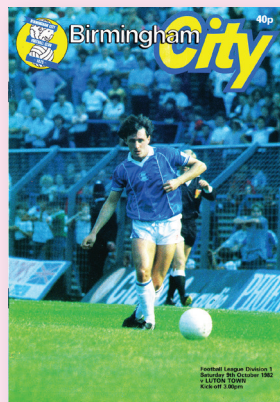

THE BOYS ARE BACK IN TOWN

**FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES TEN PLAYERS
WHO HAD MORE THAN ONE SPELL AT BIRMINGHAM CITY**

TREVOR FRANCIS

England international striker Trevor Francis was both a player and manager at Birmingham City. Signing professional for Blues in May 1971, he starred as they won promotion in 1971-72 and were twice FA Cup semi-finalists, netting 119 goals in 280 League games before joining Nottingham Forest for £1m in February 1979. He scored their winner in the European Cup final that year, then played for Manchester City, Sampdoria, Atalanta and Rangers. Later player-boss of QPR and Sheffield Wednesday, he managed Birmingham from May 1996 until December 2001, guiding them to the 2001 League Cup final, then was Crystal Palace's manager.

PETER WITHE

England international striker Peter Withe had two spells at Birmingham City. He played for Southport, Barrow, Port Elizabeth City, Arcadia Shepherds and Wolves prior to joining Birmingham in August 1975. Moving to Nottingham Forest in September 1976, he starred as they won the League Championship and League Cup in 1977-78. He moved via Newcastle United to Aston Villa in June 1980 and was a key figure as they won the League Championship in 1980-81 and European Cup in 1982. Later with Sheffield United, he rejoined Blues on loan in September 1987, netting 11 goals in 43 League games overall. He held coaching and management posts.

STEVE LYNEX

Winger Steve Lynex had two spells at Birmingham City. Starting with hometown West Brom, helping to win the FA Youth Cup in 1976, he won the FAI Cup with Shamrock Rovers in 1978 before joining Birmingham in April 1979. He scored on his League debut at Manchester City and made a significant contribution as Blues regained top-flight status at the first attempt in 1979-80. Moving to Leicester City in February 1981, he was a promotion winner again in 1982-83. He was loaned back to Birmingham in October 1986 and netted 12 goals in 56 League games overall for Blues, then played for West Brom, Cardiff City and Telford, becoming a publican.

IAN HANDYSIDES

Ex-England Youth midfielder Ian Handysides had two spells at Birmingham City. Signing professional at St Andrew's in January 1980, he made his League debut in Birmingham's 3-0 defeat at home to Southampton a year later and reunited with Alan Buckley at Walsall in January 1984. He helped them beat top-flight Coventry City in the 1984-85 League Cup second round. Rejoining Birmingham in March 1986, he was unable to prevent relegation from the top-flight that season and netted six goals in 118 League games overall for Blues before ill health forced him to hang up his boots in October 1988. He tragically died of cancer in August 1990.

MICK FERGUSON

Striker Mick Ferguson had two spells at Birmingham City. Signing professional for Coventry City in December 1971, he was leading marksman in 1976-77 and joined Everton for £280,000 in August 1981. He was loaned to Birmingham in November 1982, then returned to St Andrew's on a permanent basis in June 1983, scoring nine times in 22 League games overall for Blues. Loaned back to Coventry, he helped them preserve top-flight status at Birmingham's expense in 1983-84. He joined Brighton in exchange for Mark Jones in September 1984, then had spells at Colchester United and Wealdstone, becoming community officer at Sunderland, then Leeds United.

ROBERT HOPKINS

Winger Robert Hopkins was an influential figure as Birmingham regained top-flight status at the first attempt in 1984-85. Initially with Aston Villa, 'Hoppy' followed Ron Saunders to Birmingham in exchange for Alan Curbishley in March 1983, starring as they reach the FA Cup sixth round in 1983-84. He moved to Manchester City in August 1986 but reunited with Saunders at West Brom in exchange for Imre Varadi two months later. Rejoining Birmingham in March 1989, he was a member of their 1991 Leyland/DAF Cup winning squad, netting 30 goals in 173 League games overall. He later played for Shrewsbury, Instant Dict and Colchester.

PETER SHEARER

Ex-England Semi-Pro midfielder Peter Shearer featured in Birmingham City's 1994-95 Second Division title and Auto Windscreens Shield 'double' triumph. A former Blues apprentice, he made his League debut in their 0-0 draw at home to Shrewsbury three months before turning professional in February 1985. He helped Blues to regain top-flight status that season, then had spells with Nuneaton Borough and Cheltenham, moving to AFC Bournemouth in March 1989. Rejoining Birmingham in January 1994, he netted seven goals in 29 League games overall for Blues before his career was ended by injury. He has since coached at Blues' Academy.

PAUL PESCHISOLDO

Canadian international striker Paul Peschisolido had two spells at Birmingham. He played for Toronto Blizzard before moving to Birmingham in November 1992. Leading marksman that season, he reunited with Lou Macari at Stoke City in exchange for Dave Regis in August 1994. The husband of Blues' then-

managing director Karren Brady, he rejoined Birmingham in March 1996 and netted 17 goals in 52 League games overall. Sold to West Brom for £600,000 in July 1996, he joined Fulham for £1.1m in October 1997 and starred in their 1998-99 Second Division title triumph. He later played for Sheffield United, Derby and Luton, then managed Burton.

PAUL DEVLIN

Scotland international winger Paul Devlin helped Birmingham City regain top-flight status in 2001-02. Starting with Stafford Rangers, he joined Notts County in February 1992 and was leading scorer as they won the Anglo-Italian Cup in 1994-95. He moved to Birmingham with Andy Legg in February 1996 and joined Sheffield United for £200,000 in March 1998. Returning to Birmingham for £200,000 in February 2002, he netted 32 goals in 123 League games overall for Blues before sold to Watford for £150,000 in September 2003. Later playing for Walsall, Bohemians, Tamworth, Sutton Coldfield and Halesowen, he has become a football coach.

WES THOMAS

Striker Wes Thomas had two spells at Birmingham City. A former QPR scholar, he was top scorer for Waltham Forest in 2005-06 and Thurrock in 2006-07. He moved via Fisher to Dagenham & Redbridge in September 2008 and helped win promotion in 2009-10. Joining Cheltenham Town in July 2010, he moved via Crawley to AFC Bournemouth in September 2011. He was top scorer in 2011-12 and loaned to Birmingham in January 2013. Moving to Rotherham in January 2014, he rejoined Blues on a permanent basis in June 2014 and netted seven goals in 44 League games overall. He joined Oxford United in June 2016, then Grimsby and Notts County.

MONDAY'S CLUB STATEMENT

We are delighted to hear the fantastic news from Luton Council that the High Court has confirmed that no appeal has been made within the deadline against the pre-Christmas decision to dismiss C&R's call for a Judicial Review on the Newlands Park planning approval.

Along with our colleagues at the Council, we always believed that their decision last March to grant permission for the mixed-use development at Junction 10 was fair and not open to challenge. The Judge agreed on December 19th and finally C&R have given up on contesting the decision further.

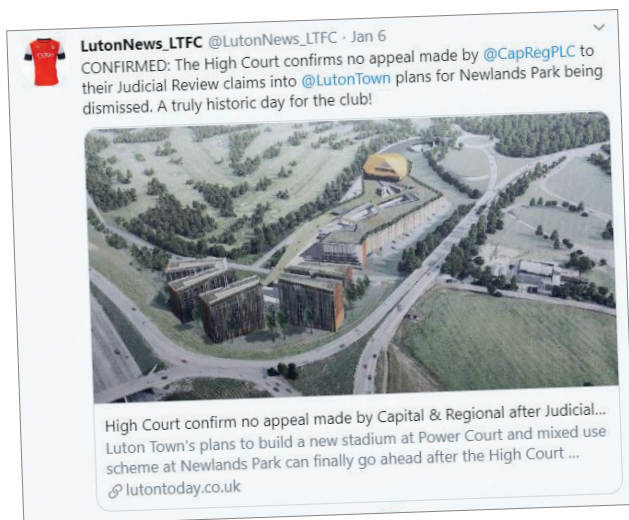

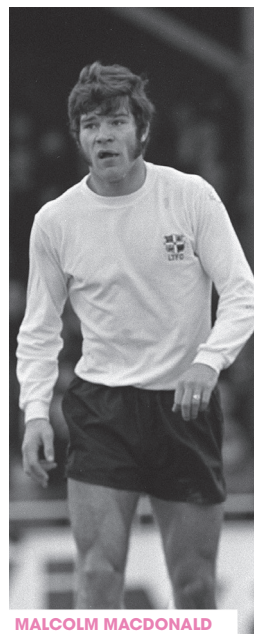

ST: PAUL WALSH AND MALCOLM MACDONALD

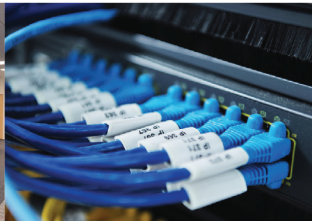

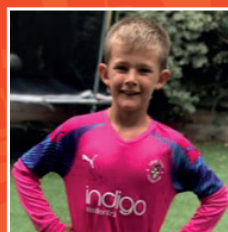

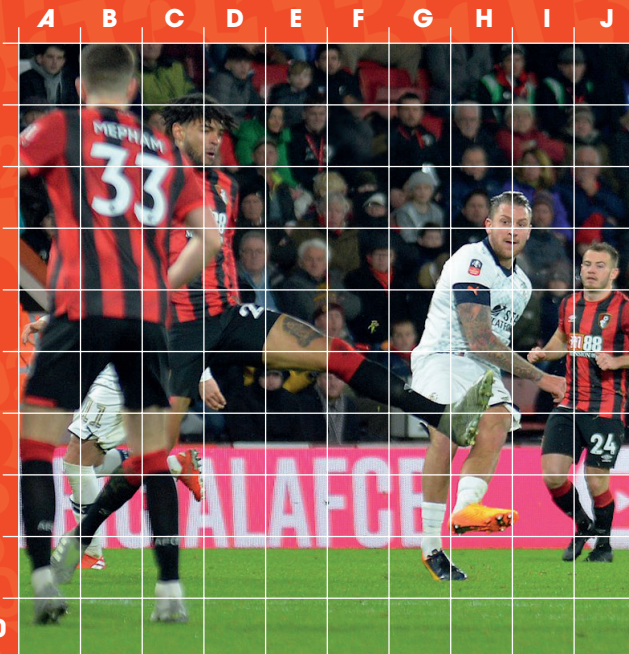

WHO?

Twice champions of Europe, Forest have now been a Championship side since 2008, having had a three-year spell in League One. A club with bucket loads of history, the City Ground based side haven't quite reached the heights supporters of a certain generation became accustomed to – after near-misses at returning to the Premier League, they have spent the last few years battling it out in the bottom half of the table.

STADIUM - CITY GROUND

Built in 1898, the City Ground sits right next to the River Trent and has been expanded and refurbished on several occasions throughout its history. Now with a capacity of just over 30,000, the ground itself sits within a stone's throw of city rivals Notts County and the Trent Bridge cricket ground. The record attendance for any game at the City Ground came in 1967, when 49,946 crammed in for a match against Manchester United.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Hatters faced Forest in Championship action earlier on this campaign, losing 2-1 at Kenilworth Road. Callum McManaman fired in late on, but goals from Lewis Grabban and Sammy Ameobi put the result beyond the Town. Nottingham Forest hold the upper hand since the first meeting in 1938, with 26 wins compared to Luton's 21. They have drawn on 15 occasions and Sunday's match will be the 63rd game between the clubs.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Three of the League Cup winning squad from 1988 have also had a foot in the Forest camp, notably with Kingsley Black signing for Brian Clough's side in 1991 for £1.5 million. Danny Wilson had a brief spell at the City Ground in 1983, whilst Mick Harford was caretaker boss in the 2004/05 campaign. Steve Sutton joined on loan in the 1991/92 campaign from Forest, whilst we also welcomed Jorge Grant and Jason Cummings on half season loans last year.

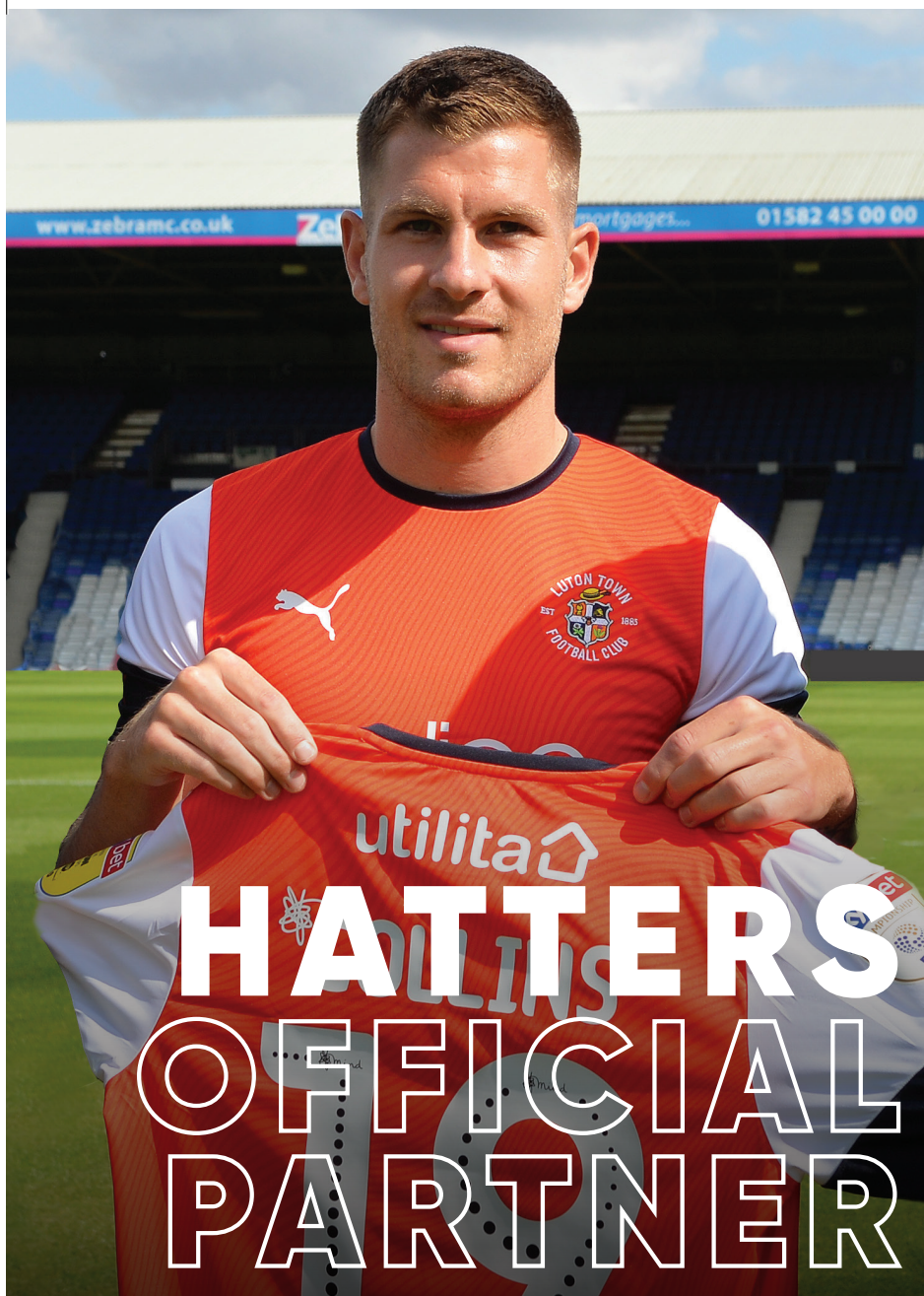
In the number 10 role was Cameron McGeehan, a player who timed his runs perfectly to pop up with a fine number of goals during his stay at Kenilworth Road.
