

**Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for another big game in the Championship.**

I'd like to welcome everyone who has travelled south with my former club Stoke City. I was only there for a short time, but I made a lot of friends in the Potteries and I wish everyone a safe journey back this evening.

We sat sixth in the table after another terrific home win on Tuesday night, when we had to show real character and determination to fight our way back from a goal down against a very good Middlesbrough side.

I wasn't too down about how we'd played in the first half, despite being obviously disappointed to concede the early goal. I thought we created openings, but just needed to find a clinical edge.

When we came out after the break we discovered it, and we have the capability to do that to teams. We've seen in the Swansea and Coventry games here that we are front-footed and can score goals in quick bursts, and I was delighted to see the result turned around.

A lot was made before the game about making five changes, but we have the squad here now and I have to show that I trust everyone. In these three game weeks, we have learned to freshen things up a bit. I didn't do that in the last one, and we managed to get

seven points. But we just felt that after being below par at Preston, we needed some fresh legs and the players who came in were first class.

Of course, the part that you played from the stands can't be understated either. In my programme notes on Tuesday I asked for everyone to embrace the midweek nights under the lights, because we know the opportunities will get less with each one that passes, as Power Court becomes a reality.

You certainly did that. I could sense the eruption building before half-time as we went close to the equaliser, but in that second half you were something else. It was hairs on the back of the neck stuff at times. More of the same today please.

Finally, you will have seen that now more than 60 of us staff at the Club, including the Academy and Community Trust, are taking part in the Prostate United challenge in support of Mick.

It shows the fantastic spirit that runs through Luton Town, and I'm proud of every single person and of our club, even though my calves might not be feeling it right now!

# NOTES FROM THE BOARDROOM

## Good afternoon everyone and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road.

Our visitors today are Stoke City, whose record this season is similar to ours. Like us the Potters have only won one major trophy in their 158-year existence, however, they only recently completed a 10-year spell in the Premier League. We have played them 46 times since our first match in 1953, winning 11, drawing 15 and losing 20. Our last victory was in the equivalent of the current League One in October 2000 when we won 3-1 at the newly built Britannia Stadium.

They are one of the richest clubs in the Championship having been owned by the Coates family since 2006. Of course, this fact, on top of Nathan's time with them and the 20 years since a win, make for a mouthwatering challenge today.

What a game on Tuesday night, and what a way to bounce back from a disappointing result and performance at Preston. Inconsistency seems to be a thing in the Championship, and with Bournemouth losing their unbeaten start to North End on Wednesday night, every team now has had shock results against current form. I suspect it has a lot to do with the ridiculous schedule of three games in a week followed by two weeks off, and the fact that we seem to have lost the home/away/home/away routine to be replaced by away/away/home/home.

We had West Brom and Barnsley away with two days in between, and Blackburn and Bristol City likewise. How does that give adequate time for recovery? Or an opportunity to correct in training what might have gone wrong in the first game, or prepare for a different style and formation? The lack of recovery time might also go someway to explain the increase in soft tissue injuries that have been seen.

Live football is the soul and those who watch it

are the lifeblood of the game, and this is another example of supporters not getting due consideration. Travel is not easy these days. Probably the ideal transport is rail, but for many if not most midweek games, it is not an option because the timetable particularly for late finishes doesn't work. Roads are increasingly congested and the length of journey cannot be guaranteed and the cost is becoming more significant. It is very different to have to find the money for an away game in two weeks than one in three days. The powers-that-be should be doing far more to encourage live participation.

Can you remember what fun it was to have a local derby on Boxing Day and at Easter? Who do we have this year, but Bristol City and Cardiff. Supporters are amazing and, as a slight aside, hats off to the Middlesbrough fans for filling the away end on Tuesday and generating their share of the tremendous atmosphere in the ground. It seems to me that the more difficult it is made to travel and the sometimes nonsensical scheduling of fixtures, the less fans will travel and the greater will be the loss of revenue. This is one of those situations where there is a gradual erosion, which seems to attract little comment and which, if it isn't addressed, will have gone too far to be reversed.





It appears as though the intention is to discourage fans from travelling so that in future stadia will house home fans only and everyone else will watch on TV in the pub or at home.

In his notes on Tuesday, Gary talked about progress being made with our developments and particularly the modified approval from the Council and detailed plans for the Stadium at Power Court. We are excited by what we have seen so far and staggered by the amount of detail being provided. It is amusing to see Kempy seemingly surgically attached to his laser tape measure wherever he goes. Apart from the inhouse work by architects and engineers, Gary and his team are undertaking many site visits for ideas, just as much what not to do, as to do. I am a great lover of Kenilworth Road, but can't wait to see and feel everything come together in the new stadium.

Last, but not least, a few lines as we approach another Remembrance Day. Those of you who saw or listened to the game at Preston last week will have noticed the confusion over the minute's silence. There was the bugle, the referee's whistle, loud applause and then the silence. Eric might have commented "all the right ingredients, but not necessarily in the right order".

As we recall the dead and particularly the youths that lost their lives fighting for freedom, it might be appropriate to give a thought to the tragic death in August of the 19-year-old Afghan youth footballer, Zaki Anwari, who plunged to the ground after clinging on to a plane in an attempt to escape the horrors of war. We will never know what life had in store for him or whether he would have made the grade as a footballer. Nor can we know what would have been the future of all other victims of wars around the world. So, as we stand and honour the lives lost in conflicts past and present, the following words of G K Chesterton seem to fit the bill.

*"Courage is almost a contradiction in terms. It means a strong desire to live taking the form of readiness to die."*



# HATTER PROSTA

**November has begun, so too has the Prostate United challenge for the 61 staff members at Luton Town, who have come together in support of Hatters hero Mick Harford to raise funds for Prostate Cancer UK with a month-long fitness challenge.**


Earlier this year, the Town assistant-manager was diagnosed with the disease that kills one man every 45 minutes, and recently completed a two-month course of treatment that has included daily visits to UCLH in London for radiotherapy.

Staff at the football club wanted to do something to show they were with the 62-year-old former striker and manager every step of the way, and when head of performance development James Redden suggested joining the Prostate United challenge, the response was overwhelming.


‘Prostate United’ was created by Rotherham duo Stephen Gilpin and Ross Burbeary three years ago, and since then has seen hundreds of football club staff run or cycle every day each November to raise funds in the fight against the disease.

Here you can see how some of the staff have been getting on with the chance, with participants having the option to choose a daily distance to run or cycle – either 10km, 5km, or 3km, on foot, or 25km, 15km or 10km on the bike. For some it has even been a bit of both!



## THE GOALKEEPER: JOSEF BURSIK

Bursik began his career with AFC Wimbledon and spent eight years there, playing for their academy sides. He joined Stoke in July 2017 as a 16-year-old and his first taste of senior football was on loan at Hednesford, then AFC Telford. Bursik was also loaned out to Accrington, giving him his first taste of the EFL. The 21-year-old joined Doncaster on loan at the start of the 2020/21 season, but was recalled by Stoke in November. He made his Potters debut against Huddersfield that month, then joined Peterborough on loan before playing for Lincoln in the League One play-offs on an emergency loan.

## THE DEFENDER: BEN WILMOT

Beginning his career at Stevenage as a scholar, Wilmot came through the academy at the club, and broke into the first-team. He made 10 league appearances for the club, including playing against the Hatters in 2018, before leaving for Watford. Wilmot made his debut for the club in the EFL Cup against Reading, and later joined Serie A side Udinese on loan. He made five appearances in the Italian top-flight before returning to Vicarage Road. The 22-year-old spent time on loan at Swansea, before establishing himself in the Watford team during the 2020/21 season. In June 2021, he signed for Stoke.



## THE MANAGER: MICHAEL O'NEILL

Michael O'Neill began his managerial career in Scotland, first as an assistant manager to Mixu Paatela at Cowdenbeath, before being Brechin City manager in April 2006. After just over two years with the club, O'Neill left Brechin for Shamrock Rovers in December 2008. He won the SSE Airtricity League Premier Division twice as manager, before going onto manage Northern Ireland. He guided the nation to their first-ever European Championship by qualifying in 2016. He became Stoke manager in November 2019, initially combining both roles.

## THE MIDFIELDER: MARIO VRANCIC

Another signing from the summer, Mario Vrancic signed for the Potters after leaving Norwich. Vrancic began his professional career with Mainz, playing for the second side before progressing into the first-team. He later moved onto Borussia Dortmund II, also having spells in the top two tiers of German football with Paderborn and Darmstadt. He made the move to English football in the summer of 2017, joining Norwich City. During his time with the Canaries, he helped the Carrow Road outfit to Championship title success twice - in both the 2018/19 and 2020/21 seasons.



## THE STRIKER: STEVEN FLETCHER

A vastly experienced striker, Steven Fletcher began his career at Hibernian. He scored 52 times in 189 appearances in all competitions for Hibs, before moving onto Burnley. He only spent a season at Turf Moor, leaving for Wolves. Fletcher netted 22 times in the Premier League across two seasons for Wolves, making the move to Sunderland in 2012. The striker enjoyed four seasons at the Stadium of Light, making over 100 appearances in all competitions. Fletcher spent a season on loan at Marseille, before joining Sheffield Wednesday. After four years with the Owls, the 34-year-old joined Stoke in August 2020.

## WATCH OUT FOR... JACOB BROWN

Jacob Brown began his career with Barnsley, and made his debut for the club in 2016. After featuring mostly for the Under-23s, he signed for Chesterfield on loan. He would break into the Barnsley first-team under Daniel Stendel and was a part of the side that won promotion to the Championship, making 40 appearances the following year. The 23-year-old joined Stoke in September 2020, and scored his first Potters goal against Wolves in the EFL Cup. His first season for the club saw him make 41 Championship appearances, scoring five times. So far this season, Brown has four goals.



## A HAT IN BOTH CAMPS

Born in Cape Town in 1966, Mark Stein came to England as a young boy.

Following older brother Brian to Kenilworth Road, he signed for Luton in 1983 as a junior before accepting professional terms in January 1984.

After making his Hatters debut in that same year, Mark had to wait until the 1986/87 campaign before earning a regular place in the side when he showed speed off the mark, excellent ball control and an eye for goal – he also earned a Littlewoods Cup winner's medal after coming on as a substitute in the final against Arsenal.

After 71 first team appearances and 23 goals, a bid of £300,000 from QPR in 1988 was too good to turn down. His stay at Loftus Road was short though, and he was drifting around at Oxford when Stoke manager Lou Macari invited him to the Victoria Ground where his career took off again.

Earning legendary status in the Potteries, his goals shot Stoke to the championship of Division Two (now League One) in 1993, before he joined Chelsea for £1.5 million, where he continued to net regularly.

Loan spells back at Stoke and at Ipswich followed before a permanent move to the south coast with Bournemouth in 1998.

Mark finished his Football League career back where it started, joining Ricky Hill's Luton in 2000, where he added a further 36 appearances and three goals to his Hatters tally.

Moving to non-League with Dagenham & Redbridge and Waltham Forest, Mark also studied for physiotherapy qualifications which he put to use at Barnet and later Crawley Town.


Mark now teaches children with special educational needs in Kensal Rise.

**The Hatters had started last season with a bang, winning their first four games before suffering a 3-0 home defeat to Manchester United in the Carabao Cup.**

A 1-0 reversal at Watford followed before it was back to winning ways with a 2-0 home victory against Wycombe which put us up to fifth in the table.

An International break gave everyone a chance to re-charge batteries before it was back to League action with a visit from Stoke who were unbeaten away from home.

The Town certainly had the majority of the first half but spurned several gilt edged chances. Glen Rea, Elliot Lee, Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu and Rhys

Norrington-Davies all saw efforts saved, flash wide or go over the top leaving supporters to rue the missed opportunities.

Fears were realised in the opening minute of the second period when Tyrese Campbell produced an excellent cross for veteran Steven Fletcher to head the Potters into the lead.

Ten minutes later the Stoke lead was doubled when the Town failed to clear the ball from a corner leaving an unmarked Nick Powell to slam the ball home from close range.

The Hatters huffed and puffed after this but with the Stoke defence holding firm the game ebbed away leaving the Town to lament the chances wasted over the 90 minutes.



# MEMORY MATCH

**Luton Town 6 Stoke City 2.  
Division One (now Championship).  
27th November 1993.**

**After escaping relegation from Division Two (now the Championship) in 1993, in what would have been the Town's second successive demotion, manager David Pleat and his players hoped that the new campaign would bring about a period of stability and perhaps even a return to the top flight.**

Unfortunately, after a bright opening game, when local rivals Watford were seen off at Kenilworth Road, the Hatters went on a run of six games without tasting further victory which sent them tumbling down the table once more.

The poor run was finally ended in emphatic style when Barnsley were thrashed 5-0 at Kenilworth Road although the 'Tykes' played for most of the

game with only ten men after Gerry Taggart was sent off for a bad foul on Julian James. Celebrations were cut short, however, when it was pointed out that the Town's two victories had been against depleted sides, as Watford had actually been reduced to nine men on the opening day!

By the time of the visit of Stoke to Kenilworth Road on 27th November, the Town had played another nine games since beating Barnsley but had won only three of them, losing the other six, and it was no surprise that we were hovering just above the relegation places only two points off the bottom.

Off-field problems had raised their head once more in the shape of chairman David Kohler's decision to sell the club to the Ellingham and Mitchell consortium. The 'will they, won't they' saga went on for weeks, with claims and counterclaims reverberating around the corridors of Kenilworth Road which obviously had an unsettling effect on all those involved with the club.

The Town had been due to play Wolves at Kenilworth Road the week before the visit of Stoke, but the game had been called off at the eleventh hour due to an icy pitch. It was hoped that the extra week would give David Pleat the time to get some of his injured players fit. As it turned out he was unsuccessful as Marvin Johnson, Julian James, David Greene and David Preece all failed to make the starting line-up. Paul Telfer was a late casualty and John Dreyer was out through suspension.

Stoke had eyes on the other end of the table and were sitting comfortably in eighth spot only seven points off the top. They had, though, suffered a blow earlier in the month when Lou Macari, who had led them to promotion the previous season, had decided to move to Celtic, one of his old clubs, as manager. His replacement, Joe Jordan, had only one decision to make before the trip to Kenilworth Road which was whether to use loan signing from Celtic, Gordon Marshall, in goal or recall out of form Mark Prudhoe. He decided to give ex-Scotland international Marshall his debut.



The supporters' heads were in their hands as early as the second minute when a mistake from young Jamie Campbell, deputising for Dreyer in central defence, gifted the ball to Potters' Dave Regis who made no mistake with a low strike. It got even worse a few minutes later when Des Linton headed Toddy Orlygsson's corner into his own net.

The players did not have long to feel sorry for themselves as within two minutes Kerry Dixon had reduced the deficit. Dixon, probably the only player to have benefitted from the enforced lay-off the previous week, after being out for a large part of the season through injury, took a pass from Ceri Hughes in his stride and hammered a 25 yard shot into the top corner.

Suddenly the Hatters had clicked into gear and almost everything they tried came off. After 35 minutes, Hughes hit a 25 yarder past Marshall from a short free-kick taken by Alan Harper, and two minutes later the recovery was complete when Scott Oakes fired a left foot drive into the bottom corner of the net. Mitchell Thomas, on loan from West Ham and making his second home debut after seven years away from Kenilworth Road, hit a low cross to the back of the penalty area

where another loanee, Paul Dickov, sold the Stoke defence a dummy leaving the way open for Oakes.

The Potters changed formation for the second half in a bid to save the game and for time caused a few anxious moments in the Luton defence. Trevor Peake, however, swept up brilliantly to hold together the makeshift Hatters back line as the game gradually swung away from Stoke once more.

Minutes after John Hartson came on for Dickov, who had broken his nose, the Town made the game safe when, after a good run and pass from Oakes, a thundering right foot shot from Dixon gave the goalkeeper no chance.

The scoring was still not complete for on 79 minutes Dixon converted an Oakes cross with his head for his first hat-trick in Luton colours. Tony Thorpe was then introduced to the fray for his first taste of League action, replacing the tiring Jason Rees, and was instrumental in the four man move that set up Hartson to side-foot in a last minute goal to make it a resounding 6-2 victory, the Town's best for five years.

# MANAGING TO SUCCEED - STOKE CITY

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten leading Stoke City managers

## ARTHUR SHALLCROSS


Arthur Shallcross managed Stoke City to promotion in 1921-22. He played for hometown Leek and was a Football League referee before becoming Stoke's secretary-manager in February 1919, but was unpopular with the supporters after selling star player Charlie Parker to Sunderland. After Stoke narrowly avoided relegation in 1920-21, he signed several new players including future manager Bob McGrory and plotted a dramatic improvement in results. He guided the Potters to the top-flight the following season as runners-up to Nottingham Forest. Resigning in March 1923, he resided in Stoke until his death in September 1950.

## TOM MATHER

Long-serving manager Tom Mather guided Stoke City to the Second Division title in 1932-33. He was assistant-secretary at Manchester City and Bolton Wanderers, where he had a spell as secretary-manager, before taking charge of Southend United in July 1920. Appointed Stoke's boss in October 1923, he also led them to the Third Division (North) title in 1926-27 and so nearly the top-flight in 1931-32. He steered the Potters to the FA Cup sixth round in 1933-34 and remained in charge until May 1935, then had spells as manager of Newcastle, Leicester City and Kilmarnock, residing in Stoke until his death in March 1957.

## BOB McGRORY

Scottish full-back Bob McGrory gave Stoke City outstanding service as both a player and manager. Initially with Dumbarton, he joined Burnley in August 1920 and moved to Stoke in April 1921. He starred in their 1921-22 promotion success, then was ever-present as the Potters won the Third Division (North) title in 1926-27. Also ever-present in 1934-35, he made 479 League appearances before becoming manager in June 1935. He

guided Stoke to fourth place in the top-flight in 1935-36 and 1946-47. Resigning in May 1952, he then managed Merthyr Tydfil to the Southern League title in 1953-54 and died in May 1954.

## FRANK TAYLOR

Former England wartime international right-back Frank Taylor managed Stoke City to the FA Cup fifth round in 1955-56 and 1957-58. Signing professional for Wolves in July 1936, the right-back was an FA Cup finalist in 1939 and guested for several clubs during the war. He joined Wolves' coaching staff, then became Scarborough's manager in June 1948 and later assisted Major Frank Buckley at Leeds United. Appointed Stoke's manager in June 1952, he remained in charge at the Victoria Ground until June 1960, then resided in Sheffield until his death in January 1970. His brother Jack managed Leeds United and QPR.

## TONY WADDINGTON

Long-serving manager Tony Waddington plotted Stoke City's 1972 League Cup final triumph. A former Crewe Alexandra right-half, he joined Stoke as a coach in July 1952, then was their assistant-boss before becoming manager in June 1960. He guided the Potters to the Second Division title in 1962-63, the League Cup final in 1964 and two consecutive FA Cup semi-finals. Stoke also qualified for the UEFA Cup on two occasions and lifted the Watney Cup in 1973. He remained in charge until March 1977 and returned to Crewe as manager from June 1979 until July 1981, residing locally until his death in January 1994.

## ALAN DURBAN

Former Welsh international midfielder Alan Durban managed Stoke City back to the top-flight in 1978-79. Initially with Cardiff City, he joined Derby County in July 1963 and helped win the Second Division title in 1968-69 and



League Championship in 1971-72. He moved to Shrewsbury Town in September 1973 and became player-boss, steering them to promotion in 1974-75. Appointed Stoke's boss in February 1978, he also plotted the Potters' 1978-79 League Cup run, leaving in June 1981 to manage Sunderland. He rejoined Cardiff City as manager in September 1984, then was Derby's assistant-boss and Sunderland's chief scout.

## LOU MACARI

Former Scotland international midfielder Lou Macari managed Stoke City to the Second Division title in 1992-93. He won all three Scottish honours with Celtic before moving to Manchester United in January 1973, featuring in three FA Cup finals including their 1977 triumph. Appointed Swindon's player-boss in July 1984, he twice guided them to promotion and took charge of West Ham in July 1989. He managed Birmingham and became Stoke's boss in May 1991, plotting their 1992 Autoglass Trophy final success. Rejoining Celtic as boss, he managed Stoke again from September 1994 until July 1997, then Huddersfield.

## GUDJON THORDARSON

Icelandic manager Gudjon Thordarson plotted Stoke City's 2000 Auto Windscreens Shield final success. He won numerous honours as a player with IA Akranes and had three spells as manager, also managing Iceland, before becoming Stoke's boss in November 1999 after a consortium of Icelandic businessmen bought the club. He led the Potters to the Second Division play-offs in three consecutive years, including their 2002 final triumph. Leaving in May 2002, he has since managed Start, Barnsley, Keflavik, Notts County, IA Akranes again, Crewe Alexandra, Bi Bolungarvik, Grindavik, Runavik and Vikingur Olafsvik.

## TONY PULIS

Tony Pulis managed Stoke City to the 2011 FA Cup final. A hard-tackling midfielder with Bristol Rovers and hometown Newport County, he helped AFC Bournemouth to win the Third Division title in 1986-87. Later playing for Gillingham, he then managed AFC Bournemouth, Gillingham to promotion in 1995-96, Bristol City and Portsmouth. He was Stoke's boss from November 2002 until June 2005, then managed Plymouth before managing Stoke again between May 2006 and May 2013, guiding them to the top-flight in 2007-08. He has since managed Crystal Palace, West Brom, Middlesbrough and Sheffield Wednesday.

## MARK HUGHES

Former Welsh international striker Mark Hughes managed Stoke City to ninth place in the Premier League in three consecutive seasons. 'Sparky' amassed a vast collection of honours as a player with Manchester United, Barcelona, Bayern Munich, Manchester United again, Chelsea, Southampton, Everton and Blackburn Rovers. He was twice voted PFA 'Player of the Year', then managed Wales, Blackburn, Manchester City, Fulham and QPR before becoming Stoke's boss in May 2013. Guiding the Potters to the League Cup semi-finals in 2015-16, he remained in charge until January 2018, then managed Southampton.



**Neil Warnock's visit to Kenilworth Road on Tuesday night marked his 1,602nd game as a manager in the Football League in a career spanning almost 40 years. Football has changed in every aspect in that time, from training methods, nutrition, sports science, scouting, recruitment and tactically, yet Middlesbrough's manager has stood the test of time.**

Warnock's longevity got me thinking about Town manager Nathan Jones – how has he adapted to the constant changes in challenges that he's faced with the Hatters in three divisions over almost four seasons in charge?

In Luton's promotion-winning League Two campaign and before his departure the season after, Luton were wedded to the diamond formation and it became part of Luton and Jones' identity. James Justin and Jack Stacey were the flying full-backs, with the four central players rotating and combining through the thirds with some swashbuckling passing moves.

Although in League Two Luton did swap to a front three away from home and sporadically use a back three, in their League One campaign, moving away from the diamond and the free-flowing passing football that accompanied it seemed unfathomable. Contrast that with how Jones has gone about adapting and building his side to take on the rigours and quality of the Championship.

Tactical flexibility is something that Luton fans have become accustomed to, with Town starting with a back three in ten of their 16 Championship games so far this season.

But more importantly, stylistically Jones has

evolved. Last season Luton didn't play in the front footed, free flowing nature that his teams identified with in previous seasons. They dug in and defended for long periods of games to ensure that they didn't overstretch themselves.

This season, Luton have been as direct as they've ever been under Jones and that's mostly due to the arrival of Elijah Adebayo. In the same way that Luton's manager identified Stacey and Justin as the key men and built a style around them, Jones has worked to tweak his beliefs and vision based on what's in front of him.

From the free-flowing passing and playing through the likes of Andrew Shinnie, Elliot Lee and Luke Berry to the direct, ultra-high tempo style of play that's built on physicality, hard work and fitness levels, Luton fans have seen the full breadth of styles of football under Jones.

That evolution and willingness to be flexible based on the challenges faced in the present moment, as opposed to the dogmatism of living and dying by a playing philosophy, is something that should be celebrated because how you go about winning football matches is arguably not as important as winning matches themselves. Style only becomes a problem when teams aren't winning.

The likes of Warnock have stood the test of time in football because of their openness to new ideas. They are like chameleons – adapting to their environment but retaining the same core identity every step of the way.

This is a joint initiative between Luton Central Mosque and Luton Town FC Community Trust.

**The Trust have formed a partnership with our near neighbours at the Luton Central Mosque to identify ten young men and women aged between 17 and 20 to join our football mentoring scheme and increase opportunities for the local Asian community to access affiliated football.**

The scheme is the brainchild of Councillor Aslam Khan, who has been a big supporter of our cohesion work in the Town for many years and is designed to create role models for the local community who will encourage and provide opportunities for young boys and girls to play football.

Like many urban Towns, Luton's local grass-root football scene is fractured and made up of lots of small youth clubs, many single teams, and two or three 'big clubs'. It won't have escaped anyone's

attention that, compared to the size of the Asian community in Luton, the number of young Asian boys and girls playing organised affiliated football is small. The reasons are well documented in terms of the invisible barriers, whether they are economic and financial, as well as cultural.

However, for the latest generation of young Asians the cultural barriers are much smaller and as Councillor Khan says: "If Luton can produce elite young cricketers, why not footballers." We agree, and the first team's continued success is making an impact with the local community who traditionally have 'supported' the top four Premier League teams, but now recognise Luton Town FC – that's a big change from six or seven years ago!

So, our mentoring scheme will look to create a cohort of coaches who can act as role models and ambassadors for our Club, and help identify talent, signpost to local clubs and provide coaching support for the many volunteers who run local clubs. The Trust will ensure our cohort of young men and women will gain their L1 Coaching Certificate while receiving coaching mentoring to prepare them in delivering sessions 'in the real world'.

Councillor Khan added: "Many elders in the local community now recognise that the current generation of Asian youngsters are more free spirited and less likely to simply follow community elders instructions once they reach their teenage years. This new generation need activities outside of school and the madrasa's, and sport is widely recognised as the most effective diversionary activity for young people. If we can provide role models for our local community to increase opportunities to play football and steer them away from anti-social behaviour while looking for talent, it is a win, win for everyone".

## PL KICKS TOURNAMENT ATTRACTS 16 LOCAL TEAMS

What a great KICKs tournament we enjoyed during half-term last week. Sixteen teams turned up at Lea Manor Rec centre to compete in three age groups, U13, U15 and U18s. The real achievement and magic of the tournaments are that they bring together young people from all over Town – only football has the power to do this as sadly, for lots of young men particularly, they only feel safe on their own turf.

Our KICKS project is funded by the Premier League with the main aim of promoting participation in sport in areas of high need, while providing opportunities for young people to develop skills and confidence while supporting young people to progress into positive pathways. KICKs uses sport as a hook to engage targeted young people and divert them away from gang related crime and anti-social behaviour. The aim is to help people feel safer and improve cohesion by bringing different communities together.

All participants took part in workshops delivered by local agencies that included Bedfordshire Police, Luton Youth Offending Services, Active Luton and ResoLUTiONS, with topics covered including gang awareness, relationships with local support services, youth social prescription support and advice on risks posed by vaping and high energy drinks.

PL KICKS Manager Wayne Polson said: "We aim to maintain the Club at the heart of its community by providing sport and educational opportunities that increase participation and support community cohesion through inclusive and accessible activities by delivering effective, affordable and accessible sport, physical activity and recreation. When we organise these events and everyone behaves and get on with each other, it's great. The more we provide opportunities to mix across Town the more we hope to show the positive pathways and support that exist for all young people."



# THE OPPOSITION

Stoke City were founded in 1863. Their only ever major trophy was in the 1971/72 season where they won the League Cup. They were also FA Cup finalists in 2011. Many of their fans see themselves as rivals with West Brom and Wolves, but their real local rivals are Port Vale, the two sides' grounds are separated by just 6.7 miles across the city. The Potters spent ten straight seasons in the top flight after their promotion in 2008. Their highest-ever finish was 9th and they finished 9th for three consecutive seasons. Stoke are currently in 6th in the Championship.

## 5 THINGS YOU MIGHT NOT KNOW ABOUT STOKE

- Stoke City FC is the second oldest football club in England, with only Notts County being older.
- Before their promotion in the 2007/08 season the Potters had been absent from the top-flight for 23 years.
- Sir Stanley Matthews was the oldest ever player to make a top-flight appearance, playing for Stoke against Fulham aged 50!
- Stoke were involved in the game against Notts County when the FA decided to introduce the penalty kick in 1891.
- They were also involved in the game where injury time was first introduced, against Aston Villa, also in 1891.



## PLAYED FOR BOTH!

**Tom Ince** – Tom Ince has played 85 times so far for the Potters, scoring 10. He signed on loan for Luton in January 2021 until the end of the season. He never quite got regular game time through injury, and then returned to Stoke.

**Mark Stein** – He started his career at the Kenny, playing 54 scoring 19. In 1991 he went on loan to Stoke and signed permanently the next year. Later in his career, he made another return to Stoke and then returned to Luton three years later. In total he played 105 times for Stoke and 74 times for Luton.

**John Dreyer** – Dreyer was a popular figure at Kenilworth Road, and he spent six seasons of his career in defence notching up a total of 214 appearances. In 1994 he made the switch up north to Stoke and played 49 times.

The R's have spent the last seven seasons in the Championship after relegation from the Premier League in 2015, spending a third of this decade in England's top tier. QPR's last piece of silverware came in 2011 as they earned promotion to the Premier League as champions, whilst the R's came close to winning the FA Cup in 1982, losing 1-0 to Tottenham Hotspur in a replay.


