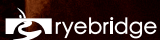

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's Sky Bet Championship fixture with Cardiff City.

We welcome a Cardiff City side who have recorded some good results since making a managerial change last month, and that welcome is extended to Steve Morison, his staff and their squad, not least James Collins who makes his first return to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

When we brought Collo to the club in the summer of 2017 from Crawley, we told him he could become a Championship player with us and it proved true. He scored a hat-trick on debut and never looked back, winning countless team and individual trophies as well as becoming an international footballer. He moved on with our thanks in the summer, and I'm sure you will reinforce that today.

We have hit a sticky patch in recent games in terms of putting the ball in the back of the net. We feel we played well enough in each of the last three games, against Stoke here before the international break, at QPR last Friday and at Nottingham Forest in midweek.

But we haven't scored in those matches and although we believe the one point taken from those nine available isn't a fair reflection of the performances, we have to start converting the high number of opportunities we are creating.

At the City Ground we never looked in danger, even when it was 11 v 11, and we played some wonderful football. We should have had two more penalties and their keeper was well off his line when the one he saved was taken, before he pulled off an unbelievable save from Kal Naismith in injury time.

We start today in 12th place – the same as we finished last season – with 25 points from 19 matches. This time last season we had one more point but were a place lower in the table. We were six points off the play-offs and ten above the relegation zone, both exactly the same as we are now.

We feel we should have more points and we should be higher in the table. But we are punching well above our weight and are well on course for improving on last term.

We'll need your support as ever today, and I'd like to thank you personally for the backing you have shown to Mick Harford, Prostate Cancer UK and all of the staff at the club and community trust who are close to completing the Prostate United challenge.

We are proud to wear the charity's Man of Men logo on our shirts today as a special nod to what everyone has achieved this month with their runs and cycles, so sing Mick's name as loud as you can again, and get behind our men to help us end the month in style.

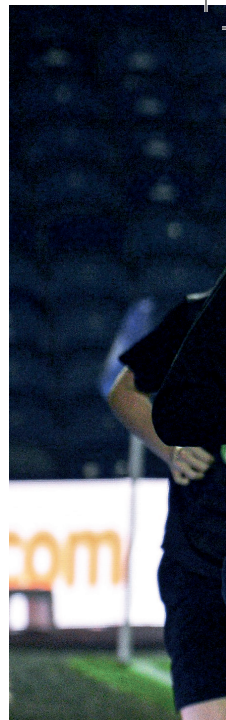

Through my playing career I had lots ups and downs, but being part of a great LFC squad in the 1980s is the highlight of my career. It was the best team I was part of throughout the whole of my career and was full of internationals – Steve





Foster, Mal Donaghy, Ashley Grimes, Brian Stein, Ricky Hill, Mitchell Thomas, Tim Breacker, Danny Wilson and Kingsley Black. We gelled, the spirit, camaraderie and belief shone thorough, especially from our leader Steve Foster.

The team was blessed with immense talent and had a real desire to work hard for the football club, and playing at Kenilworth Road was special for me and my team-mates. Many a time, you got us over the line in vital games with that intimidating noise and such glorious backing.

As November comes to an end, I was to say a big thank you and congratulate all my colleagues, friends, and many people I do not know, for taking up the Prostate United challenge. I have watched the effort, pain and hurt a lot of you guys have put yourself through for myself and Prostate Cancer UK, and as a Club are proud to wear the charity's logo on the front of our shirts for today's game.

Please let me tell you I am, and will always be grateful, for the support shown to myself and others. There has been some tough times over the last 11 months or so, but I've been able to draw on your loyalty, support and best wishes to get me through this.

One thing I have learnt on my journey is that I am not alone, so as I am still trying to beat this illness, I want to say a special thank you to my family, Gary Sweet and the 2020 board, Nathan and all the staff at the football club, and a special thank you to you, the supporters., I am totally indebted to all of you for the support you have shown me.

I am so proud of my football club, LTFC. To be part of this club is a great honour. The memories will live with me forever. The honesty and the integrity in the way the club works, and is run, is paramount to all its employees. This comes from the 2020 board filtering down. Their belief, work ethic, spirit and togetherness, which is vitally important to us all.

Cameron Jerome, up against his old club today, took on Sky Sports' 'Ten to tackle' podcast with Jonathan Oakes last week...

What do your team-mates call you?

CJ or Cam, but I've had quite a few nicknames throughout my career. When I was in Turkey they couldn't say Cameron so they called me Jeromey, which was quite funny!

Smartest team-mate?

There are one or two clever boys actually. We had a quiz night in pre-season and I was surprised with the amount some were getting! Luke Berry seems like he is quite intelligent, Dan Potts also.

Career highlight?

It is hard to measure which achievement trumps the other one because they are all very proud moments for me. I wouldn't necessarily say one is better, but winning the Carling Cup with Birmingham City and scoring at Wembley in the play-off final for Norwich is another achievement. I have been proud of my whole career to be honest with you, not having a club at 17 to still playing at 35 is no mean feat, so I'm going to keep plugging away and enjoy it whilst I can.

What moment in your career would you like to change?

I wouldn't say I have any regrets. I think the dynamics of football have changed, if I knew the things that are around today, if I could maybe go back to when I was a little bit younger and implement them into my lifestyle, the things I know now I'm wiser and older then I would do that, but I certainly have no regrets.

Best player you've played with?

I had such an unbelievable relationship with Wes Hoolahan at Norwich. He was a little magician for me! He would drift in and out of pockets, he had a goal in him, a pass and he could get stuck in for someone at a disadvantage in terms of height and physical attributes. James Maddison is another one I played with at Norwich, he's a really talented individual.

Do you have a matchday routine?

I actually don't. I know a lot of people do but I don't generally tend to repeat myself, for example eating something similar at a certain time or putting my boots on a certain way.

Most treasured item?

I've kept a signed jersey from every club I have been at. Then I've got cup final medals, my play-off winners medal and bits and pieces from England.

Best skill other than football?

Football is all I know in terms of an actual skill. I would like to think in terms of being a dad first and foremost, a family man, a good friend to my closest friends on a regular basis. I think I could go into any circle of team-mates and have a laugh, and I think it is a strength personally.

Initiation song when joining?

I sang Wonderwall by Oasis. We had a night out in pre-season and we managed to get a karaoke machine! It was an easier moment rather than being round the table at a hotel, it was quite a comfortable situation. The lads had spent a good pre-season bonding and working together, so it was nice to have a good, relaxed environment.

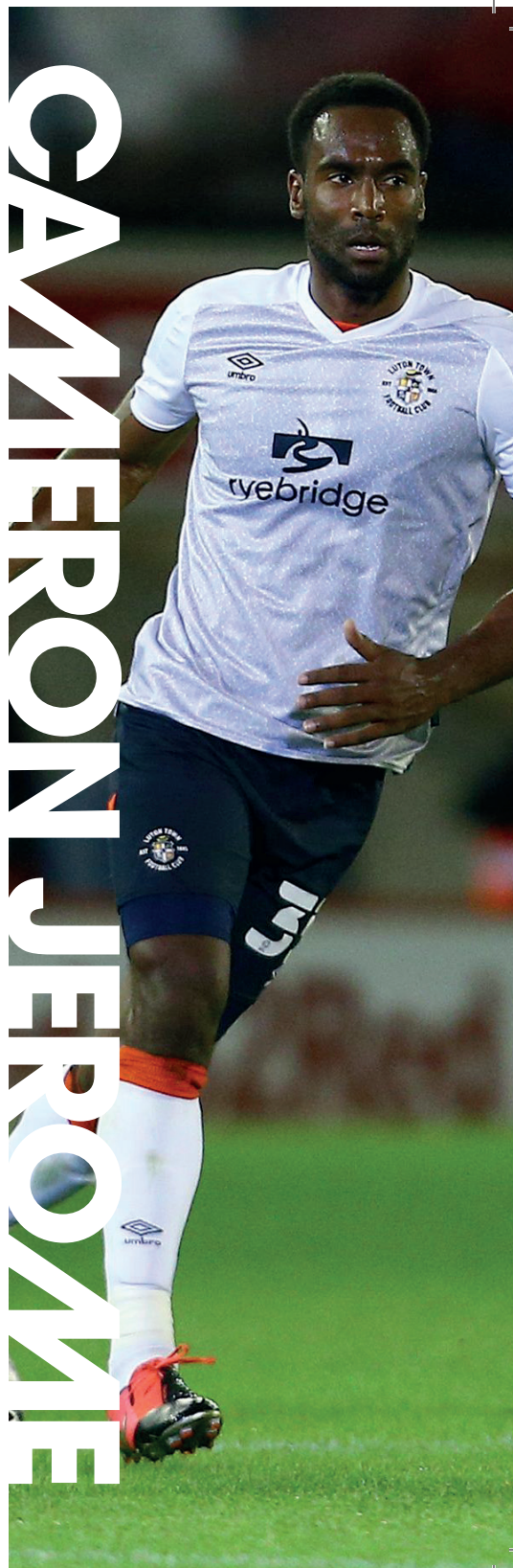
What makes Luton special?

It is such a family run club. In terms of the size of the club, it isn't the biggest in the Championship, it doesn't have the biggest budget but what it does have is the fans, the spirit of the place.

It's one of the best changing rooms I have been in, there's no egos, no attitudes. The manager is intense, he drives that every day. He is a winner, he wants everyone to improve and wants everyone to work hard first and foremost but he drives that passion and desire, the players do as well. It has been an enjoyable start to my career so far here and it is nice atmosphere to be around.

Coming to the latter stages of my career where there are a lot of young players within the squad, it is nice to pass on one or two little details and bits of information to the players. There is such an array of talent and untapped potential in one or two players, this club could definitely go places. The plans that the club have, the steps for the future, building different things in terms of the stadium, training ground, always looking to improve.

They're not going beyond their means like some clubs in this division, take one step at a time and that isn't an easy thing to do, especially in this division when the temptation for the level above is so great.

THE OPPOSITION

Cardiff City sit three points above the Sky Bet Championship relegation zone ahead of their visit to Kenilworth Road this afternoon. A 1-0 defeat at home to Hull City on Wednesday night means the Bluebirds currently sit in 20th position, eight places and seven points below the Hatters with both sides having played 19 matches.

It's been all change for Cardiff in the last few weeks. Previous manager Mick McCarthy left his role towards the end of October, and former Stevenage and Millwall striker Steve Morison was eventually appointed until the end of the 2021/22 season, following a role as interim.

Since Morison took the reins, the Welsh side's form has picked up. Cardiff came from three goals down to claim a 3-3 draw away at Stoke City in the 38-year-old's first game in charge. A 1-0 defeat to QPR followed that game, before the Bluebirds recorded back-to-back wins. Kieffer Moore scored twice in a 2-1 win over Huddersfield, before former Hatter James Collins netted his first goal for Cardiff in another 2-1 win, this time against Preston. They were denied a third consecutive victory in midweek, however, with Hull taking the points away from south Wales with a 1-0 win.

Last season, the visitors did the double over Town. In November, Cardiff recorded a 4-0 victory at the Cardiff City Stadium, and in the return fixture at the Kenny, the Bluebirds were 2-0 victors with

goals from Harry Wilson and Will Vaulks.

Aden Flint and the aforementioned Moore lead the goalscoring charts for the away side going into the game, both scoring four times in the league so far this season. Flint, a part of the Cardiff defence, has a knack for coming up with a goal, and Moore netted 20 times in his debut season for the club.

The Hatters come into this game on the back of a goalless draw away at Nottingham Forest on Tuesday night. Nathan Jones' side currently sit in 12th place in the league, six points off the final play-off spot.

Despite defeat to the Tigers on Wednesday, Cardiff's form has definitely picked up since the appointment of Morison, and will look to build on that when they make the trip to Bedfordshire. We welcome the Cardiff City fans who have made the trip from South Wales this afternoon.





THE GOALKEEPER: ALEX SMITHIES

Born in Huddersfield, goalkeeper Smithies progressed through the academy at his hometown club, having joined the Terriers as an eight-year-old. He made his first-team debut in December 2007, appearing as a 76th-minute substitute, and made his first start three days later. Smithies would go on to make over 270 appearances in all competitions before leaving for QPR in 2015. During three seasons in west London, he made 109 appearances in all competitions for the Hoops. The 31-year-old made the switch to Cardiff in 2018, and has featured regularly for the Bluebirds in the Championship since.



THE DEFENDER: ADEN FLINT

Flint began his footballing career at non-league side Pixton, before joining then-Conference North side Alfreton. He spent three years with the Reds, making 100 appearances, but the Football League came calling in January 2011 and he signed for Swindon. Flint spent two-and-a-half years at the County Ground, before signing for Bristol City. The defender had a five-year spell at Ashton Gate, appearing over 200 times for the Robins. He moved to Middlesbrough in 2018, then joined Cardiff in July 2019. After a brief spell on loan at Sheffield Wednesday last season, Flint returned to the City first-team this season.



THE MANAGER: STEVE MORISON

Morison was appointed manager of Cardiff earlier this month, on an initial deal until the end of the 2021/22 season. As a player, Morison spent time at Northampton, Bishop's Cleeve, Stevenage, Millwall, Norwich, Leeds and Shrewsbury. He retired in 2019, going on to coach at Northampton's academy. He later coached at Millwall's academy, before being appointed U23 manager at Cardiff in February 2020. After the dismissal of Mick McCarthy last month, Morison was announced as caretaker manager, and was later given the role until the end of the season.

THE MIDFIELDER: MARLON PACK

Another player who crossed the River Severn to play for both Cardiff and Bristol City, Pack has been a Bluebird since joining the club in August 2019. He began his career at his hometown club Portsmouth and made a single league appearance for Pompey. Pack spent time on loan at Wycombe, Dagenham & Redbridge and Cheltenham, eventually joining the latter permanently. After two seasons at Cheltenham, the 30-year-old had a six-year-long spell at Ashton Gate, making over 240 league appearances for the Robins, before Neil Warnock took him to Cardiff City Stadium two years ago.



THE STRIKER: KIEFFER MOORE

Early in his career, Moore spent time in Non-League football with Truro City, Dorchester Town and Yeovil, before having a spell in Norway with Viking. He returned to England in 2016, signing for Forest Green Rovers. After a loan spell at fellow National League club Torquay, Moore signed for Ipswich for £10,000. His time at Portman Road didn't last long, and he joined Rotherham on loan. The 29-year-old then had a spell at Barnsley, and later moved onto Wigan. In 2020, he signed for Cardiff and in his first season at the club, he scored 20 times in the Championship. Internationally, he has 24 caps and eight goals for Wales.

WATCH OUT FOR... RUBIN COLWILL

Born in Neath, Colwill joined Cardiff when he was only eight. The now 19-year-old progressed through the club's academy sides, featuring for the U18s and U23s. He made his senior debut in February this year, coming on as a late sub against Coventry. Colwill's first start for the club came in April, featuring in a win against Wycombe. The midfielder netted his first goals earlier this season, scoring a brace against Nottingham Forest in September. He was a part of Wales' squad for Euro 2020, and made his international debut against France, coming on as a substitute for former Hatter Joe Morrell.

A HAT IN BOTH CAMPS

James Collins returns to Kenilworth Road this afternoon after ending his four-year stay at the club to join Cardiff City in the summer.

Prior to his days in a Luton shirt, Collins spent a single season with Crawley, scoring 22 times for the Reds including goals in both games against the Town. He made an immediate impression on his Kenilworth Road debut in August 2017, when he scored a hat-trick and provided two assists in the 8-2 thumping of Yeovil.

The goal contributions continued throughout the campaign as he recorded 19 goals and 10 assists in the League Two promotion-winning season, plus one in the FA Cup to make it 20 goals for the season. He and Danny Hylton formed a brilliant strike partnership, scoring 40 of the 94 league goals Town scored under Nathan Jones' management during that memorable campaign.

Despite not scoring until the 10th match of the League One season, Collins would go on to net 25 times as the Hatters earned back-to-back promotions. With two hat-tricks and three braces, the striker was the League One player of the year, golden boot winner and rightly named in the division's team of the year. He also earned an international call-up with the Republic of Ireland.

Collo retained the crown of the club's top scorer in the following two seasons as well, and the now 30-year-old scored arguably his most important Luton goal last season, certainly in the eyes of supporters, when scoring the winner against rivals Watford in April 2021 with his first touch, having been brought on as a substitute to take arguably the most famous penalty in Hatters history.

He left for the Cardiff City Stadium in July with the best wishes of everyone at Kenilworth Road, and last week he netted his first goal for the Bluebirds in their 2-1 win at Preston.

After a Dan Potts goal secured a 1-0 win at Birmingham on February 13th, the Town's first win in a month, everyone at Kenilworth Road breathed a small sigh of relief. Although seemingly safe in mid-table, a prolonging of the run could have set alarm bells ringing among the less optimistic of the supporter base.

It was now back to Kenilworth Road for a game against a Cardiff City side who had won three games on the spin following the appointment of Mick McCarthy as manager. Two changes were made to the Luton team that beat Birmingham, with Jordan Clark and Harry Cornick being replaced by Danny Hylton and Kal Naismith, who was making his full Town League debut.

The ball was in the air a lot in the opening stages before Bluebirds Will Vaulks sent in a strong shot from the edge of the box which was well saved by

Simon Sluga, while at the other end both James Collins and Kiernan Dewsbury-Hall saw efforts go wide.

The Town were dealt a blow when Tom Lockyer received an ankle injury in a challenge which turned out to end his season. The re-shuffled side continued to spurn opportunities though, with Hylton missing out on two occasions.

The second half started with two quick Cardiff goals out of the blue. Firstly, a long ball was not cleared properly and Bluebirds loanee Harry Wilson fired in a wonderful effort to open the scoring. This was quickly followed when the Town failed to clear the ball sufficiently from a corner, leaving Vaulks to hammer the ball into the net via a deflection.

The Hatters still had the better of the chances over the remainder of the game, but did not show the same ruthlessness in front of goal as displayed by the Welsh side.

Luton supporters certainly looked forward to the start of the 2005-06 campaign. After winning the Championship of Division One (now League One) in glorious record breaking style the previous season the high scoring Hatters, with a settled side, were not looking to merely consolidate but to push on.

Forwards Carlos Edwards and Dean Morgan, together with Finland international midfielder Markus Heikkinen, were added to a squad which included attacking duo Steve Howard and Rowan Vine, solid defensive pairing Chris Coyne and Curtis Davies and influential midfield general Kevin Nicholls.

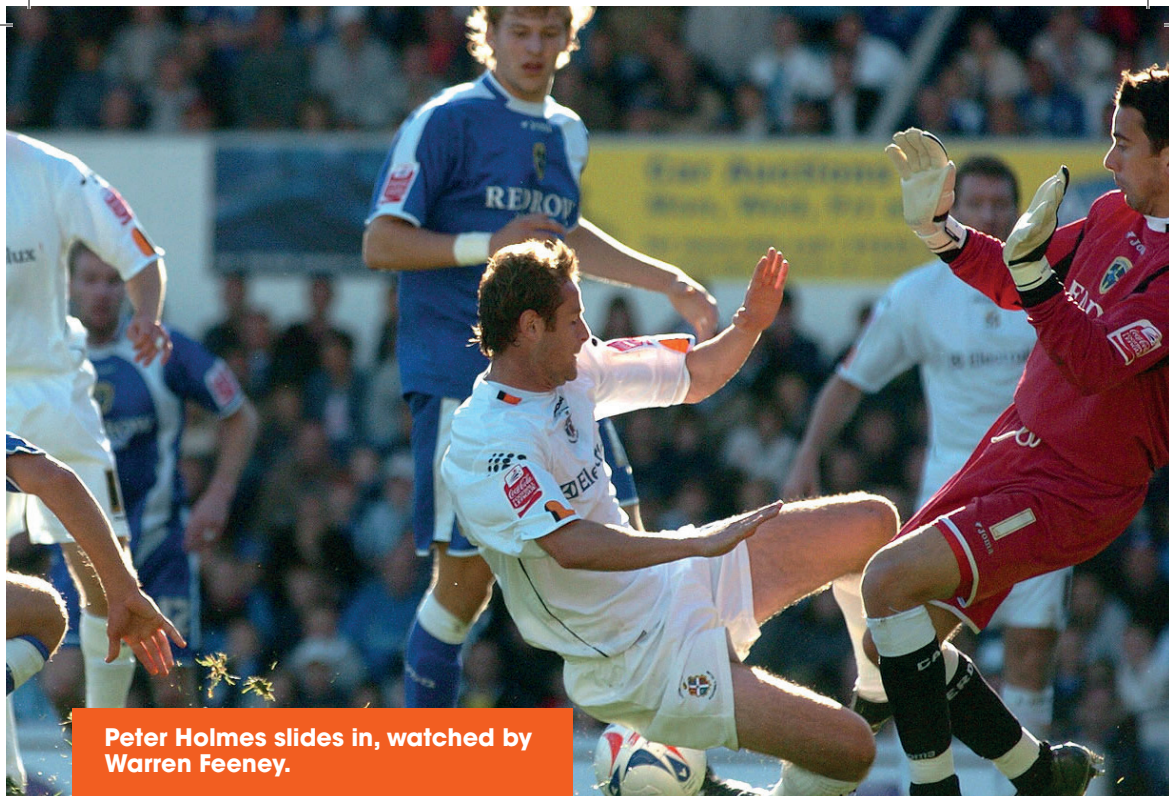
Coyne and Morgan were injured for the opening



game, away at newly-relegated Crystal Palace, with Heikkinen forced to play in an unfamiliar central defensive role. Heikkinen seemed like he had played in that position all his career as he slipped seamlessly into the side with the Town going on to upset the pundits with a 2-1 victory. Manager Mike Newell, making huge mileage out of an unfortunate comment in the Eagles programme of the 'little Luton' variety, certainly fired up the players to secure the memorable win.

Next up were another relegated side, Harry Redknapp's Southampton, and in front of a boisterous capacity Kenilworth Road crowd, a last minute shot into the top corner from Morgan earned a 3-2 win. The following weekend a 0-0 home draw with Leeds saw the Hatters sit proudly on top of the first published League table of the season.

Although top spot could not be maintained by the time of the visit to Cardiff in early October, the Town were sat third, with the loss of Davies with everyone's good wishes to Premiership West Brom for £3 million not being felt at all.

The Bluebirds were protecting an eight game unbeaten run and had not conceded a goal in four. This run looked like it might be extended when Michael Ricketts and teenage strike partner Cameron Jerome combined in the ninth minute leaving the former to fire past Marlon Beresford in the Luton goal.

The Luton response was immediate though with Warren Feeney heading against the bar and Howard missing a great opportunity before the deserved equaliser came after 30 minutes. With the Cardiff defence pushing out to trap Howard offside, Morgan ghosted in to get on the end of an Ahmet Brkovic through ball to then beat Neil Alexander with an emphatic shot.

The Town remained in the ascendancy and took the lead with 58 minutes gone. After going close with a powerful volley, Peter Holmes was not to be denied and bundled in a clipped pass from Howard following a cross from Brkovic.

Cardiff came more into the game after this with Darren Purse hammering a volley against the woodwork, while at the other end Howard struck a post. The final action saw Ricketts head against the bar in the closing seconds, which would have

produced an undeserved point for the Welsh side.

Bluebirds manager Dave Jones bemoaned the fact that after his side's early goal, they seemed to sit back and allow the Town to take over the game. "We could have equalised with our late rally but whether we deserved to is another point," he said.

Hatters boss Newell was not getting carried away. "I was disappointed we didn't add to our tally as we created ample opportunities to take the game away from Cardiff," he said. "I would have been very upset to have come away with anything less than three points."

Newell also gave the waiting press corps his views on the Town's solid start to the campaign.

"Our plan is to carry on going the same way we have been playing. Other people's expectations have changed – not ours. We didn't set any targets as we didn't know what we were capable of doing.

"We always try to play decent football and to be honest we haven't been bettered yet. We haven't scraped any points or come away from games thinking we've been lucky."

LACE UP AND SPEAK UP



Today's game is dedicated to Stonewall's Rainbow Laces campaign, in which LGBTQ+ supporters are being encouraged to start a conversation – to Lace Up and Speak Up – to help make sport everyone's game. Here, Hatters Michael Nanton-Knight asks for fellow LGBTQ+ fans to get in touch...

There is something magical about a football match. It can unite people, a football community who all want the same thing, to celebrate, support and win, regardless of sexuality, gender or race.

I was a Junior Hatter, playing on the supporters' team at away games. I enjoyed playing football but as I got older the macho environment knocked my confidence and I stopped.

Reaching my late teens, I had questioned my sexuality for years and was very much confused and found navigating who I was difficult, challenging and at times depressing.

At the time, if you were gay in Luton, there was a high chance you would be verbally abused or beaten. So I lived in fear of being exposed and sat firmly in the closet.

Two-thirds (64%) of LGBTQ+ people have experienced anti-LGBT+ violence or abuse.

Justin Fashanu was a brave man and one of my heroes. He was the first £1m black footballer in Britain. He was also the first and only player in British football to come out as gay.

What happened to Fashanu in the years that followed petrified me. The abuse he received for

being gay on and off the pitch led to his suicide.

Over 30 years since Justin came out and he is still the only one. Sadly, the environment in football can still be toxic and some players are too scared to be their authentic selves.

Thankfully, in the battle against Homophobia and Biphobia in football, certain individuals are starting to stand up to perpetrators to show them that derogatory comments are not acceptable in this current progressive footballing environment in the UK.

Life in Luton as a gay man hasn't changed much either, so the need for safe spaces is very important.

As Luton South Constituency LGBTQ+ Officer I would like to create safe spaces within football for LGBTQ+ people and their allies to play, support and enjoy football. With the support of Luton Town FC, we would like to create an LGBTQ+ supporters' network. Maybe, further down the line, a team?

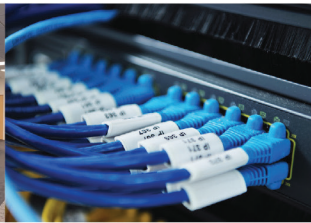

It's fair to say that midfield maestro Henri Lansbury has adjusted to life at Kenilworth Road with ease since signing for Luton in the summer.

The former Arsenal youngster, whose first experience of the Hatters came during the 2009 Johnstone's Paint Trophy Final whilst on-loan at Scunthorpe United, has graced the Town faithful with some eye-catching performances and has proved to be a crucial cog in Nathan Jones' well-oiled machine.

What makes the recruitment of Lansbury over the summer interesting is how it marked a deviation from the types of targets identified by the Town who could drive the club forwards in the long run – the likes of Admiral Muskwe, Allan Campbell and Fred Onyedindma, brought in as young, athletic players who fit the aim of adding 'pace and power' to the squad.

Lansbury doesn't necessarily fit that bill. So why was he brought in?

"With all the youth and energy and all the qualities that we are bringing in, we felt we needed...that real know-how at the level" is how Jones explained the signing of the former Nottingham Forest and Aston Villa midfielder, suggesting that he was brought in as someone who could provide the kind of leadership by example to support the addition several younger, less experienced, players.

But right from his first start of the season against Barnsley, where his quick-thinking from a free-kick deep in his own half created what would prove to be Luton's winning goal, it's Lansbury's quality and tenacious nature that has earned the praise of the Hatters faithful.

When he picks the ball up it's obvious that he sees pictures that nobody else does, be it a dangerous through pass, a flat switch of play into a wing-back or an ability to dictate and control possession from deep.

He ranks as Luton's best progressive passer, meaning that he's frequently able to play into team-mates higher up the pitch, crucial in the Hatters' ability to break the opposition's lines and get into goalscoring positions.

Combined with a tenacity and aggression that makes him the kind of leader by example that Nathan Jones was looking for, Lansbury makes Luton tick. He's the fulcrum for the pace, power and athleticism of the rest of the team, linking them together and providing the quality in possession that they need to thrive – the recent defeat to Stoke City showed just how crucial he is to the Hatters.

The signing of Lansbury shows the importance of balance in squad building. Sticking to the overarching philosophy and direction that you want to go in is important, but slight deviations are necessary to ensure that those different pieces can be glued together.

Lansbury is that glue, and he's already looking like one of Luton's smartest signings yet.

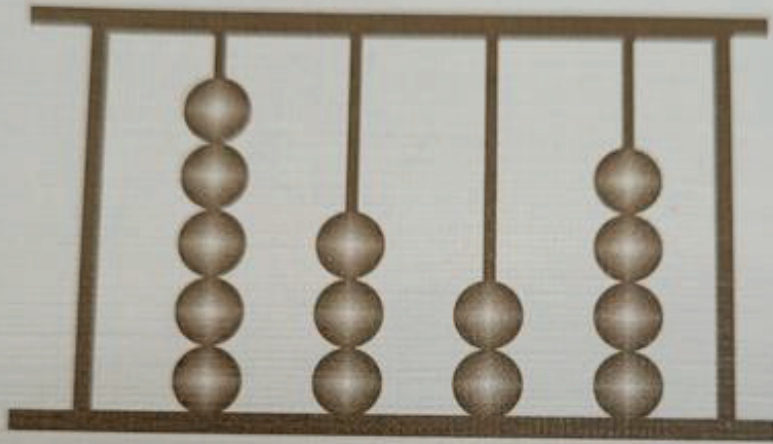

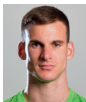

Goalkeeping coach Kevin Pilkington is relishing the opportunity to be back at Kenilworth Road, but admitted coaching plans weren't part of his plans after football initially!

Pilkington, 47, played for the Hatters in two spells throughout his career, a career he started at Manchester United under the wing of Peter Schmeichel.

Reminiscing about his time at Old Trafford, he said: "I learned so much from my time there, not just as a footballer but as a person as well. You hear a lot of the boys from that era say that if they hadn't made it as a footballer, they would have been okay because they would have made it as a person.

"That was the biggest thing instilled in the team, discipline, respect, how to treat people. I had that all from my mum and dad anyway, but it was even further enforced by the football club as well. To work with them was incredible. Sir Alex, I can't speak highly enough of him. He was brilliant to me then and brilliant to me now."

Now playing his trade as a coach working alongside Kevin Dearden, who continues with a broader role on the management team, Pilkington revealed his delight at being back with the club.

"I loved the environment," he said. "I loved Kenilworth Road and playing in that atmosphere was brilliant for me. I kept in touch with the people who are still here. Gary Sweet I know really well, I know Paul Hart and Mick Harford as well. It's a good move for me, it's one I'm really excited about, one that I'm really looking forward to and hope it goes well."

But while some already have aspirations to continue working within football during their playing days, the transition into coaching wasn't at the forefront of Pilkington's mind to begin with.

"It wasn't something I thought I'd step into but once I got into it, I really enjoyed it. I started doing my badges, I went to Ilkeston Town in Non-League and helped them out on a Tuesday and Thursday evening when I wasn't playing. It just evolved from there.

"I got involved with the Great Britain university team and then at the back end of my time at Luton, I got a phone call from Notts County to go in there as their goalkeeping coach. I wasn't quite sure about it initially but once I got into it, I loved it and have really enjoyed it since.

"Nothing beats playing but it is the next best thing. I love goalkeeping, it is my passion."

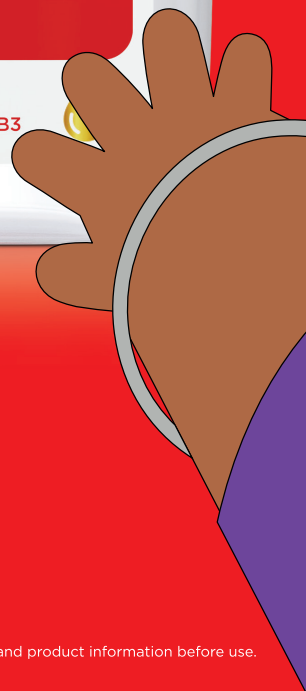
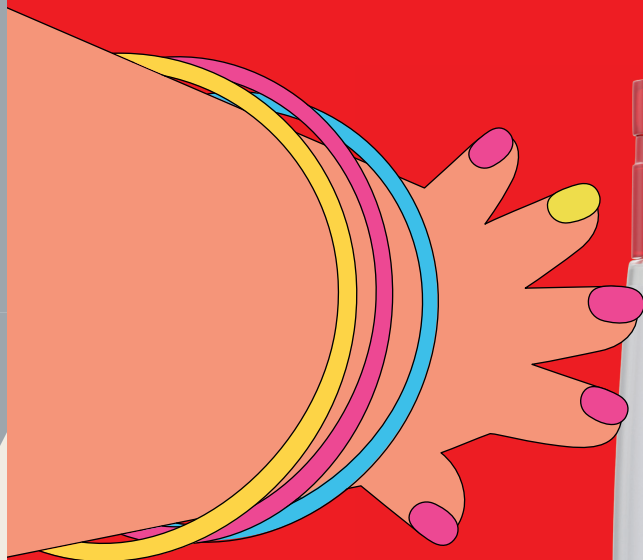

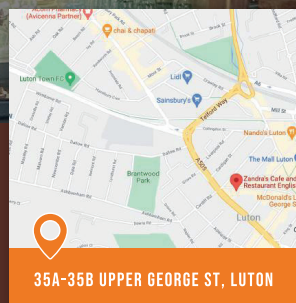

The new hub, which will fully open next year, has been named Morton House after the late, great Hatters legend Bob and at a formal naming ceremony on 18th November, his widow June was present to give her blessing.

Local boy Bob stayed loyal to his roots and ended up spending nearly 20 years with his only Football League side, Luton Town, making 495 League appearances in that time, a club record.

After playing locally for Waterloos, Bob signed amateur forms for the Hatters as the War drew to a close and then signed full-time in 1946. After making his debut in 1948 at centre-forward in a 1-0 win at West Ham, Bob never looked back and the only question mark in his long career was whether he was a better wing-half or forward.

His versatility doubtless cost him senior international honours but whether he was stopping goals as a strong, tough tackling defender or knocking them in at the other end he never gave less than 100% and always played with a smile on his face.

After leaving Luton at the age of 38 in 1965, Bob became player-manager of Bletchley Town and then enjoyed 16 years with Luton Sports Press before sadly passing away in 2002.

James Shea is hopeful the Town's fortunes will change this afternoon after a frustrating draw against Nottingham Forest in midweek.

For the goalkeeper, it was a first league outing since Boxing Day last year in the absence of Simon Sluga, and he helped preserve an eighth clean sheet of the Sky Bet Championship campaign.

Reflecting firstly on a personal note, Shea said: "I thoroughly enjoyed it. It was great to be back out there and even better to keep a clean sheet. It has been a long time and it has been frustrating because I'm like any player, I want to play.

"To be fair, Simon has been brilliant, he has done really well and I just have to be ready when I'm called upon. It's not the first time I've done it, I'm used to it, and I'll be ready when I get my chance.

"The hardest day of the week is the game day. You want to be out there in front of 25,000 like we were tonight. I got that buzz today, which I was over the moon. If Simon plays on Saturday, then I'll be right back behind him and likewise I had messages from Si today saying 'good luck', 'all the best' - it's the goalkeepers union!"

But after missing the opportunity to move up the table, the keeper added: "Everyone is annoyed we didn't get the three points because we deserved it. I thought we played really well especially first half. I never felt under threat at all, even when they had 11 men. The only time they had a real threat was when they had a free-kick in the last minute.

"We work hard on the training ground, Elijah takes penalties every single day and it just hasn't happened for him today which is one of those things. We will keep sticking at it, keep working hard and hopefully our performances will earn the points they deserve."

Finally, the 30-year-old commented on the arrival of goalkeeper coach Kevin Pilkington, who has supplemented the background staff further.

"He gets the way we work which is massive. We've got two Kevs now and it has been brilliant. Training has been great, he has fitted in like he's been here for years."
