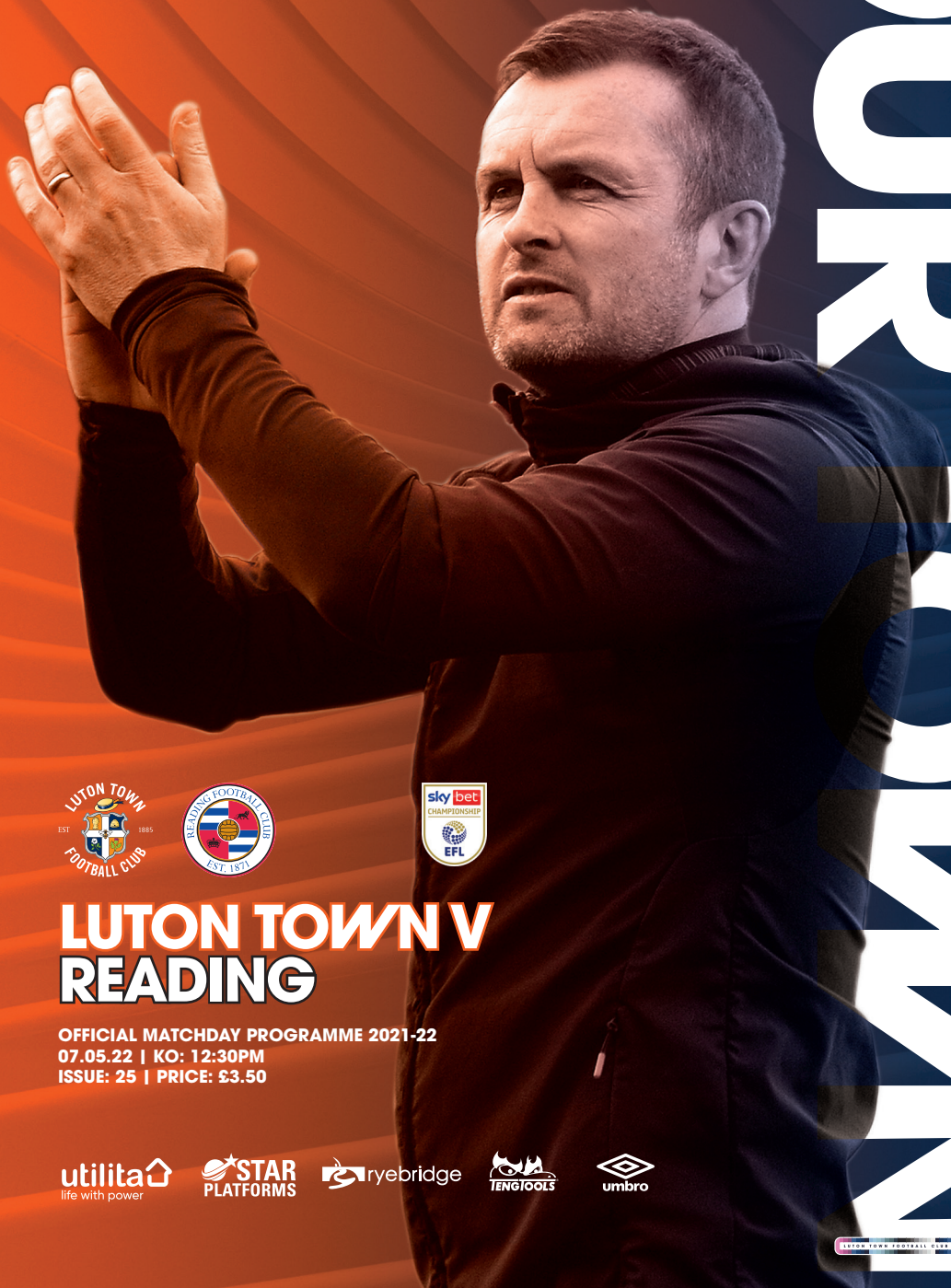

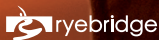

The pundits and the betting agents thought we would be hovering around the bottom half of the division, so it has been a fantastic journey and an incredible season for Nathan, his support staff, and the players as they have strained every sinew and given everything, to get us into this position.

We have shown that we can mix it with the best by winning against side such as Bournemouth, Nottingham Forrest, Middlesbrough, West Bromwich Albion, Blackburn Rovers, Stoke City and Millwall and drawing with Fulham. Bringing back memories of when we were last in the championship in 2005/06, before our demise and subsequent relegations finishing up in the Conference, during which we spent five devastating years trying to get out.

It was that station pub at Huddersfield. It was late and we'd lost 2-0, though that could have been very different.



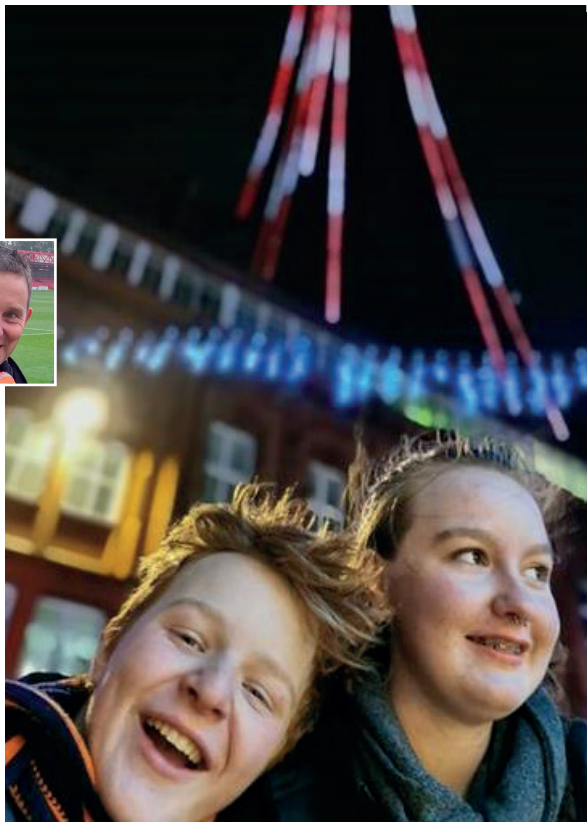

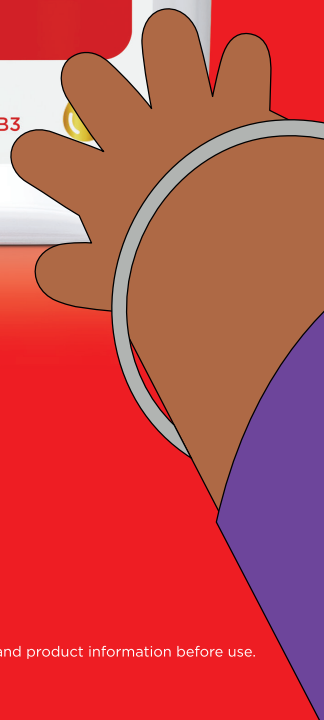
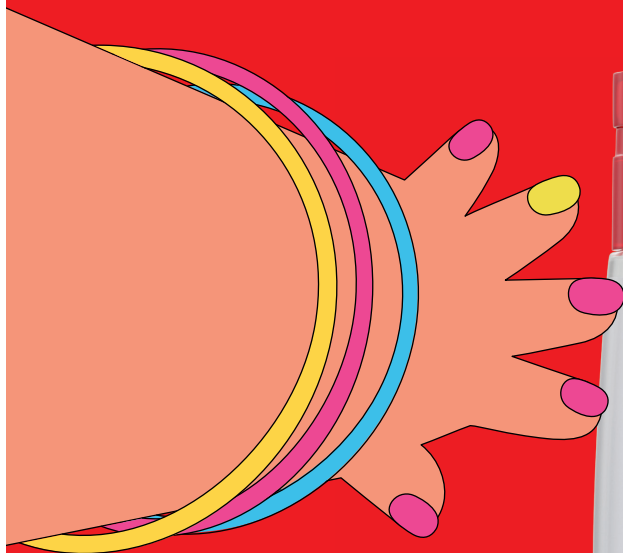

If someone told us back in August that our final match of the regular season could seal a play-off spot in the Championship we'd have snatched that opportunity with both hands and said yes please!

The defeat to Fulham on Monday was disappointing but let's not forget they won the title at a canter on an insane budget and were deserved Champions. With a goalscorer chasing a record on their final home game of the season and the desire to be confirmed Champions so they could celebrate in front of a packed Craven Cottage - it was inevitable with our squad decimated by injury that it would be a tough match against a formidable opponent.

a club's season is effectively over with nothing but pride to play for on the final day, it doesn't mean they won't put in a performance.

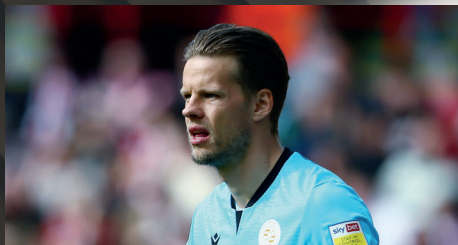

THE GOALKEEPER: ORJAN NYLAND

Nyland arrived at the Select Car Leasing Stadium on a short-term deal in March, following his release from Bournemouth in January.

The goalkeeper started his career in his native Norway, playing for the likes of Hodd and Molde, before a spell in Germany with Ingolstadt.

The 31-year-old then joined Aston Villa and later Norwich City, before his spell with Bournemouth.



THE DEFENDER: TOM MCINTYRE

A product of the Reading academy, McIntyre signed his first professional contract with the Royals in July 2016.

He earned the man of the match award on his Reading debut, featuring in a 1-1 Championship draw against Rotherham United in December 2018.

Since that debut, the 23-year-old has become a key part of Reading's defence, and he has featured in over 50 league games, scoring four times.



THE MANAGER: PAUL INCE

Named as the interim replacement for Veljko Paunovic, Ince succeeded in his goal during his time at the Select Car Leasing Stadium: to keep Reading up.

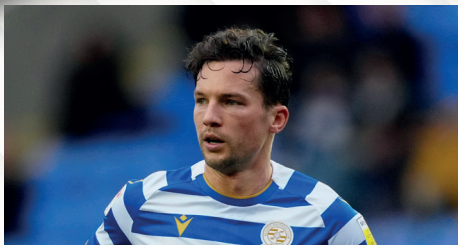
As a player, Ince had notable spells with Manchester United, Inter Milan and Liverpool, and was a regular England international.

As a manager, the 54-year-old has had spells at Macclesfield Town, MK Dons, Blackburn, Notts County and Blackpool.

THE MIDFIELDER: DANNY DRINKWATER

Progressing through the Manchester United academy, Drinkwater had loan spells at the likes of Huddersfield, Cardiff, Watford and Barnsley, before joining Leicester permanently.

While with the Foxes, the midfielder was part of the side that were Premier League winners in the 2015/16 season, and he made just shy of 200 league appearances.

He later joined Chelsea, but has been sent out on loan in recent seasons. The 32-year-old has had spells at Burnley, Aston Villa, Kasimpasa, and Reading.



THE ATTACKER: JOSH LAURENT

Playing for the likes of Non-League side Redbridge, Wycombe Wanderers and Queens Park Rangers in his youth, it was at Loftus Road that Laurent signed his first professional deal.

After a loan spell with Braintree, he signed for Brentford in January 2015. Permanent spells at Hartlepool United, Wigan Athletic and Shrewsbury Town followed.

He joined Reading in July 2020, and has featured regularly since his move.

WATCH OUT FOR... LUCAS JOAO

Angola international Joao began his career in Portugal playing for Nacional in the Primeira Liga, after a loan spell at Segunda Divisao side Mirandela.

After featuring 46 times in the league, the striker then joined Sheffield Wednesday in July 2015. He made 112 league appearances for the Owls, scoring 26 times.

He had a loan spell at Blackburn Rovers, and joined Reading in August 2019. He has 10 Championship goals to his name this season.

A HAT IN BOTH CAMPS

Kerry Dixon was probably destined to turn out for the Hatters at some time in his career, but he certainly went on a circuitous route before ending up at Kenilworth Road.

Born in the town and with an ex-Luton pro as a father, the Hatters were given every chance to snap him up as a schoolboy, but he slipped through the net and after further trials at Tottenham ended up at Southern League Dunstable Town where he blossomed into a deadly striker.

Although slightly disillusioned with League football, Dixon went out to prove people wrong by joining Reading in 1980, and in three years at Elm Park averaged almost a goal every two games, which brought the big clubs sniffing around.

The big move eventually came in 1983, when a cheque for £175,000 changed hands as Dixon joined Chelsea, to enjoy nine years of almost unbroken success.

A cult hero at Stamford Bridge he scored 147 League goals and earned eight England caps, as well as other representative honours, during his time there.

It was a surprise when he was allowed to join Southampton for £575,000 in 1992 where he never settled. Instead he came back to his spiritual home of Kenilworth Road a few months later, initially on loan, and then on a free transfer.

In 75 League appearances for the Town he notched 19 goals before moving to Millwall for £5000 in March 1995 and then to Watford for £25000 ten months later.

Kerry's final League club was Doncaster Rovers where he became player manager, but on losing the position subsequently coached at Boreham Wood, Letchworth and Hitchin.

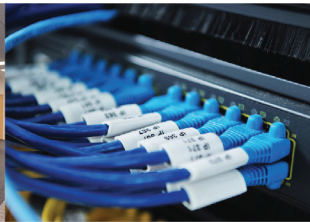

Following a momentous home win over promotion chasing Watford the previous Saturday, it was back to Kenilworth Road four days later for the visit of Reading.

Manager Nathan Jones announced an unchanged side from the Watford victory with Elijah Adebayo pronounced fit after being forced off injured while winning the match winning penalty against the Hornets.

The Hatters started as they had finished against Watford by going on the front foot with Adebayo bringing out a good stop from Royals goalkeeper Rafael with a stinging 25 yard shot.

Kal Naismith then burst forward on the left and put over a superb curling cross which was volleyed narrowly wide by Jordan Clark. Kiernan Dewsbury-Hall then forced Rafael into action once more with

long range effort before a free-kick from James Bree arrowed narrowly wide.

The best chance of the half fell to Reading though when, just before the interval, George Puskas sent a free header wide from eight yards.

The second period was more open with Reading chasing a play-off spot and the talented Michael Olise seeing more of the ball. Ovie Ejaria went close with a drilled effort for the visitors while at the other end Adebayo sliced the ball wide from a good opening.

With the game drifting towards a stalemate, Reading threw on more attackers in an attempt to salvage a win with Luton goalkeeper Simon Sluga having to come out quickly to block the previous season's four goal nemesis Yaloe Meite.

It was the Town, though, who finished the stronger and should have won all three points. A James Collins toe poke was turned behind with the Watford hero heading the resulting corner over from point blank range.

The Town had now moved into the top half of the table.

Following promotion from Division Four (Now League Two) in 1968, the Town started off the new season like an express train and were unbeaten in their first eight games as they emerged as early leaders.

In that golden autumn the die was cast for a tremendous home record with Oldham, Rotherham, Barnsley, Tranmere and Mansfield all leaving Kenilworth Road following heavy defeats

in front of increasingly larger crowds. A crowd of below 15,000 was regarded as small, and that was in Division Three!

After the first defeat of the season, at Brighton, the early promise started to fall apart as, although the home record was still excellent, the away form was abysmal with defeat after defeat putting pressure on the players to perform at Kenilworth Road.

A change of manager in December, with Alec Stock taking over from Allan Brown who was dismissed for disloyalty after being interviewed for, and not getting, the Leicester job, did not immediately help

After seven straight away defeats the gloom was lifted slightly when the first visit to Northampton for League points since 1936-37, saw a couple of goals from Bruce Rioch earn a well deserved 2-0 win. The crowd of 15,161 included a mass of scouts looking at the sharp shooting inside-forward.

Unfortunately Rioch's and the Town's season took another turn for the worse when the player was badly injured in the next home game, against Walsall, with the result that the customary away defeat the following week at lowly Crewe was seen as the end to any promotion aspirations the team may have had.

Reading were the next visitors to Kenilworth Road and a crowd of 'only' 11,871 turned up on a cold February day to see if the Town could at least maintain their unbeaten home record. Ian Buxton continued to deputise for the injured Rioch, while Graham French returned to the side at the expense of new signing from QPR, Mike Keen.

As it turned out the Town got off to a flying start when Alan Slough put us into the lead in the third minute with a great drive after his first attempt had been blocked, and had bounced straight back to him. The joy of the crowd was soon stilled, however, when the injury prone winger Mike Harrison had to leave the field after ten minutes with yet another pulled muscle.

French, on the other wing though, was having a field day, beating the Reading full-back Alan Hitchcock, who was making only his second League appearance, at will and putting over a string of teasing crosses for Brian Lewis and Keith Allen in the box.

The Hatters increased their lead just before half-time when Allen was brought down in the area by Ernie Yard, and Lewis made no mistake from the spot.

The second period saw Reading rely on spoiling tactics and physical play, and Dave Bacuzzi was lucky to receive only a booking for a foul on Buxton. The Town were not entirely blameless, however, with Lewis antagonising defenders as only he could.

Dick Spiers had been with Reading since the mid-1950s and had never been sent off, but all that changed when he brought down Lewis and the considered view was that the retaliation was understandable.

As so often happens, the ten men fought like twelve and Reading pulled a goal back just before the end, and if the game had gone on longer no doubt they would have levelled the score.

Although the Luton supporters did not know it at the time, this game proved a turning point in the season as, by the time of the return six weeks later, the team had moved up to third place on the back of four straight wins, including two away from home at Bournemouth and Oldham.

The game at Reading was played on a miserable

March evening with thick fog shrouding Elm Park and thick mud underfoot. Supporters had difficulty in making out what was happening when the ball was over the other side of the pitch and had to rely on the shouts of unseen spectators.

It was night for the brave and both sides showed great determination with a re-shuffled Luton defence, ably marshalled by Max Dougan, deputising as captain for Terry Branston, making sure that the Reading forwards did not pass.

Reading did though open the scoring on the hour, with a soft header from John Sainty that skidded under Luton goalkeeper Sandy Davie.

The Town fought back, however, and a minute later Laurie Sheffield took advantage of a loose ball in the box and ended up firing home into an empty net.

Despite some scares at both ends and some fine saves from Davie, the game finished all square with another point in the bag as the Hatters closed in on the leaders.

For the record, the Town went another eight games unbeaten but were unable to overtake the top two, Swindon and Watford. The early away form had cost the team dear and promotion would have to wait twelve months!

2021-22: A SEASON TO REMEMBER! AUGUST

Great expectation filled the air as the Luton faithful welcomed their beloved Hatters onto the Kenilworth Road pitch for the first time at full capacity for almost 18 months.

The long absence was quickly forgotten as the deafening noise from the stands was a reminder to us all that football truly isn't the same without fans.

After observing a minute's applause in tribute to supporters who had passed away since the start of the pandemic, newly promoted Peterborough United were put to the sword as debutant Fred Onyedinma stole the headlines with a goal and two assists in the 3-0 win.

But football, as we all know, has a habit of taking you on a rollercoaster journey, demonstrated best by a penalty shoot-out exit from the Carabao Cup and a narrow league defeat against West Bromwich

Albion in the following matches. Pelly-Ruddock Mpanzu made his 300th club appearance and scored to mark the occasion but it was too little, too late at The Hawthorns.

Amari'i Bell – one of eight summer signings – made an immediate impression after scoring a 'tap in' during the 1-0 victory against Barnsley to put his side back on the winning trail.

A very forgettable defeat at home to Birmingham followed, before a well-deserved point against recently relegated Sheffield United concluded the month of August with seven points from the opening five league matches.



SEPTEMBER

2021-22

Luke Berry was included in the matchday squad for the first time against Blackburn Rovers and after going two-goals down, the gaffer turned to the midfielder as a trusted 'game-changer'. That was exactly what he did scoring a brace including a 98th minute equaliser to rescue a point at Ewood Park.

Jones' side were comeback kings for a second match running after Danny Hylton netted his first Championship goal in injury-time. The striker, much adored by the players, staff and fans, had undergone three knee operations in the last three seasons and suffered from a serious bout of Covid before returning to fitness and making a vital contribution in the nick of time against Bristol City!

But after going three goals up against Swansea, the Hatters suffered a taste of their own medicine after the away side completed a comeback of their own to tie the match.

Town slipped to defeat against unbeaten Championship leaders Bournemouth the game after despite a battling performance on the south coast, their first defeat in five matches.

Frustration of both matches was quickly forgotten however when Coventry came to visit Kenilworth Road under the lights.

The Hatters were simply too hot to handle as they raced into a four-nil lead at the break, before adding a fifth in the second half – with braces from Elijah Adebayo and Harry Cornick to end September in style.

OCTOBER

A hard-fought 0-0 draw against Huddersfield Town was played out at the start of the month and at that point in time, the thought of both sides being in promotion contention would have been a particularly surprising one for most outsiders.

Confidence was high in the Luton camp however, demonstrated best when Harry Cornick notched a double at The Den in some style, finding the top and bottom corner with expert precision as Nathan Jones' side condemned Millwall to a first defeat in eight matches as they continued to make their way up the table.

The comeback kings were back to their old tricks against Derby County, coming from behind not once but twice, the latter of which thanks to Elijah Adebayo. It was a result that saw both sides extend their unbeaten league run to four matches that was bettered on the weekend when Adebayo scored yet again in a 1-0 win against Hull.

October finished with an unsuccessful trip to Preston but with two wins and two draws earlier in the month, there was plenty of reason for optimism heading into the busy winter period.



The month kicked off with a five-minute blitz against Middlesbrough as goals from Sonny Bradley – a regular contributor in front of the Sky Sports cameras – Elijah Adebayo and Harry Cornick earned Town a comeback win.

Neil Warnock celebrated his record-breaking 1,602nd game in league management but for the first time in his career was defeated by a Luton Town team.

For the first and only time this season, Nathan Jones' side then suffered back-to-back defeats at the hands of Stoke City and Queens Park Rangers either side of the international break.

Victory proved elusive on the road once more after Elijah Adebayo was denied from the penalty spot and 10-man Nottingham Forest held on to preserve a point. In a game of few chances, neither side could find a breakthrough in an action-packed second half, before disappointment was then compounded by Cardiff to end the month.

Goals from Rubin Colwill and captain Sean Morrison either side of a Jordan Clark equaliser helped Cardiff leave a freezing cold Kenilworth Road with all three points.

DECEMBER

As the weather worsened in the month of December, Town's form did the opposite and despite the horrific weather conditions at a blustery Bloomfield Road, it was a professional performance that helped Town get back to winning ways with goals coming from Sonny Bradley, Elijah Adebayo and Jordan Clark.

In resilient fashion, the Hatters would later hold leaders Fulham to a draw on home turf despite the inevitable Aleksandar Mitrovic goal in the first half.

After staying relatively Covid free throughout the season, Nathan Jones' side were then badly struck over the Christmas period and would be out of action for the remainder of the month. With the games piling up, the question on everyone's mind was whether Town would falter with such a schedule...





An emotional Mick Harford received a hero's welcome as he returned to the dug-out following his treatment for Prostate Cancer prior to the FA Cup victory against Harrogate Town to kick-off the new year.

It would prove to be somewhat of a warm-up for promotion contenders AFC Bournemouth the following week and after racing into a two-goal advantage in the first half, Town had come back from their Covid-enforced break with a point to prove.

But such was the quality of the Cherries in the second half, they were pegged back level with just over 10 minutes to play.

Refusing to lie-down which has been a mainstay in Luton's armory for many a year now, most know the script for what would later ensue in the 97th minute.


As the ball fell to Kal Naismith on the edge of the box, he controlled, chopped past the onrushing Jefferson Lerma, composed himself and curled a brilliant winner past Mark Travers to send the home supporters crazy.

The foundations of the stadium rocked as the gaffer went running down the touchline and produced a fantastic knee-slide in front of the Luton faithful on a day that will live long in the memory of those who stayed to the very end!

A great deal of confidence was carried over into the 2-0 away win at Reading as Jones' side continued their march up the Championship table.

Defeat to Sheffield United was quickly placed in the rear-view mirror as the Hatters - donning the white 'Legends' kit in support of Shelter's No Home Kit campaign - extended their good form at home with a win over Bristol City.

JANUARY



The month of February would begin in memorable fashion thanks to substitute Harry Cornick's fine effort off the bench against Swansea, where over 300 travelling supporters witnessed their beloved side move to within three points of the play-off places.

Nathan made his way into the stand to celebrate with those fans after the game, such was the feeling after a big win on the road.

Progression in the FA Cup was sealed with a confident victory at Cambridge and booked a date with eight-time winners, Chelsea.

Before the highly anticipated cup tie however, Jones' side were in tip-top form as they recorded four wins from their next five matches. Starting with a narrow victory against Barnsley and later bettered with three wins in a week – the first time Luton have managed that feat in the Championship since 1996.

An impressive 2-0 win over recently relegated West Bromwich Albion courtesy of goals from Cameron Jerome and Allan Campbell was followed days later by victory at Stoke, a result that most certainly pleased

the gaffer as he celebrated in the rain thanks to goals from the experienced Danny Hylton and Jerome once more.

Hylts proved his worth in the division by netting for the second successive match, this time the decisive winner at home to Derby as the Hatters picked up 15 points from a possible 18, which led to Nathan Jones and Allan Campbell both being nominated for the monthly league awards.

FEBRUARY

MARCH

The world champions arrived at Kenilworth Road and were up against it from the first minute. After being denied the opportunity to see the Hatters against Chelsea in the cup the season prior, fans more than made themselves heard as Reece Burke headed his side ahead in the second minute.

Goalkeeper Jed Steer was forced off with a bad Achilles injury and replaced by Harry Isted who made only his third Luton appearance – the other two coming in the Checktrade Trophy.

After Saul equalised, Chelsea fan Harry Cornick regained the lead before the quality of Timo Werner and Romelu Lukaku helped the Blues prevail on a night where Town held their own against one of the world's best.

There was disappointment on the road against Middlesbrough, before Adebayo fired the Hatters to victory against Coventry in the following match on the day Harry Cornick made his 200th Luton appearance.

A cruel defeat to QPR before two excellent wins against Preston and Hull, the latter of which propelled Jones' side into third position and will be remembered for a stunning James Bree free-kick off the underside of the crossbar.

2021-22: A SEASON TO

The Sky cameras were in position at Kenilworth Road for the first of four Luton matches they would cover during the month of April, starting with an entertaining game against Millwall.

February addition Robert Snodgrass would make a vital contribution off the bench to assist the late equaliser in a 2-2 draw, before Peterborough inflicted a late leveler of their own a matter of days later in front of 3,700 travelling Hatters.

Play-off ambitions were bruised away at Huddersfield as the prospect of needing a result against a Nottingham Forest side who were unbeaten in the league since January seemed tricky to say the least.

Adebayo was denied from the penalty spot against the Terriers, so Kal Naismith assumed responsibility after Jack Colback handled in the area and calmly rolled the ball home to give Town a priceless lead.

It was a feisty encounter that later saw Sonny Bradley dismissed for a second bookable offence, but Town managed to hold on to a valuable three points against their top six rivals.

The Easter period continued to prove fruitful following a 1-0 away win against Cardiff but was dampened by the loss of goalkeeper James Shea for the remainder of the season, plus injuries to James Bree and Fred Onyedinna.

A depleted side then held their own against a challenging Blackpool team and in fifth place, six points ahead of the chasing pack, were set-up for the two remaining matches in May, the first of which ended in defeat at champions Fulham.

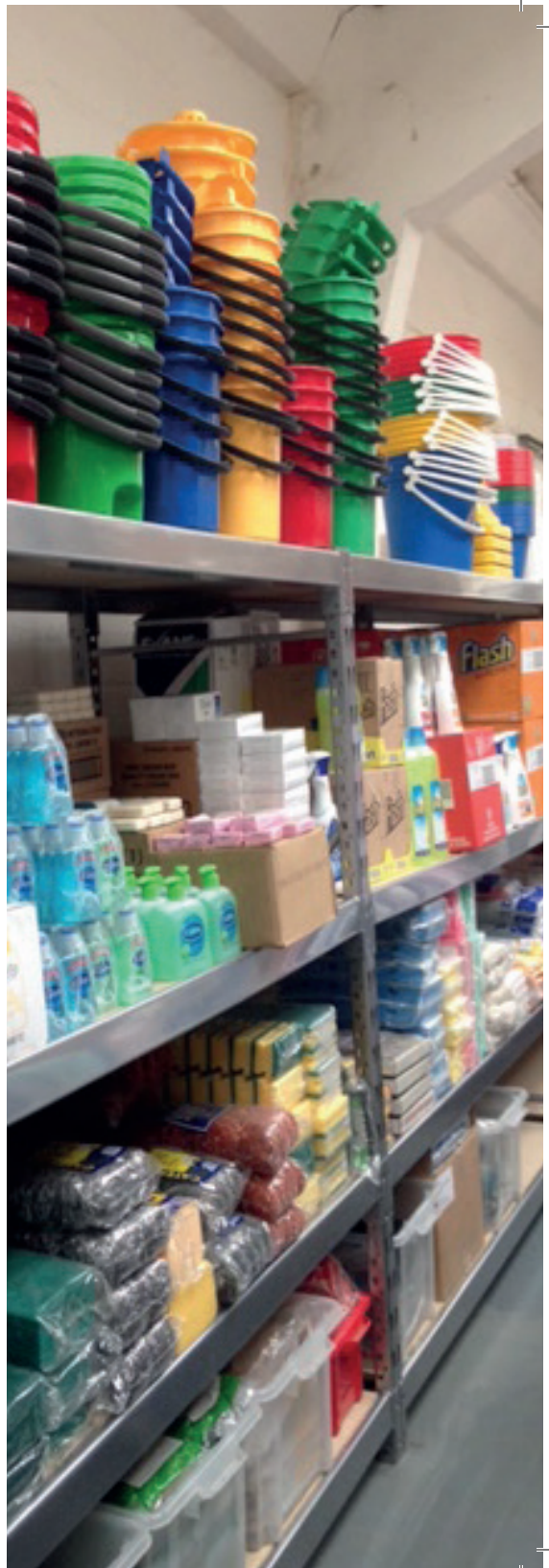





Goalscorer Newton was the biggest threat to Preston's goal after cutting the ball onto his left-foot in the area but seeing his effort get headed away off the line by Kian Taylor.

But against the run of play courtesy of a long ball over the top, the away side retook the lead through Cross-Adair, who kept his composure to slot the ball past Bentley.

Preston then continued to press and found a third goal with 15 minutes to play. Jacob Slater had time and space to cross from the left-hand-side and O'Neill supplied the finishing touches.

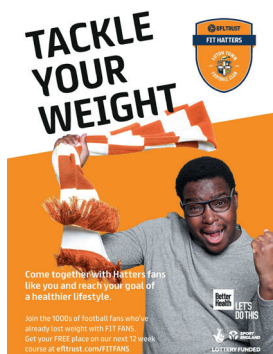

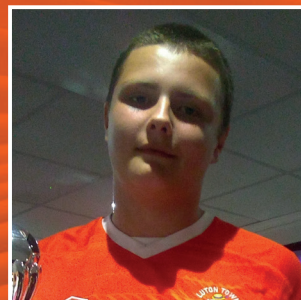

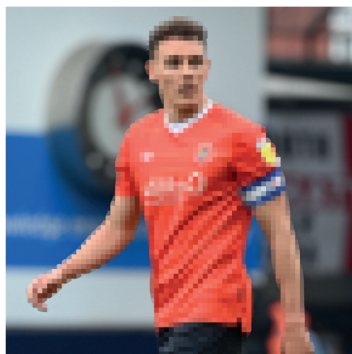

"We thought we should have been better but at the end of the day, it's another point on the board and we're always on about increasing our points tally. We're still in a good position and we're going to give everything to get it done."

After Elijah Adebayo added his 17th goal of the season in the opening minutes, the defender said: "You are going to get that from Eli and you're going to get that from the team."

"We were on it from the beginning, we know that we could have been better on the ball, but we were still going to work hard and put in a shift, that's what the boys done today. We know we have a lot more quality but at the end of the day, we take that, we learn from it and move onto the next game."

"Fair play to them (Blackpool), they came to play. I'm not surprised that they are going to come and play, we have something to play for and if people can try and ruin our season, they are going to do that. We just need to make sure we stay focused on what we need to do and the task ahead."

Keen to control the controllables and focus on their own performances rather than what is going on elsewhere, Kioso shared: "At the end of the day, the gaffer trusts us, and we trust each other."

"If we didn't trust each other and the gaffer didn't trust us, we wouldn't be playing together but he trusts us and everybody on the pitch knows that."

"The 11 that are playing trust each other, the bench trust each other and the players in the squad trust each other. That's the most important thing in the team."
