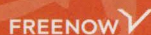

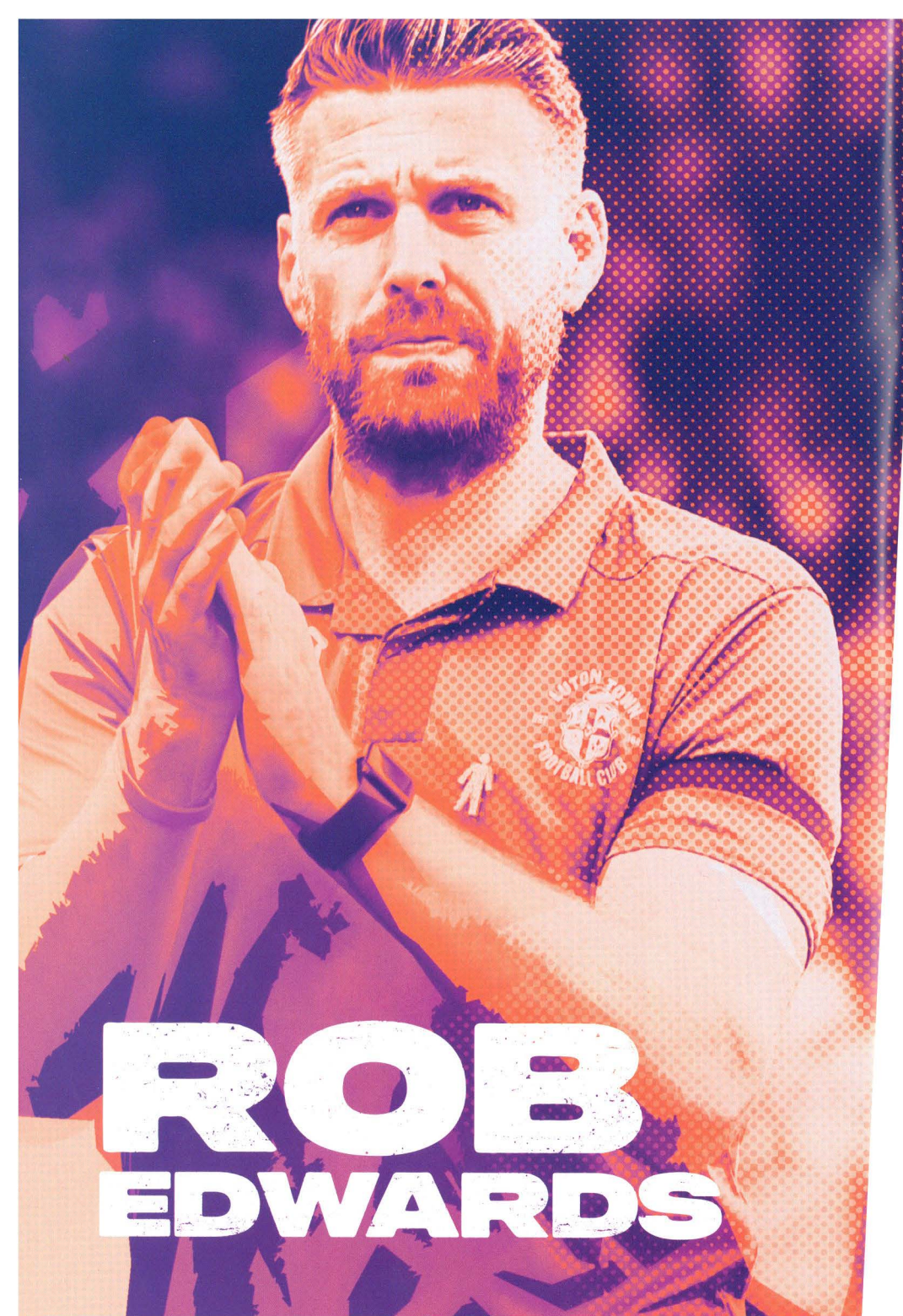

It seems a while since our last home match here against West Ham when your support on the night was incredible. It was exactly the same at Fulham last Saturday and we are disappointed that we haven't been able to give you any points to cheer about yet.

I think everyone can agree that there has been improvement in terms of performance in each match we have played this season. Against West Ham we were competitive and created good chances. It was the same at Fulham – but even though the end result was not what we wanted, we have shown we have been able to create chances, which in this league, is not easy.

After the defeats to Brighton and Chelsea, we were more compact against West Ham. We didn't want to open the game up too soon but, watching back, I felt we could have been more aggressive in certain moments.

I thought it was a really good away performance at Fulham where we limited them to almost next to nothing. It was disappointing to concede the goal in the manner in which we did. It's hard to blame any one person but there's areas in which

we can be better as a defensive unit. Furthermore, we did not take one of our three good chances and we should have definitely had a penalty.

As I've said, I think we have seen an improvement in all four matches and I'm hoping we can see that again today against Wolves. They're a good team full of talented individuals, including Portuguese and Brazilian internationals, among others, so we are under no illusions of the challenge we will face.

We are at home, however, and we want to be able to show a positive attitude. We want to look like we are the aggressors and look like the team that is provoking the play.

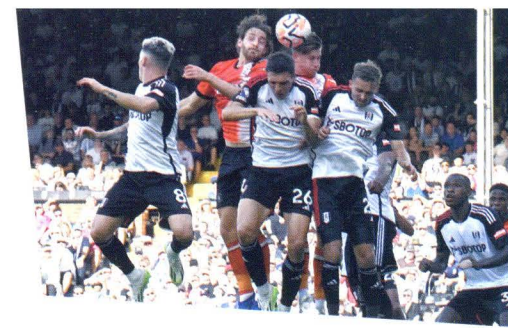
We also want to give you something to cheer about, and we recognise the importance of the role you play, especially here at the Kenny. We know this wonderful old place gives us the best chance for us to pick up points and that's certainly what we will try and do today.

It's good to be back at home. Sitting watching the West Ham game was frustrating for me personally but it was unbelievable to sit among you and back the boys from the stands.

We deserved more out of the game in the end after Mads' goal got us back into it very late on. We created some decent chances, could have had a pen, but West Ham punished us in those key moments and that's the learning curve we are on right now.

There was more progression at Fulham on Saturday. We had a gameplan that we worked on over the international break and I think you can see we put that into effect.

However, it was a very sloppy goal from our point of view to concede, which becomes even more annoying because at the other end we had some big chances that we didn't put away.

It wasn't as if Fulham were carving us open, was it? I don't remember many times them getting in behind. We created more. And yeah, we should have had a penalty. I won't go into that in any more depth as I'll probably get my wrists slapped. But you know what I'm thinking.

Of course, there has been a noticeable difference in quality at this level. Compared to the Championship, mistakes get punished more at one end and, at the other, chances are harder to come by.

That's why we need to be more clinical in both boxes. It's coming. Match by match, there's been improvement.

But there will come a time when we need to stop saying that. Goals, results and points are what we want and we go in search of those elusive first points today against Wolves. We met in pre-season for an entertaining goalless draw but now on home turf we are confident of bringing everything we've learned from the first four games and get a positive result.

Finally, a massive thanks for your support at Fulham. You were incredible throughout and in particular at the end. We take nothing for granted but your backing has really touched us and believe me we all sense it during the games.

It was amazing to see you singing and shouting words of encouragement at the end at Craven Cottage. I think you knew we'd put in a real shift – we're just frustrated not to give you something to go home happy with.

Matches here are going to be vital if we're going to achieve our goal this season. I truly believe your noise inside this old place can generate an atmosphere which can put teams under pressure. We'll try and do our bit on the pitch, and hopefully together we can make this the fortress we want – and need – it to be.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER
GARY SWEET

It gives me great pleasure to welcome you all to Kenilworth Road for our first Saturday 3pm home match in the Premier League – and indeed our first fixture played here on a Saturday afternoon since beating Swansea City in the Championship on 4th March.

While we always relish a raucous night under the lights here, there will always be something special, something traditional, about 3pm Saturday afternoons here in front of our own supporters.

Our visitors today are Wolverhampton Wanderers, and I wish a warm welcome to everyone associated with those of an Old Gold persuasion who have made the trip down from the West Midlands.

Although this is our first league meeting with Wolves since 2007, we have of course more recent, happier memories with our Black Country visitors. Who can forget Alex Lawless' stunning winner in our FA Cup meeting back in 2013 when we were in the Conference and they were in the Championship.

Both clubs went on to win promotion the following season before going onto enjoy a sustained period of success, leading to today where we go head-to-head with

one another in the top-flight since the 1983/84 season.

We also share many mutual connections which I am sure you will read further about in today's programme. Rob Edwards served the Molineux club with great distinction as a player and a coach and, in that latter role, he also oversaw the development of one of our summer signings, Ryan Giles. Kevin Foley, another summer recruit of ours, is back for more where it all started for him as a player. Kev played in the Premier League with Wolves and we were all incredibly proud of his achievements as 'one of our own' went onto play at the highest level.

Rob, Kev and Ryan are all part of a group who are desperate to record those first ever Premier League points of the season this afternoon which we all believe are creeping ever so closer following the encouraging performances in recent weeks.

This week, David and I attended a Premier League shareholders' meeting where we took our (now) regular seat between Manchester City and Liverpool. Despite common conjecture, the level of professionalism and detail among the Premier League's executive is amazingly good.

One of the topics open for debate was the 'New Deal for Football', which includes a redistribution of funding between the Premier League, the EFL and leagues below. It won't come as any surprise that we remain fully behind a fairer distribution of funding within the game to provide greater sustainability for all clubs whilst also providing a more level playing field. This is despite sitting at the top table, which is where the funding would come from.

It may come as a surprise, however, to hear that a majority of Premier League clubs were also supportive of the initiative. Clearly, anything so complex as this will need time to resolve but it feels like it's now on track with an agreement potentially in sight.

A more challenging issue is how football at every level engages with the new, upcoming football regulator. Whilst we are broadly supportive of an independent regulator overseeing the game, we would have certain concerns about how deeply it may expect to engage with the day-to-day operation of the game.

Our last home league match versus West Ham represented a significant milestone for us. Not only was this our first home fixture in the top-flight since April 1992, but it was the first time since 1986 that we had a significant number of fans watching a league match from the

The project to ensure Kenilworth Road met the myriad of Premier League criteria was a Herculean task pressured by the stringent regulatory criteria we had to meet whilst, of course, complying with building control regulations and all be completed in a ridiculously tight schedule and in such a confined space.

Everyone involved had to shed blood, sweat and tears, going above and beyond all expectations to dexterously construct a mini masterpiece and in optimal contrast and harmony with our somewhat more vintage structure.

It is my duty and pleasure to thank all of the numerous contractors involved including Capital Sky, AND, Faithful & Gould, ESG Global, Momentum Engineering, Civic Engineers, FPM Facilities Services, TTL, Focus Rigging, Musco, Factotum, White Horse Contractors, Arena Stadium Solutions, Switchshop, Rybridge, OMM, Cristec and not ignoring the numerous smaller suppliers who all did us proud. Thank you one and all. ▶

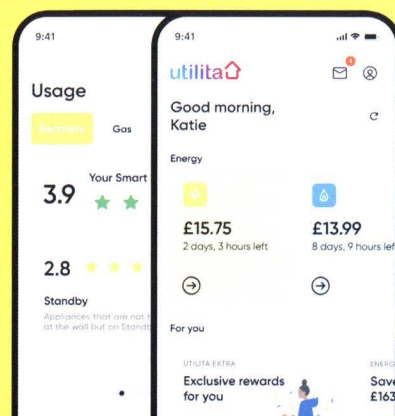
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You'll notice from that list that whilst we needed to refer to some national/international specialist contractors for certain items, such as floodlighting and steel structure, every other contributor was local with many of the – sometimes up to 250 per day – workers being Luton supporters.

I'd also like to thank all of our staff, of course, who have been magnificent in their resolve to just get the job done over the summer.

During the build period our total spend didn't deviate too far from racking up £1m per week, which perhaps demonstrates what a logistical military operation this has had to be and how different contractors (some of whom are competitors) showed that our team spirit exists off the pitch too.

Of course, it wasn't just the media facilities in a new Bobbers stand which we have improved. Indeed, there's still work ongoing as we have used this opportunity to facelift a few tired areas of our old ground. We hope you see the improvements, particularly to seating, hospitality areas and disabled facilities. One major benefit of us being so 'hands-on' during this project was that it served an excellent opportunity to be a valuable 'dry run' ahead of the next big push on Power Court, which, in the meantime, didn't get ignored – more on that next time.

I would like to extend an apology to anyone who has been, in any way, disadvantaged by any of the changes we've made. Some have been impossible to avoid as we have had no choice but to implement 50 new cameras and other spectator obstructions.

However, in other operational areas, we are confident that many of these slight challenges we've observed over the last couple of games will eventually settle, as we iron out some new idiosyncrasies in crowd movement and use of different entrances. Meanwhile, we thank you for your patience.

So far, your support has been nothing short of magnificent. It is greatly appreciated by each and every member on the board and you can see on the pitch after each game how much it means to the players and coaching staff. The ovation the players have received after each game, particularly at Chelsea, gave me goosebumps.

We're all in this together. We knew it wouldn't be easy. But we don't do things that easy way, do we? That's what makes this club, and you, the supporters, so special. That's something you can't buy. We know you will stick with us like you always have, whether it's West Ham, Wolves, Wrexham or Woking.

Keep it up today. It DOES make a difference.

AROUND TOWN

Our first home match against West Ham was also transfer deadline day, so the beautiful chaos of our opening Premier League fixture here at Kenilworth Road saw us juggling a number of announcements of player activity.

Arriving at Kenilworth Road is **Albert Sambi Lokonga**, who arrives for the rest of the season on-loan from Arsenal.

The 23-year-old is Rob Edwards' 12th summer signing made his debut at Fulham last weekend, adding to the Premier League experience that he accumulated with the Gunners and Crystal Palace, who impressed with on loan last term.

The all-action midfielder featured 15 times for the Gunners last season – most notably starting every game in their successful Europa League campaign.

Town boss Rob Edwards said: "It's an exciting signing, he comes with lots of Premier League experience and has brilliant pedigree. He knows and understands what we are about, he believes that he can help us and I think it's a really good fit. He's a midfielder who really looks after the ball, he gives us stability to play in a double pivot if needed, but he can also run on and play as a number eight."

He joins defender **Teden Mengi** as another new face at Kenilworth Road. Teden arrived on the Thursday before deadline day after leaving Manchester United.

On the 21-year-old centre-half Edwards said: "Teden is someone who we have been aware of for a long time – Richie Kyle's worked with him at the FA in the England age groups. He's a fantastic age and comes with great experience for

a young player. He's had an amazing education at Manchester United and he will help us in that outside centre-half position. He's a fantastic athlete, he's aggressive, excellent in one-v-ones and uses the ball well."

Those players departing on loan were Allan Campbell (Millwall), young pro Tyrelle Newton (Hemel), Louie Watson (Charlton), Dion Pereira (Sutton) and Admiral Muskwe (Exeter).

After being a substitute against West Ham, young defender Aidan Francis-Clarke penned a new professional contract and was subsequently loaned out to Dagenham and Redbridge.

The Club also said thank you and goodbye to Glen Rea and Matt Macey after their contracts were terminated by mutual consent.

SCHEDULE CHANGES

Three of the Town's fixtures have new dates following consultation with the Premier League.

The Hatters postponed match with Burnley here has been found a new home, with the game kicking off at 7.30pm a week on Tuesday, 3rd October.

Due to Aston Villa's involvement in the UEFA Conference League, our game at Villa Park, originally scheduled for Saturday 21st October has now been put back until the Sunday with a 2pm kick-off.

Our home fixture with Liverpool has been selected for live television coverage and as a result has been moved to Sunday, 5th November with a 4.30pm kick-off.

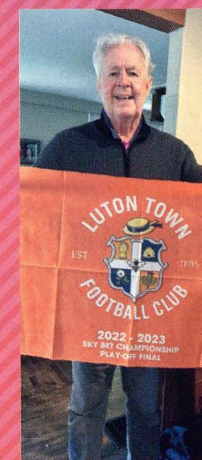

MATCH REPORT

HOME DEFEAT ON TOP-FLIGHT RETURN

The Town battled hard but came up short as Kenilworth Road's first top-flight game since April 1992 ended in defeat.

The Old Girl was deafening prior to proceedings and the players responded on the pitch, as Ross Barkley fired the first shot of the contest wide after just two minutes.

However, the Hammers began to take control of the game, and their persistence was rewarded in the 37th minute when Jarrod Bowen found space inside the box to head home Lucas Paqueta's cross.

Town responded brilliantly to the setback, creating a flurry of chances before half-time. They were almost level instantly in the 39th minute when Carlton Morris found his strike partner Elijah Adebayo in the box, however the 25-year-old could only fire over.

Not long after, Ryan Giles showed blistering pace to glide past Bowen on the left-hand side and deliver a fantastic cross, which was met by Morris and headed agonisingly over.

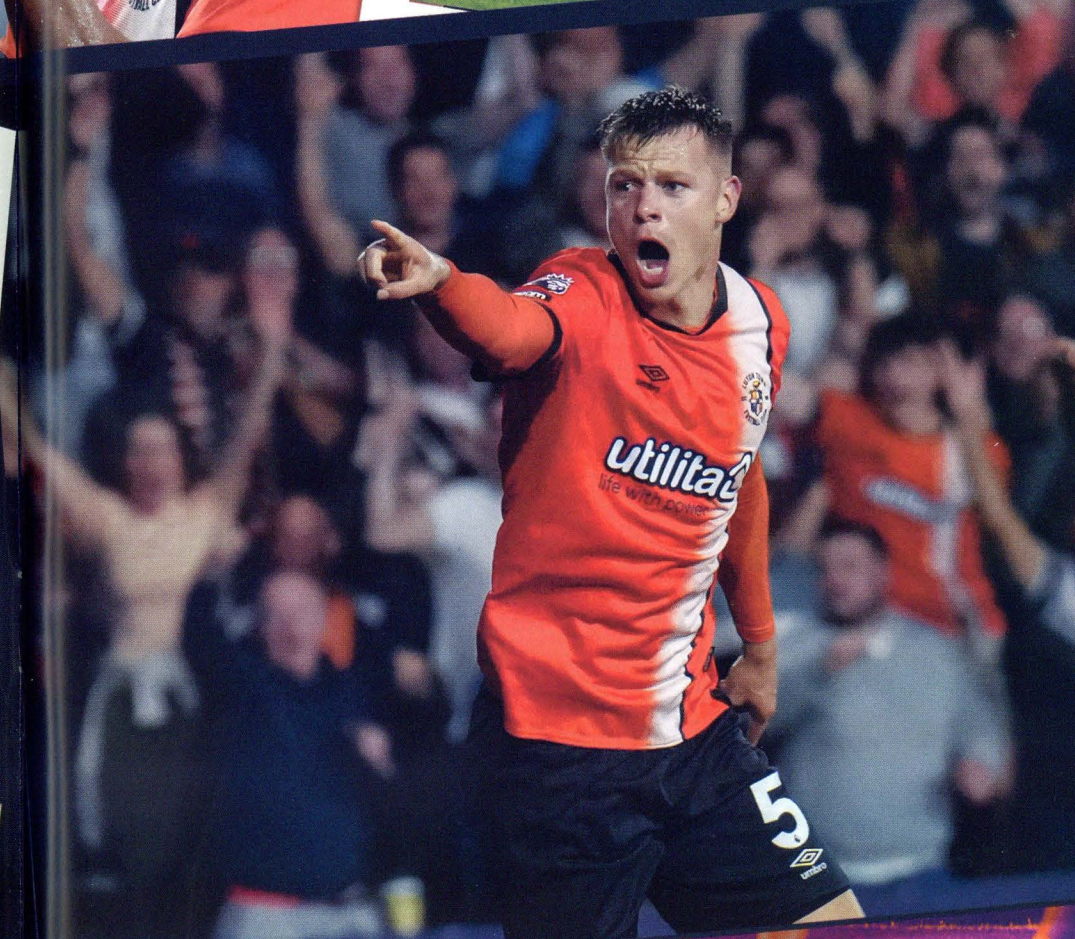
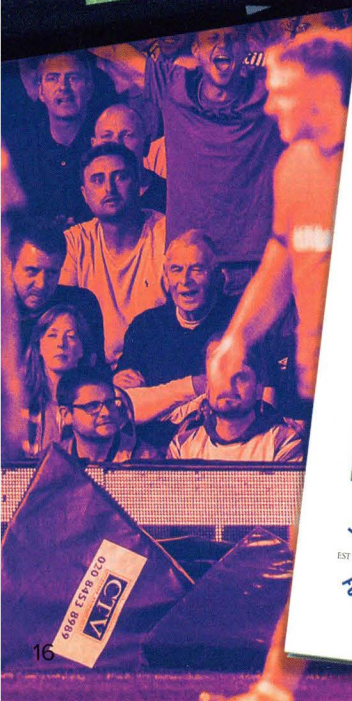
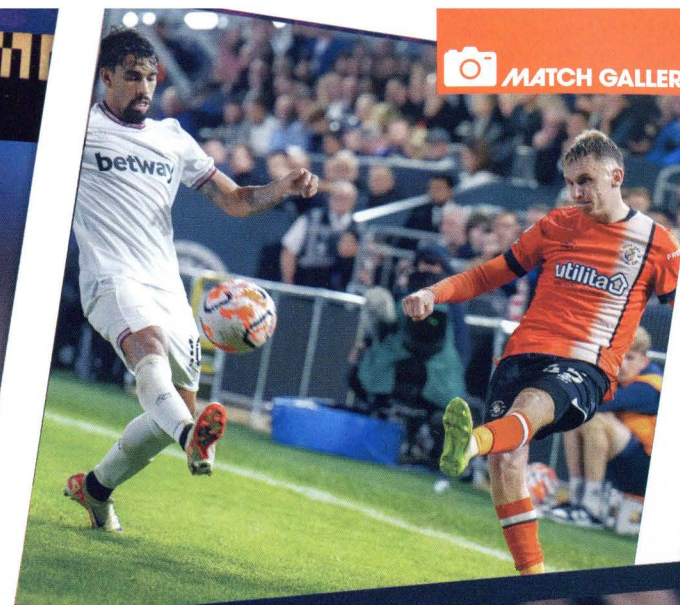
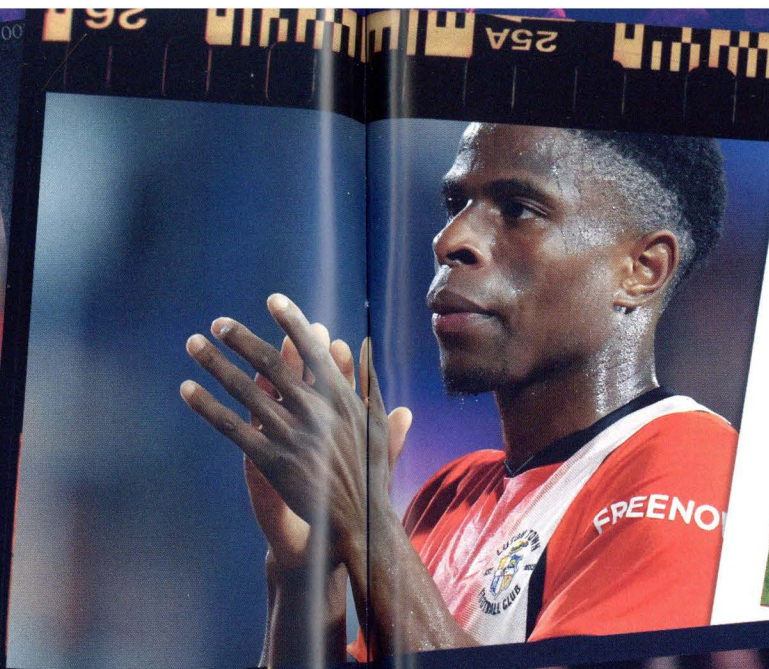
Early after the restart, the Hammers were denied by the first VAR check at Kenilworth Road when Emerson's goal was chalked off for offside.

Two big chances fell for either side just before the hour mark, as Bell had the ball nicked off him by James Ward-Prowse, who fired a delivery into the path of Saïd Benrahma, whose shot was blocked by Reece Burke on the line.

Then it was the Town's turn to go close, as Adebayo tried to latch onto a ball at the back-post, but the former Fulham man just couldn't quite sort his feet out and the chance went begging.

Morris came close to finding a leveller, firing over from close range and that proved costly as the Hammers doubled their lead in the 85th minute, when Kurt Zouma seemingly put the game out of reach, heading home Ward-Prowse's corner.

In the final moments, Mads Andersen's header pulled a goal back for the Town to set-up a grandstand finish, but a late, late leveller was not to come. 🥶



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WEST HAM REACTION

It was a goal that will be remembered as the Hatters' first at Kenilworth Road in the Premier League but it was mixed feelings for goalscorer Mads Andersen.

The Danish defender got on the end of Carlton Morris' header across goal to divert the ball home and reduce the deficit late on against West Ham in our last game here.

"I'm pleased but I'd be even happier if it was 1-0 and we won the game," said the 25-year-old centre-half.

"I'm happy of course with my goal, that's something I want to help the team with, contribute with, so hopefully there's more goals to come.

"It's a big achievement, but to be honest, I love defending so much I would rather have a clean sheet and that's just the truth."

Although it wasn't clear to the naked eye to many during the game, replays showed the Hatters may have had a shout for a late, late penalty after the ball struck James Ward-Prowse's arm in the dying moments.

"I haven't seen it back, I've heard it's a handball, but it's out of my control," said Andersen.

"I'm going to focus on what we control and if we see it in the game, we're going to shout and say 'hey it's a handball,' but I didn't see it.


"We cannot rely on those small VAR, we have to score our own goals and if we get a VAR penalty of something, yes we'll take it, but it is what it is."

Despite all of the late drama and ultimately the defeat, the Hatters' display saw further improvement following the games at Brighton and Chelsea.

"There's loads of positives I think, we kept them away from many chances, they were just very clinical on the ones they had," continued Andersen.

"We created a lot of chances to score, we did the basics better than we had done in the previous games, so loads of positives.

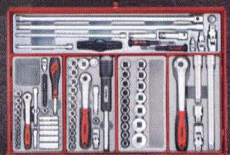
"This is not a sprint, it's a marathon and I'm sure you can see we're improving every game.

"The lads are going to keep on going, we're going to keep working hard in training and learning from the games." 



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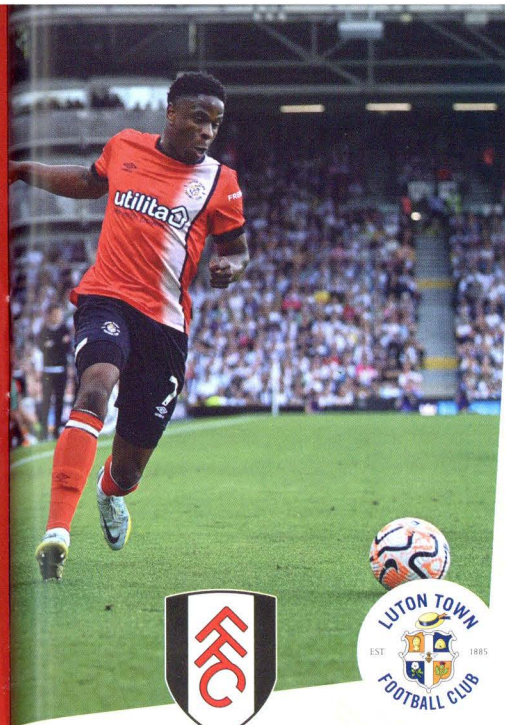

TOWN FALL TO NARROW DEFEAT

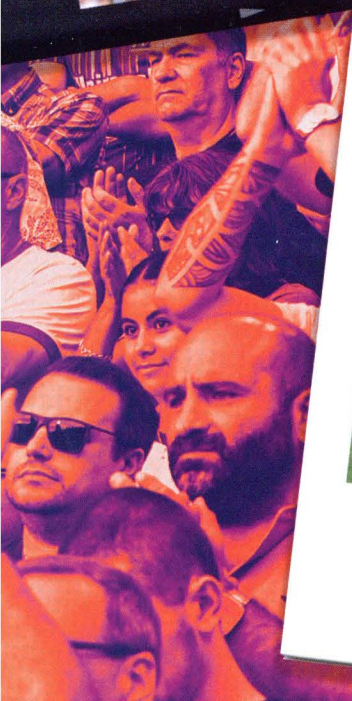
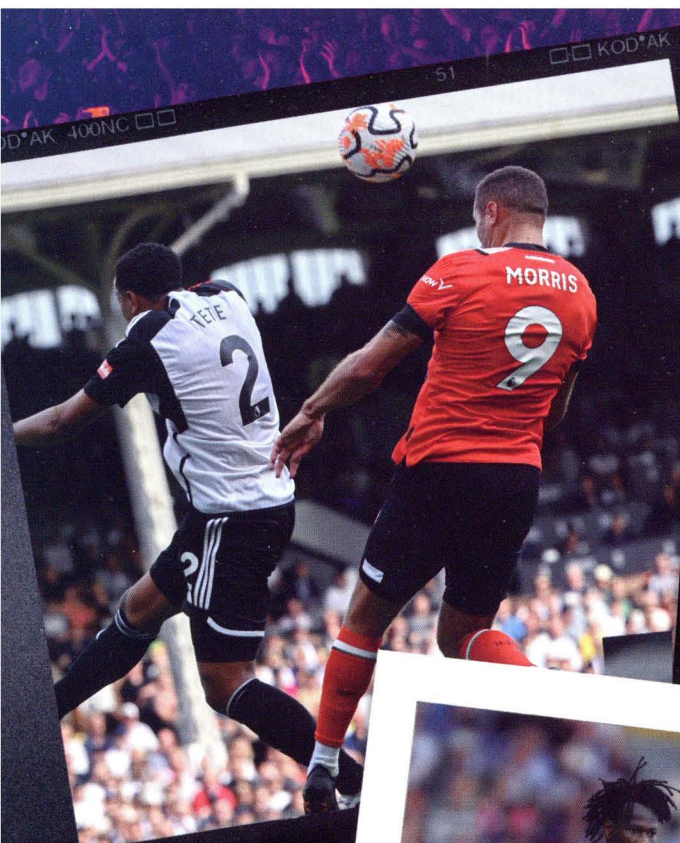
The Hatters came away from Craven Cottage with the feeling of what might have been after a solid display that on another day could have seen the celebration of a first point of the season in the Premier League. Perhaps even all three.

Growing into the game, Carlton Morris first went close, volleying a shot into the side netting on 25 minutes. Then, two minutes later, a real chance. Tahith Chong and debutant Albert Sambi Lokonga combined to send Issa Kaboré away down the right. The Burkina Faso international delivered an inch-perfect cross for Jacob Brown only for his bullet header to crash off the post.

The Town came out for the second half, shooting towards their noisy loyal faithful and two minutes after the restart that opening goal that's craved so dearly came within inches once more. This time Brown was the supplier, whipping a cross to the back-post to Amari'i Bell. The Jamaican international did brilliantly to be in the position to fashion a chance but couldn't find that crucial killer touch and Bernd Leno, the Fulham keeper, was relieved once more.

After that, a period of Fulham domination. But the game was flat on the hour, and home boss Marco Silva introduced Alex Iwobi and Carlos Vinicius on 62 minutes. Three minutes later the hosts were ahead. Willian raced down the left and dug out a cross that Thomas Kaminski got a glove to – but in doing so the ball rolled free to the newly introduced Vinicius to slam home from close range.

Behind, the Hatters rallied late on. Skipper Tom Lockyer denied the hosts a second with a great tackle before having the final chance for the Town with a header that flashed wide and with it hope of a first Premier League point was over.





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FULHAM REACTION

Forward Jacob Brown insists the belief that runs through the Town squad has not been dented by 1-0 defeat at Fulham.

Brown came closest to scoring for the Hatters on his first Premier League start, heading Issa Kaboré's cross against the post in the first half at Craven Cottage, before the same right-wing source presented Amari'i Bell and Tom Lockyer with opportunities after the break.

Town eventually succumbed to Cottagers' substitute Carlos Vinicius' close range effort midway through the second half, and Scotland international Brown said: "It's disappointing again, but we are progressing more and more each week and we can take confidence from that.

"The first three games before the international break were really tough and obviously it's a big step from last season, but we've been working really hard in training and you can see that in this performance.


"It was a really tight game and we've had bigger chances than them, and on another day it would have gone the other way."

Clearly the players were disappointed not to have taken something from the game, but the 25-year-old added: "There is a massive belief in the changing room. Like we've just said in there, I think apart from the result, we couldn't have asked for much more than that.

"We've done everything we worked on during the week, if my chance goes in obviously it's a different scoreline. But yes, the belief is high and we've just got to go on to next week."

Brown's first top-flight starting appearance came after several impressive displays from the bench, as well as his full Town debut against Gillingham in the Carabao Cup last month, in which he also scored his first goal for the club.

He proved a threat supporting striker Carlton Morris from a wide attacking position on the right, and asked whether he felt he'd done enough to retain his place in the team, he added: "I thought I did well, but obviously every game is different.

"We don't know what's needed for the next game and even if you have done well, you might not be playing because there are a lot of games coming up and we just need what's best for the next game." 



WELCOME WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS

Today, the Town face Wolverhampton Wanderers at Kenilworth Road for Luton's second home match in the Premier League. Wolves have had a tough start to the season having played some quality sides already – similar to the Hatters.

Gary O'Neil's side travelled to Old Trafford for their first match of the season and lost 1-0 after a Raphael Varane header. Additionally, the game ended in controversy as Andre Onana took down Sasa Kalajdzic in the box late on, but no penalty was given.

After this, Wolves lost their first game of the season at Molineux following a 4-1 defeat to Brighton and Hove Albion. A rampant performance from the Seagulls saw Roberto De Zerbi's team win their first two matches of the season 4-1 – both wins were against the sides playing this afternoon.

Wolves responded well to this defeat and picked up their first win of the season. Kalajdzic scored the only goal against Everton as they left Goodison Park with three points.

A 5-0 win over Blackpool in the Carabao Cup was shortly followed by a 3-2 loss against Crystal Palace. Hee-Chan Hwang

and Matheus Cunha were on the score-sheet for Wolves, but it wasn't enough to get anything from the game.

Most recently, Wolves lost 3-1 at home against Liverpool despite a classy first half performance which saw them take the lead. The second half was not so good for Wolves as Liverpool took the game away from them.

Wolves have had quite the clear out over the summer. Some of these departures include Matheus Nunes joining Manchester City and Ruben Neves joining Al Hilal for big fees. Ryan Giles also permanently left the West Midlands to join the Town.

Pedro Neto has caught the eye of the league this season having already picked up four assists in five games. He has got an assist in his last three games for Wolves and will be one to keep an eye on today.

Luton manager Rob Edwards has also spent time of playing and managerial career playing for Wolves. Additionally, the two sides met in pre-season during early August with the game finishing a 0-0 draw.

A big welcome to everyone associated with the club making the journey to Kenilworth Road today.

RAYAN AIT NOURI. French-born Algerian international left-back who joined from French outfit Angers – originally on loan – in 2020 before switching for £9.8m on a permanent deal a year later.



CRAIG DAWSON. Experienced centre-half with a wealth of top-flight

experience who arrived in the summer from West Ham. Made over 200 appearances for West Brom and has also played for Rochdale.



MAX KILMAN. Wolves skipper who joined Wolves in 2018 from Maidenhead.

The centre-half made his name in

non-league football, starting at Welling before joining the Magpies.

NELSON SEMEDO.



Portuguese international right-back who joined from Barcelona in 2020. Began his career with Sintrense before joining Benfica where he won two league titles.

MATT DOHERTY.



Irish international wing-back re-joined Wolves this summer. Moved to Molineux in 2010 where he spent 10 years making over 250 appearances before spells at Spurs and Atletico Madrid.

MARIO LEMINA.



Former Marseille, Juventus, Southampton and Nice defensive midfielder who arrived in January this year. A Serie 1 winner with Juve, he is a regular starter for Gabon.

ATTACKERS



FABIO SILVA. Highly-rated forward who arrived at Molineux from Porto in 2020 as an 18-year-old for a club record £35m. The Portuguese youth international has also had spells on loan at Anderlecht and PSV.



HEE-CHAN HWANG. South Korea international who signed for Wolves in 2021 following a successful loan spell. Started his career in Austria with Red Bull Salzburg before joining Red Bull Leipzig in 2020.

SASA KALAJDZIC. Vienna-born striker who signed last summer from VfB Stuttgart. Tore his ACL on his debut but has made a full recovery and scored the winner at Everton in August this term.



MATHEUS CUNHA. Brazilian international attacker who arrived at Molineux from Atletico Madrid. Began his career in Switzerland with Sion before moves to Germany with RB Leipzig and Herta Berlin.



PEDRO NETO. Portugal international who has become one of Wolves' most exciting and dangerous attacking threats, having joined from Lazio in 2019. The attacker, who can operate on either wing, enjoyed his best season to date across 2020/21 as he was voted Player of the Season by both supporters and his team mates.

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH LOOKS BACK ON THE TIME THE HATTERS OVERTURNED PROMOTION-CHASING WOLVES AT A PACKED KENILWORTH ROAD

5TH MARCH 1977 LUTON TOWN 2-0 WOLVERHAMPTON WANDERERS

Following a defeat at Orient, to a single Laurie Cunningham goal, on Boxing Day 1976 the Town had dropped down to 14th spot in the old Division Two and looked set for a season of mediocrity or perhaps even worse.

It is difficult to see now what transformed the team into promotion possibilities over the next three months, but it was certainly one of those golden periods when you were more than proud to call yourself a Luton Town supporter.

After a convincing 4-0 win over Chelsea on a snow-bound Kenilworth Road pitch on 29th December it was back to normality

three days later when we went down 1-0 at Bristol Rovers in a game that should have been won easily. It came as a surprise therefore when in our next game a 3-0 win was recorded at Sheffield United in front of the Match of the Day cameras.

From then on we never looked back as win after win piled up with the settled team seemingly growing in stature with each match. Hull proved tough opponents at Kenilworth Road as they sat on an early lead, but last-gasp efforts from John Aston and Jimmy Husband secured the points and sent the frozen crowd of 8,455 home happy.

Burnley were the next visitors and the 2-0 victory does not adequately sum up the ease of a win which set the Town up for the toughest test so far in the mini-run – Brian

Clough's Nottingham Forest away. The home side had not been beaten at the City Ground since the early part of the season but a superb Luton performance saw the points come our way in a 2-1 win, which included a wonder goal from Aston who ran half the length of the pitch.

We were now up to sixth position with two home games to come which were both won. Blackburn were beaten 2-0 and then a highly rated Charlton side were seen off by the same score as the crowd rose to 11,645 to see Ron Futcher score the all-important goals.

A trip to Fulham was next on the agenda to take on a side that had won at Kenilworth Road in the autumn when George Best and Rodney Marsh were enjoying a purple period for the Cottagers. Best did not play in the return and Marsh turned out for the last time in Fulham colours as the Town won yet again with goals from Aston and Husband.

After seven straight wins it was starting to become serious, and a crowd of 19,200 gathered at Kenilworth Road to see a Wolves side that had gone 12 games undefeated and who were sitting in one of the promotion positions.

Wolves, relegated the previous season, were anxious for a quick return to Division One and overwhelmed the Town in the opening minutes, carving out five good opportunities before the crowd had settled into position.

Gradually, the Luton defence took control with Paul Futcher and John Faulkner snuffing out the dangerous Wolves strike force of John Richards and Alan Sunderland, while Brian Chambers and Lil Fuccillo cut out the threat posed by Willie Carr and Kenny Hibbitt. This left Alan West free to carry out his own probing for the Town with the result that forwards Husband, Aston and Ron Futcher, constantly interchanging positions,

started to cause problems for the Wolves rearguard.

The breakthrough came after 35 minutes when Ron Futcher rose to head on a free-kick from full-back Steve Buckley, with Husband first to react with a crisp half-volley past Gary Pierce in the Wolves goal.

Incredibly, the Town went 2-0 up 90 seconds later when Fuccillo, in a seemingly harmless position out on the wing, drifted inside with the ball and casually floated the ball over the head of Pierce from an impossible angle.

The crowd went wild and although Wolves stepped up the pressure after the break it was the Town who came nearest to scoring when Geoff Palmer threw himself full length to turn a shot from Ron Futcher round the post with his hand which went unnoticed by the referee.

Despite this, and with some fine saves by Milija Aleksic in the Luton goal, the scoreline remained unchanged and the Town found themselves up to fourth and putting extreme pressure on the leaders.

The unbeaten run continued for another four games before a narrow defeat at Southampton preceded a complete collapse over Easter. The Town eventually ended the season in sixth position while Wolves went up as champions.

That run had been fun while it lasted, though.

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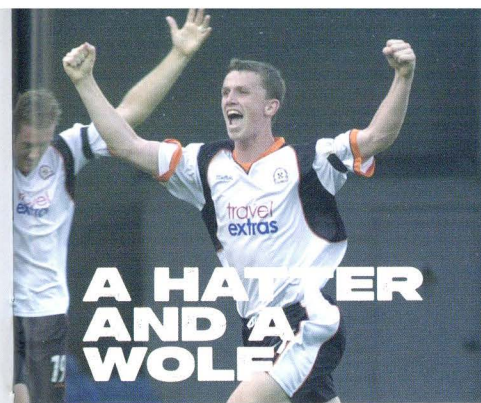

Kevin Foley graduated from the Town's academy and went on to play 166 times, helping Mike Newell's team to the League One title in 2004/05.

His performances caught the eye of Wolves, and he moved to Molineux in 2007 where he would go on to earn eight caps at senior level for the Republic of Ireland.

After spells in Denmark and back in England with Ipswich, Charlton and Coventry he then played briefly in non-league for Billericay before switching focus to coaching, joining the Town this summer as Transitional Coach.



GREAT GAMES

The majority of the Hatters' seasons at non-league level – until John Still arrived in town – were blighted with inconsistency and the 2012/13 campaign was no different.

So the Town came into this FA Cup third round with Wolves in January 2013 having welcomed in the new year with a terrible 3-1 defeat at Woking in the Conference but that

did not deter a capacity crowd welcoming the Championship strugglers.

Despite the gulf in divisions, the Hatters dominated, and led within a minute of the second half when Alex Lawless thundered home a shot the winner from 20 yards.

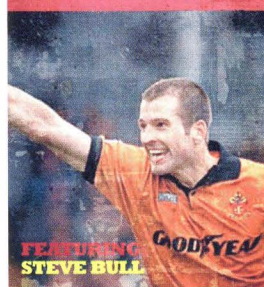
The Town would then go on to earn a history-making win at Norwich in round four – a victory that they follow up by losing at Barrow. Brilliant.



CLASSIC KIT **BRAVE**

The Molineux faithful loved him not just for his ability to score goals from all angles and distance but because he never gave less than 100 per cent.

VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD END

THIS MIGHT BE THEIR SIXTH SUCCESSIVE SEASON IN THE PREMIER LEAGUE BUT LIFE IS NEVER DULL AT MOLINEUX, AS ARDENT WOLVES FAN JACK FINCH TELLS US

From the minute he saw those 11 in old gold defeat Port Vale at Molineux in 1999 there was no turning back for Jack Finch.

Little did he know what would lie in store over the next 20 years that have seen Wolves plummet to League One, lose to a Conference team in the FA Cup (sorry, what?) and then rise to become one of the most exciting teams to watch in the country.

"It's been a bit of a rollercoaster," says Jack, now 32 and who's one of the lucky 1,000-odd Wanderers followers in the Oak Road end this afternoon. "But we've enjoyed some truly great days and took the Premier League like a duck to water when we came up."

Chinese investment has certainly nudged Wolves in the right direction after a period of mediocrity but the results have spoken for themselves.

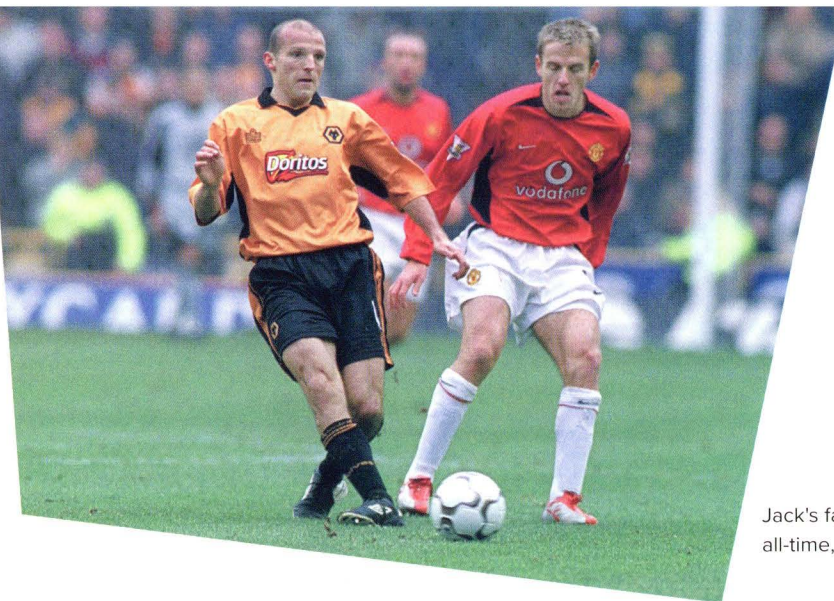
"Considering we were playing in League One in 2014 it's been great. With Nuno Espírito Santo we became

a well drilled outfit and were able to attract some tremendous players and our first season in the Premier League we finished seventh and qualified for Europe.

"For my generation it was new, exciting. We reached the Europa League quarter-final. It was just a shame for us that Covid hit, stadiums closed and instead of a full Molineux we couldn't get past Sevilla."

The good times always feel better after the bad ones. We could tell you that. For Wolves, relegation to third tier in 2013 acted as the perfect springboard to a return to the better times, which ultimately returned.

"It was an empty feeling, a bit of anger perhaps, when we went down to League One," says Jack, whose mum's side of the family support Black Country rivals West Brom. "But we took a breath and had a reset. We had three of four years of losing more than winning. We had the right man in Kenny Jackett – he certainly still doesn't get the credit he deserves – and the right players.

"It was great to win most weeks, refreshing to visit grounds we'd not played at for ages; Colchester, Shrewsbury, Stevenage."

Given Wolves' ascent to the top-flight, Jack knows how tough it is coming into the Premier League with the odds stacked against you.

"My advice to Luton fans is just to stick with it and enjoy the ride," he says. "Make the most of those days, especially at Liverpool and Manchester United. Sometimes the 90 minutes might be the worst part of the day but don't let the game and the result spoil it.

"The beauty of sport is anything can happen. I've seen us win at Man Utd, Man City. Of course, there's a dose of realism, but don't be surprised that you'll be surprised this season."

FAVOURITE GAME: "It was a while ago but back in the FA Cup in 2003 we beat Newcastle 3-2. They were riding high in the Premier League and we were mid-table in the Championship. It was a proper FA Cup tie on a cold January day and I can still picture it. It was an unbelievable game that had it all: drama, goals, saves, tackles."

MEMORIES OF LUTON v WOLVES: "We were in the Championship and Luton were in the Conference. We kind of thought it 'could happen' but were confident it wouldn't. However, our attitude was bad, we were casual on the ball and Luton deserved to win. The manager was sacked before we'd even got home to Wolverhampton."

FAVOURITE PLAYER: "Alex Rae was a no nonsense, all-action midfielder who could pass, run, tackle and shoot. He had everything, never shirked a tackle and never took the easy option. If you had 11 Alex Raes in the team you wouldn't win every week but you'd love watching it."

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THE BIG INTERVIEW

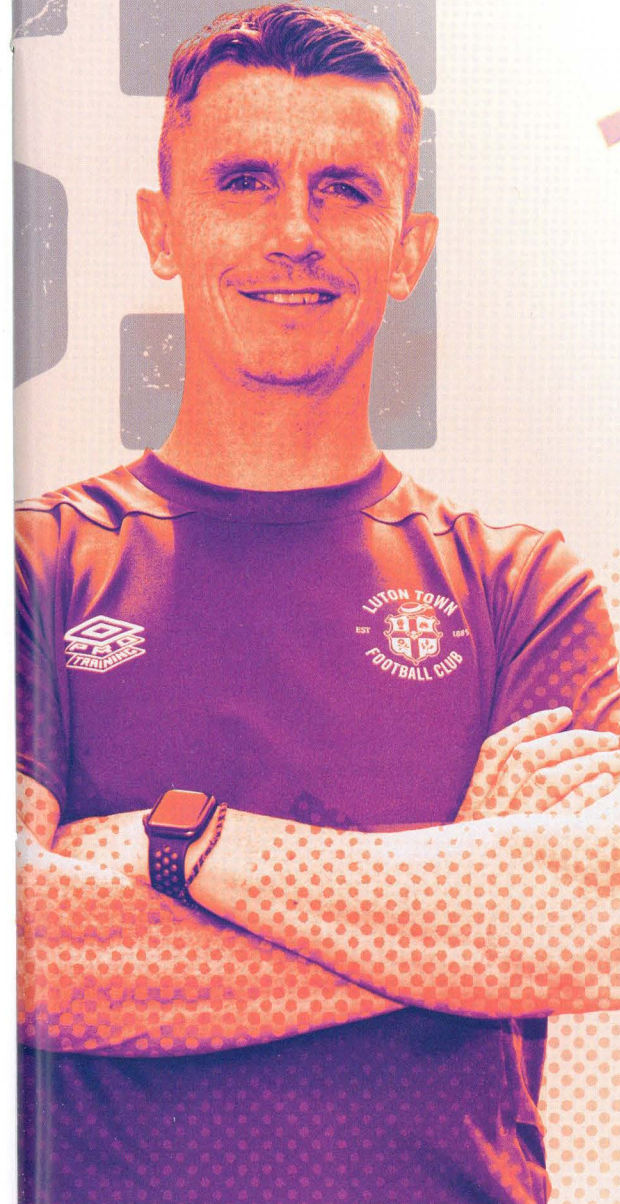
Everyone likes a hometown boy done good. For Kevin Foley that's not entirely true. Contrary to anything ever-written about him he is not a Lutonian.

However, Luton was the place where the football bug was caught, and soon after kicking the ball around in the park, it wouldn't be long before Foley was outlining a career in the game.

"People think I was born in Luton, but I was born in London and moved to Luton when I was five," explains Foley, who rejoined the Hatters this summer as Transitional Coach. "I grew up in Luton, in Farley Hill, and I didn't really play football properly until I was eight or nine.

"I was playing for Barnfield Colts and was scouted to go on a six-week trial with Luton Town centre of excellence. Fortunately for me I was taken on at the age of nine by Paul Lowe.

"Lee Cowley was coaching and he taught me a lot. He'd be preparing us to be footballers, we were taught the basics; how to play on the back foot, how to pass the ball effectively. This was a really key thing for me in my younger years and I'm glad he's still here now. ▶





"At that time I never took anything for granted but half-way through my last year as an under-16 I was told I was going to be offered a two-year YTS deal and I was over the moon. I knew that the hard work was about to begin."

Within months of signing his scholarship, Foley, then 16, was given a rare chance in a reserve game by coach Brian Stein that would go on to shape his career.

"Growing up I would play up front, I know it's hard to believe but I would bang the goals in for fun! In the centre of excellence I was playing as a midfielder, and I had never played right-back before, I'd always played either central midfield or right midfield.

"Playing for the reserves was a huge thing because you'd be playing against bigger, better players. I slotted in okay and I really thrived on it. I came away from the game thinking I could go on and do for myself in that position. My aim from then on was to nail down a place at right-back."

Sooner or later, though, the first team chance did come along. After two appearances in the LDV Vans Trophy as a 17-year-old in 2002, he got his first taste of League action under Joe Kinnear with two substitute appearances late in the 2002/03 season in League 1.

Kinnear, though, departed in a dramatic summer off the field for the Town, leaving Foley and the club in limbo. One phone vote later, the Hatters had a new man at the helm in Mike Newell.

Foley began the 2003/04 campaign still unsigned and went onto play 37 times in all competitions, scoring twice. Not bad for an 18-year-old fresh out of the youth team who was beginning to make the right-back position his own.

"The end of the Joe era was a bit weird," recalls Foley. "Joe left, and Mike Newell came in. Mike was told he was working with limited recourses and, with the club under a transfer embargo, it meant we couldn't sign anyone, me included.

"I was thrown in at right-back and for 75 per cent of that season I was basically playing as a third-year YTS earning less than £100 per week. Enoch Showumni was in the same boat, but playing for expenses. After he scored a hat-trick against Brentford we were both signed on professional forms and we were both understandably delighted, it was a magical feeling."

The Hatters finished that season in 10th place and nobody expected the following campaign to be anything other than another tilt at reaching the play-offs at best. Until they steamrollered the division, recording 98 points on their way to the title.

"At the start of the season after there was no real belief that we could win the league or even challenge for promotion," admits Foley. "As players you always want to better your previous season and in 2003/04 we finished just outside the play-offs so having a crack at the top six was our aim. We beat Oldham in the first game and won the next five.

"We were flying, but then lost three games on the bounce. I remember after losing to

Hull the manager sat us down. He showed us clips in which we did well and clips in which we didn't. He said: 'the wheels aren't coming off, don't worry, we just need to cut out these little mistakes'. There were no drastic measures after that and in the end we romped home."

The Town weren't given much of a chance in the second tier in 2005/06, especially as the fixture computer handed the Hatters an opening three-game schedule against teams relegated from the Premier League the season before: Crystal Palace, Southampton and Leeds – yet picked up seven points.

"I remember the Palace game because a lot was made of Andy Johnson deciding to stay after they were relegated," says Foley. "I was told before the game how Johnson would play, that he would stand off the post at set pieces, looking for the second ball. He was my man, I didn't listen to anything I was told, and after we couldn't clear a corner, Johnson pounced to score. It was my fault. It turned out to be a big lesson for me and I'll never forget that. Thankfully we won the game."

One abiding memory for Foley from that season in the Championship was the Town's epic FA Cup encounter with Liverpool in front of the live BBC cameras.

"Without a doubt the game of that season was the Liverpool cup tie," says Foley. "It was an incredible night. In the tunnel beforehand I was genuinely in awe standing next to Gerrard, Alonso and Carragher...they were the European Champions after all. I couldn't believe it. ▶

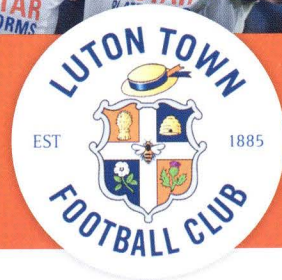
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"To go 3-1 up was unbelievable, it was out of this world. In the end we ran out of steam, I think we'd put so much effort into the game at that stage that the final 20 minutes took it out of us."

After a more-than-respectable 10th place finish in the Championship, the summer – and season – that followed was tough for Foley to take as the Town lost several key players which contributed to the first of three successive relegations that ultimately saw us slip out of the Football League.

"We lost Vine, Nico, Howard, Curtis. The spine of the team was gone and it really affected us. It was a strange season, Mike Newell was sacked and in came Kevin Blackwell. It was a new experience for me, I had never really seen that side of football before. A lot of questions went through my mind. Who will the new boss be? Will he like me? What formation will he play? Will he bring in his own players?"

But while Foley would still keep his place in the side under Blackwell, the Town drifted down to League 1, and the three-time young player of the year would soon be saying goodbye to Kenilworth Road.

"After relegation that season I still had a year left on my contract," continues Foley. "Before the first game of the season I was still at the club but Kevin Blackwell pulled me and told me that Wolves had put in an offer."

"I was nervous, I'd spent 12 years at Luton, and it had been a big part of my life. It all happened so quickly. I met Mick McCarthy

on Sunday, signed on Monday and made my debut against Bradford in the League Cup on Tuesday. I remember playing well the previous season at Wolves. I must have made a good impression.

"Moving away for the first time was a new experience. I learned a lot. We won promotion in 2009 to the Premier League. At that point I said to my agent that I felt I'd 'made it' after all, I was watching myself on Match of the Day!"

Foley's affections for the Hatters never diminished as he starred in the Premier League at Molineux, but it wasn't until 2013 that he got the return to Kenilworth Road he never thought was possible when the Town drew Wolves in the third round of the FA Cup.

"I was thinking that I might never make a return to Luton, especially with them out of the league at the time," he says. "I couldn't believe it when the draw was made."

"But the less said about the game the better...I played a nice little part in the Luton goal, shanking my clearance which led to the winner."

"It was strange walking through the main reception as an opposition player, but good to see familiar faces."

"Now, having such a history with Luton Town Football Club, growing up through the system, it's a bit of a dream to be able to come and work here now as a coach, and try and help the next generation come through."

THE RECORD

The Town's record on this day is an ugly one. Of the 24 matches we've played on this day in history, only five have been won and 10 have ended up in defeats. Not that this means a thing going into today's game. Our first, against Leicester Fosse back in 1899 was a goalless draw. Our last? A 1-0 win over Chesterfield here in League 2 in 2017, secured thanks to a goal from Danny Hylton. Bizarrely that victory ended a run of 12 matches without a win on this date.

BEST OF THE REST

The Hatters and Wolves have history on this day in the record books but it's not much to shout about. The Town travelled to Molineux for a Division One (now Championship) clash in 1995 and played out a goalless draw in front of 23,659. The Hatters would end that season finishing bottom of the table while Wolves ended in 20th place, three points above the relegation zone.



MEMORABLE MATCH!

CHARLTON 4 - 4 LUTON.

23rd September 2003.

This League Cup tie at the Valley was certainly one to remember, even if it did end in heartbreak for the Hatters hordes who made their way down to the capital.

With the Town leading 2-0 thanks to goals from Kevin Foley and David Bayliss, the Addicks, then playing in the Premier League, came back to level through Scott Parker and Kevin Lisbie.

A superb strike from loan hero Gary McSheffrey looked to have won the tie for the Hatters only for Paulo Di Canio to equalise at the death and take the tie to extra-time.

Charlton led for the first time in the tie when Claus Jensen scored early in extra-time but the Town fought back to take it to penalties when Chris Coyne equalised to make it four apiece.

The shootout saw 15 successful spot-kicks before Coyne saw his effort saved by future Hatter Dean Kiely to send Charlton through – but despite the disappointment, the Hatters were applauded off the field by their massed ranks of travelling fans.

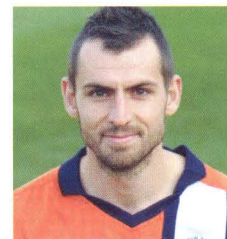

FIRST UP IS MIDFIELDER ALEX LAWLESS.



After a broken hand – yes we had to ask – not one but two consecutive play-off final defeats (yes that too) and being the target of supporters’

frustration, you could have excused Alex Lawless for throwing in the towel after a succession of set-backs in his Luton Town career.

Yet, as we know, the Welshman is not a man to give up easily. After winning Player of the Year in 2012/13, all of those disappointments and frustrations of the past were soon forgotten as the Town stormed to the title and returned to the Football League with Lawless at the heart of it.

“There were a lot of things that just *happened*,” he says, looking back at his time with us philosophically. “But the ups and downs just made me want to succeed more, it never once put me off. No matter what happened in the hard times I never let my head drop or give up in training.

“Even when there’s that feeling that the fans don’t want you and the confidence is down, you just try to get your head down and overcome it and that’s what happened.

“I felt the season before we won the league I was on a good trajectory; I was player of the year and played well even though the team wasn’t getting the right results. At the start of the season I knew John Still wanted me, and that gave me confidence. Plus the fans were showing me more love, so it kind of snowballed and it became everything I ever wanted from the beginning.

“Winning promotion – and not through the play-offs – came at a time when everything

came together. I lived in the town with my wife, and she lived through these times with me too.

“So when we went up it was the justification of why we came down to Luton, why we moved, because I’d come here to win the league with Luton. After all we went through, it was just perfect.”

The season itself only took off after a 2-0 defeat at Wrexham had seen the Town win just twice in their opening eight games.

It would be a 3-0 win over Dartford, on Lawless’ first start of the campaign, which would kick-start a run that would all but crown promotion and our long-awaited return to the Football League.

“We didn’t start great but I remember pre-season being really good. The fact we didn’t have an extended season the year before with no play-offs, was probably a blessing in disguise in some weird way.

“It was all perfect timing. With John Still, and the players we brought in, we had come from a low point in the club’s history and John brought everything together. Even though we didn’t start well we knew amongst the squad that we had the opportunity to have a great season and once we started winning there was no looking back.”

That unbeaten run was almost ended by Dartford at Princes Park in April 2014. 1-0 down with 10 minutes left the Town turned things around late on thanks to goals from Andre Gray and a certain Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu.

And it’s that win that sticks out more than anything for Lawless as the three points further cemented their place at the top of the table with time – and games – running out for Town’s rivals. ➤

"For me that's a game that really stands out. It was a stage of the season where everyone wanted to beat us, especially at their place, but it was a really tough game and it wasn't going great.

"It epitomised that season – everyone remembers us blitzing teams 6-0 or 7-0 and dominating teams but it was games like this, where we'd grind out a win, which were massive and it felt massive on the pitch. There was this huge relief and for Pelly to be involved in that and to still be doing what he's doing now, it's just golden.

"By that stage you're in the mode where you don't feel like you're going to lose, and the opposition feel as though they won't beat you – and that kind of snowballs. As a squad we developed relationships in all areas of the pitch, had a stable team and we were able to really find our feet. There was plenty of competition – John Still made sure of that – and everyone was pushing each other. There were lots of factors behind our success but the momentum we got just kept us going.


"Of course the dressing room was really strong and full of great characters, strong characters – arguably the strongest dressing room I'd witnessed. If one of two players were down or lacking confidence, there was always someone there to lift

someone else and that was constant. And if it wasn't a player, then it would be John or the coaching staff, they were fabulous."

They say a week's a long time in football yet for the Town the past decade has flown by. Lawless, now 38 and lead coach for the Under-18s, realises how far the club has come in such a short space of time.

"In the world of football you just don't see this kind of thing happening. But in terms of the people at the club and what they want then I'm not surprised. I was as excited as anyone, especially watching us now on Match of the Day.

"Now, when it comes to my pathway, I always knew I wanted to go into coaching and never wanted to leave the club. For that to come to fruition, especially at a time when there's such a great vibe at the club, and to have a boss who I respected so much as a teammate in Paul Benson, it's dreamland."

Alex Lawless was signed from York City, initially on-loan in 2010 and went onto make 203 appearances for the Hatters, scoring 22 goals. After spells with Yeovil, Leyton Orient and Ebbsfleet, he returned to Kenilworth Road as Assistant Professional Development Phase Coach last year before taking over control as Lead Under-18s Coach this summer.

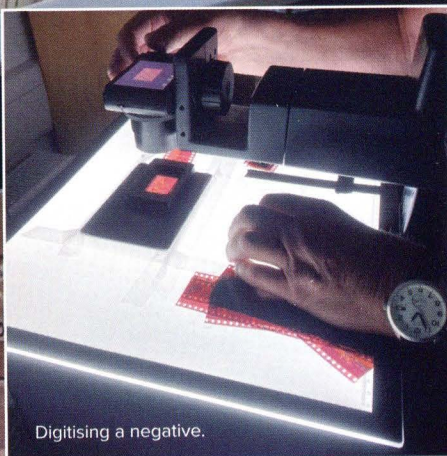
HATTERS HERITAGE

For the last 14 months, a group of dedicated volunteers have been meeting every Friday at Wardown Museum to scour the collection of 1.5 million Luton News photographic glass plates and negatives.

We have been looking at each and every negative to find anything Luton Town with the result that a tremendous 72,342 images have been located, saved and put in season and game order, for future generations to enjoy. The best of these will be captioned and uploaded to the website, hattersheritage.co.uk.

The website was launched in November 2020 with the intention to digitise every page of every programme, every match report and every photograph we possess. In addition, there are biographies and photos, where available, of every player making a first team competitive appearance since 1885 plus much more.

The website has already garnered praise from supporters of other clubs and a favourable write-up in the esteemed programme magazine Programme Monthly.

Out of 128 competitive seasons, we only have 14 left to complete, with four of these to be uploaded to the website at the end of the month. We will then conduct a review of the seasons and add new photos plus better quality match reports where we can.

None of this would be possible but for the unpaid volunteers who have given up their time free of charge to ensure that the history and heritage of Luton Town Football Club is preserved long into the future.

We want the website to remain free to view but this means we need your help with the considerable cost of hosting the website plus insurance of the club memorabilia, storage and various licenses.

A-Z THE NON-LEAGUE YEARS

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS

The Hatters spent five seasons in the non-League wilderness after being cruelly relegated in 2009 until a final glorious promotion under John Still in 2014. All part of our rich history which should never be forgotten!

Part Two- B is for Barnet, Barrow, Bath City and Braintree Town.

We only met **Barnet** during our promotion season of 2013/14 and both games were played over the Christmas period. In the game at Barnet, which was won 2-1, midfield mainstay Jonathan Smith suffered a broken leg which was to effectively keep him out for the rest of the season. The home clash, a few days later, was played in impossibly wet conditions but again we came through 2-1 to see off the challenge of Edgar Davids' Bees.

Barrow, who we met regularly in Football League encounters in the 1960s, were our opponents during our first four years in the Conference. Our home record was pretty good with three wins and a draw including a hat-trick for Jon Shaw in a 6-0 Tuesday night win, but at the far-flung outpost in Cumbria we suffered two 1-0 defeats to follow two 1-0 victories. Holker Street was not a place to go to if you were expecting a goal-fest!

We were together with **Bath City** for two seasons during our non-League stint. We had played at Twerton Park before during Bristol Rovers' stay there and returned from our Conference clashes unbeaten. At home it was two straight wins with the first meeting coinciding with our 125th anniversary celebration.

We leave the worst memories until last. **Braintree Town** became our bogey side, even trying to spoil our promotion party with a 3-2 victory at Kenilworth Road when a Hatters win would have confirmed the championship in April 2014, leaving us to wait until the following midweek for results elsewhere to confirm our promotion.

Those unfortunate enough to witness the away defeats in April 2012 and February 2013 saw arguably two of our worst performances during our time in non-League. New managers Paul Buckle and John Still, who held watching briefs to the games, must have wondered what they were letting themselves in for.

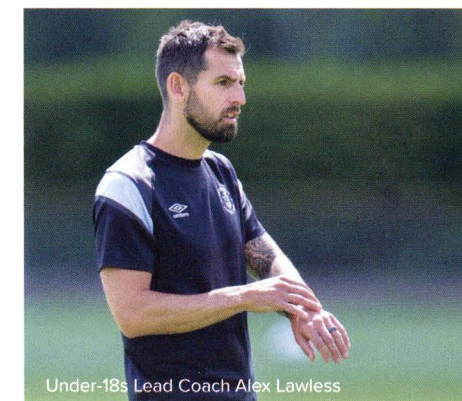
"We kept going and were the better team and deserved to win. That said, Sutton had a late chance themselves and at that point it looked as though perhaps we had missed our opportunity for the three points."

The boys performed brilliantly on the Saturday, more than competing against other Premier League sides. Displaying excellent one v one play, combinations and physical strength to outplay the opposition.

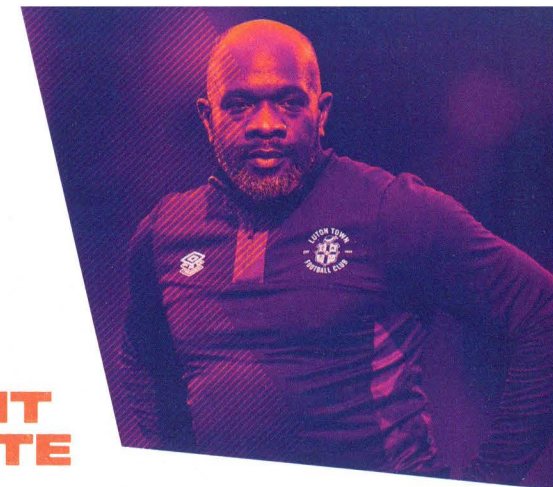

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THE NEXT GENERATION SPEAKS

Charlie Emery doesn't care what league Luton play in. He just wants to play for us.

The young centre-half has the next two years to realise that dream after becoming one of the 12 new scholars to sign on the dotted line for Alex Lawless' Under-18s.

Given the fact he joined the club as a six-year-old, means he's seen plenty over the past 10 years and been part of the journey from non-league to Premier League.

"What the club have achieved and how they have progressed has been amazing," he says. "It never bothered me when I first joined that they were in the Conference and sure, it's great we are in the Premier League now, but for me it doesn't matter what league we're in, I just want to play for Luton Town."

They are wise words from a defender who has had his own football journey over the past decade.

"I'm from Welywn but was playing for Wheathampstead Wanderers and I was there for a few months," he explains. "A few players were put forward to a trial and from that trial I was one of 12 out of 180 who got chosen."

"I began as a midfielder but now I think I've found myself as a centre-half. As a midfielder you wouldn't get much time on the ball but as a defender you do

and you're able to see the whole game. I think that really suits my game."

The academy leaves no stone unturned in their quest to unearth and develop the next footballers of the future and Charlie has loved every single minute of his education so far at The Brache.

"Coming through the academy has been great because we have had the opportunity to experience playing in tournaments abroad," he says, smiling. "Going away to different countries, seeing how different cultures play different styles of football, hearing different languages, it has been great for me."

"We're playing big teams like Bayern Munich and doing really well so those experiences have been important to my development."

Playing Youth Alliance league football each week is also an experience and the youth team's results in the past month have tested the resolve of Lawless' youngsters after losing back-to-back matches.

"We have really learned from those defeats," says Charlie. "Getting the win against Sutton last Saturday was good because now we want to stay like that and keep winning all the time. Losing wasn't nice."

"But as a group we're coming together and improving as we settle down and now we are looking forward to pushing on for the rest of the season."

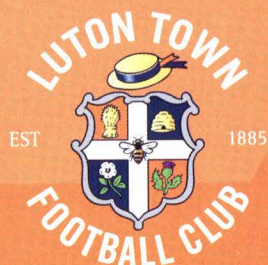


THE LAWLESS REPORT

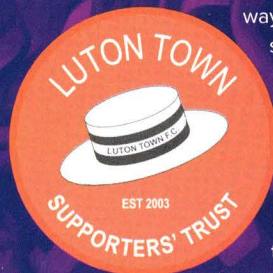

What were your feelings when you saw Luton walk out in the Premier League for the first time?

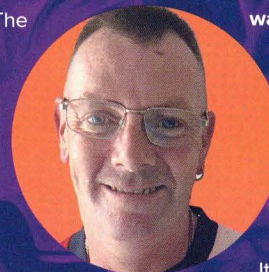
I'm not ashamed to admit that I cried. It was very emotional!

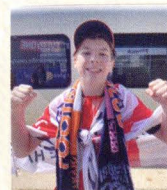

WHO'S YOUR PREMIER LEAGUE TEAM?

As we welcome Wolverhampton Wanderers to Kenilworth Road for our third home game of the season, I think it's time to look back on our first season in the Championship. More specifically, our third home game back in the second tier.

The game in question was our 2-1 victory over recently relegated Huddersfield Town. I remember going into the game with a few nerves, but I was still feeling good as we were coming off the back of a dismantling of Barnsley in a 3-1 victory at Oakwell. Being 10 years old at the time, I was mainly used to see us winning in League One and League Two, so it was quite the contrast watching us in our first season in the Championship.

Graeme Jones had named a solid team for the match with an exciting attack of James Collins, Harry Cornick and Kazenga LuaLua.

Neither side could break the deadlock in the first half, but this soon changed in the second half. Under two minutes in, the Terriers took the lead after Karlan Grant managed to bundle the ball in for the away side. This was the third time in the last two away games where Luton had conceded early in the second half and I remember there was tension within the home end.

Soon after this, Luton were on the front foot and began dominating the game. James Bree's deflected cross down the left fell to James Collins who was tripped inside the box and a penalty was awarded. Collins

stepped up and smashed it into the bottom left corner to level the game.

This gave Luton the momentum the team needed, and it looked like only one team would go on and win the game. The pressure was building on the Huddersfield defence, and it felt like a matter of time until the Hatters took the lead.

Just under ten minutes after the equaliser, Cornick laid the ball off to Andrew Shinnie far from the goal. He turned past the defender before looping the ball into the left-side of the net much to the delight of the Luton fans.

This now set the home fans on a nervous 25-minute wait for that final whistle. The game returned to the state it was in during the first half and both sides were threatening.

Luton held on and got their second win in a row in the Championship. I remember walking out of the ground and couldn't believe we were adjusting to the league so well. If you told me, we would be in the Premier League playing West Ham at home in four years I would have laughed at you!

It is always nice to flashback and reminisce about games that have been mostly forgotten about. There are plenty of games in our rise up the leagues are still left to revisit this season, I hope this has brought back some memories. 🏆

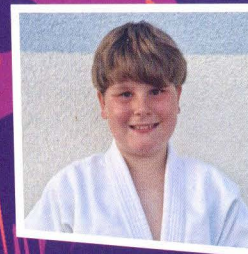

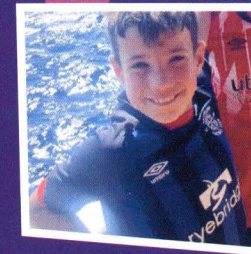

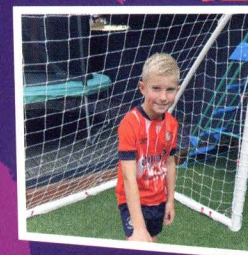

WHERE?

Goodison is one of the UK's great old football stadia. It is therefore with genuine sadness that next Saturday will likely to be our last visit to this part of Liverpool as the Toffees are set to move to their new stadium at a site at Bramley-Moore docks next year. Opened 131 years ago, Goodison Park has hosted more top-flight football matches than any other. Hatters fans will be located in the two-tier Bullens Stand that runs the length of the pitch.

HOW TO GET THERE.

As ever the Bobbers Travel Club are running a coach to Everton. Departing from Luton at 9am the fare is £35 for adults and £32 for concessions. Book your spot on the coach by calling 01234 856542. There is a proposed national rail strike planned for next weekend so we advise you to make alternative travel arrangements. If you're driving (probably best), the postcode you need is L4 4EL. Parking-wise, there is a car park in nearby Stanley Park which costs £10.

UNHAPPY HUNTING GROUND.

The Hatters' record at Goodison doesn't make for pleasing reading. Town teams have struggled here in the past, winning just six of 25 matches with 16 of those games ending in defeat. You have to

go back to October 2006 for our last visit – a 4-0 League Cup defeat but you need to scroll back to September 1988 for our last victory. That day goals from Kingsley Black and David Oldfield secured a 2-0 win in the top-flight.

THE FULHAM OF TODAY.

Sean Dyche, who took over at the end of last season and guided the Toffees to survival, has a job on his hands to prevent another relegation battle following their start to the season. Everton have taken just one point from their opening five games – that coming thanks to a 2-2 draw at Sheffield United. Last weekend saw the Blues lose out at home to Arsenal – a third successive defeat, all without scoring.

WATCH OUT FOR.

Jordan Pickford. The England number one has been a mainstay in the Toffees team since joining the club from Sunderland in 2017. The 29-year-old has been capped 55 times by his country and has continued to impress between the sticks, winning player of the year twice, in 2017/18 and 2021/22. In February he penned a new deal to keep him at Goodison until 2028.

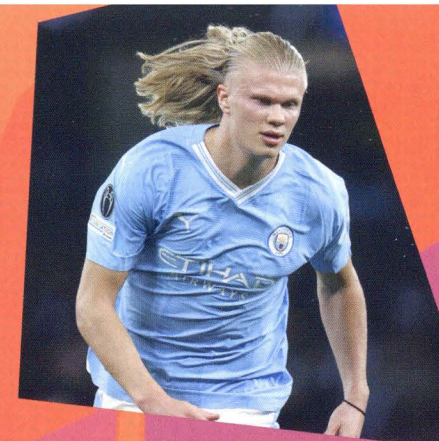

Back then the late Brian Swain was handing out actual telephones from his cupboard in the old press room to reporters carrying little more than a notebook and pen. Nobody was reporting for a website or updating social media, and Hatters fans had to wait until Wednesday to read about the game in a local paper. There were two – the Luton News and the Herald, with the Citizen having closed a few months before.

It was updates with the occasional commentary on BBC Radio Bedfordshire, and the same on Chiltern Radio, with coverage as well on London's Capital Gold. Plus, Brian could also be heard on the club's Soccerline telephone service.

As for seeing the goals, it might have been on Match of the Day or local ITV,

or you could wait for the end of season video. Watching them on your phone on your way home? That was Tomorrow's World stuff.

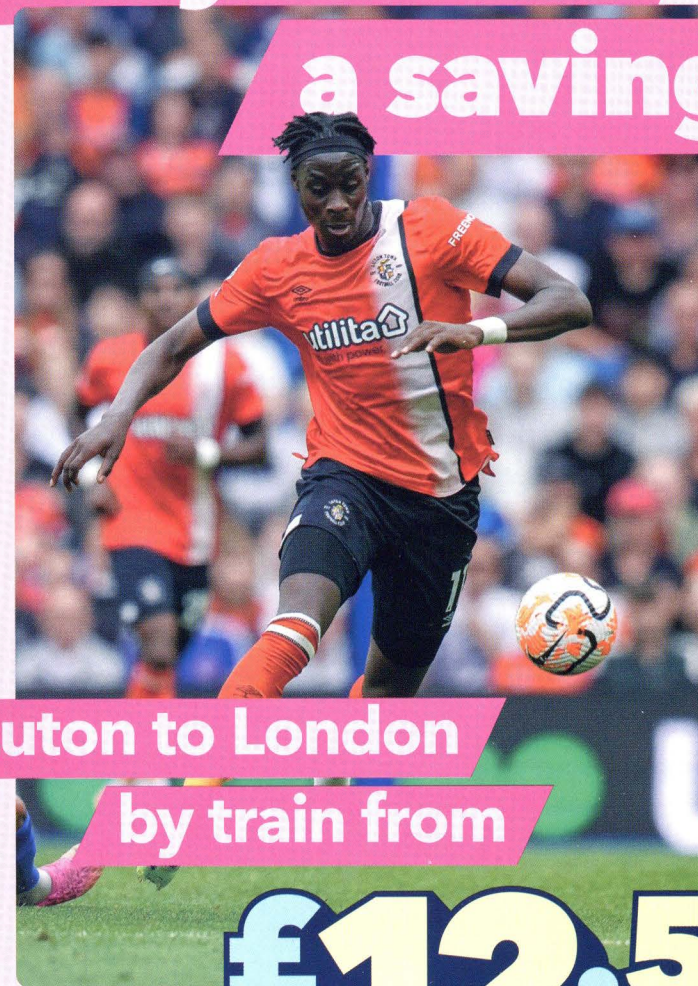
There are now so many platforms on which to debate the issues of the day, or indeed the hour. Following our promotion it was clear that the level of scrutiny would increase – it comes with the territory of being in the Premier League.

It's great to be televised around the world. As Luton Council has recognised, it can provide global exposure for the town. It can also be frustrating when people fail to see the bigger picture.

As I write these notes, a BBC colleague has again questioned the club's ambitions. It is certainly not the view across the BBC, and certainly not at BBC 3CR. But many of you now have the opportunity, via social media, to reply and express your views directly, and you are doing so. That is a positive of the new age, but I guess the ideal response is three points today. Equally, I think we can safely say that even if the club were to go down, we wouldn't be having points deducted for not paying wages. That's just one example, there are many more, and we all know them.

Hopefully the penny will drop elsewhere.
