

# ROB EDWARDS

**A very warm welcome back to you all for today's special game. It has been a long time since we saw you here at the Kenny for the visit of Tottenham.**

That game feels a long time ago now, doesn't it? Looking back on it, it ended up being a very close game. The first 18 minutes were difficult for us but we grew into it and, after the sending off on half-time, I felt we should have got something from the game.

We then had a good afternoon at Nottingham Forest where our travelling fans witnessed a brilliant comeback. The players showed character, desire and determination to come from 2-0 down to earn a precious away point.

Aston Villa last Sunday was a real challenge. It was probably our toughest game of the season to date. We're 10 games in and we're learning a lot about this league but we knew it would be difficult.

However, they made it tough for us. They exposed us in some areas which disappointed us but overall I was proud of the players' efforts. This was because they did not go under. They did not cave in. They did not feel sorry for themselves. Of course, these are prerequisites for any professional, but we have seen it happen. Villa scored six against Brighton, four against West Ham – and it was important that did not happen against us. So, for us to keep going – and score the final goal – was at least a positive to take into today's game.

A warm welcome, therefore, to Liverpool, to Jurgen Klopp and his staff and players to Kenilworth Road. What an amazing challenge it is for us this afternoon. These

are the games and the days we wanted after we won promotion: To go toe-to-toe with the best coaches, best players and the best teams – and we have that today.

It is the first time we play a true giant of football. Liverpool are a huge football club with a prestigious history and this game presents an exciting opportunity for us, especially live on TV, to show the world what we are about.

As always, first and foremost, we will look to give you everything. We want to give you something to shout and scream about. You need to enjoy these games and these occasions and we want the players to be brave and show their best.

It'll be difficult, we know that, and we know we're going to have to defend extremely well. However, we want to try and attack the game as much as possible all the while recognising we're going up against one of the best teams in Europe right now on current form.

It's going to be a great day. But remember Wembley? Remember those celebrations? Days like today are for remembering those moments. We wanted this. So let's make sure we drink in every single second of it.

Please get behind the lads and bring the noise. I promise that they will give you absolutely everything.

Finally, these are my first notes since the sad passing of Sir Bobby Charlton. A player and a gentleman of his kind we may never see again. On and off the pitch he was incredible. He will be sorely missed but greatly remembered. May he rest in peace.





# TOM LOCKYER

**It's good to be back here at the Kenny. It seems an eternity since we were last at home for the Spurs game and as a squad we're really looking forward to getting stuck into another big Premier League fixture here.**

A home match against Liverpool for a Super Sunday game on live on Sky is one all pros want to play in. Our achievement last season means we go into this game on merit, as equals, playing in the same division. This isn't a cup game. It's not a one-off that we can just look forward to and say 'we've got nothing to lose'.

No, this is a Premier League game with points at stake and that only adds fuel to the fire. So while it will be a great occasion – and one we must all – players, staff and fans – embrace, the most important thing is that we go into this game taking it seriously. Second half they stuck two in and that gave us a mountain to climb. Yet this group have not got to this stage by just rolling over, and we showed great character to get it back to 2-2. The dressing room was a good place to be after that, but we also knew we needed to be better – we won't always come back from two goals down this season.

So then last Sunday at Villa saw us on the receiving end of probably our toughest assignment so far this season. Unai Emery has got them playing some great football but we kept our heads above water even after falling behind. The gaffer didn't not want us to capitulate like a few teams have done so far this season against them. Even at 3-0 we kept going and we rallied right until the end which paid off with a late consolation.

That determination is one of our most defining characteristics and we will need that again today. We'll also need your support, which continues to be magnificent whether that be here or on the road.

# FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER  
GARY SWEET

**Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for what promises to be a Bonfire Night to remember.**

Liverpool, in the Premier League, live across the world, at our dearly beloved old stadium. 'Luton v Liverpool' just rolls nicely off the tongue, doesn't it? And we are honoured to be welcoming Sky Sports' Super Sunday team here too.

This is our third televised match so far this season on home soil and we have been heartened to receive so many compliments about the facilities, access and hospitality we have afforded Sky, TNT, the plethora of international broadcasters and journalists here so far.

No matter who you are, or who you represent (within reason!) Kenilworth Road will give you an open-armed, warm welcome. This is something we pride ourselves on and will never change. On this day 12 years ago, we welcomed Fleetwood Town to Kenilworth Road for a Conference fixture, and we would like to think our values have remained constant all the way through rise through the divisions.

Today, we wish to extend a welcome to everybody associated with Liverpool to Kenilworth Road, in particular those supporters who have travelled the 360-mile round trip having to endure the graveyard slot in this weekend's fixtures.

We have a long and colourful history with our friends from the red side of Stanley Park, especially during our top-flight days in the 1980s. Whether that be a Mike Newell hat-trick on the plastic pitch, a Mick Harford winner, playing three keepers in a single match at Anfield and still sharing the points in a six-goal thriller, a game called off due to snow (Hansen and Dalglish really didn't fancy it!) or, in more recent times, their memorable 5-3 win here in 2005 in a live FA Cup tie.

Naturally, today, we will enter battle as clear underdogs as Jurgen Klopp's side have clearly rediscovered their good form this season. However, being underdogs is what we're used to and being underdogs is what we love to be.

Indeed, the last time we competed against each other was the first day we came out of our last administration and marked a significant day in our history. Almost 16 years ago, it only seems like yesterday in some ways, marked the day that administrator Brendan Guilfoyle granted us the agreement to take control of the club we love so dearly, just hours before our FA Cup replay at Anfield in 2008. It still is a 'pinch me' moment, and today is a special landmark for everyone who has been involved since that day to see where we are and how we have progressed as a club on and off the pitch over that time.

Our Premier League experience of only ten games so far has certainly been an



eye-opening beginning to life in the boardroom at this level, but also surprising. To the possible surprise of many, I've been immensely impressed with the Premier League's executive team so far. With us, they've been welcoming, helpful and thoroughly professional. Many will also be heartened to hear that they also have a very clear caring consideration for the game, the pyramid and for those scraping a living below the top tier.

I mention this, given how the latest broadcast selections which expose some idiosyncratic misfortunes around the away fixture at Turf Moor, which we hope will be ironed out before travel arrangements need to be made.

We are clearly always on the side of the travelling supporter in such matters, however, having seen the complexities of the fixture pile-up in the calendar above the Premier League and the subsequent regulatory restrictions that then need to be maintained, I do have a certain sympathy with the challenge they face which makes it a good foundation to find solutions.

What I think the Premier League is battling with reasonably well is treading the balance between the protection of the traditional fixture schedule and the demand in commercial growth from the broadcasting community on the other hand. I am fully aware that the League has rejected certain demands from the media in favour of attending supporters.

Ultimately, it is the 20 Premier League clubs who generally have the final say, and it's fair to say that I believe more clubs should be taking a football-wide perspective rather than the narrow, single-club view many do.


This matter is very much a topic high on the agenda at this moment in time as the landscape in football is set to change. With the introduction of the incoming regulator for football, the 'new deal for football' (on the redistribution of wealth within the game) and the tender process for the Premier League's broadcast rights all afoot, it is such an interesting time to be involved.

My view is that, by and large, these impending changes to the games control and ➤

Back to matters on the pitch, last week's defeat at Aston Villa showed spirit that we have been accustomed to from this group of players in the face of what was arguably our toughest opponents of the season so far. Aston Villa were impressive, the level of their players' speed of thought a sight to behold and something we can aspire to. It is worth remembering they have only just returned to the Premier League after a spell in the Championship so they are certainly a club whose footballing ethos we can look up to.

I need to mention that your support has been amazing at each and every single game this season. It was not just recognised by us (on the other side of the pitch) at Villa Park, but praise was heaped upon us by officials of Aston Villa, who greatly appreciated the self-deprecating humour. Hatters fan for over 50 years, **John Wray** was a season ticket holder in the Kenilworth Road end, block D. John sadly passed away after a six-year battle



## TOWN MISS CHANCES IN DEFEAT TO TEN-MAN SPURS

The fact the Town came off the field disappointed not to have taken something off one of the 'big six' - was testament to another performance that warranted more as the Hatters endeavoured to keep their unbeaten visitors at bay in an intoxicating encounter inside a packed Kenilworth Road.

Spurs flew out of the blocks and could – and perhaps should – have been three goals ahead inside seven minutes. Thomas Kaminski was brilliant to save the second of those chances, denying Richarlison from close range.

Kaminski made another immense save, getting down low to turn Dejan Kulusevski's low effort around the post but with every passing minute the Town were growing in confidence and belief.

At 0-0 the game turned when Yves Bissouma was shown a second yellow card for a dive on the edge of the Hatters penalty area and the visitors were down to ten men.

After the break the Town should have led. Chiedozie Ogbene raced down the right and delivered a perfect cross on a plate for Elijah Adebayo. However, from inside the six-yard box the striker couldn't turn home.

Then, five minutes later, after a succession of Tottenham corners, Micky van de Ven turned home the loose ball to give Tottenham the lead.

The Town plugged away, aiming to make their extra man count and on 64 minutes another good chance fell their way when Alfie Doughty's wonderful left-wing cross was nodded over by an unmarked Jacob Brown.

As both sides made their changes, the game lacked fluency as the Hatters tried in vain to find a leveller against a Tottenham side that had packed their backline to see out the points.

# MARV: WE HAVE TO KEEP BELIEVING

**Marvelous Nakamba wants the Hatters to take the positives from the number of chances they created against Premier League leaders Tottenham into the upcoming games.**

Town lost 1-0 to Spurs at Kenilworth Road, but spurned several opportunities to either take the lead or equalise either side of Micky Van De Ven's solitary strike early in the second half.

The Zimbabwean midfielder said: "I think getting some chances against one of the top two teams right now, so I think we have to take out more of the positive ones and stick together as a group. It's only us who can help ourselves.

"We have to focus more, keep up the momentum and concentrate more, to stay in each of the games in the basic ways, and to keep on helping each other. As a team and a group, we need to work with each other."

Another full house roared the Hatters on, but that elusive first home win in the top-flight since 1992 still eludes Rob Edwards' side.

"I think the fans have been very, very helpful throughout, home and away, and they push us, said the 29-year-old. "Now it is up to us as a group to give them something to thank them.

"To be there for the whole 90, 95, 100 minutes, to be there for everyone, they are

doing that well. They are there for the club, there for the players and each and everyone. Now us, as players, we have to put that extra gear in as a team and everyone to push each other and help each other in a positive way."

And on playing in the Premier League, after helping the Hatters win promotion during his loan spell last season before signing permanently in the summer, the ex-Aston Villa man added: "Of course, it is a dream to be in the Premier League and be competing with the best week in, week out.

"This is what we want. This is what everyone dreams of in the club. This is what the club wants, so we just have to keep on competing, giving everything, and keep on believing."

## DETERMINED TOWN FIGHT BACK FROM TWO DOWN TO EARN POINT

With 14 minutes left, and with Nottingham Forest two goals to the good and well in command, the Hatters did what has epitomised this team – this club – over the last decade: battled, fought and eventually, through sheer determination, got their just rewards.

The game followed a familiar pattern to the Town's life in the top-flight: they were always in it. Somehow, you felt there would always be a chance – and so it would ultimately prove.

In the first half Steve Cooper's side should have gone in ahead at half-time. A number of glorious chances went begging for the Tricky Trees. Forest missed a sitter to lead with the last kick of the first 45 – Ibrahim Sangare driving a shot wide of the goal when it seemed harder to miss.

The Town goal had lived a charmed life in the first half but their luck would run out just three minutes after the restart when Chris Wood struck, taking advantage of some sticky defending to finish well beyond an exposed Thomas Kaminski.

Forest then doubled their lead through that man Wood, who craned every neck muscle to guide a fine header inside Kaminski's far post.

At that point, with 15 minutes left, Forest were cruising. Cooper made three changes of his own. Willy Boly, Nicolas Dominguez and the impressive Sangare made way with 12 minutes remaining.

And then the comeback began. With seven minutes left Chiedozie Ogbene started the recovery mission, lashing home from six yards after the Forest defence had made a hash of clearing Andros Townsend's free-kick.

Then, in stoppage time the Town were level. Tom Lockyer's laser-like raking pass was on the money. Elijah Adebayo's eyes lit up. Holding off two Forest defenders and chesting the ball down into his path there was only one outcome this week. His finish, magic, you know.

At 2-2 the game wasn't done. Wood had Hatters hearts in mouths when finishing superbly across Kaminski but the hat-trick would not count and the offside flag was a welcome relief to those of a Luton persuasion.

Our number 11 believes that the standards are set in training and the never give up attitude is throughout the whole club following the dramatic Premier League comeback at the City Ground.

"That sums up football," said Adebayo. "One week it doesn't go for you and the next week it does. It changes very fast, and the emotions are a great feeling for myself and the team.

"Rob wasn't particularly happy with the way the game had gone, but we've got game changers on the bench and everyone needs to try to impact the game.

"It's a squad game, we've all got to try to help each other out and the emotions were great when we were celebrating together, that's the team.

"The fans were singing even when we were two-nil down, this season we know it's going to be tough, but we will always have that.

mentality every day so the character in the group is good, you know straight away that this group will fight until the end.

"Things happen, it's not necessarily used as fuel, it's just football. Sometimes you don't have a particularly good week and you just have to go back to basics in the next week.

"I've told myself a lot of things in the last week and it's just about being the player that I want to be."

Fellow substitute Ross Barkley added: "In the first half I didn't think we were at our best.

"We needed to put the pressure higher up the pitch and make things happen.

"Forest are a good side who were in the Premier League last year and been through the experience of it, but we showed character, we kept pushing until the end and credit to the lads on the bench because they came on and made a difference.

"We need that otherwise the Premier League will be difficult league to play in, and we showed that we can do what the manager asked of us.

"Over the last month or so I've seen how important this club is through the fans, the staff, the players that have experienced the club for a long time, the difficulties of coming from the Conference all the way up."



Staying in the game has been a forte of the Town so far this term but Villa made life tougher shortly after the hour when skipper Tom Lockyer turned home Diaby's cut-back and all of a sudden even being in the game was proving difficult.



# OSHO ON VILLA PARK RETURN



Anfield, Liverpool on 11th September 1982 will live long in the memory for the couple of thousand Luton Town supporters lucky enough to be present.

On the face of it, a 3-3 draw at the home of the current champions would be seen as a remarkable achievement for a newly promoted side but we came away slightly disappointed at seeing two points lost.

Following promotion to Division One (now Premier League) in glorious style at the end of 1981/82 the Town had started off the new season with a fighting 2-2 draw at FA Cup holders Tottenham after being complete-

ly outplayed in the first 15 minutes, and followed it up with a 2-0 home defeat at the hands of West Ham who showed Division One know how and lethal finishing as well as being far sharper in the box.

Manager David Pleat obviously had words with his forwards, especially big money signing from Charlton Paul Walsh, with the talking to having an effect as, in the next game, Notts County were beaten 5-3 at Kenilworth Road with Walsh scoring a hat-trick.

It was now the turn of the defence to have problems as Notts County could quite easily have scored five themselves in a crazy game and when Aston Villa put four in our

net at Villa Park the following Tuesday, alarm bells rang.

After the Villa mauling a trip to Anfield was not regarded as a suitable 'comeback' game but we were all pleasantly surprised when Walsh skinned Mark Lawrenson after 30 minutes play, squared the ball to Brian Stein who hit a first time shot into the top corner of the net.

Graeme Souness smacked home a 20-yard volley five minutes later before Luton goalkeeper Jake Findlay went off on a stretcher after tearing a chest muscle in the days of only one substitute.

Instead of normal deputy goalkeeper Mal Donaghy taking over it was decided that full back Kirk Stephens was the man for the job and he was powerless to prevent Ian Rush putting the Reds ahead at the interval.

Stephens certainly looked unconventional but the chants of 'Shakin Stephens' (for the benefit of younger supporters he was a popular singer of the time) from the Kop did seem unfair as he was obviously enjoying himself immensely. Common sense prevailed, however, as Donaghy came out for the second half wearing the green jersey.

With the Hatters 2-1 down at the home of the League champions and with an outfield player in goal, no one would have offered us a chance but we stunned Anfield when, in the space of ten minutes, David Moss and Brian Stein put us in the lead.

Both goals were scored on the break as Liverpool attacked relentlessly but with Donaghy having only one save to make because of the superb cover offered by his defence a Luton win became increasingly likely.

It was a disappointment therefore when Craig Johnston banged in a leveller, especially as he had just come on as substitute for an ineffective Kenny Dalglish and instantly became the only Liverpool forward with any real idea.

As we drove away from Anfield it was soon learnt that our battling point had ended up pushing us three places down the table to just above the relegation zone. Life just wasn't fair!

An odd spot of the game was that a team had scored against three different goalkeepers and we wondered whether this was ever likely to happen again. Two weeks later we scored against three different Stoke goalkeepers in an amazing 4-4 draw at the Victoria Ground. But that is a story for another day.



## A HATTER AND A RED

Plumstead born Paul Walsh joined Charlton from school and was only 17 when he became the youngest player to net a hat-trick for the Addicks in a senior game.

Hard-up Charlton were forced to accept a £250,000 bid, plus Steve White, from top-flight new boys Luton in 1982 and the seriously talented forward soon became a terrace hero at Kenilworth Road with his twisting runs, close control and goalscoring ability.

Sadly, a bid of £700,000 from Liverpool was accepted for the, by now, England international in 1984 and he went on to grace Anfield for almost four years during which time he picked up a League championship medal. Moving on to Tottenham where he won an FA Cup winners medal, he then signed twice for Portsmouth with a spell at Manchester City sandwiched in between.

Paul's playing career ended with a knee injury in 1996 and he is now a pundit.



## GREAT GAMES

You can read about a number of classic games between the Town and Liverpool inside this programme – after all our overall record against the Reds isn't the greatest so we have to shout about the wins – so here's another.

Back in October 1986 the Reds

visited Kenilworth Road and it was Liverpool-born Mike Newell that was the toast of the town after his brilliant hat-trick earned the Hatters a 4-1 top-flight win at the Kenny. Liverpool are second-best in all departments, despite a consolation goal from the spot from Jan Molby.




**One of the benefits of winning the championship of League One in 2004/05 was being exempted until the third round of the FA Cup the following season.**

The Town had not met top flight opposition in the competition since Southampton in 1995 so we could hardly believe it when we were paired at home with Liverpool, the Champions of Europe – a game that soon caught the imagination of the football world.

Leading up to the game much was made of Town manager Mike Newell being in the books of Liverpool as a schoolboy and being a self-confessed Reds fan even though he had scored a hat-trick against them for the Hatters in a famous 4-1 win in 1986.

The match was soon picked for live TV coverage and with the kick-off being put back to 5.30pm and with miles of cable on the Kenilworth Road concourse the occasion had a surreal air about it – something we were not used to.

Mindful of putting out a weakened team and being turned over by Championship side Burnley the previous year, Reds manager Rafa Benitez picked his strongest side and

in a brilliant atmosphere the contest started as it meant to go on with both sides attacking at will.

Steven Gerrard opened the scoring with a spectacular 20 yard effort on 16 minutes but the Town roared back with goals from Steve Howard and Steve Robinson before the interval and it could have been more as an effort from Markus Heikkinen was spectacularly headed off the line by Reds defender Steve Finnan.

On 48 minutes Liverpool were awarded a penalty when Gerrard went over theatrically in the area but Djibril Cisse saw his spot kick-saved by Marlon Beresford. Five minutes later in this breathless contest the Town had a penalty of their own when Reds goalkeeper Scott Carson upended Rowan Vine in the box. Skipper Kevin Nicholls made no mistake and drilled the Hatters into an unbelievable 3-1 lead.

Perhaps the Town should have sat back on their lead but the team continued to attack ("too honest" said Newell afterwards) and were eventually undone by two goals from sub Florent Sinama-Pongolle and a pair from Xabi Alonso which included a 60-yard effort in the closing seconds with all 11 Luton players at the other end of the field chasing the game.

Liverpool had certainly been in a game and there was no shame in defeat.



## REMEMBER, REMEMBER, THE 5TH NOVEMBER



### MEMORABLE MATCH!

**WOLVES 2-3 TOWN  
5TH NOVEMBER 1994**

The Town began the 1994/95 campaign in fine form away from Kenilworth Road, racking up a succession of excellent performances on the road.

Our Bonfire Night display on this day in 1994 added to a fine sequence under manager David Pleat coming at Molineux.

David Preece, Dwight Marshall and Kerry Dixon put the Hatters well in command, racing into a three-goal lead to combat Wolves' long-ball game.

Wolves pulled two goals back against the run of the play, aided by the unfortunate Marvin Johnson, but despite the fine result – which kept the Hatters on the fringes of the play-off places in Division One (now Championship), press talk of Pleat's return to Tottenham took the gloss off another fine awayday.

## THE RECORD

It's 22 games played on Bonfire Night down the years, with the Town winning ten, losing 11 and drawing just once.

That one draw came back in 1977 when the Hatters were held at home to Hull City in a 1-1 draw in Division Two (now Championship).

Our first game on 5th November came in 1898 - a 1-0 home defeat to Burslem Port Vale and our most recent a 1-0 win over Blackpool at Bloomfield Road last season.

## TOP-FLIGHT TOWN

Today will be the fourth time the Hatters have played in the top-flight on this day and we will be aiming to make it three wins from those four following the successes previous Town sides have enjoyed.

The first such victory came in 1955 when a Bob Morton-inspired Town saw off Wolves 5-1 at Kenilworth Road before a crowd of 27,911 here.

It wasn't until 1983 that we were in action in the top division on this day and it was another afternoon that belonged to the Town as a Paul Elliott winner was enough to seal a 1-0 victory at Loftus Road against Queens Park Rangers.

However 365 days later the Hatters were not so lucky as despite a Danny Wilson goal we went down 3-1 at Millwall at the (old) Den.

## BEST OF THE REST

In 1949 the Town recorded an emphatic 5-2 win over Blackburn in Division Two (now Championship) with George Stobart scoring four goals – the only Town player to hit a hat-trick on this day.

Our first win on 5th November came in 1906 with a 3-2 win here at Kenilworth Road against New Brompton in the United League.

Other notable wins include a 3-2 win at Tranmere in 1938 and a 3-2 triumph at Ipswich in 1960.

Of course, our rich and varied history has seen us play at all levels of the pyramid. Our only matches on this day in the Conference (now National League) saw us lose 2-1 at home to Fleetwood in a game best remembered by the fine performance of Jamie Vardy and a certain Steve McNulty.

# CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS YOU'LL NEVER SING THAT!

**LEFT-BACK SCOTT GRIFFITHS  
SAYS HE HAD A LOVE-HATE  
RELATIONSHIP WITH MANAGER  
JOHN STILL BUT REVEALS  
THERE WAS NO MAN BETTER  
SUITED TO HELPING THE  
HATTERS RETURN TO THE  
PREMIER LEAGUE.**

It's always the left backs that are unsung heroes. And Scott Griffiths was no different. An ever-present in the Town team that ten years ago won the Conference, the defender went about his business at full-back quietly and confidently. He even scored once: in the 6-0 win over Kidderminster Harriers.



John Still missed that goal. He was in bed with the sniffles. But as Scott says, it was the manager's influence off the field that really helped change the Hatters' fortunes.

"He didn't mess about. We played in the right areas. John puts something in place to build a winning squad which takes time. That's something you can't do these days," says Griffiths, now 37.

"It surprises me how Premier League clubs work, considering managers come and go so quickly; nobody has time to settle and build a rapport.

"But under John we did. It sounds kind of arrogant but I got the feeling we would win the league. The players we had, the players we brought in.

"Pre-season said it all. He ran us into the ground. If you can't keep up in pre-season you had no chance, especially in the heat of the Portuguese sun. When the season started we then used to run teams into the ground. We played football when we could but after 80-85 minutes nobody was keeping up with us."

Griffiths' career at Kenilworth Road came after having already won promotion with

Still at Dagenham & Redbridge. So when the manager came calling towards the end of the 2012/13 season, there was only one answer.

"John brought me through to one club, sold me to another then brought me back. I'm paraphrasing but he spoke to me and said, 'do you fancy winning another league and I was like "yes"'. But no, I knew what was going to happen: With John's method I knew it wouldn't be long before this club were top of the table.

"I know it's not very modest but I saw what could happen, even on a poor budget like it was at Dagenham, with the right group of players who come together, worked hard for each other. John knew how to create a close knit team of players. One of his sayings was 'my 11 best not my best 11' I knew that special players were coming in and that Luton already had a few already, so I knew it was a way to go for success.

"He doesn't necessary go out to get the best players. Don't get me wrong, he attracted some very good players. But I saw him recruit players that would die for you, run through bricks walls for you. He'd mould them from a young age. He also took advantage of me as my two-figure weekly ➤

wage showed! When I was 18 at Dagenham I needed to supplement my wage by delivering pizzas! But John wanted hungry players with no egos. You wanted to play for someone like that."

With Griffiths quietly and effectively going about his business the Town were soon where he envisaged before a ball had been kicked that season.

Once the Hatters had seen off the challenge of Cambridge – including a memorable 1-1 draw thanks to a last-minute equaliser by Mark Cullen – the title and a long-awaited return to the Football League, after years of frustration on and off the pitch, became reality.

Griffiths was – and still is – not that big a football fan. It wasn't until his former kit sponsor Mick Donohue explained to him the ups and downs of the Hatters' recent history.

"As someone who plays no attention to football at all – I barely followed the team I was playing for at the time – I didn't know at the time the Luton Town story," he says.

"But I did my research; the 30-point deduction and the years of hurt and how a lot of it was unjustified. There was a lot of passion. Mick, my sponsor, talked me through what had happened and how desperate they were to get back to the League.

"The end of the season was incredible. I was on the pitch with my wife and to see so much joy from the fan and John Still lifting the trophy...There were no words. No matter how many times you win promotion it's still amazing."

Griffiths was in the away end at Aston Park last week, watching the Hatters for the first time since winning promotion to the Premier League.

Clearly itching to return to the pitch himself – "the nearest I get to football these days is playing five-a-side with my bad knees on a Sunday night," he says – he watched on proudly despite the result.

He also afforded a cheeky, proud smile when those Hatters fans around him broke into a chant of "Conference champions, you'll never sing that" to the Villa fans.

"Kenilworth Road might not say Premier League but the atmosphere and the fans and the attitude of the club does. It doesn't say relegation battle either – they deserve to be there," says Griffiths on the club's current position.

"I wanted to finish my career at Luton and would have happily stayed there. I have such good memories of good people."

Griffiths now lives a stone's throw from Forest Green's New Lawn Ground, is a qualified plasterer and is training for the Cotswolds Way Challenge, a 100k race, next June.

"I'm self-employed now. I've tried a few different things. I'm a qualified plasterer, have my own company S&J Maintenance. It's going well."

"The Cotswolds challenge is the only keeping me fit to be honest! I've always hate the gym but it keeps me fit – as well as my son, he's a little whirlwind."

## **Part Five - E is for Eastbourne Borough and Ebbsfleet.**

We met Eastbourne Borough during our first two Conference years and remained unbeaten over the four games played. A comfortable 4-1 home win over Christmas 2009 with Kevin Gallen netting two of the goals was followed by a narrow 1-0 victory at a snowy Eastbourne the following February with Asa Hall on target.

I can recall driving past the new Brighton Amex on the way to Eastbourne wondering whether we would ever play at such venues again!

In the following campaign, two goals from Danny Crow secured an eventually comfortable 4-2 win at Eastbourne which was followed up with a 3-0 home win as the campaign was drawing to a close and the dreaded play-offs loomed again.

We met Ebbsfleet United for three of our five seasons in non-League starting in 2009/10. In the first

clash that campaign, former Hatter Peter Holmes inspired Fleet to a shock 3-2 win at Kenilworth Road. Two months later, in the return, the Town were a goal down at the interval courtesy of a comedy own goal from giant centre-half Janos Kovacs.

Things got much better in the second period though as the Hatters netted six times without reply to secure a vital win and put more pressure on the top two, Oxford and Stevenage. A hat-trick from Claude Gnakpa made it an afternoon to remember at our first ever visit to that part of Kent – if you felt that Kenilworth Road was antiquated then the brilliant ‘old school’ Stonebridge Road was up another notch.

The Town were two goals up through Amari Morgan-Smith and James Dance with 15 minutes left to play at Ebbsfleet in October 2011 but contrived to concede twice late on. No mistake was made in the end of season home game though as two goals from Stuart Fleetwood secured a comfortable 3-0 victory as we homed in on the play-offs again.

Our final pair of games took place in 2012/13. Fleetwood was on target with another two goals in an early season game at Stonebridge Road which was won 3-1 but the final home game of the campaign was bittersweet. Ebbsfleet were already relegated while we were destined to finish outside the play-off places for the first time. Two goals from Alex Wall secured the three points in a 2-0 win in an underwhelming performance.



## ACADEMY UPDATE WITH HEAD OF EDUCATION KOBIE DEE

### **'Football is played with your head and your feet are just your tools'**

Good afternoon, let me introduce myself. I'm Kobia Dee the Head of Education at the Luton Town football academy, who has a passion for education as well as football. I've been a teacher for over 20 years who has worked with several elite athletes at all levels of academia. I've recently qualified as a NASENDCO which specialises in communication, interaction, along with social,

emotional and mental health with young people. I would like to thank the club who helped support me to gain this qualification at Masters level.

As you will see this afternoon, professional footballers are often celebrated for their physical prowess, dedication and hard work on the pitch. However, many people underestimate the importance of education in the lives of these players.

In reality, education is crucial for professional footballers, as it serves as a foundation for their success and long-term well-being. At Luton Town Football Club we believe one of the most compelling reasons for footballers to pursue education is career longevity. A professional career can be unpredictable, with injuries and unexpected setbacks. In such situations, having education is therefore essential, enjoyable and develops several other skills.

England and Real Madrid star Jude Bellingham who completed the same education programme as our scholars said: "Education can give you a lot of qualities that you can take into a professional environment. I've learned from the first-team games that I played (when a scholar at Birmingham City) that you must be switched on at all times and education develops my concentration."

#### **So what education does a scholar do and what does their week look like?**

Every week a scholar will complete a minimum of ten hours of education on top of their training and match schedule. This consists of 1 full day per week and 2 afternoon sessions. Players can choose to study GCSE, BTEC, A Levels or other Vocational qualifications depending on their interests and academic ability.

Since the promotion to the Premier League the games programme has excelled with lots of important midweek cup games that clash with education times. This means working closely alongside Paul Benson and Alex Lawless to ensure ALL education is completed. They are both huge believers

that education is extremely important and can build character and improves their ability. The culture we have at the club between all staff and players helps with relationships and builds both trust and understanding to get the best out of everyone.

Recently we have had scholars return from international duty in Italy and Spain, whilst away they were still able to complete their education. This can be quite challenging due to time differences and busy schedules but I'm able to check in with them regularly with a blend of online learning and coursework.

As you may be aware we currently have Joe Johnson away on England duty at the FIFA U17 World Cup in Indonesia. He will be away for over a month but Joe is fully aware of his educational commitments and when to check in. The FA are also completely supportive with this and ensure they place education in their daily timetable.

We wish Joe the best of luck out at the World Cup and know he'll be watching with the millions around the world. So let's show them what an atmosphere Kenilworth Road can be!

## THE NEXT GENERATION SPEAKS

**It takes a brave player to stand-out from the team, put their foot on the ball and make something happen – especially when the going gets tough.**

But that's something Jack Lorentzen-Jones loves to do in the central midfield battle for the Town Under-18s.

No player in Alex Lawless' side has scored more than Lorentzen-Jones, who has now been at the club for ten years – during which time the Hatters have risen from the depths of the Conference to playing in the Premier League.

But it was after a discussion with a man who helped the Hatters win the National League that helped Lorentzen-Jones hit the goalscoring form he craves from that attacking midfield position.

"In pre-season I wasn't getting much joy – I didn't get a goal or assist and that's something I model my game on," explains Jack. "I had a chat with Paul Benson about how best to improve that and now I have scored six goals and set-up two more in seven games so I've been happy."

"By the end of December I want to have scored ten goals. It's a challenge but I will back myself to do it."

Lorentzen-Jones takes such responsibility in his stride. A player who used to pretend to

be Eden Hazard in the playground at school – "I loved the way he played with such confidence, he was never afraid".

"You've got to believe in yourself," he says. "Even the top players when they are on top of their game will make mistakes. Those who do it best are those that keep going and aren't afraid to do that."

The midfielder, who was born in Northampton, has – like many in the academy – seen it all since joining the club ten years ago.

"I originally started playing for my school and they had an induction, a kind of 'come and play football' thing. I was scouted for the Centre of Excellence, then played in one game for the pre-academy, scored a few goals, and then joined the academy."

"I've played in a range of positions; right-back, as a ten, as a striker but now I'm an eight and it's my favourite position."

But what's the best bit about playing for the Town?

"I've been here since I was an under-8 and I'm a massive Luton fan, Luton through and through so it's massive for me," he says, smiling.

"We're a Premier League club now, which means we get more recognition and now it's up to us, and to me, to keep working, keep pushing on and working towards earning myself a professional contract."



## WHERE?

The Hatters next port of call in the Premier League is to one, if not *the*, most famous stadium in the world. With a capacity of 74,310, the 'Theatre of Dreams' is the largest domestic stadium in the Premier League. Opening in 1910, its largest attendance actually came back in 1939 for an FA Cup semi-final involving Wolves and Grimsby when 76,962 turned up. Old Trafford has undergone significant redevelopment in the early 1990s, with its most recent expansion completed in 2006. Hatters fans will be held in the corner of the ground, taking up part of the East and Sir Bobby Charlton Stands.

## HOW TO GET THERE

Coming from the Luton, take the M1, M6, leave the M6 at Junction 19 and follow the A556 towards Altrincham. At the junction with the M56 take the A56 towards Altrincham. Keep on the A56 for six miles and then you will come to see Sir Matt Busby Way on your left. The ground is half a mile down this road on your left, although on matchdays this road may well be closed to traffic. The postcode is M16 0RA. The Bobbers Travel Club will, of course, be heading to Old Trafford. Leaving Luton at 9am, their fares are £35 adults and £32 concessions. Book your spot by calling 01234 856542.

## OUR RECORD THERE

Okay, so here comes the awkward part. Next Saturday will be our 17th visit to Old Trafford and the Town squad will be aiming to make history by becoming the first to take anything from a trip to the famous ground. The Town have lost on all of

their previous 16 visits, scoring just eight times and conceding 47. The closest the Hatters have come to a result was a 1-0 defeat in October 1986, while our last visit – in September 1991 – saw United run out 5-0 winners. The last Town player to score at Old Trafford was David Preece in a 4-1 defeat in March 1991. For the record, the Hatters have won away at Manchester United, when the club were known as Newton Heath back in September 1897.

## THE UNITED OF TODAY

United are the most decorated club in the modern era of the Premier League with 13 titles since the division was founded in 1992, but their performances in recent seasons have left their fans yearning for a return to former glories. Their last title came back in 2012/13 and last season they finished a distant third behind their cross-city rivals. United currently sit in eighth place in the table, winning five and losing five of their first ten matches this season under boss Erik ten Haag.

## WATCH OUT FOR

Marcus Rashford. Undoubtedly one of United's biggest talents, Rashford came through the academy ranks at Old Trafford and only turned 26 earlier this week. The forward made a goalscoring start to his career on his first team debut in a Europa League game against Midtjylland in February 2016, becoming United's youngest ever goalscorer in European competition at the time. Last season the frontman hit 30 goals in all competitions in 56 games in which he helped United win the Carabao Cup.



## ROUND-UP

**Ange Postecoglou's Tottenham remain out in front in the Premier League after maintaining their unbeaten record with a victory over Crystal Palace in the first game of matchday ten.**

Son-Heung-min's goal midway through the second half put Spurs in command and despite a late consolation from Jordan Ayew from the Eagles, the London side held on to secure another three points in their quest for a first league title since 1961.

The chasing pack kept up their pursuit by all winning. Arsenal crushed Sheffield United 5-0 at Emirates Stadium with Eddie Nketiah grabbing a hat-trick. Fabio Vieira and Takehiro Tomiyasu were also on target to keep the Gunners on the heels of their North London rivals.

Reigning champions Manchester City are level on points with Arsenal and two points off the top after winning the Manchester derby 3-0 at Old Trafford with Erling Haaland scoring twice.

Our visitors this afternoon are just three points off the summit after Jurgen Klopp's side saw off Nottingham Forest 3-0 at Anfield. Diogo Jota, Darwin Nunez and Mohamed Salah were on target.



At the other end of the table the biggest winners of the weekend were Bournemouth, who registered their first win of the season to leap outside of the relegation zone. Philip Billing's stunning second-half strike helped the Cherries overcome fellow strugglers Burnley. The Clarets had led thanks to Charlie Taylor's goal only for Antoine Semenyo to level before the break.

Everton also secured a vital three points to move away from the bottom three, winning 1-0 at West Ham. A goal from striker Dominic Calvert-Lewin six minutes into the second half was the difference to pull Sean Dyche's side five points clear of the dropzone.

Elsewhere, Brentford won for the third straight season at Stamford Bridge against Chelsea to leapfrog their London rivals in the standings. Wolves held Newcastle to a 2-2 draw and Fulham took a point on their trip to Brighton.

**So we're ten games into the Premier League season and to be fair, it's gone pretty much as most Town fans would have expected so far.**

Luton find themselves third from bottom, which is probably a few places higher than anyone outside of Kenilworth Road would have anticipated back in August, as they find themselves leading the fight to stay up from the trio of promoted clubs.

After what was a fairly tough introduction to life as a top-flight club, with defeats against Brighton and Chelsea, the Hatters have tightened up immeasurably since, as yes they have lost five from the eight, but it has been by just the one goal in four of them.

Goal difference could prove such a crucial factor regarding who ends up keeping their heads above the dotted line as well, which made World Cup winner Emiliano Martinez's unfortunate late deflection into his own net even more important on Sunday.

Unai Emery's side had already put six past Brighton and four into the West Ham net, so the fact Luton kept it at three was something of a morale victory, as the comical ending means their goal difference is now minus 11.

It's already a hefty 11 better than bottom side Sheffield United, six than Burnley, who were meant to be the top ranked side of those coming up, and importantly two ahead of fourth bottom AFC Bournemouth.

That has been done with an ever-changing

back-line as well, with only keeper Thomas Kaminski the one regular strand, as injuries have robbed boss Rob Edwards of all of his centre halves at some stage, which makes the return of Gabe Osho all that more important.

If the play-off hero had a tough baptism to top flight football last weekend, it could be even harder this afternoon as Luton go up against a Liverpool team who have won 11 from 14 first team fixtures this term, their only defeat coming in that controversial 2-1 reverse at Spurs.

They also possess one of the best ever players seen at this level, a certain Mo Salah, who is already up to double figures in front of goal.

Luton have had some cracking fixtures against the Reds over the years, the 5-3 FA Cup defeat in 2006, Iain Dowie's double in a 3-1 victory in 1991, plus Mike Newell's hat-trick as the Hatters triumphed 4-1 some 37 years ago.

If they can get something from Jurgen Klopp's title-chasers today, such is the difference between the sides nowadays, it would surely surpass the lot.

If not, then once more the main thing will be to show that fighting spirit and determination to never go under that is serving them so well so far – then move on and focus on a first ever win at Old Trafford next weekend instead.
