

Today we embark on the start of a busy and hugely important period of the season – and we can't wait.

It's good to be back here at the Kenny after three weeks away since the Liverpool game. We came off the pitch that evening with mixed emotions after holding Jurgen Klopp's side to a 1-1 draw.

I'm not one for saying 'we'd have taken a point before the game'. Football doesn't work like that. When we were in a winning position there is no way you want anything less. However, what I will say is that I thought we were fantastic throughout the game, limiting a top-class team to few clear-cut opportunities.

Our goal was magnificent. It showcased many of qualities: defending a set-piece before springing on the counter-attack. We were all delighted with Tahith with the finish and the noise when the ball crossed the line was unbelievable.

Naturally we were all deflated when they equalised. It doesn't matter how often you experience it, conceding so late always, always hurts. Especially in these circumstances when we were so close to holding on for what would have been an important win.

It was, however, another valuable lesson of the ruthlessness of the Premier League. The same could be said of our last outing against Manchester

United at Old Trafford. Yeah, of course it's great to walk out and play at such an iconic venue for this club but it means nothing when you come off the pitch with nothing.

The frustrating part was knowing we had given them a game and only lost to a goal scored that came from a corner-kick. It's a real kick in the teeth when all the effort and concentration goes out of the window in one moment. We played well. We lost 1-0 at Manchester United. The positives are there but we are in a position that requires points. Playing well and losing still doesn't earn you any points.

Our performances, especially here at home, have certainly warranted more points than we have to currently show and that's a major frustration. Therefore it goes without saying that today we need a maximum return.

Crystal Palace will represent a tough obstacle. With an experienced manager and a squad packed with experience and some gifted young players, we know it is not going to be easy. I know you're probably bored of us saying that, but from what we've experienced so far the Premier League takes no prisoners.

We'll do all we can to ensure you go home happy come 5pm today and your relentless support from the stands can certainly help us achieve our goal.

The atmosphere for the Liverpool game was incredible. We heard you non-stop at Old Trafford. Your backing deserves to be rewarded with a big three points this afternoon but whatever happens, get behind us. 





FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN
DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone and a very warm welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Crystal Palace. As a bit of a traditionalist it's nice to have a kick-off on Saturday at 3pm.

We haven't faced Palace in the 2020 years, the last time being in March 2007 towards the end of our brief spell in the Championship when we went down 2-1 at Selhurst Park with two goals from Clinton Morrison and an own goal from Mark Hudson. We have played each other 57 times and have won 18, drawn 16 and lost 23.

The most memorable game for me was back in August 2005, our first game after promotion to the Championship when against all expectations we won 2-1 at Selhurst Park with goals from Steve Howard and Ahmet Brkovic. Andrew Johnson (remember him?) scored for them.

This afternoon we look forward to this game in the top-flight. This stop-start nature of this season has been frustrating to me and we now go into a manically intensive run up to Christmas. Seriously though, we feel privileged to be where we are pitting our wits against some of the top teams in the world and I suppose we have to expect to make some sacrifices.

We are excited about this afternoon's contest and look forward to hosting Steve Parish and his fellow directors, and Roy Hodgson and his talented squad. I'm sure it will be another fascinating tactical battle and let's hope we can emulate our teams of the recent past by getting a positive result at home.

There is little doubt that we are beginning to find our feet in this league having been in every one of the last four games against former Champions League winners with a chance, in every case, of a better result.

This week Gary and I took part in a Shareholders' Meeting of the Premier League. There was a full agenda covering a wide range of topics, the most newsworthy of which was the "New Deal for Football" and the topic of the incoming Regulator for Football having been recognised in the recent King's speech. I'm sure you're aware both are designed to help clubs become more sustainable, implement financial controls to protect a more level-playing field and make it more difficult for rogue ownership and poor management putting clubs at risk of going out of business often carrying the devastating effect on the communities they serve.



Clearly the details of the discussions are confidential and are continuing, but it's clear that the majority want a deal done. It is highly complicated and as you can imagine the diversity of opinion is extreme, largely because the clubs themselves are so different in their ownership model and financial muscle.

We have found that the debate is of high quality and the management of the meeting very professional, with all clubs being encouraged to have their say in a pleasingly democratic manner. As we are the only club with recent experience of the top five divisions, and with Gary in particular having made important connections in the EFL, his experience can be a valuable part of the discussions.

We feel confident that nobody will be completely happy with the eventual outcome, but it would seem wrong otherwise. There isn't anyone here who enjoys giving money away, but it is vital for the health of the pyramid. Having said that it is important that the deal achieves the result it is set up for, so it makes a bad situation better and the

funds are used in the appropriate manner with tighter controls to prevent clubs from deviating from the rules. When you are dealing with 20 givers and hundreds of takers, it's impossible to please everyone and in this instance probably anyone, but it is so important for the future of our game that we get the best deal we can for everyone concerned.


The deal has momentum and will attract a great deal of interest over the coming months. There are good people with the best intentions working to achieve the desired result, and we feel confident of a positive outcome for the long-term benefit of our "beautiful game".

On a completely different note, and as it really is a matter of life and death, a more important one. A couple of weeks back I was invited to The Brache to meet Roseann Taylor, the mother of 18-year-old Azaan Kaleem, or AJ, who was stabbed to death in Luton in 2018, and members of the Beds Violence and Exploitation Unit (VERU) who are launching a new knife crime campaign called 'Just Drop It'. ➤

A number of our academy players sat in to listen to Roseann tell the story of how and why her son died. It was very moving. The boys then joined in a discussion asking questions and offering their take on it on camera as BBC Look East were covering the event.

Roseann now works with the VERU Youth intervention specialist team and said that having the backing and support of a Premier League club meant the campaign takes on a different dimension.

The official launch of the campaign was at Youthscape in Luton and there were contributions from the Crime Commissioner, the Police and Emergency medical experts highlighting the problem.

In the five years up to 2021, 1,800 people between the ages of ten and 24 have been treated in A&E in Bedfordshire alone for injuries resulting from assault.

This is not a new problem, but is a worsening one. It's 17 years since the youth player at QPR, Kiyan Prince, died from stab wounds. Perhaps what saddens me most is that there is so little known generally about

the problem. Awareness of it seems very generational and hopefully this campaign will draw more attention to it.

It was a shock to me to hear of the dangers and difficulties young people suffer on an almost daily basis and it seems important to get across how these crimes do not just affect the victims, but also the perpetrators and the families, friends and local community of both sides.

We are backing this campaign and hope that you will all support in whatever way you can.

Finally, and on a more cheery note, Lisa McEvoy, our fan engagement officer, is trekking in Madagascar for NOAH, our charity of the year. She has so far raised over £5,000. Well done her and good luck for the rest of her journey.

HATTERS SUPPORT NEW ANTI-KNIFE CRIME CAMPAIGN

The Club have become the latest supporters of a major new anti-knife crime campaign for Bedfordshire.

First team players Andros Townsend, Jacob Brown and Alfie Doughty have shown their support with campaign merchandise in support of Just Drop It, a campaign led by the Bedfordshire Violence and Exploitation Reduction Unit (VERU).

Members of the Town under-18s also received a talk from Roseann Taylor, whose story is the centrepiece of the campaign. The main campaign video tells the story of Azaan 'AJ' Kaleem, who was stabbed to death in Luton in 2018. His mum Roseann now works for the VERU's Youth Intervention Specialist team.

Roseann was on hand to meet the players and answer questions from the academy players. Hatters Chairman David Wilkinson said: "We are proud to support the VERU Just Drop It initiative to increase awareness of the widespread and unseen results of knife crime.

"It is not just the victims, but their family, friends, and local community along with everyone associated with the protagonists, who are affected by these terrible events.

"It seems that this is largely a generational issue, and we believe this initiative can help to draw the attention of the wider public to the problem and highlight that there are no winners. It is so sad to see the damage done to the lives of all those involved so all attempts to educate, support and protect should be encouraged."



HATTERS DENIED VICTORY BY LATE LIVERPOOL LEVELLER

We've said all along the power of nights under the lights at Kenilworth Road can be special. Liverpool teams of old have suffered and struggled here. And they did again as a Town team battled, fought and timed their moments in offensive with power and purpose.

Like all games this season, the Town were always in it and that was in part down to a man-of-the-match performance from goalkeeper Thomas Kaminski.

The Town's number produced a string of fine saves to deny the visitors, with Darwin Nunez frustrated early on.

Yet the Hatters were well in the game in a breathless encounter that saw both sides attack at pace on the counter. If it wasn't Chiedozie Ogbene at one end it was the threat of Mohamed Salah at the other. The Egyptian firing over when well-placed on 21 minutes.

Kaminski did brilliantly to keep the score blank with a strong hand to deny Diogo Jota's firm strike but Town tails were certainly up at the break after Ross Barkley rifled just over.

In the second period, as the Town chased the lead, Ogbene bulldozed his way to goal, his square pass to Carlton Morris eventually ushered behind by a relieved Liverpool defence.

With 20 minutes left it should be 1-0. Nunez somehow, unbelievably, blazing over with the goal gaping following Salah's knockdown.

With ten minutes left pandemonium. Utter jubilation. Kenilworth Road was shaking.

Barkley's quick thinking sent Kaboré galloping away down the right. His cross from the right was on the money and Tahith Chong tucked home past Alisson to make it 1-0.


The Town knew they had ten minutes plus stoppage time to hang on. It was five minutes into the eight which were added that agonisingly, Liverpool found a way when Luis Diaz headed an equaliser beyond Kaminski.

You still felt there was still one last chance left in the remaining minutes and so it proved at the death when Kaboré found space in the box to warm the palms of Alisson – and that was that.

TOWN FALL TO NARROW DEFEAT AT OLD TRAFFORD

Coming off the pitch to a raucous reception from their noisy 3,000 supporters, you sensed the Town were proud of their display, but in the end one – just one moment – was the difference.

The Town's first half showing was typical of their performances this season. Disciplined. Tidy. Resilient. A wall of white shirts stood in United's way.

Erik ten Hag's side would go in at the interval frustrated yet it could have been a different story had Thomas Kaminski's brilliant reactions not denied Rasmus Hojlund's close range chance.

Every passing minute saw the Town creep higher up the pitch and that resulted in Chiedozie Ogbene having the Town's first chance – shooting straight at Andre Onana on 22 minutes.

But 14 minutes later the Hatters were mighty close to leading at the Theatre of Dreams. Issa Kaboré flew down the right and his perfect cross was met by a thunderous leaping header from Carlton Morris. For a split-second it looked all the world 1-0 but Onana leapt to his left and a big left hand later and the ball was clear.

In the second half Andros Townsend shot over from distance, but shortly before the hour the Hatters' good work was undone when United led. A half-cleared corner was recycled by Marcus Rashford and, after his low cross was half-cleared, Victor Lindelof was on hand to bash the ball home from eight yards.

Observers might have fancied the Town to roll over. If anything, the Hatters took the game to United. Their passing remained forward-thinking. The only issue was a genuine threat in the final third was missing.

However, as they huffed and puffed the Town could not call Onana into a meaningful stop and it was left to Kaminski to have the final say with another great stop to deny Rashford adding a second in added time.

Eventually the full-time whistle would come to the home side's relief and the Hatters took in the applause from the travelling hordes, who'd sung themselves hoarse after an afternoon of non-stop singing.

LOCKYER LAMENTS UNITED LOSS

Like in many of the games this season the Hatters remained in the hunt for at least a point when they visited Old Trafford two weeks ago but despite a fine performance left empty-handed.

Of course, a 1-1 draw with Liverpool and a 1-0 defeat at Manchester United, on the face of it, seems like progress as the Hatters continue to get to the grips with the rigours of the Premier League.

However, for the Town squad, and for Tom Lockyer, the recent performances and results had that sense of 'what might have been' with the captain frustrated with the return despite two encouraging performances.

"You come to United, you're going to ride your luck at times, and we did. Tom has made a few great saves, we were more than in that game, so it's a frustrating one as it is another game with zero points," said the centre-half.

"If you look at the performances we put in against Liverpool and now United, if we can have a few more of them I'm sure we'll pick up a few points along the way."

Success in the Championship in recent seasons has been in part down to a solid defence. Defensive solidity from set-pieces a particular strength.

So with United's winner coming after the Town had failed to deal with a corner, Lockyer was understandably disappointed

with the manner in which Erik ten Haag's side opened the scoring at Old Trafford.

"The annoying thing for myself is it's a set-piece," said the skipper. "We lost at home to Spurs from a set-piece, you come to Old Trafford and you lose on a set-piece, which is frustrating.

"For all the talent these teams have got in their squads, to be losing via set-pieces is extremely frustrating.

"Defend one set-piece and get away nil-nil, I'd be delighted and so would all our fans.

"We'll try and cut them out, it starts on the training pitch, the old cliche.

"Work hard on the training pitch and all that, but believe me, we are putting it in and full focus now is on to Crystal Palace." 





WELCOME CRYSTAL PALACE

The Eagles have since lost at home to Everton 3-2 in a thriller at Selhurst Park. Palace will be wanting to add more points to their tally today as they look to push on in the table.

ROY HODGSON. Former England boss and vastly experienced manager Roy cut his managerial teeth in 1976 in Sweden. The 76-year-old was LMA Manager of the Year in 2010 for his exploits with Fulham and has also managed, among others, Inter Milan and Liverpool.

SAM JOHNSTONE. Free transfer arrival in the summer of 2022 from West Brom, Sam is currently a member of the England squad. A product of the Manchester United academy, the stopper had several loans before coming number one at the Hawthorns.

DEFENDERS



JOACHIM ANDERSEN. Denmark international centre-half Joachim joined the Eagles from Lyon in 2021. Began his career in the Netherlands with Twente and has also had two years with Sampdoria.



MARC GUEHI. England international defender who came through the ranks at Chelsea before signing for Palace in July 2021 for a reported £18m.



TYRICK MITCHELL. Former Brentford academy left-back Tyrick joined Palace in 2020 and has gone to establish himself as a regular in the Eagles' defence. Made his England debut in 2022.

JOEL WARD. Eagles skipper Joel can operate at either full-back or in a defensive midfield role. Started his career at Portsmouth before moving to Selhurst Park in 2012 and has now made over 300 league appearances.

NAOUIROU AHAMADA. Highly-rated young French midfielder Naouirou signed for Palace in January this year from Stuttgart for almost £10m having come through the ranks at Juventus without making an appearance.



CHEICK DOUCOURÉ. All action Mali international midfielder Cheik joined the Eagles in the summer of 2022 from Lens and went onto win the Player of the Year award in his first season.



EBERECHI EZE. Gifted Greenwich-born winger arrived at Selhurst Park in 2020 from London neighbours QPR for a reported £17m. The England international recently signed a new contract.



MICHAEL OLISE. Highly-rated attacking midfielder winger Michael joined the Eagles from Reading in 2021. Born in Hammersmith but has represented France at youth level.

WILL HUGHES. Reliable central midfielder Will has played over 350 senior games and is still only 28. Started his career at Derby before four years at Watford prior to joining Palace.



JEFFERSON LERMA. Colombia international midfielde who arrived at Selhurst Park on a free transfer from Bournemouth. Cost the Cherries £30m when signing from Levante in 2018.



JEFFREY SCHULPP. German-born Ghana international Jeffrey has been with Palace since signing from Leicester in 2017. Extremely versatile and can play in defence, midfield or on the wing.

JORDAN AYEW. Experienced winger or forward Jordan joined the Eagles from Swansea in 2019. Began his career at Marseille before moving to Lorient and then to England with Villa in 2015.



ODSONNE EDOUARD. Former PSG academy graduate Odsonne arrived at Selhurst Park in 2021 from Celtic. The French striker has five league goals to his name so far this season.



JEAN-PHILIPPE MATETA. Another French-born forward, Jean-Philippe signed for the Eagles in 2022 after a successful loan spell. Started his career with Chateauroux, before spells with Lyon and Mainz in Germany.

CRYSTAL PALACE 1-2 LUTON TOWN

After an awful start to the 1973/74 season, when the Town went down 4-0 at Nottingham Forest, it was back to the drawing board for manager Harry Haslam.

The less than happy Harry had to cram in another bout of pre-season training in a week leading up to the visit of Carlisle to Kenilworth Road.

Remarkably, few changes were made to the side with goalkeeper Keith Barber dropped in favour of Graham Horn while out went one new signing, Peter Cruse, and in came another in the shape of the famously named Tom Finney who had been snapped up from

Crusaders in Northern Ireland.

Finney and his colleagues went goal mad against luckless Carlisle with the Hatters six up at the interval and eventually finishing up winning 6-1. The season had now started in earnest.

There was no stopping Finney, who scored in each of the next three games to add to the pair he netted against Carlisle, as the Town went on a long unbeaten run that saw them challenging leaders Middlesbrough at the top of the Division Two (now Championship).

After seven games, and following a brilliant 3-0 home win over Blackpool, Luton supporters suddenly began to believe they had

a side that could finally achieve a top flight spot for the first time since 1960.

Firstly, the cash strapped Hatters had to take on, and beat, some teams with rather more financial backing if they wanted to achieve their promotion dream and none came much richer at the time than Crystal Palace.

Palace had been relegated from Division One at the end of the previous season after spending a small fortune on players, were managed by the larger-than-life Malcolm Allison and had picked up only two points in this, a campaign when they were expected to bounce back straight away.

Despite this their fans remained remarkably loyal and in fact crowds at Selhurst Park were actually increasing and 20,322 turned up for the Hatters visit thinking that their luck would turn eventually. The Town were without winger Jimmy Ryan who had suffered a back injury and, in his place, came forgotten man Gordon Hindson.

Ex-Newcastle winger Hindson had not played since the previous season and was out to prove a point putting in a superb display and giving the experienced Palace full-back Tony Taylor the runaround in a first half that saw plenty of endeavour but no end product.

The game moved up a gear in the second period with Palace forcing some good saves out of Horn before Peter Anderson opened the scoring in the 50th minute heading in a John Aston free-kick at the near post after Hindson had made a clever dummy run.

Palace levelled eight minutes later when ex-Swindon winger Don Rogers blasted in a spectacular effort, but the Town were back in front soon after when Hindson put

over an inch perfect cross for Barry Butlin to climb high and head home.

The Hatters made sure of the points by battening down the hatches and on the final whistle Haslam went on the pitch to congratulate each player individually. The display at Forest only six weeks before seemed a lifetime away.

Palace manager Allison put on a brave front as he faced the press clutching his customary glass of champagne and puffing a Havana cigar. "That was our best performance of the season," he said. "I've got ability and so have the players. Judge me at the end of the season."

Palace were relegated to Division Three the following May, while the Town secured their place back in the top flight as runners-up. 





A HATTER AND AN EAGLE

Aylesbury-born Emmerson Boyce was one of the many players to come through the Town's schools and youth development programme prior to signing YTS forms in the summer of 1995.

He made the breakthrough into the Hatters' league side at home to Lincoln in April 1999 before becoming a regular and crowd favourite during the following season.

A fast and reliable overlapping right back, 'Boycie' saw an offer from Premier League Crystal Palace in the summer of 2004 as too good to turn down and where he found himself catapulted into the first team earlier than expected following a series of injuries to established regulars, a place he held on to.

Emmerson made a big money move to Wigan in 2006 and skippered the side to the 2013 FA Cup final win over Manchester City. After a short spell at Blackpool, Emmerson rejoined Wigan as an academy coach.

The Hatters' return to the second tier under Mike Newell in 2005 saw them return from Selhurst Park with all three points after a wonderful opening day of the campaign.

All eyes were on Palace, who had just been relegated from the Premier League, and their striker – Bedford-born Andrew Johnson, who had decided to stay and snubbing offers from top-flight suitors.

The Hatters continued from where they left off following their League One title romp with Steve Howard's thumping header from Kevin Nicholls' cross giving us the lead after Nicholls had earlier seen a penalty saved.

Johnson showed why he was the talk of the Championship when equalising early in the second half and all of a sudden assumed Palace would go on and collect an easy three points.

However the Town deservedly had the final say when Ahmet Brkovic pounced on another Nicholls set-piece with 11 minutes left to give the vocal away following a trip to the capital to remember.



He might not be a name familiar to Town fans, but to those of an Eagles persuasion, **Aki Riihilahti**'s exploits in the blue and red stripes will not be forgotten. The Finland international arrived at Selhurst Park in 2001 from Norwegian side Valarenga for just £200,000 and went onto make 178 appearances for the Eagles. Once named 'worst dressed player' by his teammates six seasons in a row the midfielder was part of the Palace side that won promotion to the top-flight in 2003/04.

Club historian Roger Wash looks back on the day the Town and Palace played out a six-goal thriller



Crystal Palace 3-3 Luton Town 20th March 1982

The Town got off to a great start to the Division Two (now Championship) 1981/82 season winning their first three games at a canter to become early leaders.

After a couple of home set-backs all became right again with the thumping of old enemies Watford at Kenilworth Road and the team began to have that unbeatable look about it.

This 'swagger' was typified in the 6-0 win over Grimsby in mid-October followed by an easy 2-0 victory at Wrexham (where we had never won before) setting us up for a home game against Crystal Palace when we hoped to consolidate our position at the top.

Our starting line-up had remained virtually unchanged for the first dozen games of the campaign and we started confidently against a Palace side that was struggling at the wrong end of the table.

Setting out their stall early however, Palace had obviously come for a point and filtered back into defence at the first sign of danger.

When you had already lost six of your games by 1-0 at that stage in the season, playing a defensive game is dangerous and, as if to prove a point, after David Moss put the Town in front from the penalty spot after 30 minutes, that was the way the score was going to stay.

The penalty, earned when Steve Lovell fouled Steve White in the area, came at the end of a period of Town pressure which had seen Brian Stein go close on two occasions but, try as they might, they could not increase the lead as Palace continued to defend in depth.

The crowd of 11,712 went home reasonably happy with the Town's performance, realising that teams were going to come to Kenilworth Road and play defensively and hope for a breakaway at the other end. Palace had only one shot on target and that came from substitute David Price in the last minute.

The only low spot that afternoon was an injury to centre-half Mike Saxby who limped off after 70 minutes. Little did we know at the time that the knee injury caused by an innocuous turn in the penalty area would effectively end his football career.



By the time of the return, the following March, the Town were going through a mini-crisis having gone three games without a win, including our first defeat for four months.

We were, however, still top of the table while Palace still were still down at the wrong end although they were heartened by a win at Chelsea the previous week.

This time negative thoughts went out of the window straight from the kick-off with both teams attacking with a will, and Palace opened the scoring after eight minutes when Neil Smillie was left free at the far post to meet a long cross.

The lead was short-lived though when Raddy Antic curled in a shot from the edge of the box four minutes later, only for Kevin Mabbett, who had made his Palace debut at Luton earlier in the season, giving the advantage back to the Eagles by scoring right from the restart reacting first to a long ball over the top.

Back came the Town, and a minute later a strong run from White took him into the box where he was upended by Paul Hinshelwood. Moss duly dispatched his tenth penalty of the season to level the scores.

We eventually went ahead for the first time shortly before the interval when, following good work from both Antic and Ricky Hill, Stein was left with a free header at the far post. On the run of play we just about deserved to be ahead.

Palace started the second period in determined fashion and it was the Town's turn to defend in depth although the Eagles rarely looked like getting through to test Jake Findlay in the Luton goal.

An inspired substitution by Palace manager Steve Kember changed the game when he introduced winger Vince Hilaire, who was later to have a spell at Kenilworth Road, into the fray with 20 minutes remaining, and it was his trickery that set up the equaliser with Smillie hammering home his second goal of the game.

The final whistle went with the Town on the attack but the 3-3 scoreline was a fair one and both teams came off to a standing ovation in complete contrast to the reaction following the negative clash between the two sides the previous October.

To finish on a happy note, the Town went the rest of the season unbeaten and walked away with the championship.

Having scored twice at Wembley in the Hatters' epic play-off final win over Coventry back in May, Jordan Clark had a long wait to finally make his first appearance in the top-flight after suffering a nasty ankle injury in the summer. This is his story to the top.

In April 2014, the Town's final game in the Conference saw John Still's side record a 1-0 win over Hyde. Alex Wall scored the winner. Jonathan Smith came on as a substitute in stoppage time to rapturous applause just four months after breaking his leg against Barnet. And in the Hyde line-up there was a 20-year-old lad from Barnsley called Jordan Clark.

Fast forward nine years and Clark had helped the Hatters win promotion to the Premier League, scoring the opening goal and in the triumphant shootout at Wembley. For the midfielder and the Town, it completed a remarkable rise from the depths of non-league to the top-flight in little less than a decade. ➤

For Clark, however, that success has not always been so smooth. Sometimes, that's life. Take this summer for instance when, just weeks before the start of the season, disaster struck.

"I tried to play a pass and got my foot trapped in the grass and went over on it," Clark says, looking back on that rain-soaked afternoon in Germany.

Ligaments in his ankles had snapped. The dream of that first appearance in the Premier League would have to be on hold.

It meant a long, hard, frustrating, time on the sidelines as the road to recovery began.

"I was lucky I didn't break anything or dislocate anything, just snapped one of my ligaments, which was not ideal but could have been worse," he continues, describing those initial moments.

"It was a killer. I was very emotional in the first week, especially being sat on my settee not being able to do anything.

"My girlfriend was having to run around for me as I couldn't do anything. I had to keep my leg up for 22 hours of the day, so that was a bit of a nightmare.

"At first I thought it was a six month injury, so I broke down in tears as you never know when you come back you might get little niggles and stuff.

"I didn't know if I would play a part this season, but then when they said three

months, you can keep cracking on with little things."

Suffering such a setback can be tough for anyone, let alone a professional sportsperson.

But what's where inner mental strength can make or break the rehabilitation process.

Sure, it was hard. But he had the benefit of good people around him. He knuckled down. Knew the hard work would pay off. Eventually, he thought to himself, he'd be rewarded.

"You're stuck in the gym so it's a bit harder, but then when you start to get out on the grass it starts to give you a bit of motivation," he says.

"You see the lads training and you think, a couple of weeks now and I should be back in there.

"My mentality was just like, I've got to do even more than what I can do as this level is unforgiving.

"The last thing I wanted to be was not fit and not stronger than I was previously, so that was the target I set.

"The physios, they're top men, I love them all to bits, and the sports sciences and strength and conditioning guys, I can't thank them enough.

"Football's funny, you get the highs of Wembley, do a whole pre-season and then the week before the first game you get ruptured ankle ligaments.



“So it was a bit of a kick in the teeth, it brings you back down to earth a little bit.

“It just makes you more hungry and when I've been watching the games, I've been like, I can't wait to get back, stamp my authority on the team and get back to how I was playing before I got injured.”

So desperate to see his teammates do their thing in the top-flight, Clark wasted no time, catching every game he could – even sitting among the travelling Hatters fans at away games.

“I see how much it means to them now, being sat next to two or three thousand every week,” he says.

“I felt like one of the fans myself going to pretty much every away game and following it with them.

“It just gives you a little taste of it and I don't want to let any of those people down who have travelled to the away games every week.

“You get a feel of what they want, they love their football and love the passion we've got on the pitch, so the fans are awesome.

“There's a lot of kids who travel up with their families, so it's always nice to give a little bit back to them.

“The conversations I've had with fans have been lovely and they're all nice people. ➤

"It's better to be on the pitch I must admit, I've missed it a lot, but the fans are awesome, I can't speak highly enough of them.

"You've done the hard yards in non-league and then gone through League Two, League One and the Championship, so it's a crazy journey.

"You've just got to enjoy every minute of it really and not let it pass you by.

"My family been on the journey with me, so it's for them as well as me, especially my mum and dad who have been driving me round the country for years, since I was a little kid, so it was special for them as well."

It was to family in Barnsley that Clark headed for after the game at Old Trafford.

Today, Crystal Palace are in town and he will be hopeful of playing a part in front of the Kenilworth Road faithful that he was sitting amongst this season.

"I have missed playing a lot and it feels like a long three months I've been out but it's nice to be back now and hopefully I can put in a few performances to make the fans proud.

"I'm looking forward to the next one now against Palace, hopefully I can get on the pitch again and get the Kenny rocking.

"It's been some journey, I always dreamed it though."

“I was nervous because I came in after Nathan and obviously, I had been down the road as well, so there was a lot of apprehension at the time.



MEMORABLE MATCH!

TOWN 2 - 0 HALIFAX
25TH NOVEMBER 1967

We'll level with you. 'Memorable' matches on this day, are few and far between – more on that elsewhere on this page.

However, one of the Town's few victories on this date came back in 1967, so we know there's only a select few you who were at Kenilworth Road to witness a 2-0 win over Halifax.

The victory courtesy of goals from Ian Buxton and John Moore, made it eight wins in a row. Alan Ball admitted afterwards he had planned to come for a point but only succeeded in denying the Town's star man at the time, Bruce Rioch, from getting on the scoresheet.

It proved to be a key win in a memorable season, as the Hatters would go on and win the Fourth Division title.

THE RECORD

We do not, of course, subscribe to curses or bad luck on a certain day. Just because the Town's record on 25th November is bad doesn't mean we expect to lose today.

However, for any fan who has attended any of our 18 matches on this day (which would be interesting, given our first match on this date was in 1893) can testify it's been a struggle. 12 of the 18 games have ended in defeat, with just five wins and one draw making up the numbers.

One of those wins came in that first game in 1893, as the Town saw off Norwich CEYMS - Church of England Young Men's Society, for those wondering. They currently played in the Anglian Combination Premier Division – level 11 in the pyramid – but on this day in 130 years ago the Hatters beat them 5-1 in an FA Cup qualifying round tie.

The Town saw off Reading 3-1 in 1907, Halifax in 1967 and Fulham in 1969 with the only draw coming before 32,763 fans at Roker Park against Sunderland.




LAST TIME OUT

After beating Fulham in 1969 the Hatters would have to wait 48 years before tasting victory on this day again when Nathan Jones took the Town to Crewe in League Two in 2017.

Second half goals from Danny Hylton and Luke Berry had the Hatters two goals to the good before a late Johnny Mullins own goal got the Railways back into the game.

But Jones' side would hold on to keep their place at the top of the League Two table on goal difference and end the club's seven-match losing streak on 25th November. Here's hoping for another three points this afternoon.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS YOU'LL NEVER SING THAT!

AFTER BEING AT KENILWORTH ROAD FOR TWO RELEGATIONS AND NUMEROUS FAILED PROMOTION BIDS, JAKE HOWELLS HAD EXTRA MOTIVATION TO HELP THE TOWN RETURN TO THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE AS CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS.



“It was a strange time and there were some dark days,” says Jake Howells, glancing at the Kenilworth Road pitch behind him.

“I would sit on the bus back from games, I was

18. Fans were around me. There was a lot of negative energy.”

He’s not painting a particular pleasant picture for someone who should have been relishing his dream of playing regular football for his local club.

An academy graduate thrust into the first team as a 17-year-old, the formative years of Howells’ professional career were unprecedented.

His debut against Huddersfield was the Hatters’ last game before relegation from League One. Two months later the Town were faced with a 30-point deduction in League Two. From youth team football to facing up to dropping out of the league entirely all in the space of 12 months. A situation like no other.

But it’s in moments like this where you learn the most about people. And about yourself. For all the Hatters’ predicaments, this was an opportunity for a fresh-faced left-footer to make his way in the game – one he would grab with both hands.

“I remember my debut, my shirt was too big for me, but to see my name on the back of it was my dream,” says Howells.

“I knew the club were struggling. But I was a young lad and saw it as a chance. I had senior pros like Kevin Nicolls and Sol Davis around me. I cleaned Sol’s boots but was sometimes keeping him out of the team which was strange.”

The campaign known to Town fans as the ‘minus-30 season’ would have tested the most seasoned pro. Yet the teenager stood up to the challenges that it brought.

“We were trying to build a squad. Trialist after trialist came in during pre-season. All I wanted to do was to play. When we signed Chris Martin on loan we thought ‘hold on, we can get out of this’.

“Physiologically it was very tough. We’d win but still be on minus points. It was very draining. I remember losing 5-1 at Darlington. It’s a long way from home and you’re thinking ‘how do we get out from this?’”

Despite the best efforts of a team constantly playing catch up, the deficit was too big to eat up.

The Town, eventually put out of their misery, could start life in the Conference free from the shackles of points deductions. However, a different challenge would lie in wait for Howells and the Hatters.

“The expectations went from ‘we’re getting relegated’ to ‘we have to win the league by 5-10 points’,” explains Howells.

“We’d go to away grounds that the club had never been to before. 2,000 Luton fans expecting us to win every game. But we just didn’t have the standard required.”

One season in non-league then became two, three, four and five. Among them back-to-back play-off final defeats. At no point, however, did he think about leaving for greener pastures.

“I never thought about jumping ship, I was so engrossed in my Luton Town journey,” Howells says honestly. “The club had supported me and gave me my platform.

“That said, the Wimbledon final hit me. Jason Walker’s last-minute header from my cross was inches away from going in. ➤


"Then, the following season, against York, an offside decision... it was just another challenge to overcome."

The seasons of dread begin to mount up in our minds as he chats chronologically through the campaigns. It's bordering on sadistic. Yet there is light at the end of the tunnel.

"All managers have different ways of doing things and then the following season John Still came in and got us back to basics," explains Jake as talk turns to 2013/14.

"One of his first sessions was purely the basics. He was all about the detail. 'Set pieces and dead balls, that's how you win leagues,' he would say. We weren't going to pass our way out of the division. We needed to be more direct but we had the players to play a bit lop-sided – Paul Benson was the focal point, Andre Gray was higher, Luke Guttridge was pulling the strings.

"Every game was amazing, especially at Kenilworth Road. We felt we'd score in every game. My tally was the best in a season – admittedly I was on penalties! – but I felt full of energy.



"Plus we had people like Steve McNulty and Ronnie Henry who had been there and done it. Seen everything you can imagine at this level. Small dressing rooms, horrible pitches. They knew going to Alfreton or Braintree wouldn't be a walkover."

Come the end of the season, and after overhauling long-time leaders Cambridge United, the Town were back in the Football League with 101 points and 102 goals crowning a magnificent and significant season.

After the years of hurt came a new feeling.

"Relief. The pressure I'd carried for so long, through all the bad times, was off. Seeing the fans on the bus those times... We knew the job the board were doing, rebuilding the club. I was proud to be part of it. To finally get the club back in the Football League was a great moment for everyone involved."

Jake's career at Kenilworth Road would end after two seasons back in the Football League at the end of the 2015/16 season. With 334 appearances for the Town under his belt, only 16 players have played more matches than him in the club's history.

"The only thing is that I never got a chance to come back and say goodbye or thank you," says Jake, with a regretful tone.

"But I am proud of what I achieved and my children will grow up seeing me scoring goals on YouTube and that's enough for me."

Now working for Foco – supplying merchandise for clubs including Paris Saint-Germain and Bayern Munich – Howells is still involved in the game to some degree, although the use of his left foot has somewhat diminished.

"It keeps me busy," he says. "But I'd give anything to be back out on the pitch now."

A-Z THE NON-LEAGUE YEARS

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS

Part Six- F is for Fleetwood and Forest Green Rovers.

Fleetwood were a team that appeared in the Conference in 2010 and, backed by the money of the now disgraced Andy Pilley, were promoted to the Football League within two years.

Our first meeting was at Highbury in August 2010 and although we won 3-0 we were all taken to Fleetwood's centre-half who looked nothing like a svelte footballer but was mightily effective. Steve McNulty was, of course, to become a Hatters favourite, starring in our eventual promotion.

Fleetwood had boosted their squad by the time they won 3-1 at Kenilworth Road later that season and a, by now, Jamie Vardy inspired Cod Army won 2-1 here in 2011/12. With Fleetwood already promoted, our final game of the season was a 'must-win' at Highbury to sneak into the play-offs. Whether the home side were a little 'under the weather' or not an Andre Gray inspired Hatters won 2-0.

At the top of a steep hill and serving 'Badger Pasties' our favourite vegan club Forest Green

Rovers were with us throughout our five years in non-League. The drive to Nailsworth was a little different to what we were used to with leafy lanes and cows peering over fences replacing out of town industrial units and crippling traffic.

Our record against Forest Green was rather good with only one defeat suffered in ten meetings. Our 6-1 win at Kenilworth Road with five different goalscorers in October 2010 was a standout but the most memorable was our final clash in April 2014 which marked our last home game at non-League level.

The promotion celebration started badly with Forest Green netting a penalty on 22 minutes with the Town unable to get going in front of a capacity crowd – perhaps they were also 'under the weather'!

Gray won and scored a penalty just before the interval and after an ear bashing from manager John Still at half-time a more purposeful Town banged in three goals without reply in the second period to set up the presentation of the Skrill trophy at the end to seal a magnificent season.

In addition to providing information and guidance to attendees and signpost them towards other support services, there will also be the opportunity to take part in quizzes, have a tour around the stadium and



A happy Lawless said: "It was a good performance, especially in the second half, from the whole team. It was a battling display but we controlled possession, won our duels and were strong in the final third.


"We were ruthless – that was something we wanted to improve on in recent weeks and after scoring three last week and four this week, we have taken it up a notch.

INTERNATIONAL RECOGNITION

The Town were represented across three continents during the final international break of 2023.

Starting in Africa for the 2026 World Cup qualifiers, Marvelous Nakamba captained Zimbabwe to draws against Rwanda and Nigeria, who have had an 18-month suspension lifted by FIFA.

The Warriors currently sit fifth in a competitive Group C, with fixtures against Lesotho and South Africa to come in the next batch of qualifiers in summer 2024.

Issa Kaboré also featured in a World Cup qualifier for Burkina Faso but was injured after 45 minutes in their draw against Guinea-Bissau.

Moving to Europe, captain Tom Lockyer will need to go through the play-offs for Wales to qualify for Euro 2024.

The skipper did not feature in the draw at Armenia last week before

starting in the final group-stage match, where Wales missed out on automatic qualification when they were held to a controversial draw with Turkey.

Jacob Brown's Scotland had already secured automatic qualification for Euro 2024 last month, and our Scotsman started the final group stage game at Hampden Park against Norway.

Goalkeeper Thomas Kaminski was on the bench for Belgium across their wins against Serbia and Azerbaijan, while Chieo Ogbene did not feature for Republic of Ireland due to injury.

Joe Johnson's World Cup journey with England is over after the Young Lions crashed out following defeat to Uzbekistan in the Round of 16 on Wednesday morning.

Ryan Garry's side had won Group C after Johnson played 76 minutes in the late win against Iran before their shock knockout loss to Uzbekistan.

DEVELOPMENT SQUAD UPDATE FORBES TAKING THE POSITIVES

Adrian Forbes could take the encouragement from an otherwise frustrating night as his under-21s fell to 2-0 defeat to a physical Colchester side in the last Premier League Cup clash.

A young Town side, including several of the under-16s, competed well against their category 2 opponents but could not prevent a third straight defeat in the competition.

This season is the first a Luton Town under-21 team has played competitive football so, despite the set-back, Forbes was happy to put everything in perspective.

"You can always look at a game like that and little things we could have done differently to stop goals going in, but I've got to reflect on the game and look at the bigger picture," he said.

"I've said it before about this group, the team didn't even exist two or three years ago, so the fact we are now here in this competition, playing against Leeds, playing against Chelsea and against Colchester, and then inviting those three teams back to Kenilworth Road over the next three months, I think we've got to look at that and see the positives.

"We've got to look at the group and see the likes of James Shea playing for the team and getting minutes, Andros Townsend playing for the team and getting minutes, Gabe Osho playing for the team and getting minutes, so we've got to look at the bigger picture as well.

"We've got two Under-16s playing in the team, competing against 23-year-old men, and I just think it bodes so well for the future of the academy and the club. They weren't just making up the numbers in the group. They deserve to be here and they competed against

Colchester and I actually think they were pivotal to the performance.

"We are a category 3 academy and we don't get the opportunity to play in a league. Any games we play, other than the Beds Senior Cup and the Premier League Cup, we have to source our own fixtures, so we go through the season in effect playing the majority of our games as friendlies, whereas the likes of Colchester, Leeds and Chelsea are playing league fixtures every week, points to play for every week, so from a development point of view, that's something that we at Luton Town can't give them at this moment in time.

"But I will make sure over the next few weeks I am going to prepare those boys in the best way possible to go and compete against Chelsea, at home, then compete against Leeds and compete against Colchester, because those three teams still haven't seen the best of us yet."

The Town's next match in the competition, against Chelsea, takes place on Tuesday 12th December here at Kenilworth Road.

WHERE?

Hatters fans will be making their first ever trip to Gtech Community Stadium next weekend when the Town face Brentford. Opened in September 2020, the Bees' new stadium has hosted the Hatters once before – for a behind-closed-doors Championship fixture in January 2021. The 17,250-capacity stadium cost £70m and replaced the much-loved Griffin Park, the Bees' home since 1904.

HOW TO GET THERE

The train is probably the best option to reach the ground, as it is only 100 meters away from the Kew Bridge Station. Furthermore the ground is also connected very well to the London Underground system, as it is close to the Chiswick Park, Gunnersbury and Acton Town stations. Finally, the Bobbers Travel Club are running coaches to Brentford. For a midday departure from Luton, the fares are £24 for adults and £22 for concessions. Call 01234 856542 to book your spot.

OUR RECORD THERE

Meetings between the two clubs have been frequent over the years, dating back to the first meeting in 1901 – one which the Hatters won 1-0 in the Southern League. Overall the Town have won 16, drawn 13 and lost 27 of their visits to Brentford. The last time we went to Brentford in front of fans, we were thumped 7-0. The less said the better. However, our last win in this part of the world was a 2-0 FA Cup replay win in November 2007 thanks

to goals from centre halves Chris Coyne and Jaroslaw Fojut. Not since September 1992 have we won at Brentford in a league encounter – 2-1 with goals from Julian James and Phil Gray.

THE BRENTFORD OF TODAY

Brentford are enjoying their third season in the Premier League having won promotion via the play-offs in 2020/21. In their first campaign in the top-flight since 1947, Thomas Frank's side finish 13th and they followed that up last term by finishing in ninth. So far this term, the Bees have been a model of consistency – they have won four, lost four and drawn four. At home, they've been beaten just once in six games, that coming against Everton.

WATCH OUT FOR

In the absence of centre forward Ivan Toney, Bryan Mbeumo has been the Bees' main source of goals, scoring six times in 12 games so far this term. The French-born attacker, who represented Cameroon at last year's World Cup, was signed by Thomas Frank for £5.8m when the Bees were still in the Championship. He scored 16 goals in debut season at Griffin Park, helping the club to play-offs, before coming an instrumental part of the side that won promotion to the top-flight.

Premier League

ROUND-UP



Back-to-back defeats for Tottenham Hotspur have meant there's been a change at the top of the Premier League – with an all too familiar name now sitting in first place.

Manchester City, who are aiming to become the first team in the Premier League era to win three titles in a row, sit one point clear of Liverpool after Pep Guardiola's side earned a point in one of the matches so far this season, the 4-4 draw against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge.

After earning a point at the death against us, Liverpool returned to winning ways last time out, beating Brentford 3-0 at Anfield to go into second place.

Arsenal sit third after beating Burnley, who are now bottom, 3-1 at Emirates Stadium while Tottenham lost for the second game in a row, with two late goals condemning Ange Postecoglou's side to a 2-1 defeat at Wolves.

One side showing no signs of stopping are Aston Villa, who earned their 13th successive home league win, by beating Fulham 3-1 at Villa Park. It was Fulham's third defeat in four matches as they slipped to 15th in the table.

West Ham defeated Nottingham Forest in a topsy-turvy 3-2 win at London Stadium, while Sheffield United moved off the foot of the table as they earned a hard-fought 1-1 draw at Brighton, who had Mahmoud Dahoud sent-off midway through the second half.

Our visitors this afternoon were on the receiving end of a 3-2 home defeat to Everton, who secured their third win in five matches. However, the Toffees now find themselves in the relegation zone after receiving a ten-point deduction from the Premier League for breaching financial rules.

After the Town lost at Manchester United, Bournemouth leapfrogged us in the standings following a fine home victory over Newcastle United.

Club Statement | FA fines Luton Town for discriminatory chant

Luton Town Football Club has been fined £120,000, warned as to its future conduct and issued with a two-year action plan by the Football Association.

The Club accepted a charge following abusive, offensive, homophobic, discriminatory chanting by supporters at the opening Premier League fixture of the season away to Brighton & Hove Albion on Saturday 12th August.

As an inclusive, family-oriented Club, Luton Town abhors abusive chanting such as this and has a zero-tolerance policy towards discrimination of all kinds. It is not acceptable towards anyone in football or wider society, either in person or online.

Those involved were committing a criminal offence and anyone subsequently identified will be issued with a Club ban and face potential police investigation.

Luton Town has worked with supporters in recent seasons to help form the Rainbow Hatters supporters' group for members of the LGBTQ+ community, who meet regularly to share their experiences of watching the Hatters.

We will continue to promote the 'Love Football. Protect The Game' campaign, which this season has focused especially on fan behaviour, and will work further with supporter groups to educate and inform on all forms of discriminatory acts to ensure that watching Luton Town is a safe and welcoming experience for everyone.
