# FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER  
GARY SWEET

**Good evening and welcome one and all to Kenilworth Road for tonight's match with old adversaries, Arsenal.**

There will be many inside the ground for whom this fixture will be their first, yet over the course of our long and rich history, we have enjoyed many encounters against Arsenal. Supporters of an older generation will remember the times Arsenal were humbled; either here, like in our last league meeting in December 1991, or at Wembley, on our greatest of all days in 1988.

Today, the Gunners arrive top of the table and I wish warm greetings to our colleagues joining us from North London in the boardroom tonight, as well as the football staff who have worked wonders to give their fans a realistic hope of winning the Premier League title again.

Tonight then, we enter arguably the toughest pair of home fixtures in recent memory on the back of a wonderful home performance against Crystal Palace. After a steep learning curve, our home advantage really is starting to show where new players are feeling at home and our confidence is growing in front of an incredibly rapturous support.

Saturday's defeat at Brentford, however, was somewhat disappointing in contrast. A very disciplined performance in the first half

did exactly what it was intended to do only to be let down by a slow start to the second half. It's evidently clear where we need to improve and the staff and lads will be working hard to improve in those areas.

Of course, as newcomers to this league, the mountain is very steep and it will take time for us to find our footing on our ascent. Stepping back to observe our progress so far, it has to be acknowledged that our development in our physical outputs, our performances and our self-belief is all very encouraging as we remain firmly focussed on the very specific apex we need to reach this season.

Naturally, we remain obsessed with picking up points, and felt Saturday was a missed opportunity, certainly ahead of this coming week. But there is no reason why we can't sit here this time next week having accumulated more points than we have now, just as our home performance versus Liverpool proved.

At the end of the season, any new club surviving this league will have done so by picking up the odd point against opposition teams occupying the top five or six positions and our target shouldn't be any different.

These past few weeks and months have been a very important time for English football, which will hopefully all become increasingly evident to all over the next month or so.



You should all know that after the government's white paper and recent King's speech, the new regulator for football will become a reality with a phased introduction through parliament over the next year to 18 months.

Opinions within the game on the impact of the regulator are unsurprisingly mixed, polarising between some believing football in their world shouldn't require one, to a majority believing the football pyramid is becoming increasingly fragile without some form of overseeing authoritative protection.

Our view is that the involvement of a national regulator is a good thing as long as it doesn't become intrusion, which appears to be how it is shaping up.

Any regulator should be structured to protect the fabric of the game, any licensing criterion for clubs to adhere to in order for them to gain future protection and to oversee a more potent owners and directors qualification for clubs where, frankly, the current football authorities have always been legally powerless.

However, the line between authoritative supervision and intrusion will be fine. The Premier League, the FA and the EFL must be permitted to run the game – its operations, its rules and its own finances.

To demonstrate to the regulator that football can keep its own house in order a renegotiation between those three football authorities in this country has been taking place over the last couple of years to restructure financial distributions together with controls to prevent overspending. This agreement, once executed, will pass more money down the leagues but with spending caps to ensure that all clubs should be more sustainable going forward.


This may appear to be a dry topic for some, but it is possibly the biggest structural reform to our national game since we voted in favour of a Premier League breakaway almost 33 years ago.

Once made public we will share more of our thoughts on the matter. In the meantime, with our own sustainable rise over the last few years, we will be well-positioned to take advantage of this transition, if managed ➤

carefully, to ensure that our progress continues soundly.

Turning attention back to tonight, this evening's game forms part of the Premier League's Rainbow Laces campaign, an initiative which is celebrating its ten year anniversary this season. It is important for us as a family club to make sure that Kenilworth Road and all of our club environments are those which feel welcome for anybody, and it's why we stand proudly alongside Stonewell in promoting equality and diversity.

Football has the power to bring us together, but the actions of a minority can also make life unbearable for others. As you may have read, we were fined £120,000 by the Football Association and warned to our future conduct after we accepted a charge following abusive, offensive, homophobic and discriminatory chanting by our supporters at Brighton on the opening day of the season.

As we mentioned in our statement, we abhor abusive chanting and adopt a zero-tolerance policy towards discrimination

of all kinds. It is not acceptable towards anyone in football or wider society, either in person or online, and it is sad that our determined efforts on the pitch have been overshadowed by a minute minority watching from the stands.

We have worked with supporters in recent seasons to help form the Rainbow Hatters supporters' group for members of the LGBTQ+ community, who meet regularly to share their experiences of watching the Hatters, and you can read more about their work elsewhere in tonight's programme.

Tonight promises to be a special occasion and I am sure will bring a raucous, old fashioned atmosphere – one rarely seen in the Premier League.

So join me in wishing Rob and the lads all the best and get ready to raise the roof and show the watching world what we're all about for the right reasons.

It will be the first time the two clubs have met since an FA Cup third round tie in the 1996/97 season. The Town held Wanderers to 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road with Marvin Johnson on target. However, it was Bolton that progressed to the next round after winning the replay 6-2 at Burnden Park.

## **DUO UP FOR MONTHLY AWARDS**

Town boss Rob Edwards and goalkeeper Thomas Kaminski have been nominated for a combined three awards for the month of November.

After holding Liverpool to a draw at Kenilworth Road and matching Manchester United for long spells in 1-0 defeat, the Hatters secured their first home win of the season by beating Crystal Palace.

Those results – and performances – have not gone unnoticed, and has

earned Edwards a nomination for the Premier League's Barclay's Manager of the Month. The manager faces competition for the award from Newcastle's Eddie Howe, Andoni Iraola of Bournemouth and Erik ten Hag of Manchester United.

Keeper Kaminski is in the line for two awards. The Belgian is one of six players – and only goalkeeper – to be shortlisted for the EA SPORTS Player of the Month award. No goalkeeper made more saves in November than the 31-year-old, with a number of the 15 saves particularly eye-catching across the three games.

One – or should we say two – of those saves has been nominated for the Castrol Save of the Month. Thomas' double-save to deny Eberechi Eze and Jeffrey Schlupp against Crystal Palace is in the running to win the award. It comes a month after his stop against Aston Villa was earned a nomination. Interestingly, one of the saves our goalkeeper faces competition for is one made against the Hatters – Andre Onana's excellent stop to deny Carlton Morris' goal-bound header is among the six stops in contention for November's prize.

## BRILLIANT HATTERS SECURE FIRST HOME PREMIER LEAGUE WIN

Hatters fans around Kenilworth Road were on their feet. Some were shouting, some were screaming. There were those who were whistling – howling even – and there were plenty frozen in silence; accepting they could do no more to influence the referee to blow the final whistle.

Eventually, at two minutes past five and after 13-and-a-half minutes of agonising injury time, that whistle came.

Relief and – for the first time at home this term – celebration. Goals from Teden Mengi and Jacob Brown gave the Hatters that elusive win on home soil after a breathless second half at the Old Girl.

Those baying for the full-time had every reason. Those who waited in silent anticipation were the same. For some they had never seen Luton Town win in the top-flight. Not for 11,537 days had the Hatters won here in Bedfordshire in the top division.

In a second half to remember – for its chaos, beauty and drama – the Town led when Alfie Doughty's left-wing corner found its way to Mengi at the backpost and he expertly guided home his first senior goal to cue pandemonium in the stands.

But two minutes later disaster struck. The feelgood factor around the place was ruthlessly cut by a moment of magic from Michael Olise. Straight from the restart, the winger flew down the right, cut inside and curled a wonderful shot beyond Thomas Kaminski, who had earlier repelled Palace with a number of smart stops. However, no keeper in the world was saving it as the Hatters cursed their luck.

To their credit the Hatters reset and went again and restored their advantage on 83 minutes. Chiedozie Ogbene delivered an inch-perfect cross into the heart of the Palace six-yard box. The pass caused the ultimate confusion in the Palace defence. They all asked questions: should we leave it? Should we clear it? Should Johnstone claim it? In the end, the indecision cost them and Brown made them pay.

Twelve additional minutes were added in which Palace hit the bar in the final minute of those but the Town held on to cue memorable scenes at the end and, importantly, three points.

# BROWN ON TOP OF THE WORLD

**Scotland international Jacob Brown netted his first-ever Premier League goal on his 250th career appearance during our win against Crystal Palace.**

“I’m on the top of the world,” said Brown after scoring the winner against the Eagles.

“It’s a crazy feeling, the three points was the main thing but for me to get my first Premier League goal was a great feeling.

“I think you could tell by the celebration that I didn’t know what I was doing. The emotions were so high with the importance of the game and me wanting to get that first goal.”

The frontman, who had scored earlier in the campaign in the Carabao Cup victory over Gillingham back in August, had extra cause for celebration having made his first start for Scotland in the week leading up to the Palace fixture.

“This week looking back has been one of the best weeks in my career,” he said.

“It’s been a week that I’ll remember for a long time. To get my first start for Scotland, it was an unreal experience and a great feeling. It motivates me to do more, to keep working hard and keep getting this feeling throughout my career.”

Brown’s winner came after Palace had cancelled out Teden Mengi’s earlier effort within minutes of the first goal.

On conceding so quickly after taking the lead, Brown said: “It’s the same, everyone feels it, when the goal for us goes in, we all celebrate on the side as much as anyone on the pitch, same as the fans.

“So when they scored, it’s disappointing, but we know we’ve just got to push on and luckily we got the winner.

“It’s obviously frustrating as we’ve been in that position before and we have been working on just when we scored to compose ourselves. It’s easier said than done, but the character we showed to then go and get the next goal and to hang on for the amount of time that we did, shows that we’re ready for this league and we just want to keep pushing on.”

The Hatters were first on BBC’s Match of the Day with the dramatic second half clearly catching the eye of the programme’s producers.

On prospect of seeing his goal on the Beeb’s long-running show, Brown said: “I’m so buzzing, I’m going to watch it a few times, my missus will be fuming, I’ll just be on my phone watching that all evening!

“We’ll watch Match of the Day, but the main thing is the three points because as a team we’re all just supporting each other. It’s not about who scores, it’s about getting the points and the team’s performance, the staff as well. You can see we share that experience with the fans at the end, it means a lot to us.”

## TOWN SLIP TO DEFEAT AT BRENTFORD

**A nightmare start to the second half helped condemn the Hatters to a defeat at Brentford.**

Having lost captain Tom Lockyer through injury at half-time, the Town conceded twice in a six-minute spell early in the second half to give the hosts a two-goal lead.

The Hatters, so often staying in games this season and scoring goals late in the final 15 minutes, added another to their tally when substitute Jacob Brown halved the deficit.

But the Bees made sure of victory with nine minutes left when Shandon Baptiste made it 3-1 to consign the Hatters to defeat.

The first half saw the Hatters defend well to keep the Bees at arms' length. Clear-cut chances were few and far between – especially for those supporting the Town with Carlton Morris relying on scraps.

Bryan Mbeumo had the hosts' first real effort that looked remotely dangerous on 37 minutes with a curling low shot that whistled just wide.

Getting to half-time goalless did not come without repercussions, however, as Lockyer remained on the turf inside the penalty area as the players headed for the dressing room and the skipper would not reappear for the second half and was replaced by Brown.

But with the Town still rearranging themselves in defence, it took Brentford four minutes after the restart to take the lead when Neal Maupay tucked home from close range after the Hatters failed to clear their lines.

And on 56 minutes the hosts doubled their lead. Mbeumo's corner was met by Ben Mee and the defender's header was deflected off striker Morris giving Thomas Kaminski no chance.

Chances for the Hatters remained slim but just as Brentford appeared to take their foot off the gas, out of the blue, substitute Brown finished well on his left foot from just inside the penalty area after Ross Barkley's through ball. 2-1 with 13 minutes left.

But hopes of a comeback similar to the draw at Nottingham Forest earlier in the campaign were dashed when the Bees made the game safe with eight minutes left when Baptiste found the net.

# BELL HOPING FOR BOUNCEBACKABILITY

**Amari'i Bell urged the Hatters to bounce back from Saturday's "disappointing" defeat at Brentford when they entertain Premier League leaders Arsenal at Kenilworth Road tonight.**

Asked whether the atmosphere in the Town dressing room was good following the 3-1 loss at the Gtech Community Stadium, the Jamaica international said: "Yes, it's still positive. It's just one game.

"We know that we have to bounce back because obviously they are all key games, but we've got two big games against some good teams coming up, so we have to keep the right mentality."

The Hatters pulled a goal back to make it 2-1 with Jacob Brown's second goal in as many games, and after conceding a third to Shandon Baptiste in the 81st-minute, thought they had a lifeline when Tahith Chong headed an Andros Townsend cross home late on, only for a linesman's flag to correctly rule the effort out for offside.

"We showed that we've got that never say die attitude, especially towards the end of the game, so it's important," said Bell. "It's disappointing that Chong's goal was offside, but we are still positive that we can keep on going to the final whistle."

After Tom Lockyer departed the action at half-time through injury and vice-captain Carlton Morris was substituted on the hour, Bell was handed the armband for the final half-an-hour.

It was the first time he had worn it since joining the Hatters from Blackburn Rovers in the summer of 2021, and he added: "(It was) the first time and despite the result, it was good for me. It was a good opportunity for me to be one of those leader players in the team."

Next come Mikel Arteta's Gunners and Pep Guardiola's England and European champions, Manchester City on Sunday at Kenilworth Road.

"We go into those two games with our heads held high, positive," said Bell. "We have to put today's game behind us and move on quickly because the next game is around the corner, and we need to show the right attitude."





# WELCOME ARSENAL

**Tonight we welcome Mikel Arteta's strong Arsenal side to Kenilworth Road for a big game under the lights. After finishing runners-up in the Premier League last season, the Gunners have started the season well and are flying high at the top end of the table.**

Arsenal opened their account for the season with a comfortable 2-1 win over Nottingham Forest before beating Crystal Palace 1-0 in their next game. This was followed with a 2-2 draw with Fulham before an impressive 3-1 home victory over Manchester United.

Within just a few games of the season, it was clear Arsenal would be contenders yet again this season. They also got off to a great start in their return to the Champions League with an emphatic 4-0 win over PSV Eindhoven.

The Gunners picked up a solid point at home to local rivals Tottenham Hotspur following a 2-2 draw. Another big result after this was beating Manchester City 1-0 after a late deflected striker from Gabriel Martinelli. Arsenal yet again proving they are here to compete at the top of the table.

Arsenal have bolstered their squad further this season and were active in the summer transfer market. Kai Havertz, Jurrien Timber, Declan Rice and David Raya were all brought to the Emirates Stadium for the following campaign – Rice being the marquee signing for a fee of over £100m.

The Gunners possess some generational talent in their young side with emerging stars like Bukayo Saka, Martinelli and Martin Odegaard performing well each week.

Arteta's side have a very settled team full of players who know their roles within the team very well. The Gunners were only five points off the title last season and are well in the race to win it this year.

Lastly, a warm welcome to everyone associated with Arsenal, we hope you enjoy your time at Kenilworth Road.

**MIKEL ARTETA.** The Spaniard graced the midfield of the Premier League for over a decade with Everton and then Arsenal before taking the managerial position with the Gunners in 2019, winning the FA Cup in his second season in charge.

**DAVID RAYA.** Stopper currently vying for the number one spot with Aaron Ramsdale. Barcelona-born, he began his professional career with Blackburn before moving to Brentford for £3m and is currently on-loan from the Bees.

## DEFENDERS



**GABRIEL.** Commanding Brazilian centre-half who joined the Gunners for a fee in the region of £27m from French club Lille in 2020.



**WILLIAM SALIBA.** French central defender William signed for Arsenal in 2019 from Saint-Etienne and has now established his position in the team following loans at Nice and Marseille.



**TAKEHIRO TOMIYASU.** Japan international who arrived at Emirates Stadium from Italian club Bologna in 2021. Originally moved from Japan to Belgium with Sint-Truiden.



## BEN WHITE.

Englishman Ben signed for the Gunners for £50m from Leeds in July 2021 following a string of impressive loan spells, including at Leeds, where he won the Championship in 2020.



## OLEKSANDR ZINCHENKO.

Left-sided defender, also capable of playing further forward, Ukrainian international Oleksandr signed from Manchester City for a reported £32m in July 2022.

## KAI HAVERTZ.

German international Kai has a wealth of experience despite being just 24. Shot to prominence at Bayer Leverkusen, joining Chelsea in 2020 before switching across London this summer.



**JORGINHO.** Experienced Brazil-born Italian midfielder and another player who swapped Chelsea for Arsenal this summer. Also previously with Napoli, he won Euro 2020(1) with Italy.



## MARTIN ODEGAARD.

Gifted Norwegian playmaker and current Gunners captain who signed in 2021. Joined Real Madrid for €3 million aged just 16 before various loan spells up until signing for Arsenal.



**DECLAN RICE.** Summer signing from West Ham for a reported £100m to become the most expensive English player ever. Made over 200 Premier League appearances for the Hammers and made his England debut in 2019.



## LEANDRO TROSSARD.

Belgian international midfielder, who can also play in attack, who signed in the last January transfer window from Brighton. Started his career in Belgium with Genk.

## ATTACKERS



**EDDIE NKETIAH.** England forward with five goals already to his name in the Premier League this season. Made his Gunners debut in September 2017 in the Europa League and spent the first half of the 2019/20 season on loan at Leeds,



**GABRIEL JESUS.** Brazilian international forward who signed for the Gunners from Manchester City at the start of last season having won the Premier League title four times with the Citizens.



**GABRIEL MARTINELLI.** Another attacker from Brazil, Gabriel arrived at Emirates Stadium in 2019 shortly after his 18th birthday. Only 22, he has already surpassed 100 Premier League appearances.



**BUKAYO SAKA.** England international winger who came through the ranks at Emirates Stadium to become one of the Gunners' first names of the teamsheet. Made his England debut in October 2020 against Wales.

## 5TH MARCH 1986 LUTON TOWN 3-0 ARSENAL. FA CUP 5TH ROUND 2ND REPLAY.

With the Town enjoying their best season since returning to the top flight in 1982, the time was ripe for a good run in the FA Cup in 1985/86.

Unlike the previous year, when the run through to the semi-final was set against a backdrop of a fight against relegation, matters on the pitch were now much more stable.

The road to Wembley started with a trip to Crystal Palace of Division Two (now the Championship) on a bog of a pitch which had been made worse by tenants Charlton playing on it the day before. In a tight contest, with the pitch a great leveller, the

Hatters finally won through 2-1 with goals from Brian Stein and David Preece.

The pitch was never going to be a leveller in the next round with the artificial surface at Kenilworth Road encouraging ball control and slick passing to feet. This meant that Bristol Rovers of Division Three (now League One) did not stand a chance with the Town running out comfortable 4-0 victors.

Next up was a home tie against Arsenal which had added spice due to the fiery and ill-tempered league meeting at Highbury between the sides a few weeks before. Record receipts of £60,000 were generated by a crowd of 15,799 who saw a pulsating contest finish 2-2 in a game the Town should have won. Ricky Hill gave the Town an early

lead before Graham Rix levelled soon after. David Rocastle then put the Gunners ahead against the run of play before Mick Harford brought the score back to 2-2 six minutes from the break.

Try as they might the Hatters could not find a way through after the interval and only a magnificent block tackle by Arsenal's David O'Leary prevented Brian Stein from netting the winner.

The gloss was taken off the contest when Arsenal manager Don Howe accused the Hatters - and Mick Harford in particular - of "bludgeoning" tactics which filled the newspaper columns. Little mention was made of the injury to Brian Stein which would keep him out for several weeks.

The much-hyped replay was postponed due to the failure of the Highbury under-soil heating and when the game was eventually given the go ahead only four days remained before the quarter-finals were due to take place. In truth the replay should not have started as the Highbury pitch was treacherous and left the players slithering about on thick ice. If ever there was an advert for an artificial pitch!

No goals were scored in normal time and with extra time also remaining scoreless, the toss of a coin took the second replay back to Kenilworth Road only 48 hours later - the tie had to be fought to a finish.

Given the short notice, 13,251 still turned up at Kenilworth Road to witness the latest instalment which turned out to be another of those famous nights under the lights.

This time the Hatters were rewarded for their relentless attacking play with skipper Steve Foster opening the scoring with a half-volley on 23 minutes, Arsenal's David O'Leary putting through his own goal just after the interval and Mark Stein adding the

icing to the cake with a third ten minutes from time. Every man played to his fullest potential which gave rise to comments in the press that this was the best Luton performance since David Pleat took charge. Pleat did not disagree.

This time Don Howe, shortly to lose his job, agreed that the Town were worthy winners.

Sadly, the story does not have a happy ending as the quarter-final, against Everton, took place only three days later with another capacity crowd at Kenilworth Road witnessing a 2-2 draw with a tiring Town allowing a two-goal lead to slip. A single Gary Lineker strike settled the tie in the replay four days later at Goodison Park. 






## A HATTER AND A GUNNER

**Luton Town scout Cyril Beach recommended several Welsh youngsters to the Hatters with John Hartson another off the conveyor belt signing professional terms in December 1992.**

Scoring on his League debut at the start of the following campaign, John's precocious talents came to the fore during the famous televised win over Newcastle in the FA Cup in February 1994.

The big clubs came sniffing around and Arsenal paid a record fee for a teenager of £2.5 million for the powerful striker in 1995 and became a regular for Wales and enjoyed several big money moves in both this country and Scotland.



## 24TH APRIL 1988 LUTON TOWN 3-2 ARSENAL

While there have been many memorable games with the Gunners down the years – admittedly none for a few years – it would be remiss to not stick this one on this page.

After 103 years of trying, and in copybook fashion, the Hatters finally won a major trophy in one of the most memorable Wembley

finals of all time, lifting the League Cup in this five-goal thriller.

The Hatters lead thanks to Brian Stein's early strike but in the second period Arsenal roar back to lead 2-1.

Andy Dibble's wonderful penalty save to deny Nigel Winterburn is the turning point and instead of behind 3-1 down the Hatters level through Danny Wilson's close-range header.


In a dramatic climax, Ashley Grimes crosses for Stein to finish brilliantly with all but the last kick of the game and the Town can celebrate what many still believe to be the greatest of great games.

## CULT HERO: TONY ADAMS



## **VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD END**

**WHAT'S IT LIKE TO BE AN ARSENAL SUPPORTER THESE DAYS WHEN YOU WERE BROUGHT UP WATCHING THE INVINCIBLES? GUNNERS FANS LIAM ROWAN EXPLAINS.**

**While our visitors Arsenal go into this fixture at the top of the Premier League table, it has been almost 20 years since their last title which has included highs and lows for 28-year-old Gunners fan Liam Rowan.**



Seeing the Invincibles in his first-ever Arsenal game, a win against Fulham at Loftus Road in the penultimate game of the 2003/04 season, it has been a long wait to see his boyhood club see Premier League success again.

"I was born into supporting Arsenal," says Liam, who has a season ticket on the halfway line at Emirates Stadium. "When I grew up all of my family were fans. I would wear my older brother's kits when I was young and then at five years old, I was playing football, so I was watching Arsenal more on TV.

"My dad, brother and cousin are the main reason why. It did help that Arsenal were one of the best teams in the league when I was growing up.

"Thierry Henry was in his prime when I was young and I adored him, it helped when I was that age to follow a team when he was playing in it."

One of Liam's main memories of Arsène Wenger's Arsenal growing up was their involvement in the 2006 Champions League final and the media frenzy surrounding the fixture in the days leading up to the final with Barcelona.

"I was in year six when we were in the Champions League final, at the time it

just felt like a massive game. Getting the newspapers on the way home from school and it was all building up to that game. Even though we didn't win it, it was a highlight seeing us play on that stage."

Liam described that other special memories supporting Arsenal over the last two decades have included the multiple FA Cup successes in the last decade and triumphing in many North London derbies at Emirates Stadium.

Regarding the strong start to this season, Liam believes that Manchester City are going to be tough to beat over 38 games, but this current Arsenal side can topple the current treble winners.

"This season we need to just keep doing what we're doing, we have to stay within six points of Manchester City and be top or around the top by the end so we are in a position to capitalise if we can while trying to go as far as possible in the Champions League."

"The players we've got now are a lot better than the ones we've had for a long time. Mikel Arteta is a massive reason why we are able to believe we can hit those heights again."

"The players believe, and the fans believe. When you add that to the quality of players that we've got, then we've got a chance to be successful this season."



## « HATTERS REWIND «

**Club historian Roger Wash looks back on the life and career of former Hatter and football pioneer Bill Julian.**

In 1989 I was invited to Enfield to spend a few hours in the company of a sprightly elderly gentleman Harry Julian, then well into his 90s, who recounted tales of his father, the celebrated Bill Julian who not only was the first professional captain of (Woolwich or Royal) Arsenal but also went on to become skipper of Luton in our early days of professionalism.

Born in Boston, Lincolnshire in 1866, and one of nine children, Bill joined the local Excelsiors club at the age of 18 and while starring in a friendly game against the then amateur Royal Arsenal in 1889, which his



side won 5-2, he was invited to play for the London side on promise of work at the munitions factory.

He went on to enjoy several good seasons at Arsenal during which time he picked up six medals and became captain at the time the club embraced professionalism. His son recalled stories of Bill playing against Baden-Powell (of Boy Scout fame) and also the most famous sportsman of the day CB Fry.

Luton Town, who had started paying their players just before those of by then Woolwich Arsenal, pulled off one of football's earliest 'deals' by offering more money to Julian to entice him to Bedfordshire in 1892.

Hatters secretary Isaac Smith carried out the negotiations for this coup but also managed to convince Julian that he should continue to live in Plumstead and also work at the munitions factory where he was employed as a steam hammer operative.

Not only were Luton picking up a 'star' footballer who would adequately take the place of the recently departed 'Hod'



Paul but also no outside job or house would need to be provided.

Bill was immediately made captain and the selection committee put their trust in him to deal with tactical and disciplinary aspects straight away. He was also encouraged to find out if any of the professionals at Arsenal, who now had a squad bloated by expensive Scottish imports, would fancy a trial at Luton. Tapping up is not new!

Julian had two seasons at Luton during which time, alongside such players as Arthur Taylor and Hugh Galbraith, the Town boasted one of the strongest sides in the south as confirmed by their 1-0 FA Cup win at Wembley Park against Old Westminsters in 1893. It was reported that after this great victory the triumphant team was greeted by a massive crowd of well wishers at Luton railway station.

Unfortunately, the ploy of Isaac Smith in saving money at Julian's expense rebounded when, after travelling 2,604 miles to play for Luton in season 1893/94 and also learning that the likes of Hugh Galbraith were on higher wages, the stalwart half-back asked for a transfer and accepted a move back to London to play for Tottenham.

After spells at Dartford and Shepherds Bush, Bill uprooted his family and spent six successful years coaching Haarlem FC in Holland and then watching as his son (Harry's brother Joe was also confusingly known as 'Bill') coached Roermondache to the Dutch championship on two occasions.

Bill senior moved back to England and worked at RSAF (Royal Small Arms Factory) in Enfield Lock before retiring, remaining in Enfield for the rest of his life. On his golden wedding anniversary in 1938 he appeared on the popular radio programme 'In Town Tonight' where he spoke of his life in football. The telegram sent by Luton Town on this occasion was among his son's mementoes.

Bill passed away in Enfield in 1957 at the age of 89.

The photo of Bill in his Luton Town strip in 1892 on this page reputedly hung in the 'marble halls' of Highbury – minus the iconic eight-pointed star Luton badge!

## WHO?

The reigning treble winners, Manchester City, are our next visitors to Kenilworth Road. Pep Guardiola's side swept all before them last season, winning Premier League, FA Cup and, for the first time in their history, the Champions League. This season they are aiming to make history by becoming the first team in English football to become champions four times in a row. They first won the Premier League in 2011/12 (Aguero and all that), their first championship since 1967/68.

## KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

The Town meet City at Kenilworth Road for the first time since a 1-1 draw in November 1998 with Gary Doherty scoring the Hatters goal. The Town are unbeaten in their last eight meetings between the two sides on Bedfordshire soil having won four and drawn, the last victory coming courtesy of a 3-1 League Cup triumph in November 1988. Overall, the record at the Kenny against City is 11 wins from 25. City have won six of those, but you have to go back to September 1980 for our visitors' last success here: a 2-1 win.

## THE CITY OF TODAY

Guardiola's side have begun the season in which they hope to make history in good form, but face competition for the Premier League crown with a number of sides this term. City began the campaign with six successive victories but have since won three of their last seven games prior to Saturday's game with Tottenham. Away from the Etihad, they have taken four points from a possible 12 in their last four trips on the road, losing at Wolves and Arsenal, beating Manchester United and drawing 4-4 at Chelsea.

## WATCH OUT FOR

All eyes will be on Erling Haaland as the Norway striker makes his first appearance at Kenilworth Road. The 23-year-old enjoyed a remarkable first season at the Etihad, scoring 52 goals in 53 matches in all competitions as City won the treble. He's already the leading scorer in the Premier League this time around with his career tally a mind-boggling 226 goals in 272 games. He started his career in Norway with spells at Bryne and Molde, before moving to Red Bull Salzburg in Austria. From there, a move to Borussia Dortmund saw his stock rise further before a £51m move to City in the summer of 2022.



# ON THIS DAY

## 5TH DECEMBER



### CLASSIC MATCH!

**TOWN 2-1 SHEFFIELD UNITED  
5TH DECEMBER 1970**

A top-of-the-table four-pointer sees the Town hold on to beat a Sheffield United side unbeaten in their last 16 league matches.

Striker Malcolm Macdonald put the Hatters in front and it was 2-0 when Jimmy Ryan doubled the Town's lead to send the majority of 20,000 crowd into raptures. Tony Currie reduces the Town's two-goal advantage from the spot after Jack Bannister trips Billy Dearden, and the Blades pressurise until the final whistle – but the Town hold on.

## THE RECORD

Overall, Hatters teams from the past have come out winners more times than they have lost over the years – especially in the years between 1891 and 1970!

The Town won three of their first four and won in total seven of their first 11 matches played on 5th December but in the past eight games, Hatters teams have just won once, and that came against West Ham's kids in a Checkatrade Trophy tie in 2017.

In that first match in 1891, Clifton were beaten 3-0 in an FA Cup fourth qualifying round tie and 12 years later, Arsenal's London rivals Spurs were beaten at our old Dunstable Road ground in 1903 in the Southern League.

Another FA Cup win came on this day against Oxford City in 1914, and it wasn't until 1936 that the Town won their first Football League match played on 5th December when Aldershot were beaten 3-2 in Division Three (South) with Joe Payne scoring one of the Town's goals.

We had to wait on tenterhooks for our next game on this day – 17 years to be exact – when Bury were beaten 3-2 before a crowd of over 15,000 in 1953 with record appearance holder Bob Morton and record goalscorer Gordon Turner scoring two of the Town's goals.

Three years later, in what was the first match the Town had played on this date in the top division, the Hatters shared six goals against Leicester at Filbert Street.

The next win would come in an FA Cup tie against Gillingham in 1964, a Gordon Riddick goal giving the Town a 1-0 victory at Kenilworth Road.

Sheffield United were then seen off here in 1970 – more on that to the left – and then the wait for glory again on 5th December had to wait until the game against West Ham in 2017.


Among some of the games that saw the Town lose, included an infamous FA Cup defeat at home to Hull in 1998. The Tigers were bottom of the Football League at the time but headed back to Humberside with a 2-1 win, even despite a brilliant solo goal from the Hatters' Steve Davis.

# CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS YOU'LL NEVER SING THAT!

HE HOLDS A CLUB RECORD FOR THE MOST CLEAN SHEETS FOR A GOALKEEPER IN A SINGLE SEASON AND HE ADMITS HE ENJOY HAVING BARELY HAD ANYTHING TO DO BUT WATCH SOME GREAT FOOTBALL IN FRONT OF HIM AS THE TOWN WON THE CONFERENCE IN 2013/14. THERE IS, OF COURSE, ONLY ONE MARK TYLER.



**“I’m not being horrible,” Mark Tyler says, honestly, seriously, “but I didn’t want to come the season the club had points deductions.”**

To be fair, who could blame him? The Hatters, unjustly on their way out of the league, were not the most appetising of propositions in the summer of 2008.

However, a year passed. Still out of favour at boyhood club Peterborough – where he was given his debut by a certain John Still at the age of 17 – the lure of Luton was eventually too hard to turn down once Mick Harford (there’s a legendary theme here already) picked up the phone again 12 months later.

It was at that point that the love affair started. 297 appearances across the best part of seven years and, in 2013/14, that success that everybody connected with the club craved: promotion back to Football League.

As we all know, from the point Tyler signed to finally achieving that aim... took a little time, let’s say. There were highs, lows, missed penalties and offside goals. Life for the goalkeeper at Kenilworth Road was never straightforward.

“I’d always been a number one and that’s the main reason why I came to Luton,” says Tyler, who left Peterborough as goalkeeping coach this summer and is now helping a friend’s landscape gardening business. It’s the first time in 30 years he’s had his weekends free. “It’s nice,” he says.

“Yes, Luton were in the Conference,” he continues. “But they were a big club in that

league, and we expected to come straight back up that year. The squad we had was a great one and we underachieved.

“The main reason now for joining was the atmosphere, though. Playing at the Kenny most weeks in front of the crowd was amazing. The crowd were right on top of you, it was a small pitch, as an away player it was always noisy for just 10,000; it was intimidating, it was the main reason for joining to experience that as a home player.

“I expected us to go up with the squad we had, but football’s a funny old game. We were a big fish in that league and everyone wanted to beat us. The York semi-final in that first season was a killer.”

The next two seasons saw the Town suffer back-to-back heartache in the finals, losing firstly to AFC Wimbledon and then to old foes York again.

However, despite the agony, Tyler wasn’t going anywhere.

“The Wimbledon final was frustrating because we played them three times and didn’t concede a goal. We had chances in the game and we played okay. But it was gut-wrenching. We took a lot of fans, as always, but I didn’t watch them lift the trophy, I was straight into the dressing room. I was like ‘get me out of here’.

“I still wanted to be there, I wanted to get Luton back into the Football League.

“As for York... This is where you need VAR! It was such a clear offside. I think for games like this, for such a big game, you should have a Football League referee. It was annoying because we started so well. Andre scored after three minutes and they scored ➤

a good goal. I don't know what they couldn't see it. He was four yards in front of me. We all went to the linesman but he said, 'no, it's onside'. But that's football – you have to deal with these situations.

"But I absolutely had no intention of leaving after that. The great thing about that game was coming out of the tunnel, it was a sea of orange, the fans were unreal. It was heartbreaking to lose again but the 30,000 fans were immense... why would you want to leave?

"I always played with my heart on my sleeve. I'm not big headed with what I've done in my career. Yes, I've had some good games, I don't boast. My job was to keep the ball out the net. I had seven great years and wouldn't change it for the world. I probably played my best football there, I loved it."

The 2012/13 season saw the Hatters record their worst-ever finish in non-league, however, for Tyler the history-making victory over Norwich will live long in the memory with his family and friends there to witness the 1-0 win.

Manager Paul Buckle's tenure would come to an end only a few months after that epic

triumph, and it would be that man Still who would pick up the reins. It was an appointment that would go on to become a significant part of turning around the club's fortunes.

"John gave me my debut at Peterborough; he'd won the Conference so many times, he knew how to do it," says. "Fans perhaps didn't like his style early on, but it was effective. Andre Gray didn't start the first 10 games but still got 30 goals. It was an incredible season. We knew we were going to win every game, and never looked like losing.

"The stand out for me was Hereford away, we drew 0-0. It wasn't great, but Andre cleared two off the line. He did his job. It was little things like that. For me it was relaxing, we knew we'd score goals and we knew we could keep clean sheets. Steve McNulty was the best centre-back I'd ever played with. Ronnie Henry, the captain, the Barnet game will always stick out. It was the coldest game ever.

"The thing we were missing in previous seasons was consistency. Once we got on a roll there was no stopping us. John Still did such a good job to get us together as a ➤

unit but he gave us the feeling we weren't going to lose. After the first 15 games we got into our stride, we got on our roll, and taking draws like we did at Hereford, kept us going and believing."

The Town kept a record 23 clean sheets that season – exactly half of the season – with the final one coming on the last day of the campaign at Hyde.

"John came to me, Macca and Scotty [Griffiths]. We were the three players that had played every game that season and asked us if we wanted to play in the last one.

"He knew what I was like. I wanted to play last game. Keep a clean sheet and break the record which we did and it was a proud moment.

"But that season was great. I was loving it. Some of the games, I'd come home and Cindy, my wife, would ask 'how did you get on?' I was like 'I didn't have much to do, but I watched a really nice game of football!'

"Everyone asked me whether or not I enjoyed being busy but it was a pleasure to watch the guys that season – some of the goals we scored were unreal."

Having played every minute of the season as the Town went up as champions, he played 31 times in the Football League the following campaign but after 27 games in 2015/16, Tyler's time at Kenilworth Road came to an end.

"Unfortunately I got injured in Nathan Jones' first match in charge and then I knew at that time that Peterborough wanted me back as a player/coach and it was the right decision at the time," he says

"I didn't want to keep playing and getting injured. Nathan then took the club to a different level, got them promoted, then he left and Mick took over and now Rob's come in and done a great job and hopefully everyone will stick together and help the club stay in the Premier League."

Nine years after being a part of the Town side that won the first, arguably hardest, promotion, Tyler watched on proudly as the Hatters were promoted to the top-flight at Wembley last May.


"I remember watching the play-off final and when Joe Taylor scored, thinking 'wow' – then for him to step up in the shootout was brilliant. But I was so pleased for the directors, Gary, David, Mike, they had been through the mill and stuck with it and got their rewards.

"It's brilliant. It's great seeing them in the Premier League.

"The greatest news is Pelly. It's great to see, we knew he had quality, he was too good for each league.

"He got brought down a peg or two when he came in but he's full of life, he's an enthusiastic person, a great footballer and he deserves every success and long may it continue."

# A-Z THE NON-LEAGUE YEARS

**HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR  
OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS**

## Part Seven - G is for Gateshead, Grays and Grimsby.

**Grays Athletic** were in trouble on and off the pitch when we met them in 2009/10. We knew we were in non-League when travelling to Bridge Road where one side of the ground was built into a block of flats. We won 2-0 that day and followed it up with a 6-0 home victory, with Kevin Gallen bagging a hat-trick, before they resigned from the Conference and ended up in the Isthmian League Division One North the following season.

**Grimsby Town** are, of course, old adversaries going back to our ill-fated stay in the Football League back in Victorian times. We met the Mariners in all but our first season in non-League when our record can be described as mixed.

We didn't lose at home but drew three of the four games, while at Blundell Park we suffered a heavy 4-1 defeat in 2012/13 but won through a single Tommy Wright (remember him?) goal the previous season.

I think that all the Luton supporters present at our 2-1 win at Blundell Park in March 2014 knew finally that we were about to step back to the Football League after five years away. And so it proved when you work the matches back – given the points difference at the end of the season, the win at Grimsby was the one that effectively secured promotion.



At the Gateshead International Stadium, which was basically an athletics track with a football pitch in the middle, our record was less impressive. Our first visit was in January 2010 where the hardy souls from Luton froze to death out in the open and could hardly raise a cheer when an own goal from Heed goalkeeper Paul Farman settled the game. At least we could see the bright lights of St James' Park, Newcastle twinkling in the distance!

Arguably our worst result in non-League came against Gateshead. In April 2013 we travelled to Carlisle, where Gateshead were playing their home games because of a sub-standard pitch at the International Stadium, and went down 5-1 in front of a crowd of 382 – the lowest for a competitive match in our history. Results like this make the upward trajectory of the Town that much sweeter.

## NEW FACES AT THE COMMUNITY TRUST

**Two of the latest recruits for Luton Town FC Community Trust are Hafizul and Naheed. Both are 18 years of age and first came to us as participants on our Premier League Kicks programme.**

Premier League Kicks offers young people the opportunity to take part in free, structured football sessions in the evenings across the town, but also aims to deliver vital life skills workshops to participants as well as boosting employment opportunities.

Both Hafizul and Naheed showed an excellent level of maturity and expressed an interest in developing their skills as coaches. Through the Community Trust

the pair undertook their FA Level 1 in Football Coaching and benefited from being mentored by our coaches.

All the training was provided free of charge with the hope that they could work for us, but knowing that it would improve their all-round employment prospects.

Both have been keen to work across numerous different projects to ensure a broad range of experiences. They started by working on Premier League Kicks, but then moved on very quickly to leading their own groups on our holiday camps.

Most recently the pair have taken on leading our Mini Hatters sessions for 3-5 year olds, and are doing an excellent job. They're clearly enjoying themselves too.

Hafizul said: "I have two favourite moments, one is the first Premier League Kicks session I ever worked at because all of the participants that knew me were surprised to see me in the Luton Town FC tracksuit, and I remember one participant was asking the other coaches if he could have a job too.

"The other experience was working on summer camps, because I got on very well with all of the kids. It was very fun and rewarding to see the kids enjoying themselves. My ambition within the trust is to continue working and take on more projects and keep growing as a coach."

Community Trust Business Development Manager, Adam Woulds, has been delighted with the progress both have made so quickly into their careers.

He said: "Hafizul and Naheed are great role models. There is nothing more satisfying than seeing the journey of an individual from participant into member of staff.

"They're both setting such a great example to other Premier Leagues Kicks participants, who can now see there is a potential route into employment for those that show the right attitude and desire. Both of them have made such a great start to working with

us and have the potential to become excellent coaches if that's the route they choose to follow.

"They're becoming such confident, well round individuals and great communicators, so I'm sure they'll succeed in whichever path they take."

Both Hafizul and Naheed are Hatters fans and live just a stone's throw from Kenilworth Road, so the performances on the pitch in the last few years have been a joy to watch, with Naheed reminiscing over last season's dramatic ending.

"My fondest memories of watching the club was the journey to the play-off final. Each match played, made me excited for the next one," said Naheed.

"The challenge was of mountain level, but I still had faith in them. The greatest memory I have is the final and the atmosphere. I was watching the match and it was an indescribable feeling.

"As the match finished with a neck and neck penalty shootout, and Luton won, I never felt such a feeling before and that's all been given to me by this club."

Naheed also had some great advice for other young people interested in getting involved in coaching.

"As someone who is not technically gifted in the sport, and who never got many opportunities, it is easy to assume that the dream to take football on was dying out for me.

"When the chance and idea of becoming a coach came up, it felt like a second chance but in a different way than I imagined. Never give up on that dream and do not hesitate to become a coach. I would not have this journey any other way. That, is what I am truly grateful for."



# ACADEMY UPDATE

## WITH HEAD OF ACADEMY SPORTS SCIENCE DANIEL TAYLOR

**Players in the Premier League are strong and quick, the games fast and intense. The physical demands of an elite player are continually growing and that is the setting in which our first team now tests itself on a weekly basis.**


Therein lies the test for the Academy – to produce players who are capable of not only coping with those demands, but able to excel within them.

In our pursuit of reaching those levels the Academy Sport Science programme consists of two arms – the integrated programme and the support programme.

The integrated programme is where we work with coaching staff to try and incorporate physical development within football sessions. How better to maximise time spent with players than improving our player's physical capabilities while also working on technical or tactical aspects? This involves discussing drill types, player numbers, pitch sizes etc. to try and hit different physical qualities. For example, is it a small area day where we want players to work with really high, but shorter bursts of intensity, such as 3v3 small sided games, or is it a bigger area day where we want players to show they can maintain intensity over longer periods of time, such as 11v11 tactical work?

We then have our support programme which is the physical work we do on top of the football. Before our under-18 and 21 players even hit the pitch this work begins with 'activations,' a 15-minute session in which we work on a different topic each day, whether that be running mechanics for more efficient sprinting, plyometrics to improve power or footwork to get players sharp ahead of match day. Pitch sessions then start with a warmup again with a different theme dependant on the day including our max speed days where the boys vie for the title of 'Speed King.' Post sessions it is into the gym to develop strength and power.

Player progress is tracked continually. In the under-18 and 21s, daily wellbeing questionnaires are completed to give insight into their readiness for the training ahead. GPS units are worn for every session or match to monitor what they have done. Who worked hard? Who can work harder?! It also allows us to analyse and reflect on our sessions. Did it hit the physical targets that we set? Does it prepare them for the demands of matches and the first team? What can we do better next time? Through the season we fitness test the players for power, strength, speed, change of direction and aerobic capacity (the dreaded 1km time trial). This all gives us a picture of the players' development and what they need to improve, but also provides us with feedback as to the success of the programme.

This support filters down to our schoolboy programme (under-9-16s), with all age groups fitness tested and the under-12s-16s receiving direct sport science sessions through the week. The aim is to increase the level of the players before they come into the full-time programme, then we can push those players who progress to even greater heights.

Jared Roberts-Smith and the first team sport science department have done a brilliant job of ensuring the first team have been prepared for the increasing demands they have faced this season and are continually pushing to get even better.

In the Academy the challenge is to try and keep up with that progress. It has been great to see several squad appearances from Academy players, but we want more. Staffing is increasing – Ria Tailor has joined this season as Academy Sport Science Intern and Oliver Jones has recently joined as Assistant Academy Sport Scientist to provide greater support for our schoolboy age groups – and we are always looking at ways we can continue to develop our programme.

As an Academy we keep pushing to get better, in the sport science department the key focus is how do we make our players fitter, faster and stronger.

**The Hatters and the Premier League and its clubs are celebrating Stonewall's Rainbow Laces campaign at all fixtures between 2 and 7 December, demonstrating their ongoing support for LGBTQ+ inclusion.**

This provides an opportunity to focus on the year-round equality and inclusion work that takes place, as the League and clubs use their platforms to encourage discussion and demonstrate allyship.

Together with the support of the Luton Town Supporters' Trust, 200 rainbow laces will be distributed to fans this evening.

This year marks the 10th anniversary of Rainbow Laces, with the theme of 'Let's Lace Up to Keep It Up'.

During the campaign window, rainbow armbands will be worn by captains across all 20 games, with Rainbow Laces branding also widely visible within stadiums throughout the period.

To support the ten-year anniversary of the Rainbow Laces campaign, the League has launched a new free educational resource, which is being made available to more than 18,900 schools through the Premier League Primary Stars programme. 'Rainbow Laces – Stand in someone else's shoes' gives students the opportunity to talk about the importance of LGBTQ+ inclusion in sport and beyond.

Pupils will learn about the Rainbow Laces campaign, how to be an ally, and then demonstrate active allyship to the LGBTQ+ community, as well as looking at the history of football's involvement with Rainbow Laces.

The Premier League also provides resources to engage young people on topics such as building stronger communities free from



homophobic, transphobic and biphobic language. These sessions are delivered by clubs in their communities through the Premier League Kicks and Inspires programmes.

The Premier League Fans Fund provides grants to clubs across the Premier League, EFL, National League, FA Women's Super League and Women's Championship to support a range of fan-focused projects. This is focused on schemes for diverse communities, including LGBTQ+ communities.

Clubs undertake a wide variety of projects and initiatives to ensure equality and inclusion are central to all areas of their operations. Through the Premier League Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Standard (PLEDIS), the League supports all 20 Premier League clubs, and a number of EFL clubs, to embed effective and meaningful policy and practices to build a culture in which LGBTQ+ people feel that they belong. This includes providing staff training and encouraging strong, visible leadership on LGBTQ+ themes.

The League continues to work with clubs to promote the reporting mechanisms that are in place for incidents of discrimination, within stadia and online. Fans who experience or witness discrimination while at a Premier League match should contact the nearest steward or police officer, or report it by using clubs' confidential text services.

Fans can also report online discriminatory abuse they see targeted at Premier League players, managers, coaches, match officials and their families directly at [www.premierleague.com/reportracism](http://www.premierleague.com/reportracism). Each incident will be investigated by the League's dedicated reporting team.

## LUTON TOWN LADIES REACH THIRD ROUND OF THE FA CUP AFTER EIGHT- GOAL THRILLER

Luton Town ladies have progressed to the third round of the FA Cup after defeating Enfield Town Ladies last weekend

Manager Rob Burton made three changes from the convincing 3-0 win last time out against Haringey Borough.

Enfield started on the front foot, dictating the play for a majority of the first half. They had an early chance four minutes in, which flew high over the crossbar.

The pressure continued to build as Enfield had a succession of corners, which was eventually halted by Amy Butler who caught the ball well.

It was then time for Luton to hit back after a superb bit of play from Shanice Lewis, who gets the ball to Amber Pearson, but her low driven shot flew wide of the post.

After half-an-hour everyone in the ground thought the Town had an opener. An inswinging corner from Fiona Buttigieg narrowly missed the top corner of the Enfield goal.

After a slow start to the game, the Hatters wanted to make an instant impact in the second half. Not even 60 seconds were on the clock when the Town had a penalty after Gabriella Spillman was clipped just inside the area. With all the pressure on her, Jess McKay converted her penalty and Luton led.

The joy was short lived, however, as five minutes later, Enfield equalised after a well worked set piece saw a shot squeeze home at the near post.

Quite remarkably, one minute after the equal-



iser, the Hatters were back in front through McKay again. Pearson sent a magnificent ball over the top and McKay finished brilliantly.

The Town looked to finish the game off quick as, within minutes of the second goal, they had a third through Spillman. Samira Khan's great headed flick found Lewis, who burst down the right hand side to send a ball towards Spillman who tucked away.

With an hour played, Luton had four. Khan got her second in as many games, lobbing the goalkeeper with a fine header.

With 15 minutes left to play, Enfield received a life-line to make the score 4-2 before pulling another one back, scoring directly from a free-kick, leaving the Town to hang on to a one-goal lead for the final five minutes.

There was even more drama at the end as Enfield were reduced to ten players after a dangerous foul on Leyah Maddix, but the referee opted for a second yellow, rather than a straight red card.

With a player advantage the Town made the game safe when Buttigieg struck to seal a victory and a place in the third round of the FA Cup where they will where they will face either Bristol Rovers or Keynsham Town at home.

# MEET THE FANS

## WITH TOWN SUPPORTER DAN BARRATT-DAVIS

### How long have you supported Luton for?

Since my dad took me to my first game aged nine in 1994 for the opening game against West Bromwich Albion. We drew 1-1.

### Where do you sit at home matches?

I sit in the main stand enclosure, having sat in Main stand Block F for a number of years, I wanted less stairs and a better view!

### Who is your all-time favourite player and why?

For me Steve Davis, purely because as a kid to me a goalscoring centre-back was unheard of and I felt he was a brilliant and consistent defender who led the side well even if we weren't as good back then.

### What does it mean to you to be a Luton fan?

I was hooked from the moment I entered the ground as a young nine-year-old, it's everything. Having moved from the area back in 1999 when I was 14, it only fuelled the passion, as well as one or two things that have happened to the club since. Most importantly it is a family club, and one that is brilliantly run.

### What are your favourite memories of being a Luton fan?

There has been a lot! Beating Leicester away in 2005 was particularly good as my dad was in the home end with my siblings when Ahmet Brkovic scored that overhead kick. The Johnstone's Paint Trophy win, given everything that was against us, meant it was a proper Luton win. Promotion to the Premier League was an out of body experience bettered only by the birth of my son.



### How has your support of Luton been seen by your friends (did they make fun of little old Luton etc.)?

I live in Coventry and before that I've lived in Lincolnshire and Towcester so I'm used to being teased about it! They have all gone quiet now though!

### Has it changed now that we are in the Premier League compared to say the Conference?

Most are very complimentary about the last few years, I think we are respected a lot more, though I still hear about the Oak Road entrance almost daily. Most modern fans would class the Kenny as a Conference ground which makes them look silly.

What were your feelings when you saw Luton walk out in the Premier League for the first time?

Pride, given the years of torture we've had through the Kohler years of being skint, to going out of the league, to coming back up and achieving what many said was the impossible dream. I didn't think I could be more proud to be a Hatter until it sunk in that we are in the big time.

### How do the experiences of seeing Luton in the Premier League compare with the lower leagues?

It's different, I found lower league fans would talk more and certainly more respectful than some Premier League opposition we've had so far. The football is different in many ways and the grounds are obviously noticeably different. The atmosphere at some grounds in the home ends this season have been rubbish in comparison to some lower league away days.

### What are you most looking forward to for the rest of the season?

Continuing the experience of being a Premier League club, we've shown already we can mix it with the big boys and I remain cautiously optimistic we can stay in this division. I'm also aiming to tick off a few more grounds this year too.

# Premier League

## ROUND-UP

**Our visitors tonight arrive at Kenilworth Road on top of the Premier League table after a dramatic weekend of matches.**

Mikel Arteta's side were made to sweat late on, but got the job done against Wolves to continue their recent good form which has seen them win four of their last five games.

Headlines were made on Sunday as 24 goals were scored across the five games, with the Gunners' title rivals Manchester City dropping points late on in a six-goal thriller against Spurs.

Tottenham led only for City to lead 2-1 and 3-2 before a late Dejan Kulusevski header earned Ange Postegoglu's side a point. Pep Guardiola's Citizens, who visit Kenilworth Road on Sunday, sit third in the table, three points behind the Gunners. Spurs lie fifth, six points away from their North London rivals.

Liverpool's game with Fulham saw seven goals, with Jurgen Klopp's Reds coming out on top in a ding-dong affair at Anfield. With three minutes left, the Londoners led 3-2 but late goals from Wataru Endo and Trent Alexander-Arnold sealed a dramatic victory. Klopp's side are now two points off the top.



Aston Villa sit in fourth place after they earned a late point at Bournemouth thanks to Ollie Watkins' last-minute equaliser in a 2-2 draw.

Sunday's goalfest also included Chelsea's thrilling 3-2 win over Brighton made more remarkable by the fact the Blues played the entire second half with ten men following the dismissal of Conor Gallagher.

West Ham drew 1-1 with Crystal Palace in Sunday's other game, while on Saturday Newcastle saw off Manchester United 1-0 thanks to Anthony Gordon's strike early in the second half.

At the other end of the table, Burnley celebrated their first home Premier League win of the season, dismantling fellow strugglers Sheffield United 5-0 at Turf Moor.

Everton, also in the bottom three, earned an important three points with a 1-0 win at Nottingham Forest. The Toffees and Clarets both closed the gap on the Hatters, who sit just outside the relegation zone, to two points.
