

So he's in good spirits and joking in typical Locks fashion. He's recovering steadily, which is massively important and great to see. We miss him around the place at the moment, but he's always with us.

This afternoon's test against Chelsea will be tough. It promises to be a cracking game and I know this place is going to be rocking. The atmosphere at games here have been unbelievable - please keep it up.

We have improved a lot since the last time we played them, back in August, in what was only our second game of the season. A lot has changed since then and we are really looking forward to this challenge against a talented Chelsea team.

I hope you all enjoy today's game as we look to round off 2023 on a winning note. It's been a special year for us and we want to finish it in style. We'll keep fighting to the very last whistle, so get behind us and bring the noise. 🏆

It was an emotionally-charged 1-0 win over Newcastle last time out at Kenilworth Road with Town skipper Tom Lockyer appreciated in the fourth minute from fans of both clubs – and then again at the final whistle.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN
DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone and a very warm welcome to Kenilworth Road for this final game of 2023.

What a year it's been!

At this time last year we were half-way up (or down) the Championship table in a stadium, which would not be up to the requirements of Premier League broadcasters, however, over the next four months we climbed into the play-off places finishing third. We beat Sunderland over two passionate legs to earn our place at Wembley where in an enthralling, but unbearably tense encounter we beat Coventry on penalties. Within minutes of promotion our wonderful management and staff then set to work to satisfy the Premier League and media requirements by upgrading the Kenny at significant expense in record time.

We are now genuinely competing in the best league in the world. We began as an underdog and were patronised and treated as unworthy by pundits and so-called experts, but as time has gone by, we have gained some respect and have started to get noticed. The Premier League is vastly different to what we have been used to over the past 15 years, but I'm sure you will join me in taking your hats off to our man-

ager, his staff and the whole playing squad for the way they are adapting and improving.

I must give a special mention to Tom Lockyer, who has played a major part both as captain and player in helping our dreams become reality. He is our warrior. We were all devastated by his cardiac arrest at Bournemouth, a day that will live in our memories forever. He is a part of us and, as Carlton Morris said in his interview at Sheffield, "he was with us in spirit".

We all thank you Tom for your past efforts and wish you well in your recovery and hope for the future.

We are under no illusions about the task ahead, but as a lifelong fan it is wonderful to see how much the players are enjoying their football and how connected we all are. As Eric Morecambe might have said "you can't see the join". Long may it continue.

Today we play host to Chelsea, the first side for the second time this season and this game sees the completion of the first half of the season. To think it's only three years ago that we were drawn against each other in the fourth round of the FA Cup in what would prove to be Frank Lampard's last game.





We were in lockdown and the limited few who were allowed in were deeply saddened that our fans were excluded from being able to watch us pit our wits against a Premier League club. We certainly didn't expect then that we would be hosting them at the Kenny in a league match within a few years. Today that is a magnificent reality.

Our recent performances have been terrific, and with a bit of luck we could have had more from the likes of Liverpool, Arsenal and Manchester City. Maybe luck does level out, but it hasn't yet – except for a couple of forced own goals at Bramall Lane maybe.

We continue to get experience of the ways of the Premier League and Gary, in particular, has been able to give the benefit of our knowledge of all levels

at the top of the pyramid. The New Deal for Football is high on the agenda. With 92 league clubs and those in the National League and below, it is an impossible task to make everyone happy and difficult to find acceptable compromises, but with goodwill and common sense we are sure a way will be found.

On a serious note, I need to reiterate the message elsewhere in this programme to all our fans.

“Please sing BUT if you don't know what you're singing, don't sing it.”


That's our message to all fans ahead of today's game and any and every future game.

Everyone matters to us and we will not tolerate discrimination of any kind.

Because of past offences we are in the spotlight. Remember that the eyes of the world are watching because of the media coverage of the Premier League.

Looking to the future, if we really want football to continue to be called the 'Beautiful Game', it's not simply about skill on the pitch: it is to completely eradicate the ugliness of prejudice of all kinds and specifically colour, creed and sexuality.

IF YOU DON'T KNOW WHAT YOU'RE SINGING, DON'T SING IT.

Please sing BUT, *if you don't know what you're singing, don't sing it!*

That's our message to all Hatters fans ahead of today's game against Chelsea.

As always, we want you to sing your hearts out for the lads but, should there be any songs you don't know the words to, please don't join in – if you do, you might, unintentionally, be singing something that could lead to a heavy Club fine, a potential ban from Kenilworth Road or even facing criminal charges.

We don't need to remind supporters that our opening Premier League match of the season at Brighton led to the Club being fined £120,000 by the FA following a charge of abusive, offensive, homophobic and discriminatory chanting for singing 'Chelsea Rent Boy' and were asked to identify individuals guilty of chanting songs that were deemed offensive.

It's not just our finances that are affected but also the Club's reputation. As an inclusive, family-oriented Club we pride ourselves for the work we have done with the local community and supporters' groups in recent seasons. This also includes helping form the Rainbow Hatters, the supporters' group for members of the LGBTQ+ community, who meet regularly to share their experiences of watching the Hatters.

Recently toughened hate crime laws have led all Clubs to more strictly monitor, persuade and control behaviour to avoid leading to any individuals and, therefore their club, from being heavily penalised for a moment's thoughtlessness.

With the eyes of the world now upon us, and after the charges brought against us so far this season, we have never been under more scrutiny from the footballing and safety authorities, so we are politely asking you to think before you sing.

Singing the same homophobic chant, for example, at Saturday's game will therefore land us an even bigger fine, will bring unsavoury media attention to yourself and the Club and, if you're identified, it will potentially result in you losing your seat and a criminal record.

So, please sing, but if you're in any doubt, *if you don't know what you're singing, don't sing it!*



COURAGEOUS TOWN WIN IT FOR LOCKS

“4 Locks” read the shirt the Town players sported in the warm-up to this game and come the final whistle the captain’s shirt was paraded around Kenilworth Road by his jubilant teammates who strained every sinew, chased every ball and battled and blocked their way to one of the most powerful and poignant 1-0 wins Kenilworth Road has ever seen.

From the off the Town were at it even before the fourth minute applause for the captain. Elijah Adebayo and Jacob Brown giving the Magpies defence an early indication of the battling qualities the Hatters would keep up for the remainder of the contest.

While the Town were still on the front-foot, Newcastle sensed that one moment of quality could unlock the Hatters defence. On 20 minutes the Hatters had Thomas Kaminski to thank for a wonderful reflex stop to deny Callum Wilson’s close-range header with the goal at the striker’s mercy.

Undeterred by the Magpies’ attacking threat, the Town remained focused and on 25 minutes the Kenny was bouncing when Andros Townsend put Rob Edwards’ side ahead. Alfie Doughty’s left-wing corner was flicked on by Ross Barkley and Townsend ghosted in at the back-post to guide a measured header home for his first goal in Luton colours. The noise was deafening and the players celebrated by holding aloft Locks’ shirt in tribute.


Ahead, the Hatters wasted no time in trying to put daylight between themselves and their visitors, and on 33 minutes, Kenilworth Road gasped in awe as Barkley thundered a shot from distance off the crossbar before he then set-up Adebayo who brought a fine save from Martin Dubravka.

In front of the break, the Town knew a second was vital in order to keep the visitors at bay, and Brown was inches away from doubling the lead only for his left foot shot hammer against Dubravka’s crossbar.

Having hit the woodwork twice you could have been forgiven for thinking this might not be the Town’s day. The Hatters survived a barrage of Magpies attacks and a VAR check just after the hour rightfully chalked off an Alexander Isak strike as Eddie Howe’s side hunted the elusive leveller.

It was helter-skelter stuff at time in the closing stages. Blocks on the line, headers away from corners all contrived to frustrate the Magpies.

We’d been here before. Liverpool. Arsenal. Games against the big boys where last-gasp sucker-punches had left us hurting. It would not be the case this time.  15






THAT'S FOR YOU, LOCKS - TOWNSEND

Andros Townsend dedicated his first goal for Luton Town and the win over former club Newcastle United to captain Tom Lockyer.

Townsend's 25th-minute header sealed all three points on an emotional afternoon at Kenilworth Road, and he said afterwards: "I'm extremely happy. First and foremost, that's for the captain – it's for Tom.

"He's put his body, he's put his life on the line for this club on many occasions, so that win was for him, and it was huge relief because we've been there before, and we've let leads slip in the last minute, the last second, the last kick of the game.

"So it was nice to see one through for the fans, for Tom, for everyone connected with Luton Town. It was just amazing to get the three points."

Asked how the week has been for the squad since their team-mate suffered a cardiac arrest on the pitch at Bournemouth a week ago, Townsend said: "It's been tough. Everyone deals with it differently. In a way, it took the pressure off. You realise there are bigger things than football.

"There wasn't much tactical work throughout the week. Normally we work tirelessly on our tactics, but it was about 'Boys, go and do it for your captain', and pretty much that was it. It's been a tough week, but when you

get three points at the end of it, it makes it all the sweeter."

The former England winger's goal was just the second header of his career to find the back of the net.

"Oh man, I was delighted," he replied. "Everyone was expecting the trademark one from outside the box. I hit one over the roof five minutes earlier, but listen, I don't think I've scored in a couple of years in the Premier League. It's been a long road back to where I am now, so I'll take a header, I'll take it off my backside; any way to get a goal to help this team get three points."



On his return to top Premier League form, the former Tottenham, Crystal Palace and Everton man added: "I think the real moment was the assist against Man City. I got a bit emotional after that one at half-time because it's been a long road back, and people telling 'You can't do it any more, your legs have gone, blah, blah, blah'.

"To get an assist against the treble winners, it really was the moment that it all hit me. But I want to score goals, I want to be on the score-sheet, I want to be contributing, so a goal is just another milestone like the assist was, and I'm looking to get better.

"I feel I'm getting sharper with every game I'm playing. I'm better, I'm sharper, I'm more reliable on the ball, I'm getting crosses into the box. I'm 32 years of age, but I'm only going to get better the more time I'm getting on the pitch." 🥰

HATTERS MAKE HISTORY - BUT BRIGHTON TAKE THE POINTS

Ahead at half-time. Behind on 69 minutes. In front again with eight minutes to go. The Hatters' Premier League journey so far has seen some wonderful moments so far.

These precious three points might not have had the allure of Everton, Palace or Newcastle but the resolve and character shown by this team to fight back among the bedlam to earn a second win on the road is sure to strengthen belief.

You couldn't have wished for a better first half. From the first whistle the Town had the Blades back-peddling and their reward came in the 17th minute when Alfie Doughty tucked home from close range for his first Premier League goal, cheekily beating home keeper Wes Foderingham at his near post.

After the break the Blades began to turn the screw. And as they saw their side upping the ante, the home support responded in kind, roaring their team forward.

United levelled when James McAtee got the Hatters on the backfoot and even though he was floored by three Town men hunting the tackle on the edge of the box, the ball trickled into the path of Oliver McBurnie and he finished past Thomas Kaminski.

Eight minutes later, the Blades completed the turnaround. Somehow the Town survived a goalmouth scramble but the loose ball fell to home captain Anel Ahmedhodzic and he sent an assured finish into the net to spark scenes of celebration.

Football's beauty can sometimes be found in the chaos. Five minutes later – on 77 minutes – the Town levelled. Substitute Carlton Morris' devilish inswinging right-wing cross tempted home defender Jack Robinson into getting his head to the ball and it skimmed off the top of the centre half and into the bottom corner.

Four minutes later the game swung back in the Hatters' favour when Morris turned in the box to make a vital yard of space for him to shape to cross, the delivery taking a deflection off Anis Slimane and looping up and up and up and up – before gloriously, somehow, incredibly, dropping into the corner of the net to send the away end into raptures.

Ahead again, the third goal – the manner of it – completely and absolutely knocked the stuffing out of the Sheffield United and despite eight minutes of added time the Town were able to hold to secure their first back-to-back wins in the top-flight since December 1992.





Alfie Doughty and Carlton Morris hailed the Hatters' performance at Bramall Lane as they fought back from 2-1 down to record their first back-to-back victories of the season.

"I think the past two games have really shown what we're about," said Doughty after the 3-2 win over Chris Wilder's side.

"We already knew this at the start of the season. It was just about us getting used to the league.

"I think we've come on leaps and bounds. The performances recently have been top. Before, we didn't really get the results we wanted, but the past two games we've got the results."

Doughty put the Town in front in the first half with his first Premier League goal of his career, silencing the Sheffield United support in the process.

"Some people call it lucky, but I like to put it through the keeper's legs. It was brilliant. I think we needed that to quieten the fans," he said.

"It was a perfect evening, though and I'm so proud of the boys. The first half we were amazing, we really dominated. The second half they were a lot better but to win just shows the character of the boys.

"You've seen before how we can keep going and going. We went 2-1 down, we're like 'that's fine, the game's not over' and this result shows that.

"I've loved playing in the Premier League – it's been enjoyable, and fun. We've now got to get the results and if we can I think we'll be fine."

Attention now turns to Chelsea this afternoon.

"The past two results have given us a good bit of momentum," added Doughty.

"Even before we'd shown against City and Arsenal that we were playing really well. We beat Newcastle, won today and now we've got to take it back to the Kenny for hopefully another three points."

Morris, who played a big part in the four-minute burst that saw the Hatters retake the lead, was also content to leave Bramall Lane with all three points.

"It was just a pleasure to come on the pitch and affect the game positively," said the striker.

Last season's top goalscorer also dedicated the win to his friend and teammate Tom Lockyer, whose shirt he held aloft in front of the away end.

"I speak to Locks every day at the moment," he said. "We miss him dearly as a squad, our boy.

"I spoke to him yesterday about how important momentum is in this period. He's behind us every step of the way and he's here in spirit." 





WELCOME CHELSEA

Today's opposition travelling here today from West London are Chelsea. The Blues currently sit around mid-table and have had a decent start to the season. Last time against the Town, Chelsea beat the Hatters 3-0 at Stamford Bridge with a double from Raheem Sterling and a Nicolas Jackson goal.

Chelsea started the season with a 1-1 draw with Liverpool thanks to an Axel Disasi header. They then lost 3-1 to London rivals West Ham at the London Stadium.

The Blues then went on a tough run after losing 1-0 at home to Nottingham Forest before drawing 0-0 with AFC Bournemouth and going down again 1-0 at home to Aston Villa.

This sparked a better run for Mauricio Pochettino's side as they beat Fulham 2-0 at Craven Cottage before thumping Burnley 4-1 away from home. This was followed up by a 2-2 draw with Arsenal, with Cole Palmer and Mykhaylo Mudryk getting on the scoresheet.

The Blues lost to local rivals Brentford 2-0 before beating Tottenham Hotspur

4-1 in their own backyard. Cole Palmer scored a penalty and Nicolas Jackson bagged a hat-trick for the Blues.

This was followed up by a contender for game of the season as Chelsea drew 4-4 with Manchester City at the Bridge. Thiago Silva, Raheem Sterling, Nicolas Jackson and Cole Palmer were all on target for Chelsea to pick up a big point.

Newcastle then beat Chelsea 4-1 at St James' Park but the Blues responded well to this by beating Brighton 3-2 on home soil. The Blues also advanced to the semi-finals of the Carabao Cup by beating Newcastle on penalties.

The Blues have been extremely busy in the transfer market since Todd Boehly took over the club. Pochettino made 13 signings in the summer, including the likes of Christopher Nkunku, Nicolas Jackson, Axel Disasi, Robert Sanchez, Moises Caicedo, Romeo Lavia and Cole Palmer.

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS THE TIME THE TOWN BROKE THE ICE AGAINST THE BLUES.

29TH DECEMBER 1976 LUTON TOWN 4-0 CHELSEA

It had been a strange season. The Division Two (now Championship) campaign had opened with a fine 2-0 home win over relegated Sheffield United with new signing, ex-Scotland international Dixie Deans, netting both goals – but since then performances had been inconsistent to say the least.

Wins at Burnley, highly fancied Wolves and Notts County were followed by unexplained poor home performances, most notably a 4-1 home thrashing at the hands of Southampton.

As Christmas approached the Town were hovering around mid-table but a couple of dismal away displays left supporters looking over their shoulders at the relegation places. Firstly, in a clash at promotion chasers Bolton the Town took the lead through Lil Fuccillo before 5ft 5in Deans got into a scrap with big Sam Allardyce for which he was booked. Seconds

later Deans was dismissed for scything down Roy Greaves and with it went the match as the Trotters netted twice to win the points. Deans never played for Luton again.

In the next game, on 27th December, the Hatters went down 1-0 to a Laurie Cunningham inspired Orient at Brisbane Road in a match that should have been won.

Next up were league leaders Chelsea and we were all thinking that if we couldn't beat an Orient team who had been in the bottom two all season what chance did we have against a side who had just beaten Fulham 2-0 in front of a Stamford Bridge crowd of 55,003 to cement their place at the top.

By the time of the Chelsea clash, heavy snow had fallen and it was touch and go whether the game would go ahead. After the lines had

been cleared the referee gave the go ahead much to the disappointment of Chelsea manager Eddie McCreadie who thought the pitch was dangerous.

Whether his misgivings were transmitted to his players went unreported but it soon became clear that the Town were up for the game from the start while the Blues were not.

The crowd of 17,107 had hardly settled down when Fuccillo opened the scoring after 71 seconds getting on the end of a clever passing move that split the Chelsea defence to slot the ball past Chelsea reserve goalkeeper John Phillips.

As Chelsea slithered around on the pitch with the height and weight of centre-half Micky Droy at a disadvantage – the Town’s smaller and more mobile attackers swarmed past him plus the goalkeeper not inspiring confidence – the Hatters took control with intricate passing that threatened a goal with every attack.

It came as a surprise that we had to wait until the 13th minute before doubling the advantage when Brian Chambers volleyed home and but for Ron Futcher being caught offside several times the

game could have been over before half-time.

As it was, Jimmy Husband hit home a glorious third just before the hour mark and it was left to full-back Steve Buckley to cement the win just before the end when he belted the ball home from the spot after the unfortunate Phillips had upended Paul Price.

Eddie McCreadie admitted that the Town had been better in all departments and refused to blame the pitch which was “the same for both sides but Luton adapted better and went out with the right mental approach.

Luton boss Harry Haslam said: “We’ve played well for the past three games and the goals had to come. I don’t think Chelsea can blame the pitch – they were well beaten because we were easily the better side.”

The Town unluckily lost their next game 1-0 at Bristol Rovers but then went on an amazing run of 11 wins and a draw from their next 12 games that saw them surging up the table to challenge the promotion contenders. This all made the fears of relegation over Christmas seem fairly ludicrous.

A HATTER AND BLUE


You could easily make an XI out of players who have played for both the Town and Chelsea down the years.

One player, however, who starred for both was Newport-born Peter Nicolas. He joined Crystal Palace from school and made his League debut as a 17-year-old on the opening day of the 1977/78 campaign.

The tough tackling midfielder helped Palace to promotion to Division One in 1979 but managed to earn a transfer two years later just before the unfortunately named 'Team of the Eighties' was relegated.

The £400,000 move to Arsenal did not work out and needing to play to keep his place as the Welsh international captain, he transferred back to Palace before being rescued by Luton's David Pleat in 1985.

He was a revelation at Kenilworth Road with his ball winning skills and it was only the attraction of European football that lured him to Aberdeen in 1987. After spells at Chelsea and Watford, Peter coached at youth level before moving back to Wales where he managed Barry and Newport and Llanelli.

The last time the Blues came to Kenilworth Road for a league encounter came in our last top-flight campaign of 1991/92.

It also proved to a Christmas cracker at the Kenny as then Prime Minister John Major watched on as Richard Harvey opened the

scoring with a 25-yard rocket shot to give the Town the lead.

Blues goalkeeper Dave Beasant pulled down Mark Pembridge


and John Dreyer got the second from his now famous 'one-step' penalty kicks to double the lead. The visitors' Tom Boyd was sent off for fouling Paul Telfer in the area, but former Blue Mick Harford misses the chance to make it three when his spot-kick hits the crossbar.

In the Premier League era, Chelsea have been blessed with a number of top players who have led them to success. With a spine of John Terry, Frank Lampard and Didier Drogba, the Blues would go on and dominate the Premier League under Jose Mourinho. However, one player in particular became a key figure in the club's resurgence at Stamford Bridge way before Mourinho would set foot inside the club. Joining for just £4.5m from Parma in November 1996, **Gianfranco Zola** would go on and score 80 goals in 312 appearances from midfield. The two-time Player of the Year helped the Blues lift the FA Cup twice, in 1997 and 2000 and win the UEFA Cup Winners' Cup in 1998. His performances also saw him named the Football Writers' Player of the Year in 1997.

CHELSEA FANS HAVE HAD IT GOOD DOWN THE YEARS. A CHAMPIONS LEAGUE WIN IN AS RECENTLY AS 2021, THE BLUES HAVE NEVER BEEN FAR AWAY FROM SILVERWARE. BUT DOES SUPPORTING THE CLUB REALLY MEAN TO THOSE WHO CARE ABOUT IT?

WE ASKED LEONIE CARPENTER TO FIND OUT.

What does it mean to be a Chelsea supporter?

It means everything. As soon as my Dad took me to Stamford Bridge in 2003, I knew this was something special. We beat Aston Villa 1-0 and to see Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink score in person was magic. I've been going to the games with my Dad for over 20 years and sharing memories with the friends I have made over that time is the best feeling.

How important is watching Chelsea to you and why?

It's a huge part of my life. My best memories have involved watching this club with my Dad. I feel very lucky to have experienced some amazing games, see us lift silverware and to have met some incredible people along the way.

Like Luton, Chelsea have experienced a rollercoaster existence – describe how the ups and downs of following the club have impacted your life.

From my earliest memory of us finishing sixth in 2000/01 season, I've experienced a lot of success and feel very fortunate. I guess the change in managers was hard to keep up with at times and the new ownership is something we are



all getting used to. The magnitude of this rebuild and trying to find our identity with so many new players and a new manager, not to mention a never ending list of injuries has been a challenge. I do believe in this project and I will always remain optimistic about this club. The challenging times always make the good times that much better.

Of all the players that have worn the blue, who stands out for you and why?

I've grown up with some unbelievable players. Zola, Hasselbaink, Makelele, Joe Cole, I could be here all day! I do feel very lucky to have watched Frank Lampard and John Terry play, for me they are Chelsea. The pride, the passion, the undeniable love for the club and the connection with the fans was everything.

What matches against Luton do you remember?

My earliest memory of Chelsea came late, it was the FA Cup tie in 2021. The 3-2 win the following year in the FA Cup was a big moment for me on a personal note. It was my first time in the studio for Chelsea TV and I was joined by Kerry Dixon, although I was too young to have seen him play it still felt very surreal! My Dad was very proud!

Can you put into words the feeling of being a Chelsea fan during their

successful era under Jose Mourinho?

He really is the special one, the success, the passion, the determination. He loves Chelsea and we love him. Mourinho v Benitez was box office. Mourinho v the press was box office. The way he celebrated, the way he conducted his team. He was and still is one of a kind.

How has life supporting Chelsea changed during your lifetime following the club?

I've seen over 20 different managers so far! It's been eventful to say the least! The last 18 months have been challenging and missing out on European football was a huge blow. Those midweek games under the lights are truly magical. We'll be back!

Finally, what's your favourite ever Chelsea game and why?

My favourite game surprisingly isn't a final. It was March 2004, we played Wolves at the Bridge. It was my first experience of a proper edge-of-your-seat game. We did end up winning 5-2 and Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink scored a hat-trick and it was also his birthday! This was also the game I started my first chant, 'Oh Jimmy Jimmy. Well, we were all singing it and I carried on, for a brief moment it was a solo performance but the crowd quickly joined in again. I'll never forget it!

KITS FROM THE PAST

In a new feature, Town fan and shirt collector David Foxen looks back on great shirts from our past. Next up, the home shirt from our last season in the top-flight, in 1991/92.

The last time the Hatters were in the top-flight was the 1991/92 season, a campaign in which we wore an iconic Luton shirt. Fortunately, the design and 'iconic status' of this shirt hasn't been tarnished by the results on the pitch from that season...

Manufactured by Umbro, what makes this shirt so iconic is the unique design; you have the classic Luton Town white home shirt, supported by a lovely blend of blue and orange. The pattern is not symmetrical, one side looks different to the other which really makes it unique and a bit ahead of its time in 1991.

There were also two versions of this shirt. One with the USA (Universal Salvage Auctions) sponsor, and the other without. The sponsored version is the rarer shirt, with USA coming onboard later in the year, so you cannot find too many of them knocking about 32 years later. For a 30-plus year old shirt, you see the sponsor less version quite frequently on match days around Kenilworth Road – despite the results on the pitch it is clearly a crowd favourite!

Match worn and player issue versions boast an embroidered badge rather than the raised felt-like material found on the retail versions. The old Football League patches (pre-Premier League) are also stitched onto the sleeves. The effort that must have gone into making these and stitching the badges and sleeve patches must have been immense compared to modern-day, mass-produced football shirts.

This shirt is so iconic and loved by Luton fans, that in 2020/21 the club released the away shirt that was a homage to the beloved 1991/92 home shirt, but with a modern twist.

It is a truly iconic shirt, and the last home shirt worn by the Hatters in the top-flight. Will the current home shirt have the same love and significance in 30 years' time? Only time will tell.


“We defended with our lives, let’s just say that,” said the 21-year-old. “As a back-line, that’s our passion, that’s what we’re here to do. The rest can go and score for us and win us the game, we’ll do the rest, but I don’t even think it was us as players, it was 11 leaders out there, everyone put their bodies on the line.

“It was a very tight scoreline, but that’s what it’s like in the Premier League, fine margins, but we came away with the three points and the clean sheet. Kenilworth Road is a special place for anyone to come, it doesn’t matter if you’re league leaders or bottom of the table, everyone is going to struggle coming here it’s as simple as that.”

The game of course will also be remembered for honouring Tom Lockyer and the medical staff who helped save the Town captain’s life at Bournemouth the week before.

And Mengi was among a number of players who paid tribute to the skipper, dedicating the win and clean sheet to Locks.

“I’m really delighted with the performance, but more importantly, we’re really happy. We all dedicated that win to Tom and hopefully he’s really proud of that, but really delighted with the performance, proud of the team, a first clean sheet,” he said.



“That was the main theme of today, to do what Locks would do, as we all know what type of player Locks is. We just tried to give our best and do what Locks would do and do what Locks would want us to do. We delivered that in abundance, so I’m really happy with the team performance, really proud of what we put on display, but we go again, we keep going.”

They were thoughts shared by midfielder Ross Barkley, who hailed a performance that embodied their captain.

“Grit, determination, passion, never say die attitude and that’s what it was today,” said the former Everton and Chelsea man.

“The manager said go out and perform in the way that Locks has performed over the years for the club, so we did do that.”

ON THIS DAY

30TH DECEMBER

90 YEARS OF HURT

The less said about this day the better! It all means the Town go into today's match looking for their first win on 30th December since an 1933 win over Northampton Town at Kenilworth Road. 7,696 fans witnessed that 3-1 victory 90 years ago today. We're unsure if anyone in the ground this afternoon is still around, but if you are, make yourselves know to us!

For the sake of completion, the other time the Hatters won on this day came in 1911 when the Town beat New Brompton – who would go onto become Gillingham- 3-0 at Kenilworth Road in a Southern League clash.

Here's for more of that this afternoon!

THE RECORD

Readers of this page will know that it doesn't matter... we've said time and time again that whatever has happened in the past on this day is no reflection of what will happen this afternoon. And for that we couldn't be happier because Town teams in the past have struggled historically on this day.


Overall, it's 12 games, two wins, two draws and eight defeats. What the history books tell us is that this day isn't one for Hatters goals. Just a paltry five scored across those 12 matches and 16 conceded.

Six of those eight defeats have come successively. The last time a Town team took even a point came on this day in 1950 when earning a 1-1 draw at Southampton in Division Two (now Championship).

Since that draw at the Dell, six defeats have come and gone. A miserable 2-1 loss in Division Four (now League 2) at Bradford Park Avenue was pretty grim in 1967, followed by a loss at Preston (1972) and then Fulham at Craven Cottage in 1978.

The Hatters were beaten 3-0 by today's opponents Chelsea at Kenilworth Road in the top-flight in 1989. The Town ended the decade with a disastrous performance as they enjoyed 90 per cent of the game but fail to capitalise on the possession. Kevin Wilson seized on two opportunist headers, and Kerry Dixon took advantage of poor ball control by John Dreyer to run in the third goal for the Blues.

More woe followed, a 2-0 home defeat to Wigan on a cold afternoon at the Kenny and then a bizarre 4-0 thumping at Port Vale in League 2 as the Town chased promotion under Nathan Jones in 2017.

Further heavy snow fell again that evening and seemed to go on for weeks with the result that the Town did not play another home League game until 16th March!

A YEAR IN REVIEW

TIME FLIES WHEN YOU'RE HAVING FUN, AND THE PAST YEAR HAS CERTAINLY BEEN AN EXCITING ONE FOR THE HATTERS. HERE'S A LOOK BACK ON WHAT WENT ON AT KENILWORTH ROAD IN 2023.

JANUARY

The New Year started with a fine comeback win at Huddersfield and a cup victory, after a replay, at Wigan. A home defeat to West Brom saw the Town down in ninth place in the Championship but back-to-back wins over Wigan (again, in the league) and Cardiff, shot the Town up to fourth place in the table.

FEBRUARY

A Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu winner earned the Hatters their sixth win in seven Championship games and with eyes on keeping the squad fresh for the league campaign, the Town were dumped out of the FA Cup by Grimsby after a replay. Draws at Coventry and Preston were followed by a home defeat to Burnley but four points followed after a 1-0 win at Birmingham and a comeback draw against Millwall having been two goals down.

MARCH

March was marvellous. With loan signing Marvelous Nakamba on form in midfield, the

Town won three and drew one of their four games to cement their place in the top six. Carlton Morris scored the winning goal in three successive matches. The first game at home to Swansea and the second was the important winner against promotion rivals Sheffield United at Bramall Lane. After a midweek win over Bristol City the Town should have made it four in a row at Sunderland. However, a controversial late penalty helped the Black Cats earn a point after Alfie Doughty's opener.

APRIL


April Fool's Day saw Watford visit Kenilworth Road and leave with absolutely nothing after the Town put their local rivals to the sword in a one-sided derby. Gabe Osho got the ball rolling in the first half before Allan Campbell made sure of the points late on. A tough Good Friday visit to Millwall saw the Town grind out a point in a 0-0 draw that lifted us to third in the table. Wins over Blackpool and Rotherham followed before a 1-1 draw at Reading secured the Hatters a play-off for a second season in a row. A fine 2-1 televised win over promotion rivals Middlesbrough rounded the month off in style.

MAY

Sheffield United joined champions Burnley in winning automatic promotion so the final two games of the regular season enabled the Hatters to prepare for the play-offs. A Tom Lockyer header earned a 1-1 draw at play-off chasing Blackburn before a goalless draw at home to Hull ended the campaign before the fun could start.

During the final game of the season the Town's opponents changed several times before Sunderland booked sixth spot and a two-legged semi-final with Edwards's side. In the first leg at a raucous Stadium of Light, an Elijah Adebayo strike silenced the majority of the 46,000 fans but the Black Cats roared back to take a 2-1 advantage to Kenilworth Road. The second leg will live long in the memory of famous moments at the 'Old Girl' as goals from Gabe Osho and Tom Lockyer secured a 2-0 win under the lights to book a place at Wembley.

And so to the national stadium and the most lucrative game in domestic football. Against Coventry, the Hatters were rocked early by the early incident involving Lockyer but the team rallied superbly and led when superb play from Adebayo set-up Jordan Clark to fire the Town ahead. The Sky Blues equalised to take the final to extra-time and late on everyone thought Joe Taylor's goal had won it only for VAR to rule it out. It meant penalties. Neck and neck throughout the shootout, both sides had scored ten perfect penalties before Dan Potts made it 6-5 to the Hatters. Fankaty Dabo stepped up for City only to skew his kick high and wide and the Hatters could celebrate promotion to the Premier League. ▶



JUNE

With promotion secured to the top-flight for the first time since 1992, work began on and off the pitch. At Kenilworth Road, the executive boxes were torn down and construction started on a new Bobbers Stand fit to cater for the world's media. On the pitch, new contracts were offered to Luke Berry, Carlton Morris and Amari'i Bell while the first new face arrived: Rotherham winger Chiedozie Ogbene. Meanwhile, the new season's fixtures were published with the Town heading to Brighton on the opening day.

JULY

The Hatters' recruitment team continued to be busy as a number of new faces arrived. Mads Andersen, Tahith Chong, Marvelous Nakamba, Issa Kaboré and Ryan Giles were added to the squad while new contracts were offered to Cauley Woodrow, Reece Burke, Tom Lockyer, Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu and Elijah Adebayo. On the pitch, pre-season was in full flow, with friendlies against Peterborough, Ipswich and Sheffield Wednesday.

AUGUST

Final friendlies, against Bochum and Wolves, completed the preparations on pitch and before the season kicked off the Town signed goalkeeper Thomas Kaminski, midfielder Ross Barkley and attacker Jacob Brown. Despite an encouraging showing, Edwards' side went down 4-1 at Brighton in the club's first top-flight game since May 1992. Another goalkeeper, Tim Krul, joined, before the Town's second match of the season, saw them go down 3-0 at Chelsea. August was wrapped up with the first win of the campaign, a 3-1 Carabao Cup victory over Gillingham at Kenilworth Road. Meanwhile, the Town added to the squad with the arrivals of Teden Mengi and Sambu Lokonga.

SEPTEMBER

September began with Kenilworth Road hosting its first top-flight match in 31 years but despite another good display the Town lost 2-1 at home to West Ham. The Hatters created several good chances but fell to a narrow defeat at Fulham but the following week the first point of the campaign was secured when a Morris penalty earned a 1-1 draw at home to Wolves. A Carabao Cup exit at Exeter followed but days later the Town were celebrating their first Premier League with goals from Lockyer and Morris earning a famous 2-1 win at Everton.





OCTOBER

The Town were unable to build on the win at Goodison as Burnley won 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in the next fixture. Four days later the Hatters were cursing their luck when Tottenham, reduced to ten men shortly before half-time with the score goalless, left Bedfordshire with a 1-0 win. After the international break the Hatters fought back brilliantly from 2-0 down to earn a point at Nottingham Forest with Adebayo netting the equaliser in injury time. The Town would end October losing 3-1 at in-form Aston Villa.

NOVEMBER

Fireworks night saw a cracker as the Town welcomed Liverpool to Kenilworth Road and Edwards' side looked on course to earn a famous win thanks to Tahith Chong's goal. However, Jurgen Klopp's side broke Hatters hearts and Luis Diaz' injury time goal meant the points were shared. A 1-0 defeat at Old Trafford followed before a long-awaited first home of the season was recorded when goals from Teden Mengi and Jacob Brown saw off Crystal Palace.



DECEMBER

A 3-1 reverse at Brentford saw December get off to a losing start before the Town welcomed Arsenal and Manchester City to Kenilworth Road for back-to-back televised matches. Against the Gunners, the Town trailed twice and then led 3-2 thanks to Ross Barkley's first goal for the club. However, Mikel Arteta's side fought back and Declan Rice's 97th-minute winner broke Hatters hearts again. Adebayo got the Kenny bouncing five days later as the striker's header put the Town in front against the champions. Pep Guardiola's side hit back in the second half but the Hatters side could be proud of their efforts in

Football was as far away from our minds as possible in the Town's next game, at Bournemouth, where our thoughts and prayers were with Tom Lockyer and his family after the captain suffered a cardiac arrest on the pitch in the second half. Thankfully, thanks to the sterling efforts of the medical staff, including from both clubs, Locks' life was saved and was released from hospital the following Wednesday.

With the skipper in their thoughts, his teammates delivered the perfect get well soon present with back-to-back wins, firstly at home to a Newcastle team that had beaten Paris Saint-Germain earlier in the season, and then at Sheffield United on Boxing Day.

It's been a rollercoaster 2023 (no change in the history of Luton Town there, then). Bring on 2024! 🙏

A-Z THE NON-LEAGUE YEARS

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS

Part Ten – L is for Lincoln City

Of course, clashes with **Lincoln City** go back to games in the old Division Two back in Victorian times but both sides found themselves at Conference level in 2011/12 following the Imps' relegation. We were starting our third season at the level and after two play-off failures were hoping for third time lucky.

In the clash at Kenilworth Road in September 2011, the Town were down to ten men after 20 minutes for a supposed off the ball elbow by Dean Beckwith. Justice was done with six minutes remaining when Stuart Fleetwood tapped in a clever cross from John-Paul Kissock leaving the Imps with only one win from their previous 24 games.

In the return in December 2011, Danny Crow gave the Town an interval lead only for Lincoln to level on 77 minutes. Dismissals for both Alex Lawless and Jamie Hand after this left the Town hanging on at the end which they did with ease despite being down to nine men.

In the following season the Hatters made it three wins in a row following a 2-1 victory at Sincil Bank.

An own goal from Imps goalkeeper Paul Farman, who allowed a weak shot from Andre Gray squirm through his hands, set the Town up which was followed by a smart header from substitute Jon Shaw straight after the interval. Although the Imps pulled a goal back the Town saw out the game without any trouble.

By the time of the return, the season was over for both clubs. Fresh from a 5-1 mauling against Gateshead, the Hatters had a point to prove with Dave Martin netting just before the interval. Andre Gray then beat the offside trap to hare away to put the Town two up before Martin again confirmed a comfortable victory.

The Town did not start off their eventual promotion season particularly well and by the time of the visit of Lincoln in September 2013 two defeats had already been suffered and the supporters were a little restless. The mood was not helped when Lincoln dominated play yet, allowed the Hatters to win 3-2 in the end. This caused the famous argument between a fan and skipper Ronnie Henry at the end which led to the galvanising of players and supporters pushing one way to the eventual title. 🏆

Community Trust Business Development Manager, Adam Woulds said: "These



ACADEMY IN 2023

DALE BRUNTON LOOKS BACK ON THE PAST 12 MONTHS

It has been another really positive year for the academy, and with the first team having the amazing day at Wembley in May and getting promoted to the Premier League, it has opened the academy up to a raft of opportunities for both players and staff this season.

On the pitch, there has been some amazing experiences for our boys in the younger age groups including a wide range of international tours to places such as Germany, Holland, Belgium and Italy. On these tours the teams can immerse themselves in different cultures, see parts of the world that they may not have seen otherwise, and play against some of the top academies from across Europe including Juventus, Bayern Munich and Nice.

In the older age groups, the teams have been invited to compete in the Premier League Cup competitions where they are able to pit themselves against the top Academies across the country. The Under-21s recently hosted Chelsea here at Kenilworth Road in front of almost 1,000 fans which was an amazing experience for them. They were also winners of the Beds Senior Cup in March, a title which they are in the process of defending this season.

The Under-18s had a fantastic season last time out, winning both Youth Alliance

League titles and reaching the fifth round of the FA Youth Cup along the way. The Under-16s were also winners of the Youth Alliance League making it a clean sweep for our young Hatters.

All of these amazing experiences are hopefully stepping stones to each boy's main target of reaching the first team, and it has been a good year for academy graduates on that front also. Joe Johnson made his first team debut at the back end of last season making substitute appearances in the Championship, before getting his first start in September in the EFL Cup against Exeter City. We have also seen the likes of Zack Nelson, Jayden

Luker and Jake Burger make the bench for the first team.



Off the pitch there has been some great progress also, with the first team staff now containing three former members of academy staff. Long standing physio Chris Phillips has been joined by analyst Simon Dunn and most recently, former player and Under-18s coach, Alan McCormack on the first team staff.

The academy has also seen former player Paul Benson take over the academy manager role this year as we look to progress from Category 3 to Category 2 status.

I just want to say a final thank you to SOLYD for their support of the academy this year and many more before it. Without their invaluable support, the academy wouldn't be able to offer some of the fantastic experience that it does to the boys within it.

ACADEMY UPDATE

WITH LEAD ACADEMY ANALYST MIKE MALONE



Hello and firstly I'd like to extend a warm, festive welcome to everyone in attendance for today's clash against Chelsea. As it's the last fixture of 2023, it thought it would be fitting to recap the last 12 months in the academy analysis department as well as update you all with the current and future plans looking into 2024.

As always, the last year has seen us adapt existing processes and implement new ones as we seek to provide top class performance support to all our players in the academy.

Amongst other things, we have seen staff increase from three to five, a new under-13-14 analysis programme implemented and an increase in our ability to analyse training by purchasing a new Hudl Focus Flex camera, capable of filming two sessions at once.

Furthermore, this season has seen the academy move full-time to the Hudl platform where our players can review games and training, create their own playlists full of clips and can interact with their age group coach to further supplement their personal development.

The importance and potential learning through analysis within academies is forever growing in an age of new, exciting technology which consistently pushes the boundaries of how we as analysis staff can support each player on their footballing journey.

When I first started at Luton seven years ago, only a handful of games throughout the academy were filmed and performance analysis sessions happened in a canteen where the coach did it all. Since then we have moved to a new training ground with purpose built facilities, introduced an under-21 group and seen the likes of Joe Johnson progress through the ranks to make his first team debut.

Achievements which should only encourage all our young players to keep working hard towards reaching their dream of becoming a professional footballer at Luton Town.



The objective of the analysis department is to work hand in hand with other departments to enhance the footballing education the players receive. This is especially true with regards to the technical and tactical development of our athletes. Our analysis sessions are designed to make players think critically, be honest with feedback and refine their own decision making in games. Our analysis sessions can often split into three main categories; pre-match, post-match and unit based.

Pre-match sessions are used mainly in the older age groups where the players will see clips of the opposition and will be quizzed around the potential weaknesses. Post-match sessions are used to learn lessons from previous games and are often linked to upcoming training sessions. Unit based sessions are where players get split into smaller groups, tasked with feedbacking on a topic that is important and specific their positions.

Entering 2024 promises to be an exciting time for academy analysis as we look to enrich the programme of work for our players. The start of the year will see the rollout of the new under-9-12 analysis programme where we will increase the amount of analysis we do with our schoolboys. It will also mark the introduction of our new under-13-14 home-based analysis programme where players will be tasked to create their own feedback playlists after each game; with the aim to deepen players' game understanding and create a more individualised approach to development. There are also plans to introduce analysis on our schoolboy tours, where players will be given the opportunity to get further exposure to the performance analysis world. All with the aim to create a holistic and well-rounded approach to player development.

Reflecting back on 2023, and looking ahead to 2024 with the challenges of being a Premier League club, it's clear to see that being part of Luton Town family is an exciting rollercoaster ride to be on.

So while I wish you all a happy and prosperous new year, let's get Kenilworth Road rocking for what I'm sure will be a fitting end to 2023. 🍷

The other trekkers were incredible too. I couldn't have done it without them. We were all so supportive of each other and I would never say never about trekking again in the future with this wonderful bunch of strong and inspiring people.

When I signed up for this trek, I was nervous. It was a massive undertaking and way out of my comfort zone, but I've always been determined and a little bit stubborn! It was a truly incredible experience and genuinely the hardest thing I've ever done but the scenery, the people, the challenges we overcame have all definitely made me a stronger person.

Thank you so much again for the support and helping to raise these vital funds for our club charity of the year Noah Enterprise. You have all changed someone's life.

LUTON TOWN LADIES

The Town Ladies moved into 2023 as league leaders with a 100 per cent record although there had been considerable disruption to the campaign completing just one match in seven weeks pre-Christmas due to postponements and the removal of six points when Harlow Town went to the wall.

With momentum lost, the Hatters struggled to recover their form suffering three consecutive league defeats although cup form continued unabated with the highlight being a 4-0 win over Bedford. A late, late show at Haringey Borough put the Town back on track. Going into added time trailing 2-1 they stormed back to win 3-2 with the winning goal coming in the 109th minute. That never say die spirit was going to be needed during the last seven weeks of the season with 12 games to play if both cup finals were reached. The group responded wonderfully launching a 13-game unbeaten run dropping just two points on the way and reaching two cup finals.

The frustration of the league campaign is best summed up by comfortably beating league champions AFC Sudbury on three out of four meetings scoring ten goals in the process and knocking them out of both the FA Cup and League Cup. A runners-up finish was a very creditable performance but with just one team promoted the desired prize eluded us.

The cups were a different story reaching both the League and County Cup finals. The Hatters were in firm control of the midweek County final against Bedford and took the lead via 30 yard strike from Tsianne Leander. Unable to score the second goal the inevitable happened when



a late Bedford penalty took the outcome to penalties. Angelika Kopec in the Town goal was in fine shoot out form pushing away penalties and it was left to Shakeela Hussain to net the winning spot-kick.

The League Cup final against Stevenage followed a similar pattern with strikes from Shanice Lewis and captain Jess McKay putting Town in the driving seat. Never a team to take the easy route we conceded a late penalty to make the closing quarter of an hour uncomfortable but the outcome was never in doubt with a 2-1 win.

The new season brought a similar first half of the season with just a single defeat in 15 matches across all competitions.

Once again the cups proved to be a welcome distraction and in particular the FA Cup. Four wins on the road sent the Town to old foes Enfield Town. A nervous goalless first half was soon forgotten as Hatters produced a devastating 15-minute spell firing a four goal salvo to move into the third round with a 5-3 win.

The eyes of women's football were on the next tie as Keynsham Town are an established club in a tier higher. Saving the best until the last of 2023, the Town put up a superb performance from the first whistle and deservedly won the tie 1-0 with a late towering Samaira Khan far post header. The Ladies now face Super League Brighton & Hove Albion in the fourth round proper on 14th January which will be our first ever televised fixture.

WHO ARE THEY?

Bolton Wanderers, aka the Trotters, are our next visitors to Kenilworth Road for the FA Cup third round tie a week tomorrow. Bolton have spent 73 seasons in the top-flight in their history and are the club to have spent the most seasons in the top tier without winning the league. Originally formed as Christ Church, the Trotters' are four-times winners of the FA Cup – their last in 1958.

THE RECORD

Over the years the Trotters have held the advantage over the Town in previous games. Overall there have been 36 meetings, of which the Hatters have won ten. Next weekend the Town will be aiming to record their first win over Bolton in 42 years. The last time saw Brian Stien and David Moss find the target in a 2-0 win at Kenilworth Road in November 1981. The last time the Trotters were in town was for an FA Cup tie in 1997. An injury-time equaliser from Marvin Johnson took the tie to a replay, but the less said about the replay the better as the Town let a 2-1 lead slip and eventually fall to a 6-2 defeat.

THE TROTTERS OF TODAY

There will be Town fans inside the ground that grew up only knowing Bolton as a Premier League side. The Trotters spent 11 successive seasons in the top-flight before succumbing to relegation at the end of the 2011/12 season. A further relegation came in 2016 but they bounced back to the Championship immediately the season that followed. However, back-to-back relegations saw the Trotters slip to League Two in 2020 – the first time they have played in the fourth tier since 1988. Now, though the Whites are on their way up. They won promotion in 2021 and last season lost in the play-offs and won the Football League Trophy.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

There are two familiar faces in the Bolton dressing room following their time at Kenilworth Road. Experienced striker Cameron Jerome and forward Carlos Mendes Gomes joined the Trotters in the past six months. Jerome scored six times in 61 appearances for the Hatters, three of which came in the Championship. Mendes Gomes joined the Town from Morecambe in the summer of 2021 and went on to make a total of 15 appearances for the Hatters, scoring twice before moving to Bolton this summer.

Ready for this page to jinx things? Here we go: the Town go into today's game knowing three points will see them jump out of the relegation zone – for a few hours at least – following the back-to-back wins over Newcastle and Sheffield United pushed the Hatters closer to a number of sides above them in the Premier League table.

The six points earned across the last two matches have put pressure on those towards the lower end of the division following the completion of a dramatic matchday 19.

The Hatters' win at Bramall Lane had greater significance following Nottingham Forest's win 3-1 win at St James' Park against Newcastle. New boss Nuno Espírito Santo's first victory came thanks in no small part to a Chris Wood hat-trick against his former club.

Forest's and the Town's wins meant Everton needed to record a positive result to move clear away from trouble – and at half-time in their game against Manchester City things looked good for Sean Dyche's side as they led 1-0. However, Pep Guardiola's men roared back in the second period with three goals to leave the Toffees just one point ahead of the Town in the table.

Another club looking over their shoulder is Crystal Palace after Roy Hodgson's Eagles lost 2-1 to our visitors this afternoon. Mykhailo Mudryk gave the Blues the lead before Michael Olise equalised for Palace. Just when it looked as though the visitors were able to earn another decent point on the road, Noni Madueke netted a late penalty to condemn the Eagles to defeat.



Just above Crystal Palace in the standings are Brentford, the London club are four points above the relegation zone after losing their fourth match in a row on Wednesday night. Thomas Frank's side were beaten on home turf by a resurgent Wolves, 4-1 – a result which lifted Gary O'Neil's men up to 11th in the table.

When the Town came off the field at Old Trafford back in November, Bournemouth were still below us in the table. However, their incredible run of form as propelled the Cherries away from danger. Their run of six wins and one draw from their last seven matches – their latest a 3-0 victory over Fulham – has Andoni Iraola's men up to 12th place – ten points above the relegation zone.

Other than Sheffield United, the other club below the Town in the standings are Burnley, and last season's Championship winners were beaten on Boxing Day, going down 2-0 at home to a Liverpool side who have only tasted defeat once so far this season.



Take yourselves back 12 months and on Boxing Day many of you would have been sitting here having seen Luton pegged back by Norwich City, Gabe Osho sent off for a second yellow, the first booking at best dubious, meaning a first win of manager Rob Edwards' reign at Kenilworth Road was looking unlikely.

Luton were sitting in 15th place, six points above the drop zone and four away from the top six, before Edwards showed the positive mentality that has encapsulated his time in the dug-out, throwing on Cauley Woodrow with four minutes to go.

At first it just didn't feel quite right when Luton were heading to Stamford Bridge, taking on West Ham and going up against Spurs.

Gradually that has changed. A win at Everton got things up and running, while at home at least, Edwards' side have really started to look like they believe they can cope at this level.

The way in which the Town came so close a famous win over Liverpool, held on to defeat Crystal Palace, showed no fear when taking on Arsenal, only losing to the very last kick, and saw Manchester City keep the ball in the corner late on to claim victory, has given a sense that Luton can make a decent fist of staying in this league.

With this written before games against Newcastle and Sheffield United, Luton could be in an even better (hopefully not worse) position by the time Mauricio Pochettino's men rock up here, as a good festive period will go some way into seeing if Town can make 2024 another wonderful year.

Finally, having been present at the Vitality Stadium and seeing the horrific incident with Tom Lockyer, it goes without saying that I wish the defender all the best in his recovery and hope to see him back at Kenilworth Road soon. 🙏
