When you play Man Utd, Liverpool and Man City in successive games, you perhaps are entitled to endure a little period of uncertainty.

With the situation regarding Everton's points deduction a little clearer, I'd ask you all to not be concerned by that or anything else surrounding Everton or any other clubs. We simply need to concentrate on ourselves. Ultimately, if we don't do our job then it doesn't matter what happens elsewhere. So let's try and get as many points as possible in the final 13 games to give ourselves the best possible chance of being a Premier League club next season.

We're in this fight. Together we're in this fight and we'll fight all the way. That togetherness can be the difference in the run in. It's how we can be unique to other clubs. We have all been on this incredible journey for such a long time that now's the time to show everyone what we are all about.

That includes CPR training and to know what to do in those situations. Just take a moment and think if a cardiac arrest happens to someone who is close to you.

I have been so touched by everyone's support, but also by the interest. The amount of enquiries our press team and me and my family have received to talk about the subject has been astounding really. I will continue to talk about it because moments like these are, while sometimes difficult, can only help educate other people should they be thrust into such a situation.

Back to the football, and while the results haven't been what we would have liked, the performances certainly have been encouraging.

Against Man Utd we recovered well from a very slow start to boss the game and were unlucky not to take a point. Of course it was tough for us to get back in it being 2-0 down so early, but it was another one of those games in which we can learn a lot from.

Then we went to Liverpool. Regardless of the final score, I think we can be really

proud of our efforts. To be leading 1-0 at half-time was amazing and I thought we were full value for the lead. The second half was one-way traffic and I don't think any team in the world could have coped with the way they played in those second 45 minutes.

City on Tuesday saw us bow out of the FA Cup. When you're up against Erling Haaland and Kevin De Bruyne it is never going to be easy but when they're in the mood and on the same wavelength, no team is going to stand much of a chance. However, we had our moments and we probably scored the two best goals of the game thanks to two great efforts from Clicker. The first one was an incredible finish. It was such a shame he picked up an injury in pre-season but there's no denying he's such a quality player and he showed that on Tuesday night.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE
GARY SWEET

They say time flies when you're having fun. Is anyone else wondering how quickly this season has flown? We're now in March when it doesn't seem five minutes since we were heading south to Brighton on the opening day in August.

The defeat that grey, wet afternoon to the Seagulls certainly opened our eyes to the challenge that lay in wait over the course of this, our first season in the top-flight in over 30 years. While many outsiders wrote us off before a ball was even kicked, such negativity, thankfully, has not penetrated The Brache or Kenilworth Road.

It is, therefore, with great pride that we enter the final 13 games of the season with a real chance of preserving our Premier League status. Nobody outside our environment gave us a chance of being in this position but the way in which Rob, his staff and the players have performed over these past seven months have been a result of incredible hard work, meticulous dedication, desire and plenty of skill and quality.

The past two matches in particular have seen us come up against, let's be said, two amazing football teams with individuals performing at their peak. However, how refreshing has it been to see this Luton Town team taking the

game to Liverpool, at Anfield, and then Manchester City here in the FA Cup on Tuesday? It's brave, it's progressive, entertaining and aggressive. It is as close as the fabled 'Luton Way' as it is to playing, and we have nothing but admiration for how the team's style has evolved throughout the season. Teams are certainly wary of the threats we carry, and opposition managers have been extremely complimentary about the way we are playing.

Another proud aspect of the match against Pep Guardiola's side was the glowing display by Joe Johnson, who – after celebrating his 18th birthday last week – came on in the first half and did not put a foot wrong. With Zack Nelson inching closer to his senior debut and with Axel Piesold given a squad number for the first time, we hope these products of our academy can not only push on and break into the first team on a regular basis, but also inspire the next generation of players in our academy set-up.

Of course despite all the plaudits and positivity, points are the prerogative – things we need in order to achieve the goals set out at the start of the campaign. That continues this evening against Aston Villa, who I wish to extend a warm welcome to. Our focus



has always been on retaining our status regardless of external noise, and that is something we will continue to aim for between now and the season's end.

Your support has played a massive part in our success. It been tremendous, ferocious and passionate home and away, and we'll need you to maintain those levels between now and the end of the campaign. The noise does make a difference – anyone who was at Anfield will testify to that.

This evening you will notice that the installation of safe standing in the Oak Road Stand has been fully completed. This process has been a complex but rewarding one that means that over 800 additional seats are now in this area of the ground and it has resulted in us more than doubling the home capacity in this section.

We challenged the market, leaving no stone unturned, by installing a bespoke design into the Oak – designed in-house and manufactured specifically for our use. No such design exists outside of Kenilworth Road.

We've had many questions enquiring about why we feel the need to do it now – with such little time left at Kenil-

worth Road – and whether the cost can be recovered.

Firstly, because of the increase in capacity, pay-back would be well under two seasons with the additional benefit of allowing more supporters into the stadium. This increase has been made possible by a number of strategies, including increasing the number of usable rows, decreasing the segregation zone, having all standing seats as allocated positions and losing one gangway.

But there are other major reasons why we're doing this now. The most valuable to us is that we're learning with a view of perfecting a significant standing proportion of our capacity at Power Court.

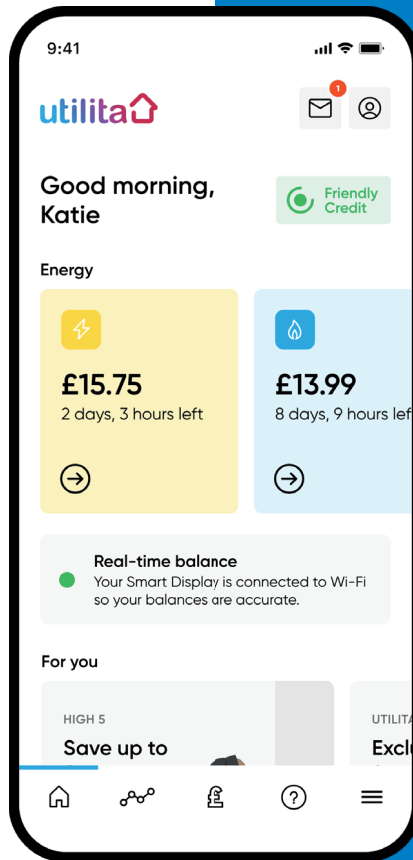
It also means we would, by working with the Sports Ground Safety Advisory and our SAG, that confidence in us operating this level of licensed standing will increase safety and enjoyment for our supporters. But, naturally, this will be dependent on everyone using the Oak Road to respect the environment for the greater good.

I can also reveal that we are in the early stages of investigating into areas of the Enclosure in which we could possibly install the rail seating. We will, of course, update you on any future developments.

Perhaps most importantly, the completion of this development means today is likely to see the biggest attendance at Kenilworth Road since we took over custodianship of the club in 2008. Kenilworth Road took its fair share of derision in the summer for being the smallest in the division but that is no longer the case. Our fixture against Manchester United saw the biggest league attendance, 11,483, since we played the same club in 1992 and we'll,

hopefully, be able to see an attendance of 12,000 before the season is over.

Turning attention back to today, and before kick-off we will remember Chris Nicholl, who sadly passed away last week. Chris was a magnificent centre-half who served both ourselves and our visitors with distinction. Having helped us to promotion from the old Third Division he went onto excel for Villa, where he twice won the League Cup. Please join us in a minute's applause to remember him today.

Please get the behind Rob, Richie, Trolls and the boys this afternoon.

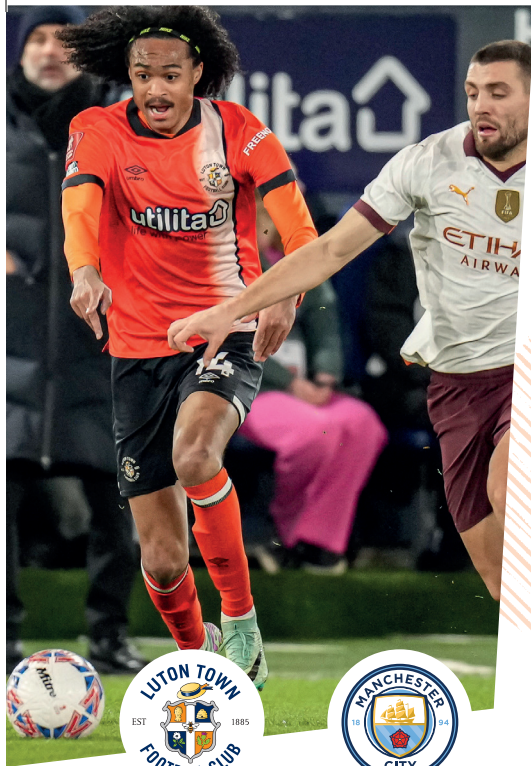

HATTERS EXIT FA CUP AT HANDS OF RUTHLESS CITY

The Town's run in the FA Cup came to an abrupt end as ruthless Erling Haaland scored five times to send holders Manchester City into the quarter-finals.

The Hatters had no answers to the striker, playing for the first time at Kenilworth Road, with the Norwegian firing the visitors in front in the third minute from Kevin De Bruyne's cut-back.

It was 2-0 to the Citizens on 18 minutes when Haaland latched onto De Bruyne's throughball to thunder past Tim Krul.

Krul, who was in fine form all evening in the face of an attacking bombardment, could do nothing as De Bruyne and Haaland combined once more for the striker to lift a delightful finish home.

As half-time approached, however, the Hatters got themselves to within two goals when Jordan Clark hit a sumptuous 25-yard curling effort into the top corner. It was the midfielder's first of the season and first since scoring in the play-off final at Wembley in May.

After the restart, Town voices were raised as, on 52 minutes, Clark got his second to make it 3-2, lashing home brilliantly from Ross Barkley's superb lifted pass.

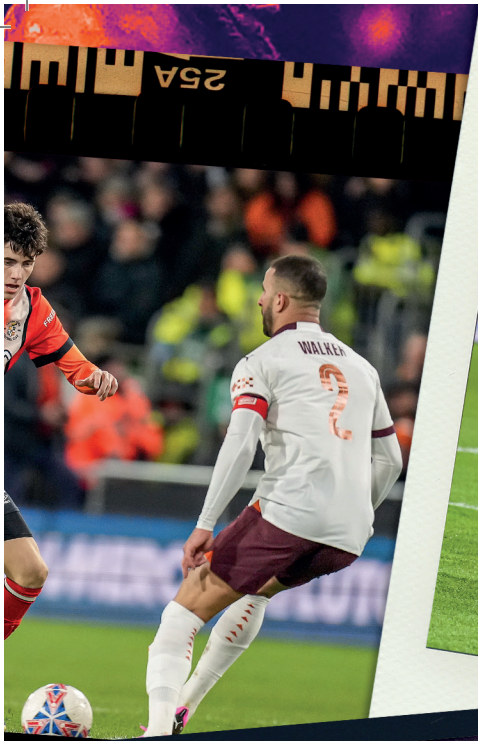
However City – and Haaland in particular – wasted no time in restoring their advantage as the striker scored twice in a three-minute spell to make it 5-2. The first saw him tap home from close range from another unselfish De Bruyne pass before then blasting home from 12 yards moments later.

Krul continued to impress for the Town as the visitors pushed for more but the Dutchman couldn't stop a sixth with 17 minutes to go when Mateo Kovacic's drive from the edge of the box flew home.

To their credit, the Hatters never gave in and Rob Edwards introduced Daiki Hashioka for his debut mid-way through the second period.

But City were too strong and deservedly claimed their place in the last-eight leaving the Town to focus on Premier League survival. 🦋

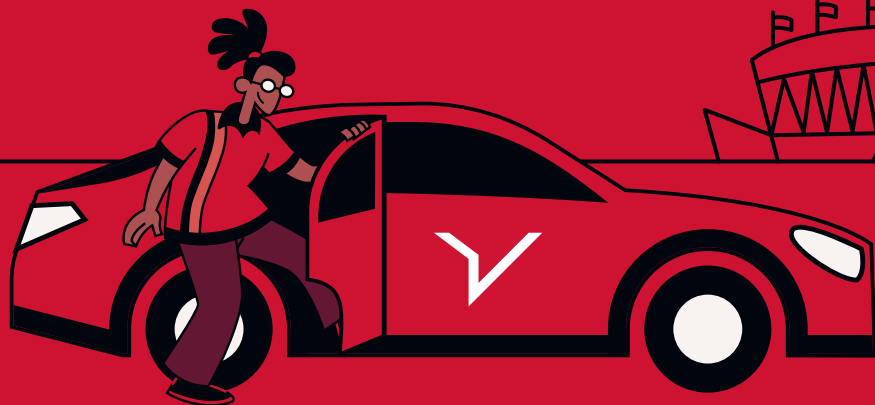

13 CUP FINALS LEFT SAYS CLICKER

Midfielder Jordan Clark says the Town need to stick together for the final 13 “cup ties” after their FA Cup dreams were ended by a rampant and ruthless Manchester City on Tuesday night.

The former Accrington man was on target twice against the treble winners at Kenilworth Road, scoring with two fine finishes either side of the break.

Clark says that now the Hatters’ run in the competition is over, attention can focus solely on fighting for Premier League survival.

“We have 13 cup finals left and those games, especially at home, are vitally important,” the 30-year-old said afterwards. “We need to pick up points and do so at home because that’s our strongest threat.

“We just need to be ourselves. We need to stick together, dust ourselves down and go again. We have Aston Villa next who are doing well but we just need to be us. We need to go after teams and defend better and if we learn from our mistakes we can get better I’m sure of it.”

On his two goals against City, Clark admitted his opening strike – a beauty


from 25 yards that sailed into the top corner – was borne out of frustration.

“I don’t think I’ve hit a better goal in my career,” he said. “But it was more out of frustration as Kevin De Bruyne had left me a couple of times in the first half and I was disappointed in myself defensively. So I thought ‘I’ll just whack this as hard as I can and see what happens’ so it was nice to see it hit the back of the net.



“To be honest it was nice to get back into the game a bit, especially because going in at 3-0 down would have meant the dressing room would have been a bit deflating. Obviously getting another one back gave us a lift. We talked about that at half-time and we were back in it for a bit but then the game ran away from us in the end.”

On the performance – and coming up against players of City’s calibre – Clark added: “You give them half-a-yard and they just find the space. They pick the right passes 99.9 per cent of the time and if you give them half a yard the next thing you know the ball is in the back of your net.

“It was a tough night at the office. You get back in it at 3-2 and you think you have half-a-chance but then they give the ball to the big man [Haaland] and he has that quality. It’s just a different dimension when he plays.”

ROB BACKS HATTERS TO BOUNCE BACK

Town manager Rob Edwards backed his side to quickly put the FA Cup exit behind them after Manchester City ran out 6-2 winners at Kenilworth Road on Tuesday night.

The Hatters made a game of it against the treble winners, with Jordan Clark's well-taken brace cutting the deficit to 3-2.

However, Norwegian striker Erling Haaland ultimately proved the difference hitting five of the six goals to send City through to the quarter-finals.

"I hope the result doesn't have a negative effect. I'm always going to come out and try and back the team and try and be bullish, say what I think are the right things, but then time will tell now how we react and knowing this group the way I do, I think they'll react in the right way," Edwards said afterwards.


"We've got some really good leaders in there, lads who know how big the games are coming up and we've been

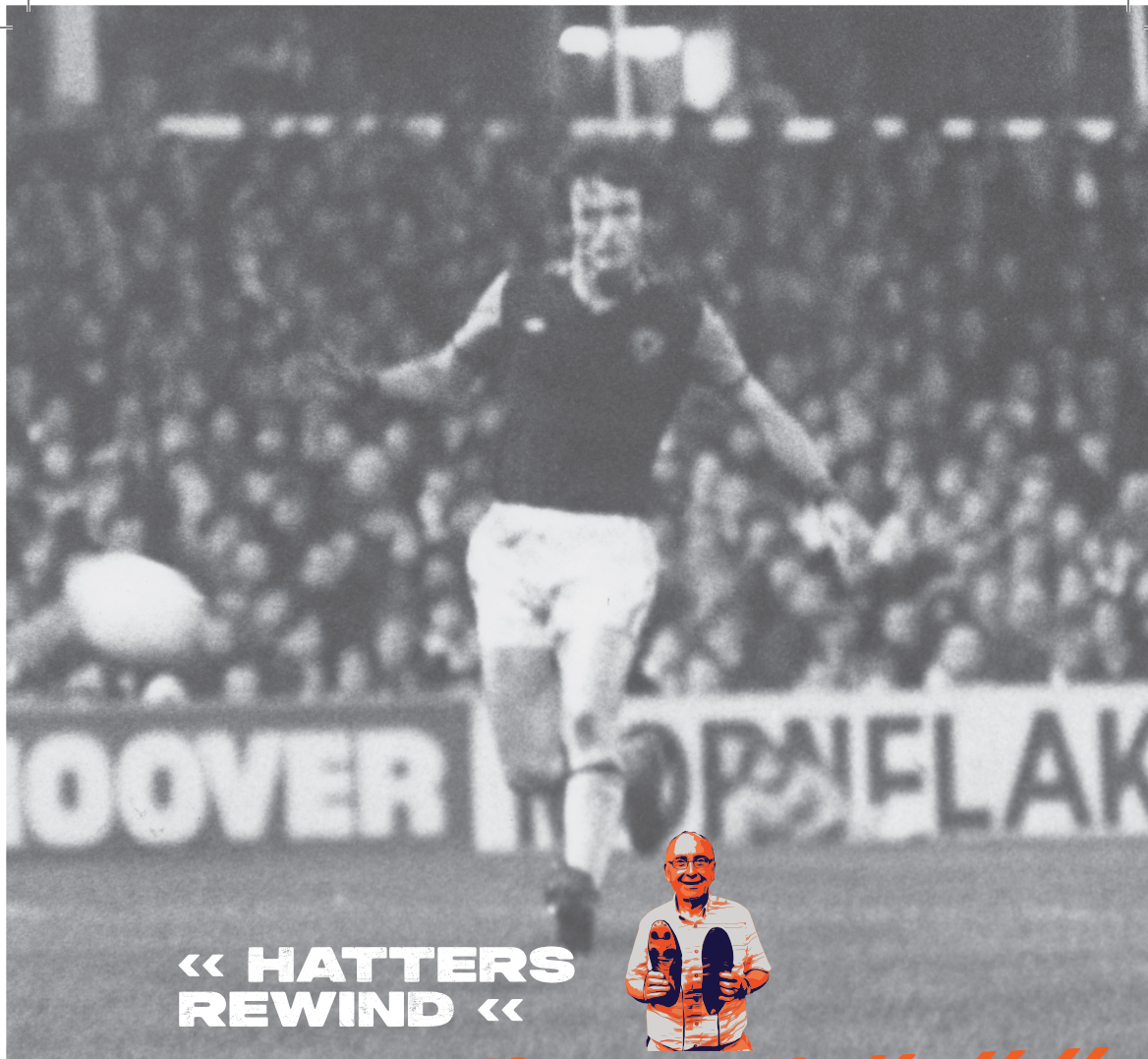
hit by an amazing team, arguably the best team in the world, one of the best teams I've probably ever seen, and there's no shame in that.

"There will be bits, and it's on me, the areas that we can improve and work on, so we'll work really hard to try and rectify that quickly, but I don't see it knocking this group.

"We've got to make sure we use it to get better and not to allow it to feel sorry for ourselves as if you do that in the Premier League then you are done, and we're not done at the moment, we're not.

"We're in with that fighting chance that we've talked about, so let's learn and make sure that we get better rather than feel sorry for ourselves.

"This group have shown that time after time, we can't ever give up. If you do against a team like that then they're ruthless and they keep going, and they were. It was a tough night for us, but it's not going to diminish our confidence and our belief in what we're trying to do."

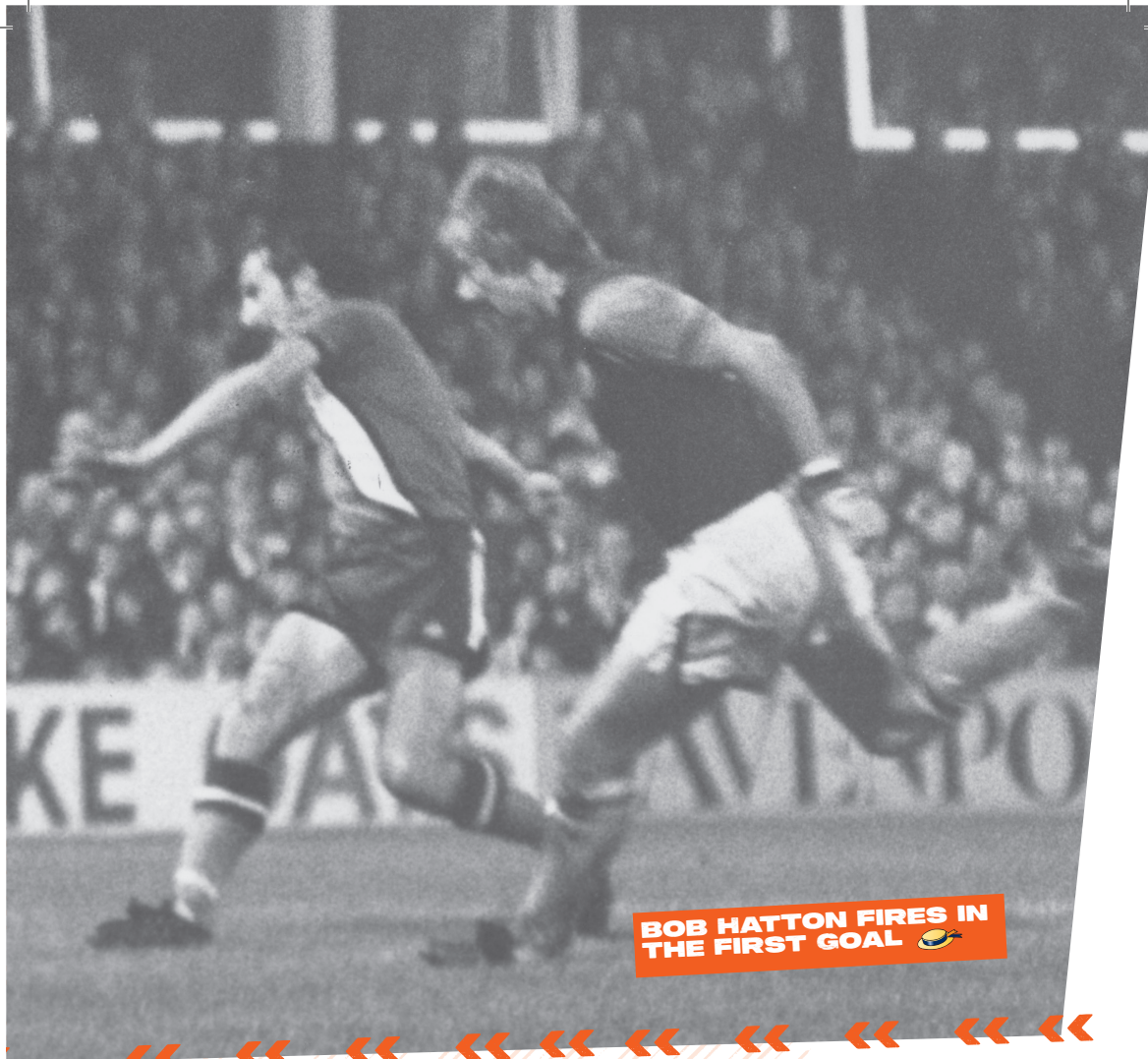
ASTON VILLA 0 LUTON TOWN 2

**Football League Cup fourth round.
8th November 1978.**

The Town had never previously survived beyond the fourth round of the League Cup and after they were drawn away to mighty Aston Villa in 1978/79 most pundits felt that the modest record was likely to stay intact.

Having limped past Wigan and Crewe in the previous rounds and having little in the way of pedigree in the competition, the Hatters had few grounds for confidence. Fearing the worst and hoping for the best, Luton supporters travelled to Villa Park with their fingers firmly crossed.

The supporters had seen their new look side (seven players had made their Hatters debuts on the opening day) take teams apart in league games

at Kenilworth Road, starting with a 6-1 home thumping of Oldham, and following it up with a three, a seven and a six. Manager David Pleat's new players were not, however, so hot away from home and had yet to win on their travels which did not bode well.

Top-flight Villa had disposed of Sheffield Wednesday and Crystal Palace in the earlier rounds and had won the competition three times already in its short existence.

Manager Ron Saunders hoped to win the pre-match psychological war by announcing that he would be fielding his strongest side for the first time that season.

Once play commenced Luton survived an early scare when danger-man Andy Gray forced Hatters' goalkeeper Milija Aleksic into action in the opening minutes. But Villa's much-vaunted full-strength side was disrupted in the 12th minute when Gray hobbled off with

damaged ankle ligaments following a hard but fair tackle from Town's Mal Donaghy. Villa reshuffled, but it soon became apparent that the Town had gained the upper hand.

The hosts, in fact, had not won at home for ten weeks, the anxiety of which began to spread through their side, and the crowd of 32,737, the longer the game went on. Saunders was a disciple of the long ball game, which was meat and drink to Chris Turner and Mal Donaghy at the heart of the Luton defence. The Town became ever more dominant and Villa goalkeeper Jimmy Rimmer had to save smartly from Turner. Mercurial winger David Moss won an indirect free-kick in the area when fouled by Ken McNaught, and the wily Bob Hatton shortly had the ball in the net but was flagged for offside.

The goal that Luton were increasingly threatening to score came on 66 minutes, when Lil Fuccillo threaded a delightful ball through to Hatton, who took it in his stride and fired a fierce shot into the top corner of the net.

Brian Stein added a second in the final minute when he found himself unmarked in front of goal, tapping in a cross from Moss to seal a famous victory.

Villa manager Saunders could barely spit out a word of congratulations after the game when he said "We were bloody awful and have no excuses. Luton worked tremendously hard, and good luck to them."

Pragmatist that he was, David Pleat was more concerned by the lack of league points than fleeting glories in the Cup, and threatened to make changes in the side for the forthcoming trip to Oldham, inferring that too many minds had been distracted by the cup-tie at the expense of the bread and butter league.

WELCOME ASTON VILLA

The Hatters welcome Unai Emery's high-flying Aston Villa side to Kenilworth Road for what is a big game for both sides. In the reverse fixture, Villa beat the Hatters 3-1 at Villa Park in what was a tough day in the office for Rob Edwards' side.

The season didn't get off to the best start for the Villans as they lost 5-1 to Newcastle United on the opening day. Villa responded brilliantly to this by proceeding to beat Everton 4-0 at Villa Park.

Early in the season, it became clear that Villa Park was becoming a fortress for Emery's side, and they took advantage when playing at home. An away win at Burnley meant things were looking good for Villa early on.

In early September, Villa lost 3-0 away at Liverpool before beating Crystal Palace 3-1 at home. A massive away win at Chelsea was followed by a remarkable 6-1 home win over Brighton and Hove Albion with Ollie Watkins impressing the most as he bagged a hat-trick.

There were some great results like wins over Zrinjski Mostar, AZ Alkmaar – in the Europa Conference League – and West Ham before the Villans beat us 3-1. John McGinn and Moussa Diaby

both scored twice while own goals from each team made the score 3-1.

A shock 2-0 loss to Nottingham Forest was the only game out of eight in a row that they didn't win. This meant Emery's side only suffered one loss in ten games across October and November.

In early December, Villa picked up two absolutely huge wins. Two 1-0 home wins over Manchester City and Arsenal put Unai Emery's side in a superb position and it was one they had to hold on to.

Villa's home winning streak ended with a 1-1 draw against Sheffield United. Former Villan Cameron Archer put Sheffield United ahead late on, but Nicolo Zaniolo equalised even later on for Villa.

After this draw, Villa tasted defeat for the first time in almost two months with a 3-2 loss to Manchester United. This was followed with a win over Burnley and an FA Cup victory over Middlesbrough.

More recently, Villa recorded wins over Sheffield United, Fulham and Nottingham Forest and go into today's game at Kenilworth Road – their first visit for a league game since 1992 – in fourth place in the Premier League.

UNAI EMERY. Spaniard who took over at Villa Park in October 2022 following a successful spell with Villarreal where he won a fourth Europa League title. Won three of those titles with Sevilla before moving to Paris Saint-Germain and then spent a short spell in charge of Arsenal.

GOALKEEPER



EMILIANO MARTINEZ. Argentina World Cup winning stopper who signed for Villa from Arsenal in 2020. Restricted to just 15 Premier League appearances for the Gunners he spent several years out on loan at clubs including Oxford, Sheffield Wednesday and Reading.

DEFENDERS



MATTY CASH. Dependable right-back who arrived at Villa Park from Nottingham Forest in 2020. Born in England but represents Poland at international level through his grandparents.



DIEGO CARLOS. Brazilian centre-half Diego signed in 2022 from Sevilla for a fee in the region of £26 million. Moved from his homeland to Portugal in 2014 and then signed for Nantes before his switch to Spain.



LUCAS DIGNE. France international centre-back who joined Villa in 2022 after four years with Everton. Came through the ranks at Lille and then enjoyed spells at PSG and Barcelona.



EZRI KONSA. Centre-half Ezri signed for Villa following their promotion to the Premier League in 2019. Started his career at Charlton and then spent one season at Brentford before moving to Villa Park.



PAU TORRES. A reported fee of £31.5 million saw the centre-half reunited with Unai Emery last summer. The former Villarreal defender made his international debut for Spain in November 2019.

MIDFIELDERS



LEON BAILEY. Jamaican international right winger who arrived at Villa Park for a fee in the region of £30 million in 2021. Began his professional career in Belgium with Genk before moving to Bayern Leverkusen in Germany.



MOUSSA DIABY. French international attacking midfielder or winger who signed for Villa last summer for a club record £51.9 million. Started his career with PSG before moving to Bayer Leverkusen.



DOUGLAS LUIZ. Rio-born Brazilian international midfielder Douglas joined Villa in 2019 from Manchester City. Failed to make a league appearance at City but has become a regular over the past five seasons.



BOUBACAR KAMARA.

Free transfer arrival from Marseille last summer, the French international defensive midfielder made over 150 appearances for his hometown club before joining Villa.



JOHN MCGINN. Club captain John has been a revelation for Villa since signing from Hibernian in 2018. The Scotland international midfielder helped the club to promotion in his first season.



JACOB RAMSEY. Villa academy graduate who first shot to prominence in the 2020/21 season after winning a host of end-of-season awards. Hit 12 goals in the following two seasons to become a first-team regular.



YOURI TIELEMANS. Belgian international midfielder Youri arrived on a free transfer last summer following Leicester's relegation to the Championship. Began his career at Anderlecht before a move to Monaco.



NICOLO ZANILO. Attacking midfielder or winger Nicolo joined Villa on loan from Galatasaray last summer. An Italy international, he has also enjoyed spells at Inter Milan and Roma.

ATTACKERS



OLLIE WATKINS. England international forward has hit 14 goals in 26 games this term. Started his career at Exeter before moving to Brentford where he scored 45 goals in three seasons.



JHON DURAN. Young Colombian international striker who signed for Villa last season from Chicago Fire. The 20-year-old has been a regular substitute but has still scored four times this term.

As the 1984/85 season drew to a close, Hatters supporters were biting their fingernails down to the quick as they worried about the trip to Aston Villa and whether the Town could continue their much improved run and manage to fight clear of the threat of relegation.

The battle to keep hold of a top flight spot, won in style in 1982, had looked a forlorn one as the previous Christmas approached with a paltry three wins from the first 16 games and only a poor Stoke side keeping them off the bottom. With no money to spend and constant bickering going on at board level behind the scenes, manager David Pleat wondered where to turn next as his lightweight and inexperienced side was steamrollered week after week.

Kirk Stephens, Brian Horton, Raddy Antic and Paul Walsh had all departed the previous summer leaving Pleat with very little to work with but, just as he was regretting not taking up the offer to join QPR that came his way six months

before, board infighting came to a head.

Out went chairman Denis Mortimer to be replaced by entrepreneur David Evans, who immediately stated that the Town would not go down. Needing little prompting, Pleat went out on a spending spree that over a two-month period completely reshaped the Luton side.

Steve Foster, David Preece, Mick Harford and Peter Nicholas arrived at Kenilworth Road and almost overnight the spine of the team had been replaced, not by free transfer signings or players over the hill but by real quality.

The team, however, had a lot of catching up to do as the abysmal start to the season had left them several points shy of a realistic position of safety. To add to the problems (but what problems?!) came an unexpected run in the FA Cup.

Battling through to the semi-final was a tremendous achievement especially when

it is remembered that two of the club's new signings were cup-tied. Stoke, Huddersfield, Watford and Millwall were seen off before unlucky defeat at the hands of Everton at Villa Park ended the dream of the twin towers for another season.

Because of the involvement in the Cup, only three league games were played between 1st January and 2nd March and although Luton supporters could see that the Pleat 'league' side was a far better outfit than its lowly position suggested it was to be tested to its limits with so many games to cram in.

Sunderland were seen off at Kenilworth Road in early March before the team earned a heartening draw at Sheffield Wednesday. All this good work was undone, however, when Watford turned the Town over 3-0 at Vicarage Road.

The next two games, both at home, were therefore seen as vital if the team was to keep in touch with the teams above but both QPR and Ipswich were beaten fairly comfortably. After another set-back, this time at Southampton, a vital game at bottom place Stoke was won.

This was quickly followed by the FA Cup semi-final defeat and it was wondered whether the disappointment would be reflected in future league games.

The supporters need not have fretted as, in a titanic struggle against fellow strugglers Norwich at Kenilworth Road, goals from Emeka Nwajobi and David Moss earned a 3-1 victory.

In the previous season Manchester United had won 5-0 at Kenilworth Road in front of the live television cameras in what can very politely be termed a lacklustre performance.

Naturally the cameras were back to see the title chasing Reds repeat the thrashing but this time the Hatters had heart and steel in their side and a late winner from Harford pulled the team out of the bottom three.

The Town blotted their copybook a little when Nottingham Forest won at Kenilworth Road in the next game but a point was won at another team fighting the drop, West Ham. A surprisingly easy 3-1 win over a poor Arsenal side left the Hatters with a trip to Villa where a victory would almost guarantee safety.

So, the hardy supporters travelled up to Villa Park again a few short weeks after the bitter Cup defeat. Villa had scored nine goals in their previous two games but their forwards were hardly given a look in by the new look Luton rearguard of Tim Breacker, Steve Foster, Mal Donaghy and Mitchell Thomas which was settling down to become one of the best units in the country.

Admittedly the Town's performance was not a patch on the one put on against Everton in the FA Cup, but there again Villa were not in the Toffees' class as proved by the fact that the Merseysiders had already clinched the league title. The only goal of the game came after 21 minutes when Brian Stein, showing excellent predatory skills, smacked the ball home after it was mis-controlled by Villa's Gordon Cowans.

There were few scares for Les Sealey in the Luton goal and when the final whistle eventually sounded the relieved Hatters fans soon realised that their team had picked up 13 points out of the 18 at stake since the semi-final defeat. Whether that defeat was a blessing in disguise we shall never know!

A HATTER AND A VILLAN

Plenty of names fit the bill here, including Jake Findlay and Steve Foster plus Curtis Davies and Henri Lansbury in more recent times.

However, Luton-raised **Bruce Rioch** starred for both sides in the 1960s and 70s. Bruce made his League debut as a 17 year old for the Hatters in November 1964 and soon had the scouts flocking to Kenilworth Road where they admired his pace, power and fierce shooting.

After helping the Town to the championship of Division Four in 1968 and seeing his colleagues narrowly miss out the following year, Bruce accepted a record fee move to Aston Villa. Further big money moves to Derby and Everton followed as well as the honour of skipping Scotland, the country of his father.

Bruce then entered into a second career managing, amongst others, Middlesbrough, Bolton, Arsenal and Norwich with some success followed by a spell in Denmark.

TOWN 3-1 VILLA 10TH AUGUST 2016

It's not often on this page that we rewind to the previous match in this particular segment but in August 2016 the Town recorded a wonderful League Cup win over Villa at Kenilworth Road.

Villa, playing in the Championship at the time, had already hit the woodwork twice, first time through Hatters defender Glen Rea slicing a clearance and then Jack Grealish hit the inside of the post from 20 yards, before Jordan Ayew put them in front on 13 minutes.

But the Town roared back in a famous cup victory under the lights. Jack Marriott, Cameron McGeehan and Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu combined to play Jake Gray into the right side of the box and the former Crystal Palace man flashed his right-footed shot past Villa keeper Mark Bunn and into the back of the net.

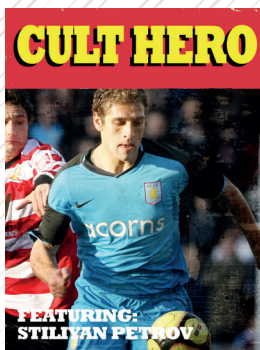
McGeehan's deflected strike then put the Town in front eight minutes after half-time before a comical own goal from Jores Okore sealed victory just after the hour.

He was instantly taken by his teammates and the Villa Park faithful for his performances in midfield and long-range strikes. Sadly his career came to an end after being diagnosed with acute Leukaemia in 2012 but the club and its fans stuck by him – applauding him in the 19th minute of matches.

VIEW FROM THE OAK ROAD

HOWEVER, APART FROM THE WONDERFUL FOOTBALL AT VILLA PARK THIS SEASON, WHAT IS IT TRULY LIKE TO SUPPORT THE CLUB THROUGH THICK AND THIN? WE PUT OUR QUESTIONS TO JAG KALAAR OF THE PUNJABI VILLANS.

What does it mean to be a Aston Villa supporter?

I really feel as a passionate football fan, you assign your colours to the mast from early days of your life! So for me it's about displaying my personal interests (football) and opinions and beliefs (AVFC) which I adhere and will hold until the end.

I began following Villa from the epic League Cup in 1977 which Villa won by beating Everton 3-2 at the third attempt.

I think the fact they were on TV frequently in a short time made me a Villa fan. As they say Aston Villa chooses you and not you choosing Aston Villa, so that loyalty to them aligns for me with being a loyal person that someone that can be relied upon and someone who means and does what he says.

Just like the club and life, there has been a lot of ups and downs and many teams that have to dominated the

game, however once you are a Villan you are always a Villan!

So words that highlight what it means to be a villa fan are: loyalty, pride, passion, positivity and resilience! Never give up!

How important is watching Villa to you and why?

Over the years I followed Villa by coming to games on a game-by-game basis. I then became a member and when my kids were older I became a fully-fledged season ticket holder! I have watched villa from all 4 stands too. For me it's important to watch Villa since with football being a big hobby of mine, I look forward to our fixtures and games and that's not only been when we have been doing well but also through the lows, such as the relegation 2015/16.

Going to football also is a key aspect of socialising and engagement which are so good for our general and mental well-being. I feel a sense of belonging

is something humans strive for, historically we would have operated in tribes. So being part of Aston Villa and also the Punjabi Villas groups brings the belonging and tribalism to the fore.

Luton might have had their roller-coaster ride, but can Villa fans associate with that? Describe how the ups and downs of following the club have impacted your life.

Well let me start with the low time which I particularly recall being relegated in 1986/87 and more recently 2015/16! Those were dark and low times especially in the 2015/16 season since it was almost like the soul had been sucked out of the club.

There is no doubt if you ask any genuine football fan, when your team loses on a weekend it shapes the mood of the week, especially if it is to local rivals. It's the same for the manner of defeats. If the players have given their best and lost well you hold your hand up. But when there hasn't been the effort or issues of conflict in the camp, then that does infuriate the fans.

Of course we have had many highs, too. For me they have been 1977 League Cup win, winning the championship in 1980/81 and of course the European Cup in 1982 and Super Cup in 1983!

Other periods that stand out are when Ron Atkinson, Brian Little, John Grego-

ry and Martin O'Neil managed us. However, the period under Unai Emery I must say is the best football we are playing and has got us playing and battling above our levels. A top coach and someone who takes a personal pride in the job he does.

Of all the players that have worn the claret and blue, who stands out for you and why?

This is tough to answer since we have had so many awesome players.

If I had to narrow it down it would be between either Dwight York and Jack Grealish.

Dwight because since he scored so many vital goals for us and without him we wouldn't have had half the success and Jack because he epitomised everything

about AVFC. He came through the academy and he played in an our team that took us from low ends of Championship to the Premier League and then helped keep us up! I have nothing but admiration for Jack. Oh by the way he just didn't leave, he left us £100m financially better! He would also always get a hero's welcome when he comes to Villa Park from me.

Are there any matches against Luton that you remember in particular?

Yes, when we beat Luton 4-1 at Villa Park in 1982! A couple of penalties from Sld Cowans, Withe and Dennis Mortimer all scoring! ▶

I've never experienced it and that would be some evening and experience. We are so close and I really believe it will happen on 2024/25 season.

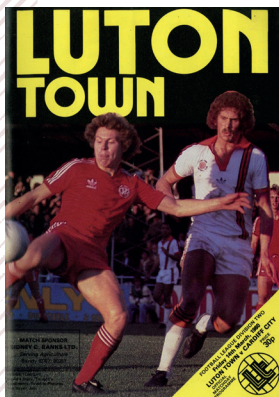
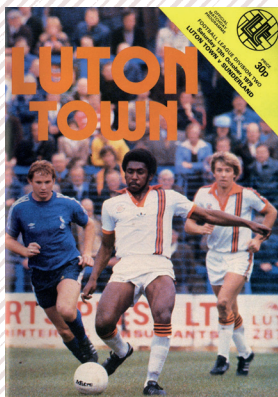

1979/80 HOME SHIRT

After five seasons of wearing orange home shirts, the Hatters moved back to white for the 1979/80 season. This year also saw our first Adidas kits and a relationship that lasted ten seasons until 1989/90 season.

The shirt maintains the previous season's 'stripe' but this time, the stripe is orange with thin black lines rather than a block white from previous seasons. Our badge switched from the left side to the right side for this season, a move that only lasted for this shirt template.

The 80's Luton badge was stitched onto the shirt, along with the retro Adidas logo that featured in the centre of the shirt, just under the buttons. We had a smart, orange collar this season which meant the orange of the stripe, and the collar really pops against the core white of the shirt.

Finally, we had the iconic 'three stripes' down the sides of the sleeves in orange and black. It really is a beautiful shirt.

Aside from the change in colour, manufacturer and badge location, it also features our first sponsor! From March 1980, Tricentrol adorned the shirt, just under the Adidas logo. The sponsor also invaded a bit of the stripe and adds a different dimension to an already glorious shirt.

As for the season, we finished a respectable sixth place in the second tier, a big improvement on the previous season's 18th! David Moss was our top scorer, banging in 24 goals. Notable games from that season include a 1-0 home win against Watford, which included an eye watering 62 free kicks. Nice tame game then...!

Bob Hatton was the hero that day, with Jake Findlay keeping a clean sheet. We did the double over the Hornets that season, with a 1-0 at Vicarage Road, too. Other epic games in this shirt include a home 3-3 draw with Chelsea, and a David Moss hat-trick against Fulham in a 4-0 home victory.

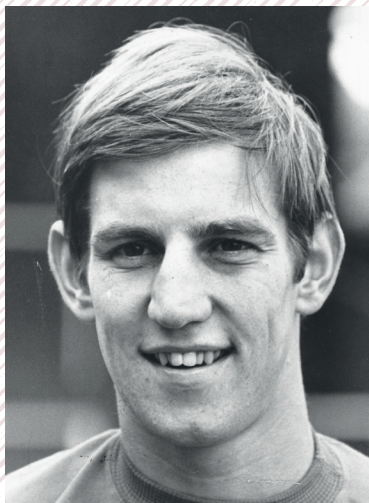

REST IN PEACE, CHRIS NICOLL

Tributes paid for former Town and Villa centre-half

Everyone at Kenilworth Road has been saddened to learn of the passing of Chris Nicholl after a long illness at the age of 77.

Chris was a mainstay at the heart of the Hatters defence, alongside John Moore, as the Town secured promotion to the old Division Two in 1970 before almost securing a place in the top flight a year later.

Discarded by Burnley as a youngster, Chris was plying his trade with Witton Albion when he was picked up by Halifax who he helped to promotion to Division Three (now League One) in 1969.

Early in the following campaign, the towering central defender was the first to subdue Luton's Malcolm Macdonald leading to a £30,000 move to Kenilworth Road the following day where,

after a fairly slow start, he became a rock in the centre of the Hatters defence as they nearly won back to back promotions.

Sadly, finances dictated Chris's £90,000 move to Aston Villa in 1972 and from there he went to Southampton and finally Grimsby, picking up 51 caps for Northern Ireland during his travels.

Chris received his big managerial break at Southampton in 1985 and remained at the Dell until 1991. Since then he scouted for Wigan, was assistant manager of Northern Ireland and managed Walsall before becoming a local radio commentator at the Bescot Stadium.

Our condolences go out to all his family and friends.

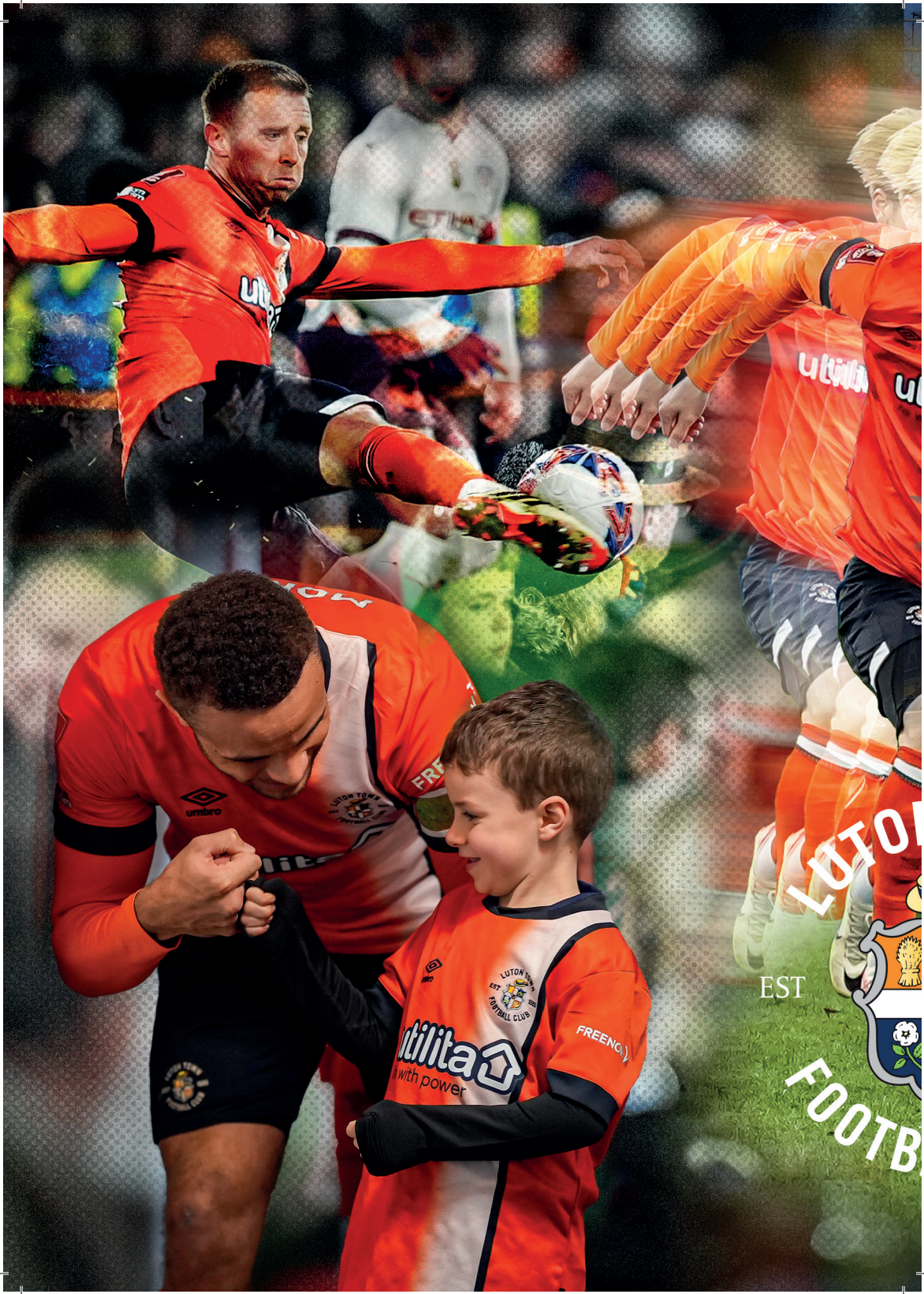

GREAT GAME TORQUAY 0-1 TOWN 2ND MARCH 2002

The Town are marching towards promotion in 2001/02 when they head to south Devon on this day 22 years ago today.

Joe Kinnear's side made the trip to Plainmoor in search of a club record 11th away victory of the season and duly returned to Bedfordshire with all three points.

Croatian sensation Ahmet Brkovic is the match-winner, latching onto Kevin Nicholls' perfect through-ball and tucking home after rounding a certain Kevin Dearden in the Torquay goal.

Dearden, however, is in good form to deny the Town more goals on a day in which Kinnear's men are superior in all departments.

The Hatters would end the campaign as runners-up to Plymouth, finishing on 97 points, winning 30 of their 46 games and scoring 96 goals.

CLEAN SHEET RECORD

If results on this day in the past are anything to go by then the Hatters should be cherishing a win with a clean sheet come the end of the 90 minutes.

Of course, football does not work like that but the Town's previous record on 2nd March certainly makes for interesting reading.

Of the 19 games played, Hatters teams in the past have kept an impressive 11 clean sheets, also winning on 11 occasions.

The Town might have lost last time out on 2nd March – against Chelsea in the FA Cup fifth round in 2022 – but that was the first defeat on this day since 1912! That included a 14-match unbeaten run which saw the Hatters concede just three times across the 110 years – not bad going if we say so ourselves.

The Town won nine of those 14 games, including two games in the top-flight. In 1985 Mick Harford and Ricky Hill were on target in a 2-1 win over Sunderland at Kenilworth Road and six years later, a solitary strike from Iain Dowie earned the Town a vital victory over Nottingham Forest.

These 14 games perfectly encapsulate the Hatters' rollercoaster existence across 110 years, with victory in the top five tiers of the English football pyramid.

As well as those two top-flight wins, victories in the second tier were achieved over Southampton (1-0 in 1976), Cambridge (1-0 in 1982) and Nottingham Forest (1-0 in 2021).

The sole win in the third tier came in League One at home to Rochdale in 2019 when goals from strikers Danny Hylton and James Collins earned all three points.

The fourth tier triumph came at Torquay mentioned elsewhere on this page, while the Hatters were also successful in the fifth tier on this day.

That day was a special one in particular back in 2013 as the John Still era at Kenilworth Road began with victory as a goal from Jake Howells in first half stoppage time earned victory in the new boss' first game in charge.

KENILWORTH ROAD TO HOST WNL LEAGUE CUP FINAL IN MARCH

The Women's National League Cup Final between Newcastle United and Hashtag United will take place at Kenilworth Road on Saturday 23rd March 2024.

The Kenny will be the biggest venue to date to host the competition's Final, which will be fought out between two of Newcastle and Hashtag following their semi-final victories this weekend.

players from the team down to the game on the 23rd March.

Gary Sweet, Town CEO said: "The women's game has grown to new heights in so many ways in recent seasons and we're truly seeing a new era for women's football.

"That's why we are delighted to have the backing of the Football Association to provide Kenilworth Road as the host stadium for this hugely respected and exciting national competition, a fitting venue that the two finalists will deserve for such a big occasion.

"The success of our own women's team this season has added to the already growing interest in the women's game locally and we are looking forward to opening the Kenilworth Road doors to thousands of fans who feel similarly inspired."

The club secretary of the Luton Town Ladies, David Baker said: "Luton Town Ladies Football Club are so thrilled to be involved in the Women's National League Final this year. A-Z THE NON-LEAGUE YEARS

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS

Part Fourteen. R is for Rushden & Diamonds.

Rushden & Diamonds had been formed in 1992 as a merger between Rushden Town and Irthlingborough Diamonds under the ownership of Doc Martens chief Max Griggs. He oversaw a meteoric rise up the Leagues and built a very well appointed ground at Nene Park, complete with expensive chandeliers in the reception area.

The rise was so fast that they were promoted to the Football League where they clashed with the Town, and even reached as high as League One. Sadly, by 2009 both sides were in the Conference.

The first game at Conference level came in October 2009 at Kenilworth Road in front of a Kenilworth Road crowd of 7,101 with new manager Richard Money sitting in the stand holding a watching brief.

He was not impressed with what he saw. Although huffing and puffing in the first period without troubling former Hatter Nathan Abbey in the Diamonds goal, his new team fell apart in the second period and it came as a surprise that it took until the 84th minute for them to break the deadlock. Skipper Kevin Nicholls was dispossessed in midfield after slipping, leaving

the impressive Lee Tomlin to speed through with the ball to net with ease. A further goal from Mark Byrne in added time rubbed salt into the wound.

The Town improved and by the end of the campaign were in the play-offs as were Diamonds. The sides met at Nene Park in a dead rubber on the final day of the regular season but played out an entertaining 1-1 draw with Tom Craddock on target for the Town.

Both sides failed in the play-offs so met again the following season where at Kenilworth Road in January 2011 the Town fully avenged their previous season's performance with a comprehensive 3-0 victory. Matthew Barnes-Homer, with two, and Claude Gnaka netted the goals against a side who had gone three months without a league win.

In the return, a Robbie Willmott goal separated the sides in the Town's favour but by this time Diamonds were suffering having lost the financial clout of Max Griggs. Deducted five points during the campaign for financial irregularities, they were demoted at the season's end into oblivion.

A phoenix club has now been set up but sadly Nene Park is no more. 🐦

ACADEMY UPDATE

WITH WITH HEAD OF ACADEMY COACHING DAN WALDER



Since moving away from the Under-18s role at Luton Town, I have transitioned into the Head of Coaching role which is vastly different from the positions I have previously filled.

The adjustment from a “Coach” to a “Coach Developer” has been a sharp learning curve and I have had to get used to, accept and embrace the challenges which come with this position.

This season, we have been focused on upskilling the coaches to make the Academy as relevant, challenging and productive as possible in the ever-changing climate of the modern game. Developing a process which is analytical and objective to give the coaches pinpoint feedback on their intervention styles and biases, is one area that is key to this and allows the coaches to assess and critique their own coaching utilising a variance of systems and formations.

The brand-new look to the “Elite Coaches Framework” is one area of this, where coaches receive detailed statistical feedback based on which parts of the game they are focussing on the most, and how their coaching links into the brand-new Academy Playing Philosophy and Coaching Methodology.

The fantastic work that has been going on in the first team has helped with this enormously. For example, the addition of Ross Barkley and Sambi Lokonga to the first team this year has allowed us to analyse our own first team players who excel in their awareness as well receiving the ball under pressure and relay this to the players, creating specific practices which work on these skills when outnumbered against opposition. The man-for-man pressing in games has allowed us to utilise positive examples of aggressive pressing styles when working both zonally and individually, and display this as a cultural identity during Academy Fixtures.

The quick passing nature of the first team, has allowed us to emulate how the players make clever angles and distances, creating triangles and diamonds all over the pitch – and to ensure that this style of play is present in Academy games.

All of this work has only been possible through the addition

of staff members in both the coaching and analysis departments as well as the tireless hunger of all of the staff to create the best possible programme for the players in terms of the fantastic variety they have had in their games and tournament programme this year, the enhanced mix of training programmes they have received and the analysis which has been conducted culminating in the Under-18s winning their league as well as various football and futsal tournaments being won across the age groups throughout the season.

There is still so much work to do and over the next eight weeks we are further implementing and enhancing the statistical and objective feedback for coaches which will help shed some light on the areas that we need to focus on as staff going forward.

Hopefully this continued effort and hard work will help the Academy to create more players who can make the transition from the Academy to the first team and follow in the footsteps of Cauley Woodrow and Joe Johnson.

On 18 minutes the lead was doubled. Fiona Buttigieg floated a ball over the top of the Woburn defence in the direction of Elizabeth Sanders, who took her time one on one with the keeper and slotted the ball into the bottom right corner.

New signing, Shianne Swarres controlled the tempo of the midfield in the first half, but her best moment came in the 30th minute, sending an incredible pass in behind the Woburn defence to pick out Andie Dickens, who sent the ball across

the face of the goal, only for Sanders to miss the target.

With 12 minutes left to play in the first half Luton had a third. Buttigieg's corner was headed by a Woburn defender towards her own goal which was parried by the keeper but forced home by Dickens who fired the rebound into the back of the net.

Three minutes later, Dickens scored again. Picking up the ball just inside the box, she curled the ball towards the goal and the shot was too powerful for the Woburn keeper to keep out.

The goals continued after the restart when 11 minutes into the second half the Town scored again. The Woburn keeper took a goal kick that is cut out by Pearson and she did exceptionally well to lob the keeper who had not yet made it back to her goal.

With 15 minutes left to play five became six. It was an unfortunate moment for the Woburn keeper who fired the ball at Spillman, resulting in the ball dropping into an open goal for Tanya Blacksley to tap in.

A defensive mix up produced a seventh Luton goal with seven minutes to play. A Woburn defender cleared the ball off the line but her clearance was sent straight into another Woburn player and then into the back of the net.

The scoring was then complete with five minutes left to play when Gabriella Spillman got a deserved goal. It was a fantastic run from Pearson on the right hand side and she teed up Spillman who made no mistake with her finish.

SELHURST PARK SATURDAY 9TH MARCH 2024 KICK-OFF 3.00PM

WHERE?

Selhurst Park has remained unchanged since our last visit to this corner of South London. The ground, which opened in 1924 has a capacity of 25,486. Designed by the famed architect Archibald Leitch, it has hosted international football in the past, as well as the Olympics in 1948. Since the Town played here in 2007, the stadium layout has changed slightly, with away supporters now housed at the other end of the Arthur Waite Stand – and further away from the two-tiered structure behind the goal at the Holmesdale Road end. Even though this stand is one of the oldest, it still offers fans great acoustics to get behind their team.

HOW TO GET THERE.

As ever the Bobbers Travel Club are running a coach to Selhurst Park. Departing from Luton at 11.30am the fare is £24 for adults and £22 for concessions. Book your spot on the coach by calling 01234 856542. Selhurst Park is situated at the heart of a residential area with strict parking regulations in operation on the streets immediately surrounding the stadium which means driving isn't ideal. Taking the train is the best bet. The nearest stations to Selhurst Park are Selhurst, Norwood Junction and Thornton Heath, all of which are within 15 minutes' walk of the stadium.

UNHAPPY HUNTING GROUND.

The Town head to Selhurst Park looking to improving on a record that stands at seven wins from 45 visits. Not since the opening day of the 2005/06 season have the Hatters won at Palace. That afternoon, 2,500 travelling fans celebrated a 2-1 win thanks to goals from Steve Howard and Ahmet Brkovic. The Eagles won the last meeting on London soil in the Championship in February 2007, while it was honours even for the last time we met at Selhurst Park in the top-flight. That day a penalty from Mark Pemble earned the Hatters a point in a 1-1 draw. Those with stories from their parents or grandparents may regale how the Town lost 7-0 twice there (in 1907 and 1929) and 8-0 in 1909!

THE PALACE OF TODAY.

Roy Hodgson was replaced in the managerial hotseat by Austrian Oliver Glasner and the new boss had the desired effect in his first game in charge as the Eagles lifted themselves from the relegation zone with a 3-0 win over Burnley last weekend. Palace's record since October has seen them win just four times in 19 games, which saw them beat Burnley twice, Sheffield United and Brentford. On home turf, the Eagles have won three of their last four at home, with one defeat – at home to Chelsea – preventing that from making it four in a row.

ROUND-UP

Since the Hatters last kicked a ball in anger in the Premier League, the picture at the bottom of the table has changed significantly following the news earlier this week that Everton saw their ten-point deduction reduced to six after an appeal.

It meant the Toffees rose to 15th in the table, five points above the Town in the league standings, and enabled them to leapfrog Nottingham Forest and Brentford too.

On the pitch, Sean Dyche's side haven't won in nine Premier League matches after a late, late Lewis Dunk goal earned Brighton a point at the Amex last weekend. Everton entertained West Ham at Goodison Park earlier today.

So that all means the club closest to the Hatters in the table are Nottingham Forest who sit one place and four points above Rob Edwards' side. Forest hosted leaders Liverpool earlier today but went into the fixture having lost four of their last six matches in the top-flight.

Brentford lie one place and one point above Forest in 16th spot, the Bees losing last Monday against West Ham. Thomas Frank's side have taken nine points from their last 15 matches in the Premier League, winning three and losing 12. This afternoon they hosted west London rivals Chelsea – a side the Bees enjoy playing against.

Two clubs sit together on 28 points, eight points above us in the standings. Bournemouth aim to end a seven-match winless run when they head to Burnley tomorrow – the Clarets themselves in desperate need of the points.



Crystal Palace, meanwhile, were boosted by the new manager bounce last weekend. Austrian Oliver Glasner took over from Roy Hodgson and had an immediate effect on his new side as the Eagles boosted any fears of relegation with a 3-0 victory at home to Burnley. Palace's last four wins in the Premier League have been against Burnley, twice, Sheffield United and Brentford – today they travelled to Tottenham.

Looking at the other end of the table, Liverpool's win over the Hatters the previous week kept them at the top of the tree before winning the first piece of silverware of the season when beating Chelsea in the Carabao Cup. Jurgen Klopp's Reds sit a point clear of Manchester City who in turn sit a point ahead of Arsenal in what all neutrals hope will be an exciting race for the title.
