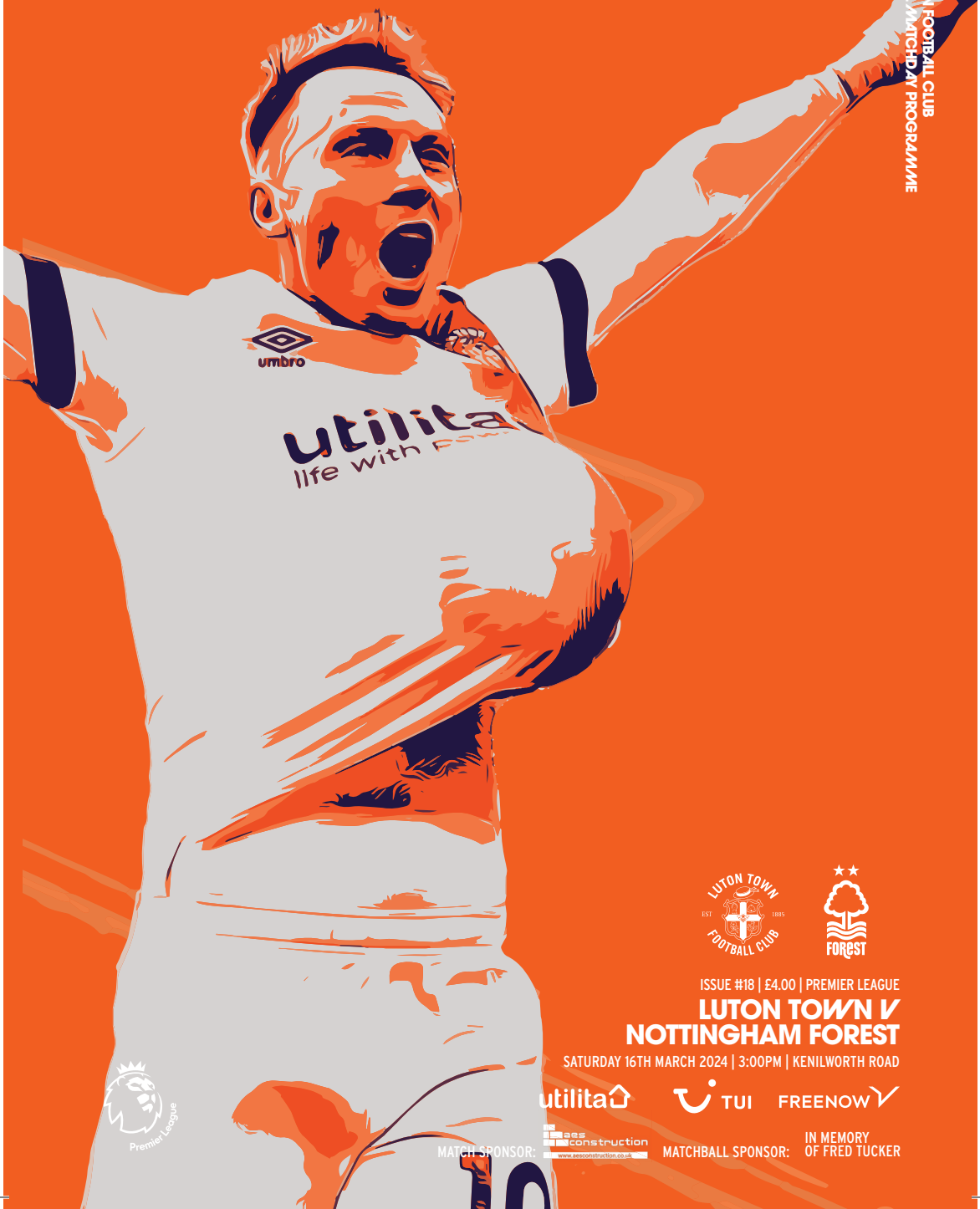

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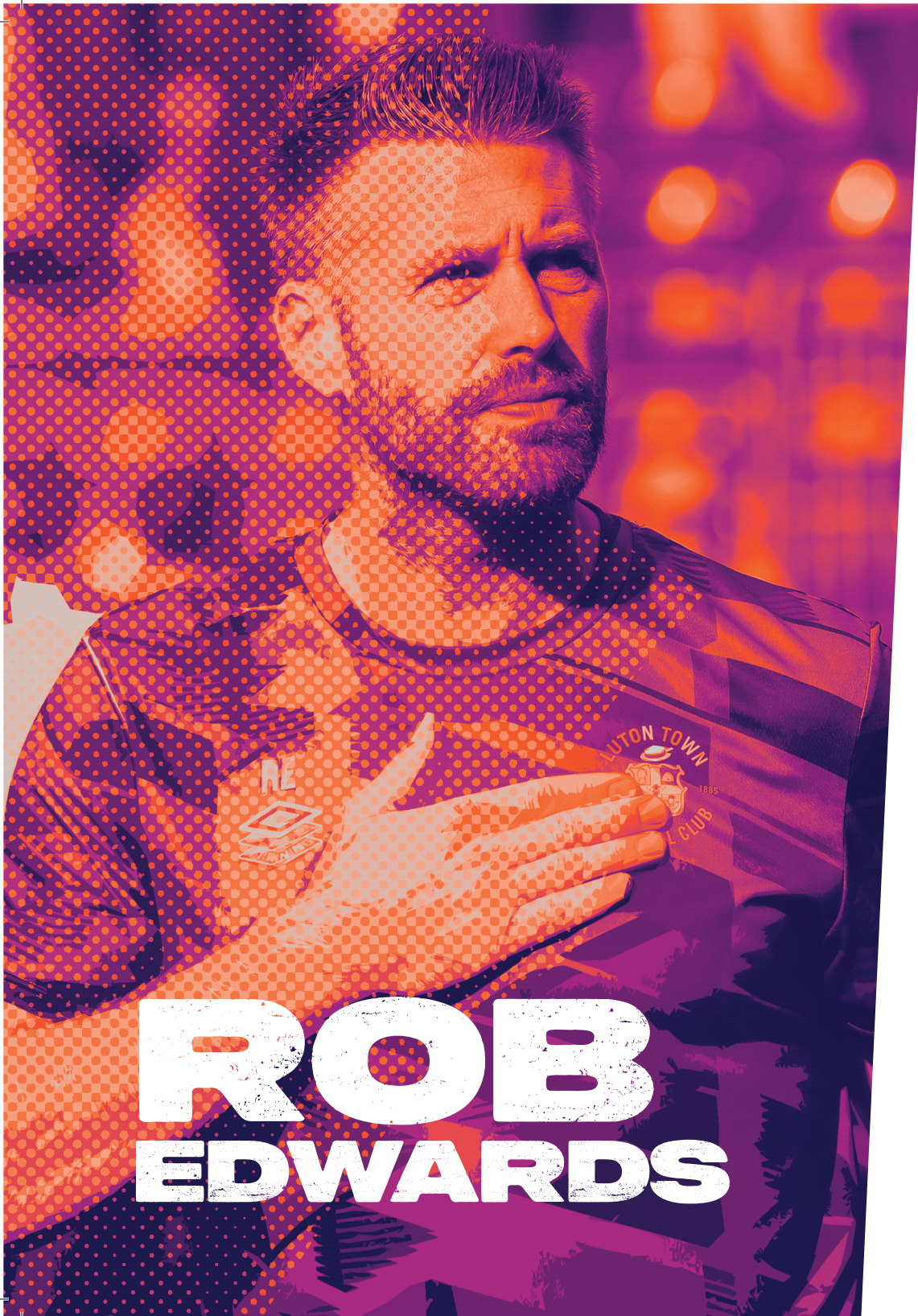

I think there's a feeling from you that you understand what we're going through right now, so that support at the end meant a lot after such an exhausting and exasperating 45 minutes.

After the game, as a group of staff, we went through the match and went through it again when we woke up. We have no alternative but to try and learn from our mistakes and try more of the things that we did so well on Wednesday that got us in such a commanding position at half-time.

It's a case of recovering now for today's game and look ahead to what is for both clubs a massive game.

I'd like to welcome Nuno Espirito Santo and his Nottingham Forest team and staff to the Kenny. It doesn't take a genius to work out how important this game is for both clubs so all I will say is that off the pitch, in the stands, we need you.


Two matches from last season will stick in my memory forever. Watford and Sunderland at home here were experiences like no other. On the pitch we'll pick ourselves up. It will be the same group of players that need to go again so they are going to need your support. They will be doing all they can to make you proud of this football club.

We understand it's difficult right now but I'm never going to sit here and make excuses, in these notes or when I'm talking in the media. We have a group that we believe in and we've got to stay strong.

Wednesday night was undoubtedly a setback but we've had plenty of those. We had a bigger one the last time we travelled to Bournemouth in what was a life and death situation. Wednesday wasn't that – we lost a football match in a harsh way. But we'll learn and we'll get better.

Everyone works so hard to do the club proud in the toughest league in the world and we're not going to stop now.

As I mentioned at the start, your support has been magnificent. So please keep it up. We'll need you today, so bring the noise and get behind the boys.

It was fantastic to meet up with the medical staff who helped save my life three months ago. They are amazing people, so humble, and I was truly heartened to see them after what had happened to me. I was introduced to the crowd before the game and while it was nice to receive all that applause, I was pointing my finger towards the medics, as they are the real heroes.

At half-time I then chatted with fans from both our and Bournemouth's supporters' clubs who raised over £2,000 for the British Heart Foundation through various fundraising initiatives, including Mark Crowther, who is cycling to every game this season. It truly is inspiring to see people go to such lengths to raise money for such a great cause.

Bournemouth were great and they really rolled out the red carpet for me – I even had my face on the front of the programme! It was a really nice touch and I think there is a real mutual respect between the two clubs and sets of fans as a result, especially shown in the 59th minute when there was a round of applause.

Remember, if you don't know CPR, then go and learn it. It saved my life and you might one day help save somebody's life – it could be someone incredibly close to you. So get out there and do it!

During the half-time presentation I was probably grinning from ear to ear in the photographs. The boys put in a tremendous attacking display to be 3-0 up, scoring some excellent goals. We put ourselves in such a good position but I don't think anyone truly expected what would happen next.

There's no getting away about how disappointing the second half was for us. We could sit here and talk about it until we're blue in the face but that won't help. What we need to do to is put that to the back of our minds because this afternoon we have a massive game against a Nottingham Forest team who are within our sights.

The boys know the importance of today, a victory would put us above them in the table going into the international break. However, for them to be able to do that we need all four sides of the Kenny to bring the sort of noise we've heard in recent seasons here. Those Watford and Sunderland games immediately spring to mind.

Your support really does make a difference and the boys need your backing more than ever. The lads are giving everything right now and they have been brilliant in the face of some testing times. Please show them how much they mean to you this afternoon.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHAIRMAN
DAVID WILKINSON

Good afternoon everyone and a very warm welcome to today's visitors Nottingham Forest.

Our clubs have quite a history since playing each other for the first time in 1938 in the old second division. Since then we have played each other 68 times with us winning 23 and drawing 18.

One of my earliest memories was our FA Cup run in 1959. The biggest crowd ever, 30,069, in the Kenny for the quarter-final against Blackpool, a dramatic semi-final draw against Norwich at White Hart Lane in front of 65,000 and a tense 1-0 victory in the replay at St Andrews led us to our first ever Wembley appearance against Forest. We went into the game as strong favourites having beaten them 5-1 just a few weeks before, but sadly, it wasn't to be and we didn't play well on the day and lost 2-1.

We had another major disappointment when in the year following our League Cup Final win against Arsenal we made it to Wembley again, in the same competition, but came up short 3-1 against Brian Clough's Forest.

Over the years several notable players have appeared for both clubs amongst those are David Pleat, Danny Wilson, Kingsley Black and Barry Butlin and, of

course, Mick Harford also had a brief spell as their manager.

You don't need me to tell you that today is a relegation battle. With ten games left we are both in a fight to stay in the richest league in the world. Forest were promoted last year and managed to narrowly avoid relegation.

They demonstrated that, despite a huge turnover, and reportedly heavy investment in players, competing in this league is tough and that experience has been repeated this year. Chasing the dream can be dangerous as many clubs, including ourselves, have, in the past, found to their cost, and in the long term it cannot be right for a competition to be decided by those who can afford the greatest losses. Why does it seem to be an anathema to show a profit? Sustainability should be the key and it is that that is currently exercising the grey cells of all those at the top of football.

Having experienced so much of it since our inception nearly 140 years ago, we are strong supporters of our football pyramid and believe that it is the base that gives it its strength. It is country wide and all encompassing. It is open to all and encourages pride and investment in local communities. It breaks down barriers between classes,

racism and creeds and encourages discourse. It is one of the greatest enablers of social intercourse and a catalyst for charitable work and funding. Like an iceberg it is easy to lose sight of what is beneath the pinnacle, but highly dangerous to do so.

Every youngster who kicks a ball against a wall or in the park with his or her friends dreams of playing for their favourite team. The base of the pyramid is source of all the future hopes. In youth football everyone wants to know that there is a pathway for a player to progress and this must apply to clubs as well. What is the incentive without a target? Where is the joy without a challenge?

Most clubs have experienced the highs and lows. It is a proven fact that football is a cyclical business. All but two of the clubs in the Premier League have spent time in lower divisions and it is only Arsenal of the top six who haven't. Today's opponents are a classic example when in the late 70s and early 80s they won two European Cups and many other competitions under the management of Brian Clough.

The EFL clubs live in hope of reaching

the promised land, but when they get there the hope can turn to fear. Fear of relegation, but this must be good because it is these swings of emotion that make this sport so successful and watchable. Personally I can't imagine not having had those experiences.

We continue to be involved in last-minute drama. It has so often this season gone against us, but it was our way, for once, last Saturday with Cauley converting Andros' superb cross in the dying seconds at Crystal Palace.

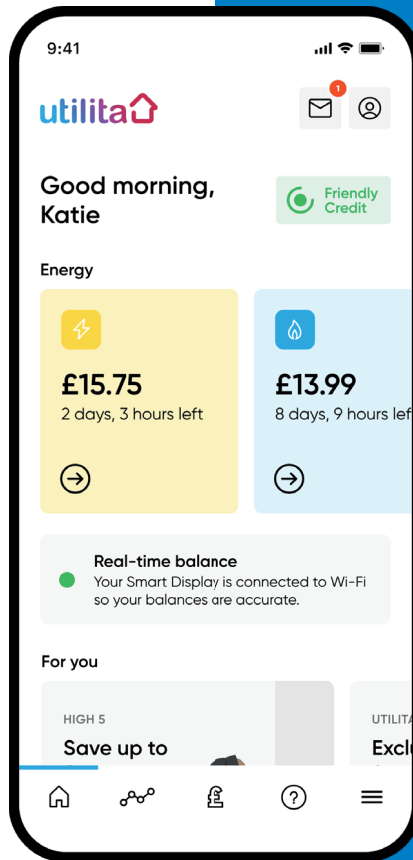
Gary and I are just back from Bournemouth where we witnessed more drama and this time massive disappointment, but I hope that we remember how far we have come and see how much our wonderful squad are putting into their performances. Your support has been magnificent and we all need to keep going for Rob and all his team.

It is great to see Locks in good spirit and we'd like to thank all at Bournemouth for all they did to recognise him and the awful events of that day. Thanks also go to both our supporters groups who raised funds to help with travel and for the British Heart Foundation. ▶

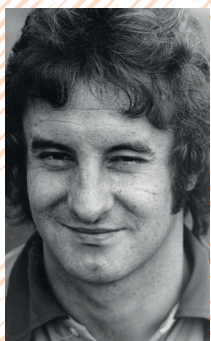
HAPPY BIRTHDAY

REST IN PEACE

Jimmy Husband.

15th October 1947 – 9th March 2024

News has reached Kenilworth Road of the sad passing of Jimmy Husband at the age of 76 after a short illness.

Born in Newcastle, Jimmy was a highly regarded schoolboy footballer, and after playing for England schoolboys, was left with the choice of many clubs who coveted him. In 1963 he opted for League champions Everton.

Jimmy became a regular for the Goodison Park side, picking up several England under-23 caps, appeared in an FA Cup final in 1968 and won a League Championship medal in 1970. He would doubtless have picked up a full England cap but manager Alf Ramsey was averse to using wingers which was where he predominately played at the time.

Jimmy was fast and skilful with an eye for goal and became Luton manager Harry Haslam's final piece in the jigsaw, in December 1973, as the Hatters sought successfully to win promotion to the top flight.

Scorer of many vital goals during that season and the next four years for the Town, Jimmy finished his career, along with many others, in the North American Soccer League.

His record of 48 goals in 162 first team games in Hatters colours confirmed his

value to a side containing the likes of John Aston, Jim Ryan, Peter Anderson and the Fitcher twins.

On his return to the UK, Jimmy settled in mid-Bedfordshire where he ran a pub and was a welcome guest of the club in 2005 for the Kenilworth Road Centenary celebrations.

Our condolences go out to all his family and friends.

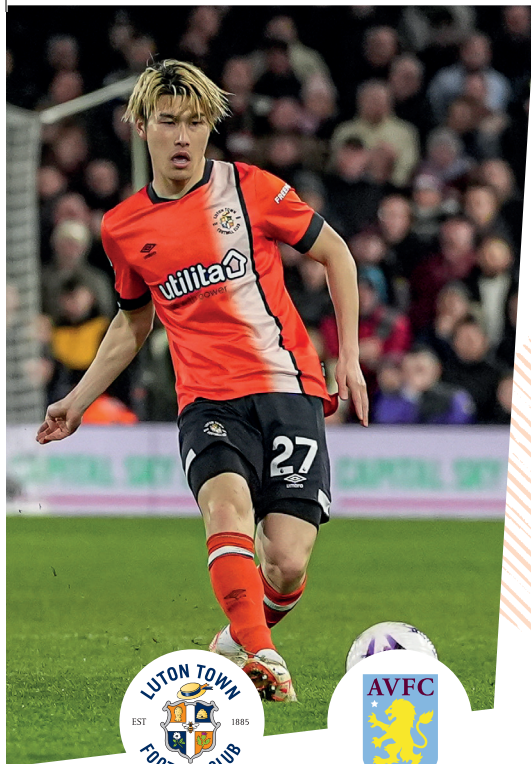

HATTERS COMEBACK ENDED BY LATE VILLA WINNER

With a minute left on the clock, and with a point within their grasp following one of the finest, battling 45 minutes at Kenilworth Road this season, all of the Town's incredible endeavour was undone in heart-breaking fashion.

Moussa Diaby swung in a cross from the right and fellow substitute Lucas Digne nodded past Thomas Kaminski at the back-post and a relieved Aston Villa celebrated a crucial win in their quest for Champions League football.

The Town, inconsolable, were left to reflect on nothing to show for their efforts that saw them battle back from the dead to level after a first half that saw Villa ease into a two-goal lead.


Ollie Watkins was the difference in the opening period with two very well taken goals to put Unai Emery's side in control.

Kaminski had earlier repelled Villa with a series of fine saves but the Town keeper's night was much quieter after the interval as the Hatters took the game to their visitors.

In a wonderful response despite trailing by two, the Hatters penned Villa back and deservedly halved the deficit on 66 minutes when Tahith Chong bundled the ball over from close range after Villa couldn't deal with a right-wing cross.

Kenilworth Road was bouncing. It was just what the Sky Sports cameras wanted. Six minutes after making it 2-1 it was level and the noise was deafening as belief flowed through those in orange. Alfie Doughty's deep left-wing free-kick was floated to perfection to the back-post for Carlton Morris to send a side-foot finish beyond Emil Martinez.

All of a sudden the Town tails were well and truly up and Villa had no answer. Three minutes after the equaliser – and with 15 minutes left – Morris nodded straight at Martinez following Jordan Clark's cross. Kenilworth Road's foundations might not have coped had that effort found the target.

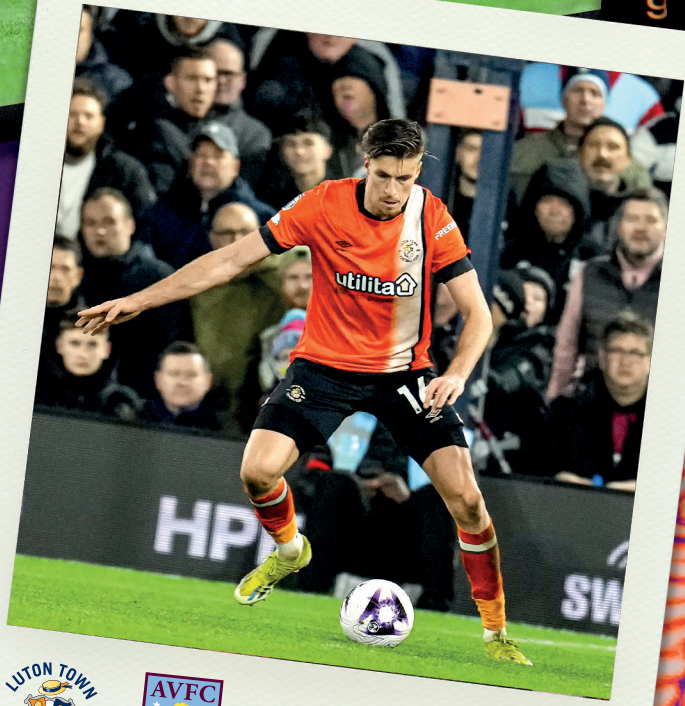
Still the Town pushed. But Villa had the final say to knock the stuffing out for the Hatters at the death when Diaby and Digne combined and that was that.

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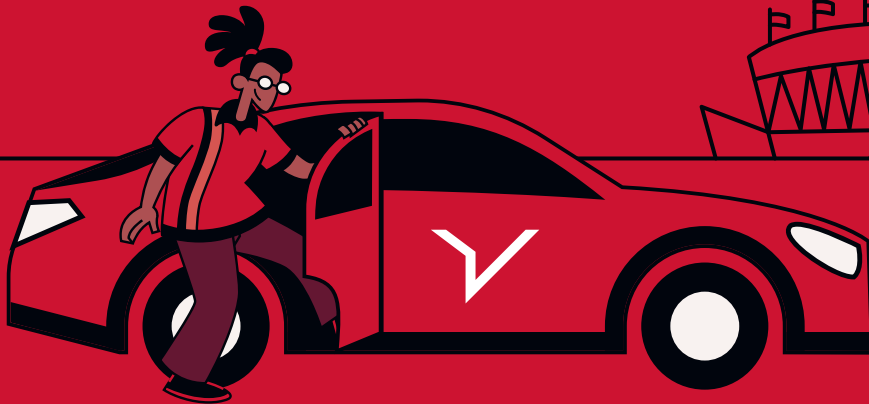
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REFLECTIONS ON VILLA DEFEAT

Carlton Morris couldn't hide his frustration that his eighth Premier League goal of the season and fifth in seven games didn't earn the Hatters a point against Aston Villa in our last home Premier League outing.

The striker's goal – which brought the Hatters level having trailed 2-0 at half-time – made him become the first Hatters player to net in three successive home top-flight matches since Iain Dowie in 1990.

"That's my main job as a forward, creating goals and scoring them, but it's extremely frustrating when it doesn't follow with a result. I'm really disappointed as it's another occasion of the performance being there, but us not coming away with any points," said the former Barnsley frontman.

"The first half wasn't really us, we were losing too many duels, we weren't really at the races and second half it was like the switch flicked and that was us performance-wise, but it's disappointing not to come away with any points.

"Set-plays is a strength of ours, we need to keep that going, but I'm just going to keep working hard, keep the team positive. It's a humble, hard-working group, that's what we do, and that's

what's going to get us out of this fight."

At the other end of the pitch the Hatters had goalkeeper Thomas Kaminski to thank for a series of fine stops to prevent Villa increasing their two-goal lead.

The Belgian also reflected on the first half performance that allowed the visitors to go in at the break in command.

"It was a very bad first half I think," said the Town keeper. "We were not really aggressive in the first half, we were a little bit on the back foot and maybe we showed Villa a little bit too much respect. For me it was good, but I'd rather make zero saves and get the three points.

"At half-time the manager said, 'if you come out aggressive and on the front foot, win a couple of duels, the fans will be behind us again' and that's what happened, as you can see what happens when the fans are there.

"He was very direct in his message and I think we all understood and that's why we came out so aggressively, took the game a little bit in our hands, but we can't give these goals away.

"We came back very well, we did the right things, we were aggressive, we were on the front foot, but unfortunately they get that last goal. We are doing the right things, especially at home, also against a good side, but it's disappointing as we've got no points." 🥹





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LAST-GASP WOODROW EQUALISER GIVES TOWN A POINT AT PALACE

The late hurt and heartbreak from the previous weekend's defeat to Aston Villa was quickly banished as the Hatters served up a late show of their own to earn what could be a crucial point come the end of the season.

As the games begin to run out, all of a sudden every point becomes more precious – and when an equaliser comes in the final moments of a game which the Town had not been at their best – the scenes of jubilation in the away end and among the squad come the end told its own story.

Trailing to Jean-Philippe Mateta's 11th-minute goal, the Town rallied in the second half but all seemed lost but with one final action two substitutes combined to breathe new life in the Hatters' survival hopes. Andros Townsend, a former Palace favourite, cut inside on his left foot and arced a dangerous cross that found the head of Woodrow who guided his header gloriously into the corner.

Mateta's opener exasperated those of a Town persuasion as the striker nonchalantly turned home inside the six-yard box after Alfie Doughty's back-pass left Thomas Kaminski and Gabe Osho leaving the ball for each other.

Palace spurned several chances to double their lead. Mateta heading over on the half-hour before shooting wide after being gifted the ball by Jordan Clark shortly before the break.

After the interval the Hatters' chances of a positive result took a turn for worse when Edwards lost Osho and the impressive Teden Mengi in the space of 15 minutes as the Town revered to a back-four with Daiki Hashioka and Reece Burke operating in the centre.

But the Town upped their enterprise in the search of a leveller and on 67 minutes their efforts were nearly rewarded when Carlton Morris struck a volley straight at Johnstone.

After that let off Palace then should have been out of sight on 74 minutes when Kaminski produced a fantastic save to thwart Mateta from close range. It would turn out to be a key moment.

Eberechi Eze almost scored from 50 yards with an audacious effort that clipped the crossbar and, as time ticked down, it seemed that the Town were running out of ideas in their quest for a late point especially when Odsonne Édouard hit the bar.

But just when it looked all over, Townsend and Woodrow combined and the Hatters were left to celebrate a momentous point with their travelling fans.

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WOODROW'S DELIGHT AT LATE LEVELLER

Cauley Woodrow's first Premier League goal in almost a decade rescued what could prove to be a vital point in the fight for survival against Crystal Palace last weekend.

The 29-year-old, whose only other top-flight goal also came against the Eagles when playing for Fulham on the final day of the 2013/14 campaign, silenced the Selhurst Park crowd with an inch-perfect glancing header in the 96th minute.

It sent the travelling Hatters into ecstasy, and asked about them singing 'He's one of our own' in the celebrations when the final whistle blew seconds later, Woodrow replied: "It's amazing. I love this club.

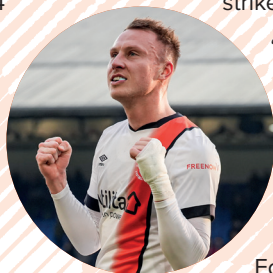
"I've got history here from when I was younger and I came back last summer and I haven't played probably as much as I'd have wanted to, but I've always got a good attitude, I keep my head down and do as much as I can for the team and it was a really great moment.

"I'm really grateful that they did that at the end. I'm just thankful that I could send them home with a happy result."

Woodrow also explained his special celebration immediately after netting

his third goal of the season in all competitions, following a Carabao Cup strike against Gillingham back in August and the last-gasp winner in the FA Cup fourth round tie at Everton in January.

"My wife is pregnant and the baby is due on the 7th May, so she said to me 'Next time you score, stick the ball up your top,'" smiled the striker.




"I scored against Everton and I forgot, so I was getting it in the earhole to be fair because I was thinking I'm not sure I'm going to score before the baby comes! But thankfully it came today and she's text me already, so it's all good."

Former Palace winger Andros Townsend, whose cross led to the leveller, believes the point could be huge come the end of the season.

He said: "You never know how important that is going to be. It's so those fine margins that could turn out to be so vital in our battle to stay in this league.

"We once again showed just how much we fight for each other and the team. The spirit in this dressing room is truly like no other I've been a part of.

"We kept going to the very end, like we have done on many occasions this season, and we got our reward." 

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HATTERS LET HALF-TIME LEAD SLIP AT BOURNEMOUTH

The Town saw a 3-0 half-time lead evaporate as they were beaten at Bournemouth.

Leading at the break thanks to terrific counter-attacking goals from Tahith Chong, Chiedozie Ogbene and Ross Barkley, the Hatters fell apart in the second period.

Dominic Solanke got the Cherries' first goal five minutes after the restart to pull one back but two goals in the space of two-and-half minutes – from Illia Zabarnyi and Antoine Semenyo – drew the hosts level.

Barkley missed a big chance for the Town to restore their on 71 minutes but with seven minutes to go the Cherries led for the first time when Semenyo thundered a shot past Thomas Kaminski.

With Tom Lockyer introduced to the crowd before the game, all seemed rosy at half-time with the Hatters well in command – Chong headed home in the ninth minute following a lovely dinked cross from Jordan Clark to get the ball rolling. It was the 16th successive game that the Town had scored in the Premier League this season.

But it got better for the Hatters shortly after the half-hour with a goal of real quality and attacking verve. Chong released Alfie Doughty down the left and his low cross was converted by Ogbene sliding home at the back post

Yet it got better for the Town in first-half injury time when Issa Kaboré released Barkley in on goal and the midfielder blasted home to make it 3-0.

Bournemouth were booed off at half-time but their supporters were on their feet just five minutes after the restart when Solanke turned and finished brilliantly in the box to get one back.

The goal gave the Cherries hope and as the hosts attacked at will, they completed the turnaround with two goals in the space of three minutes. Firstly Zabarnyi converted from close range despite the best efforts of the Town defence to clear the danger. The equaliser then came when Semenyo hit a low effort from the edge of the area beyond Kaminski.

The Hatters steadied the ship and could have retaken the lead when Barkley spurned a chance from a matter of yards having reacted quickest to Carlton Morris' flick-on from Doughty's set-piece.

But as time ticked down Bournemouth came again and the Cherries found a winner with seven minutes remaining when Semenyo added his second of the game, driving into the box from the right and blasting home.

TOWN FAN DAVE FOXEN LOOKS BACK AT THE HATTERS' COLOURS DOWN THE YEARS

1885 – 1889

If I were to ask you, “what colours do you associate with Luton Town?” your answers would probably be along the lines of orange, white, blue, black etc. But what about pink and purple? It probably wouldn't cross your mind unless you were a keen Hatters historian!

Our first ever kit was exactly that – pink and purple. If you pop in your time machine and go back to 1885 – 1889 and went to a Luton Town game, you will see our beloved club playing in a rather fetching pink and purple ‘kit’. I say kit in loose terms, as it is not the type of football attire you see these days.

I don't think anyone has seen this shirt live, due to it being 140 years old next year, but looking at the very grainy pictures from that era, the shirt looks very thick! It was half pink, half purple with buttons to keep the material together. It also boasted a very smart collar, and fetching pink and purple hat and we doubt that would pass the FA regulations these days!

The shorts are more like three-quarter lengths, going well below the knee. These shorts were in the purple-blue colour, with matching socks. The pink was left to just the shirt and hat. For that era, and looking at the manufacturing process, having two colours on the shirt and hat was quite forward thinking!

Fast forward to 2010 and the club released a special 125 Anniversary Special shirt to celebrate our club being 125 years old. This included both a rugby style shirt, and a modern-day remake. The modern-day remake was used in our match against Bath City in the Blue Square Premier in October 2010. We won that game 3-1, thanks to goals from Danny Crow, George Pilkington and Taiwo Atieno.

The original shirt, in 1885, was worn by the likes of E. Ellingham, George Deacon and J.C Lomax, the latter being our top scorer in 1888-1889 with six league goals!



WELCOME NOTTINGHAM FOREST

The Hatters welcome Nuno Espirito Santo's Nottingham Forest side to Kenilworth Road in what is a massive game in the Premier League relegation battle. Last time out, Forest lost 1-0 away to Brighton & Hove Albion.

Forest had a tough start to the season and faced Arsenal away on the opening day. Arsenal won 2-1 as two first half goals from Eddie Nketiah and Bukayo Saka before a late goal from Taiwo Awoniyi gave the Nottingham Forest fans something to cheer about.

In the next game, Forest picked up their first win of the season after beating Sheffield United 2-1 at home. This was followed by a 3-2 loss to Manchester United and a 1-0 home defeat to Burnley in the Carabao Cup.

In early September, Forest won their first away match of the season. This was an excellent 1-0 away win against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge, an Anthony Elanga goal was enough for the win.

After this, Forest went on a poor run. A home draw with Burnley was followed by a defeat at Manchester City. Two draws against Brentford and Crystal Palace were to follow.

In October, Forest then drew 2-2 with the Hatters. A Chris Wood double put Steve Cooper's side 2-0 up before late goals from Chiedozie Ogbene and Elijah Adebayo earned the Town a point.

Nottingham Forest picked up their next win in early November as they shocked the league by beating high flying Aston Villa 2-0. This was followed by four losses in a row against West Ham, Brighton, Everton and Fulham.

This poor run continued with a draw with Wolves and losses to Tottenham and Bournemouth making things look bleak just around Christmas. Nuno Espirito Santo was appointed as the new Forest boss after the loss to Spurs.

Boxing Day marked the start of a good run of form as a 3-1 away win against Newcastle and a 2-1 win over Manchester United turned the tide.

However, Forest have won one league game in 2024 so far and that was a 2-0 home win over West Ham United. More recently, Forest have lost three games in a row 1-0 and will be looking to pick up some big points in the coming weeks.

THE BOSS



NUNO ESPIRITO SANTO.

Installed as the Forest boss in December last year, replacing Steve Cooper. Led Wolves to the Premier League in 2018 and spent a short-spell in charge of Tottenham and Al-Ittihad in Saudi Arabia.

GOALKEEPER



MATZ SELS.

Belgian stopper who arrived at the City Ground last month from Ligue 1 side Strasbourg for a fee for £5 million. Began his career with Lierse and Gent before six years at Strasbourg.

DEFENDERS



WILLY BOLY.

Hugely experienced French-born Ivory Coast international centre-back who joined Forest from Wolves in 2022. Started his career at Auxerre before moving to Portugal with Braga and Porto.



MURILLO.

£10 million summer capture from Brazilian side Corinthians. Only 21, the centre-half only made his top-flight debut for the South American heavyweights in April last year.

MOUSSA NIAKHATE. Senegal international centre-half Moussa arrived at the City Ground in 2022 after spending six yards with Mainz in the German Bundesliga. Started his career with Valenciennes before moving to Metz.



HARRY TOFFOLO.

Born in Welwyn Garden City, left-back Harry started his career at Norwich but it wasn't until a spell at Lincoln that he shot to prominence. Signed for Huddersfield

in 2020 and moved to Forest following their promotion to the Premier League.



NECO WILLIAMS.

Highly-rated young Wales international full-back who joined Forest in 2022 for a fee of £17 million from Liverpool. Made his Liverpool debut in 2019/20 leading to his first cap for Wales.

MIDFIELDERS



DANILO.

Young Brazilian midfielder who arrived at the City Ground in January last year from Brazilian side Palmeiras. Made his senior debut aged 17 and scored his first goal in the Copa Libertadores.



CALLUM HUDSON-ODOI.

London-born midfielder or winger Callum signed for Forest in September last year. Came through the ranks at Chelsea where we won the Champions League and the World Club Cup in 2021.



NICOLAS

DOMINGUEZ. September 2023 arrival Nicolas signed from Italian club Bologna, where he had played over 100 games. An Argentina international he began his career with Velez Sarsfield.



MORGAN GIBBS-WHITE.

Attacking midfielder who signed for Forest from Wolves for £25 million last season. An England Under-21 international, he shot to prominence after scoring 11 goals while on-loan at Sheffield United in 2021/22.



IBRAHIM SANGARE.

Ivory Coast international defensive midfielder arrived at the City Ground in September last year for a fee for £30 million. Started his career at Toulouse in France before moving to PSV in the Netherlands.



RYAN YATES.

Forest academy graduate and club captain who made his debut for the club in 2018/19. Prior to his debut the defensive midfielder enjoyed loan spells with Barrow, Shrewsbury, Notts County and Scunthorpe.

ATTACKERS



TAIWO AWONIYI.

Nigeria international centre-forward who made an instant impact when signing last season. Scored ten goals in 27 appearances last term after arriving from Union Berlin in Germany for £17 million.



ANTHONY ELANGA.

Swedish winger Anthony joined Forest from Manchester United last summer for £15 million. Was part of the Red Devils squad that won the League Cup in 2023 and were runners-up in the Europa League in 2021.



DIVOCK ORIGI.

Belgium international striker who is currently on loan from AC Milan. Began his career with Lille but made his name during eight years at Liverpool, scoring 41 times in 175 games at Anfield.



CHRIS WOOD.

Experienced forward who scored twice against the Town earlier this season. Born in New Zealand, he moved to England to join West Brom in 2009. Became prolific during spells at Leicester, Leeds and Burnley eventually moving to Newcastle. Signed for Forest last summer.



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A HATTER AND A RED

Local boy Kingsley Black signed on for Luton Town after leaving college and following a series of brilliant displays on the left wing for the reserves he was awarded a League debut at QPR in September 1987 while still only 19.

Seven months later he starred as the Hatters lifted the Littlewoods Cup leading to a fight between Billy Bingham of Northern Ireland and Bobby Robson of England for his international services. He chose the former and eventually earned 30 caps for the country of his father.

An inevitable big money move followed, joining Forest in 1991 for £1.5 million, where he went on to be part of the squad that finished runners-up in the League Cup final in 1992 and the First Division (now Championship) in 1993.

After leaving the City Ground in 1996 he headed for Grimsby, where his experience helped the Mariners achieve two Wembley wins in 1998 as the club won the Second Division (now League One) play-offs and the Football League Trophy.



GREAT GAMES

This afternoon will be 69th meeting between the two clubs with Forest holding the upper hand marginally in the head-to-head record.

The Reds have won 27, the Town 23, while there have been 18 draws. Forest won both of arguably the two biggest matches the two sides have played against each other: the 1959 FA Cup Final and the 1989 League Cup final.

Of the Town's 23 victories, perhaps the most important came in the FA Cup in December 2007. Both clubs were in League One at the time but met in the FA Cup second round at Kenilworth Road.

With the Hatters on the cusp of administration, hopes were pinned on beating Forest and drawing a big gun in the third round. Calvin Andrew's solitary strike earned the Hatters a 1-0 win and money-spinning cup tie against Liverpool, eventually taking the Reds to a replay before the 2020 consortium were given the green light to take over.

The Town have won their last two home top-flight fixtures against Forest, winning 2-1 in April 1992 (Mick Harford and Julian James on target) and 1-0 in March 1991 (thank you Iain Dowie).

CULT HERO



CULT HERO: STUART PEARCE

If you search 'Nottingham Forest cult heroes' online, you'll find a book with that precise title, written by David McVay. With his arms spread wide in celebration – but with a steely facial expression – the lead image shows **Stuart Pearce** with the captain's armband. After joining Forest from Coventry in 1985, the man nicknamed 'Psycho' went on to become a club legend, make 522 appearances, scoring 88 goals – not bad for a left-back – and made 76 of his 78 England caps while at the City Ground.

Following promotion, the Town started the 1970/71 season, their first back in Division Two (now the Championship) since 1963, slowly – but once they had got used to the division and, aided by the goals of star striker Malcolm Macdonald, they started to climb the table.

In the week before Christmas 1970 the Hatters extended their run of only one defeat in 16 games in a 1-1 draw at Norwich, where the Canaries netted a fortunate last-minute penalty, and cemented their second place in the table, one point behind Leicester.

A Boxing Day home clash with Millwall was postponed late on due to snow but with the weather causing many cancellations the league table was not affected as the Town looked forward to the diversion of the FA Cup where we had been drawn away to top-flight Nottingham Forest.

Forest were going through a dismal run and had gone 11 games without a win but

a crowd of 23,230, including several special train loads from Luton, were at a freezing City Ground to see Forest run rings around the Hatters on an icy pitch and take a deserved lead on 18 minutes through Jimmy McIntosh.

On the half-hour Forest full-back John Winfield crashed into the back of the net, followed by Macdonald, with the result that a goal post snapped at its base – posts were made of wood in those days, and no doubt water had seeped in, frozen and then thawed leaving it weak.

The subsequent delay while a new post was sought out and put in place gave Luton coach Jimmy Andrews and his staff time to re-organise things on the pitch and, after the re-start, with Don Givens pushed further forward and winger Jimmy Ryan given a free role, the Town looked more threatening. Therefore it was no

surprise when a deserved equaliser, from the head of Macdonald, came on 70 minutes to take the tie back to Kenilworth Road.

Before the replay the Hatters drew 0-0 at home to QPR to preserve second place in the division and looked forward to the Forest clash and a good chance to avenge the FA Cup final defeat from only 12 years before.

This time 23,483 turned up to see a contest of high speed, thrust and parry with the Town attacking from the start but leaving themselves wide open for the counter attack.

After 15 minutes of sustained pressure, during which Forest goalkeeper Jim Barron pulled off some wonder saves, Forest broke away and scored a soft goal through Peter Cormack.

Macdonald levelled five minutes later only to see substitute Gary Collier and then John Richardson net twice within a minute to give the away side an apparently unassailable lead.

The Town were made of strong stuff, though, and a penalty from Macdonald after a foul on Jimmy Ryan opened the game up again.

Supernac was rampant and seemed to be playing the Forest defence on his own and the roof was lifted when he bagged his hat-trick with six minutes to go to level the tie.

Manager Alec Stock went down to the bench to supervise extra-time but watched in horror

as Forest winger Ronnie Rees raced through from a seemingly offside position to bang in the winner at the death.

Coach Jimmy Andrews said afterwards: "We over attacked. It was a great game for spectators, but not a great professional game. At times we were murdering them.

"We played well enough to win and badly enough to lose. Attacking football is great if you are not too worried about the result."

Manager Alec Stock was still seething afterwards, saying: "We gave goals away tonight. I have no time for excuses or hard luck stories, but if the game had gone to extra-time we would have paralysed them."

Forest assistant manager Bill Anderson, realising his side were a touch fortunate to be going through to meet Orient in the next round, said: "Of course Luton should have won but they did not get the breaks. Had we been 3-1 down at half-time we could not have grumbled but when one of our defenders headed the ball on to his own bar and we escaped it was then I began to think in terms of a victory for us.

"No-one can win a cup tie of this nature without luck and Luton certainly did not enjoy their share tonight."

SUPPORTING YOUR CLUB IS NEVER EASY, NO MATTER WHAT LEAGUE, NO MATTER THE REPUTATION OR ITS PAST GLORIES. NOW IN THEIR SECOND SEASON IN THE TOP-FLIGHT FOLLOWING PROMOTION IN 2022, REDS FAN MATT OLDROYD GIVES US THE LOWDOWN ON WHAT IT LIKE TO FOLLOW FOREST THIS SEASON.

What does it mean to be a Forest supporter?

I think the last couple of seasons have truly shown me how much it means, after a quarter of a century following the Reds home and away. I've always been proud to follow them but getting to be part of Wembley and top flight adventures with my own generation has been brilliant.

How important is watching Forest to you and why?

I suppose it means an awful lot. I've followed this club to the third tier and back again, taking in places like Woking, Gillingham and Weymouth along the way. And now that my son has started to come to games over the last few years its somehow taken on even more importance. He saw Forest get promoted to the Premier League a lot quicker than his old man!

Luton might have had their rollercoaster ride, but can Forest fans associate with that? Describe how the ups and downs of following the club have impacted your life.

To an extent, yes. We were the original Premier League yo-yo club, but much of our recent history has been scratching around in a frustrating attempt to return to the top league. So perhaps more carousel than rollercoaster, although we made it in the end!

The fortunes of Forest will always have some sort of impact, but I've hopefully learned a little to cope with the losses a bit more these days!

Of all the players that have worn the red and white, who stands out for you and why?

Of those I have seen with my own eyes, I'll struggle to look beyond Stuart Pearce. The power of his

character and his Trent End salutes before kick-off used to mean everything to me as a young supporter. In more recent times I grew to adore Brice Samba. A wonderful goalkeeper who took us to Wembley with his heroics in the play-off semi-final.

Are there any matches against Luton that you remember in particular?

A 2-1 win at Kenilworth Road in 2019. I think it's the only time I've seen us win at your ground, and the away end was tremendous that day. I will always look forward to a trip to Kenilworth Road – its cramped and dated but, a little like the City Ground, it has lots of charm.

Can you put into words the feeling of being a Forest fan right now? What's your expectations for the remainder of the season and beyond?

It's a difficult period, combining the struggle on the pitch with the uncertainty of the PSR punishment. The sooner we learn our fate with that the better because at least then we know what we are fighting against. I think we have the talent to survive, but clearly results need to improve.

How has life supporting Forest changed during your lifetime following the club?

Perhaps I've become more cynical, and I've definitely grown tired of Saturday 3pm kick-offs becoming less frequent! The strange thing about it is you see these faces every weekend who you don't really know but you all grow up together, following a shared passion across the entire country. I've always liked that side of it. The camaraderie.

Finally, what's your favourite ever Forest game and why?

For reasons that won't surprise anyone, my favourite Forest games have mostly come in the last couple of years. Wembley was clearly amazing, but I will go for Arsenal at home at the end of last season when we secured our Premier League status. It felt like the culmination of many, many years of heartbreak coming to an end and the noise in the closing moments will stay with me forever.

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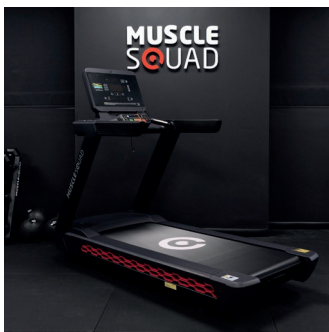
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ON THIS DAY



GREAT GAME 16TH MARCH 1974

LUTON TOWN 3 LEYTON ORIENT 1

As we have touched on elsewhere in today's programme, it was with sadness that we learned of the passing off Jimmy Husband last week.

Well, on this day in 1974, as the Hatters chased promotion to the top-flight, Jimmy scored a hat-trick as the Town saw off promotion rivals Orient at a packed Kenilworth Road.

In front of 17,045 Husband is the difference as the O's are seen off 3-1 with Alan West and Barry Butlin also in inspiring form.

THE RECORD

The Town's record on 16th March is decent down the years, losing just five times in the 21 games since the first match back in 1895, winning ten of those.

Hatters teams taking part on this day have won three of the last four, including the last two. Back in 2022 the Town thrashed Preston North End 4-0 at Kenilworth Road in the Championship with Luke Berry scoring two of those.

365 days prior to that win, the Town were successful at Kenilworth Road as well as goals from James Bree and Elijah Adebayo earned the Hatters a 2-0 win over Coventry in the Championship.

Draws at Wrexham in 2013 and at home to Gillingham in 2019 on our way to the League One title followed a 3-1 win over Kidderminster Harriers in the Conference in 2010. In front of 5,908 two goals from Kevin Gallen and one from Jake Howells gave Richard Money's side all three points.

TOP-FLIGHT TOWN

The Hatters are playing their fourth match in the top-flight on this day this afternoon and will be looking to earn their first victory.

Of the three games Town teams have played in the top division on 16th March, two have ended defeat.

Norwich City won 1-0 here at Kenilworth Road in 1991 while Burnley secured a 2-0 victory in 1957. Sandwiching those defeats was a 1-1 draw at Sheffield Wednesday in 1985 with Mick Harford on target in front of 18,856 at Hillsborough.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS YOU'LL NEVER SING THAT!

HE WAS THE MAN WHO LIFTED THE CONFERENCE TROPHY COME THE END OF A HISTORIC SEASON IN THE TOWN'S HISTORY. YET FOR CAPTAIN RONNIE HENRY, AS HE RECALLS, IT WAS NOT ALL QUITE PLAIN SAILING BEFORE THE GLORIOUS CAMPAIGN TEN YEARS AGO.



When Ronnie Henry first set foot in Kenilworth Road in 2012 he envisaged a first season of glory and goals, promotion and pride.

Signed by Paul Buckle from

Stevenage, then in League One, and instantly installed as captain, he had one aim and one aim alone: inspire Luton Town back to the Football League.

Sadly, things didn't quite work out for the former Stevenage man. The Town were regressing, and struggled in the Conference under Buckle in 2012/13. Kenilworth Road, which Henry once knew as an intimidating, hostile environment as a visiting player, was now an uncomfortable place for the Town players to perform as the team finished in seventh in the fifth tier.

It was a year that made Henry think about his decision to leave Stevenage and even question whether he would even stick around for a second season.

"That first year, if I said I didn't have second thoughts, I'd be lying to you," Henry says as he takes a look around an empty, cold and wet Kenilworth Road last week.

"Yeah, there were times that come over me that I thought this is this is a tougher challenge than I thought, and where I felt, 'what have I done?'"

"It wasn't easy. There was moments where I could have left the football club because of how hard it got, but the reason I was captain is because that I stuck by what I wanted to do."

By the time that disappointing season had come to an end the Town had a new man at the helm in the shape of John Still and Henry knew the boss would want to get back to basics if the side were to make a return to the Football League.

"I remember John taking over very clearly," remembers Henry. "It was a Tuesday evening. He came in to the dressing room and spoke to us. Then we went to Braintree and we lost. John came

to watch. He was quite clear in what he wanted. It was quite simple.

"John knew exactly what he wanted and he made it very clear from every different playing position from goalkeeper to the forwards. When you get it here, this is what you do. We're all on the same the same sheet. So it made it quite easy for us. It was quite, quite refreshing. It was simple."

But things in football are never easy, never simple.

Henry still had his burning ambition of winning the Conference, of being the captain and lifting the trophy, but a bumpy start to the following season saw the Town already playing catch-up.

With expectation as high as ever, Henry was quickly realising why the Hatters were finding it so difficult in getting out of the fifth tier.

And one incident in particular sticks out – one which went on to have a huge impact on the remainder of the season.

Behind at half-time at home against Lincoln, one fan vented his frustration at the team as they left the pitch. Once the Town had turned the game around and won 3-2 thanks to two goals from Mark Cullen, the captain stuck up for his teammates and told the supporter exactly what he thought.

"I remember it clearly now," recalls Henry. "I mean the position I played in the team was obviously at right-back. So coming over to get the ball back from the crowd and when they're throwing it back at you it was really hard not to hear what they were saying."

"I understood where they were coming from. The fans are passionate, they want the club to do well. They expect to do well. And we weren't doing great at the time."

"So it was it was on us. The only thing I said to the fan was that we had a young team. It wasn't easy, even for myself as a senior player and as a captain."

"There was a huge responsibility on us to win games week in, week out. And that situation here with the fan, right or wrongly, I went to speak to him. ▶

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"I said, 'listen, we're not doing it deliberately. We're trying our best. I understand where you're coming from. But listen, give us some leeway. A little bit. We'll try and get you where we want to get to'.

"Now a lot of people are saying that may have been the turning point to the club rising up the league, whether it was or not, I don't know, but him and the rest of the fans kind of understood.

"It was a case of 'let's get in this together'. We're only going to get up the leagues by the fans and the players and the staff all getting amongst it together. And I think that's when John started to bring the fans into the huddle.

"It certainly did bring us all together and it felt more of a more of a unique football club and you know for a fact when these fans here get behind you, in this environment, in this stadium, there was only one outcome when we walked out of this tunnel onto this pitch. We knew we were going to win."

With the fans onside and with Still reciting his "stronger the team" mantra each week, the Town were soon hitting their stride, hitting top spot at the turn of the year and never looked back.

Henry, from right-back, was in fine form and continued to use his leadership skills as captain to full effect – none more so on New Year's Day when Barnet came to Kenilworth Road.

"It was a big, big game and the weather was absolutely terrible, and I don't mind saying it now, but the game probably shouldn't have been on," remembers the skipper.

"I was freezing from the start but I was trying to get the game on, making sure it was on, making sure it was played. I said to the referee 'come on, ref, it's got to be played!'

"I was saying there was nothing wrong with the pitch, even though it's psychology in my head I knew the pitch was hardly playable.

"We landed up playing in areas in the corners of the pitch where it wasn't so bad. We didn't want to play in the areas that were terrible as the referee would call it off.

"But I'm really pleased the game went ahead because we ended up winning it and going four points clear. It was a big game and it was a big turning point.

"Psychologically it was big against Barnet because it was a huge game. To get that game on to keep the momentum going... after that we I didn't look back."

And that's how exactly how it ended. A 27-match unbeaten run paving the way for a promotion back to the Football League and, come the end of the season, Henry achieved the aim he set out when he first walked into the dressing room. ➤



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Helped by a team which included several leaders, with the likes of Steve McNulty, Mark Tyler, Luke Guttridge and Paul Benson, Henry wrote his name into Hatters history by lifting the Conference trophy aloft after the 4-1 win over Forest Green in the final home game of the campaign.

"It was special, especially being captain," he says. "I enjoyed the responsibility of being captain at such a fantastic football club and it was a real honour, but it was a real responsibility. It was tough the first year. I'm not going to lie to you.

"But I managed to do it the second year and it was a lot easier because of the experience in the in the changing room and the standards we had, the environment and the coaching staff created. It made my job a lot easier because I had five or six players around me that would do exactly the same job.

"I just wore the armband out on the pitch at the weekend and got the privilege to lift the trophy which was a huge, huge moment in my football career and one that I remember all these years on.

"But it wasn't just for me, it was for my family. It was for the fans and for the people that work here. Because when I came here it was obvious what the football club wanted.

"It became desperate for the fans to get out of the Conference. Everyone deserved it because we worked so hard for it and it was just a great moment, so to give that to the football club, it was a relief.

"I'm not going to lie, it was a relief. To banish all of that frustration that that you had sometimes taken personally, especially the previous year.

"But getting us out of the Conference was probably a bigger achievement than a lot of people realise because it's so hard to get out of the division with only one club being promoted automatically."

But while the Hatters were heading for League Two one man who wasn't was Henry.

"Yes," he says with a tinge of melancholy. "As soon as we finished the season and we were promoted I spoke to the club about extending my stay, and Luton were quite open to extending it, but I made the decision to go back to my old club Stevenage with my old manager.

"There was nothing against Luton, and I would love to have stayed here, but I thought at the time I needed to make a decision.

"I thought, I've come here. I had an agenda: I wanted to help get the football club into the Football League and I've done that so I could walk away happy.

"I'd love to have played for the club in the Football League but that wasn't to be.

"But I am so I'm so proud of what I've done here and I have no regrets. I have no regrets whatsoever." 🧢

HATTERS HISTORIAN ROGER WASH REMEMBERS OUR OPPONENTS DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS

S is for Salisbury, Southport, Stockport and Stevenage Borough

When we dropped into non-League it gave supporters a chance to visit new parts of the country such as the cathedral city of Salisbury and its quirky ground on the outskirts. Quirky inasmuch as a double decker bus stood along one touchline – ‘parking the bus’ took on a new meaning. We only played twice at Salisbury City, drawing both, but comfortably won our home games.

We had played Southport in our Football League days and resumed meetings for four seasons commencing in 2010/11. Highlights included 6-0 and 5-1 home wins with all different scorers in each plus the wonder volley from way out by Steve McNulty, which is still regularly shown today, during the 3-0 victory at Kenilworth Road during our promotion season.

At Haig Avenue a dismal 2-1 defeat in 2010/11 is hard to expel from the memory, as is the 1-0 defeat on the opening day of our promotion season. An entertaining 3-3 draw is sandwiched between these though.

Another team we had met semi-regularly during our Football League years was Stockport County who we met for two seasons in the Conference. They were on a downward spiral at the time though and we recorded three wins and draw from our four games with none regarded as classics.

When we were cruelly dumped into non-league the general feeling was that we would bounce straight back and so an early 1-0 home defeat at the hands of Stevenage Borough caused resentment in the crowd leading to manager Mick Harford leaving the club.

Looking back, it can be seen that Stevenage had pulled together a once in a generation squad of players that gradually assumed pole position. A chance came to pull closer to them over Easter 2010 at Broadhall Way where, in front of a capacity crowd, a solitary goal from Matthew Barnes-Homer separated the sides to inflict their only home defeat of the season.

Sadly, despite our best efforts, we could not catch them and ultimately finished second only to lose in the play-offs. 🏆

Following International Women's Day last week, I would like to begin by acknowledging the part our club plays in supporting women working within the football industry.

I am aware there are an array of challenges and obstacles that women can face in the workplace, which may be exacerbated in a male dominated environment, so choosing to work in the right place with the right people is paramount.

I think at some point in their career, a woman will question her work-life balance and whether parenthood will jeopardise her career, which can often be one of the many barriers to full-time employment for women.

I have been incredibly fortunate in the seven-and-a-half years that I have been at the club that I have always felt supported as both a female and as a mother. I currently work full-time as the academy administrator, but I initially joined the club as a sports therapist.

The opportunity to change to a more flexible role was presented to me when I found it difficult to balance my family life and work responsibilities. The academy are incredibly grateful

for this, as without me, I don't think they would cope...! I think that's what's great about football, there are so many different pathways available.

As a female working within the academy, I have never been made to feel "less-than" or undervalued, in fact, I am pretty sure I am everyone's favourite colleague (at least that's what I tell myself). So I would encourage any female exploring the possibility of working in football to try to ignore any gender stereotypes and to not be deterred.

Football is a fast paced and exciting environment with many jobs well suited to women. The current catalyst for change sees more women now entering the men's game, which is great. My own daughter plays for our girls under-12s and seeing the new generation of girls falling in love with the sport is exciting. For her (and even my son) it is important for me that they see a future where we champion women in sport.

However, the Hatters did not need to as a minute later Andie Dickens gave Luton the lead. Maddix floated a pass across the field which Dickens picked up. She sent the defender the wrong way and her effort from just outside the box slipped

underneath the goalkeeper and into the back of the net.

The Hatters almost had a second when Amber Pearson was played through on goal, forced the keeper into a good save before the rebound fell to Maddix only for her fire her shot over the crossbar.

On 33 minutes it seemed Maddix was through on goal, but a Bedford defender made an incredible last-ditch sliding challenge to prevent her from getting a shot away.

With three minutes to go until the break, Bedford equalised with an effort from the edge of the box.

The first attack of the second half goes Luton's way. Quick feet from Dickens saw her glide past two Bedford defenders, but her cross was slightly overhit and Bedford regained possession.

With 15 minutes to play, luck was on Real Bedford's side as they took the lead. Chloe Martin attempted a cross into the Luton box and the ball floated above Amy Butler and spins off a puddle at the goalmouth.

Despite their best efforts the Hatters could not find an equaliser and Real Bedford celebrated reaching the final.

Tanya Blacksley was awarded player of the match for her desire to win every tackle and challenge.

The Town know a victory this afternoon will lift them out of the relegation zone as they welcome a Nottingham Forest side to Kenilworth Road.

Forest sit one place and three points above the Hatters in the table after the Reds lost 1-0 at Brighton last Sunday. The Town's point at Crystal Palace inched them closer to Nuno Espirito Santo's side and could have gone into today's game above the Tricky Trees had they hung onto victory at Bournemouth.

The fight for survival is likely to go down to the wire as the season reaches its climax with the Town's fellow relegation rivals all losing last weekend.

Everton went down 2-0 at Manchester United as goals from Bruno Fernandes and Marcus Rashford gave Erik ten Hag's side all three points.

Brentford, who sit five points above the Town in the table went down 2-1 at Arsenal with Kai Havertz's goal six minutes from time giving the Gunners all three points in their quest for the league title.

The two sides below the Hatters in the table both picked up points following draws on the road – both letting two-goal leads slip.

Burnley led 2-0 at half-time against West Ham only for the Hammers to strike back in the second half and earn a point thanks to Danny Ings' injury-time equaliser.

And Sheffield United were also on the receiving end of a Bournemouth comeback as the Blades led 2-0 going inside the final



16 minutes only for the Cherries to fight back and earn a point.

The biggest game of last weekend saw Liverpool and Manchester City play out a high-quality 1-1 draw at Anfield. John Stones put City ahead in the first half but Alexis Mac Allister's second-half penalty ensured it finished all square.

The result of the weekend came at Villa Park as two Champions League hopefuls met. After a goalless first half, Tottenham scored four goals without reply in the second period to close the gap on fourth place to two points.

Wednesday night saw Luton take their place in the record books but sadly for all the wrong reasons, the Hatters becoming just the third team to ever lose a Premier League game having been 3-0 ahead at half-time.

When Ross Barkley blasted the visitors in what looked like an insurmountable lead just before the break, all eyes turned to the live league table to see Town above the dotted line once more, but following the second 45 minutes, it's doubtful anyone was up for checking it again.

All is not lost though, as come 5pm today, the standings could once more see Luton having dragged themselves out of the bottom three, if they can somehow summon almost superhuman reserves of energy and mental strength to defeat Nottingham Forest and go above the Reds in the process.

To do so will see Rob Edwards have to patch up his battered and bruised squad for one last time ahead of an international break that can't come soon enough for the manager.

Commendably, he doesn't want to use the quite incredible injury list as an excuse this season, pointing to the way in which Liverpool coped with such adversity recently, but it's safe to say Town have been hit harder than most

by their absentees.

Wednesday night saw Luton into double figures of players in the treatment room when facing the Cherries, with the quartet of Marvelous Nakamba, Jacob Brown, Amari'i Bell and Dan Potts all unlikely to feature against his term.

It means Luton have had to field two goalkeepers on their bench for their last three Premier League encounters, while despite the club and Edwards keen to promote young players, it would be extremely difficult to throw on teenagers Zack Nelson, Axel Piesold or the latest to be involved, Dominic Dos Santos Martins into the melting pot of a top flight relegation scrap, when their senior experience is next to nothing.

Edwards might not want to use it as an excuse, but I will, as had Sambi Lokonga or Elijah Adebayo been fit, the pair in prime form before suffering hamstring strains, it could well have been a different story on the south coast.

Injuries and unavailability are biting at just the wrong moment and if they are to be the reason why Luton aren't going to the likes of the Emirates, Old Trafford and Anfield once more next term, it will be a real, real shame. 🤕
